The venue for the finals of the 1984 Gold Cup was the Skean Dhu Hotel in Glasgow. This is not my favourite hotel by a long way, but the playing accommodation was excellent and 30 or 40 kibitzers were able to follow the action in comfort.

The Final




In the Sowter/Lodge methods the opening bid of 2NT showed either a pre-empt in clubs, or a major 2-suiter. Lodge responded 3C and Topley had a difficult decision to make at the 3-level. A double might have produced +500, but would more probably have led to a heart game. Topley chose to bid 3NT, however, and this contract was a thing of little beauty after a club lead. With only 8 top tricks, declarer had to try for the 9th via the spade finesse. Unlucky! The defenders took 5 clubs, 2 diamonds and a spade to put the contract 4 down.

In the other room Michael Allen opened a Precision 2C, and when this was passed round Sally Horton was able to compete at the 2-level. Sandra Landy transferred and the good heart game was reached. The swing on this hand accounted for the 12 IMP lead enjoyed by LANDY after the first set.

The strong club triumphs
On Board 10 the AIREY team suffered a heavy blow on a hand tailor-made for a strong club sys-

tem.

Topley cannot be blamed for opening 1S nor can Collins be crimed for his pass, but with everything lying favourably 11 tricks were available. 10 IMPs to LANDY.

Luck of the lead?

AIREY notched up his first double-figure swing on Board 17.

After auctions that started with a multi 2D, both teams landed in a reasonable slam. North had to find a lead . . .

Philip Topley led the two of

clubs, and this proved to be a safe choice. Nicola Smith won with the ace and finessed in spades, but with both key kings badly placed she had to go one down.

In the other room Sally Horton led a disastrous diamond. Russel Bryant won in hand and properly rejected the spade finesse, playing the ace and queen. The king of spades was his only loser, dummy's third diamond going away on the fourth heart. 14 IMPs to AIREY.

On Board 22 Landy and Horton had what could have been a lucky misunderstanding.

3NT had no chance on the lie of the cards. +50 to LANDY.

In the other room Landy considered her bid of 3S to be forcing, but her partner was not on the same wave-length and passed. I hope they get this sequence sorted out soon.


The club lead was won with the ace and the jack of spades run to the king. The six of clubs came back, and Landy could have made sure of 10 tricks by playing the 9 from dummy. She played the 5 instead, but it didn't matter since East put up the king anyway. South ruffed and played 3 more rounds of trumps, discarding diamonds from table. West switched to his diamond and East was allowed to win with the queen. Winning the diamond continuation, South played out the

rest of her trumps to squeeze West in hearts and clubs for 10 tricks.

How might it have been lucky to miss this game? Well, if West refrains from playing a second club declarer can make no more than 9 tricks.

Costly defence

On Board 26 Airey and Collins had a costly misunderstanding in defence.

In the open room, after a multi from East, South finished in a reasonable contract of 3H, making an overtrick for +170.

East passed in the closed room and Lodge opened 1C showing 7-11 points. After a forcing response and a transfer sequence, Sowter played in the quite unreasonable contract of 3NT.

Collins led the king of spades on which Airey played the eight! After some thought, Collins decided that this was probably from a singleton or doubleton holding, and switched to a diamond. Sowter was thus able to make his ridiculous contract with an overtrick, scoring 2 hearts, 3 diamonds and 5 clubs. Clearly, if playing in a more accustomed partnership, Airey would have overtaken the king of spades with his ace and returned the suit.

Perhaps he should have done so anyway.

The biggest swing of the match went to AIREY on Board 36.

A good contract of 6NT was reached at both tables. Collins won the spade lead in hand with the ace and immediately played a small diamond. When the queen won the trick, he returned to hand with a heart and played his second small diamond. West took her king, and declarer eventually finessed in clubs to land 12 tricks.


Sowter, playing from the North hand, also received a spade lead. He won with the ace and took a successful club finesse. That gave him 11 tricks, and it was just a matter of finding the 12th. He ran the queen of diamonds at trick 3 and lost to the king. A spade came back, and after cashing his third spade declarer tested the clubs. East discarded a heart on the 3rd round, and declarer then tried the diamonds, hoping for a club/heart squeeze if they didn't break. None of these chances came off and the slam went one down. 17 IMPs to AIREY.

Sowter picked a losing sequence at the end. If he had run the hearts before the diamonds West would have been caught in a minor-suit squeeze. In any case, he didn't give himself the best chance in the diamond suit. When the club finesse succeeds, it must be right to enter dummy with a heart and play a low diamond. When the queen or jack wins, the manouevre can be repe-

ated. The squeeze chances are only marginally diminished by this line of play, and declarer has the extra chance of finding the king of diamonds with West.

Nothing's impossible

Most of the swings continued to go the other way. On Board 50 Landy was allowed to make an 'impossible' 3NT.

The closed-room contract of 2H was made, in spite of the bad break, when Nicola Smith found the unfortunate lead of the jack of hearts.

In the open room South led the spade 9 against the ambitious contract of 3NT. Dummy's jack was allowed to win, North encouraging with the 8. Sandra ran the jack of clubs at trick 2 and Russel Bryant allowed it to win, a decision he was shortly to regret. When North discarded a heart on the second club. declarer won with the ace and played a low heart, smoking out the bare ace. South persevered with a spade and North again allowed dummy to win, completing an echo with the 2. Sandra now finessed the diamond queen and cashed the ace, and Airey missed his last chance to defeat the contract when he failed to unblock his king. Thrown in with the 3rd diamond he could cash two spades, but that was the end of the road. There was no way to reach the king of clubs, and declarer scored 3 diamonds, plus 2 tricks in each of the other suits.

The final contract was the same in both rooms, as was the opening lead of the ace and another spade. Bryant cashed the ace of hearts at trick 3 and subsequently lost control to go one down. The contract can be made after the play of the ace of hearts, but that is another story.

Nicola Smith realised that a 4-1 trump break could be troublesome. Since she could afford to lose a trump trick as well as a spade and club, she played the 8 of hearts from dummy at trick 3. With the boss heart still in dummy, she had an answer to anything the defenders might try. In practice West rose with the king of hearts and attacked in clubs, but Nicola was able to ruff the second club with the ace of hearts, draw trumps, and take the rest of the tricks for a gain of 10 IMPs.

When the final tally was made (at 11.30 pm for play had speeded up commendably), it transpired that the LANDY team had won the Gold Cup by 92 IMPs (180-88). The team had played good bridge all weekend and thoroughly deserved their win

As far as I know, it's the first time the Gold Cup has been won by a team containing 3 women, and it's encouraging to think that all three will be members of the British Women's team for the World Olympiad at Seattle in October.

### 1984 PACHABO CUP by John Williams

The Pachabo remains one of the most cherished events in the calendar - widely supported, keenly contested, and generally played in a spirit appropriate to a gathering of the clans.

This year 29 of our 34 County Associations entered their county teams champions for the Cup, played at the Grand Hotel, Birmingham on 9th and 10th June.

Though many teams rose to and fell from the leader board at different times, one never faltered. Gloucestershire in the form of Angseesing, Kambites, Rue and Chamberlain, held the front by an almost indecent margin virtually from start to finish, to a point where they led by more than two matches with one to go. A remarkable achievement by any standards, and not less so after losing their last encounter to the runners-up, Yorkshire.

Normally one looks for a hand on which the winners excelled or modestly demonstrated the luck that accompanied them. Here there were perhaps too many of both, (certainly the former), for the winners to present an agreed choice.

Meanwhile, one deal stood out from the weekend as being of instructive interest.

West leads the ace of diamonds against 4S played by South, after

the auction 1S-4S.

At my table East followed with the nine, the king was continued and ten tricks resulted, to the relief of some and the consternation of others. Team-mates at the other table did better:

East played the jack of diamonds under the ace showing, presumably, either the ten without the queen, or a doubleton. West judged the latter to be less likely and switched to the queen of clubs. Declarer covered with the king, (at first sight a duck in dummy seems obligatory), East won with the ace and returned the ten of diamonds, covered by the queen and ace and now West was required to guess whether to cash a club or a diamond. He guessed wrong for a flat board.

Two points emerge: firstly, covering the queen of clubs at trick two is perhaps not the wooden play it appears to be. If the queen is ducked, and East rises to the occasion and overtakes to return a diamond, West cannot now misguess which suit to cash.

Secondly, how good are your defensive signalling methods? East's play of the diamond jack at trick one must be correct, but which diamond does he return when on lead? There must be a theoretical case for discounting possession of the ten, which you have already promised, and playing the nine to show an even number after the jack and ten, (in this case, with J10975 one would have played the 5 at trick

These are deep waters, and any pair who defeated 4S by legitimate means, and would do so in any similar circumstances, should step forward and announce their credentials. The EBU selection committee might wish to take notice.

Indeed, my best friends have been known to say I'd be quite a decent sort of chap if I would just occasionally shut up! I offer no defence. I admit to an extraordinary talent for extending the conversation. But I do know when to shut up—at the bridge table, that is. And that's what this article is about—when to overcall and when to keep quiet.

Much has been written about bidding in general. Most of it, perforce, relates to systems, conventions, etc, etc. And therein lies a void. It prescribes treatments for a partnership, for two regular partners to study and agree. Even books on competitive bidding lean heavily in the direction of partnerships. All very useful, but, what of the innumerable situations that concern only you — the player with a decision to make on whether to overcall or not.

### A lesson learnt

I make no great claims to original thought, but feel that I have been lucky enough to be in the right places at the right times to hear the wisdom of so many great players. My thanks are to them for any ideas that I have and any philosophies that have developed. How about a hand?

Playing teams at love all, partner opens 1H, 1S on your right, 2H from you, 2S on the left, then 4S. "Normal" auction, contract solid — so what's the mystery?

Many years ago I held the hand playing against the late, great pair Konstam/Dodds. At the end of play Leslie Dodds, with his usual courtesy, asked if I would mind if he made a comment about my bidding. Of course, I was delighted, (how nice it would be if the gratuitous commentaries of some of today's 'good' players were prefaced with a polite 'would you mind?').

"Young man", he said, "your 2H bid was the only way we could bid our game with such low values. Although I had a good overcall, I could hardly proceed over 2S except in the knowledge that my Jxx were facing a shortage. Plus the information that my partner's values were outside the suit."

So obvious when you think of it. My hand is far too weak to hope to buy the hand unless partner is very strong. If he is, I'll hear from him again and, as was demonstrated, if the hand belongs to the enemy, then my bid can only give them help.

The board turned out to be flat, so perhaps even the international opponents in the other room were just as naive as I.

Of course, it makes a difference had RHO passed. Now a raise to 2H might well crowd the enemy out. If one follows through this thinking, if you open 1H and hear partner raise to 2H after a spade intervention, it should show a sound raise.

# ONLY BID TO IMPROVE THE SILENCE by Joe Amsbury

Helping the opponents

Pursuing the same general thought. Pass from partner, 1C on the right and you hold:

### ♠ 643 ♥ K4 ♦ KQ10976 ♣ J7

Do you bid the 'automatic' 1D? If so, with respect, you have fallen into the trap that snared me so many years ago. Your partner has passed so you can hardly expect to buy the hand. The only possible gain is that it might assist partner to find the best lead in defence. This is a very hackneyed alibi; after all, some of the time you will be on lead yourself and some of the time you will persuade the enemy to change from a bad game to one that is better. At worst, as happened, partner doubles the opponents in a cold game. Just as bad, you've helped quite a lot in solving declarer's problems in the play.

Make your good suit spades. Now, over 1C or even 1D, you can claim that you might crowd the auction, you might push them too high and, if the vulnerability is right, there may be a cheap sacrifice available.

At the heart of the matter is the fact that whenever we bid it is believed that that bid is more likely to gain than lose. Assume that you open 1H with:

### ♠ K84 ♥ KJ73 ♦ A104 ♣ KQ6

Next hand doubles and it is left in for penalties. Say you lose 800. That's not going to stop you from opening 1H next time, is it?

### A sound overcall

It obviously gains more to open the bidding than to pass. Just to illustrate the point, you are vulnerable at teams. 1S is bid on your right and you hold:

### ♠ KQ5 ♥ AQ10764 ♦ K742 ♣ None

You bid 2H, as did my partner, Terence Reese, in a French tournament. As I entered -800 on my score card I could hardly contain a smile. Terence's overcall was sound, but his counterpart in the other room I knew to be an 'aggressive' bidder. As expected, we gained 12 IMP's when 4H, (the chosen bid), met with a fatal end. Nonetheless, 2H was impeccable. It stood to gain more than it stood to lose. Compare that with the bids shown earlier.

You will surely have picked up my thread by now. All bids, but particularly those made after the opponents have opened, must have a real purpose.

It can be a realistic hope to have enough combined values to buy the contract; an attempt to obstruct, (normally a space-consuming bid); and, sometimes, when the scene is right, it can be an attempt to prepare a profitable sacrifice.

To make sense, a bid must have a purpose in mind. If you overcall 1H with 2C, holding

### ◆ Q3 ♥ Q72 ♦ A63 ♣ AJ864

and get doubled for a big penalty, don't complain about bad luck. Instead, reflect on the good luck you had when many similar overcalls went unpunished!

When we open the bidding — say 1H — we are not stating that we expect to make seven tricks with hearts as trumps. No more does a 1S response convey the same message. Bidding whatever the system, is simply a conversation wherein two people chat, exchange views etc. about where and how high to go.

An overcall is a different kettle of fish. You will rarely get the chance to have a cosy chat with your partner. Too often the opening side will quickly raise the level beyond your side's ability to communicate.

To sum up — an opening bid is a suggestion and carries quite a range. An ovecall, even a jump overcall, is a statement of expectation in the *named* suit and, if partner is going to be able to make accurate assessments, the expected number of tricks must be narrowly defined.

So, if you haven't got anything intelligent to say, keep quiet.

It is strange how often a random draw produces an ideal climax. The Crockfords Final proved to be a case in point. With two rounds to play, the four teams in contention for the trophy were paired together—Posner v Airey, and Stanley v Elliot.

Posner was to meet Stanley in the final round, whilst Airey and Elliot would be playing teams not in contention.

In the penultimate round Posner had a convincing win over Airey. In the other key match Phillip Alder and I, making one of our rare appearances together, seemed to have no more than held our own on the first eight boards against Elliot. However, we were ahead 37-4 after a devastating set by the evergreen Phil Topley with his regular partner Dave Collins.

With such encouragement we made a more positive contribution to the second half which was won 40-12, and this gave us not only a win by 20-0 VPs, but also a lot of aggregate IMPs which would come into play in the event of a tie. Such a result was on the cards for Posner now had the same VP score as us and no one else could win the trophy.

Board 2 of our match v Elliot gave North problems. You hold at 'red':

### ♠K52 ♥Q84 ♦AQ62 ♣A52


West opens 1S. Do you overcall 1NT, double or pass? Assuming you pass, East bids 2S which comes back to you. What now?

Suppose, instead, you hold as West at 'green':

### ◆AQ1096 ♥A1096 ♦K53 ♣10

(a) Shows good defensive values and probably only 3 spades. What now? Sandra Landy passed, which seemed a reasonable view. The full hand:



After a spade lead and a club

switch Phillip could only make 6 tricks and came to 5 of them for -400. In the other room North overcalled 1NT, East doubled and a spade lead set up a possible 800. However, when North took his king of spades and led a small club it was not clear to East that he needed to play the king. Now North escaped for -500 with the aid of the diamond finesse. If you passed throughout as North, award yourself 12 IMPs.

The match against Posner started with a few dull boards. Then I picked up the following exotic collection at 'green':

### **♠**KQ732 ♥A ♦AKQ1096 ♣8

What luck we were playing a club system! Surely the Acol pair in the other room would have problems. Our bidding was smooth:

1C	1D(a)	(a) 0-6
2D(b)	2H(c)	(b) Forcing
2S	3C	(c) 0-3
35	45	THE REAL PROPERTY.


The king of hearts is led and you see that partner has found a good imaginative raise to 4 spades with:

### **♠**J9 ♥7652 ♦8 **♣**J96542

You dislodge the ace of trumps, ruff the heart continuation and discover that spades are 4-2. So you start playing diamonds praying they will run. How infuriating if your good game fails whilst opponents are in a puny part-score. Your prayers are answered and 4S makes. Good news? Not exactly! You lose 5 IMPs, whereas if the jack of diamonds hadn't dropped you'd have gained 8, as the opponents are in 4S doubled!

### Double?

During this match an ethical matter arose of general interest.

### CROCKFORDS 1984

The director was called after the 2S bid to establish the facts and protect the position of E/W. North at this point explained the double as 'two way' — "He may have good trumps or he may be stuck for a bid. I have to judge whether to leave the double in," was the gist of his explanation.

3S just made and the T.D. returned at the end of the hand to rule that the score of +140 stood, as 2H would have given N/S +200. He added an obiter dicta for the guidance of N/S to the effect that he would have awarded an adjusted score if 2H had been making.

"That is ridiculous," said North, "the same thing happened to me in the Spring Foursomes!"

If an experienced and successful tournament player can misunderstand this classic situation, it is clearly likely to puzzle others, and the principle underlying the T.D.'s remarks are worthy of amplification.

You cannot fairly play that such doubles may or may not show good trumps, for you will never achieve an equal tempo when you double with AQJx and when you double with Axx.

Partner's 'judgement' is bound to be influenced by the pace of the double. Would a player remove such a double with a weak no trump that contains AK and A if he thought partner had 4 good trumps? When partner has 4 good trumps, doubles in tempo, and you leave it in, the opponents have no redress. You have given yourself an advantage to which you are not entitled and the only way to even things up for your opponents is for the T.D. to award an adjusted score when you take the right decision to remove a slow double.

If one accepts the ethical principle, how do you deal with the situation North/South faced without giving your opponents a 'free kick'. There are at least 3 solutions.

(i) South eventually decides to double and North stands it. At teams this is clearly an exciting policy not suited to unsympathetic team-mates. I have never subscribed to the ultra modern theory that strong players should concece 670 from time to time.

- (ii) South gives up the chance of a juicy penalty when North has 3 trumps and bids 2 no trumps or a speculative 2 spades.
- (iii) You play, as do Roman Smolski and I, that such doubles show a doubleton trump. Partner passes with 4 trumps and adequate values, can use his judgement without ethical problems with 3 trumps, and removes the double with a doubleton trump. With such methods South redoubles 1NT and it is North who doubles 2 hearts. Now South has a close view. I would remove to 2 spades at teams and take my chances of the magic +200 at pairs.


At half-time we are 10 IMPs down and need to get back 8 to achieve a 10-10 draw. After 7 fairly uneventful boards we have regained only 3. On the final hand you hold as West at 'red':

**♠**KJ93 ♥85 ◇K52 **♣**KJ94

The opponents bid:

North	South
1H	1S
2D	2H
2S	No

Your lead? I tried a trump. The full hand was as follows:



Declarer finessed the queen of spades and led a small heart. Phillip won with the king and switched to a club, won with the ace. Now the queen of hearts was cashed and, once everyone had followed, declarer felt 10 tricks were secure and, in such a close match, the overtricks could be vital. He crossed to the ace of spades expecting trumps to be 3-2, but now the hand collapsed for 2 off.

The winning line, after the queen of hearts, is to ruff a club and play the ace of hearts. West can ruff, but the ace of trumps provides an entry for the jack of hearts to force another trump from West, and eight tricks are made. Dave Collins had made 2S in the other room against a diamond lead, and this gave us just the 5 IMPs we needed.

It seemed unfortunate for the Posner team to lose on a split-tie decided on total IMPs, especially as they had defeated us by 2 IMPs in our match. It would surely be better to provide, in future, that on the very rare occasions that 2 teams are equal of VPs and have drawn their match, that they play 4 boards to

decide the matter.

Even better would be to play the final over the Bank Holiday weekend and extend it to 3 days, enabling the 2 leading teams from the round robin to meet in a 64board final. Surely the English teams of 4 Championship merits a long head-to-head final?


### JUNIOR CAMROSE ENGLAND WIN 6TH YEAR RUNNING

### **NOT GUILTY**

The Laws and Ethics Committee conducted an Enquiry under the Union's Bye-Law 41(d) into allegations of misconduct on the part of Union members Mr K. Kelmere and Mr C. Kelmere, playing in partnership.

The Committee found that the bidding methods adopted by Messrs Kelmere were undoubtedly unusual and the basic philosophy such that opponents may have difficulty at times in comprehending.

However, there was evidence that, on occasion,

these methods had led to disaster.

On examining certain hands on which their unusual style had gained good results, it was clear that they courted disaster if opponents had taken different actions. The evidence showed no unfair play or other misconduct under the terms of Bye-Law 41(b).

It was the Committee's decision, therefore, that Mr K. Kelmere and Mr C. Kelmere are not guilty of a

breach of Bye-Law 41(b).

### DOUBLE IN DOUBT

In Keith Stanley's Crockford's report he records an ethical question which has created problems several times of late.

The requirements are absolutely clear: if a player who has opened 1NT on balanced no-trump values is not to pass his partner's double of opponent's overcall (albeit with a doubleton in the trump suit), then he has a partnership agreement which must be stated on his convention card. (Its absence where there is any margin of doubt will go against him.)

The double must be alerted in accordance with section 10(v)(c) of the Directives, and the opener's actions subsequent to the double must be uniformly consistent with the method, regardless of partner's tempo, for players cannot avail themselves of a two-tone double which hangs its real meaning on the degree of assurance with which it is

made.

Where a double can be made without values in trumps, it follows that it can only be passed on a hand which does have trump values, no doubt better than Jxx.

This June's Pachabo competition produced a situation in which the application of the same principle had to be determined in a situation that was very different from those previously examined:

North argues that after partner has doubled, for penalties by partnership methods, he knows South has 4 spades. E/W suggested that East could well have a void in hearts with South having four.

The appeal committee considered this latter view was entirely feasible, noting particularly that the hesitation before the double does make it certain that South will not have 4 hearts and, ergo, must have spades.

North is not entitled to his removal of the double to spades. which is made secure by the unauthorised information, and the score is adjusted to 3Hx minus 1 = +200to N/S.






### HESITATION

The Proprieties describe as 'grossly improper' any attempt to mislead an opponent through the hesitancy of a play. An opponent who draws a false inference in these circumstances is entitled to score adjustment under Law 12; a penalty under Law 99 is discretionary.

A case in point would be where a player has no problems but recognises that his partner needs time to think and deliberately spends time over his own play of a card in order to disguise which of them has the problem: this is a deliberate attempt to mislead opponent by the hesitancy of his play.

# Letters

### SMOKED OUT

One of the more unfortunate aspects of bridge is, for me at least, its association with tobacco smoking. Many's the time I've left a session with streaming eyes and headache due to unwanted 'passive smoking'. Many players seem to have no conception of the hardship they cause to others when lighting up.

As one of the younger members of the EBU, I have in recent years played in such competitions as the Daily Mail Schools Cup and the Junior Guardian Pairs. I am sure many members of the Union would be surprised to know that ashtrays were provided even in events where none of the competitors were over eighteen and, indeed, some were even as young as eleven or twelve!

Is the Union aware that such occurrences take place? I am sure that the Union has no intention of

initiating tobacco addiction among under-age persons yet, at the same time, I find the aforementioned events difficult to comprehend.

May I take this opportunity of wishing the new magazine every success.

Ed.: There is no evidence that ashtrays initiate tobacco addiction. Rather, the reverse is true. An ashtray full of dog-ends makes a very strong statement against taking up the habit and, indeed, is often used in anti-smoking advertisements.

On the other hand, if ashtrays weren't provided and smokers left with no alternative but to flick their ash and stub out their cigarettes on the floor, the EBU would rapidly run out of venues willing to accept bookings for bridge events.

### SCORING FOR

**BEGINNERS** 

The International Code for duplicate scoring, the system generally used in America, provides for scoring in half match-points, (1 MP for every lower and ½ for every equal score). The end result is, of course, the same as ours, (2 MPs for every lower score and 1 MP for equal), but the arithmetic is scaled down and therefore more manageable. For convenience, halves are denoted on score sheets by an 'X'.

Also, instead of marking the highest score first, I find it easier to start with the lowest and work upwards. The lowest N/S score, which may be a minus, is marked '0', the next lowest '1', the next '2' and so on. The number of points to be awarded at any stage in the marking is, in fact, always equal to the number of results already marked.

This little rule comes in useful when equal scores upset the simple progression. If there are equal scores the points are shared. Thus two equals sharing 5 and 6 MPs would each be marked '5X'; three equals sharing 4, 5 and 6 MPs would each get '5'; and in both cases the next score to be awarded would be '7'.

Before long we may be able to program our home computers to do all the scoring and calculations for us. Meanwhile, I would strongly urge those burdened, (albeit voluntarily), with this chore, to try the above system.

### WHO WAS RIGHT?

May I present a query? As South I held, at Game All:

♠K6 ♥AK642 ♦None ♣QJ10764 and the bidding went:

East South West North
1D 2C No 2NT
3D 3H All pass

North held:

▲A8 ♥Q1076 ♦AQ74 ♣983

and the obvious 11 tricks were made.

I chided partner for not raising to game and she replied that since I hadn't doubled the opening bid, (which she strongly averred I ought to have done), she felt fully justified in passing.

Pity we hadn't been practising C U R B — it would have promoted a much healthier atmosphere for the rest of the evening!

May I request you put the query to your panel for criticism and comments?

H. Black, Sale, Cheshire.

Ed.: The modern method is not to double with a two-suited hand, but to bid your suits as you did.

The panel was divided on whether your 3H is forcing. However, those who felt it wasn't had to agree that, looking at North's hand,

....

it was impossible to construct a holding for South that could possibly merit a pass from North.

Your failure to double the opening bid marks you with spade, as well as diamond, shortage, therefore your shape must be something like 2-5-0-6 or 2-4-1-6 or 1-5-1-6 with values for game since you were prepared to bid a new suit at the 3 level. You certainly won't be 2-4-2-5 since, with that type of hand, you would either pass 3D or double if you're strong enough, as partner has shown diamond values with her 2NT bid.

In short, the pass of 3H was incomprehensible.

### **GLITTERING PRIZES**

Everyone playing at the moment accepts, (albeit grudgingly), that it is impossible to make a living playing tournament bridge in this country. However, it is surely in everybody's interests for the overall standard of our major events to be as high as possible.

Why do many of the top players not play in the majority of the national competitions? Why is it so difficult for young players to improve their game sufficiently to join the ranks of the top players?

It is agreed by the majority of players that the most effective way to improve is by playing with and against 'good' players and this is true irrespective of your standard.

The answer to the two questions

posed above is, in many instances. money. To give an example, take the premier Swiss Teams event in the calendar - the Four Stars in Brighton this summer. The entry fee is around £18 and the first prize, (in a field of 250-300 teams), is £40. The difference hardly covers travelling costs let alone accom-

Where is the incentive for the top players to play in an event where even if they win or reach the final in a very large field, they cannot even nearly cover their expenses?

For young players, especially students, it is impossible to play often enough to gain the experience necessary to do very well at the game. Members are always dis-

appointed when our national teams fail to excel in international competitions, but it is hardly surprising where are the young players coming through. Answer - they're

How can the EBU justify giving such small prizes to winning teams and giving prizes down to teams finishing 80th? Let's scrap the prizes from 20th to 80th and give decent prizes to the first 10-20 teams.

The argument that big prizes encourage cheating holds no water if people want to cheat they will anyway, and the amounts we're talking about are still tiny by comparison with the continental events. Mark Smith, Bristol.

In the last Quarterly S. Watson complained that clubs don't make enough effort to welcome new faces and encourage poorer players.

I was sorry to read Sid Watson's letter in the Quarterly. As a past President of the NEBA, present Chairman of the Newcastle Bridge Club, a member of Whitly Bay and other local clubs and a player in almost all of the North East clubs I have only rarely met the kind of conduct he complains of.

Some of the smaller clubs have an accommodation problem and cannot cope with additional members. Some players are less than tolerant of 'poorer' players, but that is not something which is confined to the North East.

I would not like visitors to the North, or local people who would like to play or learn to play, to be put off by this letter.

All the local clubs are listed in the telephone directories and we have an excellent private bridge school in Newcastle. I am sure anyone wishing for a game either occasionally or regularly will find local secretaries willing to find them congenial company.

Sitting West, RHO opened 'one diamond' out of turn. The director was called and the appropriate section of the rule book read out. The bidding then reverted to the correct opener, (my partner, East), who opened . . . 'one diamond'.

South, the offender, then passed and so North was also obliged to pass subsequently and we eventually played the contract in 5C doubled for a score of +550.

What would have been the ethical consideration had South bid his suit, (he did have diamonds), at the two level over my partner's one diamond bid, (partner also had diamonds!)? The cue bid in that position would, you see, have shown a black two-suited hand. Would North have to have alerted it

and acted on it being so, or could he have got South 'off the hook' by treating it as a diamond suit?

Ed.: Having 'paid the prescribed penalty for an inadvertent infraction, it is proper for offenders to make any call or play advantageous to their side, even though they appear to profit through their own infraction.

So, as partner is obliged to pass for one round, the only logical interpretation of a 'two diamond' bid from South, in the situation above, is that he has a diamond suit and is prepared to play in it at the two level. North is free to make use of the knowledge he has gained and to treat the bid as natural.




# MY FAVOURITE



Dr U. Jacobson had the problem. Always a very thoughtful player (ie slow!) he took very little time to reason that such generosity from LHO could only have one meaning — great expectations of winning a second trick. As this second trick could only be the trump queen, he ran the jack of spades at trick 3. The full deal:



Dr Jacobson's partner was generous in his praise — not for the clever play, but because "he did it in less than 5 minutes!"





### **LADY MILNE TROPHY 1984**

### by Raymond Brock

The draw determined that England would play Scotland in the final match and, at that time, England needed an 8-4 victory (ie 9IMPs) to retain the trophy.

In the last session of each match the boards were played in 2 sets of five to allow a half-time comparison and, at this stage, England were leading by 10 IMPs — one more than the required margin. The boards were flat in the 2nd half and the following board was clearly the crucial deal.



In both rooms West opened 1NT and played there, doubled by South. England led the 3D, playing 3rd and 5th leads, covered by dum-

my's queen and won by South's ace.

If South returns a diamond and North wins to clear the suit, declarer can get home by using the 2 entries in dummy to double finesse in spades. Of course, if North were to switch to a heart, declarer would be limited to one entry to dummy, South would have an established suit, and declarer would fail by 2 tricks.

In fact, South returned the king of hearts. Declarer won with the ace and finessed the queen of spades. When this held she continued with ace and a small spade. Clearly an error, since playing the ten of spades sets up the 9 of spades as an entry to dummy to cash the jack of diamonds once it has been established.

However, South now switched to the ten of clubs, instead of continuing hearts, covered by declarer, and when North returned a club declarer emerged with 8 tricks and a score of +380! Even at this stage North could still have defeated the contract by cashing the diamond and returning a heart.

In the other room the English declarer played low on the initial

lead and when South was able to win with the diamond ten to switch to a low heart she had no further chance to make the contract and went one down.

Declarer's play at trick one was a tactical error since the target wasn't to gain points but simply to preserve the 10 IMP lead by adopting the line of play most likely to be chosen in the other room.

That was 9 IMPs away and England lost a further 10 playing in 5 spades, one down, when they tried for a very unlikely slam.


