### Landfill battle intensifies

THE battle is intensifying on several fronts to stop a massive Perth rubbish tip being built 14km south of Toodyay.

Objectors have a new deadline of Monday March 24 for public submissions to the WA Department of Environment Regulation opposing the tip (see advertisement Page 2, Letters, Page 4).

Morley waste management company Opal Vale Pty Ltd has applied to the DER for "works approval" to operate a 30ha landfill dump in Chitty Road.

The disused claypit is planned to take three million tonnes of rotting Perth rubbish over the next 20 years and add an extra 42 heavy trucks and road trains a day on busy Toodyay Road.

WA's State Administrative Tribunal granted conditional approval last year and the Environmental Protection Authority has rejected calls for a full environmental assessment.

However, in upholding the EPA ruling, Environment and Heritage Minister Paul Jacobs said it "should not be taken to infer that the proposal is environmentally acceptable"

And in an apparent swipe at Government inaction, the EPA said a strategic waste management policy to meet future demand "would be preferable to the continued ad hoc development of landfill proposals'

Even if the DER approves the landfill site, objectors can appeal further under State environmental protection law.

Local opponents are redoubling their efforts to stop the landfill site after sending a 4324-signature petition to State Parliament last October.

They want the WA Waste Authority

to expand its review of Perth waste and recycling to cover fringe areas such as Chittering, Gingin, Northam, York, Beverley and Toodyay.

The current Perth and Peel Region review is not expected to be completed until mid-2014.

Local objectors want the DER to conduct a full and comprehensive investigation of the Toodyay landfill proposal, as promised by the Minister.

The department is currently facing strong public criticism for its regulatory oversight of the dumping of industrial liquid waste into the Serpentine River and serious contamination of neighbouring properties at Oakford.

Objectors' concerns about the Toodyay landfill site include:

- Contamination of surface and groundwater in the Avon River Catchment:
- Pit stability and seismic activity;
- Air quality noise, dust and asbestos dust and fibres:
- Litter and visual amenity;
- Increased heavy trucks and road safety; and
- Community interest and public consultation.

IT SEEMS that the WA Planning Commission (WAPC) has allowed radical elements within its ranks to promote an eminently sensible

Responding to community demands for more affordable housing and rentals, the WAPC has altered its policy on Ancillary Accommodation (granny flats).

The Commission has removed the requirement that they can only be occupied by members of the same family and will allow folks to rent them out.

Our Council waxes lyrical in its aims and objectives about wanting to provide for a range of housing choices and to encourage creative planning and design.

Yet we have hundreds of overly restrictive building regulations such as the one that says an ancillary dwelling must be a similar design and appearance to the existing house.

We will end up like Perth at this rate. The flatlands appear as barren as a desert to the countryman's eye, offering nothing but the same fences and roofs instead of a horizon.

Why should we emulate them when the people of Perth are flocking to Toodyay on the weekend to escape from the mindnumbing sameness of Perth.

They love to see quaint old workers' cottages and tractors rusting in the sun with a windmill creaking lazily in the background.

We should be encouraged to build a mudbrick hut or a stone cottage with a fireproof cellar instead of another brick box.

A well-built stone cottage can withstand flood, fire and tempest.

I note that Cr Craddock moved that Council consider methods to encourage passive solar dwellings by waiving some fees and charges. Toodyay should be exploring innovative

ideas and solutions instead of harassing residents for possible infractions of pernickety regulations.

An inordinate amount of council time is taken up with deciding which particular hue of Colorbond fencing will be allowed or if the pitch of the verandah roof will be acceptable.

A number of contentious issues are currently up for public comment such as signage policy.

If you go to the Shire's new partially installed website, click on news, then Periodic Review of Local Laws, have a read and pick out what you think is unreasonable and write to or email the CEO by 17 March.

Here's one example: it seems you can cop a fine of \$5000 if you perform street theatre or play any musical instrument wearing dirty, torn or ragged clothing

Moondyne Joe will be in the poo again and it's the end of live music in town.

I reckon someone let the 'Temperance

women' from the Moondyne festival write that policy.

It's ridiculous and frankly none of Council's business what sartorial fashion choices we make.

The Shire Council should consider the fact that its real strength comes from the community supporting it and stop trying to micro-manage every damn thing we do.

#### Poor timing

IN THEIR infinite wisdom Council has seen fit to reschedule their meetings in future to the day after the Herald's deadline.

It seems they want a whole month to get their accounting in order and tidy up the end of period adjustments for the previous month.

The upshot of this is that, if something bothers you enough to then write to the editor about it, your letter won't be published another two editions.

That means more than two months between the original meeting and your response hitting the streets by which time the subject will be done and dusted, dead and buried. A poor effort.

#### Council amalgamations

WA Premier Colin Barnett said he'd be coming for regional local governments once he's finished forcibly amalgamating the metropolitan ones.

As Parliament resumed, two Liberal Members voiced their support for his plan and another has called for Royalties for Regions to be scrapped.

While they haven't scrapped the Dadour provisions which allow for a referendum if the residents are opposed to an amalgamation proposal, they have found a loophole which is to simply change the boundaries between two councils and then they become one.

Barnett might have his little hobby farm out here but do you really think he gives a rat's about where our township is administered

Former Shire CEO Graham Merrick and his crew wanted us to merge with Chittering,

just down the road a bit. Too easy. Maybe Goomalling, seeing as how we're just next door with such similar interests.

Or Northam, being the biggest kid on the block could take us under their wing and make our decisions for us.

This is a debate about the right of citizens to self-government at a municipal level.

It is likely that only those amalgamations that are not seriously contested will proceed. Council would do well to reflect on this before further disengaging from the community.

### New top cop sends strong message

TOODYAY'S new police chief says he has zero tolerance for crime and has served notice of a 24/7 crackdown on criminal activity to protect local community safety.

Sgt Warren Conder, who transferred from busy Geraldton Police Station last year, said he arrived to find Toodyay "inundated with a high level of crime".

The main offences were burglary, stealing, assaults, trespassing and anti-social behaviour.

The highly experienced police officer – who also served 13 years in Australia's defence forces – responded with a local lawenforcement blitz that resulted in "numerous arrests being made and well over 100 charges going to court".

"I have a zero tolerance for crime and I make no apologies for this," Sgt Conder told *The Herald*.

"Everyone in our diverse community has a right to feel safe at home or at work, day or night – and my staff and I intend to ensure this happens."

Sgt Conder is familiar with Wheatbelt policing, having spent part of his 15-year WA Police career at Wongan Hills before his more recent Geraldton posting.

recent Geraldton posting.

He holds a degree from Edith Cowan University majoring in police studies and criminology, and served in both the Royal Australian Navy (HMAS Brisbane and HMAS Derwent) and the Australian Army (109 Signals Squadron) after lecturing in law and business studies at Edith Cowan University and working in WA Government industrial relations.

His police email signature includes a quote by Senator Robert F. Kennedy, US Attorney General, 1961-61, who was murdered by a gunman while campaigning in 1968 to be elected US President:

"Every time we turn our heads the other way when we see the law flouted, when we tolerate what we know to be wrong, when we close our eyes and ears to the corrupt because we are too busy or too frightened, when we fail to speak up and speak out, we strike a blow against freedom and decency and justice."

Sgt Conder is joined at Toodyay Police Station by Snr Const. Nicky Turner (also previously at Geraldton and Wongan Hills), First Class Const. Lea Arnold, Const. Greg Bingham (previously at Northam), Const. Chris Milonas and long-time Toodyay resident, Community Service Officer Lee Pollard.

Const. Bingham was involved in youth

group activities in Northam and has launched similar new programs in Toodyay.

First Class Const. Arnold also has a Wheatbelt background from a previous police posting at Kellerberrin that included Wheatbelt basketball and other youth programs, and Const. Milonas is active locally in sport and community events.

Sgt Conder said they join CSO Pollard in sharing an excellent local knowledge of Toodyay and its surrounding areas.

The new station chief describes himself as a family man with a community focus who enjoys working with the community at all levels.

"I encourage people in the community to come and speak to us here at the station," Sgt Conder said.

"I have an open-door policy to promote open communication.

"Everything is confidential, and the smallest piece of information could be the last piece we are looking for in an investigation puzzle."

Sgt Conder said that if the Toodyay Police Station was closed, it meant local officers were either out on patrol in the Toodyay area or conducting inquiries.

"I provide seven-day coverage to our community, so please use the after-hours call button which will reach me 24 hours a day, seven days a week via Northam Police Station," Sgt Conder said.

"Crime is not a 9-5 time slot.
"You will often see me patrolling the streets, or maybe parked down some dark side road in the early hours of the morning at different

times during the week.
"I am going to be here for at least the next four years.

"I want to put those in our community who actively engage in criminal behaviour on notice"

# **AvonLink business case** heads for State Cabinet

A BUSINESS case to save Toodyay's Avon Link passenger rail service from closure is undergoing formal assessment before being presented to State Cabinet.

The Wheatbelt Development Commission and TransWA have prepared a detailed case to keep the rail service open following WA Transport Minister Troy Buswell's shock decision last year to close the rail link at the end of December.

A 3579-signature petition to State Parliament calling for the rail service to stay won the AvonLink a six-month reprieve until June this year.

However, Mr Buswell made it clear at the time that the AvonLink would still be axed to save money if was not better used by local residents and visitors.

Local politicians and authorities have combined to press for the service to be modified to make it more attractive to users, including by introducing weekend services, better timetables and easier ticketing.

A spokesman for the Wheatbelt Development Commission said the business case to retain the rail link had been presented to the WA Department of Regional Development for assessment.

This was needed because the plan called for access to Royalties for Regions money.


The Department would then make a formal recomendation to the Minister for Regional Development, WA Nationals Leader Terry Redman (Warren-Blackwood), who would decide whether to present the business case to State Cabinet.

His WA Nationals Party colleague, local MP Shane Love (Moore), described the process as "pretty well on track".


Mr Love said the business case had met a

submission deadline set for the end of last month and was confident it would reach Cabinet.

The main opponents of these impending disasters are a small group of local volunteers working unpaid from home, two WA Nationals MPs based in Geraldton and Northam, and the Toodvay Shire Council.

Local business – which has more to lose than most and should be playing a leading role to help save Toodyay - is missing in

That's because the local Chamber of Commerce is hamstrung by a lack of strong, representative leadership, sparse membership and little support across broad avenues of local trade and commerce.

Liberal Governments tend by political persuasion to be more attuned to the voice of business concerns than complaints by environmental activist groups.

Yet Toodyay has no local business leadership group capable of sending a delegation to Parliament to tell the Premier and his Ministers where to stick their stinking

To echo Shire CEO Stan Scott's words at last month's AvonLink public meeting, Toodyay doesn't need a bunch of Perth public servants sitting in a darkened room making decisions local people don't want.

There is still time to save the day. What remains of the old Toodyay Chamber of Commerce and Industry Inc. has called a Special General Meeting for 7pm Monday March 10 at the Freemasons Hotel

The aim is to enrol new members, elect a new management committee and set a new business leadership agenda for Toodyay's economic future.

The Herald urges all local business owners and traders to attend that vitally important meeting.



#### Cats dumped to avoid law

SINCE the new cat laws were introduced, environmental groups have documented increased numbers of stray cats in our shire.

They are easy to spot behind shops, along the riverfront, under bridges and scavenging through bins at the Refuse Station.

So-called 'irresponsible owners' are now threatened with punitive measures (ie: heavy fines) but I argue there aren't actually many irresponsible owners at fault dumpers that are causing the problem.

They probably cannot afford to comply with the regulations, thus the caring folk among us end up with even more cats.

We are often unable to catch them – let alone get them all registered, micro-chipped and sterilised.

Fees for sterilisation are still high, though the discounted 'Snip and Chip' day in Newcastle Park last year was a move in the right direction.

Perhaps this event could be held every year and advertised more extensively.

#### Bejoording left in the lurch

FIVE new National Broadband Network towers for faster local internet services in the near future, said the last Herald.

Up in Bejoording, I get no mobile phone or wireless internet reception.

At best, Telstra say they will send me a modem for my landline, offering something a bit slower than the old ADSL1.

Knowing the Shire of Toodyay supports all its citizens, and knowing they want to put us (those with small acreages) on to 'town' rates this year, I figured the Council would lobby hard for Bejoording – with about 100 families and lots of school kids – to get the benefit of a new tower.

I attended last month's NBN Co public information briefing in Toodyay to get more information.

There my hopes were dashed – I was told Bejoording will not get a new NBN tower.

Instead, we will have to wait for a new satellite to be operational which at best is still another two years away.

The reasons appear to be purely commercial, and nobody could tell me if my eventual satellite connection cost would be any different to those getting a tower signal.

Apparently, no consideration for a towe is given to communities with less than 200 homes

It seems that our 'Infrastructure' Federal Government is still driven by financial return, not the public good.

#### Landfill submissions plea

THE BATTLE continues to stop the development of a massive Perth metropolitan waste rubbish dump at Lot 11 Chitty Road, 14km south of Toodyay.

The 30ha Class 11 landfill site is planned to take three million tonnes of household and food waste, asbestos and asbestos products, contaminated soils and biomedical waste over the next 20 years.

An application by landfill operator Opal Vale Ptd Ltd for works approval can be inspected at the Shire of Toodyay office or on the WA Department of Environment Regulation website: www.der.wa.gov.au.

The Department is now advertising a call for public submissions on the application, which must be lodged with the DER by the cut-off date of Monday March 24.

The DER will review public comments on environmental issues such as air, water and land emissions before deciding if the works application should be granted.

## **Uncaring owners** blamed for stray cat 'chaos'

IRRESPONSIBLE owners are to blame for a big increase in dumped and unwanted cats in Toodyay, according to Cat Appeal Toodyay co-founder Jenny Ferguson.

The volunteer cat carer believes many local owners are dumping unwanted kittens, pregnant females and unsterilised males to evade WA's new cat laws.

Avon Valley volunteer cat refuges have been unable to cope with the rising number of pleas to take in unwanted and stray cats.

New WA laws introduced in 2011 gave owners two years in which to sterilise and register their cats or face fines of up to \$5000.

The aim was to reduce WA's large number of unwanted and feral cats, with about 5000 a year being euthanised.

The Shire of Toodyay ran a half-price "snip and chip" day last year for cat owners to have their pets sterilised and injected with an indentifying microchip to comply with the new laws.

But Jenny says her phone has "run hot' since the new laws took full effect last November because cat owners don't want to pay the cost of sterilisation.

"It's been chaos," she said.

"Sterilising a cat needs to be done only once – there are no excuses, it's just laziness.

"People just drive their car into the bush and dump unwanted kittens which then become first and second-generation strays.

She said a single pair of unsterilised male and female kittens could produce up to 420,000 cats in six years.

'We've been able to sterilise 48 unwanted cats in four months but had to refuse another 35 because we have no room for them," Jenny said.

Toodyay's Heartlands Veterinary Hospital says it costs \$100 to castrate a male cat, \$195 to spay a female and a further \$78 to micro-chip (or \$60 if under anaesthesia for sterilisation)

Female cats in heat cost \$205 to spay and pregnant females \$215.

Seniors Card holders received a 10 per cent discount.

"We sterilise about 15 cats a month, plus some from Jenny Ferguson," Heartlands Veterinary Nurse Jordie Street said.

"Each sterilised cat is injected just under the skin between the shoulders with a microchip the size of grain of rice with an indentifying number linked to the owner's details which are registered online.

The veterinary hospital also charged \$135 to euthanise cats for home burial, or \$155 for disposal.

Toodyay Shire CEO Stan Scott said stray cats were an issue wherever there was bush because dumped cats adapted easily to living in the wild.

The Shire had not prosecuted anyone because its approach was to educate owners.

"A lot of people are still not aware of the new law," Mr Scott said.

### **Property owners fined** for firebreak breaches

MORE than 100 Toodyay property owners have been fined \$250 each for failure to create or maintain firebreaks on their land.

A further number have been issued with work orders to comply with firebreak regulations or face \$250 fines.

Toodyay Shire CEO Stan Scott said work orders were issued where owners had made an an obvious attempt to comply.

Infringement notices with \$250 fines were issued only where no apparent effort had been made.

"About 130 infringement notices have been issued, which is slightly more than last year," Mr Scott said. "Some are repeat offenders but most are not."

Mr Scott said the Shire had employed an extra casual ranger for three months to help inspect every Toodyay property that was

required to have a firebreak.
"I think the 2009 Toodyay fire has

sharpened everyone's minds about fire danger," he said.

"The main purpose of a firebreak is to enable access to a property to help fight a fire rather than to stop a fire.

"The community seems generally supportive of the Shire taking a tough line on firebreaks on private property.

"We get as many calls from people alerting us to the need for firebreaks as we do complaints.

People with a valid reason not to comply with a firebreak work order could apply to the Shire for a "Variation" to a Firebreak Order, Mr Scott said.

This included properties on steep terrain, where a common firebreak could be shared under a Variation order issued by the Shire.

"Once issued, Variation Orders are continuous and don't have to be renewed every year," Mr Scott said.

NBN Co used a community information session at Toodyay last month to announce that the new 40m-tall NBN towers were planned for sites in Coondle, Julimar, West Toodyay, South Toodyay and Toodyay.

But further inquiries by *The Herald* have revealed that the fixed wireless network towers have a broadcast range of only five to seven kilometres.

That means communities lying further afield will have to wait another two years for access to faster Internet speeds.

A spokesman for NBN Co declined to release maps showing the range of the five proposed towers on the grounds that planning approval had yet to be sought and obtained from the Shire of Toodyay.

The Shire of Toodyay has been generally supportive of the NBN roll-out, with CEO Stan Scott describing it last month as a

"significant win for Toodyay"

However, Bejoording resident Richard Hazelwood – who has no home mobile phone or wireless internet reception – said NBN Co representatives told him at last month's community information session that fixed wireless towers would not be built for communities of less than 200 homes.

NBN Co declined to comment further.

However, it advertises publicly that homes within range of the new towers will have wireless broadband access only if their roof-mounted receivers are in direct line-of-sight view of the new transmitters.

Some residents in Stirlingia Drive within two kilometres of a tower planned in nearby Drummondi Drive said they were told they would not get NBN fixed wireless access because they are on the wrong side of an intervening hill and are too far from other towers located elsewhere.

Mr Brown the DER could reject the application or set strict environmental conditions that could cause the applicant to abandon the proposal.

He said the WA Legislative Council had invited Principal Petitioners Alice Bernal, from the Avon Valley Environmental Society, and himself to present a formal submission to Parliament, which occurred in November.

The Legislative Council would now

call on Mr Jacob to lodge a ministerial submission addressing concerns raised by the petitioners before deciding whether to launch a full Parliamentary

Opal Vale claims the Waste Authority review of Perth garbage disposal will have no impact on its Toodyay landfill plans and has told the Government that it is "unreasonable" to delay DER approval until that review is complete.

# Illegally dumped litter risks \$1000 fine

AN OFFENDER could be facing a \$1000 fine following a report to Toodyay Tidy Towns Committee of illegal household rubbish dumping at the Northam-Toodyay Road stand-pipe.

Authorities are investigating after a member of the public reported the offence to the Committee.

Sure enough, on inspection there was what appeared to be a trailer load of dumped household rubbish.

It was reported to authorities, which are investigating further.

The weekly Tidy Towns volunteer rubbish pick-up from the old Information Bay into

town continues with a haul of cans, bottles and cigarette packets, etc. gathered every time.

Illegal use of yellow Main Roads rubbish bins to dispose of household garbage sees Lloyd Reserve and the Information Bay often strewn with litter, made worse by crows attracted to rotting food.

Particularly distressing is people using the Information Bay as a toilet with toilet paper blowing across the area.

The Toodyay Tidy Towns Committee is working with the Shire to improve the approach and entrance to town.

We finally got the dilapidated signboard structure replaced and now we are campaigning for a new events sign (or signs) and the installation of an entry statement.

Not much to ask one might think but the



processes involved can be painfully long and somewhat exhausting for those involved.

The approach and entrance to our town should be a welcoming showpiece for visitors and residents alike rather than an avenue of thoughtlessly discarded garbage.

The Committee encourages road users to keep their rubbish in their cars until they reach a bin and also to secure loads properly.

Littering is against the law and penalties have increased under tough new legislation.

Throwing any form of litter – including cigarette butts – from a car can cost offenders up to \$500.

Toodyay has entered the Tidy Towns Sustainable Communities competition again and has registered as a 2014 participant.

Shirley, at the 'Tidy Towns Head Office', says that more than 60 communities have already registered and she expected the total to exceed the usual 70 by the March 1 cut-off date

The Toodyay Tidy Towns Committee has changed the way it works to reduce the workload.

We will:

• send minutes and emails only to

Committee members and no longer formally sign up supporters (old or new) as we did last year;

- we will not issue new Supporter Certificates for 2014 (but please keep displaying the old ones);
- we will ask current supporters if they wish to remain listed as supporters;
- we will continue to issue our Toodyay Tidy Talk newsletter to all current and new supporters; and
- we will be happy to add new supporters to our contact list.


Clean Up Australia Day was held on Sunday March 2.

## New Toodyaypedia: recording online

PEOPLE who search for 'Toodyay' on the Internet may have noticed a lot of new information about the town's historic landmarks appearing online in the popular global reference website Wikipedia.

In May last year, Toodyay Historical Society President Peter Robinson attended the launch of Freopedia – a project aimed at sharing information about sites in Fremantle

Small signs with square barcodes called 'QR codes' had been attached to buildings and memorials in the port city.

Anyone with a smart mobile phone and a free app could scan these codes and be linked to Wikipedia articles written about them

Peter thought this could also work well in Toodyay and approached the local Shire to see if it could happen.

In October and November, several introductory workshops about Wikipedia were run in Toodyay by Gideon, Vice-President of Wikimedia Australia

With his help, we decided to officially launch our own WikiTown project at the Toodyay Show and have since created about 35 articles on local historic buildings.

Links for two of these articles have appeared for several hours on Wikipedia's world-wide home page where millions of

people 'land' every day.

Many of these articles need expanding. We also need help from the community to decide what other topics to cover.

More articles can be created about places and things, memorials and statues, or people.

In that way, Wikipedia world-wide will help us to preserve and share the unique Toodyay story.

Gideon and his fellow Wikipedians will return to Toodyay on Saturday March 8.

They are offering to provide free oneon-one instruction in the Toodyay Public Library during the afternoon while it is closed to the general public.

They will start at the Visitor Centre at 10am and plan to chat informally with locals and look around town before

heading across to the Library after lunch.
Anyone keen to learn more about
Wikipedia is welcome to join us – there
is no obligation to become involved with
Toodyaypedia if you just want see what
it's all about.

However, we hope you will be inspired to become involved, especially because you can contribute online to Toodyaypedia from home



#### Herpetology A book of interest

#### Python Watch Desraé Clarke

THE February article written on the little Mountain Devil (Moloch horridus) resulted in a number of readers contacting me by email, letters and the receipt of some beautiful photos plus a disc of photos – how special is that!

It has also been absolutely amazing to find how widespread around the Shire of Toodyay the little critter is. Thank you SO much to everyone who has taken the time to report their sightings.

There are a number of excellent books available on species of herpetofauna. Some can be a little technical but valuable information will also be found.

Herpetology is the study of reptiles and amphibians.

In 1995, the University of Western Australia printed the first edition of 'A Guide to the Reptiles and Frogs of the Perth Region' with the light-coloured cover and ISBN number of 1 875560 42 4.

However, a revised publication has been completed in 2010 by the WA Museum with an ISBN number of 9781920843410; it has the cover with the orange-throated skink, West Coast Pale-flecked Morethia.

Although Toodyay is on the perimeter of the Perth Region the publication contains many herpetofauna of this area and is an excellent book to have on the library shelf.

You may discover the original light-covered book in a second-hand book shop—it is a valuable publication to have!

As has proven with the reports and observations of the Mountain Devil whereabouts within the Shire of Toodyay there appears to be a greater number of the species than previously recognised.

### 'The town that never was'

Richard Hazlewood

RICA ERICKSON the well-known historical writer used that phrase in her booklet entitled 'Notes on Bejoording' and there is no better way to describe this very unique place.

Every month I read *The Toodyay Herald* from cover to cover and although Bejoording is in the Shire of Toodyay and very significant in the history of Toodyay it rarely gets a mention except in monthly columns by the Bejoording Community Group and Bejoording Volunteer Bushfire Brigade.

When I decided to retire to somewhere in the Shire almost three years ago, no real estate agent ever mentioned Bejoording to me. No locals I spoke to ever mentioned the name and it had no presence in the local newspaper.

How lucky was I to find the acreage and cottage I now call home after 18 months of looking and that was by pure chance. I had decided upon a rather nice home in

I had decided upon a rather nice home in Coondle and was about to make an offer when a good friend of mine came at my suggestion to look at homes in the Shire and on the first day he came up to look put a cash offer on a home I had chosen.

He didn't know it was supposed to be mine. It was just good luck for him and ultimately good luck for me too because it forced me to look further afield and I discovered Bejoording

discovered Bejoording.
Why is Bejoording so different and, I believe, so special?

In 1838, the government declared a townsite at Bejoording in order to protect the locality's natural springs and watering places. It was 1280 acres – similar in size to Toodyay – and was one of WA's earliest planned sub-divisions with a well-planned grid of blocks of mostly 10 acres and land

group activities taking place regularly, an impressive level of activity that would put many other country towns to shame.

Yet most of the few thousand people in Toodyay and its close surrounds would be surprised by the level of community activity undertaken by only a couple of hundred people in Bejoording.

The two main centres of social activity are the Community Group and the Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade; many residents belong to both groups, which between them account for most of the local community.

There is at least one 'event' every month except January and some months have two. Many but not all take place at the Bush Fire Brigade shed which is shared with the Community Group.

Every Wednesday of the year except January, the Community Group has a social gathering at 'The Shed', as it's known by all locals.



Mud fun

Here are some examples.

Every year one member of the community opens their home for an AFL Grand Final party, another will host a Bathurst Race Day party, and once a month at The Shed there's a 'Feast Night' with a different culinary theme every time, such as a seafood night, a curry and casserole night, a big breakfast night, a soup night, etc..

An annual 'Clean Up Bejoording Day' brings out a large number of adults and

Reflective jackets are provided as well as garbage bags, and all the official roads in the 'town' are cleared of plastic, bottles, cans and many surprising things, all followed by a barbecue.

There's an annual car rally, a 4WD picnic, a Halloween Night party and even an 'Air Hockey' competition.

Many people have birthday parties and other special occasions at The Shed and most are open to the whole community.

The biggest event of the year – the 'Mud Footy' fixture on Boxing Day – is a sporting event to rival any other in the bush and each year attracts 100 or more people. It's been running for more than a decade,

and I'm guessing it's unique to Bejoording.

One member of our community has a large clay pan on his property, big enough for a game of footy, and spends all day flooding it from his dam so by around 4pm

there's a field of sticky grey mud.



set aside for public facilities such as a cemetery, public square, police barracks and school.

So everything was set for the creation of a whole new town – yet it didn't happen. Only a few families took up blocks in the early days, so the critical mass of people needed for a town never happened.

The railway came through in 1909 which brought facilities at Toodyay and Bolgart within easy reach of Bejoording families. This eliminated the need to further develop the infrastructure needed for a town.

By the mid-20th Century, many of Bejoording's older families were selling their blocks.

Some were subdivided into smaller blocks and a broader population base started to develop.

The name still appeared on maps as a town – as it does today – and the area started to take on many of the characteristics of a town which, in a rushed sort of way, brings me to the present and the unique community that Bejoording is.

You will meet a different crew each time as each crew is rostered on once a month from 5pm Friday until 5am Monday on a 24/7 call-out basis.

### **Pastryless Asparagus Quiche**

Desraé Clarke

I FIND this quiche one that I can whip up very quickly. I usually have chopped spring onions in the freezer and always a tin of asparagus in the pantry. As there is no fussing with a pastry base this delicious meal, hot or cold and together with salad, is one that can be on the table quickly.

#### **Ingredients:**

- 2 tablespoons wholemeal self-raising flour 1 cup milk
- ½ cup cream
- 4 eggs
- 1/4 packet of dried soup e.g. Spring Vegetable or French Onion
- 1 cup grated tasty cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped spring onions
- 1 x 340g can asparagus pieces, drained

#### Method:

Lightly grease a 23-25cm quiche dish.

Beat the eggs in a medium-sized bowl.

Stir in the cream and half of the milk and

MIX well.

Add the flour and mix until all the lumps are removed.

Stir in the dried soup mix.

Stir in the remainder of the milk and mix to a smooth consistency.

Add the cheese and spring onion.

Pour the mixture into the greased quiche

Arrange the drained asparagus pieces on top of the quiche.

Bake in a moderate oven for about 35 to 40 minutes until the quiche is nicely browned and firm to the touch.

Serve with salad and crusty bread. NB This quiche will freeze well.



THE two students who were successful in winning places on the 2014 Tour are Olivia

Ferguson and Sam Chitty.
This was a very keenly contested competition, with a total of six students all from the Toodyay District High School taking part.

Members of the judging panel were hard-pressed to make their decision.

As you are all aware the reason the RSL run this competition, is to endeavour to keep the story of the Sandakan Death Marches alive and to remember those individuals who lost their lives in the defence of our country.

These individuals are the three Dorizzi brothers, Gordon, Herbert and Thomas. The other member from our district was Reginald Ferguson.

We found out after the awards were made last year, that both of our students are related to Reg Ferguson.

Reg lost his life in Ranau Camp no. 1 on 23 March 1945, only a couple of months before the Japanese surrendered in Borneo in September 1945.

The winning students will be representing themselves and the Toodyay community.

They will be joining a delegation of approximately 30 individuals, organized by the Borneo Exhibition Group Inc (BEG) which will include eight other students, four of them from Borneo, who came through the partnership with Australia, Sarawak and Sabah school program (PASS).

The tour consists of a fourteen day program to visit many of the sites where these WWII events occurred.

The students and their guardians will depart Perth on Saturday 9 April 2014 and will fly to Kuching, the capital of Sarawak,

via Kuala Lumpur.

They will spend a number of days in Kuching visiting various places before departing by air for Labuan via Miri.

Labuan is an island and it is where the War cemetery for Borneo is located.

ANZAC Day Services will be held in the War Cemetery on Labuan.

The students will then fly to Sandakan via Kota Kinabalu. In Sandakan they will attend a service close to the site of the Sandakan Prisoner of War camp.

They then journey to Ranau taking part in a rice carrying exercise to demonstrate a small part of the hardships the allied prisoners were subjected to.

They then visit the Kundasung Memorial Gardens which is an amazing memorial.

It is then onto Kota Kinabalu and a visit to the SANZAC School, before flying home again via Kuala Lumpur. This is only a brief outline of the itinerary.

On their return to Australia our students will be called upon to deliver a few presentations to our sponsors and the school to relate what they have seen and learnt.

It was also very heartening to read that the late Dr Richard Walkey has been awarded an Order of Australia medal in the Governor - Generals 2014 Australia Day Honours List. 

### Landholder information packs on local agenda

ONE of Toodyay's several environmental groups is the Toodyay Landcare District Committee (LCDC).

First established in 1989, the committee has attracted over \$300,000 in external funding for environmental projects within

LCDCs are statutory bodies formed under section 23 of the Soil and Land Conservation Act (1945).

They operate within defined land conservation districts and are formed by an 'Order of the Governor in Council' on the advice of the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Fisheries and administered by the Commissioner of Soil and Land Conservation.

One of the many functions of the LCDC is to manage projects and carry out acts that prevent, mitigate or remedy land degradation processes

The LCDC attracted funding in 1997 for a Landcare Officer (employed by the Shire until 2001), and in 2002 the LCDC employed the Landcare Officer through a landcare service charge (on the rates).

The service charge no longer operates, but the LCDC continues to be active in a fully voluntary capacity with support from the Shire and with Council representation.

Project ideas discussed at the last meeting of the LCDC include: landholder information packs on subjects like stocking rates, firewood collection, fencing, weed control, pastures etc: a dedicated meeting and storage facility for Toodyay's environmental groups; and small farm field workshops

# Migratory finch numbers dwindle

Toodyay Naturalists' Club Desraé Clarke

THE first meeting of the year welcomed Gillian Basnett as guest speaker on her work in the Kimberly region on fire regimes and the Gouldian Finch.

Gill's specialty is fire ecology; she also has a keen interest in wildlife, particularly birds.

Following her great list of educational achievements Gill completed her Masters thesis 'developing models to predict the impacts of fuel reduction burning on habitat complexity, ground-dwelling mammals and understory birds'.

The importance of fire and regeneration of plants included the difference between the 'early dry season' fires and the 'late dry season' fires.

Intervals between fires are necessary to allow the regeneration of plants which may be from seed, resprouting plants, lignotubers, and a few others.

For instance, Spinifex needs at least three years between fires to grow properly. Some plants are completely killed.

It would be appreciated that small animals are greatly affected by fire but the large monitors, lizards and raptors benefit from the death of other creatures.

Survival of the Gouldian Finch depends on the main food source of the seed from the grass, Sorghum.

It is a highly migratory little bird and the loss of its food source causes it to move further afield.

It appears the numbers of the Gouldian Finch in the wild have decreased dramatically over the past decades but it is difficult to estimate exact numbers as they are migratory.

At this point in time, it is estimated numbers to be approximately 2,500 birds.

Gillian's team have been radio-tracking the birds for movement and trapping to check nutritional status.

The Saturday 15 March meeting at the CWA Hall, commencing 7pm, will have guest speaker, Dr Stephen Davies, with his presentation on 'Magpie Geese'.



### Rare visitor appears in Avon Valley waterways

**Bird of the Month**

ALTHOUGH rare in the Avon Valley the Black-tailed Native Hen has been sighted along the Avon River and adjoining waterways.

It is found throughout the Australian inland, is highly nomadic and follows rainfall and flooding for breeding on either saline or fresh water; it is a highly 'eruptive' species and breeds anytime after flooding rains.

A significant rain event in the drier regions of Australia results in dramatic food and invertebrate growth.

This attracts the birds in great numbers to feed and breed. This can occur at any time of the year and in any given area and may not happen again for a decade or more.

As the food source is depleted the area is

This 35cm bird has a large black tail but overall, is of dull brown colouring. Its

underparts are dark grey with a bluish tinge; it has a few large white flecks on the flanks.

Its eyes are a bright, golden-vellow and its bill has a bright pea-green upper mandible and a red lower mandible; the legs and feet are coral pink. Both sexes are similar in size and colouring

The Black-tailed Native Hen nests under cover on the ground and well concealed in dense vegetation close to water.

The nest is a cup of plant material lined with feathers. Five to seven dark green, spotted eggs are laid and the young chicks hatch a greenish black colour with a bill the same colouring as an adult.

It feeds both night and day on vegetation, seeds, snails, insects and small reptiles. It is usually a silent bird but may give a sharp 'Kak' or continuous 'Kak-Kak-Kak-ak-akak-' in alarm

# Asylum seeker hell-hole 'inhuma

THE World Health Organization (WHO) has just organised a plan to improve mental health services worldwide. Notable is a shift to a recovery model instead of a medical model that predominates in much of the world, including Australia.

It involves a holistic approach where overall recovery is the focus and includes all aspects of the needs of an individual in the environment in which they live.

The WHO plan also has a focus on human rights, which is an area of particular concern to psychologists, and one that I feel compelled to share with readers of *The*

Given this, you would have to ask why our politicians allow a hell-hole like Manus Island to exist at all.

The following appeared on the ABC news website on 12 December last year:

'Manus Island's detention centre has been described as cruel, inhuman, degrading and violating prohibitions against torture in a detailed report by Amnesty International.

The centre has been notoriously difficult for journalists to access since it reopened last year, but three Amnesty researchers and translators were allowed into Manus Island for a week last month.

I emailed the member for Pearce Christian Porter and stated, 'I request that you consider speaking out publically and call for the immediate closure of the Manus Island Detention Centre'.

His response was not reassuring. I emailed the Member again and stated:

"I refer to my email correspondence regarding Manus Island. I assume that you did not consider taking any action on this

Manus Island since its inception as a place for off-shore processing, has been a mental health death trap for asylum seekers.

The recent Amnesty International report sounded a dire warning. The asylum seekers have no chance of assimilating in Papua New Guinea.

They should be processed in Australia and the gulag shut down.

You will be aware of recent events on

Manus Island that tragically resulted in one death and many injuries.

In all likelihood the young man that was killed could have had a very bright future as an Australian citizen.

A communication received from GetUp yesterday was poignant:

'By now you would have heard about the tragic turn of events on Manus Island that left one person dead and 77 injured.

We don't yet know if this new tragic low marks a turning point, if it's part of Australia's new status quo, or if it will finally be enough to make our Government rethink our cruel treatment of asylum seekers, the very people who need our help most.

The truth is, we still don't really know what happened because the Government won't tell us. What we do know is that a young man lost his life in the most horrific way – while under our care, while detained in your name.

His name was Reza Berati, a 23 year old

made the perilous journey by boat to seek refuge in Australia and instead of finding safety, he endured a nightmare.

Reza is not the first to die because of this policy. There are many others who have already taken their own lives while locked in Australian detention centres.

But rather than acknowledging our failure to protect them, Immigration Minister Scott Morrison sent an email lauding today as a 'significant milestone" in the Government's "strong resolve on our borders"

The only 'milestone' reached this week was a new low for human rights in Australia.

We live in hope that this horrible tragedy will be enough to make Australia rethink our treatment of asylum seekers.

In the past Pearce has had an independent voice concerning asylum seeker policy however this voice now appears lost to career
