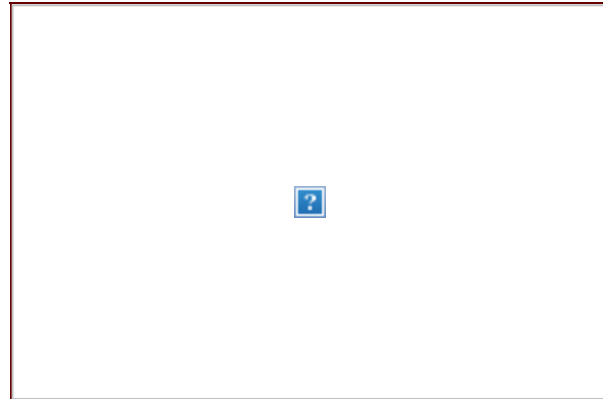

### Test is no difficulty for Dr Stephen Vickers

DR STEPHEN VICKERS, a member of the Oxfordshire Bahá'í community, and Chief Executive of NEBOSH (The National Examination Board in Occupational Safety and Health), recently ran out winner of the BBC's Test the Nation National Quiz, which attracted more than 115,000 entries from all over the UK.

In an evening of interactive brain-teasing, Ann Robinson, presenter of *The Weakest Link*, the BBC's quiz show popular on both sides of the Atlantic, and fellow TV personality Philip Schofield tested the nation's general knowledge. Stephen was part of an Examiners' team of fifty taking the test live in the studio with six other groups made up of plumbers, cabin crews, "domestic goddesses", estate agents, football supporters, and celebrities.

The studio teams and viewers at home alike were asked 70 questions throughout the evening, to obtain their "quiz quotient". At the end of a very exciting programme the Examiners team was victorious with a quotient of 124 points, beating the football supporters and celebrities into second and third places respectively.

Much to the delight of his many Bahá'í and professional friends around the UK, Stephen obtained the highest individual mark of any contestant (68 / 70), not just of all those who took part in the studio, but from among all those 115,000 entrants who participated online and text messaging.

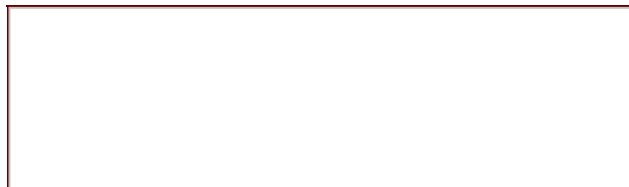
