
Trade Demand Index

Trades are forging ahead despite facing lockdown, labour shortages and material delays. In the last month, we've seen an increase in homeowners

posting jobs looking for trades across a wide variety of skill sets. BC trades have responded, and there is something that has changed. From May to July, we saw trades take on less work than usual, indicating that schedules were full to the brim. However, since the end of August, we've seen an upswing of trades taking on new jobs, and also finishing up older jobs that may have been delayed due to lockdown or material shortages. In the coming weeks, we'll be anticipating the new roadmap from MBIE and CHASNZ to provide strong leadership and support for the trades industry.

About this index:

Using Builderscrack's deep, long running data-set, our Trade Demand Index aggregates a variety of data-points into a representative measure of demand on the trades sector across time.



Movers and Shakers:

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Top 20 Trades

Our Index recorded that plumbers, plasterers and tilers were particularly under the pump in October, compared to previous months. The increased

pressure has likely resulted from a combination of factors: the flow-on effect of manufacturing being suspended in Auckland, paired with shortages of gib and silicone, and a retained popularity of bathroom renovations which require all three mentioned trades. 

They also asked suppliers what they thought would be useful

to respond to supply chain issues. One response reads:

We need to start changing the expectations of end clients around accessibility of product, ease of substitution, and speed of build – this will require some tough conversations, but also needs to be backed by industry bodies and the media. It's difficult as a standalone builder to tell a client that what used to be standard is now unrealistic in terms of timeframes, price, and accessibility. It requires support from industry bodies and a national conversation to change client expectations.
