Trade Demand Index

Demand pressure kept rising throughout August, even with the country in lockdown for the second half of the month.

Our first Level 4 lockdown in 2020 saw demand drop, with the majority of jobs coming through labelled as essential. This time around, we've had a much smaller turndown with all job categories experiencing demand. This indicates homeowners knew what to expect, and made use of the time to organise jobs for when restrictions eased.

Provided trades can remain on the tools and needed materials are available, we expect there will be quite a strong bounceback in October and November with those plans from lockdown coming into fruition.

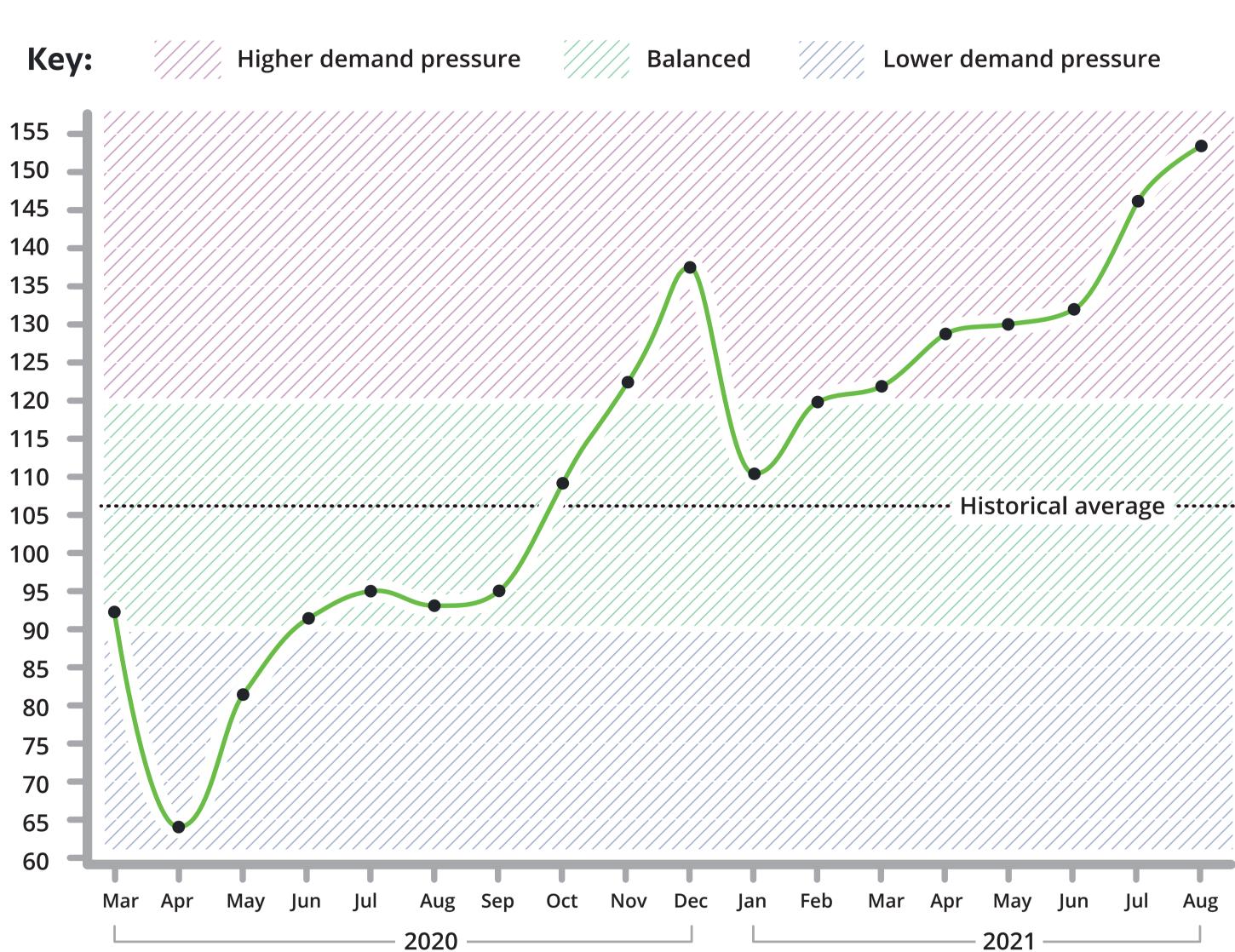
About this index:
