Oct. 16, 1908: Edmonton football team renamed

The Edmonton Rugby Football Club was reorganized as the Esquimaux — the forerunner to the Edmonton Eskimos — at a meeting in the Windsor Hotel on Jasper Avenue and 101st Street.

The team had been nicknamed "Esquimaux" by a Calgary sportswriter as early as 1897.

The meeting brought out some of the best-known players in the Dominion, including former Toronto Argonaut Harold Brunton. It featured a call-out to all rugby players, and those who aspired to be, to join the team.

It was decided that a captain would be chosen after the team's first practice.

The officers elected at the meeting were president William Antrobus Griesbach and vice-president Charles William Cross.

Challenges were issued to Strathcona, Alberta College, Fort Saskatchewan Mounted Police, the YMCA and the Caledonians. Calgary had challenged Edmonton to a game on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 9.

It was decided the first game of the season would take place at Diamond Park in Edmonton and would be a combined team of the Esquimaux and the Calgary Rugby Team.

Two years later, the team would be renamed the Edmonton Eskimos.
