Description	<p>The design shows six staggered pillars, representing the six participating teams from the respective six Confederations, and one separate metal structure referencing the host of the competition. They hold up a globe in the shape of a football – a consistent feature amongst almost all of FIFA's event trophies.</p> <p>The graceful curves and inherent strength of the trophy evoke the balletic and athletic qualities necessary to successfully compete in the FIFA Club World Cup and the tension and movement describe the competitive energy amongst the participants.</p>

History

Intercontinental and Toyota Cup

Between 1960 and 1968, the **Intercontinental Cup** was a competition endorsed by UEFA and CONMEBOL and contested between the winners of the European Champions' Cup and the South American *Copa Libertadores*. The system of play was a home-and-away series, decided by points only (the same format used by CONMEBOL to determine the winner of the *Copa Libertadores* final until 1987). Because of this format, a third match was needed when both teams were tied on points.

From 1969 to 1979, the Intercontinental Cup continued as a two-leg competition between the UEFA and the CONMEBOL club champions. However, it adopted the European standard method to decide the winner by adding the goals of both matches to the aggregate score.

As of 1980 and until 2004, the competition was held as a single match in Tokyo and Yokohama, Japan. It was called the **Toyota Cup**, named after its sponsor.

In 2017 the FIFA Council approved the decision to recognise all European and South American teams that won the **Intercontinental Cup/Toyota Cup** – played between 1960 and 2004 – as club world champions.

FIFA Club World Cup

The first **FIFA Club World Cup** organised under the auspices of FIFA was held in 2000 in Brazil with the participation of the club champions of all six confederations (AFC, CAF, CONCACAF, CONMEBOL, OFC and UEFA). In addition to those six teams, two additional competitors were invited: Real Madrid from Spain as the Toyota Cup winner of 1998 and the Brazilian host team, Corinthians, who went on to win the trophy.

In 2005 the Toyota Cup merged with the FIFA Club World Cup. This competition has since been played under the auspices of FIFA and between the club champions from the six Confederations (UEFA's and CONMEBOL's representative entering the competition in the semi-finals).

As from 2007 the host's top team has also participated. In 2007, as a Japanese team won the AFC Champions League, the highest placed non-Japanese team of the AFC Champions League had a play-off for the quarter-finals with the OFC representative.

- The opening match was played between the representative club of the host association and the club of OFC

- The losing clubs of the quarter-finals contested the play-off for fifth place
- The losing clubs from the semi-final matches contested the play-off for third place
- The winners of the two semi-final matches qualified for the final

2000

- The competition was played in two rounds
- The 8 teams taking part were divided into two groups of four teams
- The system of play was a league system, each team playing one match against each of the other teams in the same group
- The top teams in each group qualified for the final. The teams coming second in each group contested the play-off for third place

Facts about the FIFA Club World Cup

- ⚽ The 15th edition of the FIFA Club World Cup will be held in the United Arab Emirates.
- ⚽ The first match in the 2018 edition will be the 116th in the history of the FIFA Club World Cup.
- ⚽ To date, three Brazilian clubs (Corinthians in 2000 & 2012, São Paulo in 2005, and Sport Club Internacional in 2006), two Italian clubs (AC Milan in 2007 and Internazionale in 2010), two Spanish clubs (Barcelona in 2009, 2011 & 2015, and Real Madrid in 2014, 2016 & 2017), one English club (Manchester United in 2008) and one German club (Bayern Munich in 2013) have won the FIFA Club World Cup.
- ⚽ European teams have won ten of the 14 titles to date, with the other four claimed by South American teams.
- ⚽ Ten of the 14 finals played to date have been between European and South American teams. In 2000, the final was an all-South American affair, with Corinthians (BRA) playing Vasco da Gama (BRA). African teams have reached the final twice – TP Mazembe Englebert (COD) taking on Internazionale (ITA) in 2010, and Raja Casablanca (MAR) playing Bayern Munich (GER) in 2013. In 2016, Asia’s Kashima Antlers (JPN) took on Real Madrid.
- ⚽ Two Spanish teams (Barcelona and Real Madrid) have won six titles between them. Three Brazilian teams (Corinthians, São Paulo and Sport Club Internacional) have four titles between them.
- ⚽ Barcelona and Real Madrid are the only clubs to have won the tournament three times.
- ⚽ Spain’s Pep Guardiola is the only coach to have won the tournament three times, twice with Barcelona (in 2009 and 2011) and once with Bayern Munich (in 2013).
- ⚽ So far, 61 different teams have participated in the FIFA Club World Cup.
- ⚽ Brazil boasts the highest number of participating teams (seven different clubs).
- ⚽ With nine appearances, Auckland City have competed in the most editions of this tournament. They have also played a record 15 matches.
- ⚽ The three Egyptian players Wael Gomaa, Hossam Ashour and Mohamed Aboutrika (Al Ahly SC) have appeared in a record number of 11 matches.
- ⚽ Topping the overall list of goalscorers with seven goals is Portugal’s Cristiano Ronaldo (one in 2008 for Manchester United, four in 2016 and two in 2017 for Real Madrid).
- ⚽ Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United and Real Madrid), Ronaldinho (Barcelona and Atlético Mineiro), Dwight Yorke (Manchester United and Sydney FC) and Neri Cardozo (Boca Juniors and Monterrey) are the only players to have scored for more than one team in the competition.
- ⚽ Cristiano Ronaldo (POR) has scored the most goals in a single final, netting three times against Kashima Antlers (JPN) in the 2016 final.
- ⚽ Both Lionel Messi (ARG) and Cristiano Ronaldo have scored the most final goals (four). Messi scored one in the 2009 final against Estudiantes La Plata, two in the 2011 final against Santos (BRA), and one in the final against River Plate in 2015. Cristiano Ronaldo scored three against Kashima Antlers in 2016 and one against Grêmio in 2017.

Facts about the FIFA Club World Cup continued

- ⚽ Before Cristiano Ronaldo's (POR) three goals for Real Madrid in the 2016 final, Filippo Inzaghi (ITA), Lionel Messi (ARG), Luis Suárez (URU) and Gaku Shivasaki (JPN) were the only players to score a brace in a FIFA Club World Cup final. In 2007, Inzaghi scored two goals for AC Milan against Boca Juniors. Messi's two goals were for Barcelona in the 2011 final against Santos. Suárez's brace was also for Barcelona in the final against River Plate in 2015, and Shivasaki scored twice for Kashima Antlers against Real Madrid in the 2016 final.
- ⚽ The quickest goal in the history of the FIFA Club World Cup came in 2013, when South American champions Atlético Mineiro needed less than two minutes to get on the scoresheet, with Diego Tardelli finding the net after just one minute and 51 seconds. The fastest goal after coming on to the pitch was by Gareth Bale, who needed only 47 seconds to score for Real Madrid against Al Jazira in 2017.

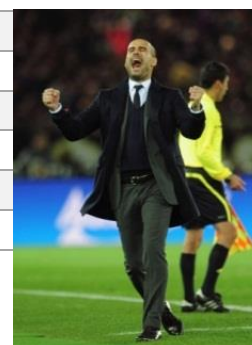

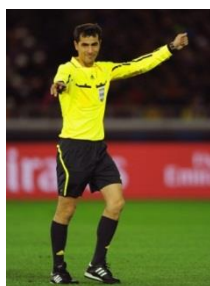
