The auto tax, which will be the same amount paid by car owners for their State license plates, and the imposition of a toll of 25 cents on East River bridges and 10 cents on Harlem River bridges for motor vehicles registered outside of the city, were steamrollered through the Board of Aldermen on an emergency message from Mayor O'Brien declaring that the city faced a financial emergency requiring immediate action to obtain new revenues. The vote was 52 to 2.

Contrary to expectations, the six Queens Aldormen voted with the other Democrats in the board for the city automobile tax. Democratic Leader John Theofel had gone on record against bridge tolls as un-(Please turn to page 5)


