OUTSIDERS PAYTOLLS

Aldermen Justify Vote on Ground Queens Is Not Discriminated Against, Harvey Is Opposed

New York City automobile owners today were hopeful that the city tax on motor vehicles, approved by the Board of Aldermen branch of the Municipal Assembly Tuesday and certain to be ratified by the Board of Estimate branch on Friday will be upset or deferred by the many court moves planned.

The auto tax, which will be in the same amount paid by car owners for their State license plates, and the imposition of a toll of 25 cents on East River bridges and 10 cents on Harlem River bridges for motor vehicles registered outside of the city, were steamrollered through the Board of Aldermen on an emergency message from Mayor O'Brien declaring that the city faced a financial emergency requiring immediate action to obtain new revenues. The vote was 52 to 2.

Contrary to expectations, the six Queens Aldermen voted with the other Democrats in the board for the city automobile tax. Democratic Leader John Theofel had gone on record against bridge tolls as un-

Bayside Man Dies In Subway Depot

Charles Bishop, I. R. T. Motorman, Stricken

While on his lunch hour about two o'clock this morning, Charles Bishop, 53-year-old motorman on an I. R. T. subway train, was stricken with a heart attack and died in the employe's lavatory of Main street, Flushing, station. Bishop, who lived in 29-28 200th street, Bayside West, was found lying on the floor of the room by another employe, Sal Panastier of 40-29 99th street, Corona. Panastier telephoned Flushing Hospital and Dr. Baim, ambulance surgeon, pronounced Bishop dead. His body was removed to the Queens Morgue, Kissena boulevard, Flushing-Hillcrest, to await funeral arrangements. Detective John H. Walsh of Flushing station house investigated the case and reported the death due to natural causes.

Facts About City Motor Tax Bill Passed By Board

Among the chief provisions of the new tax bill passed by the Board of Aldermen Tuesday are the following: A fee equal to the one for State license plates must be paid before July 1 to the Commissioner of Licenses by New York City residents who own any motor vehicle except a taxicab. Non-resident owners of motor vehicles must pay a toll of 25 cents.

1,000 Line Streets To See Procession of Confirmants; 56 Children from Orphanage Receive Rites

A complete list of the names of the children confirmed by Bishop Molloy at St. Michael's Church Tuesday will be published in tomorrow's Journal.

More than 1,000 people filled St. Michael's Church and the streets were lined in the neighborhood for blocks around Tuesday afternoon for the confirmation of 331 children and about 19 adults, by the Rt. Rev. Thomas Edmund Molloy, Bishop of Brooklyn.

The gold and white of the Papal flags and the red, white and blue of the American flag floated over the entrance to the rectory adjoining the church and fluttered from the flagpole in the grounds and over St. Michael's parochial school. Parents and relatives lined up in the streets with bouquets for the confirmants.

Thronged lined the sidewalks to see the procession of the clergy, the bishop and the prettily dressed confirmants. The children assembled at St. Michael's parochial school under the direction of Sister Grace Madeline, principal, and members of the faculty and marched to the church.

The girls were dressed in white with white gloves, wreaths of amilax around their heads, fastened with large bows of red ribbon. The boys wore new school suits, white gloves, red ties, red arm bands, and boutonnières of red carnations.

The red worn by the children and the red flowers which massed the altar, symbolized the descent of the Holy Ghost in tongues of flame. Of the 331 children, 194 were girls.

Policeman Saves Animals in Fire

Rescues Horse, Rabbits From Corona Barn

A horse and two rabbits were rescued while two dogs and a goat were burned to death in a fierce fire that completely demolished the barn at 54-30 103rd street, Corona, at 10 o'clock, Tuesday night.

The dense smoke could be seen for miles around. Patrolman Charles Varenburgh of the Newtown Precinct went into the burning structure and rescued the horse and the two rabbits. When he attempted to make the second trip the walls of the building caved in.

The fire attracted a large crowd and the children cheered Patrolman Varenburgh for his heroic deed.

The owner of the building is Frank Carvaruso, of 101st street, Corona. Cause of the fire could not be determined.

Bayside West Busses Use New Route On Saturday

North Shore Company to Follow Harvey's Request to Take Line off State Street West of 164th St.

SEE CONGESTION

Rauschwerger Says Route On State Street Best And That Change Will Add To Traffic Snarl

The Bayside West line of the North Shore Bus Company will change its route beginning Saturday in compliance with a demand by Borough President George U. Harvey that busses be forced off State street, west of 164th street, Flushing.

Several days ago, Mr. Harvey insisted in a letter to Police Commissioner Bolan that the Bayside West line under franchise specifications should use Northern boulevard, Crocheron avenue and 164th street instead of the section of State street now used between Whitestone avenue and 164th street.

Announcing the shift in routes, Joseph Rauschwerger, president of the North Shore Bus Company explained that the change was not being made on the initiative of his organization. He said that the Bayside West line has used State street west of 164th street since service was started three years ago. When franchise routes were laid out by Borough President Harvey, Northern boulevard, Crocheron avenue and 164th street were substituted for State street west of 164th street and that although the present route is more direct and convenient, his company had to bid

Captain Escapes As Blast Wrecks Beechhurst Boat

An explosion of the gasoline tank on the runabout speed boat of Reese Hatchitt of Beechhurst at 7:45 o'clock this morning completely wrecked the boat. Damage was estimated at about \$5,500.

The 26-foot runabout was tied up to the Lorco dock at 152nd street and Seventh avenue, Beechhurst, when the explosion occurred. Captain J. R. Crouse was aboard the boat at the time and escaped uninjured.

No determination had been made at a late hour this morning of the cause of the explosion and Captain Crouse was awaiting the arrival of the insurance men.

Dress All Burned Up—So is Tailor

There's quite a difference between an expert dress-maker and just an ordinary dress-maker who professes to be an expert.

Rose Hannah, 27, of 314 West 133rd street, Manhattan, was aware of this fact today as she waited in County Jail for a hearing next week on charges of disorderly conduct.

Miss Hannah was hired by Sam Schaman of 36-03 162nd street, Flushing, Tuesday morning, to press dresses in Schaman's tailor shop. According to the proprietor the woman said she was an expert dress-maker.

However, the first dress Miss Hannah pressed turned a deep brown which Schaman said closely resembled the color of cloth burned with an iron in the hands of a novice, Schaman alleges.

He examined the workmanship and then told Miss Hannah that he suspected she was not an expert dress-maker and that she would have to leave his shop. But it was not so simple. Miss Hannah insisted that even experts make mistakes and refused to leave.

In fact the woman did not leave the shop until she was assisted by Patrolman George H. Hodgson of Flushing station house.

Miss Hannah was taken to the police station and placed under arrest for disorderly conduct. She was then taken before Magistrate Thomas F. Doyle in Flushing Court where she pleaded not guilty to the charge. She was held in \$100 bail.

Education Head Promises to be Ready for Construction Just as Soon as City is in Position to Issue Corporate Stock; Site Settlement is Victory for Journal and Civic Groups, Nunan, Burke Present

Transfer of a part of Raymond M. O'Connor Field in Bayside to the Board of Education as a site for the new Bayside High School, advocated by the North Shore Daily Journal in a relentless campaign for many months, was authorized today by the Sinking Fund Commission.

Immediately thereafter Dr. George J. Ryan, president of the Board of Education, announced that the preparation of plans for the high school will be started at once so that everything may be ready for contractors' bids as soon as the city is able to issue corporate stock to cover the cost.

Support of Mayor's New Tax Proposal Is Urged by Ryan

"Now that the property has been officially turned over to the Board of Education and the site for a high school in Bayside is definitely settled," said Dr. Ryan, "plans for a structure will be studied and prepared so that we will be ready to go ahead just as soon as the city finds itself in a position to issue corporate stock. The school is necessary to relieve the overcrowded conditions in Flushing High School."

The action of the Sinking Fund Commission was unanimous and was without discussion, although State Senator Joseph D. Nunan, Jr., of Douglaston, and Assemblyman James A. Burke of Hollis, sponsors of the enabling bill in the last session of the Legislature, were present to ask for the authorization.

The fact that no opposition developed before the Commission made any statements from the Legislators unnecessary.

Favorable action on the transfer was recommended by Controller Charles W. Berry to whom the request of the Board of Education for a transfer of a portion of the park property was submitted several weeks ago, soon after it was sent down from the Park Avenue headquarters.

In order to acquire title to the property, the Board of Education must pay approximately one-half of the condemnation awards or about \$30,000. Although no final decree has been entered, Controller Berry said.
