Cardinals Coaching Staff

CHARLEY WINNER, Head Coach

A journey that led from New Jersey to Missouri to Ohio to Maryland ended back in Missouri three years ago when Charley Winner became head coach of the St. Louis Football Cardinals.

The hard-working, soft-spoken Winner, now 44 years old, led the Cardinals to an 8-5-1 mark his first year. The team slipped to 6-7-1 a year ago and now has set its sights higher for 1968.

"There's no easy way to win," says the Big Red head coach. "If there were, everyone would be a winner."

The 5-9, 165-pound Winner was born in Somerville, N. J., in 1924 and celebrates two birthdays, explaining it this way, "My birth certificate says July 3, but my mother says I was born on July 2. So I celebrate both of them — it's more fun that way."

After being a fine halfback at Somerville High, Winner enrolled at Southeast Missouri State College, Cape Girardeau, Mo., in 1942. His coach there was E. R. (Abe) Stuber, now the Cardinals' director of player personnel. Winner played as a freshman, then was drafted in the spring of 1942. He spent 2-1/2 years in the Air Force as a radio operator and gunner, flying 17 missions over Germany. His plane was shot down in 1945 and Winner spent six weeks in a German P. O. W. camp before the war ended.

Returning to college, Winner enrolled at Washington University in St. Louis, having been impressed by the school and the city during a freshman football trip. As a halfback, Winner earned a pair of football letters and also won three track letters as a sprinter and broad jumper, serving as captain of the Bears' track team.

While Winner was at Washington University, the head coach there was Weeb Ewbank. Winner met Ewbank's daughter, Nancy, and a football romance blossomed.

Earning a B.S. degree in 1949, Winner remained at Washington U. in 1950, helping coach the football team and receiving a master's degree in education. He moved to Cleveland in 1950 as an assistant coach under Lou Saban at Case Tech. He also found time to help scout for the Cleveland Browns and to marry Nancy Ewbank, whose father was then on the Cleveland staff.

When Ewbank became head coach at Baltimore in 1954, Winner went along as an assistant. He worked with the ends, then the linebackers and eventually assumed command of the entire Baltimore defense, a task he held when the Colts won NFL Championships in 1958 and 1959.

Ewbank moved to the New York Jets in 1963, Don Shula became head coach of the Colts and Winner was faced with a decision. "I could have gone to New York with Weeb," he says, "he and I always had worked well together. But I felt it was time to strike out on my own, rather than continue to be associated with my father-in-law."

Winner stayed at Baltimore, still in charge of the defense, as the Colts won the Western Division title in 1964 and tied for it in 1965, losing to Green Bay in a playoff in the latter season.

When he finds time away from football, Winner is a rabid fisherman and an amateur gardener. He and Nancy live in a suburb of St. Louis with their two daughters, Cinda, 16, and Lisa, 11.

CHUCK DRULIS, Assistant Coach

The senior member of the Big Red staff, in charge of the defense, Chuck Drulis is rated one of the top defensive strategists in professional football.

Drulis is going into his 13th season as a Cardinal staff member and his 18th as an NFL coach. A native of Girardville, Pa., he starred as a guard at Temple University in Philadelphia, winning all-East honors. He was a member of the Chicago Bears' NFL champs as a rookie in 1942, then went into the service for 2-1/2 years. He rejoined the Bears in 1945 and earned all-Pro laurels in 1947 and 1948.

Entering the coaching ranks, Drulis' first post was at Green Bay in 1951 and he spent three years there before moving to Philadelphia in 1954. He came to the Cardinals under Ray Richards in 1956 and has remained to mold some of the league's finest defenses under Frank (Pop) Ivy, Wally Lemm and Charley Winner. Drulis is credited with devising the safety blitz, first used by the Cardinals in 1960.

Drulis' family includes both football and artistic talent. His brother, Al, was a back with the Cardinals and his two sons, Chuck, Jr., and Kerry both have been fine football players. The latter is a pre-med student and football player at Washington University in St. Louis. His wife, Dale, is an outstanding artist, sculptor and decorator who designed and executed the facade of the National Professional Football Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio.

BOB (RED) MILLER, Assistant Coach

Volatile, dynamic coach works with the superior Cardinal offensive line, also coordinates the Big Red ground attack in his third season on the staff.

Miller came to the Big Red with Charley Winner in 1966 after a distinguished coaching career, both on the college and professional level. He grew up in Macomb, Ill., then was a fine guard at Western Illinois University, being named Most Valuable Player on the squad three straight seasons and graduating in 1950.

After a tour of high school coaching at Astoria and Canton, Ill., while he earned a master's degree in education, Miller returned to his alma mater as an assistant under Lou Saban in 1957. He moved with Saban to the Boston Patriots in 1960 and the Buffalo Bills two year later, then served as an assistant at Denver in 1964 and 1965.

Miller and his wife, Nancy, live in a St. Louis suburb with their two children Stephen, 13, and Lana, 11.

HARRY GILMER, Assistant Coach

One of the great names of collegiate and professional quarterbacks, Harry Gilmer starts his second year with the Cardinals, working with the quarterback corps and coordinating the passing attack.

He joined the Washington Redskins in 1948 as the team's No. 1 draft pick and played there until he was traded to Detroit in 1955. After concluding his professional career with the Lions in 1956, he moved with Buddy Parker to Pittsburgh as an assistant coach. He joined the fledgling Minnesota Vikings as an assistant to Norm Van Brocklin in 1961 and worked with the Viking defense until he became head coach at Detroit in 1965.

Gilmer and his wife, Katherine, live in a suburb of St. Louis. They have four children, Connie, 20, Fran, 18, Dale, 13, and Drew, 11.

DON SHROYER, Assistant Coach

Starting his fifth season with the Cardinals is Don Shroyer, whose primary chores as linebacker coach give him an imposing task this season, rebuilding a group which lost two starters through retirement in the off-season.

Shroyer is in his second tour of duty with the Big Red. He was an assistant in 1962 and 1963, left to become head coach at Southern Illinois University and rejoined the Cardinals in 1966. While at SIU, Shroyer helped develop Jim Hart, currently the Cardinal quarterback.

Shroyer, a native of Lovington, Ill., attended Millikin University, where he was a top-flight halfback while earning bachelor's and master's degrees. He entered coaching at Carmi (Ill.) High School and served for five seasons before returning to his alma mater as head coach.

At Millikin, Shroyer led his teams to a 29-18-1 record, climaxed by an undefeated season in 1961. He came to the Cardinals the following year as defensive backfield coach. Shroyer and his wife, Marilyn, live in a St. Louis suburb with their three children, Gail, 15, Doug, 13, and Christopher, 3.

JOHN (RED) COCHRAN, Assistant Coach

A member of the Cardinals' championship teams on 1947 and 1948 returns to the Big Red as a staff member this year and will work with the offensive backfield.

Cochran was out of football last year after spending eight seasons at Green Bay, where his running backs were the scourge of the NFL. Before becoming a member of Vince Lombardi's original Packer staff, Cochran had been an assistant coach at Detroit from 1956 through 1958.

A native of Alabama, Cochran was a two-sport star at Wake Forest, where his education was interrupted by 34 months in the Army during World War II. He joined the Cardinals in 1947 and played for four seasons as a defensive back.

Cochran led the NFL in punt returns in 1949, setting a team record by averaging 20.93 yards a return, a mark that still ranks second in NFL annals to Jack Christiansen's 21.47 in 1952. Cochran began coaching at Wake Forest in 1951 before entering the NFL with Detroit. He and his wife, Pat, have three children, Tracy, 11, Cindy, 9, and Russell, 8.

DICK VORIS, Assistant Coach

NFL coaching veteran joins the Cardinal staff this year, with the defensive line his primary duty.

Voris, a native of California, was an outstanding center and linebacker at Hartnell Jr. College and at San Jose State, graduating in 1952.

He returned to his prep alma mater as head coach that year, leading Hartnell (Calif.) High School to 21 straight victories. He joined the Los Angeles Rams as line coach in 1954 and moved East in 1955, becoming line coach and chief assistant to Earl Blaik at the U. S. Military Academy.

Voris left Army to become head coach at the University of Virginia in 1958 and joined Vince Lombardi's staff at Green Bay in 1961. He returned to San Francisco two years later and worked with the 49er defense until coming to St. Louis early this year. Voris and his wife, Idelle, have two children, Susan, 18, and Ronald, 17.

KEN SHIPP, Assistant Coach

Veteran of 17 years of college and pro coaching makes his NFL debut this year, working with the Big Red pass receivers.

Shipp is a native of Tennessee and was a halfback at Middle Tennessee State College. He graduated in 1950 and began coaching there immediately. After three years there, he moved to Trinity University, San Antonio, Tex., and was a staff member from 1953 through 1957. He joined the staff of the Montreal Alouettes in 1958 and spent three seasons in Canada.

Moving to Tulsa, Shipp worked under Bobby Dodd for two years, then joined the staff at the University of South Carolina. He went to Miami (Florida) in 1964 and has been in charge of the Hurricanes' high-powered offense ever since.

Shipp and his wife, Sue, live in St. Louis.

EMMETT (ABE) STUBER, Personnel Director

The unceasing search for talent to keep the Cardinal roster filled with young and promising players is what keeps this veteran football man on the move. Stuber sees hundreds of college players each spring and fall and checks on hundreds more through reports turned in by other scouts.

Stuber is a veteran of more than 35 years in coaching, scouting and administration. He was a star quarterback at the University of Missouri in 1924-26, and began his coaching career at Southeast Missouri State College, Cape Girardeau, in 1930. For 17 years, he turned out a series of outstanding football, track and basketball teams, and recruited many fine football players, including a young halfback named Charley Winner in 1942.

Moving to Iowa State as head coach in 1947, Stuber spent seven years there, then joined the Washington State College staff in 1954. He made his NFL debut with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1955 and moved to Green Bay a year later.

Stuber joined the Cardinals in 1958, dropped out of football for a year, then came back to the Big Red in 1960, with the talent department his major assignment. He and his wife, Dorothy, live in Piedmont, Mo. They have four grandchildren, two by a son, Dick, and two by a daughter, Mrs. Martha Griffith.

GEORGE BOONE, Assistant Personnel Director

Joining the Cardinals this year to assist E. R. (Abe) Stuber is young George Boone, veteran of eight years in football coaching and scouting. He will work with Stuber in the major operation of locating, watching and judging talent.

A native of Kentucky, Boone was a varsity tackle at the University of Kentucky, then served as an assistant coach for six years.

The 30-year-old Boone joined CEPO — a combine of seven NFL teams that share scouting information — as an area scout two years ago.

Boone and his wife, Dedee, are the parents of four children.

JACK ROCKWELL, Trainer

No team is better than the physical fitness of its players, and that's the vital task that Jack Rockwell has filled for the Cardinals since 1960.

The 42-year-old Rockwell joined the Big Red the year they became the St. Louis representative in the NFL, and he brought a solid background to the job. A native of Seattle, he enrolled at the University of Kansas, but World War II service interrupted his studies and he completed work toward bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Colorado.

He served Colorado as head trainer for seven years before joining the Cardinals, and previously had served as trainer for the Bremerton, Wash., minor league baseball team and as a therapist for the Washington State Rehabilitation Center. He also was the trainer when a U. S. basketball team toured Russia in 1948.

Rockwell recently was named executive secretary of the National Athletic Trainers Assn. He and his wife, Jean, live in a suburb of St. Louis with their two sons, Kerry, 17, and Kevin, 10.

JOHN OMOHUNDRO, Assistant Trainer

Helping in the myriad of jobs associated with a training room is 25-year-old John Omohundro, a native of Salt Lake City who is in his second season with the Cardinals. Omohundro earned a degree in physical education at the University of Wyoming, serving as assistant trainer there and as head trainer at the College of Southern Utah. He is single.

BILL SIMMONS, Equipment Manager

Making certain that all the Cardinal equipment is ready and in good repair, and that it's in the right place at the right time, is the task of Bill Simmons.

Simmons, 43, is spending his third season with the Big Red after four years as a physical education teacher at Ferguson Junior High School.

A native of Kansas City, Simmons received both bachelor's and master's degrees at Northeast Missouri State College. He also served in the Air Force during World War II and the Korean War.

Simmons and his wife, Katie, live in a suburb of St. Louis. They have five children, Dan, 22, currently in the Navy, Tim, 19, Sue, 15, Kathy, 14 and Pat, 12.

Second-round draft choice is tall, rangy defensive back with exceptional speed, fine hitting ability. Intercepted nine passes as college senior, also played as receiver and snared 32 passes for 385 yards. Native of Atlanta played in Senior Bowl, College All-Star games. Single.

BAKKEN, JAMES LEROY — Kicker

B-11/2/40 6-0 200 Wisconsin Seventh Year

NFL scoring champ established three league records in 117-point season — most field goals (7) and most attempts (9) in a game, set against Pittsburgh, and for consecutive-game string of 19 in which he booted at least one field goal. Owns most team career and season scoring marks, has led team in scoring for five years. Fine all-around athlete was prep standout at Madison, Wis., then won college football and baseball letters. Was drafted as quarterback by Rams, came to Cardinals as free agent before 1962 season. Played in Pro Bowl, 1966 and 1968. Married (wife, Hope), two children, lives in St. Louis. —

B-12/30/44 6-3 205 U. of Tex. (Arlington) Second Year

Tall safety shows excellent speed, tackling ability, saw action as reserve and on special teams in rookie year. Fourth-round draft choice was high school end in Denison, Tex., college half-back, played in Senior Bowl. Working toward degree in civil engineering during off-season. Married (wife, Jena), one child.

BRUMM, DONALD DWAIN — Defensive End**B-10/4/41 6-3 245 Purdue Sixth Year**

Loss of rugged defensive end for much of 1967 hurt Cardinal pass rush and his return to top health should bolster defense. Hard-charging pass rusher was leader of 1966 defense that paced league. Tough, strong competitor was star tackle at Purdue, came to Big Red as first-round draft choice. Won team Rookie-of-the-Year honors in 1963, scored only touchdown of career in 1965 when he recovered Redskin fumble, went nine yards to score. Married (wife, Donna), one child, recently bought home in St. Louis.

BRYANT, CHARLES LIMAR — Running Back**B-3/7/41 5-11 205 Allen U. (S. C.) Third Year**

Hard-running back with blazing speed has seen limited duty first two years because of injuries, saw major duty on kickoff returns last season. Worked on defense in training camp, could be reserve there. Born in Columbia, S. C., was track and grid star in college, drafted ninth by Cardinals. CARLIN, VIDAL CARLOS — Quarterback

B-4/6/45 6-2 195 North Texas State First Year

Hard-throwing quarterback was third-round draft choice for 1967, spent most of season in Continental League. Has added poise and maturity to excellent arm. Hit high spot of college career when he completed 34 of 52 passes against top-ranked Arkansas. Native of Tucson, Ariz., was prep star at Galveston, Tex., then at Tyler J. C., North Texas State. Married (wife, Lea), one child, lives in Shreveport, La.

CHILDS, CLARENCE — Defensive Back

B-1/13/38 6-0 180 Florida A&M Fifth Year

Fleet defensive back came to Cardinals in August trade with Giants, will work at corner spot. Joined New York as free agent in 1961, spent year on reserve squad, two in Army before winning offensive backfield berth in 1964, leading NFL in kickoff returns with 29-yard average. Career total is 126 returns for 3163 yards, 25.1 average, 2 touchdowns. Shifted to defense by Giants in 1966. Earned four grid, three track letters in college, specializing in 220 but turning in 9.3 clocking for 100-yard dash. Native of Lakeland, Fla.

CLARK, ERNIE — Linebacker

B-8/11/37 6-1 230 Michigan State Sixth Year

Hard-hitting outside linebacker came to Cardinals from Detroit in off-season trade for Joe Robb, will bolster defense. Born in Florida, was prep standout in Medina, N. Y., then worked for two years before entering Michigan State, winning three grid letters as defensive end. Was Lions' 13th-round draft choice, led Detroit in minutes played (399:45) in 1966. Excellent tackler has fine speed, good pass-coverage ability. Married (wife, Vivian), lives in Detroit.

CONRAD, BOBBY JOE — Flanker

B-11/7/35 6-2 200 Texas A & M Eleventh Year

Tenth-ranking NFL receiver of all time is third (behind Bobby Mitchell, Tommy McDonald) among active players with 386 catches. Has caught passes in 90 consecutive games, needs five to match Don Hutson's NFL record. Rangy, sure-handed receiver has been on flank only six of his 10 seasons, starting as defensive back in rookie campaign, playing in backfield next three years. Has played in 134 consecutive games, never missing one in NFL career. Native of Clifton, Tex., was prep star there, then was collegiate quarterback, halfback, end. Set College All-Star game scoring record with 15 points (four field goals, three conversions) in 1958, led Cardinals in 1959, did team's place-

kicking for three years. Led NFL, set team mark in receiving in 1963. Played in Pro Bowl, 1965, named team MVP, 1962 and 1965, was St. Louis "Old Pro," 1964. Married (wife, Betty), two children, lives in Clifton.
