I am honoured to present the Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF) Annual Performance Report for the Fiscal Year 2021. This report helps explain to the Government, the five year Action Plan and Sri Lanka Air Force Corporate Plan 2021-2023, in line with the National Policy Framework ‘Vistas of Prosperity and Splendor’. It also includes the Annual Action Plan for the year 2021 and National Defence Strategy. Also, we are putting into place the strategy, resources and operational concepts needed to address the facing challenge of the national security and nation development of the country. We have continued deployment of troops to UN contingents at Central Africa and South Sudan (a totally of 327 service personnel) which has positively impacted to increase the inflow of foreign currency to the country. I am grateful to each member of the SLAF workforce for remaining steadfast during these difficult times.

The SLAF also remains committed to its annual financial statement audit regime that resulted in an audit of opinion where a few weaknesses were identified and are now being addressed, so we can move to be better. The audit findings and recommendations continue to provide us with invaluable information to guide our corrective actions as we strive to improve the quality of our financial reporting process. Our overall financial performance section in the management’s discussion, analysis section and compliance report outlines the SLAF’s assessment of weaknesses and compliance with relevant laws and regulations.



The overall financial performance section provides the Auditor General's Report, which details the results of this year's audit. The audit remediation effort is key to our goal to ensure that the SLAF's resources are matched to strategy, strategy is matched to policy and policy is matched to the will of the country. Modernizing and reforming our professional practices will make us even better guardians of hard-earned taxpayer resources, as we continue to better support our war fighters and free up time, money and personnel for higher priorities. ## 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

### 1.1 Introduction

a. During the financial year 2021, Sri Lanka Air Force has contributed in line with Sri Lanka Air Force Corporate Plan 2021-2023 and Annual Action Plan year 2021 and also the National Policy Framework 'Vistas of Prosperity and Splendor' five year Action Plan of the Government of Sri Lanka giving top priority of national security to the country. In addition to the primary role of effective utilization of air power for the defence of the nation, SLAF has contributed nation development activities to country. Especially, in response to COVID-19, the SLAF has prioritized the protection of our forces including service members and their dependents and civilians maintaining mission readiness, and supporting the whole of government effort to fight this virus in the year 2021. In the face of complex challenges like the COVID-19 pandemic, SLAF advanced important initiatives in FY 2021 that will have a positive impact on the Government human capital management landscape in the years ahead.

b. In the year 2021 Sri Lanka Air Force had continued its leading role in developing domestic air transport, which is identified as a prerequisite for development of tourism in the country. The Sri Lanka Air Force also played a major role in national calamities and disasters by active participation in casualty evacuation and timely engaging troops. Annual Performance Report 2021 includes analysis of Corporate Plan for the period 2021-2023, Annual Action Plan 2021 and also National Policy Framework Vistas of Prosperity and Splendour 5-year Action Plan with annual budgetary allocation. Further, established activities during the year 2021 for accomplishment have been analyzed against the actual performance and highlighted for intended planning of 2021.

#### c. Analysis of Annual Action Plan with Budget

(1) The Annual Performance Report is set out on the same basis as the Annual Budget with Annual Action Plan. It reports performance against the targets set out in the Corporate Plan for the period 2021 - 2023. Each section contains a short performance summary and assessment at the front, supplemented by an essay providing additional background on some relevant aspects of defence related activities during the year.

(2) The Annual Budget is designed deliberately to evolve over time to reflect emerging top level priorities and changes in the way the Department is organized. Consequently, although the overall structures remain consistent, there is inevitably a certain amount of change from one annual Budget to the next at the top level supporting objectives and the way they are bridged and presented.

(3) At the highest level, objectives of the Sri Lanka Air Force are set out in the Corporate Plan 2021 - 2023. The Annual Performance Report therefore starts with a summary of performance as of 31st December 2021 against the targets set in the Corporate Plan for the period 2021-2023 and Annual Action Plan of year 2021. The spending review is provided throughout the report.

**d. Departmental Financial Statements 2021**

(1) The Department is required to prepare Financial Statement for each financial year detailing the resources required, held or disposed during the year and the way in which it has been used. The financial statements are prepared on a cash basis in accordance with Financial Regulations and Treasury guidelines.

(2) They must give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Department, the Net Resource outturn, resources applied to objectives, recognized gains and losses, and cash flows for the financial year. The Department Financial Statement for 2021 is attached with this report.

**e. Strategic Framework for Performance Management**

(1) Performance Management is a multi-phase process setting strategic goals and priorities, creating program activities, monitoring program activities collecting data and measuring progress towards achievement of goals, using performance and evaluation information to influence program and resource allocation decision making and communicating results to stakeholders.

(2) The SLAF's performance management is guided by a high-level three year SLAF Corporate Plan 2021-2023, Annual Action Plan (AAP) of the year 2021 and *National Policy Framework Vistas of Prosperity and Splendour 5-year Action Plan*.

## 1.2 Vision, Mission and Core - Competencies

**a. Vision**

“Ensuring national security through effective employment of airpower”

**b. Mission**

“To train, equip and deploy a professional Air Force exploiting our core competencies to undertake air operations in support of national security”

**c. Core - Competencies**

The core competencies of an organization are the major determination of driving the organization towards achieving its goals. The SLAF also has number of unmatched core competences as follows:

(1) Military Flying and Air Defence Capability. SLAF is the sole entity capable of conducting military flying and Air Defence operations in Sri Lanka.

(2) Innovative Adaption for Limited Resources. Through its history, SLAF has shown a unique adaptability in the utilization of limited resources and is application for achievement of maximization effect under varying circumstances.

(3) A professional, motivated Workforce with Diverse operational Experience. SLAF possesses a rich heritage of traditions inherited from the RAF, a well-defined training and professional development structure, a wealth of experience gained in the application of Air Power in diverse operations conducted since its inception, which has produced a dedicated, motivated and highly adaptive professional force.

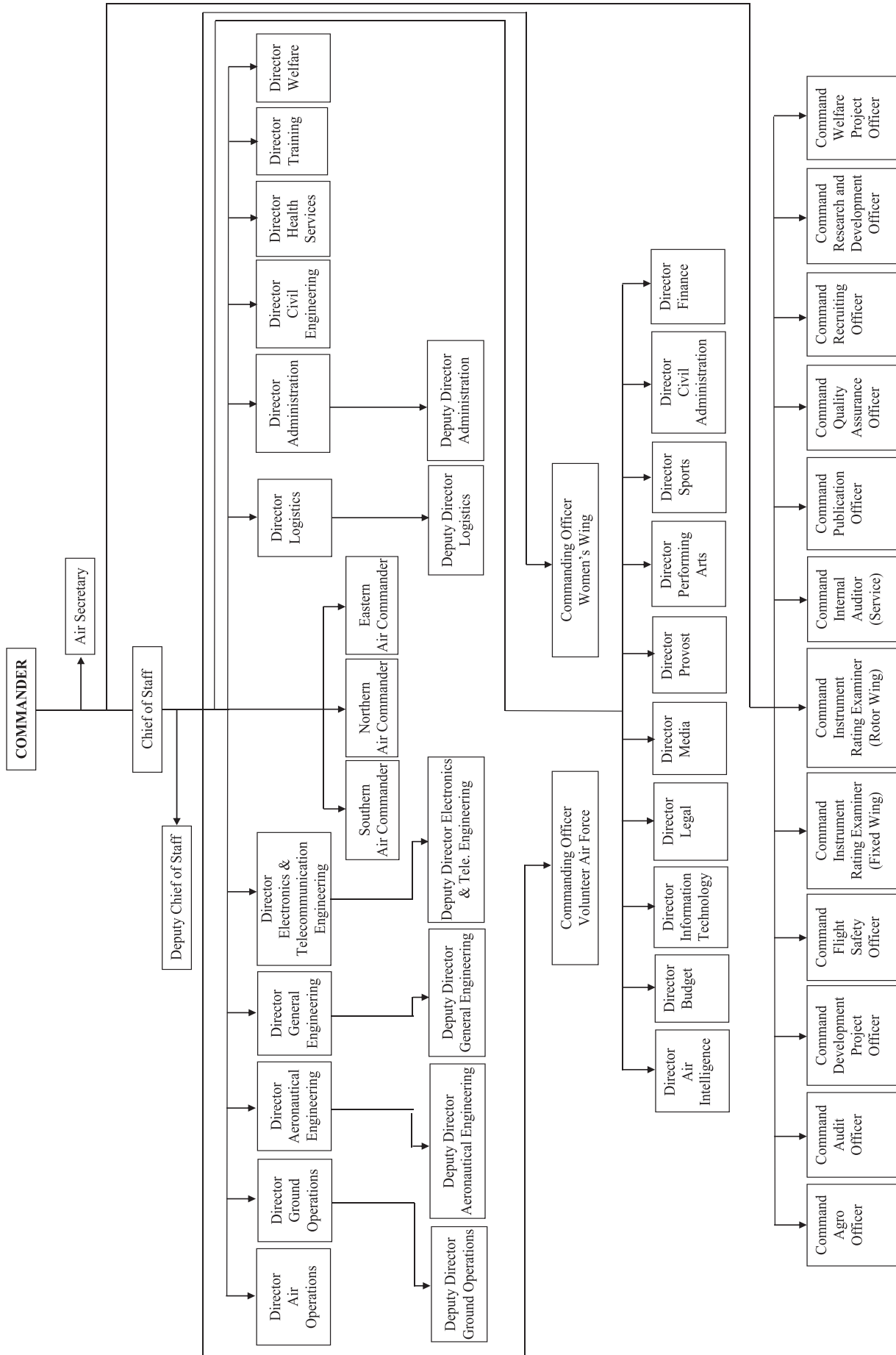
(4) Effective, secure, responsible exploitation of the electromagnetic spectrum and cyberspace for national security.

(5) Through possession of an exclusive island wide secure telecommunication, IT and Radar network, SLAF has the unique ability to exploit the electromagnetic spectrum for communication and Air Surveillance and cyberspace for information management.

### 1.3 Key Functions

- a. To provide tactical air support and transport to Land and Naval forces.
- b. To provide rescue facilities and transport at the request of the Government.
- c. Provide engineering and logistic services to maintain aircraft, road transport, electronic equipment and other plant and machinery.
- d. Provide troops for internal security operations.
- e. Undertake Non- Military Air operations and carry out research and development projects connected with national development.
- f. Actively participating in the Peace Keeping Forces of the UN by providing human resources, aircrafts and vehicles.

## 1.5 Main Directorates and Command Divisions of the Sri Lanka Air Force and its brief Description in the year 2020

### a. Directorate of Air Operations

#### (1) Introduction

(a) The Operational shaper of the Sri Lanka Air Force comes under the purview of the Directorate of Air Operations. The Directorate is responsible for the areas of Air Operations, Air Defence & Air Traffic Controlling and Fire Fighting.

(b) The overall budget of Directorate of Air Operations was LKR Mn 52.20 covering major activities under the main headings of insurance of aircraft, fire fighting, ATC and airfield safety.

(c) During the year 2021, the directorate has completed most of the activities, which have been projected in the Annual Action Plan 2021 of SLAF.

### b. Directorate of Ground Operations

(1) Introduction. The Directorate of Ground Operations was reinstated on 28th February 2014. The SLAF Regiment, consisting of 29 Wings placed under the Directorate of Ground Operations with the aim of preventing any external /internal aggression by the enemy and to preserve / secure the SLAF air assets and installations vital for operations.

#### (2) Comparison of Actual Performance with Annual Action Plan.

The overall budget of Directorate of Ground Operations for the year 2021 was LKR Mn. 72.08 covering the activities such as purchase of defence equipment and defence material, Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) equipment, parachute equipment, Regimental Special Force equipment and Air Dog medicine equipment.

### c. Directorate of Aeronautical Engineering

#### (1) Introduction.

(a) The Directorate of Aeronautical Engineering (Dte of AE) is responsible for the maintenance of the SLAF aircraft fleet in airworthy (FMC) condition through the application of standard engineering practices and thus ensuring flight safety. The SLAF inventory consists of 106 aircraft of 27 types. These 106 aircraft are further sub divided as 60 Fixed Wing Aircraft and 46 Helicopters.

(b) The overall budget of the Directorate of Aeronautical Engineering is the largest divisional budget amounted to LKR Mn 7,408.48. The overall budget of the directorate has been planned to carry out tasks which is responsible for such as Aircraft Engine, Gear Box, Propeller & Tools, Purchase of Aircraft, Establishment of AOF (China), Aircraftmaintenance, Purchase of Aircraft spares etc...

#### **d. Directorate of General Engineering**

##### **(1) Introduction.**

(a) The Directorate of General Engineering has been established to administer the General Engineering Trades of the SLAF. It primarily provides support facilities for the SLAF's primary role of flying. The Directorate administers ten (10) trades and two (2) major formations under its purview.

(b) TThe General Engineering Wing (GEW) & the Mechanical Transport & Overhaul Wing (MTR&OW) are the two formations. The directorate has specialist airmen in ten (10) trades but is served by Officers of the Technical Engineering branch who alternate between performing General Engineering duties and duties in the field of Aeronautical Engineering.

(c) The Directorate of General Engineering has projected in its Action Plans (AP) based on Vote on Accounts an amount of LKR Mn 1,235.00 at the beginning of the year 2021 for General Engineering activities. Out of these allocations, according to the liquidity availed; the directorate has carried out its essential tasks during the year 2021.

#### **e. Directorate of Electronic and Telecommunication Engineering**

##### **(1) Introduction.**

(a) The Directorate of Electronics and Telecommunications Engineering (Directorate of E & T E) was established in the SLAF for administration of Electronics, Telecommunications and Information Technology functions and to provide and maintain efficient Electronics, Telecommunications and Information Technology facilities.

(b) The initial budget of the Directorate of Electronics and Telecommunications Engineering which has been included in the Annual Action Plan (AAP) for the year 2021 was LKR Mn. 1,241.50. The projections have been made for the directorate to accomplish the targets set for the year in the action plan. In the year 2021 the directorate has performed in an outstanding manner by implementing successfully most of the projects which were forecasted in the AAP. Further, few projects have been started and yet to be completed at the end of the year while, less number of projects have not been commenced.

**f. Directorate of Logistics**

(1) Introduction.

(a) The Directorate of Logistics has been established in the SLAF to provide the necessary logistics support to conduct all Air Force operations, training, administration and welfare functions efficiently.

(b) At the beginning of the year 2021, the Directorate of Logistics has projected an amount of LKR Mn. 5,454.00 for its logistic activities. Out of the total budget, 92.32% spent to provide the Diets, Fuel, Oil, Lubricants and Uniforms. Most of projections have been achieved during the year by the directorate.

**g. Directorate of Administration**

(1) Introduction.

(a) This directorate is entrusted with all the matters concerned with the administration of the Sri Lanka Air Force and also with duties pertaining to General Discipline, Officers matters, Airmen/Airwomen matters, Pay and allowances, Organizational matters and other administration matters.

(b) The overall budget of the Directorate of Administration for the year 2021 was LKR Mn. 31,668.20 as per Annual Action Plan (AAP). The budget of the directorate 96.70% has been allocated to the payment of salaries, wages and allowances. The directorate has budgeted LKR Mn.865.00 for payment of electricity and water bills of the bases and stations of the SLAF, which represented 2.73% of the total budget of this directorate. The balance 0.56% represents the purchase of capital equipment, purchase of stationery, traveling charges and property loan interest.

**h. Directorate of Civil Engineering**

(1) Introduction.

(a) The Directorate of Civil Engineering is established in the Sri Lanka Air Force for the formulation of Policy and to perform all functions encompassing different fields of Engineering namely Civil, Mechanical and Electrical. The directorate is to utilize efficiently the approved technical manpower, other material resources and the allocated finances to meet all engineering requirements coming under the purview of the directorate.



(b) In the Annual Action Plan of SLAF year 2021, the Directorate of Civil Engineering has projected an amount of LKR Mn. 853.00 for its main headings of Civil, Mechanical and Electrical engineering activities. This Comprises Purchase of Mechanical & Electrical Goods, Vehicle Repair & Maintenance, Hiring of Civil Engineer Machinery, Additions and Improvements of all SLAF establishments, Rehabilitation of Runways, Maintenance of Machinery, Purchase of Civil Engineering Workshop equipment, Repair of Civil Engineering Machinery, Purchase of Pumps, Air Conditioners and Generators and Construction of Building & Structures. At the end of the year 2021 the directorate has executed most of the activities which were projected in the Annual Action Plan while some projects have already been implemented and in progress. Some of the activities have not been commenced due to various reasons.

**j. Directorate of Training**

(1) Introduction.

(a) The Directorate of Training has established in the Sri Lanka Air Force to formulate training policy, plan and conduct of Initial, Basic, Advanced Trade Training, Specialized and Instructor Training, Promotion Examinations for Officers and Airmen/Airwomen. This Directorate will ensure that high standards are achieved and maintained at all SLAF training establishments.

(b) The Directorate of Training has projected in the Annual Action Plan (AAP) for the year 2021 an amount of LKR Mn 647.06 for training and capacity building of personnel within the Sri Lanka Air Force with view of enhancement of providing better quality service.

(c) SLAF during the year 2021 has conducted both local and foreign training courses for various professions of the SLAF such as Pilot, Aircraft Engineers, Civil Doctors, Accountants, Auditors and Regimental Officers and also the all the tradesmen for the uplift of the skills level of the staff and capacity building. The main role of the Directorate of Training is to generate skilful military personnel with outstanding performance to serve the government. The directorate has accomplished most of the projections during the year 2021.

**k. Directorate of Health Services**

(1) Introduction.

(a) As one of the main contributors to the technically intensive military force, the Directorate of Health Services (Dte of HS) will continue to be one of the key players in maintaining the health of the Sri Lanka Air Force. In addition to carrying out its main task of maintaining the health in the SLAF, D of HS will have to develop its capabilities to handle more in depth patient care activities in our hospitals.

(b) According to the Annual Action Plan (AAP) of SLAF in the year 2021, the overall budget of the Directorate of Health Services is LKR Mn. 242.20, which expected to be financed by budgetary allocations of year 2021.

**l. Directorate of Welfare**

Introduction. The Directorate is responsible to the Commander of the Air Force for the welfare of all Officers/Airmen and their families. As such the Directorate of Welfare is tasked with the responsibility of establishing and administering welfare organization for providing financial and other essential welfare facilities to uplift the standard of servicemen and their families. The directorate is responsible to ensure rehabilitation and welfare of the DIA (Disabled in Action) personal and NOKs of KIA (Killed in Action) personnel.

**m. Directorate of Provost**

Introduction. “SLAF Police is primarily responsible in maintaining law and order and a high standard of discipline within the organization. Performing ceremonial duties such as VIP Motorcycle Escorts, Honour Guards, Crowd Controlling and Traffic Controlling are some of the key roles played on field by Policemen.

**n. Directorate of Air Intelligence**

Introduction. The Directorate of Air Intelligence was established on 23rd May 2017 to plan and execute all Intelligence matters in Sri Lanka Air Force. The directorate is responsible for the effective and efficient planning and execution of Air Maritime Strategic Command Centre (AMSCC), Air Intelligence including Air Surveillance, Ground Intelligence, Global Intelligence and Cyber Intelligence in the purview of Sri Lanka Air Force.

**p. Directorate of Information Technology**

Introduction. The Directorate of Information Technology was established in the SLAF as an independent Directorate. The primary role of the directorate is to design, develop and maintain all information technology (IT) systems and equipment including software systems, networks, hardware, data bases, multimedia designing and cyber security in order to achieve organizational objectives.

**q. Directorate of Finance**

Introduction. The Directorate of Finance manages the financial activities of the SLAF in liaison with the treasury. The directorate ensures the availability of liquidity for all budgeted expenses and advise in the direction of spending.

**r. Directorate of Civil Administration**

Introduction. The Directorate of Civil Administration has bounded with providing civilian employees to perform variety of services coming under different Directorates. It is also responsible to the Commander of the Air Force for an efficient administration and to exercise disciplinary control over civilian employees.

**s. Directorate of Budget**

Introduction. The Directorate of Budget (Dte of Bgt) is established in the SLAF as an independent directorate (Non AFBM). The primary role of the Directorate of Budget is to obtain financial resources (provisions) to manage the activities of the SLAF and considerably influence respective Directors/Command Officers for the optimum utilization of provisions which are allocated to them during a financial year in conference to Government Financial Regulations.

**t. Directorate of Performing Arts**

Introduction. The Directorate of Performing Arts was established as the only of the SLAF to cater the ceremonial and entertainment requirement of national interest, organizational interest as well as providing entertainment assistants for welfare of serving and retired SLAF personnel and civilians. Being one of the most reputed and established performance organization in the country, the Directorate of Performing Arts has strengthened the revenue of the SLAF as one of the key profit generators of the organization.

**u. Directorate of Media**

Introduction. The Sri Lanka Air Force as a Department under the Ministry of Defence, is responsible and answerable to the Public of Sri Lanka through the Ministry of Defence. However, in the course of its day to day operations, it may be necessary for the SLAF to interact directly with the general public both in the interest of promoting or preserving the public image of the organization or in response to communications initiated by those outside the organization. Considering that any and all communication between the SLAF and the general public has to be carried out with due cognizance of the implications to National Security as well as the due dignity and decorum of the Sri Lanka Air Force. It is imperative that the content and tone of all such communications are filtered by an authority under the direct purview of the Commander of the Air Force.

**v. Office of Dental Services**

(1) Introduction.

(a) As an essential preventive and curative health service, dental services must be made available to every individual of the SLAF conveniently and professionally. The Office of Dental Services is continuously improving the quality of dental services while expanding the service to all SLAF establishments.

(b) According to the Annual Action Plan (AAP) of SLAF in the year 2021, the overall budget of the Office of Dental Services was LKR Mn. 44.50 and expected to be financed by budgetary allocations for the year 2021.

w. **Command Recruiting Office**

Introduction. Recruiting falls as the responsibility of Command Recruiting Officer. The role and the responsibility of the Recruiting Section is directed towards fulfilling vacancies available for Officers, Lady Officers, Airmen and Airwomen in the Sri Lanka Regular and Volunteer Air Force as and when authorized by the Commander of the Air Force. This objective is met through the publication of Gazette notifications, newspapers/advertisements on television and other special recruitment drives.

x. **Command Flight Safety Inspectorate (CFSI)**

(1) Introduction.

(a) Sri Lanka Air Force Flight Safety Organization is headed by Command Flight Safety Officer (CFSO) who is the head of the Command Flight Safety Inspectorate (CFSI) and responsible to Commander of Air Force for all functions under purview of CFSI. There are two Staff Officers to handle Flying and Engineering aspects of flight safety respectively.

(b) There are three Chief Flight Safety Inspectors (CFSI) representing Flying, Engineering and Medical branches who will liaise with CFSO in the formulation of policy, procedures and carryout review and other relevant functions of CFSI. Further, there are four Flight Safety Inspectors (FSI) representing Fixed Wing, Rotor Wing, Jet Aircraft and Air Traffic Control who will function under Chief Flight Safety Inspector Flying (CFSI Flying).

y. **Command Quality Assurance Inspectorate**

Introduction. The Command Quality Assurance Inspectorate (CQAI) is established to perform Quality Assurance functions within the SLAF. CQAI is headed by the Command Quality Assurance Officer (CQAO). He is responsible for the operational efficiency of the QAS in the inspectorate to the Commander of the Air Force, to whom he has the right of direct access.

z. **Command Legal Department**

Introduction. The Command Legal Department of the SLAF was established as an independent component of the SLAF Command structure on 1st January 2007 with the intention of providing best, efficient, effective and accurate legal advisory service or any other legal services to the SLAF independently and transparently without being subjected to any influence whatsoever upholding the principle of Rule of Law in accordance with the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

**aa. Internal Audit Division**

Introduction. Internal Audit Division (IAD) was established in the year 2011 in fulfillment of statutory requirements laid down in Financial Regulations of the Government of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka. Accordingly, the IAD is a division directly reporting to the Commander of the Air Force and headed by 'Command Internal Auditor' subsequently in the year 2017, this appointment was renamed as 'Command Internal Auditor (Service)' due to appointing of civil Government Accountant as Chief Internal Auditor (CIA-Civil). Chief Internal Auditor (CIA-Civil) too performing Internal Audit duties independently and report to Commander of the Air Force.

**ab. Command Research and Development Cell**

(1) Introduction.

(a) The Command Research and Development Cell (CRD Cell) is functioning since March 2011 to date. The CRD Cell established to conduct and coordinate research and development in the areas essential to improve overall efficiency of the Air Force.

(b) The Research and Development Wing (RDW) at SLAF Base Kat was established during the year 2015 and function under Command Research and Development Officer (CRDO). RDW is entrusted to conduct/ facilitate the SLAF research studies in liaison with Professionals, Institutions and Universities functioning in the fields of Research & Development.

**ac. Command Welfare Project Unit**

(1) Introduction.

(a) The Command Welfare Project Unit has been established to provide all essential commodities and other consumable items at concessionary rates for the consumption of members of the Air Force as a welfare measure.

(b) The operational functions of Command Welfare Project Unit involves with procurement of commodities and consumables from outside institutes, storing and distribution of same within the SLAF organization across the country where a considerable monetary transactions are taken place.

**ad. Command Development Projects Unit**

Introduction. The Command Development Projects Unit (CDPU) is established under the Command Development Project Officer (CDPO), in order to supply fine aggregates for development works initiated by the Government and the Sri Lanka Air Force. The CDPO will report directly to the Commander of the Air Force. SLAF has been entrusted with the responsibility of activating quarry projects in selected areas to meet the demand of random rubble required for the constructions. In addition to development purposes, this project is obliged to provide its products to military institutions for the establishment of military installations.

**ae. Command Agro Unit**

Introduction. The Command Agro Unit of Sri Lanka Air Force has established for the uplift and coordination of Agriculture, Live stock farming and commercial ventures in the organization and to produce and provide farm products to all service and civil personnel in the Air Force as welfare measures.

**af. UN Peace Keeping Missions**

(1) Introduction. Two (02) Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF) Aviation Contingents have been deployed in UN Peacekeeping Missions at Central African Republic (MINUSCA) and UN Peacekeeping Mission South Sudan (UNMISS) since 2014 and 2015 respectively. However, UN Peacekeeping Mission in South Sudan (UNMISS) was repatriated from 07 August 2021 and UN Peacekeeping Missions in Central African Republic (MINUSCA) has been deployed up to date.

(2) Scope

- (a) Troop transport, insertion and extraction
- (b) Air Patrol (with armed troops onboard)

## 2. PROGRESS AND THE FUTURE OUTLOOK

- (6) Upgrading of GPS 175 System for B-200 aircraft at No 03 Squadron.
- (7) Upgrading of LYNX 9000D+ TCAS system for AN 32 B aircraft at No 02 Squadron.
- (8) Upgrading of GTN 750 XI system for Y-12 II aircraft at No 08 Squadron.
- (9) 05 SLAF personnel (3 x Technicians and 2 x Officers) in 2 times attended for AN 32 aircraft acceptance and ferry flights course in Ukraine.

- (3) Proposal for return to service of the Searcher MK II UAV System and upgrade it to Searcher MK III UAV System are in progress.
- (4) Development of indigenous UAV System (Lihiniya UAV System) is in progress.
- (5) Establishment of real-time data link/communication with AMSCC (Air and Maritime Strategic Command Center) which include Air picture of AD RADARs as well as ATRC.
- (6) Airmax datalink system purchased for R&D project at SLAF Station Katukurunda.
- (7) Procurement of spares and accessories for Indra MK II Radars and specialized test equipment.

**c. Goal 03 Establishment of EW arm and introduction of Network Centric Warfare.**

**Key Achievements**

- (1) SLAF LBAD system equipped with drone jamming equipment to enhance the security of VIP & VVIP.
- (2) Acquisition of portable drone guns and portable drone jammers. (Back pack drone jammer batteries and hand held drone gun batteries purchased for uplift and strengthening ground defence.)

**d. Goal 04 To provide comprehensive force protection for vital Air assets, installations and provide security for VAs and VPs.**

**Key Achievements**

- (1) Replacing of Fire Control USFM Radars with GIBKA-s system is in progress.
- (2) Strengthen the LBAD coverage for His Excellency the President by deploying new AD points in Colombo and Mirihana.
- (3) Acquisition of integrated GIBKA-S Fire Control Radar system with IGLA-S missile system for Land Based Air Defence is in progress.
- (4) Acquiring and provisioning of CCTV cameras and related equipment for SLAF establishments to enhance the perimeter security.

**e. Goal 05 Improvements in SLAF airfields to acquire redundancy in operations during day/night / all weather conditions.**

**Key Achievements**

- (1) All Aerodrome markings and Helipad markings were standardized according to the ICAO regulations.
- (2) All Civil Aircraft Operators have been notified through DGCA to educate their fire prevention Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) to SLAF Fire Fighters at landing locations to provide comprehensive fire cover.
- (3) Upgrading ATC Towers with ICAO Standard instruments such as barometers, Wind Speed Indicators and Aerodrome Beacons.
- (4) Most of analog ATC instruments were upgraded to digital versions to standardize their readings.
- (5) Proposal has been worked out to upgrade all Airfield in SLAF.
- (6) Total of 14 annual flight safety surveys have been conducted on Academy/ Bases/ Stations including flying formations, in order to minimize the safety issues which effect on operational efficiency. Alternative plans such as use of Goose Necks instead of runway/ apron lights have been discussed.
- (7) Further a special survey on Digana helipad was conducted to ascertain its operational capabilities and to identify further improvements.
- (8) Special inspection carried out at Mannar runway to check the suitability for commencing air operations.
- (9) Initiation of reinstallation of existing elephant fence and perimeter fence at Weerawila Runway.

- (10) Initiated deploying of air rifles as measure of controlling bird strike hazard at airfields.
- (11) Gathering statistics of bird activities (behaviors) to formulate safe zones for flying operations.
- (12) Initiated to construct new ATC tower at Heavy Transport Hanger for smooth function of air operations of SLAF Ratmalana.
- (13) Special study was initiated in collaboration with R&D Wing and the University of Moratuwa to design a suitable Bird Repellant system for SLAF air fields and hangars.

- (7) Upgrading of existing video endoscopy system at Hospital SLAF Station Colombo.
- (8) Providing wall mounted oxygen systems, Multipara monitors and Ventilators for Upgradation of HDUs of SLAF Hospitals.
- (9) Purchase of Short Wave Diathermy Machine for Physiotherapy Unit at SLAF Base Higurakgoda.

However, there is clear evidence that Oral diseases are not inevitable, but can be reduced or prevented through simple and effective measures at all stages of the course, both at the individual and population levels. **h. Goal 08 Optimization of SLAF resources in support of National Interest.**

**Key Achievements**

- (1) SLAF was able to earn revenue from the deployment of aviation contingents in UN Peace Keeping Missions in South Sudan and Central African Republic.
- (2) SLAF has logged a total of 21 commercial flights and generated Rs. 14,159,992.37 of income through charter flights.
- (3) Assisted the government while participating for countering COVID-19 pandemic by CBRNE Wing.
- (4) Procurements projects to enhanced the ground defence capabilities and procurements projects to enhanced the Search and Rescue capabilities. These procurement projects were completed during the year 2021.
- (5) Essential strength and equipment have been provided for UN Peace Keeping Mission in Central Africa.

**j. Goal 09 To review existing training system and procedures of SLAF to enhance efficiency and improve professionalism.**

**Key Achievements**

- (1) Identification of Key Performance Indicators (KPI's) for each and every personnel, section, branch, directorate and conduct continuous review of the performance against such KPI's and identification of training needs/training areas to be improved.
- (2) A Flight Safety awareness workshop has been carried out for NCO's in order to improve the flight safety awareness within the organization.
- (3) A Crew Recourse Management training has been conducted for aircrew (Officers and Airmen) in view of developing and enhancing the CRM of the 7th MINUSCA contingent members prior to deploying in Central African Republic.
- (4) Annual Flight Safety Poster Competition was conducted on March 2021 in order to inculcate flight safety culture among the members of SLAF.
- (5) Knowledge sharing and lesson learnt program was initiated among SLAF personnel who are directly involving with flight safety aspects by distributing the videos and articles of past aircraft accident investigation reports to evaluate the lessons which can be learnt out of it.

**k. Goal 10 Right size the force structure of SLAF, revisioning Recruitment plan and induction of new technologies.**

**Key Achievements**

254 numbers of Officers and 1,324 numbers of other rankers were recruited in the year 2021.

**l. Goal 11 To enhanced the situation awareness and operational efficiency of SLAF through cutting edge ICT technologies.**

**Key Achievements**

- (1) Research project was initiated to develop anomaly identification and detection system and proposal was submitted to Centre for Research and Development at Ministry of Defence. The project was approved by the senate to progress.
- (2) Project was initiated to design and develop indigenous Command and Control Centre for AFHQ at DHQC Akuregoda. Initial proposal was approved and development process started at No 01 ITW Ratmalana.
- (3) Installation of 2 KVA online UPS with 3 hours battery backup for SLAF repeater stations in order to enhance the high availability of the SLAF Data Network.
- (4) New fiber optic cable laying from SLAF Base Katunayake to SLAF Station Bandaranayake International Airport to enhance the data and voice communication infrastructure.
- (5) Installation of lightening protection system to ADC&CC SLAF Station Mirigama.

## 2.1.1 Summary of Performance of Sri Lanka Air Force in the year 2021

### a. Directorate of Air Operation

(1) During the year 2021, the SLAF has operated its diverse fleet of aircraft to cater VVIP/VIP transportation, transport of troops/passengers and cargo, Air Surveillance, commercial domestic air transportation, obligatory to the nation by its only military air arms of the country. Nevertheless, close interaction provision of assistance to the sister services (SL Army, SL Navy, and Police) in terms of Air Power had been equally important among above task.

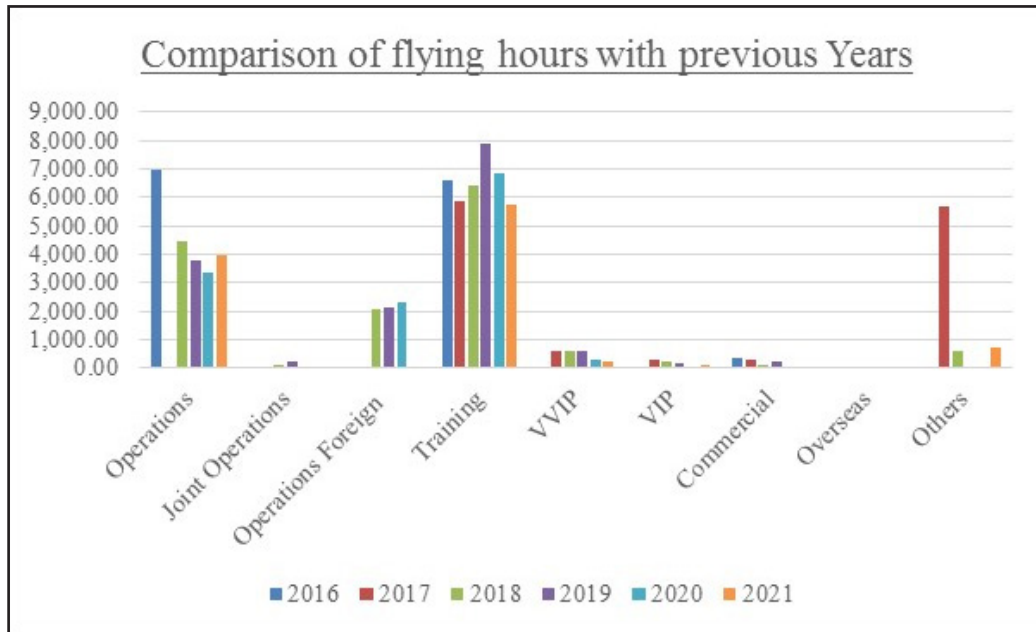

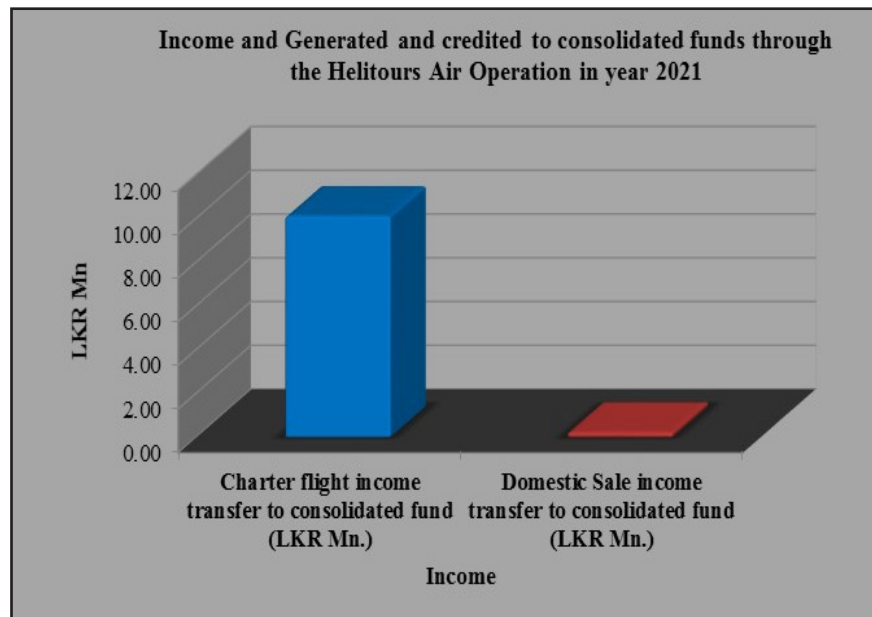

c. Directorate of Aeronautical Engineering

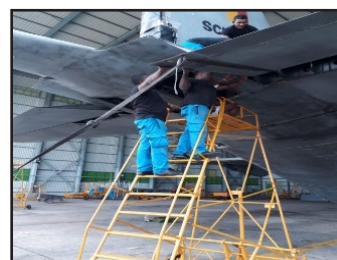

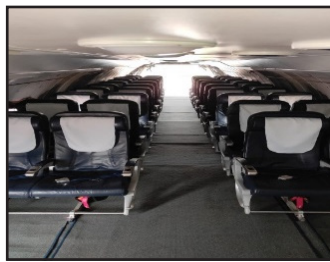

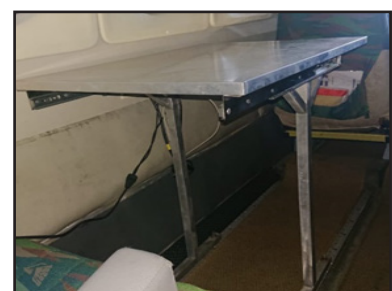

### 3.4 Summary Analysis of Financial Condition

#### a. Financial Review

The SLAF has initially received budgeted provision LKR Mn. 51,604.59 for total Defence Expenditure for the year 2021. There were LKR Mn. 5,536.26 supplementary provisions granted during the year for additional cost of operation. Hence, the total net provision remained as LKR Mn 57,140.85 in the year 2021. The actual total Defence expenditure for the year was LKR Mn 41,737.47 which represents LKR Mn 35,630.58 of recurrent expenditure and LKR Mn. 6,106.89 of capital expenditure. However, the total net provision has increased by 29.17% whereas the actual expenditure has increased by 2.86% compared to the year 2020. However, Overall Defence expenditure in 2021 remained within the total provision voted by Parliament and the Control totals set by the Ministry of Finance and Planning of Sri Lanka.

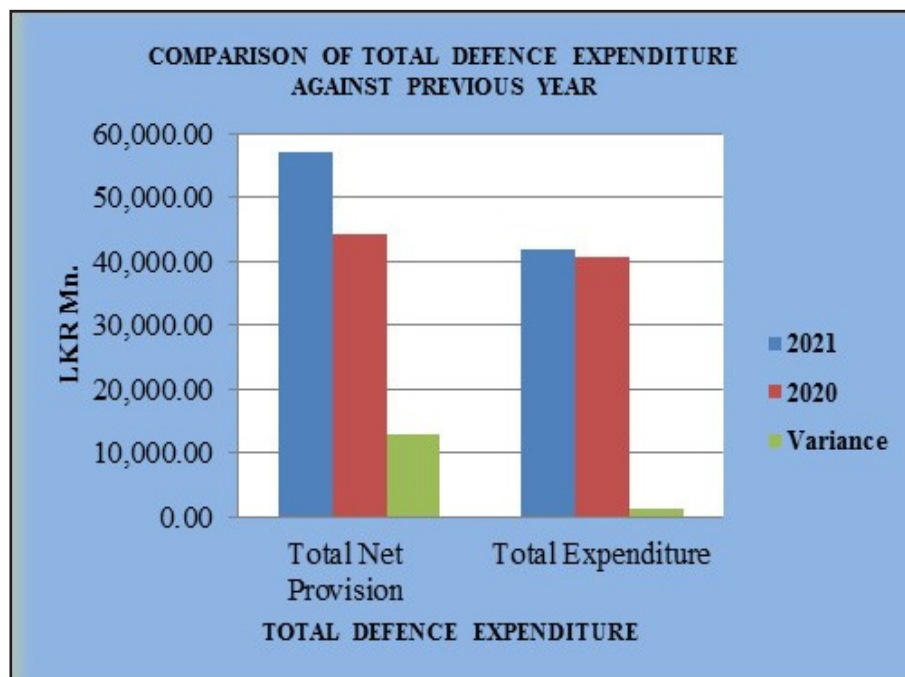

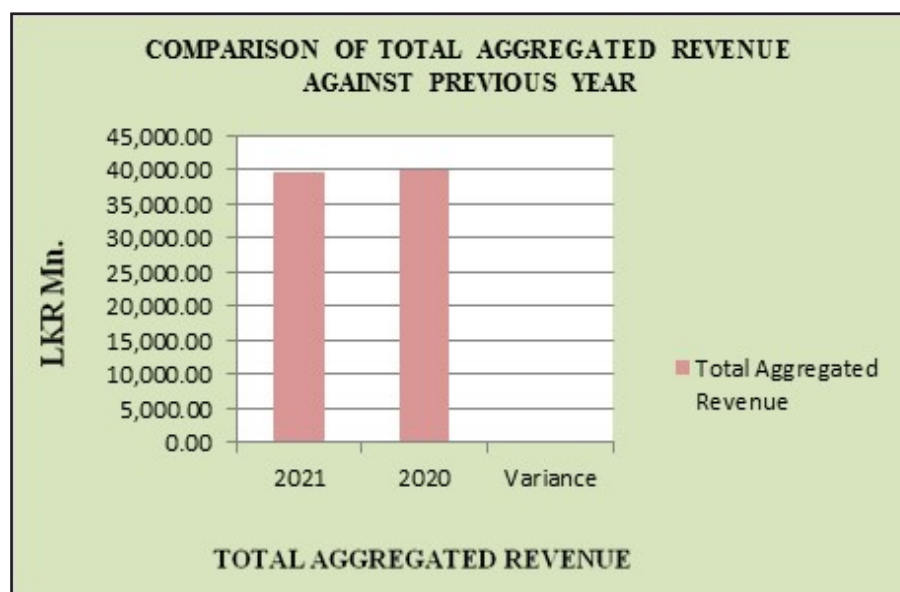

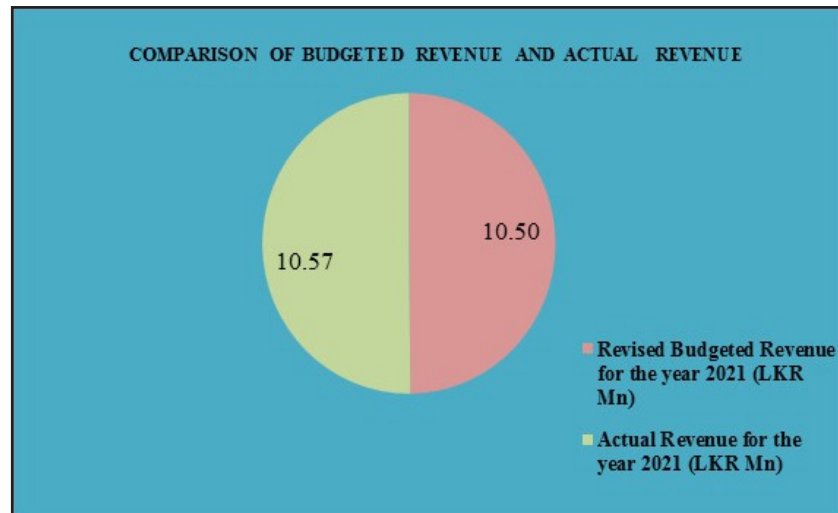

(2) Non-Revenue Receipts

(3) Expenditure of SLAF

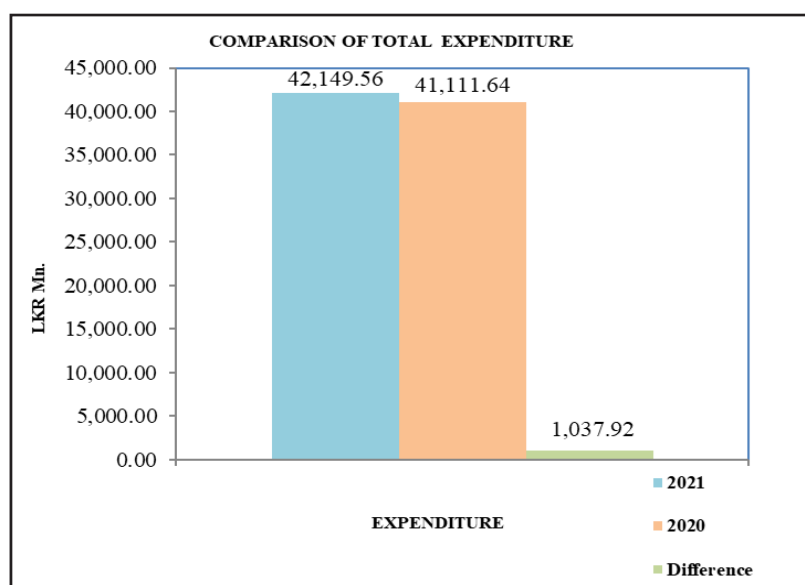

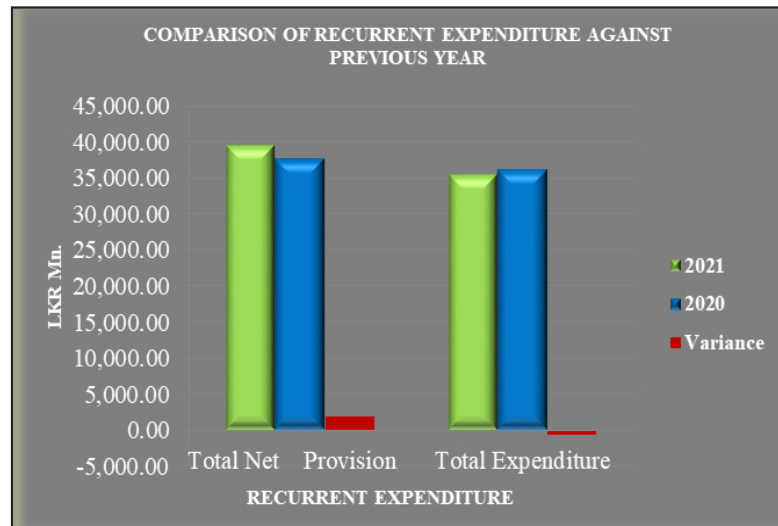

(5) Capital Expenditure

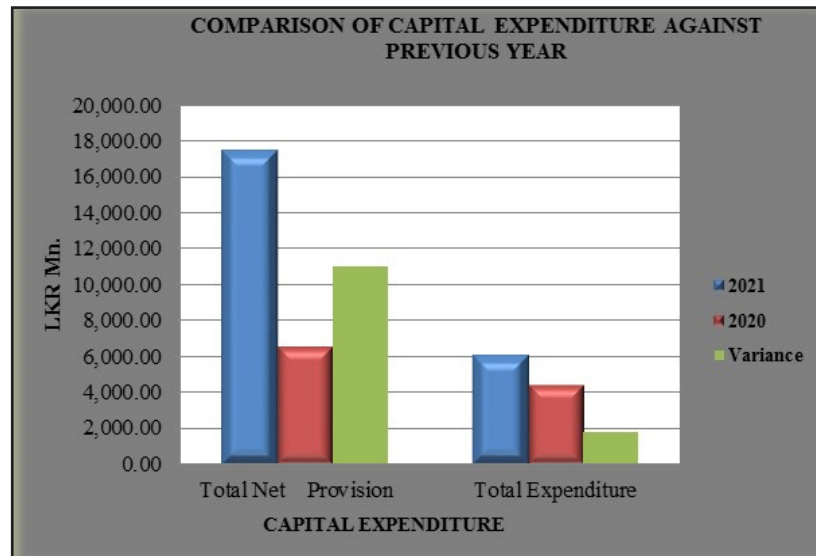
(a) The Sri Lanka Air Force has received provision for the total capital expenditure of LKR Mn. 11,656.49 with a view to provide the necessary infrastructure facilities, acquisition of capital assets, capacity building of servicemen and civil employees. There were LKR Mn. 5,516.26 supplementary provisions granted and transfer LKR Mn. 350.00 as per the FR 66 and FR 69. The total capital grant approved by the treasury was LKR Mn. 17,522.75. The total net provision for the year 2021 has increased by 170% as compared to the year 2020. Accordingly, the revised capital provision for 2021 was as follows.

(b) Further, the actual expenditure of the year 2021 was LKR Mn. 6,106.89 which has resulted in 40% increase compared to the year 2020.

(c) **Rehabilitation & Improvement of Capital Assets**

The SLAF initially forecasted LKR Mn. 3,887.00 for the Rehabilitation & Improvement of Capital Assets during the year with the view of maintenance of viable asset base and its smooth operation. There were LKR Mn. 3,196.26 supplementary provisions granted and no transfer as per the FR 66 and FR 69. The actual expenditure of the year 2021 was LKR Mn. 4,154.97.

(d) **Acquisition of Capital Assets**

The Sri Lanka Air Force initial provision was to acquire fixed assets amounting to LKR Mn. 6,174.49 mainly to provide, vehicles, furniture and office equipment, plant, machinery and equipment, building and structures. The treasury approved an initial allocation of LKR Mn. 6,174.49 for acquisition of capital assets. There were LKR Mn. 2,175.00 supplementary provisions granted and transfer LKR Mn. 350.00 as per the FR 66 and FR 69 resulting net allocation of LKR Mn. 8,699.49. The actual expenditure for the year 2021 was LKR Mn. 1,265.63.

(e) Capacity Building

Under the capital expenditure, Sri Lanka Air Force has originally forecasted LKR Mn. 570.00 for capacity building. The actual expenditure for the year 2021 was LKR Mn. 279.41.

(f) Other Capital Expenditure

Under the capital expenditure, Sri Lanka Air Force has incurred an amount of LKR Mn. 406.89 as other capital expenditure against the total net provision of LKR Mn. 1,170.00.

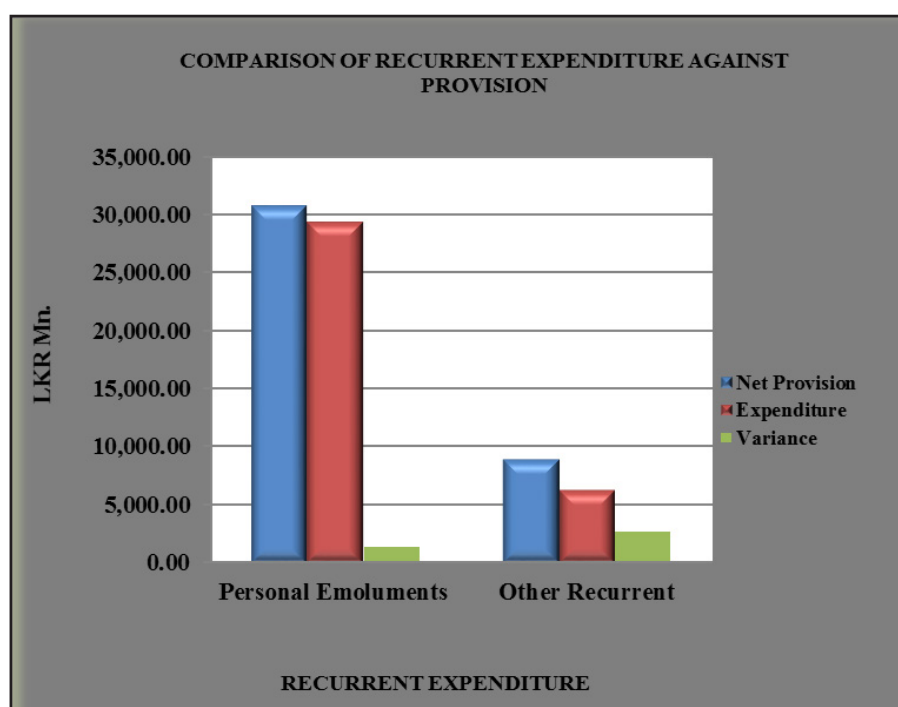

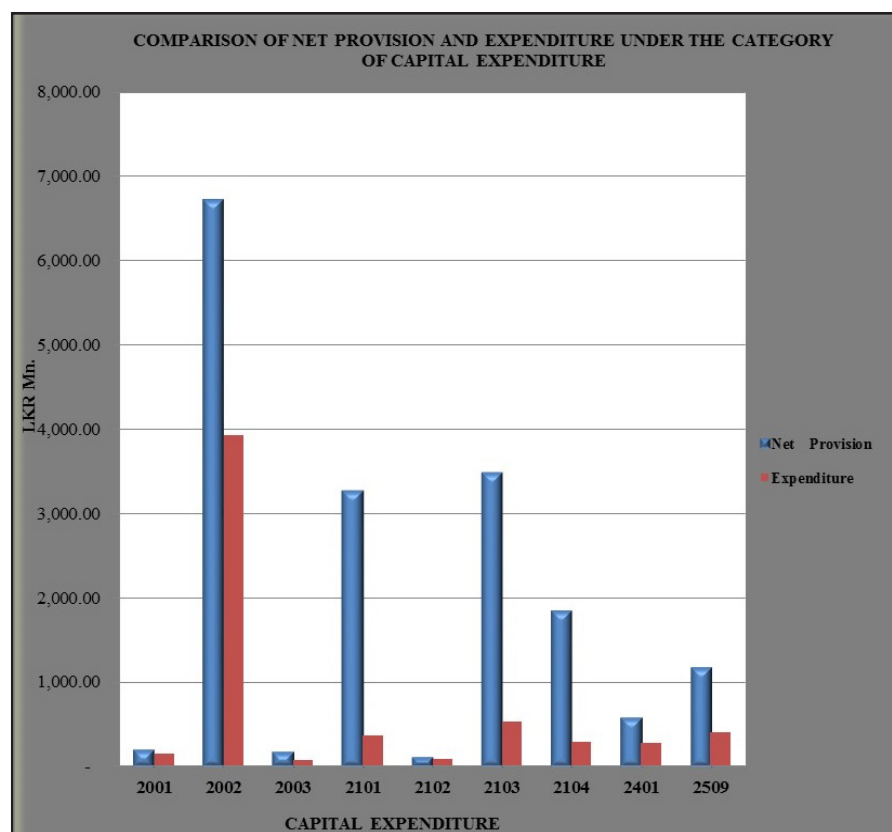

### **3.10 Auditor General's Report**

#### **The Summary Report of Auditor General in accordance with Section 11 (1) of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018 regarding the Financial Reports of Sri Lanka Air Force for the period ended 31st December 2021**

##### **1. Financial Statements**

##### **1.1 Qualified Opinion**

The audit of Financial Statement of Sri Lanka Air Force for the period ended from 31st December 2021 comprising the Statement of Financial Position as at 31st Dec 2021, the Statement of Financial Performance for the period then ended and the Statement of Cash Flows has been carried out under my directions in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka which should be read in conjunction with the provisions of the National Audit Act, No19 of 2018. This report includes my comments and observations with regard to these Financial Statements submitted to Sri Lanka Air Force in compliance with section 11(1) of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018. In terms of Article 154 (6) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka which should be read in conjunction with the section 10 of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018, the Auditor General's report will be submitted to the Parliament in due course.

In my opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of Financial Position of Sri Lanka Air Force as at 31st December 2021 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the period then ended in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles, excluding the impact of facts mentioned in Para 1.6 of this report.

##### **1.2 Basis for the Qualified Opinion**

I carried out the audit in pursuance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAS) My responsibility in relation to Financial Statements is further described in the section of Auditor's Responsibility in this report. I believe the audit evidences that I have obtained are sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

##### **1.3 The responsibility of the Chief Accounting Officer and the Accounting Officer in relation to Financial Statements**

In compliance with generally accepted accounting principles and as per the provisions made under section 38 of National Audit Act, No19 of 2018, it is the responsibility of the Accounting Officer to ensure effective internal control which requires to enable the preparation of Financial Statements as reflecting a true and fair view and the preparation of Financial Statements free from material misstatements whether due to fraud and errors. As per section No 16 (1) of National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018, and Sri Lanka Air Force shall properly maintain books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared.

As per subsection 38 (1) (c ), the Accounting Officer shall ensure that an effective internal control system is being carried out for the financial control of Sri Lanka Air Force and shall carry out periodic reviews to monitor the effectiveness of the system and accordingly shall make any alternations as required for the system to be effectively carried out.

#### **1.4 Auditor’s responsibility for the audit of Financial Statements**

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud and error, and to issue an auditor’s report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud and error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercised professional judgment and maintained professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement is higher than for one resulting from fraud, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, or the override of internal control.
- Obtained an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but No purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal control.
- Evaluating the fair and appropriate presentation of transactions and events underlying the structure and the content of Financial Statements, that included disclosures.
- Fair and appropriate presentation of transactions and events underlying the presentation, structure and content of the financial statements as a whole, had been evaluated.

The Accounting Officer had been informed regarding the significant findings, main internal control defects and other findings identified by my audit.

#### **1.5 Report on other legal requirements**

As required by section 6 (d) of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018, I state the following.

- a. Financial Statements were consistent with last year,
- b. Following recommendations given by me in relation to financial statements of previous year had not been implemented.

## **1.6 Comments on Financial Statements**

### **1.6.1 Statement of Financial Performance**

#### **1.6.1.1 Revenue Receipts**

Following observations are made in this regard.

(a) Omissions

A total of Rs. 3,301,895 from 06 receipts relevant to hire charges of aero planes earned during the reviewed year had not been accounted.

(b) Understate

Though the total income earned as hire charges of aero planes for revenue code 20.03.02.16 was Rs.13, 402,123 as per the records of Helitours that had been accounted as Rs.10, 574,308 in Annual Financial Statement (ACA-F form). Accordingly a total of Rs. 2,827,815 had not been accounted for revenue during the reviewed year.

(c) Other Observations

(i) Though the Revenue Accounting Officer should take special provisions as per 128(2) e of Financial Regulations in collecting arrears of revenue which should be received to the Government without any delay, total of Hire Charges revenue of the Aero planes of Sri Lanka Air Force that had been in arrears was Rs. 12, 674,073 at the end of reviewed year from 10 State Institutions and 02 Private Institutions with a delay of a period ranging 3 to 18 years.

(ii) However, in spite of the secretary to the Ministry of finance had been ordered at the committee meeting for Public Finance which was held on 21st June,2018 to call upon relevant secretaries and take measures to recover the dues for Sri Lanka Air Force, and unrecoverable arrears of Government revenue cannot be considered as losses and damages as per 102(2) d of Financial Regulations and for waiving off the charges due to Government , empowered officer should be satisfied that the amount due is irrecoverable and cannot as per no.113 of Financial Regulations , but against all those terms, measures had been initiated to waive off Rs.5,875,298 out of releveant amount of arrears considering that amount as a loss to the Government. Accordingly, preliminary reports had been prepared under FR104 (3) which is bearing no. SLAF/R.603/22665/P dated 05th January 2022 for losses.

## 1.6.2 Statement on Financial Situation

### 1.6.2.1 Non Financial Assets

Following observations are made in this regard

(a) Although expenditure for acquisition of capital assets included in capital expenditure as per Financial Performance Statement of the year under review was RS. 1,265,628,114 , that amount had been mentioned as , Rs. 935,582,119 as expenditure for acquisition of Non Financial Assets in the year in ACA 6 form. Accordingly, purchasing and acquisition of Non Financial Assets amounting Rs.330, 045,995 had not been recorded in the above Statement

(b) The balance of Rs. 929,278,775 which was for unfinished work as at 31st December 2020 as per ACA 6 form had not been brought forward as the opening balance of the reviewed year.

(c) Though original cost deductions applicable for updated valuation of lands should be expurgated through “transfers”, total of Rs. 329,000,000 had been recorded in ACA 6 form as disposal. Accordingly, a culpable disclose as disposal of land had been revealed through the form.

(d) Although, the original cost of Rs. 20,594,200 for 08 buildings which were demolished a at the end of reviewed year should be expunged from the balance of buildings in ACA 6 form, that had been included in buildings final balance existed as at 31st December, 2021. Accordingly, assets which do not physically exist had been revealed through ACA 6 form.

(e) If there is no fraud or defect in the existing procedure as per 108(i) d(ii) of Financial Regulations, power has been vested to Chief Accounting Officer with regard to damages with a value of not more than Rs. 1000,000 and at the instances when the Chief Accounting Officer does not have authority as per F.R.108(3), those damages should be reported to Treasury and should obtain orders to take measures with regard to existing damages. However, during the years 2018/2019/2020 without obtaining the authority which should be obtained for 08 buildings with a total cost of Rs20, 594,200 had been demolished against those terms.

#### **1.6.2.2. Non Availability of Evidence for Auditing**

Following observation is made in this regard.

(a) A register had not been maintained for recording loan balances of personnel who had transferred out , who had transferred in, deceased, retired and had vacated their posts. Accordingly, it was unable to corroborate arrears of loan balances amounting Rs. 9,707,517 which had been existed for more than 05 years through audit.

## **2. Financial Review**

### **2.1 Revenue Management**

(a) Though the Accounting Officers should take measures to prepare Revenue Estimates in a proper and accurate manner when preparing Revenue Estimates as per 85(1) (c) of Financial Regulations, Revenue Estimates under revenue code no. 20-03-02-16 for Hire Charges revenue of the aero planes in reviewed year as well as during past 05 years period had been abated and revised from a 33 percent to 91 percent, when preparing Revenue Estimates. It has been observed that, abatements of estimates in the reviewed year were 91 percent when compared with past 05 years.

(b) As per revenue code no. 20-03-02-16 - Earning of Hire Charges revenue of the aero planes, there was an adverse condition of gradual decline in net annual earnings of Sri Lanka Air Force from 2016 to the year under review. That had been varied with adverse abatement as 24 % to 94 % when compared with 2016.



## 2.2 Expenditure Management

Following observations are made in this regard.

(a) Accounting Officers should take measures to prepare Estimates completely and accurately as possible when preparing Estimates as per 50(ii) of Financial Regulations. However, due to not following those it had been required to obtain additional allocations through supplementary estimates and had to get transfers of allocations under FR 66 and FR 69. Accordingly, original estimated limit of 2 recurrent object classes and 4 capital object classes had get increased from 3.9 percent to 140 that is Rs. 7,000,000 to Rs. 3,196,256,600 through supplementary estimates.

(b) Transfers under FR 66/69 had done for 6 object classes from Rs. 4,000,000 to 363,000,000 that is within a range of 4.9 percent to 39.

(c) As per FR 74 when applying for supplementary provision the Head of the Department shall submit a report indicating the nature and extent of the service, the total cost thereof, and the amount of additional financial provision required after identifying them as well as the amount of provisions necessary for further expenditure on the same service during the rest of the financial year should be obtained as per 78(3) e (ii) of Financial Regulations. However, as measures were taken against those terms and due to requesting supplementary provisions without identifying them accurately, 02 supplementary provisions amounting Rs. 3,820, 256,600 had been cancelled and had obtained supplementary provisions amounting total value of Rs.1,810,256,600 at the end of the reviewed year, that is at 30 th December 2021. Therefore, supplementary provisions amounting Rs.2, 010,000,000 had been adversely abated as at the end of year under review.

(d) Action Plan and a Procurement Plan should be prepared according to the annual Estimate and those plans should be implemented after requesting the Imprest accordingly. However, due to not utilizing the provision received for objective tasks Rs.9,940,088,786 that is 49 percent out of total provision of Rs.20,488,316,600 had been utilized for 10 capital object classes and 07 recurrent object classes out of 17 object classes.

(e) Total provision of Rs. 3,705, 500, 000 for 06 capital object classes had been remained 100 percent without utilizing. Out of that provision of Rs. 1,231, 500, 000 for 04 object classes was obtained through Annual Estimate while provision of Rs. 2,474,000,000 for 02 object classes was obtained through supplementary provision.

## 2.3 Certifications to be done by Accounting Officers

Although certifications should be done regarding the following facts by Accounting Officers as per the provisions made under section 38 of National Audit Act, No19 of 2018, measures had not been taken in that regard.

The Chief Accounting Officer and the Accounting Officer shall ensure that an effective internal control system is being carried out for the financial control of Sri Lanka Air Force and shall carry out periodic reviews to monitor the effectiveness of the system and accordingly shall make any alternations as required for the system to be effectively carried out. Those reviews should be done in writing and forward to Auditor General, but statements for carrying out such a review had not been provided for the audit.

## 2.4 Non Compliance with Legal Regulations

## 2.4 Issuing and Settling Advances

Following observations are made in this regard.

- (a) There was an arrears of loan balance amounting Rs. 15,738,441 in Public Officers' Advance 'B' account as at 31st December, 2021 and 96 percent out of total amount of arrears of loan balances that is Rs.15, 048,421 was due from civil personnel.
- (b) Though measures should be taken to recover balances of advances to be recovered from officers who had vacated their posts from guarantors or heirs in terms of section 4 of chapter xxiv of Establishment Code, without following those terms balances of loans amounting Rs. 15,738,441 to be recovered from civil personnel who had deceased/retired/vacated their posts had been recorded as outstanding loan balances and out of that amount existed for more than 05 years was Rs.9,717,517.

## 2.5 Operating Bank Accounts

When scrutinizing bank statements as at 31st December 2021 there were unidentified deposits amounting a total of Rs.281,561,099(US\$1,393,866.83) for 05 instances in Foreign currency account of Bank of Ceylon and out of that deposit of Rs.53,418,900 (US\$264,450)had not been identified even as at 25th March 2022.

## 3. Operational Review

### 3.1 Procurements

Following observations are made in this regard.

(a) For providing hotel accommodations to local/foreign officers for 70th anniversary of Sri Lanka Air Force, Rs. 5,256,426 had paid from SLAF Command Welfare Fund and later that was reimbursed from LAF head. However this service supply had made without following the tender procedure. Therefore, it was unable to verify through audit that whether service had been gained at a minimum cost as per 1.2.1(a) of Procurement guide Line.

(b) Although, revision of Total Cost Estimate should be approved by the authority as per 4.3.3 of Code of Government Procurement Guidelines, due to not preparing original cost estimate amounting Rs.900,000 when purchasing a Diathermy machine worth Rs. 1,125,000 for Guwanpura hospital on 20th July, the amount was revised as Rs.1,125,000 only with the approval of the president of procurement committee without not getting the approval of committee members.

(c) From 2004 to 2014 in 64 parts of aeroplanes had been sent overseas in 37 occasion for repairing and paid value of US\$ 53600, US\$ 130,525.28, US\$ 91,821.80 respectively with total value of Rs.153,183,110.16 (US\$ 758,347.08)as new purchase value/repair value/debris value and 07 aeroplane parts of which value had not been mentioned and those spare parts of aircrafts had not been returned to Sri Lanka Air Force for a period ranging 07 year to 17 years but, follow up action had not been taken in that regard.

### 3.2 Assets Management

Following observations are made in this regard.

(a) Fuel dispensing pump machine which was purchased on 22nd September 2002 for Rs.500, 000 by stores section of Air Force Base camp Katunayaka, had been kept in the stores without using nearly 05 years. The warranty period of said machine was also expired on 22nd September 2008 that is after 02 years from the date of purchase.

(b) Although, the vehicles identified to be disposed should be disposed year by year as per the provisions of chapter 12 of Public Finance circular bearing no.02/205 dated 15th July, against those terms there were 61 vehicles at Vehicles Repair and Disposal unit of Air Force Base Katunayaka had not been disposed with a delay of 06 years.

(c) There were 37 officers's quarters under Air Force Base Katunayake were in Dilapidated and uninhabitable condition for a period of 02 months to 11 years. Accordingly, due to dilapidation of officers's quarters there was a loss of Rs. 5,718,900 to the Government as house rent due to not providing those houses repaired while there were 102 officers at the waiting list.

### **3.3 Bonds and Liabilities**

Following observations are made in this regard.

(a) Although the maximum limit of liabilities that can be reached for object class no. 224-1-3-1205 was Rs. 135,240,833 as per F.R.94(2) according to the statement of liabilities provided by no.(iv) of Financial Statement, the value of Bonds and Liabilities of that was Rs.393,875,916. Accordingly, reached to Bonds and Liabilities exceeding maximum limit of liabilities by Rs.258,635,033.

(b) Out of the contracture value of US \$49,570,057 which is for the agreement of Defence Secretary with the foreign institution named Israel Aerospace Industries Ltd., Signed on 02nd May, 2021 for repairing 05 Kafirs payment had been made for US \$ 7,435,508 that is Rs.1,509,408,124 in the year under review and the balance liability of US \$ 42,134,549 as at 31st December, 2021 that is Rs. 8,511,178,898 (value for that date) was not include in the Statement of Bonds and Liabilities.

### **3.4 Losses and Damages**

Following observations are made in this regard.

(a) Although losses and damages to be recovered or to be written off should be revealed through Statement on Losses and Waiving off (Losses under F.R.106/113) of Annual Financial Statement to be submitted as per note (i) of no.06 in State Accounts Guidelines no.2021/03 of Director General of State Accounts dated 26th November and against that term, total of Rs. 386,194,141 related to 154 incidents to be recovered or to be written off which were born due to operational activities of Sri Lanka Air Force as at 31st December 2021 of the reviewed year had not been recorded in Annual Financial Statement.

(b) Losses and writing off worth Rs. 105,255,389.93 bearing no.MI-17(SMH-4415) under Damages and Losses (ii) for which approval had been granted by the Secretary to General Treasury under F.R.109 on 21st October, 2022 had not been recorded in the statement of Writings off under F. R. 109.

### **3.5 Non Economic Transactions**

It is revealed that tires and tubes purchased from 1999 to 2014 are remained with a delay of 7 to 22 years in stores as Sri Lanka Air Force presently does not have vehicles using unit 198 tires that had been purchased as well as purchasing tires unnecessarily, exceeding the limit without conducting a proper study.

### 3.6 Management deficiencies

Following observations are made in this regard.

(a) When comparing physical balance of 04 items of fuel on 06th December 2021 in Fuel unit of Sri Lanka Air Force Base, Katunayaka with the balance in computer software system (EPASS) to that date, the stock balance had been overstated adversely for 222944 litres worth total value of Rs.29,451,200 that is 48 percent to 1137 percent due to not entering fuel stocks which are issued for credit to computer system.

(b) Accounting Officer should take measures to ascertain fees to be received to the Government accurately and recover them completely as per F.R.128(1)(b). However, against those terms, when renting out 11 Government buildings at Air Force Base Katunayaka, to external parties and, though chief valuer of Government had valued the monthly rental with regard to 11 buildings, due to taking measures for crediting part of contractual value as Government revenue and the rest as Non Public Fund as per the instructions issued by the letter bearing no. SLAF/236/Accounts and dated 06th June 2018 of Deputy Administrative Director (Accounts) of the Board of Administrative Directors, which was addressed to Commanding Officer, the Government had lost total revenue of Rs. 11,333,650 during January to December, 2021. According to details mentioned above, there was a loss of Rs.263,000 to the Government in relation to 04 buildings at Air Force camp, Colombo due to not crediting total contractual value based on assessed revenue on rent in 2021.

(c) It is mentioned that the validity period of valuation report of Chief Valuer of the Government Department of Valuation bearing No. CM/CMC/RP/666,668,669 dated 10th June, 2016 with regard to rent out buildings at Colombo station of Sri Lanka Air Force for external parties will expire after 3 years and accordingly, without carrying out another valuation on building rent after 10th June, 2016 with a delay of 06 years, rent had been charged for those buildings.

(d) As per Government valuation in relation for renting out restaurant building of Sri Lanka Air Force headquarters while the market price of the rent had been valued to Rs. 115,000, there was a loss of revenue amounting Rs.1, 200,000 to the Government in 2021, because the contract had signed as monthly Rs. 7500 for Government Fund and Rs.7500 for Non Public Fund and therefore credited less amount worth Rs.100, 000 disadvantageously to the Government.

#### **4. Human Resources Management**

##### **4.1 Expenditure for the Strength, Actual Cadre and Personal Emoluments**

Approved cadre for commissioned officers at the end of reviewed year was 2557 and there were 316 vacancies. Approved cadre for Non - Commissioned officers (Other Ranks) was 34,381 and out of that there were 3829 vacancies. Maximum number of vacancies that were 2602 for the ranks of Leading Air Craftman and Air Craftman from other ranks.

## 8. AUDIT AND MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

### a. Audit Committee and Management committee Charter

The Terms of Reference of the Audit Committee and Management Committee are governed by the Audit Committee and management committee circular issued by the Department of Management Audit at Ministry of Finance and Planning on 9th July 2009 and subsequent circular issued on 12th January 2019. The Committee also ensures that the scope and coverage of its functions addresses the requirements laid down in above circular in respect of Government Department.

### b. Principal Focus

The Audit Committee could focus personal attention to efficient operation of the committee and the risk areas of financial discipline reported by the Auditor General and the internal Auditors and immediate remedial action could be taken.

### c. Medium of Reporting

The proceedings of the Audit and Management Committee meetings are tabled at the meetings of the Board, where all key issues, concerns, actions taken, outcomes achieved or pending, and follow-up initiated, are clarified, discussed and Board approval obtained.

### d. Composition

(1) Meeting of the Audit and Management Committee of the Sri Lanka Air Force is held quarterly as per the laid down instructions given in the respective treasury circular. The composition of Audit and Management Committee is as follows,

e. **Secretary to the Audit Committee**

The joint secretary (Joint Convener) to committee acts as Command Internal Auditor (Service) and Chief Internal Auditor (Civil), who are Chartered Public Finance Accountant and Class I Government Accountant, functions as the joint secretary (Joint Convener) to the Committee.

f. **Internal Audit**

Reviewed the independence, objectivity, and performance of the internal audit function as well as the adequacy of the Department's resources,

- (1) Reviewed the Internal Audit Policy and circular which are issued by the Ministry of Finance and planning on Public Finance Management and the audits carried out based on the policy and circular instructions.
- (2) Reviewed the effectiveness of the implementation of the Internal Audit Plan year 2021.
- (3) Reviewed significant internal audit findings and management's responses thereto, with a view to taking timely corrective action.
- (4) Evaluated the performance of the Command Internal Auditor (Service) and Chief Internal Auditor (Civil) and reviewed the evaluation of the senior audit staff of the Internal Audit Division.
- (5) Reviewed training and development needs and requirements for specialized training of the Internal Audit Division and the need for capacity building with special emphasis on investigation staff.

g. External Audit

The external audit is carried out by the Auditor General in terms of the Constitution of the Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka. The Committee;

- (1) Reviewed and followed up on audit issues identified by the Auditor General, pertaining to the audit for the year 2021.
- (2) Reviewed the Report of the Auditor General to the Parliament of Sri Lanka on the accounts of the Sri Lanka Air Force for the year ended 31st December 2021, the Management Letter, and the management's responses thereto and followed up on corrective measures taken by the Sri Lanka Air Force.
- (3) Reviewed and discussed the key reports from the Auditor General's Department and action was initiated where deemed necessary.
- (4) Audit Plan of 2021 submitted by Command Internal Auditor (Service) and the Chief Internal Auditor (Civil) for the audit of the Financial Statements of Sri Lanka Air Force and its Sub imprest which were held at Bases and Stations level for the year ended from 31 December 2021.
- (5) Timely submission of required information.
- (6) Feedback from the management on the effectiveness of the audit processes relevant to their operational areas.

h. Special Initiatives

Guided the office of the Command Internal Auditor (Service) and Chief Internal Auditor (Civil) to train operational staff of the Sri Lanka Air Force on the importance of the Internal Controls to prevent and pre-empt frauds.

j. Governance

The Committee, on an ongoing basis, reviewed the manner in which it implemented good governance practices with particular reference to the respective Government Circulars.



## 9. CONCLUSION

Overall, performance of the Sri Lanka Air Force during the year 2021 has acquired a greater success with facing challenges of COVID -19 pandemic.
