


PROTECTOR.

Application filed July 26, 1922. Serial No. 577,654.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, James M. Walters, a citizen of the United States, residing at Los Angeles, in the county of Los Angeles 5 and State of California, have invented a new and useful Protector, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to merchandise protectors particularly designed for use by win-

10 dow dressers.

The object of the invention is to provide a simple and cheap device of this character which may be quickly slipped on over the shoes and retained in position without 15 requiring the use of laces or like tedious time consuming fastening means, and which will effectively protect fine materials, floor coverings and the like from contact with the

With the foregoing and other objects in view which will appear as the description proceeds, the invention resides in the combination and arrangement of parts and in the details of construction hereinafter de-25 scribed and claimed, it being understood that changes in the precise embodiment of the invention herein disclosed may be made within the scope of what is claimed without departing from the spirit of the invention. In the accompanying drawings:

Figure 1 represents a side elevation partly in perspective, of the device constituting this invention with parts broken out to show the interior construction, the protector having the opening through which the foot is inserted arranged in stretched open posi-

tion ready for use.

Fig. 2 is a similar view showing the opening in contracted position, and

Fig. 3 is a detail sectional view taken on

the line 3-3 of Fig. 1.

In the embodiment illustrated, the device constituting this invention is preferably constructed of fleece lined jersey cloth which 45 while affording ample thickness to protect adjacent objects from contact with the shoe over which the device is worn, yet has sufficient yieldability to permit its ready application and removal, but other suitable 50 material may be used, if desired.

of a slumber sock, the foot portion 2 of which is designed to encase the wearer's shoe and which has an opening or mouth 3 for the insertion of the foot, said opening 55 being preferably provided with a casing 4 extending peripherally therearound and in which is located an elastic tape 5, the ends of which are united in a manner similar to a round garter, and which is of a size suf- 60 ficient to snugly fit the ankle of the wearer when in use.

This protector 1 as shown has reinforcing members 6 and 7 located on the inner face thereof at the heel and toe respectively to 65 prevent the sole and heel of the shoe from

puncturing the fabric.

Snap fasteners 8 are arranged at the mouth of the protector, the cooperating members of which are disposed at opposite sides of 70 said mouth as shown clearly in Figs. 1 and 2 and are designed for use when the protector is worn by persons having small feet.

The cooperating members of the fasteners are connected after the protector is applied 78 and in connection with the elastic tape 5 holds said protector securely in position on the foot so that the user may walk around without danger of the device working off as would occur with the ordinary sock used so without having the fasteners and tape.

The size of the mouth 3 of the protector is much larger than that of an ordinary stocking or sock to provide for the insertion of the foot of the wearer with the shoe ap- 85

plied.

From the above description it will be obvious that these protectors may be quickly slipped on or off over the wearer's ordinary shoes so that little time is consumed in mak- 90 ing the change and yet when applied they will completely encompass the portion of the foot below the ankle so that all possibility of contact of the shoes with adjacent objects is prevented.

I claim:

A shoe cover composed of thick yieldable soft fabric made in the form of a slumber sock with a mouth for the insertion of the shoe of the wearer, an endless elastic band 100 encircling said mouth and of a size to snugly This protector 1 may be made in the form fit the ankle of the wearer, reinforcing mem-

bers located on the inner face of said cover at the heel and toe, and snap fasteners, the cooperating members of which are located on the opposite faces of said mouth at points

5 spaced from the front and rear thereof to vary the size of the mouth to fit feet of different sizes.
