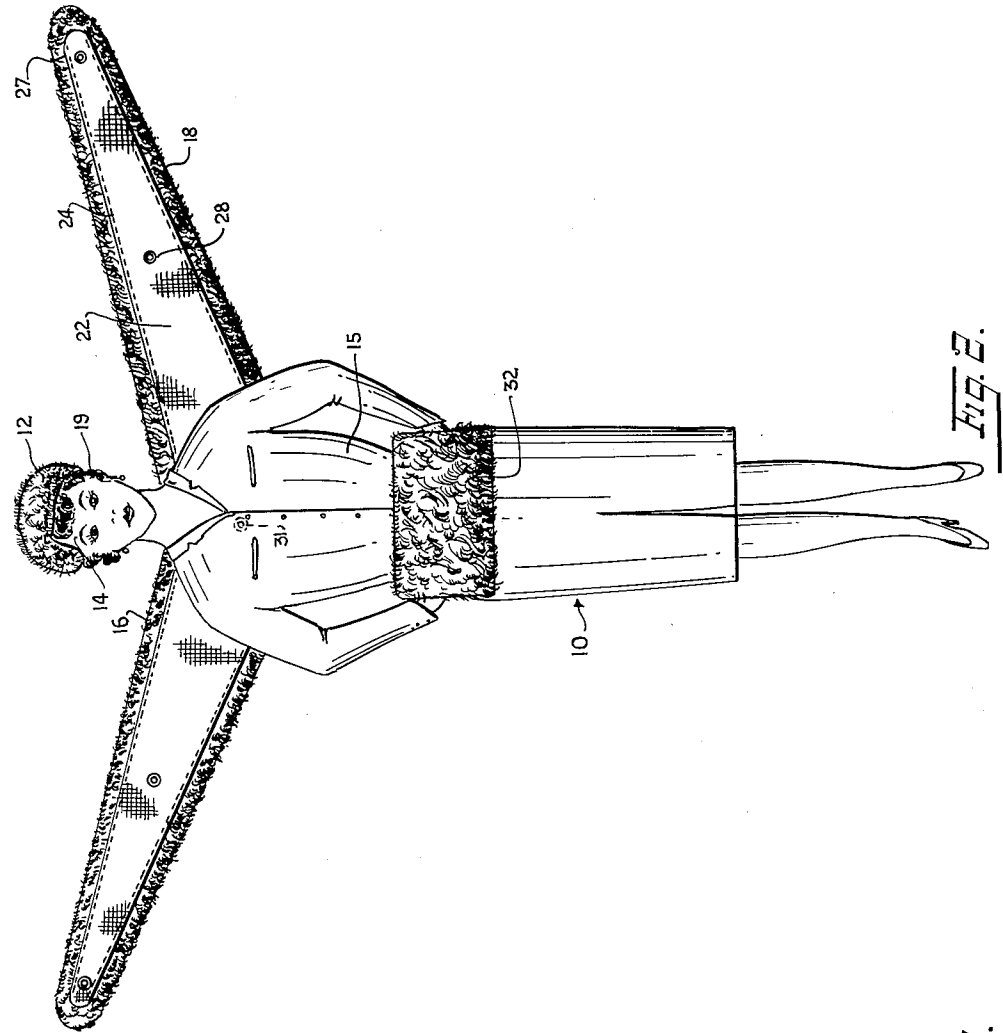

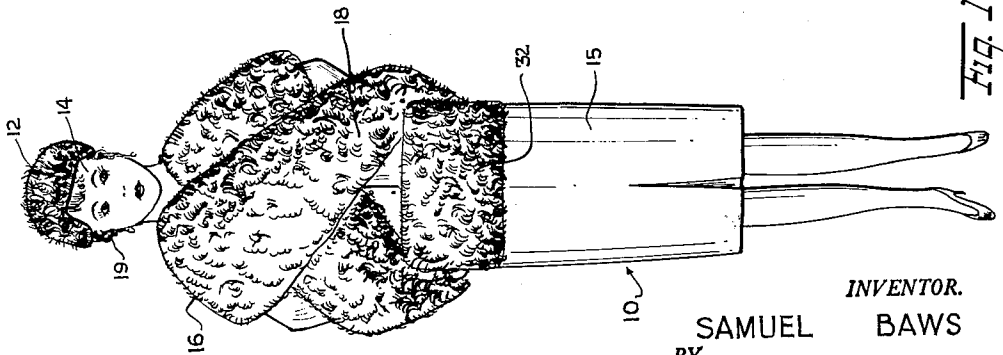

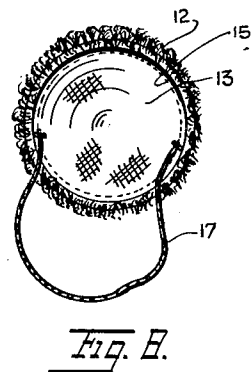
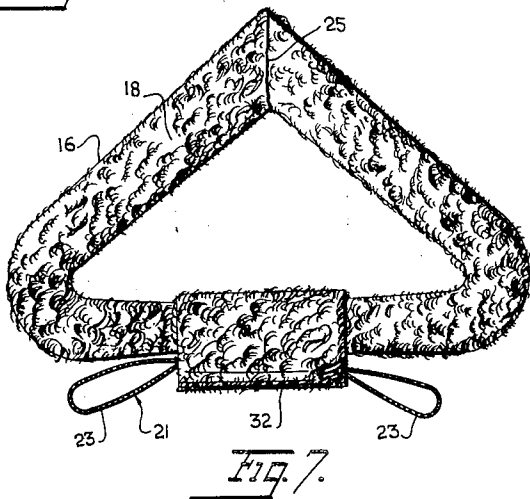
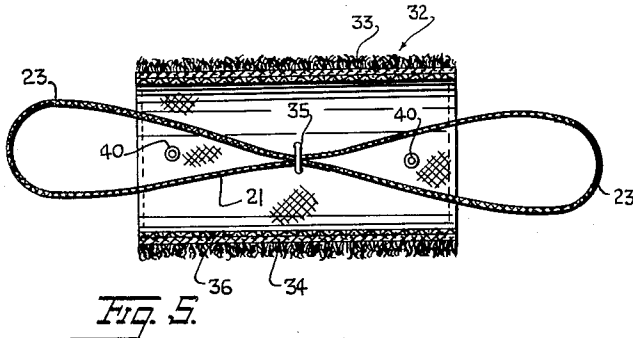
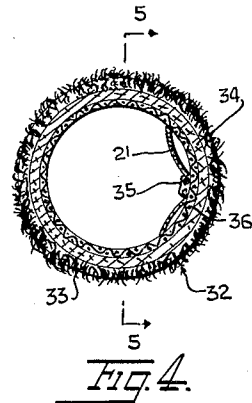
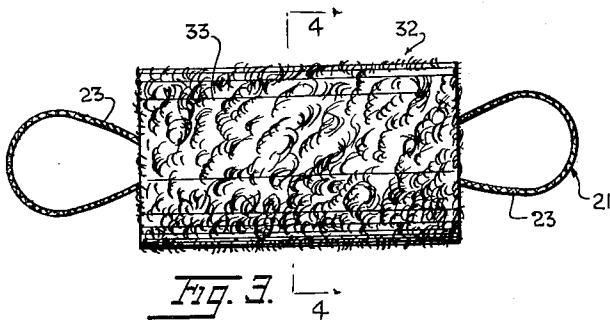
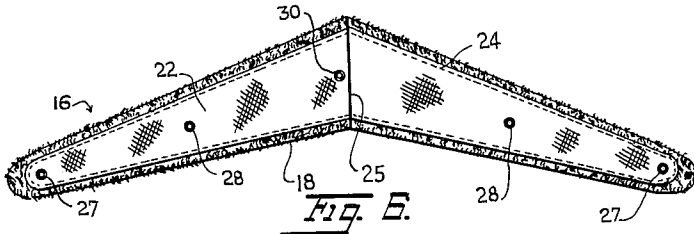

**FUR APPAREL FOR DOLLS**

This invention relates to the art of doll clothes and more particularly concerns fur garments for dolls.

According to the invention there is provided a hat, muff and stole made of natural animal fur adapted for wear by a doll. The fur garments may be attached to the doll by quick detachable fasteners, in various positions.

It is therefore a principal object of the invention to provide fur garments for a doll.

It is a further object to provide a natural fur hat, muff and stole for a doll, the fur garments being provided with fasteners for holding the garments in various positions.

For further comprehension of the invention, and of the objects and advantages thereof, reference will be had to the following description and accompanying drawings, and to the appended claim in which the various novel features of the invention are more particularly set forth.

In the accompanying drawings forming a material part of this disclosure:

FIGS. 1 and 2 are elevational views of a doll wearing garments according to the invention.

FIG. 3 is a front elevational view of the muff.

FIG. 4 is a sectional view taken on line 4-4 of FIG. 3.

FIG. 5 is a sectional view taken on line 5-5 of FIG. 4.

FIG. 6 is an elevational view of the stole showing the rear side thereof.

FIG. 7 is an elevational view of the stole and muff in an attached position.

FIG. 8 is an elevational view of the hat showing the inner side thereof.

Referring to FIGS. 1 and 2, there is shown a doll 10, wearing a fur hat 12 on its head 14. Around the shoulders of the doll is disposed a stole 16. This stole, as shown to best advantage in FIGS. 2, 6 and 7, includes an outer fur side 18, and a cloth lining 22 secured to the leather of the fur by stitching 24. The stole is formed of two generally triangular pieces joined at their bases along a line 25 by suitable stitching. On the lining 22 are disposed snap fasteners 27 and 28 near the apical ends of the stole. The stole may be secured to the clothing of the doll by a snap fastener 30 located near the center of the stole. A mating snap fastener 31 will be mounted on the back of the dress 15 of the doll.

The muff 32 is a generally cylindrical or tubular member having outer fur 33, leather 34 and a lining 36 secured thereto by stitching 38 as shown in FIGS. 3-5. Inside

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the muff near the ends thereof are snap fasteners 40 adapted to be engaged by fasteners 27 or 28 of the stole. The ends of the stole are thus engaged with the muff as shown in FIG. 7.

FIG. 8 shows the hat 12 provided with a lining 13 secured thereto by stitching 15. An elastic cord 17 may be attached to the hat for quickly attaching it and removing it from the doll. The cord may be engaged in and concealed by the hair 19 of the doll.

The muff may be provided with an elastic cord 21 secured by a clip 35. The loops 23 of the cord permit the muff to be attached to the arms of the doll.

The doll is thus equipped with "fashionable" fur garments which a child can easily put on the doll and remove therefrom as often as desired. Also the child can arrange the garments in various ways on the doll to obtain different ornamental effects.

It is to be understood that the said garments may be made of real or synthetic fur, or other fabric material.

While I have illustrated and described the preferred embodiment of my invention, it is to be understood that I do not limit myself to the precise construction herein disclosed and that various changes and modifications may be made within the scope of the invention as defined in the appended claim.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by United States Letters Patent is:

A garment set for a doll, comprising a tubular fur member having open ends to receive the arms of the doll, an elastic cord secured inside said member and defining loops extending outside said member for engaging said member on the arms of the doll, snap fastener elements inside said member spaced apart near opposite ends thereof, an elongated fur structure formed of two triangular sections with joined bases and outwardly extending apices, and other fastener elements at the apices of said structure detachably engaged with the snap fastener elements in said member to define a stole for encircling the body of the doll.

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
