

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BANDEAU, BRASSIÈRE, OR THE LIKE

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6 Claims. (Cl. 2-42)

This invention relates to bandeaux, brassières or the like, one of the objects being to provide a garment of this type the bust sections or cups

of which are self-adjusting.

Heretofore it has been the practice to make these garments to fit predetermined chest measurements but the bust sections or cups have been made to a standard depending upon the waist or chest measurements and while a person might-10 procure a bandeau or brassière of the proper size when measured about the waist or chest, the user was not assured of a proper fit in the bust sections or cups unless she should be of a standard size.

An object of the present invention is to so con-15 struct the bust sections or cups that they will be capable of stretching annularly, thereby to become self-adjusting to sizes which ordinarily would not be obtained in connection with the 20 standard chest or waist measurement of the purchased garment.

It is a further object to provide bust sections or cups the seams of which are stretchable transversely, thereby relieving the material from ob-25 jectionable strains at these points as well as uncomfortable and unsightly wrinkling.

With the foregoing and other objects in view which will appear as the description proceeds, the invention consists of certain novel details of 30 construction and combinations of parts hereinafter more fully described and pointed out in the claims, it being understood that changes may be made in the construction and arrangement of parts without departing from the spirit of the 35 invention as claimed.

In the accompanying drawing the preferred form of the invention has been shown.

In said drawing:

Figure 1 is a front elevation of a bandeau or 40 brassière embodying the present improvements.

Figure 2 is a front elevation of a portion thereof showing one of the sections or cups stretched at the seams.

Referring to the figures by characters of refer- $_{45}$ ence, I designates a band of any suitable material adapted to encircle and to be secured about the body and carrying bust sections or cups 2. In the present instance these sections are joined to the band i by an inserted tape 3 of elastic $_{50}$ which is stretchable transversely. This tape can extend continuously along the two sections 2 and between them, if desired.

Each of the sections or cups 2 is made up of segments indicated at 4. 5 and 8. Obviously more 55 than three segments could be used if desired. In the structure illustrated the three segments are joined together by inserted strips of tape 7 formed of elastic material stretchable transversely but not in the direction of their length and the inserted tapes extend from the center of each section 2 to the margin thereof. It is preferred to have one section extend upwardly from the center while the remaining sections diverge downwardly to the tape 3. The materials used in the formation of the segments 4, 5 and 6 are preferably non-stretchable. Crossed tapes 8 of elastic stretchable longitudinally can be interposed between and connected to the sections or cups 2 above the band I and the usual shoulder straps 9 are extended from the tops of the sec- 15 tions or cups 2 to the end portions of the band i.

It is to be understood that the garment described is to be made of standard sizes as ordinarily. However should it be necessary, in order to prevent wrinkles and to afford a proper fit, to 20 have sections or cups 2 larger than a standard size, it will be apparent that the elastic tapes 3 and 7 will stretch readily transversely, as has been shown in Figure 2 so that the sections will thus adapt themselves to the wearer and afford 25 a proper fit.

Obviously this construction will also relieve the material of strains at the seams to which it would be subjected should the elastic inserts not beemployed under the conditions stated. Further- 30 more the garment would be worn with much more comfort than otherwise would be possible.

While the elastic inserts are preferably formed of elastic fabric, it is to be understood that any suitable elastic material can be used. It is also 35 to be understood that the positions and shapes of the inserts can be varied to meet the requirements. It is merely essential that the garment be so constructed as to become self-fitting, thereby to eliminate strain upon or objectionable bind- 40 ing by the garment.

What is claimed is:

1. A garment of the class described including a body encircling portion, bust sections or cups joined thereto and each comprising non- 45 stretchable portions and elastic portions, each section or cup being stretchable at the elastic portions transversely of a plurality of lines radiating from a point adjacent to the center of the section or cup.

A garment of the class described including a body encircling portion, bust sections joined thereto each comprising non-elastic segments extending about a point adjacent to the center of the section and elastic portions interposed be- 55 tween and connecting the segments and radiating from said point, each section being stretchable at the elastic portions transversely of a plurality of lines radiating from a point adjacent to the center of the section.

A garment of the class described including a body encircling band, bust sections, an elastic connection between the sections, and means for allowing relative movement of the band and sections toward and from each other, said means including a strip of transversely stretchable elastic between and connecting the band and

sections.

A garment of the class described including as a body encircling band, separate resiliently connected bust sections thereabove, and a transversely stretchable strip of elastic secured along one edge of the band and joining the two bust sections thereto for independent resilient adjustment to the body of the wearer relative to each other and to the band.

5. A garment including connected bust sections, each comprising annularly spaced segments of non-elastic material, and transversely stretchable strips of elastic interposed between and connecting the segments for relative movenant toward and from each other.

6. A garment of the class described including cups each comprising segmental portions and elastic connections between said portions, each cup being stretchable to fit the wearer.

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
