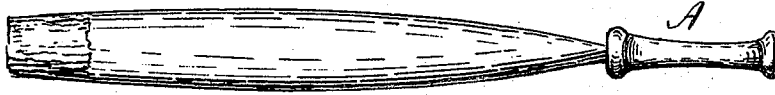

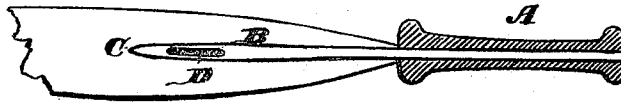
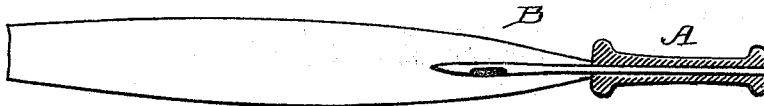

WALLACE GOODWIN, OF DETROIT, MICHIGAN.

IMPROVEMENT IN CIGAR-HOLDERS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **210,022**, dated November 19, 1878; application filed June 19, 1878.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WALLACE GOODWIN, of the city of Detroit, in the county of Wayne and State of Michigan, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Cigar-Holders; and I do declare that the following is a true and accurate description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, in which—

Figure 1 is an elevation of cigar with holder attached. Fig. 2 is an enlarged sectional view of hollow tube, showing slit and pointed end. Fig. 3 is a vertical longitudinal section of same.

The invention consists of a straight hollow tube, terminating in a point at one end, with a slit cut through the tube near the pointed end,

said tube being fastened into a mouth-piece, so as to form a complete cigar-holder.

In the drawing, A represents a mouth-piece. B represents a straight hollow tube, terminating in a point, C, at one end. D represents a slit cut through the hollow tube near the point.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The pointed hollow tube B, having a side slot, D, jointly with a mouth-piece, substantially as shown and described, and for the purpose set forth.
