Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The University Club occupies the northwest corner of Fifth Avenue and 54th Street in Manhattan. Attributed to Kendalland Moore (of the architectural firm of McKim, Mead & White), the club was designed in 1897 under the supervision of Charles F. McKim.

The six-story University Club building, constructed of granite, closely resembles a sixteenth-century Italian Renaissance palazzo in plan and proportions but its exterior displays a combination of original architectural features. The handsome facade is divided into three main horizontal divisions separated by two strongly defined band courses. Each of the three divisions contains a row of large, arched windows. The first two divisions above street level have small, rectangular mezzanine windows above the arched windows, alternating with carved, marble shields. Each arched window has a large keystone block embellished with an heroic size head. On the Fifth Avenue side, attic windows are ingeniously worked into the frieze of the superb deep cornice crowning the building.

Among the conspicuous architectural features of the exterior are the elaborately ornate bronze railings of the six projecting balconies which are supported on large stone brackets. The dominant arched entrance doorway, on the Fifty-fourth Street side, is enframed by two handsome rusticated columns supporting a heavily ornamented lintel or entablature. Well-emphasized horizontal stone courses in continuous bands cover the surface of the building; the corners are slightly projected, rising the full height of the building, to create a feeling of enframement and strength in this truly imposing structure.

The decoration of the interior of the University Club is unequaled in the City of New York. The first and second floor halls are characterized by panelled walls with marble columns (Doric on the first floor; Ionic on the second) supporting projecting entablatures. The walls of the main floor hall are decorated with mosaics. A relief of the club's insignia, hanging over the fireplace, was designed by Kenyon Cox and executed by Charles Keck. The main dining room is articulated into rhythmic bays by engaged Ionic columns and pilasters, and each bay is filled with richly carved panelling accentuated by each university's crest. The ornate coffered ceiling is also of wood. The lounging room's ceiling is very similar to that of the dining room, while its walls are simpler: blank walls are separated into bays by ornate Corinthian pilasters. The doorways are enframed by a sumptuously carved, arched surround which rises the full height of the room. The library is by far the most elaborately decorated room. The ribs of the cross-vaulted ceiling are delicately carved in wood. Ceiling paintings by H. Siddons Mowbray (1904), which are based in style and color on those by Pintaricchio in the Borgia Apartments in the Vatican, fill every wall surface. Other public rooms, such as the magazine room and the council room, are also notable for their fine detailing, which is distinct and yet equal to that found in any other chamber of the club.

Very little remodeling has since taken place, save the addition of the 1916-20 wing (52 x 100 feet) on the northwest corner of the building, also designed by McKim, Mead & White, and included in this nomination.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The University Club, a superb example of the work of the architectural firm of McKim, Mead & White, was designed as a monumental Italian Renaissance palazzo. Occupying a conspicuous site on Fifth Avenue, the building achieves an excellence in its proportions and details rarely surpassed in this country. A building of this type will probably never again be built in the United States.

Called "one of the great buildings of the city," the University Club was designed in 1897 according to the principles taught at the École des Beaux-Arts in Paris where the partners of the firm had studied. Among its outstanding features on the exterior are the bronze railings decorating the six balconies, and the deep terra-cotta cornice crowning the building. A most impressive feature is the arched entrance framed by rusticated columns which dominates the Fifty-fourth Street side. This grandiose exterior and the more refined elements of the interior illustrate the masterful skill of the architects in creatively synthesizing Italian Renaissance forms to produce an outstanding original design.

The prestigious architectural firm of McKim, Mead & White was chosen to design the clubhouse. Appropriately, the architects looked to the Italian Renaissance for inspiration, which to them meant the High Renaissance, not the Baroque exuberance of classical motifs then current. Earlier examples of the firm's interest in this style were the impressive group of the Villard Houses on Madison Avenue (1882), and the Boston Public Library (1887). The University Club remains to this day one of the most well-known McKim, Mead & White buildings.

Early in 1864, a group of men who had been intimate friends in college discussed the idea of founding a University Club. They had previously met on Saturday evenings for three years as an organization known as the Red Room Club. The following year, a charter, "for the purpose of the promotion of literature and art, by establishing and maintaining a library, reading-room and gallery of art, and by such other means as shall be expedient and proper for such purpose," was granted by the legislature on April 28, 1865. They originated something that was new in the club life of New York, a club that required an intellectual and cultural background for membership, a college degree. For fifteen years, prior to occupying their present home in 1899, the club had its headquarters in the Jerome Mansion, at the southeast corner of Twenty-sixth Street and Madison Avenue on Madison Square.






The University Club of New York, McKim, Mead & White, architects.
