2018 General Election

Survey conducted September 26 through September 27, 2018. 1,555 likely 2018 General Election voters participated in the survey. Survey weighted to match expected turnout demographics for the 2018 General Election. Margin of Error is +/-2.5%. Margins of Error within specific demographics (crosstabs) is significantly higher due to smaller sample size.

Totals do not always equal 100% due to rounding. Survey conducted by Remington Research Group on behalf of Missouri Scout.

Josh Hawley: 48%

Claire McCaskill: 46%

Undecided: 6%

Sandra McDowell: 44%

Nicole Galloway: 43%
