

PREFACE

The 1990/91 round of Population and Housing Census in the region, has been dubbed a regional census and quite rightly so, since the collaborative and co-ordinated efforts received the full support of all the governments.

The countries involved and the year they conducted their censuses are as follows:

In British Virgin Islands, Grenada, Montserrat, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Turks and Caicos, and Antigua and Barbuda, the census officer had no previous experience in census taking; with that in mind a census officer's manual was prepared by the Regional Census Office to guide and assist mainly those census officers with little or no experience.

Training programs were also organised by the Regional Office, to further assist with the large and complex task of managing, organising, and conducting the census.

Antigua and Barbuda was extremely fortunate, at the time of preparation for the census, to have a Statistical Advisor who had a fair amount of experience in census taking, both within the caribbean and outside.

The Regional Census Office headed by Mr. Desmond Hunte, as Regional Census Coordinator, along with four (4) other Assistant Regional Census Co-ordinators, provided the necessary advice and technical assistance to member states, thereby ensuring that countries were kept totally involved in the activities of the Regional Census Office.

The Regional Census Co-ordinator operated under the general technical direction of the Regional Census Co-ordinating Committee. This committee comprised heads of all statistical offices, one representative from University of the West Indies (UWI), University of Guyana (UG), ECLAC, Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS), CARICOM, External Co-operating Agencies, and relevant personnel known for competence and experience in census taking.

At the local level a National Census Advisory Committee was appointed by government to assist the local census office with technical advice, as well as general and public relations assistance. This committee comprised a wide cross-section of the community and convened some fourteen (14) monthly meetings.

The census was supported regionally by UNFPA, and other international organisations such as ECLAC, CTAP and EEC which gave technical assistance as well as funding workshops and training programs for census related activities.

The Local Census Budget over-all was EC 1.6 million dollars, with UNFPA contributing approximately EC \$153,000.

For the 1990/91 round of censuses in the caribbean, each country was responsible for the processing of its own data. However, the Regional Census Office assisted with this exercise by developing a regional computer Edit/Consistency programme, and provided other technical support and assistance in this regard. An extensive programme was mounted to ensure the general public was well briefed with regards to the census procedures and the census questionnaire. The main political organisations, non-governmental organisations and private sector, were also involved in the whole process of public awareness.

This is the second volume to be produced on the 1991 Population and Housing Census and provides the main tabulations from the census. Other volumes of the census results are to be produced at a later date.

Once again the contributions of all concerned with this national effort are commendable. However, it would be remiss of me if special mention were not made of Mr. Anthony Rooke, Statistical Advisor. Through his expertise and dedication, he has inspired the hard working staff at the Census Office, in particular Mr. Jaceey Sebastian, Statistical Officer, thereby influencing the success which is apparent at this time.

POPULATION AND HOUSING CENSUS 1991

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Definition of Population Totals

The total number of persons enumerated was, according to a manual count of the "Visitation Records" compiled by enumerators etc, 62,929 persons - the enumerated population. This is somewhat larger than the figure of 59,355 on which the following tabulations are based. The difference is partly due to the failure to complete questionnaires for some persons either because of no-contacts or refusals, and partly because of the deliberate exclusion from the tabulations of tourists, businessmen and others temporarily in the state, those enumerated in certain institutions such as hospitals and prison, and vagrants.

It should be remembered that a small number of Antiguans will inevitably have been omitted from both the enumerated totals and the tabulations, either because they were temporarily out of the country (seamen, diplomats, students, tourists, etc.) or because of evasion

and errors. To the extent that this has occurred the resident population will be slightly underestimated.

In addition to the above, 985 households were identified where there was complete refusal or no contact, and no information could be obtained as to the number of occupants in the household. In order to arrive at the 'best' estimate of the population, an estimate for this undercoverage was made based upon the average household size in private households of the parish in which the missing households were located. This estimate yielded a further 3049 persons. This gives rise to an estimated de facto population of 65,978 and an estimated resident population of 63,896.

Users of the census data are advised to pay careful attention to the population group which comprises the universe for any particular table. Some tables refer only to the population aged 15 years and over and some only to females 15 years and over. All tables exclude vagrants and persons enumerated in "Restricted Institutions" i.e. prison, hospital, mental home, etc. but include persons enumerated in "open institutions" i.e. hostels, barracks, etc. and long term guests in hotels. Tables on 'housing" and "households" similarly exclude "Restricted Institutions" and include "Open Institutions", but it should be noted that some tables refer only to non-institutional households where indicated in the table heading.

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SUMMARY REPORT

POPULATION AND HOUSING CENSUS - 1991

A. INTRODUCTION

The tables in this report present statistical data compiled from the 1991 Population and Housing Census of Antigua and Barbuda, combined into a summary report. The printing programme for the census envisages a total of three reports to be produced.

- (1) Administrative Report: which details all the procedures used in the census, administrative arrangements, forms used, staffing, budget, etc. Published in June 1993.
- (2) Summary Report: which includes detailed tabulations, primarily intended for use by general government and the public at large.
- (3) Analytical Report: which will attempt to provide an analysis of the findings of the census with an indication of the main changes since the previous censuses.

In addition, this may be supplemented, on request to the census office, by additional computer printouts too detailed or lengthy to be included in the printing programme.

It should also be noted that a preliminary report was issued in December 1991 which provided preliminary data on the population of each enumeration district, based upon a manual count of the Visitation Records compiled by the Census enumerators.

The notes that follow in this report contain only an outline of the conduct of the census for the benefit of data users. Fuller details may be obtained by reference to the Administrative Report.

B. CENSUS DATE

Census Day was 28th May 1991, with Census moment being midnight on this date.

No census was conducted in 1980/81 and although a census was conducted in 1970, little is known about the methodology used in that census or its reliability, but it is known that what few tables were prepared were based upon a 20% sample of questionnaires completed. It should be noted therefore that this 1991 census was the first full census since 1960.

C. POPULATION COVERED

The aim of the 1991 Population Census was to determine the number and characteristics of persons to be found in the country on Census day. This DE FACTO objective therefore implies that the Census should cover, not only residents of the country, but also non-resident

tourists and businessmen temporarily in the country. It also implies the exclusion of persons who are normally residents in the country, but were absent abroad on Census day.

There are however some departures from the above approach in respect of the treatment of tourists and businessmen temporarily in the country, crews on board ships in harbour on census night, the inmates of certain types of institutions, and vagrants. Only very limited information was collected on these sub-populations and although they are included in the enumerated total, they are, in most cases, excluded from the tabulations. Institutions were divided into 3 groups:-

- (a) open in which occupants engage in normal economic activity
- (b) restricted in which occupants do not engage in normal economic activity and
- (c) hotels and guest houses accommodating six or more persons.
- a) Institutions <u>included</u> in tabulations (open)
 - i) Hostels for nurses, teachers, students and others
 - ii) Police barracks and Police stations
 - iii) Defence Force
 - iv) U.S Navy Base
 - v) U.S Air base
- b) Institutions <u>excluded</u> from tabulations (restricted)

- i) Holberton Hospital and Adelin clinic
- ii) Mental Hospital
- iii) Fiennes Institute and other homes for the Aged
- iv) Prison and Boy's Training School
- v) Lepers Home.
- c) Hotels and guest houses accommodating 6 or more persons.
- Long term residents (6 months or more) included in tabulations.

It should be noted that only persons resident in restricted institutions for 6 months or more were recorded as resident there. If resident for less than 6 months they should have been recorded at their usual residence.

If an institution (including hotels) contained separate quarters for staff, caretakers, etc.. these were treated as private households.

Also excluded from the tabulations:-

- i) Short-term visitors (less than 6 months) in Hotels and Guest Houses accommodating 6 people or more
- ii) Crew on board ships in harbour on Census night
- iii) Vagrants

D. REGIONAL CO-ORDINATION

As with previous censuses in the region, there was a large degree of co-ordination between the english-speaking countries. Regular meetings were held between the census officials of the region under the auspices of the Regional Census Co-ordinating Committee established by the CARICOM council of Ministers; all Census offices were represented.

The Regional approach ensured:-

- a) a uniform approach to the overall planning of the census
- b) a virtually uniform questionnaire throughout the region
- c) a common approach to definitions to be used
- d) uniform guidelines and materials for training at all levels of the census operations
- e) a uniform approach to the machine processing of the data

The Census Office was responsible for:-

- i) the mapping exercise
- ii) the recruitment and training of enumerators
- iii) field activities
- iv) data processing

E. <u>METHOD OF CONDUCTING THE CENSUS</u>

For the purposes of the census, Antigua and Barbuda was divided into 267 Enumeration districts. These were drawn so as to co-incide with the parish boundary with one or two minor exceptions, and the St. John's city boundary. One enumerator was allocated to each such district

and was required to list all buildings in the enumeration district and interview every household to obtain the information required. Each building, dwelling unit and household, together with the number of person residing in the household, were entered onto a Visitation Record.

The enumerator was instructed to interview the Head of the household to obtain the census information in respect of all persons in the household and enter the data onto the census questionnaire. Enumerators were instructed to ask questions exactly as written on the questionnaire.

As it was not possible to interview all households on Census day, enumeration districts were pre-enumerated during the 3-4 weeks prior to Census day to obtain the detailed information, and then in the 2 days after Census day each household was re-visited to verify the occupants to each household and any appropriate adjustments were made.

F. <u>DATA PROCESSING</u>

The census questionnaire was a mark sensing document and most of the questions were pre-coded requiring enumerators simply to mark the answers in the appropriate box. Questionnaires were first edited manually and those questions which required a written response were coded onto the questionnaire at this stage, so that all responses could be transferred on to the computer by simply passing the questionnaires through an optical mark reader.

Using a software programme called Integrated Management Processing System (IMPS) provided to the region by U.S. Bureau of Census, the data was then edited on the computer in a three part edit process -CENTRY, NORTON, and CONCOR - which checked for missing data, inconsistencies and other apparent errors, which were then verified against the relevant questionnaire and appropriate amendments made.

This is the first time that Population Census data has been completely processed at home in Antigua and Barbuda and as a result, in addition to the usual Census tables available in the various census reports, it will be possible for data users to access much more detailed data on request to the Census/Statistics Office than in any previous Census.

G. THE QUESTIONNAIRE

The questionnaire is grouped into eight main sections. Some of these are directed to specific sub-populations such as Heads of household, or persons 15 years and over, females aged 15-64, etc.. Tables relating to each of the questions included in the questionnaire may not appear in this particular report, and reference should also be made to the other volumes of Census reports indicated in section 1 above, or to the Census/Statistics Office. A copy of the questionnaire is shown in the appendix.

IDENTIFICATION

This was completed for all persons. Although each person's name is written on the form, this cannot be read by the optical mark reader and thus is not transferred into the computer; similarly with the address of the household. The 12 digit identifying number, together with the individual number within the household, uniquely identifies each person. It also serves to identify the parish, village, or area within the parish, and enumeration district of residence and links the members of each household. The individual number within the household is also used to determine household size.

SECTIONS OF OUESTIONS

1. HOUSING

These questions were primarily directed to the Head of the household and the categories used are relatively self-explanatory and may be seen in the copy of the questionnaire in the appendix.

1.2 Type of dwelling

The concept of townhouse and double house/duplex are not well understood in Antigua and Barbuda as they are few in existence. Joined houses are often referred to locally as apartments.

1.5 Construction material of walls

Makeshift is used to include unconventional materials such as galvanize, cardboard, etc.

1.6 Construction material of roof

As in the case of walls, this includes the use of unconventional materials such as cardboard, roofs of cars, etc.

1.9 Type of toilet facilities

At present there is no sewer system in Antigua and Barbuda.

1.15 Number of Rooms

The number of rooms actually used for living is recorded here and is defined as an area permanently separated by means of walls from other parts of the dwelling unit, but excludes galleries, toilets, pantries, corridors and kitchens. A room curtained off by a temporary partition is not considered as a separate room.

1.16 Number of bedrooms

As with number of rooms makeshift arrangements with curtain or blinds do not count as rooms. The rooms must be used exclusively for sleeping. A dwelling unit which uses a room for sleeping by night but other activities by day was recorded as "no bedrooms".

2. **CHARACTERISTICS**

This section, asked of all persons, covers basic characteristics such as age, sex, ethnic group, religion and relationship to Head of household.

2.1 Relationship to Head of Household

The Head of the household was simply defined as the person acknowledged as such by the members of the household. The eight categories used in the classification were:-

1 Head

5 Grandchild

2 Spouse or partner

6 Parent/parent-in-law

3 Child

7 Other relative

4 Son/daughter-in-law

8 Non-relative

These categories are interpreted broadly to include the spouse or partner of the Head. Thus category 3 - child, means a child of either the Head of the household or of the Head's spouse/partner, similarly with categories 4, 5, 6 and 7. Non-relative may include a household helper (living with the household), a friend, a guest, or any other person not related to either the Head of household or his or her spouse/partner.

Some misunderstanding of the term son/daughter-in-law did occur as, during editing, several instances were detected where a person was recorded as a son or daughter-in-law but was too young for this to be true. Most appeared to be the children or grandchild of the Head's partner and after examination of the questionnaires the appropriate corrections were made. However, cases where such persons were not of a very young age will not have been detected.

2.2 **Sex**

It was ensured during data editing that sex was recorded for all persons. There are thus no persons with sex not stated.

2.3 Age

Age was taken as "age last birthday". Enumerators were also instructed not to leave this question blank and if the age was not known to make an estimate based on reference to outstanding events such as fires, floods or hurricanes. A detailed scrutiny was made during editing, and remaining blanks were estimated based upon familial relationships and in some cases, further enquiries. There are thus no persons with age not stated.

2.4 Ethnic Group

As with all questions on the questionnaire, the enumerator was instructed to ask the question as printed on the questionnaire "To what ethnic, racial or national group do you think (the person) belongs". The category recorded here was that to which respondents said they belong and not the impression or opinion of the enumerator.

The categories used were:-

- 1. African/Negro/Black
- 6. Syrian/Lebanese
- 2. Amerindian/Carib
- 7. White

3. East Indian

8. Mixed

4. Chinese

9. Other

5. Portuguese

10. Don't know/not stated

In those cases where the respondent indicated the category "other", there was space on the questionnaire to write in the reply given.

2.5 Religion

The religion recorded was that to which the respondents said they adhered. The categories, of which there were 15, plus "other", "none" and "not stated", are given on the questionnaire in the appendix. Where the category "other" was indicated by the respondent, there was space on the questionnaire to write in the reply given.

3. **DISABILITY**

The enumerator was not expected to make any judgement as to the nature or correctness of the response given to this question, simply to record the answers. Individuals may suffer from more than one category of afflictions specified so multiple answers are possible. The nine categories were:-

1. Sight

- 6. Neck and spine
- 2. Hearing

7. Slowness at leaning or understanding

3. Speech

- 8. Mental Retardation
- 4. Upper limb (arm)
- 9. Other
- 5. Lower limb (leg)

Space was provided on the questionnaire to indicate the type of affliction if "other" was specified.

A subsidiary question in this section asked ways in which the illness/disability or infirmity impaired the person's activities, and again multiple answers are possible.

4. <u>BIRTHPLACE AND RESIDENCE</u>

4.1 Birthplace:

Enumerators were instructed to record the place of normal residence of the mother rather than the location of the hospital or home where the birth actually occurred.

For local born population the location within the country of birth was recorded.

4.2-4.5 International Migration:

For the local born population, additional questions were asked as to whether the person had ever lived in another country, and if so what country. But no question was asked as to when the person returned to this country.

However, persons born abroad were asked when they last came to live in this country.

NOTE: A further question was asked concerning international migration, at 1.1(a) on the questionnaire. It asked for the sex and age of any persons who had gone abroad in the last year. The emphasis was on PERMANENT MIGRATION so that persons who had left for purposes of study, medical treatment or extended vacation were not included.

4.6-4.7 Internal Migration

These questions were asked of all persons regardless of whether they were born here or aboard, and attempt to identify movement of persons within the country. The questions

identified, for persons who had moved, where they last lived and when they came to live in the village, town or city where they presently lived.

5. EDUCATION AND TRAINING

The questions on education were asked of all persons aged between 3 and 49 whether they were still attending school or not; however, the questions on training were addressed only to persons aged 15 and over.

5.1 Attending School or Educational Institution

This includes both full-time and part-time attendance. Enumerators were instructed not to ask this of infants under 3 years of age or persons 50 years and over, however any that were included were amended at the final edit stage. Hence there are no persons under 3 years of age or 50 years and over recorded as attending school or educational institutions.

5.2 Full-time or Part-time

This enables data to be extracted separately for full-time or part-time education.

5.3 Type of school or Educational Institution attended

The categories used were:-

- 1. Nursery/Infant/Kindergarten/Pre-school
- 2. Primary
- 3. Senior School or Secondary Dept. of Primary school
- 4. Junior Secondary

- 5. Senior Secondary, General Secondary, High School, etc.
- 6. Trade/Vocational School
- 7. Technical Institutes
- 8. Community College/Sixth Form College
- 9. University
- 10. Other
- 11. Not stated

These categories were used uniformly in the region and therefore some categories are not applicable in Antigua and Barbuda, such as Junior Secondary. The category "senior school or Secondary dept. of Primary school" incorporated students at those primary schools which have classes beyond the usual age of transferring to Secondary school, who have not yet passed the post primary examination. The "other" category includes schools for the blind and deaf.

5.4 Address of School

The location of each school was indentified to the enumeration district (E.D.) in which it was located. This was achieved by trawling through all the enumerators' Visitation Records and from the list of buildings etc. recorded, and drawing up a master list of all schools together with their E.D. numbers; this was cross-checked against a list of schools provided by the Ministry of Education. At the manual edit stage, editors referred to the master list and inserted the appropriate E.D. number onto the questionnaire.

5.5 Mode of travel to school

In conjunction with the previous questions, a detailed picture can be obtained of travel patterns and distances travelled to school. The categories were:-

1. Walk

5. Public vehicle (e.g bus)

2. Bicycle

- 6. Hired transport (e.g taxi)
- 3. Private car or vehicle
- 7. Other
- 4. Don't know/not stated

Note that the question asked for the main mode of travel to school.

5.6-5.8 Educational Attainment

This has been measured in two ways.

- i) Highest level of school, college, etc. attended
- ii) Highest certificate, diploma or degree earned.

In addition, for those whose highest level of schooling was "primary", the grade or standard reached was also asked.

These questions were asked of all persons whether currently attending school or not.

It should be noted that the categories of school used here are slightly different from that used earlier (at question 5.3 - school currently attending), being simplified groupings.

With regard to highest certificate, etc. earned (question 5.8) it should be cautioned that

the range of examinations taken during the lifetimes of the census respondents is very varied and not easy to rank. Especially as the population becomes more mobile and opportunities for higher education in other countries become more widespread. As far as possible qualifications were equated with the "normal" range of qualifications found in the region, but difficulty in doing so may account for a high proportion of qualifications in the "other" group. For a full list of the categories used see copy of the questionnaire in the Appendix. Note that university degree was the highest level of qualification specified.

5.10-5.12 Formal Training

This question was only asked of persons aged 15 years and over. The training must have been by way of a formal course and lasted at least 3 months.

The categories of training used were:-

- 1. Correspondence course
- 4. Institution

2. On the job

5. Other

3. Apprenticeship

6. Don't know

In addition, respondents were asked to specify for what occupation the training was preparing them. This does not imply that the training was successfully completed, nor that the trainee took up a position in that occupation. The occupations were coded according to the regionally adapted "International Standard classification of occupations" of the I.L.O. (see under OCCUPATION).

6. MARITAL STATUS, UNION STATUS & FERTILITY

These questions were confined to persons 15 years and over.

6.1 Marital Status

This question is concerned with the legal status of the marriage, thus persons living apart but still legally married were record as married. Persons who have married remain so until the marriage is dissolved by death, divorce or legal separation. Legally separated persons are living apart and separated by court order.

6.2-6.5 *Union status*

These questions attempt to elicit information on the types of relationships for persons other than those who are now married and living with their spouse. It seeks to identify (i) those who were married but not now living with a partner (ii) those who are now in a common law relationship, (iii) those who were in a common law relationship, and (iv) those who were never in a union.

6.6 Age at first union

This was asked of all persons except those that indicated in questions 6.1-6.5 that they had never been in a union. A manual edit check against the questionnaires was made of all those that showed age at first union under the age of 15.

6.8-6.14 *Fertility*

These questions were confined to females who were aged between 15 and 64 only. In addition, any females 15 years of age and over attending primary or secondary school were excluded from the scope of this question: This was in common with the other countries of the region.

- 6.8 Number of livebirths ever had
- 6.9 Age at first livebirth
- 6.10 Age at last livebirth

The answers to these questions will help determine the existing and potential level of fertility of women within the country.

Additional questions asked:-

- 6.11 Number of births in last 12 months
- 6.12 <u>Sex of those births</u>
- 6.13/14 How many of these died

7. ECONOMIC ACTIVITY

These questions were asked of all persons aged 15 years and over. Note that two reference periods are used for identifying economic activity:-

i) The past 12 months (question 7.1-7.4).

ii) The past week (question 7.5-7.8)

A person was classified as working if they were engaged in the production of goods or services for sale for most of the reference period. This would include employers, employees, own account workers, self-employed, and others receiving a wage or salary.

It also includes trainees, and apprentices, whether paid or not, as well as unpaid helpers and family workers on commercial farms and other enterprises. The work did not have to be continuous but take up "most" of the reference period compared with any of the other categories of economic activity. "Had a job but did not work" applied to persons who had a job but spent most of the reference period away from the job because of illness, injury, vacation or some other cause.

Also included are persons on temporary lay off or industrial dispute. "Looked for work" means that the person must have spent must of the reference period actively looking for work.

"Wanted work and available". This category includes persons who are ready and willing to work but did not actively look for work.

The four categories so far defined constitute the economically active population. The economically inactive population comprises firstly those engaged on "home duties" i.e. housewives and others engaged on cooking, cleaning, child rearing, etc. but not receiving pay for their work. "Attended school" applies to those who for most of the reference period were full-time students at school or university, but who may, particularly in respect of the 12 months reference period, at the time of the census actually have entered the labour force. The remaining categories of the economically inactive were "Retired" and "Disabled". There were

also categories "other" and "not stated".

7.1 Main Economic activity in the past 12 months Categories as above

7.4 Months worked in past 12 months

The enumerators' instructions were to address this question to those whose main activity in the last 12 months was either worked, or had a job but did not work. However, the sequence of questions and instructions on the questionnaire are such that this question could have been asked of all other categories of activity, and the initial tabulations show that this did occur.

These have not been edited out and are included in the tabulations.

7.5 Main economic activity last week

Categories as for Economic activity last 12 months.

7.6 Type of work looked for or wanted

This question was only addressed to those who, in the proceeding week, are recorded as "looked for work" or "wanted work and available" i.e. the unemployed. This required a written answer and was coded at the editing stage into the regionally adapted "International Standard Classification of Occupations" (ISCO) of the International Labour Organisation. (See later under "Occupation").

7.8 Hours worked last week

This question was addressed not only to those whose main activity last week was "worked" or "had a job but did not work", but also those in other categories of activity who did any work at all last week (by means of the supplementary question 7.7). Whilst many of the persons recorded as "not working" yet still gave a high number of hours worked, will have genuinely had other employment such as their own farm or business, part-time jobs, etc..., an examination of the questionnaires suggest there may have been some misunderstanding.

Persons engaged in home duties may well consider this as work and so gave the number of hours they worked in this capacity. Question 7.7 on the questionnaire asked "did you do any work at all last week including work at home" and this may have been misinterpreted by a few persons as home duties so the number of hours so worked was given. In addition it would appear that where a person "Had a job but did not work" some enumerators may have entered the normal amount of hours worked. However, no adjustments to the data were made for this as it was not possible to determine from the questionnaires the correct response required.

7.9 Occupation

The question asked "what sort of work does the person do in their main occupation" in an attempt to get the best description possible. It applied to those persons who did any work at all during the year preceding enumeration or the last job held by persons who had ever worked. The total number of persons will therefore exceed the number who "worked" last week or last year.

The question required a written answer with instructions to obtain as full a description as possible. The written answers were coded at the manual edit stage into the regionally adapted "International Standard Classification of Occupation" (ISCO '88) of the International Labour Office (ILO) at the 4 digit level.

This detailed list of occupations and codes is shown in the Administrative report but for purposes of tabulation two sub-classifications are used.

- a) Ten Broad Occupation Groups:
 - i) Legislators, Senior officials and Managers
 - ii) Professionals
 - iii) Technicians and Associate Professionals
 - iv) Clerks (incl. Secretaries and Typist)
 - v) Service Workers and Shop Sales workers.
 - vi) Agricultural, Forestry and Fishery workers.
 - vii) Craft and Related workers.
 - viii) Plant and machine Operators/Drivers and Assemblers
 - ix) Elementary Occupations
 - x) Defence Force

Plus a category for not known or not stated.

b) A truncated version of ISCO'88

It may be noted that although personnel working at the U.S Navy base have been

included, they have been classified in this section according to their occupational activity e.g electrician, storekeeper, etc... rather than as "military".

7.10 Dependence on Tourism

In order to get a better idea of the extent of tourism related employment in the economy than can be obtained from looking at a person's occupation or the industry in which they work, persons were asked to indicate whether they consider their job was dependent on tourism:-

- i) Completely dependant
- ii) Partially dependant
- iii) Not dependant at all.

7.11 Type of Business (Industry)

This question asked for the type of business in which the person worked, or last worked in the case of those not presently working. In the case of Government employees, the name of the office or department was requested. Domestic servants and other personal service workers were classified as working in private households. As with Occupation, it required a written response on the questionnaire and this was coded in the census office using a regionally adapted version of the "International Standard Classification of all Economic Activities" (ISIC) at the 4 digit level as recommended by the United Nations. A complete list of the classification used and coded is shown in the Administrative report. For most tabulations 17 broad industry group are identified:-

- 99 Extra territorial organisations.

7.12 Address of Workplace

This was used to identify the location of the workplace. Each workplace was identified into its enumeration district based upon a master list of business places drawn up by the census

office from the Visitation records completed by enumerators listing all buildings and business places.

These Enumeration Districts were grouped into major divisions within parishes identifying each village in the rural areas and the main locations within the city, and each workplace was coded into its appropriate major division.

7.13 Mode of travel to work

In conjunction with the previous question and the place of current residence, this will provide a detailed picture of travel patterns and distances travelled to work.

The mode of travel most used was recorded and where more than one mode were used in a single journey that part which covered the greatest distance was recorded.

7.14 Type of worker

This question applies only to those persons who recorded that they were presently working. The categories were:-

- 1. Paid employee government:- persons working for Government and receiving payment in wages or salary.

 Includes Statutory Corporations, etc.
- 2. Paid employee Private:- persons working for a private organisation

and receiving payment in the form of wages, salary, commission, tips, piece rates or in kind.

3. Unpaid worker:-

persons working in a business or farm which is run for profit, but who receive no payment in cash. They may be a member of the proprietor's family, an apprentice or trainee, but they contribute to the production of goods and services.

4. Employer:-

persons who operate their own business or enterprise and hire one or more paid employees.

5. Own Account worker:-

persons who operate their own business or enterprise and hire no paid employees.

7.15 Movement of Goods

This question is an indirect way of identifying informal traders. Informal traders have no fixed business address where goods may be safely stored overnight and their stock is usually relatively small and portable.

7.16 Last pay/income period

This was a lead-in question to facilitate the next question on income.

7.17 Gross pay/income for the last period

Enumerators were instructed to probe to obtain the total income from work, for the last pay period, including allowances, before any deductions for Social Security or Medical Benefits. For self-employed persons the income recorded was total income less wages, salaries and business operating expenses.

Persons were asked to identify their income level categories by reference to an "Income Flash Card" shown to the respondent at this time.

The Income level categories are as follows:-

7.18/7.19 Receipt of money from family/friends abroad

The same flash card was presented for respondents to identify the category indicating the level of money received from family/friends abroad.

8. **WHERE SPENT CENSUS NIGHT?**

Since the members of the household where initially enumerated prior to census night, this question aimed to check the members of the household actually present on census night.

Persons who were no longer members of the household due to death, permanent migration, institutionalized, or ceased to belong to the household for other reasons, were deleted from the questionnaire by drawing a line across the appropriate pages in the questionnaire. However, the optical mark reader "read" all these deletions and they had to be expunged at the machine editing stage. Additions to the household, such as new born babies, temporary visitors and new members of the household (e.g marriage or returning residents from abroad) were enumerated at this time and added to the questionnaire. The categories specified for this particular question were:-

- 1. At this address
- 2. Elsewhere in this country
- 3. Abroad.

A substantial number of questionnaires did not have this completed - these were recorded as "at this address" during machine editing.






Chart 1: Population by Parish





Chart 2: Population by Age Group and Sex





Chart 3: Ethnic Origin





Chart 6: Ownership of Dwelling




Chart 7: Year Dwelling Built




Chart 8: Construction Material of Walls




Chart 9: Type of Toilet Facilities





Chart 10: Cooking Fuel


