Paulston's time was 7hr. 5min. 16sec. G. L. Walcott was second, S. J. Hillston third, and M. G. Clarke (Melbourne) fourth. The fastest time was made by the scratch man, W. Little, viz., 6hr. 56min. 40sec.

AUSTRALIAN TEN-MILE RUNNING CHAMPIONSHIP.

DEATH OF AN OLD-TIME SCULLER.

The death took place on 6th September, at Greenwich (N.S.W.), at the age of 85 years, of Mr. Richard A. W. Green. He was the first champion sculler of Australia to proceed to England 57 years ago. In a match between Green and Deward, of Gravesend, for £200 aside, Green won easily. The betting was 5, 6, and 7 to 4 on Deward. In Australia, Green defeated T. M'Grath in a match for £200 aside.

ONE DAY CRICKET MATCH.

WIN FOR AUSTRALIA.

London, September 12. In the one-day match against a team from Cumberland, selected by the Mayor of Whitehaven, the Australians won on the first innings. Cumberland scored 201, and the visitors lost eight wickets for 284 before rain stopped the play. Armstrong, Gregory, Carter and MacIntyre were left out of the Australian side, and the team was captained by H. L. Collins. T. J. Andrews (43) and J. M. Taylor were the principal contributors to Australia's total.

CHAMPIONSHIP TENNIS.

AUSTRALIANS IN AMERICA.

Vancouver, September 11. The Australian tennis players took part in the first round of the national singles championships on Friday. Their opponents were not leading players, all being of medium class. Surprise was expressed when Eighram defeated N. Peach, the Australian captain, 6-3, 6-1, 6-4. Peach was the only visitor competing who was defeated.

Australia was easily victorious when C. Todd (N.S.W.) defeated Grosbeck, 6-1, 6-1, 6-0. J. B. Hawkes (Vic.) defeated Rosenbaum, 6-2, 6-3, 6-3; and J. O. Anderson (N.S.W.) defeated Rice, 1-6, 6-2, 6-4, 6-3.

On Saturday, in the second round, Hawkes defeated Leroy, 6-1, 6-2, 6-3; Willis E. Davis defeated Todd, 4-6, 3-6, 3-4, 6-3, 6-3, in one of the hardest-fought matches of the tournament. Anderson defeated Symington, 6-1, 6-1, 7-5.

New York, September 12. The draw for the third round of the National Singles Championship at Philadelphia has matched Hawkes against Anderson, so that only one Australian can play in the fourth round.

On the recommendation of the Assistant Minister for Repatriation (Mr. Rodgers), the Federal Ministry last March appointed Major-General Sir James M'Kay, Lieut.-Colonel H. S. Evans, and Mr. W. A. Stewart to act in an advisory and consultative capacity in connection with the War Service Homes Department. It was officially announced recently that the board had been terminated. Mr. Rodgers explained to-day that the services of Sir James M'Kay and Lieut.-Colonel Evans had been retained for the present, the former as business adviser and the latter as consulting accountant. They were engaged in work for which they had special qualifications.
