The Works department will have a game where children can build houses from kits, whilst the Game department will be offering the chance to look through the scope of a rifle. The Ranger Service will run countryside education games and visitors can plant a tree with the Forestry department. Also on site will be the Scottish Equestrian Association's mechanical horse, an ideal mount on which to try riding for the first time.

The information tent will be filled with display boards illustrating every aspect of the Estate's work and staff will be on hand to answer any questions. A New Look for 2006!

Blair Castle International Horse Trials and Country Fair has launched a new logo for 2006, and the team are very pleased with the new, modern design.

Several other developments are in place for 2006, including the building of a third cross-country track. Blair has been awarded the running of the European Young Rider Championships for 2007, a prestigious competition that will really add to the excitement and will attract Young Riders from around 15 countries. The EYRC runs over a CCI** level course, which is being built in preparation for a trial run this year. Blair will therefore run CCI*, CCI** and CCI*** competitions concurrently, the first time this has been done in Britain.

An innovation on the Sunday will be the Blair Castle Cross-Country Challenge, a race around the cross country course for human participants. Also taking place on Sunday will be the final of a new Scottish series for ridden Clydesdales, the first time Clydesdales have actually competed at Blair.

The event will also be supporting a new charity, the Equine Grass Sickness Fund. The EGSF is the only charity in the world raising funds specifically for research into grass sickness, an extremely painful and distressing disease which can strike horses, ponies or donkeys at any time and in a high proportion of cases is fatal. Blair Castle Trekking Centre has lost ponies to grass sickness in the past, so the Estate was keen to support this important charity.

The Atholl Highlanders

he original Atholl Highlanders were a regular regiment, the 77th, raised in 1777 for service in America. However, after being stationed in Ireland, the war had concluded before they embarked for America and they were disbanded in 1783.

In 1839 Lord Glenlyon, later 6th Duke, participated in a tournament at Eglinton in Ayrshire, taking with him a retinue of Athollmen. On Queen Victoria's first visit to Scotland at

Dunkeld in 1842 and during her stay at Blair Castle in 1844 these men provided her Guard of Honour. In recognition of this service she granted them the Queen's Colours and thus the right to bear arms. This unique grant constituted the Atholl Highlanders. The original colours, which still survive in the castle, were presented on September 4th, 1845.

After the First World War regimental parades fell into abeyance although the pipers appeared on special occasions such as the visits to Blair of The Crown Prince of Japan in 1921 and King Feisal of Iraq in 1933 and the funeral of the 8th Duke in 1942.

In 1966 the 10th Duke decided to revive the rank and file and hold an annual parade, from small beginnings it grew to the present strength of about 100. Officers are usually local lairds. The rest of the men are recruited by invitation from the Duke, and have have estate or local connections. At the parade each recruit is presented with a sprig of juniper. One of this year's recruits Sandy Crerar, says: "Having lived in Atholl virtually all my life and worked in the grounds of Blair Castle over many summers, it is a special honour to be invited to join the Atholl Highlanders. This is especially so as I will become a third generation Atholl Highlander."

In 1979 the revived corps received new Regimental and Queens Colours but these have now become damaged and new ones have been made. It is very appropriate that on the 40th anniversary of the revival, to be held in May the new colours will be presented to the regiment by the Duchess of Atholl. Big Tree Country



Diana's Grove

Two new projects that should be starting this summer within the Atholl Estate Woodlands The Big Tree Country Project in Diana's Grove and a Cattle Grazing Trial at Newtyle Hill aimed at helping the regeneration of Juniper.

The Big Tree Country Project is supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Forestry Commission and aims to improve the visitor experience in the world famous stand of big trees that makes up Diana's Grove next to the Castle. Included in this work is the area of woodland that lies to the east of Hercules Garden known as Hercules Wilderness, an area of Policy Woodland dating back to the 18th century. Here we hope to create a new grove of specimen conifers to compliment Diana's Grove.

The Cattle grazing Trial at Newtyle involves the Forestry Research branch of the Forrestry Commision and is aiming to use cattle to break up the old grass sward around the juniper bushes opposite Fungarth. This is a site designated for its conservation value but needs new young juniper bushes to be established to replace the old and dying specimens. There is a lot of interest nationally in the use of cattle to create the right environmental conditions for allowing the germination of such plants. This work which involves the collaboration of the Estate with Alastair Morrison of Port of Tummel and the Forrestry Commision researchers is part of a nationwide trial looking at this subject in different woodland types.

The 30th Scottish International Patrol Jamborette

In July, some 1200 Scouts and leaders from all round the world will arrive at Blair Atholl for the 30th Scottish International Patrol Jamborette. Over the few days before the Scouts arrive, a team of leaders will transform Target Park into a village to service the camp. Scouts from 17 different countries will join Scottish scouts and they will then live and work together for two weeks.

During the camp, Scouts will have the chance to take part in a wide range of activities on site and in the surrounding area. The camp is open to visitors on the afternoon and evening of 22 July when visitors will have the opportunity to join in the international Country Fair in the afternoon and campfire in the evening.

in 1946, and was the idea of Jack Stewart, International Commissioner for Scotland. The arrangement then, as now was that a Scottish Patrol would arrive and set up a 'double' Patrol site to allow their overseas patrol to travel to Scotland without tentage and camping equipment. The idea worked extremely well. The

relatively small size of camp allowed more international contact, and friendships, made in camp, were encouraged to continue at a Scottish home during a short period of hospitality after the camp – which is still

Property Development Update

The site at Old Struan is now complete with landscaping and minor roadworks left to do when the weather improves. One of the units has been sold to Perthshire Housing Association under the Homestake split equity scheme, two have been kept for estate rentals and three are being sold on the open market this spring.

An estate managed 4 house project at Guay has just started using the same building design and main contractor, Alexander & Co.

Tighmhor are planning to start the Kindallachan project after A9 junction upgrades this summer. A revised design and layout for six houses along a more contemporary style has been submitted to the local authority.

An infill site for one house at Inver will be taken forward by the estate to planning and building control stage this summer. The property will be developed and retained for letting.

Finally, an infill site with planning approval at Auldclune is being sold on the open market this spring.
