The Guildhall School Alumni Newsletter

Founders' Day – 27th September 2005



The Guildhall School of Music first opened its doors on 27th September 1880, housed in a disused warehouse in the City of London. Supported by the City of London from the start, with 62 part-time students, it was the first municipal music college in Britain. Initially all tuition was on a part-time basis, but full-time courses were introduced by public request in 1920 and Departments of Speech, Voice and Acting were added by 1935. '& Drama' was added to the School's title. The School moved to its present premises in the heart of the City of London's Barbican in 1977 and continues to be owned, funded and administered by the Corporation of London.

Today, the School currently numbers some 700

students on its roll call, approximately 570 of whom are undergraduate and postgraduate music students, and 130 are studying on the acting, stage management and technical theatre courses. It has also gained an international reputation; in any year approximately 40% of the students are from outside the UK and typically represent over 40 nationalities. Junior Guildhall is a vital part of the Guildhall School and was set up as a specialised Saturday School for those young children showing great artistic and musical promise. It offers advanced training in music and drama to young people aged between 4 and 18.

The Guildhall School celebrates its 125th anniversary on Tuesday 27th September 2005 and we hope that all former students will be thinking of the School during this important day.

'While reflecting on our past and boasting of the talent which has been nurtured, we plan to build upon our educational and cultural links – from our immediate neighbourhood to the far-flung corners of the world.'

Professional Profiles

Niamh Cusack - actress



Niamh Cusack was born in Dublin and started her professional career as flautist playing with the RTE Symphony and Concert Orchestras. She then trained as an actress at the School. Niamh's father, Cyril Cusack, was an actor, and her two sisters, Sinead and Sorcha, are also actresses.

Niamh's impressive acting career spans theatre, film and television. Her roles for the Royal Shakespeare Company include Desdemona in Othello and Juliet in Romeo and Juliet. Niamh described the contrasting roles as follows, 'to move from Desdemona to Juliet was to move from a reactive role to an active one. I think Juliet is considerably younger than Desdemona, but in her play she is the active agent, the person who does everything and who motors the play, particularly in an emotional sense' (from Players of

Shakespeare – edited by Russell Jackson & Robert Smallwood).

Niamh's acclaimed theatre work includes A Doll's House, A Woman of No Importance and The Three Sisters at the Gate Theatre in Dublin, Indian Ink by Tom Stoppard at the Aldwych Theatre, Playboy of the Western World at West Yorkshire Playhouse, The Plough and The Stars at The Young Vic, Not I in the Beckett Festival at the Barbican and The Phoenix at The Bush Theatre.

Niamh's many television credits include Louise in Till We Meet Again (Yorkshire Television), Josephine in Fools of Fortune (Central Television), Ruth in A Marriage of Inconvenience, Melanie in Chalkface (BBC), Julie in Rhinoceros and Christine in Always and Everyone (both Granada Television). She is best known for her role as Dr Kate Rowan, the local GP in the popular tv series *Heartbeat*. Her film appearances include Denise in Lucky Sunil, Clara in Paris by Night and Clara in Under the Sun.

Niamh's recent stage performances include *Breathing Corpses* at the Royal Court Theatre, *His Dark Materials* at the National Theatre and *Mammals* at the Bush Theatre, London.

Natasha Jouhl - soprano

Natasha was born in London in 1976 and moved to New York at the age of seven. She gained her BMus degree from the School in 1998 and continued her studies on the Opera Course, which she completed in 2001. Natasha won the Gold Medal Competition in 1999. Her roles at the School included Bernadette in the world premiere of Andrew Schultz's Going into Shadows, including a collaboration project in Brisbane, Australia, Lia in Debussy's L'Enfant Prodigue and the title role in Rimsky-Korsakov's *The* Snowmaiden. In 2002 she completed a year at the National Opera Studio. Natasha is presently studying privately with Susan McCulloch.

She has performed in masterclasses with Graham

Johnson, Iain Burnside and Sir Thomas Allen at the Royal Opera House. Oratorio performances include Handel's *Samson*, *Acis and Galatea* and *Messiah* at Arundel Cathedral, Haydn's *Creation* at St George's Chapel as part of the Windsor Festival, Schubert's *Mass in A Flat*, Faure's *Requiem* and Dvorak's *Requiem* for Goldsmiths Choral Union

Her operatic roles include Donna Elvira in Don Giovanni, Papagena in The Magic Flute for Longborough Festival Opera, Rosalinda (Wexford Festival Opera) and Adele (Kentish Opera) in Die Fledermaus, Nella in Gianni Schicchi for the William Walton Foundation Actor-Singer course in Ischia and Elisetta in *The Secret Marriage*, Ilia in *Idomeneo*, First Lady in The Magic Flute and First Wood Nymph in Rusalka for Opera North, and Mélisande Pelléas and Mélisande and the title role in Rodelinda (covers) for Glyndebourne.

Natasha recently performed in William Christie's Les Arts Florissants' Young Artists Programme *Le Jardin des* Voix, which included concert performances throughout Europe. Future plans include the cover of Cleopatra in *Giulio Cesare* for Glyndebourne Festival Opera.

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Simon Emes - oboe



Simon Emes was born in London and began his musical education as a chorister at St. Pauls Cathedral. He studied the oboe at the School where he won the Gold Medal in 1982. Simon has been Co-Principal Oboe with the Halle Orchestra, Solo Oboe with the Royal Danish Orchestra in Copenhagen, and Co-Principal Oboe with the Oslo Philharmonic Orchestra which he joined in 1986. He has also appeared as soloist with the orchestra. Simon is currently Principal Oboist with the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra. As a freelance player he has appeared as guestprincipal oboe with the BBC Scottish, the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic, the Scottish Chamber Orchestra and the Chamber Orchestra of Europe.

Maria Radicheva - violin



Maria Radicheva studied violin at the School with the late Yfrah Neaman. She was the recipient of the 'Premiere Prix' Diploma from the School.

Maria has been met with critical acclaim as recitalist and guest soloist in major concert halls throughout Europe including Paris, Vienna, London, Geneva and Rome. In the United States, she has performed at Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall in New York City, Dumbarton Oaks in Washington, DC as well as in Dallas, Houston and other cities. A frequent guest at summer festivals, Maria has attended those of Aspen and Marlboro.

Maria Radicheva presented her New York recital debut in 1987 at Merkin Concert Hall as winner of the National Federation of Music Clubs Competition. She has been an adjunct professor at NYU Department of Music.

Maria is visiting violin specialist at Montclair State University, and is currently on the violin faculties of Manhattan School of Music, and Mannes College of Music, and is Programme Director of Summer Chamber Music Retreats at Vassar College.

Gill Gordon (née Hollands) Singing & Piano 1969-1973

I have been reading the recent newsletter you distributed and am writing to inform you of what I am currently doing and also Rae de Lisle, who was a contemporary of mine in the early 70s. I studied singing with Noelle Barker and piano with Bridgette Wild.

Rae came to Guildhall on a bursary from New Zealand in 1969 and studied piano with Bridgette Wild. When she returned to NZ, after continuing her studies with Maria Curcio and Cyril Smith, she became an established concert pianist in the southern hemisphere and was part of a renowned chamber ensemble, the Zelasny Ensemble.

At the same time she trained in teaching piano by Suzuki method, for which she is now one of the top teacher trainers. She had tendon problems even when at Guildhall, and seven years ago, had to stop playing professionally due to RSI. She has continued as a top piano teacher at Auckland University and this year one of her students, at the age of 18, won the prestigious Sydney International Piano Competition. On a visit to New Zealand in 2003. Rae

suggested to me that I should learn Suzuki method, so I have begun the course in England, taking my level one qualification in April this year and currently studying for levels 2 & 3.

I have had 14 years away from teaching music, which was what I did after leaving Guildhall in 1973 and am just rebuilding my practice, having dropped out of the business training world. The Suzuki method is a whole new dimension in teaching, which I find very effective in working with very young children. There is currently no brass Suzuki method, so following completion of my piano studies, I am about to embark in mv mid-50s on an MA, with development of Suzuki method for brass as my dissertation material. I already have a fouryear old "guinea pig", whose mother, a Suzuki flute teacher, is able to work in the appropriate style with me, so I will have some ground work already in place when I am ready to start the course.

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Patsy Rodenburg awarded OBE



We are delighted to report that Patsy Rodenburg, Head of Voice at the School, was awarded an OBE in the recent Oueen's Birthday Honours list. Patsy has been Head of Voice at the School since 1981 and at the Royal National Theatre since 1990. She has been voice tutor at the Royal Shakespeare Company and works regularly with many other major international theatre companies, including the Almeida Theatre, Shared Experience, Cheek-by-Jowl. Théâtre de Complicité and the Donmar Warehouse. Patsy Rodenburg's principal achievement has been in the training of actors for speaking Shakespeare for which she has given her all. She has an exceptional depth and breadth of experience in enabling actors to tackle this most difficult of tasks. She has shared her experience and methods unselfishly and has

disseminated her advice through four major books: The Right to Speak (1992), The Need for Words (1993), The Actor Speaks (1997) and Speaking Shakespeare (2002). In consequence, Patsy Rodenburg's lead has been followed in many parts of the world.

Patsy has played a significant part in enhancing Britain's enviable reputation for the quality of its theatre and its training for the performing arts. The great cultural institutions such as the RNT, the RSC and the Guildhall School, are central to sustaining this reputation and in delivering, through our cultural institutions, the economic and social benefits which profit the UK as a whole. But the most important resource are talented young people, and Patsy's work in developing the best acting talent makes her a vital ambassador for the UK and its culture. It is no exaggeration to say that very many of the actors who speak Shakespeare well on stage do so in consequence of her support and advice.

Reflections from Hilaire Benbow, MBE, DSC

We pleased to reproduce the following letter from Hilaire Benbow about his close association with the School.

'Now 80 years of age, I am delighted still to have the privilege of attending stage performances at the Guildhall School, which I have been doing since 1947 when the School was situated in John Carpenter Street, and to admire the versatility of the students as they pass through their courses. As a member of the Town Clerk's Office at Guildhall for 441/2 years, I used to write the fair copy of the Music Committee Minutes in ox gare (record ink) in the Minute Book in the early 1940s before joining the Navy, and remember Sir Henry Kimber, founder of the School's Gold Medal Awards, before he left the Corporation in 1949 after a membership of 50 years.

In the late 1950s and early 60s, I was responsible for the booking of the Guildhall for functions by outside bodies, subject to the approval of the City Lands Committee. One of our frequent applicants was Mr du Pré, a professional conference organiser, who would apply on behalf of such organisations as the Milk Marketing Board, and would end our telephone conversations by telling me, with

considerable pride, of the latest achievements and engagements of his daughter, Jaqueline.
