

Don Fox Park The first community park of Lebanon built in 1994. It is named after one of the city's mayors.




Prime Outlet Mall Opened in 1998, this mall houses over 50 outlet stores.

Circling the Square and Beyond...





1. On the Square

Statue of General Hatton

Located in the center of the square, the statue stands as a symbol of historic Lebanon. It was erected in 1912 by confederate veterans. General Robert H. Hatton was a graduate of Cumberland University, a lawyer, a state and U.S. representative and a first colonel of the 7th Tennessee Infantry Regiment. In 1862, he was killed at the Battle of Seven Pines in Richmond, Virginia; his body was finally returned to Lebanon in 1866 for reburial in Cedar Grove Cemetary.

Cabin of Neddy Jacobs

The cabin was occupied by Neddy Jacobs, a trapper, when he moved to the county in 1800. It is located at the mouth of the town spring, a source of natural water during the founding days of Lebanon. The cabin seen today was rebuilt in 2002 as a replica of the original. Open weekdays.

Law Office of Sam Houston

A plaque now honors the spot where the law office of the one-time Governor of Tennessee once stood as a log building until 1932. The office was rented by Houston in 1818 from then Postmaster Isaac Golladay. After leaving Tennessee, Houston moved to Texas where he led the Texas Army to victory over Mexico and became the President of the Republic of Texas in 1836.

The Arcade

Orginally deeded in 1831, the first structure on this site burned and was replaced in 1909 by this building known as a "mall." Today, the arcade is McCullough's Art Gallery. Open weekdays.

2. Archives

Genealogical Research facility. Open weekdays.

3. Train Depot

The first depot was built in 1869 for the Tennessee & Pacific Railroad. In 1877, the T & P was acquired by the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis. The Tennessee Central Railway brought its first train to Lebanon in 1902. A new depot was built in 1916 closer to downtown. The Tennessee and Pacific site is currently home to Shenandoah Mills.

4. Pickett Chapel

Built in 1827, Pickett Chapel Methodist Church is the oldest brick building and house dedicated to God in Lebanon. Originally the Lebanon Methodist Church, it was sold after the war to former slaves. The building was placed on the National Register of Historical Properties in 1977.

5. The Mill

Dr. H.K. Edgerton introduced the woolen industry into the town of Lebanon in 1908 to increase city revenue and employment. The first wool blankets were shipped to customers in 1910. The Lebanon Woolen Mills was closed in 1998 and is currently called the Mill at Lebanon.



6. A.P. Stewart Home

The home of the late General Alexander P. Stewart, a graduate of West Point Academy, a member of the faculty of Cumberland University and the highest ranking confederate general from Tennessee.

7. Robert L. Caruthers Home

Built in 1828, this original Greek Revival dwelling was the home of Robert Looney Caruthers, a founder of Cumberland University. Caruthers served in the State Legislature, the State Supreme Court and the Confederate Congress. Presently, the Caruthers house is home to Ligon & Bobo Funeral Home.

8. Fite-Fesseden House

Built in 1870 by Dr. James Fite, surgeon of the 7th



Tennessee Infantry, this building is a combination of Greek Revival and Italianate style and currently serves as the Wilson County museum.

9. Judge Nathan Green Home

Known as the father of equity jurisprudence, Judge Green was a member of the Supreme Court of Tennessee for twenty-one years. He was also a senator, Chancellor of East Tennessee in 1827 and served in the War of 1812. Green passed away here in 1866.

10. I.W.P. Buchanan House

Built in 1898, this Queen Anne architectural style

home, belonged to Isacc Williams Pleasant Buchanan, the first Headmaster at the Castle Heights School.

11. Site of Caruthers Hall Original site of the Cumberland University Law School.

12. Cumberland University

Founded in 1842 by the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, it housed schools for the study of arts, law and theology. The building was designed in 1844 by William Strickland and burnt down during the Civil War. The present university was rebuilt in 1896. Campus open daily.



13. Site of Castle Heights Military Academy

Originally Castle Heights School in 1902, it became a military academy in 1918. Castle Heights Military Academy closed in 1986, but many of its buildings have been restored, including "Old Main," now the **Lebanon City Hall/ Lebanon Museum and History Center** and **The Mitchell House**, home of one of the founders of Castle Heights School and the current location of Cracker Barrel Headquarters. Campus open daily.



14. City of Lebanon Museum and History Center

Located at the rear of the City Administration Building, the center was opened to the public in 2000.

15. William D. Baird Industrial Park

The first Industrial Park in Tennessee, established in the 1950s and named after one of Lebanon's former Mayors.

16. Cedar Grove Cemetery

This 19th century city cemetery contains the graves of the early city families, over 125 Confederate soldiers and Governor Campbell and Caruthers.

17. Fiddlers Grove

Located at the **James E. Ward Agricultural Center**, the grove is a village of over 40 restored or replicated historical buildings and artifacts which tell the story of Lebanon and Wilson County. Self-guided tours. Open daily.
