Art Collection

As previously reported, the painting "In the Studio" by **Hugh Henry Breckenridge** (1870-1937) was donated to the Sketch Club by Breckenridge's granddaughter and great-granddaughters. **Terry Newman** has generously offered to have it restored by Newman Galleries. Due to the painting's size (5' x 6') and its poor condition, restoration will take considerable time. Terry reports that the painting has been stabilized and that the in-painting by his staff is underway as time permits. Terry will keep us posted as they move ahead with this project. Pictures of this painting are posted in the library. Terry also generously had Newman Galleries repair the portrait of **Franz Lesshaft** by **Will Thomson** that had fallen and cracked. It is located over the door to the Pool Room in the foyer.

Annual Fund Drive

It's over, but if you missed it, you can still send in your contribution. The fund drive raised \$6,432 which is a record for recent years. These funds will be directed by the Board of Directors, and probably will be used mainly for the building improvements specified in our Preservation Plan.

Grant Committee Report

We are awaiting results of operating fund grant requests that have been filed with the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts and the Philadelphia Cultural Fund. For the building Preservation Plan, we have received funds from the Philadelphia Intervention Fund of Preservation Pennsylvania which is funded by the Pew Charitable Trusts (\$18,000), The Claneil Foundation (\$4,000), and the Dolfinger-McMahon Foundation (\$2,500). Our grant request with The Arcadia Foundation has been approved for \$25,000 and we will receive these funds in July. Our request to the Helen D. Groome Beatty Trust was turned down due to their receiving numerous requests and having limited funds. A grant request to the William Penn Foundation will be submitted before the end of January. We have asked John Milner Architects, Inc. to give us their proposal for preparing work specifications for the Priority One recommendations. We will then have contractors quote on this work with the hope of having it done this summer.

Archive Report

The Archives work party on January 20th started the New Year with a great response, thanks to **Charles Reeder, Bruce Bentzman, Jack Lucey, Art** and **Donna Ostroff**, and **Jim Crate**. Also our gratitude to **Bill Campbell**, he has completed the sorting and identification of two boxes of photographs from the Club's disorganized photo accumulation.* "D" **DiStefano** has donated another painting for auction the proceeds to benefit Archives. It will be archival framed and on display at the next several dinner meetings. Who's That? Walter Baum

Painter ~ 1884 - 1956

The mission of the Club is to encourage the creation and appreciation of fine art. Walter Emerson Baum not only achieved this mission but exceeded. From 1926 he began writing critiques of artist and exhibition reviews. He became the Art Editor for The Philadelphia Evening Bulletin and The Philadelphia Sunday Bulletin from 1929 until 1956. He also founded the Baum School of Art (1929 - formerly the Kline-Baum School of Art) and the Allentown Art Museum (1933 - formerly the Allentown Art Gallery). He assisted in the start many other art clubs, including the Circulating Picture Club. He has been called "The Father of Art in Lehigh Valley."

Instead of following in the family trade as a barber, he apprenticed himself to William T. Tego, and entered the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in 1910 (where he studied with Thomas Eakins and Thomas Anshutz), and, of course, became a member of our Club. He is best known for his landscapes. He won the Jennie Sesnan Gold Medal for best landscape at the Academy in 1925 (as well as an Honorable Mention from the Club in 1939).

His paintings hang in the James A. Michener Museum in the Lenfest Exhibition. "The Narrows" (1936, oil on canvas, 40" x 50") is one of [my] favorites. It portrays the old canal between the palisades and the Delaware River. This is a winter scene, a recurring theme, since Walter worked outdoors even during the worst winter storms. As one of his children tells it, "My father strapped an easel to his car's fender, a palette to his door and painted away while my mother relaxed in the backseat, reading novels." The painting has since been temporarily removed from the wall by the conservator.

Walter was married for 52 years and had four children. He was born and lived his entire life in Sellersville, Bucks County, PA. He was the editor of *The Sellersville Herald* from 1921 to 1942, and wrote a book about the history and heritage of Sellersville, *Two Hundred Years* (1938). He died here on July 12, 1956.

One of his last works was a scene of our Club's garden, the interior facing the north wall: "Mid-City Retreat" (casein on board, 24" x 30") which is currently in the collection of Mr. & Mrs. J. Lawrence Grim, Jr.

Also, we will accept paintings just before the monthly meeting in March, so if you like you can bring your work in between 5:30 pm and 6:00 pm on Friday, March 10th.

Memorial ~ Reginald E. Beauchamp

Reggie Beauchamp recently passed away at the age of 90. He was a long-time member of the PSC and took an active role in its affairs. For many years, he was Program Chairman and provided many interesting speakers for our monthly meetings. An extensive obituary notice appeared in *The Philadelphia Inquirer* after his death on December 20, 2000. As indicated in this notice, this tall and distinguished looking man was a combination of Benjamin Franklin and P. T. Barnum. His work as a sculptor included a bust of Connie Mack that is in the Baseball Hall of Fame, the Whispering Bell Tower at Seventh and Arch Streets, the Living Flame Memorial in Franklin Square, the Hero Mosaic in City Hall, a Vietnam War Memorial at Edison High School, and his 14 foot high bust of Ben Franklin covered with 80,000 pennies donated by school-children. This latter work stood for many years at Fourth and Arch Streets. His events included draping huge rolls of colored ribbon from the William Penn statue at City Hall to nearby buildings, turning the area into a huge maypole. In the commercial world, Reggie served as Director of Special Events for *The Evening Bulletin*. Reggie characterized the artistic flair and dedication of many past Sketch Club members. He will be missed, but his spirit will live on in our organization.
