# US paid Pakistan billions of dollars to counter terror (Khalid Hasan)

WASHINGTON: Pakistan has received billions of dollars in reimbursement for its support of US led counter terrorism operations, while Congress has appropriated billions of dollars to reimburse Pakistan for its support of counter-terrorism operations. According to an updated version of a Congressional Research Service (CRS) report on Pakistan, As of September 2006, a total of \$6.64 billion had been appropriated for FY2002-FY2007 Defence Department spending for coalition support payments to Pakistan and other cooperating nations. Pentagon documents indicate that disbursements to Islamabad account for the great majority of these funds: about \$3.6 billion for operations from January 2002 through August 2005, an amount roughly equal to one-quarter of Pakistans total military expenditures during that period..

GHULAM Ishaq Khan, who died in his hometown Peshawar on Friday at the ripe old age

of 91, was closely associated with the economic and political history of Pakistan almost ever since the countrys foundation. His training as a bureaucrat ensured that he would bring a certain encrusted conservatism to bear on political developments and he perhaps made no secret of his distaste for politicians, whom he believed to be inconstant. But, on the whole, Mr Ishaq Khans career as a bureaucrat and policymaker was far less controversial than the character it assumed after he was catapulted to the presidency following Gen Ziaul Haqs sudden death. Unfortunately, he then came to symbolise all that is wrong with our political system and state management at the top..

# **EDITORIAL:** Fighting terrorism for money

An official report released in Washington says Pakistan has received the lions share of a total of \$6.64 billion for 2002-2007 for the coalition fighting terrorism: about \$3.6 billion for operations from January 2002 through August 2005, an amount roughly equal to one quarter of Pakistans total military expenditures during that period. The report says that US Pakistan relations were subject to fluctuations until 9/11 but after 9/11 they improved remarkably because Pakistan became a key ally in US-led counter-terrorism efforts. Even though some Americans may not be very sanguine about the role Pakistan has played in trying to rid the world of Al Qaeda terrorists, important personalities in the US administration and Congress have praised Pakistan for taking up the cause by rounding up hundreds of very dangerous terrorists that no other country could have managed to do..

# 82 die as missiles rain on Bajaur: Pakistan owns up to strike; locals blame US drones

KHAAR Bajaur, Oct 30: Eighty two people were killed, 12 teenagers among them, in an air strike at a religious seminary in Damadola in the Bajaur tribal region on Monday morning. Pakistans military spokesman, Maj. Gen Shaukat Sultan, said those killed in the dawn attack were all militants and denied that there had been any collateral damage. The

operation, he said, was launched following intelligence reports that the seminary was being used as a training facility for terrorist activities. But local residents believe the air strike was carried out by fixed wing US drones which fired hellfire missiles at the compound, killing all those inside the seminary, including its administrator Maulvi Liaqat Ali. However, the military spokesman denied US involvement in the attack..

Jirgas on both sides of Pak-Afghan border: Kasuri to visit Kabul for talks

ISLAMABAD: Foreign Minister Khurshid Mahmood Kasuri will visit Afghanistan soon to hold talks for convening jirgas on both sides of the Pakistan Afghanistan border as agreed between President General Pervez Musharraf and his Afghan counterpart Hamid Karzai, said Foreign Office spokeswoman Tasneem Aslam during her weekly briefing on Monday. She expressed surprise over a reported statement by NATO commanders that attacks inside Afghanistan had increased following the North Waziristan peace accord. She said that this statement had come at a time when NATO itself was trying to conclude similar deals in Afghanistan..

DG ISPR Maj Gen Shaukat Sultan has confirmed that a madrassa was targeted by helicopter gunships and precision weapons. According to him, 70 to 80 militants were receiving military training in the madrassa though he said he could not yet confirm the number of dead. According to him the facility was far from the populated area and no women and children were inside during the early morning attack..It is ironic that the attack has come within two days of the reported deal between the local peace committee and the Mohmand tribe at a jirga attended by 3000 tribesmen and elders who had expressed loyalty to the country, vowed to ensure peace in the region and eliminate any foreign activist found in the area..
