I just wanted to update you on the IMAX situation and let you know that we are working hard to send a strong message to NILGOS (Waterfront building owners) and Sheridan (IMAX operators) that we want some action. We're also pushing the landlords to improve landscaping and architectural detailing of the building.

On a much more positive note... repair works to Bournemouth Pier's 'landing stages', which have been closed, will take place. We recognise what an important landmark this is and want to make sure boating services continue this summer.

The Pavilion will undergo refurbishment – including essential repairs to the stage, toilets revamp, theatre re-seating and foyer upgrade – work is likely to start early next year.

Last year's 'Great Bournemouth Debate' showed us how much you care about civic pride, the quality of our environment (four Blue Flags, six Seaside Awards and seven Green Flags) and how important it is to maintain these high standards. Find out how we're ensuring cleaner streets on pages 26 and 27.

We've appointed architects for the Winter Gardens who have an international reputation. The Council's learnt lessons from private developments and it's essential that the scheme sits well in the locality. That's why we've undertaken a major study of the Exeter Road area to make sure all the plans for development in that area fit together. See pages 9 and 10.

I hope you enjoy this edition; the next one will be with you between 27 June and 10 July.

Measuring up our services – we may be phoning you...

Last autumn we started a programme of regular monthly surveys with residents and parks users designed to give you the chance to tell us how you rate some of our key services. Now we've rolled the programme out even further to include benefits applicants, tenants, seafront visitors and callers to our cleansing and waste customer service centre.

Beach and parks visitors may be approached in person during their visit whilst all other surveys will be carried out by our research partners, Hill Taylor, who will phone a random sample of customers who have recently used the other services. Hill Taylor will also contact residents in general to give them the chance to have their say about more universal services such as refuse, street cleansing and roads.

Deputy Leader of the Council, Cllr Adrian Fudge said "Your input is vital so if you receive a call please try to spare the time to help us improve our services. Our researchers will take just a few minutes to ask some simple questions about how satisfied you were with various aspects of the service you received. Your opinions will be used to tailor our services to meet your needs more closely."

Hill Taylor act as an independent researcher so you will never be identified by your responses and your details will never be passed onto any other company. The feedback from this research will be

reported directly to the managers responsible and will, in turn, be used to set future performance targets. We will be publishing the targets in future editions of this magazine along with regular updates of how you are continuing to rate us, so you can see how we measure up.

Council round-up

Here's a round-up of decisions that have been made by your Council recently:

THERAPIST'S SLING DESIGN ADOPTED

One of our Occupational Therapists has been instrumental in the design of a new hoist sling which is already making life easier for disabled people and their carers.

Teresa Stanley's inspirational idea was taken to the drawing board by Liftech Systems Limited whose industrial expertise enabled the concept to become reality. Prototypes were designed, manufactured and trialled with Community Care service users. This customer research contributed to the development of the new product, known as the Stanley Combination Sling. Its design and construction provides comfort for the user and significantly reduces the time a carer needs to provide personal care.

The working partnership between the Council and the Totton-based company enabled the project to move from original idea to finished product within three months.

IN SICKNESS AND IN HEALTH

Carers Week takes place from 12–18 June focusing on the health and emotional wellbeing of people who look after a sick or disabled relative, partner or friend. The 2006 theme, In Sickness and in Health, reinforces the notion that, for many, caring is not about choice. It also aims to highlight the effects that caring can have and support people in their caring role. Bournemouth's Community Care Services are planning a variety of events for carers including complementary therapy sessions and practical hints on how to keep healthy.

The Carers Week programme includes a special evening event for carers who also work outside of the home. 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MAKING WAY for arts and culture

Work started on clearing the Winter Gardens site in March. The initial work included removal of asbestos from some areas of the building and securing the site, with fencing put in place. Demolition of the redundant building is now well underway, and all site preparation work will be completed towards the end of May. Over the summer, while designs are being worked on, we plan to use the site as a car park, bringing in income until work can start next year.

HE EDEN PROJECT

Large casino bid submitted

The perfect location, the right economy and the ideal time – that's Bournemouth's message in our bid to host the best 'large casino' on the south coast.

Our bid has now been submitted to the Casino Advisory Panel, which will decide where the country's one regional (super), eight 'large' and eight 'small' casinos will be.

We are keen to ensure the town realises all the associated regeneration benefits of one of the country's first large casinos, if the bid for a licence is successful. The Council, as the Planning and Licensing Authority, would expect to choose between several rival bids with criteria including the quality of the scheme and the level of regeneration benefits.

The final scheme, which would not be decided until spring 2007, will be a major new tourist attraction for Bournemouth giving a significant boost to the local economy. It is forecast to attract 750,000 visits per year and will create up to 900 jobs.

As well as a casino with up to 40 gaming tables and 150 gaming machines, any development would

be likely to include quality restaurants and other attractions, including something for children (away from the gambling area, of course). The casino itself would offer more than just gaming – there could be relaxation zones offering massage and music for example, free internet and iPod connection, and services such as shoe shine and car valeting. The Bournemouth Area Hospitality

Association, Bournemouth Tourism Action Group and Bournemouth Chamber of Trade & Commerce all support the application, and around a third of residents said they would be likely to visit the attraction, when surveyed through the Bournemouth Citizens Panel.

The development will generate many well paid job opportunities for local people both in the direct operation of the casino and the extensive associated leisure facilities and as a result of an increased demand for tourism in the area.

The bid also highlights the fact that, despite Bournemouth being the UK's top holiday destination, the need to reinvent itself is essential to keep people returning and attract new visitors. It is time for this reinvention and a large casino is an ideal way to do it. We now have a long wait until the New Year, when the Advisory Panel will make its announcements.

BRINGING TOGETHER DEVELOPMENTS INTO ONE CULTURAL VISION

A study has recently been undertaken to look at the developments proposed in the Exeter Road area of the town. The result is the production of the draft 'Exeter Road Design and Development Strategy', which looks at the existing character and use of the area and from this develops a vision for the overall vicinity.

With the New Winter Gardens as a centre-piece, we're looking at creating a cultural quarter for the town with better links to the gardens, BIC and beach. We've been advised by the Design Review Panel South West that this study is necessary to ensure that all developments are considered as part of the overall strategy for the area.

Looking at issues such as capacity for development, affordable housing, pedestrian, vehicle and public transport in the area, the study aims to bring together all these aspects as there is significant pressure for development in the Exeter Road/Bath Road area. Proposed developments include:

- The New Winter Gardens Arts and Education Centre
- Terrace Mount residential scheme
- Bournemouth Hotel School
- Exeter Road leisure development
- The Pavilion Theatre/Bath Road North development

Consultation has already taken place with local landowners, residents, councillors, and developers, who were invited to attend workshops and a 'walkabout' of the town centre. But you can have your say too! 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
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FREE BUS TRAVEL for the over 60s

There's good news for those of you who are over 60, with the introduction of free local off peak bus travel so that you can travel around after 9.30am on weekdays and at weekends or bank holidays without any time restrictions.

With the help of some additional funding from the Government, we've improved the previous half fare bus travel scheme now giving you free travel within the borough. And recognising that many people need to travel across borough boundaries, we're keeping the 'Connect' scheme so you can travel in the Bournemouth and Poole area and on journeys outside the boroughs, as long as you don't need to change buses.

If you're an existing 'Connect' travel card holder you should have automatically received your new pass. If you haven't, do let us know, it may be that we haven't got your latest contact details.

I haven't had a travel card before, how do I get one?

Request an application form and return it to us with a recent passport sized photograph of yourself, proof of age and permanent residency. We'll then post your free travel card directly to you.

How do I use my free travel card?

Just show it to the driver each time you get on the bus. Remember you must always show your 'Connect' card or you will be asked to pay the full fare.

Can I use the pass on any local bus?

Yes, all local bus operators are participating in the scheme. This includes Yellow Buses, Wilts & Dorset (including More and Route ONE services), First, South West Coaches, Shamrock, Damory Coaches, Verwood Bus and Roadliner.

Which areas are covered?

The 'Connect' scheme is jointly operated by Bournemouth and Poole councils. You can therefore hop on and off buses as often as you wish within this combined Bournemouth and Poole area. Providing that travel is not before 9:30 am on a normal weekday, journeys will be free.

Can I use my Connect card on journeys that go outside of the Bournemouth/Poole area?

Yes, providing that your journey either starts or finishes in Bournemouth/Poole and no additional change of bus is required.

What if I need to travel before 9.30 am on a weekday?

During the morning peak time you will have to pay the full fare on the bus and no discount will be available. However, remember that your return journey will usually be after 9.30 am and therefore free. Blind and partially sighted residents can continue to have free travel without any time restriction.

What if I can't travel by bus?

More local buses are offering low floor access, which makes it easier to use buses if your mobility is impaired. If you require assistance to travel you may be entitled to a companion travel card. (Details are given on the travel card application form.)

However, if you are unable to use buses because of a problem with your mobility, you may qualify for National Travel tokens as an alternative to use on local taxi journeys. You will need to supply medical evidence. Full details are provided on the application form.

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Bournemouth goes to chelsea

The Parks and Gardens team are gearing up for a special trip after being invited to attend the RHS Chelsea Flower Show 2006 in May, and they've called upon Bournemouth and Poole College students to help them create a show-stopping display.

Chris Evans, Manager at Kings Park Nursery is heading up the Chelsea team and says they have been working hard on the design to come up with something really spectacular for the show. "It's a highly theatrical three dimensional display based on the Bournemouth motto 'beautiful and healthy' and encompasses the healthy lifestyle of Bournemouth residents and visitors."

The 10m x 10m display features five giant pieces of fruit and veg made out of cut flowers measuring three metres high which the floristry students at The College have created. These nestle in a giant willow basket which is surrounded by real fruit and vegetables spelling out the well known phrase '5 a day'.

Circling this are three sections depicting 'work, rest and play' planted in carpet bedding with points of the compass facing North, South, East and West. The different sections include the Bournemouth Coat of Arms, a typical beach scene with a giant deck chair and finally a hand crafted sand sculpture depicting a surfer riding a wave. The colourful and quirky bedding display will be sure to stand out at the show with its clever use of carpet bedding, cut flowers, props and novel portrayal of healthy living.

Sue Clarke, floristry tutor said, "The College has been very well represented at the Chelsea Flower Show over the years, and we are thrilled to have been asked to join Bournemouth Council for 2006. The designs are very creative and should look quite spectacular when complete. It will put The College and the town on the map."

- When making up hanging baskets, think about putting an old saucer or piece of thick plastic on the bottom to create a small reservoir.
- Water baskets, containers and troughs every day, even if it's rained. It may seem pointless, but rain will only penetrate the top couple of centimetres of the soil.
- Being careful about water is a big priority for everyone. Water butts are quite cheap these days and soft rainwater is the best there is! 'Grey water' is another alternative, using old bath water or washingup water. Be careful though if any products with a

high salt content have been added. There are now products on the market which can pump water out of baths to be used in the garden.

- Use a good compost to make the baskets, if you don't put a slow release fertilizer in; start feeding the plants after eight weeks every week with a high potash feed.
- Don't over-plant your displays, it can often lead to plants rotting off later in the season due to lack of light and air. A well-planted display can often last right through to October.





Child Safety Week – Monday 19 June to Sunday 25 June 2006

Accidental injury is a leading cause of death among children in the UK. Last year, around 300 children and young people were killed in accidents, that's five times as many children as were killed by family abuse or neglect, and 15 times as many children as were killed by strangers.

Accidental injury also puts more children in hospital than any other cause. Every day, around 300 children are admitted to hospital because of their injuries - that's over 100,000 children every year. Many children are left scarred for life or permanently disabled.

The tragedy is that many of these deaths and serious injuries can be prevented.

The theme of Child Safety Week this year is 'Avoid the worst. Put child safety first'. We have chosen this theme because – in our busy lives – it's all too easy to overlook child safety until the worst happens. Far better to put child safety on your priority list now, before a child is seriously hurt or, worse still, killed in an accident which could have been prevented.

Independent market research has found that Child Safety Week has the highest recall levels of awareness weeks held in June. Half of parents polled said they have acted to make things safer for their children as a direct result of the awareness week. Parents say: *"It opened my eyes to dangers that I wouldn't even have thought of until now"*

"I learned that the things I would have done could have put my baby in danger"

"It made us look around our house to check that we had all the safety equipment mentioned"

Home Safety Checklist

More accidents happen in the summer, on a Sunday and in the evening or when people are in a hurry, under stress or in unfamiliar surroundings. This checklist has been compiled to raise your awareness of general safety in your home and on the roads.

General Safety

We have a smoke alarm and know how/when to check it (they save lives but only when they work)

Medicines are put away immediately after use and kept in a lockable medicine cabinet (we always remember to read the label and they are safely disposed of when their shelf life date has expired)

Living and Dining Room

Hot meals or drinks are always placed out of the reach of young children and pets (they can seriously scald if tipped over)

There are no trailing leads or damaged plugs (someone could trip up or get electrocuted)

Halls and Stairs

The hall and stairs are free from clutter (shoes, trainers, school bags, so no one falls down the stairs)

There is a safety chain fitted (it gives us time to check who is at the door before deciding whether to let them in or not)

Kitchen

All household cleaning chemicals are poisonous, so they are stored safely where younger children can't get to them (fit locks to cupboards that contain them and buy containers with child-proof tops)

We always wash our hands before eating or preparing food (food poisoning can kill)

Bathroom

A non-slip mat may be useful in the bath/shower (to prevent injuries from slipping over)

Razor blades are stored safely after use and out of reach of young children

Bedroom

Candles are treated with respect and lamps are used safely and never covered with material to dim the light (they could catch fire)

We try to encourage sleeping with our bedroom doors closed (to stop the smoke spreading into our rooms if there is a fire)

In the Garden

Where provided, ponds or pools are 'child safe' (toddlers have been known to drown in a puddle)

We make sure we wash our hands after playing in the garden (soil carries harmful organisms like tetanus and toxocara – which can cause blindness)

On the Road

Seat belts and child seats are always used for every person when travelling in a car (we are 90% less likely to be killed if we are wearing properly fitted seat belts and the person in front has a better chance of survival as well)

Roads are always crossed safely **stop, look, listen and think** (of the 500 children and young people killed on Britain's roads in 1996 HALF of them were pedestrians)

Facts

- At least one person under 18 dies each week in a house fire.
- About 800 younger people are hurt in falls every day, many falls happen on the stairs.
- 37% of burns and scalds happen to the under five's and many more to young people.
- Once a fortnight one child under five dies from drowning – some in the bath.
- Every year 40,000 young people accidentally swallow pills and chemicals.
- Every year young people fall out of unlocked windows. Make sure they lock but can be unlocked in case of fire.
- Many accidents happen in the garden. Every year young people drown in ponds and pools.
- During 1996, 500 children and young people were killed on Britain's roads.

BUSINESS RATES EXPLAINED

Continuing our regular articles about the Council's finances, this edition we're looking at business rates, how these are calculated and what they pay for.

What are business rates?

Business rates, otherwise known as national nondomestic rates (NNDR), is a tax on properties used as shops, factories and offices for example.

You may have to pay business rates if you use all or part of your property as something other than living accommodation. If your property is used for both domestic and non-domestic purposes part of it will be assessed for business rates and the other part for council tax, a pub is a good example of where this would apply.

How are business rates calculated?

All business properties have a rateable value, which is determined by the Valuation Office Agency. We calculate your bill by multiplying the rateable value of your property by a factor set by the Government (expressed as pence in the pound) which is known as the multiplier. We then apply any relief that you might be entitled to, and come up with a final figure for your bill.

What is the money spent on?

We collect business rates on behalf of the Government and the money collected is shared out to each local authority depending on their population. This means that areas with very few businesses will not be disadvantaged. Business rates, together with council tax contribute to the costs of local services such as roads, police and the fire.

Working around the clock for a cleaner borough

We're leading the way in cleanliness as work continues on the 'big spring clean'. This is an annual event which helps to prepare the town for the huge influx of visitors through the summer months. This year we're paying extra attention to Old Christchurch Road, Horseshoe Common and St Peter's Road.

We're continuing to focus on keeping streets clean of unsightly chewing gum. It's notoriously difficult to lift from pavements and precincts but removal teams have been working through the night. Street furniture including benches, litter bins, planters, bollards and lampposts are being steam-cleaned as well. Cllr John Hayter, Cabinet Member for Strategic Development and Transport said, "Cleaner streets is one of our service improvement priorities and we are proactive when it comes to keeping the borough clean and tidy. Last year we were recognised as a resort with clean streets as well as clean beaches by the environmental campaign 'Keep Britain Tidy'. To keep this status we will continue to carry out projects within the community to make sure our standards remain high for both residents and visitors."

Stop, don't drop!

In line with the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act we have set up an enforcement team who will work seven days a week to deal with waste and litter enforcement issues and who will give fixed penalty notices to anyone found to be littering.

- 3am until 10am coastal

- 5pm until 9.30pm coastal cleansing team



Safe and Clean teams were set up near the end of last year to deal with fly tipping, rubbish. vandalism and graffiti in particular. A four man team work across Boscombe and Springbourne to ensure that it is kept clean and tidy. We had a chat with Danny, Andy, Leon and John:

Tell us what is involved in your iob?

"We are a small team of four who go around Boscombe and Springbourne collecting bulky goods that people have dumped. We collect all kinds of abandoned items such as fridges, washing machines, beds, sofas, televisions and more!

What is the response time?

"We have a 24 hour response rate to calls but when we have an emergency call out we respond immediately, this is usually when we get a report that needles have been dumped."

What's the best thing about your job?

"It's a rewarding job – you can actually see the difference that we've made over the last six months."

And the worst?

"Handling needles has to be the worst thing but we're trained to do this and at least it means they're not left on the street."

- The chewing gum removal programme will cover 17,000 square metres.
- We removed 1.8 million pieces of chewing gum from Bournemouth and Boscombe precincts last year.
- There are around 400 wheelie bins on the promenade during the summer months and in one day we can go through 200 large bin bags.

FIP TOP BEACH

Keeping our beaches clean and tidy is a top priority all year round. We caught up with Tony Harris, Cleansing Supervisor to find out what his team do:

How does your day start?

"We start the day at 3am litter picking on the promenade and beach. Depending on the tide we can find all kinds of things that have been washed up and need removing. It's such a lovely site when the sand has just been raked, it looks immaculate."

Do people work throughout the day?

"Yes, we can have one shift of workers working from 3am until 10am and then another shift working from about 5pm until around 9.30pm. In addition to this we have a team working throughout the day, emptying the bins and picking up litter and just keeping an eye on rubbish."

How many people keep the seafront clean?

"There are six of us employed full time throughout the year, however during the summer months we have to employ around 20 extra agency staff who are all dedicated to keeping the seafront looking spotless."

What's the best thing about your job?

"Working on the seafront in the summer has to be a benefit for anybody. The best part of the job is seeing Bournemouth being awarded for its clean beaches because we know that we have contributed to this."

And the worst?

"Dealing with those who just don't care. It's rewarding to see the seafront at sunrise however it's a totally

different sight when the sun sets and people have left a mountain of rubbish behind. It's the same feeling that you get when you've just cleaned your house and someone walks in with dirty shoes on!"

SELF HARM BOOKLET LAUNCHED

Over recent years there has been a rise in the levels of self-harm in young people. However, many people don't know where to go to get help and support. For this reason The Self Harm Action Group was set up and they recently launched 'The Little Book of Self Harm' at The K Bar. This was perfect timing as it was also National Self Injury Day which aims to raise awareness of this issue and the ways that you can get help.

The book is aimed at young people who are self harmers as well as those who just want to know more about the subject. It covers why people self harm, gives a real life story and offers some helpful tips and advice to try

and cope. It also provides some interesting facts and figures such as:

- Most of the females that self harm are aged between 14 and 19 years
- Males that self harm tend to be aged 17-25
- People self harm to relieve tension, because they are angry, to punish themselves, because the feel out of control and for many other reasons
- Four times more females than males self harm

Zoe aged 14 says, "Self harm could affect us all on some level. As people we have the ability to punish ourselves and numb our feelings."

The young people involved in this project took responsibility for different aspects of the booklet including researching information, designing, fundraising and finally distribution.

AREA FOCUS ON LITLEDOWN

Littledown is unique in that it's one of the newest but also one of the oldest parts of Bournemouth. Originally it was a small settlement to the south of the much more important Holdenhurst Village, and for centuries it existed as a huddle of farm buildings clinging on to the edge of the heathland.

Amongst this ancient landscape, most of the housing that makes up Littledown is less than 20 years old. The buildings at the JPMorgan site and Royal Bournemouth Hospital are of a similar age, but in Riverside Avenue there is a mid-20th century home for retired nurses, and even older is Littledown House, which dates back to the late 18th century.

For most of the 20th century, Littledown remained an isolated farming community on the northern edge of Bournemouth, with Mr Joseph Edward Cooper-Dean living in Littledown House. Within living memory, Littledown used to be an area of open fields but by this time, the Cooper-Dean family story was drawing to an end. The only descendants were two spinster sisters and Littledown House, with the surrounding farmland, was sold to Bournemouth Council in the early 1980s. There was a lot of discussion as to what the Council would do with the area but eventually much of the land was sold off for housing. A large section was set by for a park and a sports centre and it's now the ever popular Littledown Leisure Centre.

Littledown House, a listed building, survives and has recently been restored to the elegance it would have displayed in the late 18th century, when it would have been a classic Jane Austen type mansion. With all the new buildings that now cover Littledown, it can be difficult to imagine it as farmland, but drivers on the Spur Road can look out for a set of warning lights near to the back of the hospital site. When the Spur Road was first built, it cut off the Cooper Dean land at Littledown from their farms at Holdenhurst. One of the concessions to the family was that the road was built with a cattle crossing. No one seems to recall it ever being used, however the old agreement remains in force, so if one of your colleagues turns up late to work one day because of cows on the Spur Road, they could well be telling the truth!

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YOUR LETTERS – PHONE MASTS

ROBERT FROM SOUTHBOURNE

"I'm angry that the Council is letting phone masts go up around Bournemouth without planning permission, such as the Vodaphone mast in Fisherman's Avenue. Why are you allowing this to happen?"

A: The Government has allowed phone masts up to 15 metres tall to be erected without full planning permission and this is called Prior Approval Consent. In these cases the Local Planning Authority can only refuse masts and equipment on grounds of siting and appearance. If we're unhappy then we have 56 days from when consent was sought to notify the company. We considered the Vodaphone proposal and concluded that it was unacceptable. An error in the notification letter that Prior Approval was refused has allowed Vodaphone to exploit a 'loophole' in the procedure and erect the proposed mast despite documented opposition from us and the local community. Our internal processes have been tightened to ensure this doesn't happen again.

SALLY-ANN FROM STROUDEN PARK

"I have three young children and I'm worried about the effects that phone masts have on my family's health. The Council needs to listen to public concern and protect us from this dangerous equipment."

A: Concerns about health risks of phone masts is not something the Council is allowed to take into

account when considering any planning applications or Prior Approval Consents. However, we do check that applicants have the appropriate health certificates.
