#### I.I Purpose

This Community Development profile is intended to help the community, elected representatives, service providers and government agencies better understand the diverse nature of Banana Shire and the possible social, economic and environmental issues they may face now and in the future.

- ♦ A Community Survey to residents in the Council.

# 2 Location

The town of **Thangool** is located 12km south of Biloela, 153km south of Rockhampton and 577km north-west of Brisbane.

### 2.1 History

The history of the Thangool district goes back to the years of the famous Archer brothers, Charles and William who explored this area in 1853, on the advice of Ludwig Leichhardt. The party travelled from Eidsvold and followed the creeks to the Fitzroy River.

In the 1850's and 1860's, a small group of speculative pioneers acquired very large areas of land and launched into tentative efforts at sheep raising. This was eventually discarded in favour of cattle.

Thangool was surveyed in July, 1925. Storekeepers moved in soon after and, because of the uncertainty of new settlements, started in primitive shops constructed of corrugated iron and logs. During the 1930's, Thangool consisted of two hotels, a barber



and billiard saloon, two bakeries, two butcher shops, a picture theatre, two garages, a cordial factory, a School of Arts, a blacksmith's shop, a police station, a bank and a school. The cotton industry, being labour intensive at the time, was the cause of the 'boom'.

#### 2.2 Description

Thangool is best known for its aerodrome, race track and proximity to Mt Scoria. With daily flights to and from Brisbane, Thangool is the gateway to the Callide Valley. The Thangool Race Course is the main track in the shire, the fourth largest in the central region and hold regular meetings.

Thangool has diversity in local small businesses including Service Station, Two Hotels, Post Office, Two licensed Carpenters, Backhoe and Truck Hire, Aircraft Refuelling, welding/prefabrication, two environmental clean up businesses and Squab Processors

The average annual rainfall of the area is 700mm (28 inches), but tends to be erratic in distribution. However, when seasonal conditions are favourable, excellent yields of all grain crops are harvested. The most important dryland (rain grown) crops are sorghum and wheat although cotton, sunflower, barley and mung beans are also grown. The principal irrigated crops are cotton, lucerne, sorghum, wheat and beans (both navy and French).

Thangool is central to the Squab industry in Queensland due to the establishment of Queensland Squab Processors by a local family. QSP now supply over 60% of the Australian market.

Herb production for the food service industry is also a new Queensland Industry that was developed by Thangool farmers. Herbs from the CD Herb members are export through out the world. The majority of the herbs are supplied for Gourmet Garden products.

Mt Scoria (meaning place of Fused Metals) is a rare rock formation. At 150 metres high, Mt Scoria was once the core of a volcano. Banana Shire Council

#### 2.3 Executive Summary of Key Census Results

- On census night, 12,439 people were counted at home in Banana Shire (92% of the population). Proportions in the UCLs ranged from a high of 96.3% in **Thangool**, to a low of 86.4% in Baralaba.
- At 30 June 2001 nearly one-quarter (24.0%) of the estimated resident population of Banana Shire were aged 0-14 years, a total of 3,469 children. Within the region, Banana Shire Rural had the largest number of children (1,436), however, **Thangool** had the highest proportion (31.7%).
- Within the region, Biloela had the largest number of people born in all five regions, while Baralaba, **Thangool** and Theodore all recorded small numbers of people with birthplaces outside Australia.
- ♦ In Banana Shire, 1,455 people (10.9%) stated that they had no religion. Tis compares to a high of 13.8% in **Thangool** and a love of 5.7% in Theodore.
- In Banana Shire there were 1,786 couple families with children, accounting for half of all families occupied private dwellings. **Thangool** recorded the highest proportion of couple families with children (53.6%), while in Baralaba only 38.8% of families fell into this category.
- In 2001, there were 1,329 couple families without children 37.7% of Banana Shire's population. Over half of all families in Baralaba were couples without children (52.2%) the only UCL were couple families *without* children outnumbered couple families *with* children. Thangool recorded the lowest proportion of couple families without children (28.6%).
- There were 1,000 people living alone in Banana Shire during 2001, 8.3% of the population. Biloela was the UCL with the most lone persons (422 people), however, Theodore recorded the highest percentage (18.3%). In contrast, 5.6% of the population in **Thangool** lived alone (the lowest proportion).
- Over one-quarter (26.1%) of Banana Shire's population consisted of children under 15 years, while a further 3.3% were dependent students aged 15-24 years. Children under 15 years comprised 34.2% of **Thangool's** population (the highest proportion). Baralaba recorded the lowest proportion with 18.9%.
- Average occupancy rates for separate houses within Banana Shire (2.7) varied from a high of 3.0 in **Thangool** to a low of 2.3 people per dwelling in Baralaba and Theodore.
- ♦ Townhouse occupancy rates varied from 1.7 in Biloela and Thangool to 1.4 in Moura. Baralaba and Banana Shire Rural recorded no townhouse occupation.
- Unit occupancy rates experienced the greatest variation, ranging from an average of 2.8 people in **Thangool** to just 1.1 people in Moura.
- At the 2001 Census there were 5,717 private dwellings counted in Banana Shire, including 791 unoccupied dwellings (13.8% of the stock). Unoccupied dwellings contributed to 17.5% of total dwelling stock in Moura (the highest proportion), but only 7.6% in **Thangool** (the lowest proportion).
- Over three-quarters of private dwellings in Banana Shire were separate houses, a total of 4,345 dwellings. In comparison, **Thangool** (86.4%) had the highest proportion of separate houses, while Baralaba had the lowest proportion (64.1%).
- Of the UCLs, Biloela recorded the highest number of approvals for both houses and other dwellings. In **Thangool** and Theodore, no dwellings were approved between September quarter 2002 and June quarter 2003.
- ♦ Of the 4.920 occupied private dwellings in Banana Shire, 2,056 (41.8%) were fully owned. This compared to 59.8% in Baralaba (the highest proportion) and 30.0% in **Thangool** (the lowest proportion).

- ♦ A further 990 dwellings (20.1% of the stock) were being purchased in Banana Shire. The proportion of dwellings being purchased was highest in **Thangool** (39.1%) and lowest in Baralaba (9.4%).
- Thangool's usual residents in non-private dwellings were split entirely between hotel/motel (50%) and nurse/staff quarters (50%), while Moura recorded a very high proportion of usual residents in nurse/staff quarters (82.9%).
- ♦ In 2001, there were 1,989 low-income earners (between \$1 and \$199 per week) in Banana Shire 19.6% of the population. Theodore (24.3%) had the highest proportion of low-income earners, while **Thangool** had the lowest proportion (15.9%). There were also 699 people (6.9%) in Banana Shire with negative or nil income.
- ◊ In 2001, the unemployment rate in Banana Shire was 4.9%. In Baralaba this proportion was 11.9% (15 people), compared to an unemployment rate of just 2.1% (3 people) in **Thangool**.
- There were 4,668 people (46% of those aged 15 years and over) working full-time in Banana Shire, and 1,756 people (17.3%) working part-time. In contrast, Banana Shire Rural had the largest proportion of full-time workers (49.2%), while Baralaba had the lowest (30.4%). Proportions of part-time workers ranged from a high of 22.8% in Thangool, to a low of 15.2% in Baralaba.
- There were 721 people living in Banana Shire who were employed in retail trades (10.8% of employed people). **Thangool** had the highest proportion of retail trade employment (16.7%) while Banana Shire Rural had the lowest (6.9%).
- The largest number of people with a bachelor degree was in Biloela (292 people or 7.0%), while in Baralaba and **Thangool** very few people had a bachelor degree in 2001.
- Nearly two-thirds of people aged 15 years and over in Banana Shire had no qualifications or were still studying (6,424 people or 63.3%). This percentage was highest in **Thangool** (70.8%) and lowest in Moura (59.0%).
- In Theodore (25.1%) and Baralaba (21.2%), significantly higher proportions of employed persons walked to work than in Banana Shire as a whole (7.1%). Thangool recorded a minimal number of employed persons who walked to work.
- There were 917 people (13.7% of employed people) in Banana Shire who worked from home in 2001. The majority of these were in Banana Shire Rural (821 people), while Baralaba, Thangool and Theodore recorded small numbers of people working from home.
- ♦ A further 34.8% of dwellings in Banana Shire had two vehicles parked on Census night, with proportion in the region ranging from 42.7% in **Thangool** to 27.3% in Theodore.
- ♦ In 2001, over three-quarter of private dwellings in Banana Shire were occupied by family households. Of the UCLs, **Thangool** recorded the highest proportion (82.1%), while Theodore had the lowest proportion (60.2%).
- Conversely, Theodore had the highest proportion of lone person households (36.5%), while **Thangool** had the lowest proportion (15.1%). In Banana Shire as a whole, 21.5% of occupied private dwellings were lone person households.
- ♦ Low-income households (less than \$300 a week) made up 11.8% of all households in Banana Shire. This compared to a high of 18.6% in Baralaba, and a low of 6.9% in **Thangool**.
- Computer usage at home ranged from a high of 40.6% in Banana Shire Rural to a low of 17.4% in Baralaba. Internet usage at home was highest in **Thangool** (19.3%) and lowest in Baralaba (3.9%).

- Call public meeting for citizens over 55 years

- Ask them to decide on a future group
- Establish Senior Citizens Group

#### Issue: Establishing a positive town culture

#### ✓ Solutions:

- Showcasing the local talent
- Promote a welcome friendly culture for visitors and new residents
- Recognising and articulating towns positive attributes (glass half full)



#### **Prioritising of Solutions**

The community prioritised the identified solutions through a prioritisation tool. The tool asked four questions in relation to the possible implementation of the solution. Each question was rated using a score of: None = 0, Minimal = 1, Adequate = 2, Outstanding = 3. (See attachment for Prioritisation Tool)

The following table represents the score for each of the identified solutions. The highest scoring solutions are highlighted in green. These solutions have been selected to be implemented in the first year of the plan. Each year the community will review the solutions for the next year.
