**AMERICAN MOVIE CRITICS:** An Anthology From the Silents Until Now, edited by Phillip Lopate. (Library of America, \$40.) A century of film through the eyes of the country's best critics.

**THE BIG BAM:** The Life and Times of Babe Ruth, by Leigh Montville. (Doubleday, \$26.95.) Ruth's on-field genius and outsize personality set baseball on the path to its prime-time glory.

**SPALDING'S WORLD TOUR,** by Mark Lamster. (PublicAffairs, \$26.) Lamster rollickingly recreates the exhibition baseball tour that Albert Goodwill Spalding led around the globe in 1888-89.

**L'AMERICA,** by Martha McPhee. (Harcourt, \$25.) An Italian boy and an American girl, in love with each other and with each other's countries.

**DOING NOTHING:** A History of Loafers, Loungers, Slackers, and Bums in America, by Tom Lutz. (Farrar, Straus & Giroux. \$25.) A study of our attitudes about working and slacking.

**BLACK MAESTRO,** by Joe Drape. (Morrow/HarperCollins, \$24.95.) A galloping biography of the cosmopolitan black jockey Jimmy Winkfield, who won the Kentucky Derby in 1901 and 1902.

**MOONLIGHT HOTEL,** by Scott Anderson. (Doubleday, \$24.95.) In a fictional third-world country, an American villain stirs up a war bearing traces of several recent real-world conflicts.

**THE HERETIC,** by Miguel Delibes. (Overlook, \$25.95.) This absorbing novel of the Inquisition delights in the details of 16th-century Spanish life.

**ROUGH CROSSINGS:** Britain, the Slaves and the American Revolution, by Simon Schama. (Ecco/HarperCollins, \$29.95.) An account of the thousands of runaway slaves who served the British crown in hopes of securing their freedom.

**LA PERDIDA**, *by Jessica Abel (Pantheon*, \$19.95.). The heroine of this graphic narrative seeks intuitive kinship with Mexican culture, but grim reality intrudes on her folkloric illusions.

**LATE BLOOMER,** by C. Tyler (Fantagraphics, \$28.95.) A collection of graphic work amounting to a wise autobiographical sketch of the cartoonist as she struggles with life and motherhood.

# Paperback Row

THEY MADE AMERICA: From the Steam Engine to the Search Engine — Two Centuries of Innovators, by Harold Evans with Gail Buckland and David Lefer. (Back Bay/Little, Brown, \$18.95.) Sir Harold, the historian, publisher and journalist, follows up "The American Century" (1998) with absorbing profiles of Americans from the Wright brothers to Bill Gates, whose inventiveness changed the way we live. The author sees innovation as "a distinguishing characteristic of the United States" - both a product of and a contributor to American society. Originally published as an illustrated large-format volume, "They Made America" was the basis of a four-part television series for PBS in 2004. "This is a rich, wide-ranging work," Neil Genzlinger wrote in the Book Review.

**THE BOY WHO LOVED ANNE FRANK,** by Ellen Feldman. (Norton, \$13.95.) Feldman's imaginative novel about Peter van Daan, one of Anne Frank's companions in the secret annex, imagines what his life might have been like if he'd survived to take on a new identity as a gentile in postwar America. (The real Peter died in a concentration camp in 1945.)

AHMAD'S WAR, AHMAD'S PEACE: Surviving Under Saddam, Dying in the New Iraq, by Michael Goldfarb. (Carroll & Graf, \$15.95.) This is a moving tribute to Ahmad Shawkat, an Iraqi intellectual who suffered imprisonment, torture and exile under Saddam Hussein's regime and served as Goldfarb's translator during the invasion of Iraq. Goldfarb, a former correspondent for National Public Radio, reconstructs Shawkat's life and recounts the postwar events leading to his murder.

Alia Mamdouh, a journalist born and educated in Baghdad, left Iraq in 1982, after Hussein seized power. In **NAPHTALENE: A Novel of Baghdad** (Feminist Press, \$15.95), lyrically translated by Peter Theroux, Mamdouh describes the city's domestic life and a girl's coming-of-age in the 1950's.

JOHN JAMES AUDUBON: The Making of an American, by Richard Rhodes. (Vintage, \$16.) This is a detailed account of the life and times of the great 19th-century naturalist and wildlife painter who left France to wander the American backwoods and created a masterpiece, "The Birds of America." Rhodes, the Pulitzer Prize-winning author of "The Making of the Atomic Bomb," sets Audubon's fortunes within the changes of the country itself — the War of 1812, the Louisiana Purchase — and includes a sampling of his vibrant art. In the Book Review Jonathan Rosen said Rhodes "has produced nothing less than a portrait of the United States in its formative years."

**BLOOD FROM A STONE**, by Donna Leon (Penguin/Grove, \$7.99.) Commissario Guido Brunetti, the philosophical Venetian police detective in Leon's engrossing series, confronts an underground economy and government corruption when he investigates the assassination of an African street peddler. Our reviewer, Marilyn Stasio, said "readers will enjoy the paradoxical way in which justice is served in Venice."

IMPERIAL RECKONING: The Untold Story of Britain's Gulag in Kenya, by Caroline Elkins. (Owl/Holt, \$17.) "Imperial Reckoning," which won this year's Pulitzer Prize for general nonfiction, un-

covers a little-known history of brutality during the final decade of British rule in Kenya. Elkins, a history professor at Harvard, spent years interviewing former British colonial officers and survivors among the Kikuyu tribe, Kenya's largest ethnic group.

**THE LAKE, THE RIVER & THE OTHER LAKE,** by Steve Amick. (Anchor, \$14.) Set in the summer of 2001, Amick's first novel revolves around Michiganders in the state's northern lake district. There are the year-rounders, tourists and the longer-duration summer people; through interlocking stories of passion, regret and adolescent angst, Amick sets his characters' lives tumbling over one another. Our reviewer, Liesl Schillinger, called this novel "easygoing, rambunctious."

THE BELLS IN THEIR SILENCE: Travels Through Germany, by Michael Gorra. (Princeton University, \$16.95.) From his base in Hamburg, Gorra wanders through some of Germany's most historically resonant spots — Lübeck, Berlin, Weimar — peppering accounts of his journeys with literary reflections on the nature of travel literature.

WITH BILLIE: A New Look at the Unforgettable Lady Day, by Julia Blackburn. (Vintage, \$14.95.) Piecing together interviews with more than 150 people who knew Billie Holiday (1915-59) — musicians, critics, lovers, hangers-on — Blackburn provides a singular glimpse into the life of the legendary jazz singer.
