# Alberta Provincial Election Study

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## City of Lethbridge

Located in southwestern Alberta, the city of Lethbridge is home to 72,717 residents, 57,674 of which are 18 years of age or older.



The city is divided into six census areas, two each for its South, North and West geographic areas. It is divided north and south by Alberta highway 3, and east west by the Oldman River.

South Lethbridge's 27,941 residents represent 38.4 of the city's total population. West Lethbridge (22,429) and north Lethbridge (22,347) represent 30.8 and 30.7 respectively.

## Methodology

This report is based on data collected by Lethbridge Community College student enrolled in PSC150 – Local Government in the fall of 2004. Students interviewed 320 adult Lethbridge residents between October 31 and November 10, 2004 by telephone using numbers drawn randomly from the Lethbridge telephone directory. The weighted sample yields a margin of error of  $\pm$  5.5%, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data.

Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the voting age population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population.

The comparative data was collected by LCC and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 – Social Science Research Methods at Lethbridge Community College in the fall of 2004. Students interviewed 508 adult residents on October  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$ , 2004 by telephone using the Western Wats Lethbridge call center facility. Telephone numbers were selected using random digit predictive dialing. We sincerely thank Western Wats for their hospitality. The weighted sample yields a margin of error of  $\pm 4.3\%$ , 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data.

These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Lethbridge residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at LCC. The LCC Endeavour and Global News Lethbridge sponsored the two studies. We thank the Endeavour and Global for their support of our research endeavors.

What follows is a selection of our findings based on the questions below. It is important to note that these data were collected three weeks prior to the provincial election being called and prior to all of the parties having nominated their candidates in the Lethbridge ridings.

## **Provincial Vote Intention**

At the mid-point in the 2004 provincial election campaign, the governing Progressive Conservatives (38.2%) continued to maintain an overall lead in voter support within the city of Lethbridge.

The Liberals placed second with 23.6% support while the Alberta New Democrats held 8.3%, down 3.4% since early October, and in a virtual tie with the Alberta Alliance (8.2%) which has gained 2.5% since the early stages of the campaign.

Almost 5% of all voters plan to vote for some other party while 16.8% remained undecided with two weeks remaining in the campaign.

The Conservatives also hold leads in both the Lethbridge East (39.5%) and Lethbridge West (36.7%) ridings.

In Lethbridge East, the Liberals (25.7%) represent a stronger challenge to the Conservatives than they do in Lethbridge West (21.3%).

The reverse is true for the NDP with their support stronger in Lethbridge West (12.0%) than in Lethbridge East (4.6%).

The Alberta Alliance is demonstrating much stronger strength in Lethbridge East (9.9%) than in Lethbridge West (6.7%).



## Provincial Vote Intention – Most Likely Voters

When asked how likely they are to cast a ballot on election day, 59% of all respondents stated they would definitely vote. A further 20.4% stated they would likely cast a ballot while a further 20.5% are much less likely to vote.

More important than the overall totals is the demographic and vote intention breakdowns of those who are most likely to cast ballots.

Initially, a familiar pattern emerges when likelihood of voting is broken down by age. The youth (35.6%) are the least likely to state that they will definitely cast a ballot. Only about half of all generation-X voters (54.2%) stated they would definitely vote while 71.6% of boomers are certain they will cast a ballot. Seniors are the most likely to vote with 85.4% stating they will definitely vote.

When analyzing only those who are most likely to cast ballots, Lethbridge West remains a Conservative stronghold (38.2%) compared to the Liberals' (25.8%). The New Democrats (12.4%) are running third amongst those most likely to vote while the Alliance trails at 6.7%. Only 11.2% of those most likely to vote in Lethbridge West are undecided.

The situation is very different in Lethbridge East. Although the Conservatives lead among voters most likely to cast ballots (37.6%), the Liberals (32.9%) are poised to make Lethbridge East a much closer battle, especially given that 15.3% of those most likely to vote in Lethbridge East remain undecided.


