Purpose of this Scorecard

Republicans for Environmental Protection (REP) is pleased to release its first scorecard to assess the performance of Republicans in Congress on the vital conservation and environmental issues of our day. This Republicans-only scorecard is an important tool for carrying out REP's mission: *to resurrect the GOP's great conservation tradition and to restore natural resource conservation and sound environmental protection as fundamental elements of the Republican Party's vision for America.*

The Republican Party has a proud conservation legacy left by exceptional leaders such as Presidents Theodore Roosevelt and Dwight D. Eisenhower. Republican statesmen such as Congressman John Saylor and Senators William Roth and John Chafee played a critical role in passing many of America's landmark environmental laws and protecting national parks, wildlife refuges, and wilderness areas.

While the GOP still has a number of conservation champions, the party leadership is dominated by people who have lost sight of the importance of conservation and environmental protection for keeping America strong and prosperous. It is time to restore the great Republican conservation tradition, and time for Republican leaders to recognize that *Conservation is Conservative.*TM

Through this scorecard, REP provides citizens with a clear benchmark to evaluate the performance of Republican leaders on today's critical conservation and environmental issues.

How the Scorecard Works

REP scored the votes that, in our judgment, were the most important environmental votes that members of Congress cast on the floors of the House and Senate in 2005.

Lawmakers' scores are based on the number of pro-environment votes that they cast. The grading scale is 0 to 100. Each pro-environment vote is worth the same. Since we scored 12 votes in the House, each pro-environment House vote is worth 1/12th of 100, or 8.33. We scored 15 votes in the Senate, so each pro-environment Senate vote is worth 1/15th of 100, or 6.67.

Scores can exceed 100 or fall below 0 because we also assigned positive or negative credit for significant non-voting actions that demonstrated either positive or negative leadership on critical environmental issues. To ensure that floor votes always represent the bulk of the scoring, each significant non-voting action carries half the weight of a vote. The number of non-voting actions in each category (positive or negative) cannot exceed the number of floor votes scored.

Absences are counted as a negative vote. Each lawmaker's final score is rounded up or down to the nearest whole number.

U.S. House of Representatives

SCORED VOTES

(For each issue, the green GOP vote is shown in parentheses.)

1. A motion to waive a parliamentary challenge against the Defense Appropriations Conference Report, which was essentially a motion to accept Senator Ted Stevens' (R-AK) last-minute attachment of a provision authorizing oil and gas drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. *Vote #666. (NO)*
2. H.R. 3893, Congressman Joe Barton's (R-TX) bill to expedite the construction of new oil refining capacity in the United States by providing incentives that include waiving environmental protections and allowing refineries to be located in national wildlife refuges. *Vote #519. (NO)*
3. H.R. 3824, Congressman Richard Pombo's (R-CA) bill designed to weaken the Endangered Species Act of 1973. The bill eliminates protection of "threatened" species, eliminates critical habitat provisions, creates an open-ended entitlement for developers, weakens the role of science, and exempts all pesticide decisions from ESA standards. *Vote #506. (NO)*
4. An amendment (in the form of a substitute bill) offered by Congressmen Sherwood Boehlert (R-NY) and George Miller (D-CA) to eliminate the provisions of H.R. 3824 that would weaken the Endangered Species Act and create a developer entitlement program. *Vote #505. (YES)*
5. An amendment offered by Congressman Jeff Flake (R-AZ) to amend the Mississippi River-Illinois Water Way Project to tie lock and dam construction authorization to the validity of the usage and economic benefit claims made by proponents to justify the project. *Vote #377. (YES)*
6. An amendment offered by Congressman John Peterson (R-PA) to the Interior Department appropriations bill to lift the moratorium on natural gas production in the Outer Continental Shelf. *Vote #192. (NO)*
7. House Concurrent Resolution 95, the FY 2006 Budget Resolution establishing federal budget revenue and spending targets, which included the assumption of revenues from oil and gas leasing in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. Such revenue assumptions clear the way for Arctic Refuge drilling authorization to be included in subsequent budget reconciliation legislation, and thus not subject to a Senate filibuster. *Vote #149. (NO)*
8. H.R. 6, the Energy Policy Act of 2005, Congressman Barton's energy bill that subsidizes new fossil fuel development at the expense of the environment, while largely ignoring efficiency and clean energy technologies that can reduce oil dependence, lower greenhouse gas emissions, and safeguard America's natural heritage. *Vote #132. (NO)*
9. An amendment to the Energy Policy Act of 2005, by Congresswoman Lois Capps (D-CA) to remove section 1502, a provision that would provide liability protection for manufacturers of the gasoline additive MTBE, which has polluted drinking water supplies. *Vote #129. (YES)*
10. An amendment to the Energy Policy Act of 2005, by Congressman Ed Markey (D-MA) to remove the provisions allowing oil and gas exploration in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. *Vote #122. (YES)*
11. An amendment to the Energy Policy Act of 2005, by Congressman Sherwood Boehlert (R-NY) to direct the Secretary of Transportation to increase fuel economy standards from today's average of 25 miles/gallon to 33 miles/gallon over 10 years. *Vote #121. (YES)*
12. An amendment by Congressman Mike Rogers (R-MI) to weaken an amendment by Congresswoman Nancy Johnson (R-CT) that would direct EPA to revise federal vehicle fuel economy testing procedures to provide consumers with accurate fuel economy information on new vehicle labels. *Vote #119. (NO)*

Environmental Leadership Credits

WILDERNESS AND PUBLIC LANDS

Charles Bass (NH), **Jeb Bradley** (NH) and **Nancy Johnson** (CT) — for leadership in protecting the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge by coalescing fellow Republicans into a cohesive swing bloc of Arctic Refuge defenders. They accomplished this through a variety of efforts, such as initiating key “Dear Colleague” letters to House leaders. This leadership forced the House leaders to remove Arctic Refuge drilling authorization from the House budget and, ultimately, from the final House/Senate Budget Reconciliation Conference Report.

Steve Chabot (OH) — for leadership in sponsoring and building support for an amendment to the Interior Department appropriations bill to prohibit funding of new logging roads in the Tongass National Forest. This amendment would have passed if Congressman Pombo had not blocked it with an unfounded parliamentary objection.

Wayne Gilchrest (MD) — for leadership in opposing the Pombo/Gibbons provision included in the House budget reconciliation package to loosen privatization provisions in the 1872 Mining Law and overturn a 10-year moratorium on privatizing public lands used for mining. Congressman Gilchrest organized opposition and authored an important “Dear Colleague” letter to the Chairman of the House Budget Committee.

Heather Wilson (NM) — for leadership in sponsoring and helping to secure passage of the Ojito Wilderness Act, designating 11,183 acres of BLM-managed lands that contain dramatic landforms and rock structures.

Twenty-nine Members — for leadership in protecting the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge by signing at least one of the critical “Dear Colleague” letters to House leaders insisting that Arctic Refuge drilling authorization not be included in House budget legislation. They are:

CLEAN ENERGY, ENERGY CONSERVATION, AND CLIMATE CHANGE

Roscoe Bartlett (MD) — for his leadership to end the nation’s addiction to oil by raising awareness of the “Peak Oil” problem through floor speeches and the formation of a “Peak Oil” Caucus.

Charles Dent (PA) and **Bob Inglis** (SC) — for starting the House Hydrogen and Fuel Cell Caucus and promoting the advancement of a hydrogen economy to wean the nation off its overdependence on oil.

ENDANGERED SPECIES AND HABITAT PROTECTION

Sherwood Boehlert (NY) — for developing and co-sponsoring an amendment to eliminate the provisions of H.R. 3824 that would weaken the Endangered Species Act. Although the amendment narrowly failed, it diminished the momentum of H.R. 3824 and highlighted its flaws.

AIR AND WATER QUALITY

Nine Members — for sponsoring H.R. 1126, the Save Our Waters From Sewage Act, and using its leverage to force the Environmental Protection Agency to abandon a proposal to allow sewage treatment plants to bypass portions of the treatment process and discharge partly treated sewage into rivers, lakes, and ocean waters. WILDERNESS AND PUBLIC LANDS

Richard Pombo (CA) — for inserting a provision in the Resources Committee budget reconciliation package to authorize oil and gas drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

James Gibbons (NV) and **Richard Pombo** (CA)— for inserting a provision in the Resources Committee budget reconciliation package to loosen privatization provisions in the 1872 Mining Law and overturn a 10-year moratorium on privatizing public lands used for mining, allowing companies to acquire public lands at artificially low prices and develop public lands for non-mining uses.

Richard Pombo (CA) — for raising a questionable parliamentary objection to Congressman Steve Chabot's amendment to the Interior Department appropriations bill that would prohibit funding of new logging roads in the Tongass National Forest.

Mike Simpson (ID) — for ruling in favor of Congressman Pombo's objection to Congressman Chabot's amendment to the Interior Department appropriations bill that would prohibit funding of new logging roads in the Tongass National Forest.

C. W. Bill Young (FL) — for accepting, as Chairman of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, Senator Stevens' (R-AK) last-minute attachment of a provision authorizing oil and gas drilling in the Arctic Refuge.

WILDERNESS AND PUBLIC LANDS

Wayne Allard (CO) and **Craig Thomas** (WY) — for leadership in persuading House members to remove a provision inserted in the House FY 2006 budget reconciliation bill that would have loosened public lands privatization provisions in the 1872 Mining Law.

Pete Domenici (NM) — for sponsoring and helping to secure passage of the Ojito Wilderness Act, designating 11,183 acres of BLM-managed lands in New Mexico that contain dramatic landforms and rock structures.

John Sununu (NH) — for leadership in sponsoring an Interior Department appropriations amendment prohibiting funds for new logging roads in the Tongass National Forest, which, if passed, would have protected water and wildlife in America's largest national forest and saved taxpayers money.

CLEAN ENERGY, ENERGY CONSERVATION, AND CLIMATE CHANGE

Lincoln Chafee (RI), **John McCain** (AZ), and **Olympia Snowe** (ME) — for leadership on moving the U.S. closer to adopting a meaningful policy reducing climate change risks, by being original co-sponsors of the Climate Stewardship Act (the likely template for future limits on greenhouse gas emissions); sponsoring field trips to enable colleagues to see climate change impacts first-hand; and co-chairing an international climate change task force of parliamentarians, scientists, and others to press for steps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

AIR AND WATER QUALITY

Lincoln Chafee (RI) — for leadership in casting a key vote preventing the fundamentally flawed Clear Skies Act from advancing out of the Environment & Public Works Committee. Clear Skies' targets and timetables for reducing pollutants from the electric power sector are weaker than public health requires and science justifies, and it ignores greenhouse gas emissions.

John Warner (VA) — for leading a successful effort to defeat an amendment by Senator Christopher Bond (R-MO) that would have removed stormwater mitigation requirements from transportation authorization legislation.

Environmental Harm Demerits

WILDERNESS AND PUBLIC LANDS

Ted Stevens (AK) — for inserting a provision in the FY 2006 Defense Department appropriations bill authorizing oil drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, slowing passage of vital legislation in pursuit of Alaska's parochial pork-barrel agenda.

Pete Domenici (NM) — for abusing the budget process in an attempt to force open the Arctic Refuge to oil drilling.

Ted Stevens (AK) — for leading opposition to block Senator Sununu's amendment to prohibit funding of new roads in the Tongass National Forest, endangering the forest's resources and imposing new burdens on taxpayers even as the existing road maintenance backlog in the Tongass exceeds \$100 million.

CLEAN ENERGY, ENERGY CONSERVATION, AND CLIMATE CHANGE

Pete Domenici (NM) — for sponsoring the Energy Policy Act of 2005, a bill that subsidizes new fossil fuel development at the expense of the environment while largely ignoring efficiency and clean energy technologies that can reduce oil dependence, lower greenhouse gas emissions, and safeguard America's natural heritage, thus missing a significant opportunity to redirect America's energy policy onto a more sustainable path of greater security and less environmental impact.

James Inhofe (OK) — for sponsoring a motion to table (set aside) a Senate resolution calling for enactment of mandatory, market-based system of greenhouse gas emissions limits; and for publicizing through floor speeches the scientifically discredited argument that climate change is a "hoax."

AIR AND WATER QUALITY

Christopher Bond (MO) – for sponsoring an amendment to remove stormwater mitigation provisions from the SAFETEA-LU transportation authorization bill, which would have put the nation’s rivers and lakes at risk of increased pollution if it had passed.

ENDANGERED SPECIES AND HABITAT PROTECTION

Larry Craig (ID) – for sponsoring an amendment eliminating funds for the Fish Passage Center, which has provided credible data to help federal agencies make better-informed decisions about restoring endangered salmon in the Columbia River Basin.

ENVIRONMENTALLY DESTRUCTIVE FISCAL BOONDOGGLES

Ted Stevens (AK) — for leading opposition to block Senator Coburn’s fiscally and environmentally responsible amendment to shift transportation funds from Alaska “Bridges to Nowhere” to repair of a Louisiana bridge damaged by Hurricane Katrina.
