PERU MAN IS GIVEN SUSPENDED SENTENCE

On complaint of Mrs. Mary Bressette of Peru, Humane Officer Philip S. Pitts yesterday arrested her husband, Paul Bressette on a charge of failing to support for his wife and three minor children. Arraigned before Justice of the Peace Frank Bombard he pleaded guilty to the charge. He was sentenced to serve sixty days in the county jail but sentence was suspended on condition that he pay the bills and give his wife eight dollars a week for the support of herself and children. He must report to the humane officer for one year.

PHILADELPHIA MAN HELD ON DRY CHARGE

G. Clarence Landis of Philadelphia, Pa., was brought before U. S. Commissioner G. S. Bixby yesterday by U. S. Deputy Collector of Customs J. O'Hara of Mooers and charged with smuggling contraband into the country. He waived examination for federal court and furnished \$2,000 bail for his appearance in court.

Landis was arrested after he drove up in front of the customs house and stated to the officer he had nothing to declare. The inspector began an inspection of his car and found concealed in the upholstery in back of the front seat three bottles of cream de menthe, four bottles of whiskey and three bottles of cognac.

AN OUTSTANDING OCCASION AT PLATTSBURGH BARRACKS

Presentation Of Musical Instruments Made To 26th. U. S. Infantry Band By Local Organizations — Presentation Speech Made By Hon. Victor F. Boire — Acceptance For Band By Colonel John F. Madden — Entire C. M. T. C. Regiment Passes In Review Under Command Of Col. Julius Ochs Adler

One of the most colorful events to be held at Plattsburgh Barracks this season, and one which was of great interest to the people of Plattsburgh, both soldier and civilian, took place on the parade ground of the Post Wednesday afternoon. It consisted of the ceremonies in connection with the presentation of a set of band instruments to the 26th U. S. Infantry Band by various civic, military and fraternal organizations of Plattsburgh.

At the beginning of the ceremonies the entire personnel of the C. M. T. C. was lined up in companies at the east side of the parade ground and facing the reviewing stand, forming a line which reached from one end of the parade ground to the other.

When the actual presentation ceremony began the band, nearly one hundred strong, was drawn up in front of the reviewing stand, occupied by Colonel John F. Madden, commandant of Plattsburgh Barracks, members of his staff and guests. On tables in front of the stand were the shining new instruments and two drums.

Hon. Victor F. Boire, corporation counsel, acting as spokesman for Mayor John H. McCauley, made a short address of presentation in which he referred to the amity which had always existed between Plattsburgh's military and civil population. He spoke in the highest terms of the soldier as a man and a citizen of the nation whether in times of peace or war. In conclusion he turned the instruments over to Colonel Madden, who accepted them in the name of the band, at the same time speaking of his own appreciation of the attitude of the citizens of Plattsburgh toward their soldier neighbors.

Malcolm Rice, chief pilot of the Mobodo Aircraft Company spied her Great Lakes Trainer airplane, a bright red bi-plane and he took off to escort her to the field.

Upon landing Lady Heath was greeted by a welcoming committee composed of City Clerk Walter Arlinger representing Mayor John H. McCauley, B. W. Lewis, James A. Church, Frank M. Moore, Mrs. P. B. Rogers and M. G. Larkin.
