BOROUGH PROFILE

The London Borough of Croydon has a population of over 342,000 people, 26% of whom are under twenty years of age. Croydon has 156 schools, the highest in London. Therefore one of our key priorities is to engage with young people in the community.

We work in partnership with groups such as Croydon Housing Management Services and Age Concern to educate and fit smoke alarms for at risk groups in the borough. We also run Junior Citizens events to convey the fire safety message to children and their parents. We also respond to requests from parents whose children are firesetting. A visit from our Juvenile Firesetter advisor provides advice for parents and education for the child. We plan on continuing and expanding our community safety work by attending local fetes and fairs, holding open days at our fire stations and delivering a two week road show, in conjunction with our partners.















Our firefighters in Croydon work hard to get to incidents as quickly as possible. On average our first fire engine arrives in 5 minutes and 51 seconds. When we need to, we will send more than one fire engine. On average the second fire engine arrives in 7 minutes and 5 seconds.

Risk scored premises

Under new fire safety legislation that came into force on 1 October 2006, we have the power to enforce the required standard of fire precautions. Our staff carry out fire safety checks to ensure that building managers and occupiers are complying with fire regulations. We have a risk based fire safety inspection programme and every building we check is risk graded and given a score between 2.25 and 6.5, where 6.5 is the highest risk. The graph below shows the number of checks carried out in the six month period following the implementation of the new legislation and the corresponding risk scores.

Schools Team

The Schools Team visit Year 2 and 6 pupils and deliver a package specifically designed for these age groups. Each class enjoys an hour long presentation with the schools officer, in which they learn the concepts of fire prevention, detection and escape. This hour includes visuals, worksheet activities and videos to stimulate, educate and inform the pupils. High priority schools are found in areas that have historically seen a higher number of accidental residential fires.

Juvenile Firesetters

The Juvenile Firesetters Intervention Scheme is designed to address firesetting behaviour among children and young people. Trained advisors are available to meet with the child or young person and their parents.

Partnerships

In partnership with Croydon Housing Management Services, we provide smoke alarms and home fire safety visits for vulnerable tenants utilising central government funding. We work in partnership with Age Concern to provide smoke alarms and home fire safety visits for vulnerable tenants. Through the Safer Croydon Partnership we work with other agencies to provide education for young people through the Junior Citizens events.

With regard to our regulatory fire safety work we also have a strategic protocol in place with Croydon Council's Housing Department to facilitate joint working and inspections of certain sleeping accommodation. We also work in partnership with the council's corporate Health & Safety Department in order to address the issue of fire risk assessments for schools and other, council-owned, sleeping accommodation such as residential care homes, sheltered housing units and large, multi-occupied, social housing premises.
