



Big breaks for big businesses

Corporations cashing in despite Mike's promises to cut tax incentives

Tax breaks to corporations and wealthy landowners have ballooned under the Bloomberg administration despite the mayor's long-standing vow to curtail the practice.

The benefits of the Industrial Commercial Incentive Program (ICIP), considered one of the city's biggest giveaways, has long been debated, with Michael Bloomberg among the most vocal opponents of business tax incentives during his mayoral campaign.

Corporate tax breaks blossom

The business breaks have nevertheless multiplied in recent vears, even as critics, including the city's own Economic Development Corp., agreed that the money went to wealthy property owners and businesses that would have stayed in New York anyway.

"I would have been perfectly happy to see the whole program sunset," said state Sen. Liz Krueger (D-Manhattan). "I represent midtown. People are still fighting over commercial real estate in midtown."

In 2008 alone, ICIP has cost the city \$512 million in taxes it otherwise would have collected. That is more than double the \$190 million in 2002, Bloomberg's first year in office. The number of busi-

nesses taking advantage of the incentive also increased dramatically, from 3,868 in 2000 to 6,030 in 2008, city records show.

The city argues that the ICIP tax breaks are given out over different spans of time - up to 25 years — so about one-third of the money the city spent last fiscal year was granted before 2001.

"Over time, the ICIP program evolved into an inefficient program that warranted a thorough

examination and, ultimately, reform," said Andrew Brent, a mayoral spokesman.

Slow pace of reform for flawed program

Brent said it was not until last year that a comprehensive review of the program was completed.

And it was not until this past June that the state Legislature approved an ICIP "reform" bill at the mayor's request. The legislation,

which will turn the ICIP into an abatement program, could save the city up to \$3.5 billion over a 20-year period if it is adopted by the city council, the Independent Budget Office estimates.

Since 1984, when the ICIP began in an effort to spur the development or renovation of commercial or industrial properties, it largely has been chain corporations — such as Rite Aid and Mc-Donald's — that have benefited from the rubber stamp program. This has left critics wondering-

whether the incentives are being fairly distributed.

Misdirected perks, or a 'win-win' deal?

"If we are going to spend hundreds of millions of dollars of economic development subsidies, we want good jobs and manufacturing and grocery stores in low-income neighborhoods to be the focus of the subsidy, not Manhattan office buildings and fast food stores," said Brad Lander, director of the Pratt Center for Community Development.

Supporters, however, argue that particularly during an economic downturn, tax breaks are needed for the city to attract businesses.

"It's a win-win situation for everyone," said Cheryl Slavinsky, a Rite Aid spokeswoman. "We've got quite a bit of property in New York, and we've taken advantage of a great program the city offered."





The outlook for Lehman Brothers' future seemed dim yesterday after Barclays PLC withdrew its bid to buy the beleaguered investment bank.

The withdrawal of Barclays, which along with Bank of America Corp. was considered a front-runner to buy Lehman, demonstrated how complicated negotiations over Lehman's fate had become. Also, yesterday it was reported that Bank of America and Merrill Lynch & Co. were involved in merger talks which would knock Bank of America out of contention as well.

An official said the Treasury Department and the Fed were pushing Bank of America to buy Merrill Lynch. On Friday, Merrill Lynch's shares fell as investors fretted it might be the next investment bank to come under pressure from its portfolio of risky mortgage-backed securities.





Texas on mend after lke

Rescuers save 2,000 from floods

By Christopher Sherman The Associated Press

Rescuers searching the waterlogged streets and splintered houses left behind by Hurricane Ike said yesterday they had saved nearly 2,000 people in Texas — many of whom then boarded buses to shelters without knowing where they were going or when they could come home.

More than 48 hours after the first direct hurricane hit a major U.S. city since Hurricane Katrina, authorities imposed a weeklong nighttime curfew on Houston, where electricity was scarce and downed trees and shattered glass made roads unsafe.

Pump prices jumped above \$5 per gallon in some parts of the U.S. yesterday as the storm left refineries and pipelines idled and destroyed at least 10 offshore

petroleum platforms in the Gulf of Mexico.

Ike was downgraded to a tropical depression as it moved into the nation's midsection and left more harm in its wake. Roads

were closed in Kentucky because of high winds. As far north as Chicago, dozens of people in a suburb had to be evacuated by boat. Two million people were without power in Texas,

Arkansas and Louisiana.

The death toll from the storm rose to 13. Three were in hard-hit Galveston, Texas, including one body found in a vehicle submerged in floodwater

at the airport.

"We want our citizens to stay where they are,' Mayor Lyda Ann Thomas said. "Do not come back to Galveston, You cannot live here right now."

Sarah stumps close to home

Republican vice presidential candidate Sarah Palin has left the wilds of Alaska, but she has not quite left the mountains.

In her first cautious steps on the campaign trail without running mate John Mc-Cain, the Alaska governor is making a brief swing through the West. It is a region the campaign believes will be particularly receptive to Palin's Washingtonoutsider message and outdoorsy persona.

It is also a place poised to swing the election.

In her first solo campaign speech in the lower 48 states on Saturday, Palin addressed a cheering crowd in Carson City, Nev., in a roller hockey rink in the shadow of the Sierra Nevada mountains. She joked easily about hockey moms. the air show in town and her husband's Piper Cub plane, an outdoorsman's favorite.

The claim contradicted a U.S. contention that the Aug. 22 raid on the western village of Azizabad killed up to 35 Taliban fighters.

'There was total misinformation fed to the coalition forces," Humayun Hamidzada, the spokesman for President Hamid

Karzai, said. Afghan police arrested three suspects accused of giving the U.S. military false intelligence that led to the bombardment, the Interior Ministry has said. An Afghan government

commission found that up

to 90 civilians were killed. including 60 children, a finding backed by a preliminary U.N. report.

The operation, conducted by U.S. Special Forces and Afghan soldiers, targeted Afghan employees of a British security firm as well as their family members — the reason the U.S. military recovered weapons after the battle, Hamidzada said.







L cool with label 'Exit'

With his latest CD, LL Cool J is readying his exit and preparing for his future at the same time.

"Exit 13" is his 13th CD and final official album for Def Jam records, which has been his label home for 23 years

But LL is hardly about to leave the music industry, despite his success in film and other areas. The 40-year-old says he feels rejuvenated, and credits fellow Queens rapper 50 Cent with teaching him a new way to approach his music.

In a recent interview, LL talked about his new album

What's different about "Exit 13" compared to your past 12 records?

The last couple of albums, I was making those records in two or three months. This record took two years. I don't know if people can really grasp how big of a difference that is. ... It's like the idea of training for a fight for two weeks, or training for a fight for six months. It's that kind of a difference.

And I think that musically it reflects that.

Did 50 Cent produce this record?

I actually ended up executive producing "Exit 13," but 50 did executive produce an album for me: I

have a whole album I did with 50. I only used like three or four songs for this album. Working with 50 was inspiring. You have to realize I had no reason to be hungry.

When you're the best at something for a long time, and you make albums in a couple months and they're still going gold or selling a million records ... and you're making a living in films and stuff, it affects the music.

> Watching 50 crouch over that notebook and seeing him bounce back and forth in the studio. that inspired me and made me hungry again.

You've been in the game for about 25 years. What do you think your contributions are to hip-hop?

First of all, I am the first solo rap artist period in the world to really blow up in hip-hop on the whole planet; that's one contribution, that's a starting point.

> You've covered a lot of ground in your career, what else is there to do? I just want to do it bigger, bigger and bigger, and show people that anything is possible.





He discovered that after the elder Sabar moved to Israel in 1951, he struggled with a lot of problems, most notably feeling like the most outside in a country of outsiders.

The Israeli hierarchical system was not kind to the new immigrants, and the Jewish Kurds found themselves at the bottom of the heap.

Soon his father wanted to change everything about himself, including his name (it was originally Sabagh). He lied about his Kurdish roots. He immersed himself in everything Western, but in the end he couldn't shake off the ties to his warm and traditional upbringing. Aramaic kept on dancing in his imagination, which eventually led him to a Ph.D. in Near Eastern Language and Literature from Yale.

The story is written with the skill of a wizened, Kurdish campfire storyteller regaling the youth of his village. It will make you wish for every father and son to each discover their individual paradise.

These days Sabar's father drives a two-decade-old Toyota Tercel, and it suits his son just fine.







The ultramarathon man

Runners get a rush from extreme races By Heather Newman

Imagine yourselfrunning along a peaceful wooded trail with the leaves swishing overhead and the smell of dirt filling your nose. Now picture yourself doing that for seven or 10 hours at a time.

This is what keeps some ultramarathoners — runners who get a rush from races longer than a marathon's 26.2 miles — coming back.

They're the hard core in a sport that is itself hardcore. They think marathons are fun and useful for training for the real races that are 50 kilometers, 50 miles, even 100 miles.

There are hundreds of those races a year world-

wide. The 89K Comrades Marathon in South Africa, one of the world's most famous ultramarathons, draws about 12,000 runners.

Tony Hanks of Livonia, Mich., was facing adult onset diabetes at 32 years old. His sedentary lifestyle included a job in sales where he shuffled between his desk and his car.

"I gained a lot of weight and was out of shape," said Hanks, now 33. "I thought, 'I really need to get myself back together.""

Hanks set an ambitious goal: Having never run more than 10 miles, he decided he was going to fin-

ish the Detroit Marathon. A new goal eventually became to complete it in five hours, as that would qualify him for the ultramarathon training class.

The pounds melted away. He went from 250 to a muscular 188. His first marathon was a rude awakening but he finished it. "I was in a significant amount of pain, but I kept pressing on," he

said. "It was not easy." Neither was his first ultramarathon, a 50K in December. The course was brutal and support minimal. Again, he finished — dead last in eight hours and 15 minutes. And he achieved his most important goal, he said.

"I wanted to go from couch potato to ultrarunner in less than a year," Hanks said.

He no longer needs diabetes medication. He has run many marathons and ultramarathons since with better results.

"Because the events are smaller, you get to know people better," he said. "It's not about winning. You show up at an ultra and people are patting each other on the back. You're taking a journey together."

Botox may help migraines



How to eat good fats

Dieters often fear fat, but it actually is crucial to good health. The trick is to eat foods with the right kinds of fat and avoid the others. Here are some tips from nutritionists about how to make "good" fats work for you.

1. Understand what "good" fats do.

The body uses these substances for many functions, including creating energy, maintaining cells, transporting vitamins and creating hormone-like compounds that help regulate blood pressure and heart rate. Healthy fats also can help lower bad cholesterol levels.

2. Go for monounsaturated fats. Good food sources include olive oil, fish oil, avocados and olives — yes, fruits can contain healthy fats — and most nuts.

3. And polyunsaturated fats. Soybeans, wholegrain wheat and vegetable oils, including corn, saffron, sunflower and soy, contain these fats.

4. As well as Omega-3 fatty acids. These types

of polyunsaturated fats appear to lower the risk of coronary artery disease and may guard against irregular heartbeats and high blood pressure. Go for salmon, herring, flaxseeds, walnuts and leafy green vegetables.

5. Limit trans and saturated fats. Trans fats are common in commercial baked goods such as crackers and cookies, as well as in fried foods like doughnuts. Saturated fats are most often found in animal products (full-fat dairy and red meat), partiallyhydrogenated oils such as







Be content, live longer

The secret to a long life is actually pretty simple, according to recent research from the National Institute on Aging.

After tracking more than 2,300 people for more than 50 years, researchers there found that calm and active people lived longer than their counterparts.

These findings came from data collected by the Baltimore Longitudinal Study of Aging — the old-est running study on aging - and were published in the July/August issue of the journal Psychosomatic Medicine.

The most recent findings looked at the link between personality traits of people and their lifespan. The data showed certain traits were definitively linked to a longer life, including emotional stability, organization, discipline, conscientiousness and resourcefulness.

Certain other traits led

It's important to note that personality or activity level isn't fixed or predetermined and that it can be proactively changed.

While most people that are infected with West Nile virus make a full recovery, many may develop conditions such as impaired physical and mental function that can linger for roughly a year, suggests a study published in August in the Annals of Internal Medicine.

The study of 156 people with the illness showed that fatigue and mood problems may develop as well and those with the most severe complications may take longer to recover.



Treating arthritis

What's the best natural way to combat the aches and pains of arthritis?

First, there are more than 100 types of arthritis. The best remedy often depends on the type of arthritis a person has. Unfortunately, we have no convincing evidence that natural remedies will reliably and effectively treat symptoms of the most common types of arthritis.

That said, here's what I consider some of the best complementary remedies for symptoms of arthritis:

Weight Loss. For most forms of arthritis, taking the load off a weight-bearing joint (such as the knee) by losing excess weight can be helpful.

Exercise. Physical activity may provide significant benefits for many types of arthritis. Exercise can include land or water-based physical activities or other low-impact exercises that strengthen muscles around arthritic joints.

Vitamin D. Low levels of vitamin D are common, may cause achiness and have been linked with an increased risk of osteoarthritis. While increasing vitamin D intake is unlikely to produce a prompt reduction in arthritis symptoms, it may reduce bone pain.

Acupuncture. Welldesigned studies suggest that acupuncture may be effective for osteoarthritis, fibromyalgia, and other chronic pain. Just how acupuncture improves symptoms of arthritis is uncertain.

Diet. While recommendations abound regarding which foods to favor and which to avoid for various types of arthritis. the link between diet and arthritis is strongest for one particular type of arthritis, gout. Limiting alcohol and high purine foods (such as herring, anchovies, liver, and bacon) can reduce the frequency of gout attacks in some people.



The tough task of managing telecommuters

With gasoline prices expected to remain uncomfortably high, many small businesses are letting some staffers work at home. And some owners are discovering that allowing employees to telecommute can require a different management style and some basic trust.

It can be challenging for a boss who's used to having everyone in the office in plain sight — and who now has much less control over someone who's working in pajamas with "The View" on TV in the background. Or a staffer who takes time away from work during the day to start cooking dinner or walk the dog.

"The biggest issue I have is tracking time and knowing when he's working," said Lloyd Princeton, who owns a consulting firm with offices on both coasts, and has seven employees, including one who telecommutes.

But, Princeton said, "he gets the work done. He does quality work for clients.'

Of course, onsite workers may come in late after a doctor's appointment or run personal errands during the afternoon just as Princeton's worker does.

Still, there are whole companies and even industries that now rely on employees who work from home, such as customer service or telemarketing firms. And

many use high-tech tools, including conferencing and networking systems, to ease communications between telecommuters and the office, and some use software to help monitor workflows.

"You're trusting people to do the work" says Steve Lundin, who owns a Chicago-based public relations firm, and has learned to shrug off the doubts. "At the end of the day, there is some fluff

time you're paying for, but what you bill out for is far more than what you're paying them."

Telecommuters can also end up being out of the loop. There can be bruised feelings, whether the staffer is missing out on something workrelated, or even a bit of gossip that everyone else

was sharing. That kind of disconnect is one of the downsides of telecommuting, says Tory Johnson, CEO of Women For Hire, a New York-based recruitment services firm.

"Some of our best ideas, our most fun conversations come from spontaneity, working in a big open office and chitchat,' Johnson said.

Agree and Add

In these moments, give a specific story. "The thing I liked best about my last job was the camaraderie. For example, one thing my team and I did was ..."

Find Their Egg

There's a famous story about the decision to have the home-baker add the egg to the Duncan Hines cake mix to give lazy cooks everywhere the feeling of "Eureka! I baked this myself!"

Similarly, you need to find what "egg" your interviewer will be adding to your success. Articulating for them their contribution to your achievement means they are far more likely to get invested in your success. So egg them on.

Don't use a job offer to prove your worth

A reader writes: If I were offered another position by this outside organization, would it be wise to bring up the other offer to my current superiors to show how wellregarded I am by outside organizations, or would it be inappropriate to

bring up another offer while under consideration for the dream job? Would I be better off keeping my

mouth shut about the other offer until they come up with a decision about the dream job?

It is a no-no to tell your current employer that you have been offered another job unless you are prepared to tender your resignation. Bringing up the fact that you have another offer with the explicit purpose of leveraging a raise or promotion is in terrible taste. It is a maneuver that calls your loyalty and integrity into question and might leave your employer wondering whether

you really are as valuable as you think you are. Worse still, they might call your bluff and, rather than scrambling to keep you, may wish you well in your future endeavors and show you the door. Never mind the impact on your reputation with the employer that offers you the other job. Suppose you do get your dream job with your current organi-

zation. If you leave them with the impression that you only interviewed so that you could secure a bar-

gaining chip to use with your current employer, they will be hesitant to consider you in the future.

You don't need another offer to prove your worth. Keep detailed records of the milestones you have achieved and use metrics, whenever possible, to make the case.

The best way to secure a raise or a promotion is not to prove how much people outside of the organization like you, but to do a great job and make sure that your leaders know about it

Paid sick days are a top employee perk

Most large companies offer paid sick days to employees, but 43 percent of the private work force didn't have them in 2007, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. There are no federal or state laws mandating paid sick days, although Washington, D.C., and San Francisco guarantee them.

Life without Tom Brady in the AFC East picture might not be so easy for the Jets, after all.



Cohn-Head A No-Holds-Barred

Account of Breaking Into the Boys' Club

In 1987, as a new hire with ABC radio, Linda Cohn became the first fulltime female sportscaster in U.S. history.

In "Cohn-Head," her intimate but sometimes opaque new memoir published this month, the ESPN anchor also thanks the few far-sighted men who, looking down at her through the glass ceiling, gave her each shot. "Some people say I've

broken a lot of ground and helped pave the way for women in a maledominated industry," she writes, "but I know that at almost every barrier I broke, there was a bold man in a position of power standing there who recognized my potential and was willing to take a personal risk to give me an opportunity.

The origin of Cohn's broadcasting career was not a love of journalism or writing. It was her rabid love of sports — as a Rangers fan in Long Island and as a hockey goalie for her high-school boys' and college women's teams. Sports also helped her escape the strictures of

a dysfunctional family life that hovered between her emotionally volatile mother and her quiet father, and gave her the first taste of being accepted into a boy's club.

Making psychological connections she discovered through counseling, Cohn uses her memoir to self-conciously display her constant thirst for the celebrity and diversion that her work as a "Sports-Center" anchor brings her.

Of her morning prework routine of coffee and the New York Post, Cohn writes: "The front of the paper is always too depressing for me; sports are about as much of the real world as I can handle

most days. Sports are probably also the thing Cohn has her best handle on: Just as much as her rise from awkward girl-jock to fillin local radio newsreader to Seattle sportscaster to ESPN mainstay, Cohn honestly details the slow, painful and inconclusive demise of her marriage to her college sweetheart, her greatest longtime supporter from whom she is now finalizing a divorce.
