

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Introduction

 \mathcal{W} . Deen Mohammed, is the director of the nonprofit ministry, "The Mosque Cares," and the President of CPC/Comtrust LLC (Highlighted in a 1999 issue of the Wall Street Journal). Imam Mohammed's clear representation of true Islamic faith, practice, humanitarian service, and leadership for the establishment of Muslim life in the United States are well documented. In February, 1975 upon the passing of his father the Honorable Elijah Mohammed, Imam Mohammed was unanimously elected the new leader of the Nation of Islam by its leaders and general membership. Through over 25 years of emphasis on the Qur'an, tradition of Mohammed the Prophet, and an inspired strategy reflected in a program of gradual and moderate change designed to correct erroneous religious influences and satisfy the requisites of a truer Islamic identity, he succeeded in transforming the volatile "Black Muslims" into a progressive society of Muslim Americans. They are estimated to be at least 2.5 million people today.

Outdistancing narrow concerns, W. Deen Mohammed's leadership continues to build upon this new and solid religious foundation with concrete plans into the next century for the strengthening of families, neighborhoods, and communities. What better tribute to the Honorable Elijah Mohammed and his harvest of followers and admirers by the son that succeeded him than to have developed and extended the life of his greatest legacy: to build an honest identity for a people who were displaced from their natural human dignity.



• November-1999, he participated in the Jubillenium Interfaith Conference for World Peace in Tiberias, Israel.

• May-1998, he participated in the Conference on Religion & Peace in Auschwitz, Poland, from the Center for Christian-Jewish Understanding of Sacred Heart University, under the direction of Rabbi Joseph H. Ehrenkranz.

• June-1998, Imam Mohammed was invited by the leader of the worldwide Focolare Movement, the Hon. Chiara Lubich, to Rome to address the Muslim Friends of the Focolare Conference. Representatives from 24 nations participated.

• January-1997, the Imam was appointed to President Clinton's religious advisory council under the auspices of the U.S. State Department.

• November-1996, in support of the human rights efforts of Reverend Samuel Ruiz Garcia, Bishop of San Cristobal de Las Casas he traveled to Mexico as a member of the Peace Council. Other well known members of the Council include the 15th Dalai Lama, and Reverend Desmond M. Tutu.

• In 1996, he was invited by Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak to address the Supreme Council of Affairs in Cairo on the theme: "Islam and the Future of Dialogue between Civilizations."

• December-1996, he led a delegation of American Muslims to Jerusalem, the West Bank and Gaza, to take part in talks with Palestinian leader, President Yassir Arafat.


• March-1995, he engaged in the first public dialogue between top U.S. leaders of Islam and Reformed Judaism and delivered a keynote address at an historic Muslim-Jewish Convocation, along with Rabbi Alexander M. Schindler, President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and head of the Synagogue movement of Reform Judaism in the U.S. and Canada.

• May-1995, the Forbes Forum officials invited Imam Mohammed to address their prestigious annual conference on the topic "How to Save Our Youth."

• December-1994, Hartford Seminary saluted Imam Mohammed for his work in improving Muslim, Christian, and Jewish relations with the distinguished "Cup of Compassion" award.

• Februrary-1992, Imam Mohammed became the first Islamic representative to deliver an invocation on the floor of the United States Senate.
