"We're delighted with having so many players selected for Great Britain," Lindley said. "It was a credit to the club to have eight lads in the training squad but to have seven in the team itself is a fantastic achievement. Commiserations to Antony Symmonds who missed out this time but he's not out of the running by a long chalk. He'll rejoin the training squad when they get back from France and will hopefully earn a place in the team for the matches against Australia in a few weeks time."

"We've been a victim of our own success here being unable to take part in tonight's game. No-one likes to postpone matches but we were forced to do so with having so many players picked for next week's French game. Thankfully the Stags have been very accommodating and we will hope to rearrange the match for sometime in December."

The seven Crusaders' players picked for the side against France include full Welsh international Gil Dudson who made his debut against England at Doncaster last month. The others are Dalton Grant, Jamie Tibbs, Rhys Fenton, Ross Wardle, Loren Quick and Mark Wool.

Crusaders to train in Queensland, Australia November 7th, 2008

Celtic Crusaders are set to return to training at the end of this month, with their entire squad for Super League 2009 going into a tough three-week training camp in Queensland as they prepare for their first competitive match in February.

And the Welsh side will link up with Brisbane Broncos, who played a friendly match at Bridgend's Brewery Field against the Crusaders in February 2007. The NRL club's personnel will assist the Crusaders in specialist areas such as kicking, defence and nutrition.

The club's main base will be in Brisbane's Griffith University that has played host to the last two Student Rugby League World Cup tournaments. They will also have opportunity to use the Gold Coast for two sessions a week at one of the many beautiful beaches in the area.

In addition, the Crusaders will be taking part in interactive joint training sessions with three sides from the Queensland Cup competition (the second level of rugby league in that part of Australia).

Anthony Seibold, the Crusaders' assistant coach and team manager is a former Brisbane Broncos player and he knows the benefit of training in a world class facility alongside such experienced personnel.

"We're doing this training camp in Queensland because of its warm weather and that helps power and speed gains," he said. "By having a three week camp we'll get more of a benefit in those key areas to help us compete in Super League.

"With a number of new players coming in, it's also an opportunity for them to bond with existing players and staff in a controlled environment. The whole idea is that we can have the best preparation possible in order to start Super League in the best condition."

Last gasp France stun Great Britain November 13th 2008

The Great Britain Community Lions U18s suffered a heart breaking last minute defeat to France Juniors in Montpellier.

Hard working forwards Gil Dudson, Glenn Riley and Jacob Fairbank were at the heart of most of the Lions best work and with outstanding full back Kriss Wilkes always a threat, the visitors knew that the game was very much there for the taking in the second half.

Obviously lifted by a half time talk from head coach Carl Briscoe the Lions started the second period on the front foot and soon gained their reward as the tireless Riley crashed over from close range. Jamie Tibbs added the extras and levelled the game at 6-6.

However, their joy was short lived as France hit back just eight minutes later with the best try of the night. With the set coming to a conclusion, great vision from Gigot spotted an overlap on the blind side and after combining with impressive centre Gran, winger Clement Soubeyras raced over to finish off a sweeping 60 metre raid.

To their credit the Lions again dug deep and the game started to open up as both sides looked to find the next score.

Luckily for the Lions that honour went to them, as a period of pressure deep in French territory resulted in Fairbank rampaging over from a sublime short pass from scrum half Scott George. As Tibbs added the extras the clock was ticking down and a draw looked on the cards before the game ended in dramatic fashion.

"We're obviously disappointed to come away with nothing from the game but we can certainly take some positives from the performance, said head coach Carl Briscoe.

"There was nothing to choose between the two sides but we now have to move on and look ahead to the two games against the Australian Institute of Sport which start later this month."

Briers looking forward to Crusaders trip November 18th, 2008

Former Warrington Wolves and Wales skipper Lee Briers is looking forward to visiting Bridgend next year to take on Celtic Crusaders in Super League.

Briers quit international rugby league and stood down as Wolves captain in 2007 but the 30-year old is still an active member of the Warrington squad and can't wait to play at the Brewery Field in 2009.

"It's going to be a really good clash in Bridgend, I can't wait for it to happen," he said. "The Celtic Crusaders away game will be the first fixture that I look for having played in Bridgend a few times for Wales. It'll be strange going into the away dressing room this time."

Briers made his debut for Wales in 1998 against England at Widnes and went on to win 18 Welsh caps, captaining

Wales in seven of them. His eight tries, 20 goals and five drop goals makes him Wales' third highest scorer in the last 20 years and fourth on the all time list.

He knows how much Celtic Crusaders' Super League place means for the development of Welsh Rugby League in general.

"We've always need to expand rugby league," Briers admits. "We already have a team in France and the next step was to admit Celtic Crusaders. This can only make the Welsh team stronger and lead for a better class of international game.

"You're going to see a lot more kids wanting to come through and play rugby league now. In the past, they've not been given the opportunity to play at the highest level in Wales, but now they've got Super League to aim for so more will want to give it a go. I'll be following their progress closely and I really would love to see Super League become successful in Wales."

The 2009 Super League season will be Briers' 12th. Currently fourth in the all-time points scoring list for Warrington, only Harry Bath, Brian Bevan and Steve Hesford have scored more for the famous club. Briers, and everyone else in the country, will find out when the Crusaders take on Warrington in early December when the Super League 2009 fixture list is released.

Crusaders back white ribbon campaign November 25th, 2008

Celtic Crusaders are backing a Bridgend County Borough Council-run campaign to tackle domestic violence. Members of the Crusaders' development squad have agreed to wear a white ribbon which is the international symbol for the Eradication of Violence Against Woman.

It's one of a series of initiatives and events organised by the Council's Domestic Abuse coordinator Natalie

Tanner to raise awareness of domestic abuse within the borough.

Natalie, who is based with the Community Safety Partnership, will officially launch the Council's white ribbon campaign at Civic Offices on Thursday 27 November.

"Wearing a white ribbon is a sign of your support to ending violence against women," said Natalie, who, as a former South Wales Police officer, has seen the effects of domestic abuse first hand.

"It's especially important that men and boys wear the white ribbon, which is why we are so delighted that the Celtic Crusaders have agreed to show their support.

"We must also remember that domestic abuse can also affect men and that abuse can be mental and emotional as well as physical. I really hope that by promoting the white ribbon it will get people thinking about this very significant issue."

Celtic Crusaders Community Development Officer Matthew Pritchard added "This is a very important initiative which we are pleased to support and by wearing the white ribbon we hope it will raise awareness of domestic abuse and help develop ways to prevent it.

"If this is happening to you we at Celtic Crusaders can only urge you not to put up with it and to seek assistance via Bridgend Women's Aid or the Welsh Domestic Abuse Helpline."

And this is just the start of Natalie's work. Over the next few months she will be working on other campaigns to highlight and reduce domestic violence.

She will be working closely with the re-formed Bridgend Domestic Abuse Forum which brings voluntary and statutory agencies together in partnership to tackle domestic abuse.

Natalie added: "It's recognised that those experiencing domestic abuse may require assistance from a number of agencies, therefore having a joint approach is very important."

Nine new signings as Crusaders start training November 26th, 2008

Celtic Crusaders go into their three-week training camp next Monday with nine new signings as they prepare for their first engage Super League game away at World Club Champions Leeds Rhinos on Friday 6th February.

The Welsh side's acquisitions include six players with 556 Australian NRL appearances between them as well as two former professional footballers.

Matty Smith and Ste Tyrer both arrive at the club from St Helens and are on loan for the whole season. Both have also played the round ball game at a Premiership club. Smith was on Everton's books as a youth and reserve player while Tyrer is a former Wigan Athletic goalkeeper.

Both players have since excelled at Saints and are prominent goalkickers.

Crusaders other Super League signing is Peter Lupton from Castleford Tigers, a player with over 100 Super League games to his name, who has previously played for the London Broncos, Leeds Rhinos and Hull FC. In addition, the club have signed five Australians and their first ever player from the Cook Islands.

Mark Bryant, who was born in Cootamundra, New South Wales, the same place as cricket legend Don Bradman, arrives in Wales on a high after making his 100th NRL appearance when helping to lead Manly-Warringah Sea Eagles to the Australian NRL championship after their 40-0 thrashing of Melbourne in this year's Grand Final.

Bryant is a former Australian schoolboy international, as is Lincoln Withers, who along with Marshall Chalk, arrives from Canberra Raiders.

Ryan O'Hara is a State of Origin player with an appearance for New South Wales in 2004. He arrives from Wests Tigers.

The final Australian is Adam Peek who has made 123 NRL appearances. Signed from Cronulla Sharks, he started his career with Adelaide Rams in the old Australian Super League before going to Canterbury Bulldogs, South Sydney Rabbitohs, Parramatta Eels and St George Illawarra Dragons.

And to complete the batch of Crusaders' new recruits, Cook Islander Ben Vaeau has signed from North Queensland Cowboys. The prop will finally play a game in Wales eight years after he was originally hoping to. Vaeau, then only 18 years old, made the training squad for the Cook Islands 2000 World Cup team to face Wales in Wrexham but failed to make the final cut.

Crusaders coach John Dixon said: "I'm pleased with the squad that we've assembled. We've maintained continuity on and off the field. We've retained our coaching staff and the core of players who have served this club so well over the last three years. We've addressed the key areas where we believe that we needed to improve as a club and have recruited accordingly. Marshall Chalk - Signed from Canberra Raiders - Date of Birth: 13/03/1981 – Position: Utility Marshall Chalk has been a Canberra Raiders regular for the last four years having notched up 23 tries in 71 appearances. A strong utility back, Marshall's position of choice is either wing or centre but was also a strong contributor in the back row for a time at the Raiders.

Carnegie Champions Schools 2009 kicks off November 28th, 2008

Last week saw the kick-off of the 2008/2009 Rugby League Carnegie Champion Schools competition in Wales, with first round of the year 7 and year 11 tournaments taking place across the length and breadth of the country.

Competitions will take place at all senior school age groups with the National Year 7 Final taking place at Wembley Stadium before the Carnegie Challenge Cup Final on Saturday 29 August 2009. The finals of the other age groups will take place in London on the day before with all finalists being invited as guests at Wembley.

The Year 8 and 9 tournaments kick-off in early December with the year 10 competition starting in January. This year has seen an increase in the number of schools enter the competition, with over 100 teams taking part as Celtic Crusaders' popularity and their admission into Super League doing wonders to boost the popularity of rugby league in Welsh schools.

The geographical spread of the teams also signals the message of rugby league is increasing all the time with schools taking part stretching from Pembrokeshire's St David's Comprehensive in the West to Newport's St Josephs RC Comprehensive in the East.

Because of this, the competition has had to be split into four regions for the very first time with each year group boasting an East, West, Bridgend and Central tournament.

Wales Rugby League development officer Dan Clements said: "The response from schools for this year's Carnegie Champion Schools competition has been great.

"Last year was a huge success for us but to attract more schools yet again suggests that the interest in rugby league is continuing to grow.

"To see schools wanting to play league from the city of St David's in the west, up to Merthyr Tydfil and all

the way over to Newport means the competition has a truly South Wales feel. It also means we get a chance to see school children competing from all areas, not just our traditional strongholds."

With the tournaments being run by Celtic Crusaders and Welsh Rugby League staff, there has been a true Super League feel to the competition with player visits making the tournaments even more special.

Celtic Crusaders' community development officer Matt Pritchard said: "Throughout the six week coaching programme and the tournaments that the schools have taken part in so far, the children have been very excited about Super League coming to Bridgend. We at the Crusaders are committed to providing young children with the chance to participate in rugby league.

"I have been overwhelmed by the standard of rugby on show; it demonstrates that the future of rugby league in Wales is extremely healthy"

The tournaments will continue into the New Year climaxing in a Welsh schools finals day at the Brewery Field in February to see who qualifies for the national knockout stages. This day will take place in the build up to the Crusaders first ever Super League fixture away at the Leeds Rhinos, so it promises to be an action packed week.
