

France re-elects President Charles de Gaulle (75) to a second seven-year term, with 54% of the vote. His opponent was Francois Mitterrand.

The Justice Department files intimidation charges against eight Louisiana landowners who allegedly sent eviction notices to Negro sharecroppers and tenant farmers because they registered to vote. It is the first voter intimidation suit filed under the 1965 Civil Rights act.



Pressed on the question of atomic weapons by a correspondent, Vietnam ambassador **Arthur Goldberg** says atomic weapons will not be used in the war. "The use of atomic weapons in Vietnam is not conceivable."

The engagement of Luci Baines Johnson - 18-yearold daughter of President and Mrs. Johnson is announced. Luci and Airman Patrick Nugent (22) plan a late summer wedding.

Former Vice President President Richard M. Nixon predicts that "growing discontent" with the Johnson victory for the Popublican side

administration would bring victory for the Republican side.

Moscow imposes a permanent 9pm curfew on anyone under the age of 16. Under the new rule, children are barred from streets, theaters or other public places after 9pm, unless accompanied by an adult. the curfew will be set at 10pm during school vacations. The reason given for the action was that children spend a lot of time out in the streets in the evening and they sometimes "misbehave and hinder traffic."

Fad for Christmas - **Walkie Talkies**! The FCC reminds you they are not toys - but radios. No profanity. The same channels are shared with Citizen Band Radios.

New teletype ribbon seen - has an eraser built right into it. All you do is move the ribbon from black to red, backspace, type the error again, and it vanishes.

The U.S. Office of Education reports the number of students enrolled in colleges and universities this fall rose 12% over last year to a record of nearly 6 million. Freshmen enrollments, a

continuing reflection of post-World War II reaching college age, increased 18% over 1964 - from 1,235,000 to 1,453,000.

Sports - **Gale Sayers** of the Chicago Bears is voted Rookie of the Year in the NFL.

Satellite radio? - NASA authorizes a study of the transmission of radio programs directly to FM from an orbiting satellite. Authorization of the study is believed to be the first step by a branch of the Federal Government to consider the technical feasibility of uniting the millions of homes through one airborne broadcasting facility. What kind of power would be needed in a radio satellite, the size of the antenna required by a home receiver and the prospects for practical success in the technical sense are among the purposes of the NASA study.

Television news - **Jeane Dixon**, the "prophetess of the Potomac," will appear on David Susskind's "Open End" program. She is the subject of a recently published book, "A Gift of Prophecy," which was written by Ruth Montgomery, a syndicated columnist.

CBS says this will be the last season for **Dick Van Dyke**. Van Dyke wants to pursue motion pictures. He'll still be tied to CBS under a longterm contract now being negotiated. Van Dyke will do several one-hour comedy-variety specials each year for three years, beginning in 1967. It is understood the contract would permit him to be a guest on other networks. Dick's show is still one of the highest rated TV

programs around.

Singer John Davidson, one of the principals in "Oklahoma!" on Broadway, will be the star of an hour-long weekly (summer replacement) musical show on NBC.

Brigitte Bardot's appearance on the Ed Sullivan show next Sunday has been postponed, because the A.C. Nielsen Company will not be compiling ratings that evening. Says Ed - "After my wife called it to my attention, I decided to delay Brigitte's appearance until Jan. 2 when Nielsen will be doing ratings again."







Radio news - Hawaiian singer Don Ho adds DJ duties. He's now on KHVH, Honolulu from 3:30 to 6pm weekday afternoons.

Bill Drake - a radio (doctor) or consultant, uses a hands-on approach to his work. He doesn't just set a format and leaves town, but is in constant tune with his stations. He has three that he consults - KYNO (1300) -Fresno, KGB (1360), San Diego and KHJ (930) - Los Angeles. Drake's way to do top-40 radio is different then what's out there. The DJ usually doesn't banter, but gets in and gets out of what he's doing quickly. Radio station jingles are always followed by music - a subliminal effect on the listener says Drake. All three stations feature 20/20 news - usually 20 minutes before

the hour. That way, if the competition is programming news at the top or five minutes before the hour, his stations are usually playing music. Drake's stations have 14-song minimum per hour, which usually means more music then the competition. The object to a winning station in Drake's opinion is playing better records more often. "A tight playlist is not the answer because the wrong record can ruin it through repetition."

Radio news - Texas broadcaster Gordon

McLendon is buying Los Angeles FM station KGIA (103.5) for \$400,000 and has an FCC application saying he wants to try a new format - all want ads. The classified ads would be divided into categories like job opportunities, help wanted and homes for sale. The station would charge by the word. Says McLendon - "In the beginning, we might charge a penny a word. That means the average one-minute announcement, which has 125 words, would cost \$1.25. But eventually our advertising rates would depend upon or circulation and how many people were listening. If it turned out to be a real jim-dandy operation, we might charge 5, 6 or 7

University's Trinity College on Jan. 3.






Beatles news - On

a visit to their native Liverpool two fans, aged 15, hand the foursome a letter, asking them to help stop the closing of the **Cavern Club**, a place the Beatles made famous. Later, the Beatles said there was very little they could do. Paul McCartney suggested that the city council look at the spot as a tourist attraction "instead of an old warehouse." The Cavern sits in the basement of an actual warehouse, but needs

a drainage system that the owner cannot afford, among other problems. Owner Ray Mcfall says the drainage system alone would cost \$9,000. (Don't worry, it won't close for good. A grand re-opening will commence in August, complete with a speech by the British Prime Minister).

Brian Holland is named vice president of Motown Records in charge of creative evaluation. Holland had been supervising that department since last August.
