FUNDRAISING PROGRESS (2008-09)

The Ohio Wesleyan Annual Fund is the University's primary unrestricted annual giving program. Since 1926, the Ohio Wesleyan Annual Fund has contributed to the University's growth in stature among the premier liberal arts institutions in the nation. The Annual Fund seeks to maximize each student's "OWU Experience" by directing resources to priority areas – those that most affect the quality of the curricular and co-curricular experience of all students. Gifts to the Annual Fund support financial aid, academic programs, classroom and residential enhancements, and student involvement activities.


In 1926, the Annual Fund started with 863 alumni participants who contributed \$5,289. During the Fiscal Year 2008-2009 the level of commitment and dedication to their Alma Mater grew to 7,323 alumni, parent, friends and organizations who contributed \$3,730,230.

Total Annual Giving to the University reached \$4,355,202 during the fiscal year through additional gifts to Team OWU (\$177,893), the President's Circle (\$387,079), and the Woltemade Center (\$60,000). Alumni continue to make significant donations to the University during their reunion years with the Class of '59 breaking the 50th reunion class record by raising \$611,076. In addition, the graduating class of 2009 gift of \$10,234 to the Annual Fund broke a record both in the percentage of participation and dollars raised by a graduating class.

Exceptional performance...here's some very positive news about how we use the money you entrust to us. Ohio Wesleyan has received a 4-Star rating from Charity Navigator (www.charitynavigator.org), the nation's largest independent charity evaluator. This rating, which Charity Navigator terms "exceptional," means that Ohio Wesleyan "exceeds industry standards and outperforms most charities in its cause." With this ranking, Ohio Wesleyan joins other elite institutions, such as Amherst College, Bowdoin College, Williams College, Carlton College, Haverford College, and Kenyon College. In short, Ohio Wesleyan is worthy of your trust and commitment—and the need to assist our students is great.

Estate giving... The University was the beneficiary of numerous estate gifts throughout the fiscal year by alumni and friends totaling more than \$4,159,233. OWU received over \$3 million from the termination of an earlier gift of annuities, designated for the Science Initiative for

Facilities. The Tower Society welcomed 42 new members as well as 7 recommitments during the year, with deferred commitments totaling over \$11.5 million. The chart below documents the purposes designated for these gifts by the donors.

Financial Summary/Stability (2008-09)










The University's endowment provides critical income to support the University's mission in every aspect of the University operations. The Ohio Wesleyan endowment enjoyed tremendous growth from 2003 through 2007 thanks to a combination of the generous support of our friends and alumni, careful stewardship by our Board of Trustees, and favorable market conditions. From its peak of over \$190 million in December of 2007, however, the endowment dropped to a low of nearly \$120 million in March of 2009. This rapid fall actually outperformed almost every major index over the same period as well as many of our peer institutions, which underscores the value of a well diversified and positioned portfolio, but does little to erase the absolute severity of the losses. Thanks to our previous investment placements and some key tactical investment decisions undertaken this spring, the endowment has seen very positive growth and returns since its March low, rebounding to more than \$145 million by June 30, and to more than \$160 million as of October 1, 2009.

Even with the success of our on-going fundraising efforts and dedicated work of the investment committee, the value of the Ohio Wesleyan University endowment remains at the lower end of our peers in the Great Lakes College Association (GLCA). In order for OWU to maintain its competitive edge as an institution of choice for the best students and faculty, it is imperative that we significantly grow the endowment through all gifts, including estate commitments.

LOOKING AHEAD

After a year of careful planning and collaborative conversation about the future of the University, Ohio Wesleyan is poised for an exciting and eventful 2010. OWU's course over the decade to come will be set by its new Strategic Plan, and a rigorous new curricular plan that is under development will shape the educational experience for our students based on three strategic pillars:

- Theory to Practice
- International Exposure
- Tightly-knit Community

THEORY TO PRACTICE

In the months ahead, OWU will develop a curricular approach that will touch every student, increasing opportunities to blend classroom theory with practical experiences on and off campus through internships, apprenticeships, volunteer service, undergraduate research, leadership development, study travel, study abroad and artistic endeavors. The completion of the curricular plan will require substantial investment to add more faculty positions and make resources available for faculty development, student and faculty grants and new programming. The OWU approach of combining rigorous classroom study with real-world experience equips students with the tools and habits they will need to be successful and fulfilled in their chosen fields of endeavor beyond OWU. To support this initiative, we will, competitively award \$250,000 in grants to students and faculty for theoryto-practice and international opportunities in the coming year.

The success of such a distinctive curricular initiative is dependent upon our efforts to support our outstanding faculty. We must increase the size of the faculty to allow us to reduce class sizes, particularly in those areas that offer more opportunities for students to connect theory and practice. A lower faculty-to-student ratio also will provide more opportunities for tutorials, seminars, directed readings, independent studies, and mentoring for more personal, engaged learning experiences that allow students to connect theory to practice. In addition, we will increase resources for faculty professional development and scholarly work. Finally, in order to recruit and retain top faculty talent, we will ensure that our faculty compensation increases accordingly as our competitive position improves among our peer set.

INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENT

With a keen appreciation for the increasingly interdependent global community in which our students will live and work in the years ahead, we will significantly expand opportunities for them to gain international exposure as part of their OWU experience. We will increase opportunities for international experiences including semesters of study abroad, shortterm study-travel experiences during mid-term breaks and the summer, volunteer experiences in developing countries, and travel with faculty and classmate as part of particular courses. This spring we will offer three courses that include international travel for the students enrolled in the courses. Our students must hone skills that will enable them to thrive in a global environment where they regularly interact with individuals and organizations representing other nations and diverse cultural heritages. We will encourage students to develop tolerance and understanding of diverse perspectives, and to communicate with sensitivity and empathy.

TIGHTLY KNIT COMMUNITY

At Ohio Wesleyan, we consider it vitally important to provide co-curricular opportunities that contribute to the development of the whole person and that build a strong sense of community on our campus. We will increase the resources available for these programs to foster a vibrant, close-knit community environment. Our intention is to increase student satisfaction as we help them discover their passion. Success in this area will be measured by increased retention, graduation rates, and engagement among young alumni.





IMPROVING THE LIVING AND LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Our strategic plan calls for renewal of our physical campus as the laboratory for learning. In 2009, we broke ground on the Meek Aquatics and Recreation Center, the first all-new construction at Ohio Wesleyan in nearly a decade, with an expected completion in 2010. This facility will not only house the varsity swim teams, but it also will become a focal point for campus OHIO WESLEYAN and community fun and fitness—a wonderful UNDERSTANDS THAT THE gathering place for all of our students. The Meek Center is the University's first "green" SHARED EXPERIENCE building, heated and cooled by geothermal OF RESIDENTIAL LIFE energy from 90 wells.

IS ESSENTIAL TO THE Ohio Wesleyan understands that the shared PERSONAL GROWTH AND experience of residential life is essential to the personal growth and sense of community at OWU. We have begun planning for the renovation of Stuyvesant Hall, a longawaited initiative that will preserve one of the University's most treasured architectural landmarks. Our plan also includes the restoration and refurbishment of other living spaces—residence halls, small living units, and fraternity houses—to make them more conducive to the establishment of learning communities and to give students more opportunities to interact informally and feel a greater sense of belonging. Our goal is to increase on-campus residency to nearly 100 percent. We will also enhance Greek life with clear understandings and expectations of mission, program, and accountability.

Over the next decade we will devote resources to the academic side of campus as well. Our plans call for the renovation of University Hall to make it fully accessible, and in the longer term, we are looking at plans to renovate and reopen Merrick Hall, another historic landmark on the OWU campus. We will devote resources to several academic venues, specifically Phillips Hall, Chappelear

Drama Center, and Sanborn Hall, to create better teaching spaces.

Our wide-ranging plans include a focus on student transitions and leadership, as well as health and well-being. Our educational mission includes encouraging all members of the OWU community to develop healthy lifestyles, and to participate in wellness programs. We also must invest in the ever-changing field of technology in our effort to support teaching and improve administrative efficiency

Our bold plans and objectives will require us to seek out and secure new resources to build the OWU Endowment. Our donor base must be replenished, and we

will explore new avenues to reach out and connect with

our many constituencies, whose support is vital.

The strategic plan is broad, yet it ultimately focuses on our people and the distinctive qualities of the OWU experience. The decade ahead presents limitless opportunities for our faculty, staff, and students to capitalize on their strengths and discover new avenues for learning, leadership and service.
