DX AND THE WAR

War engulfs nearly the entire world as we sit down at our typewriter after having completed work on this issue of RADEX. Let us spike all rumors by stating, now, that RADEX will definitely continue as always, bringing the DXer the best in DX news and the most complete and accurate station list in print! Now, more than ever, will we have to be on the job. Our government needs RADEX and can use the assistance of the RADEX Club and Associated Radio Clubs.

On first thought we planned on deleting all Japanese and Axis stations from our listings and omitting all news of these stations from our pages. Many readers had suggested this. However, let us not let our hastily aroused anger get the best of our better judgment. The FCC has announced that all news pertaining to these stations and facts about new stations in these countries as well as knowledge of all types of propaganda used by these stations is of value to our government. Furthermore, government monitoring posts use RADEX as a guide for checking foreign broadcasts. It is with this in mind that we urge all club members to keep us posted on any news regarding these as well as other stations throughout the world.

There is no longer time for our Station's Relation Committee to function. There is no longer time for Courtesy Programs Committees. Our government deserves the support of all clubs, NOW! RADEX has contacted the FCC, offering our services and the service of all our Associate Clubs in the interest of our country. If there ever was a time when all clubs should forget their own interests and band together for one common cause, this is THE time! We know we can count on the support of the National Radio Club, World DX Alliance, Short Wave Listeners Register, and the Universal Radio DX Club. However, a few other important clubs are missing from the above list and there are many, many smaller clubs who have yet to offer their services. Our one aim is now to assist in the defense of our country. All other aims of our proposed ARDC (Association of Radio and DX Clubs) are hereby cancelled, thus making way for an all-out effort on the part of all Radio and DX Clubs in the nation. Our co-hobbyists, the hams, are now doing their part, and WE CAN DO OURS.

Naturally our hobby is to be curtailed. There is very little DX on ham bands. All stations have been ordered off the air by the FCC. A few hams are operating in the interests of defense on special permits. No doubt there will be more of them as time passes. However, these boys and girls will be very busy and it is requested that SWL's refrain from contacting them unless reports are requested.

Broadcast band listeners find their pet treasure chests, the FCC tests, cancelled indefinitely per order of the FCC. However, DX was a great hobby long before there were FCC tests and we should not worry too much about this action. Many network stations are staying on the air much later than previously and become added obstacles to surmount. But there still is DX to be logged and stations will continue to verify good reports.

Shortwave broadcast DX will be curtailed in that listeners will have to be content to hear many countries and verify just a few. Though many times, mail does get through to nations where war is raging, our club members are forbidden to write for verifications from Axis or Axis controlled stations. All our readers are cautioned about including in any letters leaving this country, any material that may be of value to our enemies if seized.

We ask our readers to keep DXing as usual. The President, you know, has asked us not to give up our usual channels of entertainment. This is important to the morale of the nation. We sincerely ask our fellow clubs to join us in helping our country. With our combined efforts we can be of real service. We ask every DXer to form or join local chapters and we ask local chapters to contact local hams engaged in defense work and to work with them in every manner possible. Buy United States Defense Savings Stamps with the money saved by not writing for verifications from Axis stations.

It is to be borne in mind that most of the contents of this issue of RADEX was on the press before the outbreak of the war.

Our Latin American neighbors to the South are our Allies in our all-out effort to obliterate totalitarian rule from the face of the earth. It is an appropriate co-incidence that this issue of RADEX is dedicated to these Good-Neighbors of ours.

The National Radio Club, Buffalo, N. Y., entered its 9th year of successful service to DXers on Sept. 1, 1941. The N.R.C. had its beginning at York, Pa., in Sept., 1932 and was moved to Erie in 1937. In October, 1940 the club was moved to its present headquarters, Buffalo.

The 1st Annual NRC Convention held at Buffalo over Labor Day attracted 42 persons from near and far. During the banquet dinner an official charter was awarded the Milwaukee Chapter of the NRC.

Raderx DX Forecast

For JANUARY, 1942

In attempting our forecast for January we could very well copy the December forecast verbatim and let it go at that. The similarity of DX conditions of these two months constitute mid-season for DX fans. The season starts in late September and rises to a climax in December and does not begin to taper-off until February when conditions will start to show a noticeable change.

That being the case, for this month's forecast, and in keeping with the Latin American flavor in this issue, let us take a little imaginary trip into the land of tropical rhythms, beautiful señoritas, and split-frequency radio stations!

Our "Calls Heard" (listed below) will provide the experienced DXer with plenty of material for his DX wanderings. It is for the DXer who has not logged many Spanish-speaking station that we outline the easiest heard stations and attempt to help you log them.

First let's cross the Caribbean to the United States owned Puerto Rico, where WKAQ and WNEL are the principal stations. WKAQ is the easiest to hear and can be heard very soon after sunset on 620 kcs. The station is heard with incredible strength throughout early evening. The call is announced as doublay - vay - kah - ah - coo! English is sometimes used.

We expect every DXer has logged Cubans and Mexicans so we will skip these and concentrate on the DX stations! HJAN in Barranquilla is another very easy station to log. WOWO is strong on 1190 kcs., but if you tune early (shortly after 6 p.m.) you are apt to find the Spanish-speaking station on top of WOWO. Announce as "La Voz de Barranquilla" in Spanish. No English is used.



LS2, a much heard Argentine a few seasons back is now difficult to log.

To single out another South American that is easy to log, we will take you into Peru. OAX4A is the station and it operates on 854 kcs., a split frequency. OAX4A is on the air late, until midnight usually, and can be heard between the jumble on 850 kcs., and CFRB on 860 kcs. The station is best heard after 9 p.m. and announces as "Radio Nacional del Peru."

Now for the calls which were reported by RADEX readers during November and early December!

Listening for Latins

By STEVE MANN

Most DX'ers find that their difficulty with Latin American stations lies not in hearing them, but in identifying them. The purpose of this article is to give the reader some practical hints on identifying Spanish and Portuguese speaking stations.

Most of these stations do one thing that is really a big help, i.e. they strike chimes just before giving their identifying announcement. In this way, the DX'er usually knows when to listen most intently. In another part of this issue appears a list of how letters and numbers in Spanish are pronounced, so we will not concern ourselves with this method of identification here.

Although call letters are actually the best method of identifying a station, the easiest is through their slogans and individual characteristics. In most of the lists of Latin American stations appearing in this issue the slogans are given. Study these carefully; they are usually easier to understand than the call letters.

Now for a few examples of methods of identification. Mexican stations, in general, strike their chimes very slowly and make their identifications slowly and clearly. Cubans, on the other hand, speak very rapidly. Cuban stations also tend to strike only one or two chimes or gongs, where-

as Mexicans are accustomed to using four to five. Many Mexicans and Cubans don't even bother with chimes.

Central and South American stations are harder to differentiate between. In most cases, there is no special characteristic indicative of one country. As a general thing, stations in Colombia and Venezuela announce slower and more distinctly than those of other countries, but again, this is not always true.

Brazilian stations are easy to tell apart from the rest because Portuguese, not Spanish, is the language

used. The main differences between the two languages are that Portuguese has many nasal and lisping sounds which are not contained in Spanish.

On the broadcast band Latin Americans can be heard from sunset to sunrise. Brazilians are usually the first heard, often coming in as early as 5:30 p.m. An hour or so after Argentine, Uruguayan, Venezuelan, and Colombian stations begin to make their appearance. Reception again peaks between 9-10 p.m. and by 11 most of the stations have signed off. Venezuelan stations frequently sign on early in the morning. Stations YV1RK, YV1RF, and YV1RA all sign on between 5:30 and 5:40 a.m., and can frequently be heard at that time.

If your receiver is equipped with a crystal, you should be able to hear many Latins well on split frequencies. Following is a list of well heard Latins using split frequencies. TIGPH-605; TIGP-625; YSS-638; TIBAS-655; TIEP-835; OAX4A-854; YV5RQ-882; TIOS-937; HJCB-1105; TIEP2-1225; HJAT-1275; YV3RE-1475. Many of these can be heard without using a crystal under favorable conditions.

Honduras

This little Republic of Central America bounded by Antillas Sea on the North side; Nicaragua on the East side; Pacific Ocean, Nicaragua and Salvador on the South side and Guatemala on the West side, has about 115,000 sq. kms. and around 115,000 inhabitants. It has at present 5 broadcasting stations on long and short-waves: HRN "La Voz de Honduras" working with the same call letters and power (500 watts) in three different frequencies: 1450 kcs., 2437 and 5875. These stations are owned by Señor Rafael Ferrary of Tegucigalpa. In the rest of the Republic there are two more stations: HRD-2 "La Voz de Atlantida" in La Ceiba, on 6235 kcs. and 250 watts and HRP-1 "El Eco de Honduras" in San Pedro Sula, transmitting on 6351 kcs. with 100 watts. The former owned by Señora Genoveva V. de Castaneda and the latter by General Filiberto Diaz Zelaya. Honduras has granted license to six amateurs: HRIAA, HRIFR, HRIJC, HRIJR, HRIUG and HR2A. In the international prefixes, it was assigned from HQA to HRZ notwithstanding they are only using HR for broadcasting and amateurs.

CBK has been heard quite often by Frank B. Lee on Saturday nights and early Sunday morning. They verified by card in eight days. Signal on these broadcasts was an R5-6.

570 kcs.

2YA was heard with good signals several times this year by R1151 (Ind.).

580 kcs.

WIBW in Topeka sends a souvenir of their plant.

590 kcs.

WEEI comes on the air at 5 a.m. week-days. . . . CMCY over-rides almost everything on this channel practically every night. . . . KHQ verified by R2145 (Ohio) through CMCY at 11 p.m. . . . KGMB is an R9 bet in Indiana, according to R1151.

600 kcs.

TIGPH on 605 kcs. can be heard in Eastern U. S. A. in evening very regularly.

610 kcs.

WIOD is a station on this channel that often over-rides WIP in New England, not WMUR! R2327 is the authority for this statement. . . . 2FC



LR4, a nifty red and white card.

can be heard on Tuesday mornings when WIP is off the air. (R1151-Ind.).

620 kcs.

WKAQ over-rides everything on this channel in the early evening until they sign off. . . . Then on 625 kcs., with some sharp tuning and if you're not too near WPRO, TIPG can be heard with good signals until 11 p.m. or later. . . . R1151 reports that 3AR verified for reception of last April 4th with a card showing artists featured on the Merry-Go-Round, a weekly program on Monday night. 2CO and 3LO also use this same card.

630 kcs.

WMAL signs off at 2 a.m. and WPRO is on at 6 a.m.—this via Ernie Cooper. . . . 4QN was heard by R1151 (Ind.) from 5:30-5:45 a.m. . . . R1397 reports CMZ heard evenings with regularity. . . .

640 kcs.

WNAD, "The Voice of the Soonerland", verifies promptly. Schedule is from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

650 kcs.

TIBAS in San Juan de Tibas, Costa Rica, is a new 8 kw. station which is

being widely heard between WEAF and WSM. As far as we can determine, this station was first identified by any reporter when Steve Mann dug it out at the recent Bay State Chapter Meeting at the home of your editor. An assist goes to Walter Madigan, who submitted the Costa Rican list which provided the incentive for attempting to tune the station. . . . 1YA, one of the easiest heard TP's can be heard every morning according to R1151.

CX6 is believed by R1397 (Ind.) to be the station using Spanish which he is hearing very weakly, beneath WSM around 10 p.m.

680 kcs.

WLAW and WPTF make a scramble of this channel in Connecticut. (R2194). . . . Even the broadcasters are commenting on new RADEX. R2551 (Iowa) reports that WISR on November 17th had a DX program on which several nice plugs were given RADEX and compliments awarded for our improved magazine. Thanks WISR, hats off to you!

700 kcs.

Many DXers are mystified by the Spanish speaking station behind WGN every evening. Reporters are inclined to believe it is HJCU, but no one has identified it.

760 kcs.

London on 767 kcs. has been reported heard twice by R695 (N. J.) at 5:15 p.m., just before sign off.

770 kcs.

KOB is now on this frequency after having changed from 1030 kcs. . . . 31.O can be heard when KXA is off the air on Sunday mornings.

790 kcs.

Station heard on Oct. 5th at 2 a.m. giving hurricane warnings for Bahamas. Could it have been ZNS? C. Cope of Philadelphia would like to know. . . . ZNS and CMBC battle for supremacy in the evening on thi-

channel in New York area (Koppenlon). XEDF in Nuevo Laredo is now on this channel, having moved from 1260 kcs. (R1088, Texas).

800 kcs.

London on 804 kcs. reported by Frank B. Lee (N. J.) at 5:15 p.m. on two separate occasions.

820 kcs.

WAIT, says Ernie Cooper (N. Y.) does NOT come on at 6 a.m., as previously reported. They can be heard at 7 a.m. on Sunday morning.

830 kcs.

Station behind WCCO every evening is causing much comment. However we believe there are two stations as some readers—especially in New England have heard the station identify as LR-5, while those farther west are hearing the Mexican XELA. . . . TIEP is actually being heard on 835 kcs., not 825 kcs. as listed in official lists. TIEP can be heard until 11 p.m. or midnight. . . .

850 kcs.

KFUO now using 50 kw. broadcast a test on December 12th, one of those superb DX programs which this station usually broadcasts. Listeners who report, in accordance with the station's policy, will receive a beautiful souvenir of KFUO.

OAX4A on 854 kcs., your editor finds, is one of the easiest South Americans to log, especially if your receiver tunes sharply. XEMO is in the clear from midnight to 2 a.m. daily.

870 kcs.

HJCC is being heard through WWL on this frequency by R1397, but Jim expects a difficult time in copying veri data with WWL, as

strong as it is. . . . BBC station in London on 877 kcs. reported logged once by R695 (N. J.) at 5:15 p.m.

900 kcs.

CHML comes on the air at 5 a.m. daily.

930 kcs.

WBBC comes on the air at 6:30 a.m. with hill-billy music.

950 kcs.

KFEL is a 24-hour station except on a Wednesday morning when the station goes off the air at 3 a.m. . . . CMBZ heard on a Monday morning at 1:15 a.m. announcing that they would verify all correct reports sent to P. O. Box 866, Havana.—R1319, Mass.

970 kcs.

WAAT is a twenty-four hour station, but have Tuesday morning as their silent period. (Stations having a silent day deserve a special note of thanks from our DX fans for the courtesy).

980 kcs.

CMCK comes on at 4 a.m. with programs similar to those of XEAW's, giving their mailing address as Chicago.

990 kcs.

CKY reported heard well from 1-1:15 a.m. by R1319 (Mass.).

1000 kcs.

VOCM (actually 1005 kcs.) in St. Johns, Newfoundland is being heard in Northeastern U. S. A. in the late afternoon just after sunset. Frank B. Lee (N. J.) was the first to report VOCM. . . . WINS says "Good Morning" at 7:30 a.m. daily.

1010 kcs.

XEAW is still riding supreme in this channel with signals that are unequalled by any other Mexican station. R2336 (La.) states that their mailing address is Dallas, Texas.

1030 kcs.

Spanish speaking station heard at 10:04 p.m. and earlier by R1397 is believed to be LR9, although not identified.

1050 kcs.

XEG now uses the slogan the "Voice of North America." The slogan is very "a propos" as the station really blankets the continent with its powerful signal.

1070 kcs.

LR-1 occasionally over-rides CBA, but not up in New England where CBA is a powerhouse! However, at sign-off of CBA, LR-1 can sometimes be heard as their closing announcement takes about five minutes longer than CBA's!

1100 kcs.

XEFO is actually on 1107 kcs., not 1110 kcs. as officially announced, and DXers should be careful not to mistake it for the split frequency HJCB! —R1151.

1140 kcs.

WRVA, through its W. H. Wells, notifies of the station's change to a strict NBC station, dropping its Mutual affiliation. 1150 kcs.

WCOP comes on the air every morning at 6 a.m. . . . XEJP is the Mexican station being heard on this frequency (1153 kcs. to be exact) all night and into the early morning hours. . . . CHSJ is heard with good signal (R1319-Mass.) through WCOP even before that station signs off, as early as 4 p.m. CHSJ is excellent after WCOP sign off.

XEB in Mexico City is heard very well in the East. . . . R1151 reports a Costa Rica station heard once on 1225 kcs. . . . R600 indentified this station as TIEP2 on your editor's receiver and we have since identified it ourselves.

1230 kcs.

WCED in Dubois, Penna. was first reported on the West coast by Raleigh Biss of Banning, Calif. Don't forget you can get last minute RADEX tips over this station on the last Tuesday of the month from 4-5 a.m. . . . WITW is silent from 3-5 a.m. every Tuesday morning and all night on the second Tuesday of month. WFTC tests the first Tuesday of month from 3:30-4 a.m. . . . WHOP has a regular test every third Friday from 3:30 a.m. . . . KPOW in Powell, Wyo. operates from 6:45 a.m. to 10:15 p.m. daily and from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Veri is a picture post card signed by Al and Rosemary (Meyer). Al is amateur W7GBY.

CHGB is sometimes heard in New England during regular evening schedule.

1240 kcs.

WINN slogan is "Win Louisville with WINN". The chief engineer is Al Rutherford.

1260 kcs.

XEL heterodyne's WOL all night program.

1270 kcs.

HJAT (1275 kcs.) is another split frequency station that can be heard by a little sharp tuning in the early evening.

1280 kcs.

WHBI, a lot of DXers need this station, is on every Monday morning until 3 a.m., so says Ernie Cooper.

1290 kcs.

WHLD can be heard coming on the air every morning at 6:30 a.m.

1300 kcs.

KOL, according to Otto Renninger of the station's transmitter staff will carry an hour of music for the Grand National SWL Club from 4-5 a.m. on January 2nd. This will probably be KOL's only DX program this season.

WISH verification is printed on regular government post-card.

A Spanish speaking station was heard by 1151 (Ind.) from 10:00-10:30 p.m. on 1365 kcs. Bob thinks it might have been ZP5! !

1380 kcs.

WBNX doesn't make its morning bow on the ether until 9 a.m.! Station is now on until 2 a.m., however.

1400 kcs.

WCOS uses a $\frac{1}{4}$ wave vertical uniform cross section antenna. Address is 200 state Street, Columbia, S. C. H. Whittier of Mass. sends this item. . . . WLLH begins its broadcasting day at 6:30 a.m. . . . WJLB's schedule corrected: 5:15 a.m. to 1:30 a.m. (Thanks Ernie Cooper). WMIN is on until 3 a.m. every morning except Mondays. . . . WRRN in Warren, Ohio went on the air November 10th. Previous to this, it is claimed that Warren was the largest city in U. S. without a broadcast station. . . . WATW in Ashland, Wisconsin verified for R2006 with a long letter saying that two of their former announcers were at Sheppard Field. Dave Page signed the verification and "The Voice of Chequamegon Bay" is slogan used. . . . WORD in Spartanburg, S. C., requests a self-addressed stamped envelope for verification. . . . WMGA in Moultrie, Ga. is known as "The Patron's Station". . . .

1430 kcs.

WBYN is a hard station to verify. Try addressing a note to J. McDonough, Chief Engineer advises Ernie Cooper. . . . R1151 is creating the impression that he is our premier TP DXer in the East. He reports 3ZB at 4:25 and at 6:05 a.m. with weak signals and QRM'd by still another TP, believed to be 2WL! ! KLO in Ogden, Utah is on every Sunday from 3-5 a.m. with a request program. A good oportunity for Eastern DXers to log this station.

1440 kcs.

WAAB starts its broadcasting day at 7 a.m. daily.

1450 kcs.

KGIW in Alamosa, Colo., according to Ed Alen, owner, is the highest regular broadcasting station in North America.

1470 kcs.

XESM is very strong after 1 a.m. daily, according to Bob Koppelon (N. J.). Another South American to try in early evening hours is YV3RE on 1475 kcs. This one is not too easily heard, however.

1490 kcs.

WNLC in New London, Conn. puts on one of the most interesting DX programs during their monthly FCC check. The names of DXers who reported the previous program are read over the air. (R2551). . . . WIGM in Medford, Wisconsin started broadcasting on October 26th. Nathan Williams, chief engineer at WIGM says that they are notably one of the smallest cities with a NEW broadcast station. Population is 2300. While there are smaller places, they have had stations there some time, and started when initial investment was small in comparison to what it is today.

1520 kcs.

WHIP starts pouring words and music into the ether each day come seven chimes in the ayem!

1560 kcs.

WQXR has been operating with 10 kw. for some time, according to R1878 (N. Y.).



French West Africa

FGA on 9395 kcs. was heard sign-off at 3:29 p.m., using chimes and announcement in French, "Radio Dakar."—R2003 (N. Y.)

French Morocco

"Radio Maroc" on 8035 kcs. heard with fair signals around 3 p.m. They announce as "Radio Maroc" after four gongs.—R1319 (Mass.)

Mozambique

CR7BE now on 9830 kcs. heard by R600 (N. H.) from 2-4 p.m. News in English is at 3 p.m. and in French at 3:30 p.m. Station frequently stays on after 4 p.m. reading messages in Portuguese... CR7BD on 15250 kcs. also has the program but is considerably weaker.

Union of South Africa

ZRL on 9606 kcs. in Capetown is beginning to be heard regularly on 11:45 p.m. to 2 a.m. transmission. At midnight a clock strikes 7 a.m., African time.—R2117 (Pa.)

ASIA

China

XCDN is correct call for the pro-British station in Shanghai on 119300 kcs. Though the prefix XC is not assigned to China, it makes a convenient call as it forms the initials of the owners the North China Daily News! Station has a short news session evenings from 6:45-7 p.m. R2228 (Mass.) and R600 (N. H.) deserve credit for this item.

XMHA on 11855 kcs. is the American owned station in Shanghai and comes in fairly well from 7-8 p.m. on English transmission. News is heard at 7 p.m.—R600 (N. H.)

French Indo China

"Radio Saigon" reported by R2228 (Mass.) as coming in very well about any time of the day. They were heard on 11780 kcs. at 12 noon to 12:17 p.m. with French news by a lady. Identification was chimes which precede and follow all Saigon programs. . . . R600 (N. H.) reports Saigon R9 on the 7-7:20 p.m. transmission on same channel. Program opens with "La Masseilles", followed by "Ici la Voix de la France en Extreme Orient." Station is pro-Vichy.

India

VUD-3 on 9590 kcs. in Delhi, India is heard coming on the air at 6:30 a.m. with native program. News in English is heard at 7:30 a.m.—R2117 (Pa.)

VUD-4 on 11830 kcs. reported by R2117 (Pa.) and R1691 (Mass.) from 6:50-8 a.m. News in English is also heard on this station at 7:30 a.m.

Japan

All Japanese broadcast stations are now enemy broadcasters and will no doubt be used in spreading malicious enemy propaganda. All news and programs intercepted by our readers from these stations is to be treated and accepted as propaganda.

Java

PLP on 11000 kcs. is reported by R2006 as occasionally coming on the air at 5:30 p.m.

Turkey

TAP on 9465 kcs. was reported by R2117 (Pa.) from 2:15-2:28 p.m. with a fair signal.

Zanzibar

Station on 9375 kcs., believed to be in Zanzibar, has been heard twice at 2:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. with a very weak signal. Station transmits native music and talks in a foreign language. Identification sounds like "This is Zanzibar Calling" and "Ici Zanzibar."—R2009 (Cuba).

EUROPE

Azores—New

Ponta Delgada, after using 14400 kcs. for a short period now seems to have definitely settled upon 7300 kcs. for its 3-4 p.m. broadcast and on 4002 kcs. for its 5-7 p.m. program. Both broadcasts are heard with good signal, but the lower frequency is subject to more QRM at times. Opening announcement is "Aqui Portugal em Ponta Delgada, emissora da onda curta da Emisora Nacional." Station opens and closes with clock striking the hour and the Portuguese National Anthem. No call letters are used, although it is believed the assigned call on 4002 kcs. is CT2AJ. R600 and R1319 share honors on this report.

Eire

Athlone on 17840 kcs. heard by Wardman (Pa.) from 12:30-1:17 p.m. with weak signals. News and American popular songs were heard. They want reports addressed to Chrysler Bldg., N. Y.

France

"Radio Inconnu" on 9750 kcs., the anti-Vichy station broadcasts at 2:30 p.m. and is heard with R9 plus sig-

nals. The tolling of bells opens the program, followed by the announcement "Ici Radio Inconnu", and then a talk. Only French is used. R600 (N. H.)

Germany

"Gustav Seigfried Eins" finally identified by R2228 (Mass.) as his own mystery station on a new frequency of 9480 kcs. This station is anti-Nazi and is believed located somewhere in Germany.

All "D" broadcasters in Germany and German occupied areas are to be treated by Radex readers as enemy broadcast stations and news and other broadcasts emanating from these stations should be accepted as enemy news and propaganda.

Great Britain—New

A flock of new BBC frequencies and calls have made their appearance, most of them as yet unlisted in "London Calling". Here are those which RADEX readers have identified.

W9XLA on 25400 kcs. in Denver, Colo., is also heard mornings at the same time as W5XAU. W9XLA asks for reception reports and relays the programs of KLZ. The station uses 100 watts.—R1691 (Mass.)

ZFY's schedule on 6130 kcs. is from Monday through Saturday from 7-9 a.m., 11 a.m., to 1 p.m., and 5:30-8:30 p.m., with program lasting until 9:30 p.m. on Saturday.

From the kitchen comes the pleasant aroma of hamburgers (being fried by friend wife), near the right hand rests sundry cans of cool refreshment, waiting to be wafted toward dry lips as the curtain rises on ye olde Ham Hounder about to break forth with his monthly round of ham gossip and DX news.

His typewriter stutters madly amid a jungle of cards, letters, reports, news and sundry bits from here and there and from its ever-yawning maw flows a fount of information soon to become a record for posterity in the never-dying pages of Radex.

Radexers, Ham Hounding is on the air!

Last month we hinted that a new idea was buzzing around in our bonnet—that each issue we would print a short biography of one of our fellow-members so that the rest of us would know each other more intimately. If Radex is going to be the same to SWLing as the ARRL is to amateur radio, let's do the job right.

So every issue we're going to present a snapshot portrait of a Radexer—chosen by lot from those who in the past have helped by shooting in their reports (if you haven't yet sent in a report direct to me do so at once and get your name on the lists).

We have a roster of all those who in the past two years have contributed to Ham Hounding. To select the honored one for each issue the names are juggedled in a hat and drawn quite like the draft lottery that took place recently in Washington.

This month Charles H. Adams, Jr. (known to club members as R1784 and to his friends as Bill) is the lucky winner of the Ham Hounding lottery.

Bill leads the personality parade. Take a gander at yon picture of Bill and listen herewith to his story.

Bill is 17 years old and a senior at Philadelphia's Northeast Public High School. His home is in suburban Holmesburg. He began DXing two years ago and at present has 123 amateur QSLs and 115 veries from broadcast stations.

His receiver is an Echophone Commercial (six tubes) with a power consumption of 35 watts. The antenna is a 12-ft. vertical, 70 feet above the ground.

Bill's favorite ham bands are 10 and 20 meters, although occasionally he wanders up to the 75 and 160-meter bands. His best ham veris are K7BUUB, K7GNN, XE3AH, CO2JH, K4GSG and K5AM. Best broadcast DX includes COK, CMQ, COCQ, HCJB, CHNX and XERA.

Defense continues to play an important role in radio. Montana radio hams have teamed up in a statewide network to sound alarms and summon aid in any sort of emergency. Tom

D. Caverly is the coordinator of Montana's defense commission.

At a ten-state conference on defense problems held recently in Denver, Caverly said there were about 75 hams in the network, which goes into each of Montana's 53 counties.

"Each operator has a definite schedule, under which he is on duty a certain night of the week. By maintaining a regular schedule, the network will be in complete working order in case of floods, fires, airplane crashes, severe storms and so on. The value of this organization of operators in case the country goes to war is apparent."

W1NTV was dedicated November 10 in New London, Conn., as the first United Service Organization short-wave radio station in the United States. High dignitaries of the national defense program, army, navy, church and stage participated in the ceremonies which were broadcast over the Mutual network.

Rear Admiral Clark H. Woodward (U. S. N.), attached to the Office of Civilian Defense; W. Spencer Robertson, chairman of the USO's executive committee; Miss Carol Bruce of Universal Pictures, and Martin H. Work of Hollywood, radio consultant to the National Catholic Community Service, participated in the dedication at New London, while from WOL in Washington Maj. Gen. Dawson Olmstead, chief signal officer of the army, broadcast his annual message to the more than 60,000 amateurs in America.

The station is the first of a huge network providing service men facilities for sending radio messages, free of charge, to their homes and families.

Here's further news on ham band changes, thanks to L. M. Jensen of Cowley, Wyo.:

The proposed dropping of Class A restriction has been abandoned and 20 meters and what's left of 75 meters will be strictly Class A. The 7250-7300 phone band will open on Dec. 20, 1941.

Ralph Kastner (R1088) took the trouble to write to the FCC and thereby cleared up what might have been a mystery to some of you.

Ralph heard W2JT in a QSO with XE1NO and CX2CO one day and knowing that the FCC had banned amateur communication between W's and foreign hams, asked the FCC "How come?"

The FCC wrote back and sent a copy of the commission's Order 72-L permitting Earl F. Lucas, licensee of W2JT, to communicate with amateurs located in South and Central America "for the purpose of fostering friendship between peoples of the American republics."

No doubt others have been given similar permission.

We greet as new reporters Joe and Al Kaiser, of Mahanoy City, Pa., who send in their first bits of news. Joe is R2234 and Al R2221. Let's have more reports, fellows. Keep up the good work. Harlie Smith, Jr., is also a newcomer, sending a list of fine QRAs. Arthur M. Hankins, R7, sends in his first report—a dandy—direct to Ham Hounding.



He was the K4 winner of the 3rd, 4th, 7th and 8th ARRL international DX contests, winner of the 1935 ARRL Sweepstakes, and was co-winner with K4RJ of the 1935 ARRL copying bee. He holds an ARRL 35-wpm code proficiency certificates. Ev was S. C. M. for the Puerto Rican-Virgin Island section in 1928-1930 and at present is assistant S. C. M. of the West Indies section.



We had the extreme good fortune to select for one of our featured amateurs this month Viola Grossman--W2JZX—one of famous Grossman trio of father, mother and son.

Mrs. Grossman is the communications chairman of the Women's Defense Council of her county on Long Island and at present is helping to instruct 300 other women with facts on how to assist licensed radio operators during emergencies. These women are learning to copy code, be familiar with all the "Q" signals, ARRL phonetic list, and how to originate and write up a service message.

Many of the 300 women will go on into advanced course, which takes in theory, practice, communication laws and be ready to take license examinations next summer. Furthermore, more women are joining the classes daily.

Viola became interested in ham radio when convalescing from an operation in 1934. Thrilled at the conversations heard on her shortwave set, she and her husband both studied and became Class A in 1936 and 1937. Their son, Kenneth, also successfully

passed the exam and today they are a keen partnership—Sam, W2JDG, Viola's husband, doing the designing; Kenneth doing the building (with some help from Viola); and Viola the operating (along with the others, of course).


All have done marvelous emergency work. Viola during the Ohio River flood kept the 160-meter band monitored and open for emergency messages. She assisted in the New England disaster by handling messages and also during the 1938 California flood. After the latter emergency she was appointed emergency coordinator for her county.

In 1938 Viola was nominated for the Paley award, given each year by CBS to the amateur radio operator who had done the most for people of the U. S. in line of public service.

As for SWL veri requests:

"I am very happy to hear from them," says Viola. "I feel that they should rate a QSL card. If they take the time to write and list a heard contact, the least I can do is say 'thank you for your interest.' It IS appreciated by this station."

W5HQV is a station heard very often because Johnny Sasser, its operator, has plenty of time for contacts. He is a ticket agent for the Oklahoma Railway and since he works from 3 p.m. to midnight and has two days a week off the air is quite busy around his Oklahoma City home most of the time.



Johnny is a regular reader of Raderx, QSLs 10 per cent and answers all SWLs with a picture QSL of the station! He is single and 35 years old.

Johnny is a member of the Screwball Network on 160 meters which meets around 2 a.m. nightly. The purpose of the net is to be as silly as possible and yet make it enjoyable for the other members. All transmitters are equipped for break-in operation and since one of the rules is never to hold transmissions over 3 minutes all members have acquainted themselves with fast break-ins. During an exciting session one may hear just a simple "Eeek!"

For the 75-meter band Johnny uses a pair of TW 150's and on 160 a pair of RCA 810's—both 1KW input. For 10, 20 and 40 meters a pair of RCA

812's is used. All transmitters operate fone and CW, and controlled by a Meissner Signal-Shifter. Receiver is an HRO.

W4CAY of Charlotte, N. C., is our other sectional representative—Arthur L. Blalock, an electrical engineer. He is 40 years old, has three daughters (all married) and a son, a high school senior.

He is president of the Charlotte Amateur Radio Club and a member of the ARRL and ROWH.

Snapshots of Blalock's ham radio experience from when he started in 1912: initials used for call letters . . . used any old frequency . . . from spark transformer to rotary gap . . . the government license with call letters 4QW, frequency 200 meters . . . DX 1000 miles with old Hartley circuit, four 202 tubes in parallel . . . on 70 meters for a while but not very active because the job took him on the road . . . the night he came home after a bad sleet storm and found the bottles in the rectifier broken by the freeze . . . end of ham radio until 1931 when the bug bit again . . . took the exam and came back on air with new call, new license . . . now has a 50-watt CW and fone rig and a 50-watet rig on 40 CW.

W4CAY still likes code best and uses push to talk system on fone and break-in on CW. His pet peeves are two—the nets with about 20 stations all over the band instead of on one frequency and the fellows who have ECO and don't know how to use it!

As for SWL cards, they go unanswered unless sufficient postage is sent. He is absolutely correct when he says the fellow requesting a card should send the postage because it must be remembered that the amateur sending the card must also stand the cost of printing those cards.

Latin America

HAPPY HUNTING GROUND FOR SWLS

With war blocking amateur radio operations to the east and the west, the short wave listener is turning his attention to Latin America where staccato Spanish is being thrown nightly into the air lanes, ready to be picked up by the more alert tuner-inner.

On 40, 20 and 10 meters DX stations are waiting to be heard—10 and 50-watt transmitters from as far south as the Straits of Magellan and from such bizarre regions as the jungles of Peru and Brazil.

The listener doesn't need to know Spanish—but it will help. Every night at least half a dozen amateurs are speaking English, either for practice when the time comes when once more the U. S. stations will be allowed to communicate with other countries, or because they are speaking to some lonely American in a mining or farming outpost.

Some W stations have been given permission to contact Latin Americans "to foster goodwill" between the nations, and their contacts may be heard speaking English.

But to build up an impressive list of Latin American QSLs, learn the Spanish alphabet printed in another page of this issue. It's simple and if you know the letters and numbers you will find it easy to catch a station's call.

Then if you hear "Eckes ay uno ellay eckes," you'll know you have hit upon XEILX. It will take practice because the Spanish language is spoken faster than the English but through perseverance and a little study one will find that more and more stations will become identified.

Now, where are these stations?

Most of the ones heard in the U. S. are on 20 meters between 14000 and

15150 kilocycles. Tune across that portion of band on any night when conditions are good and the Spanish will flutter in. The strongest will probably be Mexican or Cuban amateurs—the latter well-known by their "Say-oh" prefix.

On 10 meters English is heard more than Spanish from the Latin Americans.

On 40 meters there are still more Spanish-speaking amateurs, more difficult to identify because usually they must over-ride the American code stations and because they seem to talk a faster Spanish for some reason or other.

A few may be heard on 75-meterfone and if one knows the code still more can be heard on all four bands.

Some of the better-known amateurs have become popular in the U. S. for their willingness to QSL and for their fairness and treatment of the amateur radio hobby. Notable among them is the "old skipper," Felix Gunther, operator of LU1DA and LU8AB.

Gunther, an import broker, has never failed to QSL for an SWL, whether or not the postage was enclosed. His LU8AB is in Buenos Aires and LU1DA is at his summer home in suburban Hurlingham.

LU5CK, LU7BK and others have QSLed willingly for the shortwave listener to make Argentina one of the most noted QSLing countries. Brazil is next with Venezuela and Colombia tied for third. Other countries follow with Chile a bad last in the matter of QSLs.

Other noted South and Central Americans include YV4AE, a pastor in Turmero, Venezuela; HP1A, the only amateur in the republic of Panama; LU2BG, who operates a police (Next page)

RETURN POSTAGE

A problem always arises when the DXer reaches the point where he is about to enclose return postage when writing the foreign countries. Common courtesy demands that something be enclosed to re-imburse the station for its time and effort.

An IRC (International Reply Coupon) is very unsatisfactory because in many localities (especially in Latin America) the radio stations find it very difficult to cash these coupons and would rather lose the small amount obtained by cashing them rather than go through the complications that go with cashing such a coupon. At best the IRC's bring the recipient only half of what was originally paid for the coupon.

American coins are not suitable for inserting in letters and this method of enclosing return postage is not recommended.

The ideal method would be enclose unused stamps of the country to which you are writing. But these, you say, are not to be had, or at least it would be difficult to obtain them. Yes, it would be, if it were not for Walter H. Koester.

Walter, you know, runs the RETURN POSTAGE BUREAU, 85 Francisco Ave., Rutherford, N. J., where at nominal fee you can purchase stamps from any country in the world! In connection with our Latin American issue we list below the Latin American countries which are included in the RETURN POSTAGE BUREAU's price list. Price is the cost to you per stamp for post-card and letter rate stamps respectively.

radio system; HK3CL, operated jointly by Mario and Eduardo Roncallo C.; PY2LM, who has one of Brazil's prettiest QSL cards; HH2MC, who is a Haitian government official; HH2B, the widely known station of Gertrude and Bill Bleo; and PY2MH and PY2IT—the colorful dual station of the romantic Major Carlos Villaca and his wife.

A resume of Latin American amateurs would not be complete without mention of the Ruede el Oeste, an international radio society that numbers among its members even stations of the United States.

The RdO corresponds in the southern Americas with the American Radio Relay League of the U. S. Its countries number almost 20 and on Oeste cards contain the flags of the various countries in the union. All Ruede cards are the same no matter what country the amateur belongs to—except, of course, the calls and addresses differ.

Ruede del Oeste members are pledged to the same principles that the ARRL has incorporated into its platform and all members must QSL if an SWL sends a report with postage. The club is for the furtherance of the principles of amateur radio and good will between countries.

So if you yearn for a scrapbook full of good DX from our southern neighbors, learn the Spanish alphabet and numbers and tune in some night—you'll find it an interesting game.

HIGH FIDELITY STATICLESS STATIONS

Beneath the frequency in kilocycles are given the call, location, coverage (or power), owner, type of station, and schedule if known.

CLUB BUSINESS

It will be the duty of the above committee members to contact by mail or personally the chief engineers of stations in their assigned areas. The members will try to determine the stations feelings toward the DX hobby and ask the engineer for suggestions on how relationships may be resumed and how, if possible, the DXers can be of any assistance to the stations. They will acquaint the engineer with the RADEX Club's aim to organize all Radio and DX Clubs

into one Association or "United Front" in order to secure a uniform method of reporting to stations, to arrange a system for conducting test programs eliminating the confusing array of letters all stations receive each DX season for courtesy programs.

RADEX and the RADEX Club, remember do not want to eliminate the DX program, nor the courtesy program. But we feel that there should be a uniform system of arranging these programs, rather than have all clubs contact the same stations over a period of a few months. The decision in this matter we feel is up to the broadcaster. Let's find out what he thinks about it, and proceed to act accordingly. Perhaps the radio stations would prefer to arrange their own programs and CPC's could be used to arrange a proper date and to secure a clear channel, rather than to solicit programs. Perhaps an even better method would be to have all DX programs arranged through RADEX or a committee appointed from our Association of DX Clubs, and have each program dedicated to one club until each club has had a dedication, then we would start back at the beginning of the list and do the same thing all over again. This would assure each club of its share of publicity over the air. I do not believe there is glory for a club in claiming the honor of arranging more programs than its fellow-clubs, for in doing this it had undoubtedly offended more stations. It is my belief that stations are getting tired of so many CPC requests for programs—and the discoveries of our SRC (Stations Relations Committee) will, I hope, bear out my beliefs. SOMETHING HAS TO BE DONE.

Here is how members of our RADEX Club can help, even though they do not have the time and facilities to serve on our committee. You can let the broadcaster in on what RADEX Club is trying to do when you write for verifications and you can write

your club director (if you belong to clubs other than RADEX Club and its Associates) telling him that you are in favor of the ARDC (Association of Radio and DX Clubs) and that you'd like to have him contact RADEX about becoming Associated with us. And most important of all observe the code of ethics of all RADEX Club members:

- 1.—Include return postage.
- 2.—Send a complete and informative report (Use RADEX forms).
- 3.—Give sufficient program data for verification.
- 4.—Be courteous, ask for, but never demand verification.
- 5.—Make your letter interesting and friendly.

Chet Payfer in a letter to me hits the nail on the head when he says: "The whole hobby hinges upon verifications. I used to be satisfied in merely logging a station, but now that means little to me. My average replies have been good until recently, when no matter how complete a report I give more and more stations fail to reply."


This condition, dear Radexers, is very true—**TOO TRUE!** Our SRC is beginning operations after much harm has been done. Too many offenses and lack of sympathy for our cause or hobby are causing the broadcasters to neglect DX mail. We must act now. 
