Dear Parent

This booklet collects together in one place information to help you as you look for the right place for your child to start secondary school. It's a big decision, but we are lucky in Kent to have a wide variety of secondary schools and academies, offering a range of opportunities. Our aim is to provide a good school for every child, where they can succeed, enjoy a wide range of opportunities, and realise their potential.

Although the County Council is not the Admission Authority for all the schools and academies in this booklet, we publish the admission arrangements for all of them here and on our website, www.kent.gov.uk. We make sure that everyone who applies is offered a secondary school place on National Offer Day, 1 March 2011.

You only need to complete one application form, the Kent Secondary Common Application Form (SCAF) — either online through www.kent.gov.uk/ola or on paper - to apply to up to four secondary schools or academies, in Kent or further away. We will do our best to offer you one of the places you would like. In March 2010, 91% of children were offered a place at their first or second preference school.

The School Admissions Code asks schools to make sure that they're giving everyone clear up to date information and a fair chance to apply for a place, so even if you have older children who have been through the transfer process in the past, be sure to read the individual school entries in the booklet carefully before you submit your Kent Secondary Common Application Form, because there may be some changes.

There is a lot to consider when you are deciding which schools to apply to, and it can help to discuss your child's ability and style of learning with his or her primary school teachers first of all. Your child's current school may have a Family Liaison Officer or Parent Support Adviser who can help you if you find it hard to understand any of the information in the booklet, or you can ask the County Council's Secondary Admissions team, whose contact details are on the contents page.

In the booklet you'll also find how you can get independent advice and help with filling in the Secondary Common Application Form from a Choice Adviser. As well as co-ordinating Year 7 admissions, from this September the Local Authority will administer a new In-Year application process for all schools. This exciting new change means that families looking for secondary school places for a child of any age, at any time in the year, will be able to name up to four schools on a single Local Authority form, rather than applying separately to individual schools.

Schools and academies across the county will be opening their doors between now and 31 October 2010, the closing date for applications.

Open sessions at secondary schools give teachers and pupils the opportunity to celebrate what they have achieved, and to show how much the school can offer. For your child, meeting the staff and the pupils and learning about the academic, vocational, sporting and artistic directions they can participate in can be the start of a whole new adventure in learning, so please don't miss your chance to take a look at all the different kinds of school open to you.

May I wish your child a happy and successful future in a Kent secondary school from September 2011.

Does your child have a Statement of Special Educational Need...?

The admission arrangements for children without Statements of Special Educational Need do not in the main apply to children with Statements. The Local Authority is responsible for arranging the admission of children with Statements of Special Educational Need and for advice on these arrangements, text boxes like this one are included throughout the booklet with information to guide you through the process. Look out for these text boxes since they are the important bits of information with which you need to be concerned.

However, you may find other information in the booklet that will be useful to you in helping you to come to a decision about the school you would prefer your child to attend.

Education in Kent

This booklet lists schools in Kent. At the back there is a map that shows where the schools are. If you would like your child to go to a school outside the Kent Local Authority area, please contact that Local Authority and ask for their information booklet. Please note, however, that ALL your school applications must be made on your **home** Local Authority's application form – you cannot fill in more than one.

Admission Arrangements

Secondary Schools in Kent


The application process explained in this booklet allows you to apply for a Year 7 place at any school or academy in the Kent Local Authority area, but the way secondary education is provided varies across the county. We call the different systems *schemes of education*, and they are shown in the map below.

In many parts of Kent, some children will take part in the County Council's 11+ assessment testing, for admission to local grammar schools which accept children in Year 7. In the Cranbrook area, there is an allability school (Angley) which admits children at age 11, and a grammar school (Cranbrook School) which admits them to Year 9, at age 13. Cranbrook has its own assessment process.

In Swanley/Hextable, Swanscombe/Stone/Greenhithe, Paddock Wood and Tenterden the schools which admit pupils to Year 7 are comprehensive, and take children of all abilities. There are also some parts of Kent which are served in the same way by Academies, which admit children of all abilities to Year 7. These are Longfield (served by the Longfield Academy), the Isle of Sheppey (served by the Isle of Sheppey Academy) and Romney Marsh (served by the Marsh Academy).

You can apply for a place at any school, wherever you live in Kent (for example, if you live in an area with a comprehensive scheme you can apply for a grammar school place, or vice versa), but the oversubscription criteria for each school may mean that your child has a lower priority for a place there than children living within the same scheme as the school. If you get a place for your child outside the area you live in, you may not qualify for help with the cost of transport from home to school, because there is a nearer school your child could attend.

You should look carefully at the map below, at the oversubscription criteria for the individual schools, and the rules on travel assistance, which are on page 26 before you complete your Secondary Common Application Form. If you are not sure whether your home address comes under Kent Local Authority, check the name of the Local Authority to which you pay your Council Tax. If you are not sure whether your home address comes within a particular scheme of education, look for the name of your parish in the list given under "transport" for the school you are interested in. If you are still not sure, ring the Admissions Team for advice.



Schemes of Secondary Education available in Kent

In the following areas there are grammar schools, all-ability schools and academies. The grammar schools take pupils who qualify for places through the Kent assessment procedure. Your child will need to take part in the Kent assessment procedure if you want him/her to go to a grammar school at age 11.

THE GRAMMAR SCHOOLS ARE:

■ Ashford, Maidstone and Shepway area

Folkestone School for Girls, The Harvey Grammar, Highworth Grammar School, Invicta Grammar, Maidstone Grammar, Maidstone Grammar School for Girls, The Norton Knatchbull and Oakwood Park Grammar.

■ Canterbury, Dover, Swale (excluding Sheppey) and Thanet area

Barton Court Grammar, Borden Grammar, Chatham House Grammar, Clarendon House Grammar, Dane Court Grammar, Dover Grammar School for Boys, Dover Grammar School for Girls, Highsted Grammar, Queen Elizabeth's Grammar, Simon Langton Girls' Grammar, Simon Langton Grammar School for Boys and Sir Roger Manwood's School.

■ Sevenoaks, Tonbridge & Tunbridge Wells area

The Judd School, Tonbridge Grammar School, The Skinners' School, Tunbridge Wells Grammar School for Boys, Tunbridge Wells Girls' Grammar and Weald of Kent Grammar School.

■ Dartford, Wilmington & Gravesham area

Dartford Grammar, Dartford Grammar School for Girls, Gravesend Grammar, Gravesend Grammar School for Girls, Wilmington Grammar School for Boys and Wilmington Grammar School for Girls.

NB: Like all other schools, grammar schools may be oversubscribed, and need to apply their oversubscription criteria to decide who can be offered a place. A child who takes part in the Kent assessment procedure is not guaranteed a grammar school place, even if he or she has been assessed suitable for grammar school, and if the grammar school(s) you want cannot offer a place, we may need to offer you a place at a different sort of school.

THE ALL-ABILITY SCHOOLS ARE:

■ Ashford, Maidstone and Shepway area

Astor of Hever Community*, Brockhill Performing Arts College, Cornwallis Academy, Folkestone Academy, Maplesden Noakes, New Line Learning Academy, The North School, Pent Valley, Swadelands, Towers and Valley Park.

*At the time this booklet went to print, a proposal was underway to close the Astor of Hever Community School in December 2010 and open the St Augustine Academy in January 2011 on the same site.

■ Canterbury, Dover, Swale (excluding Sheppey) and Thanet area

The Abbey, Astor College for the Arts, The Canterbury High, Castle Community, The Charles Dickens, Chaucer Technology, The Community College Whitstable, Dover Christ Church Academy, Duke of York's Royal Military School, The Ellington and Hereson School, Fulston Manor, Hartsdown Technology College, Herne Bay High, King Ethelbert, The Marlowe Academy, Sandwich Technology, The Sittingbourne Community College, Spires Academy, Walmer Science College, and The Westlands School.

■ Malling area

Aylesford, Holmesdale Technology College, The Malling, Wrotham.

■ Sevenoaks, Tonbridge & Tunbridge Wells area

The Hayesbrook School, Hillview School for Girls, Hugh Christie Technology College, The Knole Academy and The Skinners Kent Academy.

■ Dartford, Wilmington & Gravesham area

Dartford Technology College, Leigh Technology Academy, Wilmington Enterprise College*, Meopham, Northfleet Technology College, Northfleet School for Girls and Thamesview School.

*At the time this booklet went to print, a proposal was underway to close Wilmington Enterprise College in September 2010 and open a new academy on the same site.

The following areas contain comprehensive schools and academies which take pupils of all abilities without assessment. Kent County Council regards these areas as Comprehensive Schemes of Education.

■ Paddock Wood area

If you live in the Paddock Wood area the local comprehensive school is Mascalls School.

■ Hextable/Swanley area

If you live in the Hextable/Swanley area the local comprehensive schools are Hextable School and Swanley Technology College.

■ Isle of Sheppey

The island is served by the Isle of Sheppey Academy.

■ Longfield/New Ash Green area

The Longfield and New Ash Green areas are served by the Longfield Academy.

■ Stone/Swanscombe/Greenhithe area

If you live in the Stone/Swanscombe/Greenhithe area the local comprehensive school is Swan Valley Community School.

■ Romney Marsh area

The Romney Marsh area is served by the Marsh Academy.

■ Tenterden area

If you live in the Tenterden area the local comprehensive school is Homewood School and Sixth Form Centre.

There are a number of comprehensive church aided schools in Kent which cater for the full range of abilities and admit without assessment. They accept pupils from a wide area in accordance with the admissions criteria of the individual school's Governing Body. They are:

Bennett Memorial Diocesan School (Tunbridge Wells), St George's Church of England Foundation School (Broadstairs), Saint George's CE School (Gravesend), St Gregory's Catholic Comprehensive School (Tunbridge Wells), St John's Catholic Comprehensive School (Gravesend), St Simon Stock Catholic Comprehensive School (Maidstone), The Archbishop's School (Canterbury), Ursuline College (Thanet), St Anselm's Catholic School (Canterbury), St Edmund's Catholic School (Dover), Ashford Christ Church School (Ashford)*.

* At the time this booklet went to print, a proposal was underway for Ashford Christ Church School to become The John Wallis Church of England Academy with effect from 1 September 2010.

There are two church comprehensive Roman Catholic schools in Bexley which admit pupils from age 11: St Catherine's Catholic School for Girls and St Columba's Catholic Boys' School, Bexleyheath. Further information about these schools may be obtained from The London Borough of Bexley (0208 303 7777).

There is a church comprehensive Roman Catholic school in Medway: St John Fisher Catholic School, Chatham. Further information about this school may be obtained from Medway Council (01634 331110).

Cranbrook area

If you live in the Cranbrook area your child may transfer to the comprehensive school, Angley, at age 11. If your child meets the entrance requirements he or she may transfer to the grammar school, Cranbrook, at age 13. Cranbrook has its own assessment process. Enquiries about testing should be made directly to the school. Applications must be made to the Local Authority on forms available from Cranbrook School or the Local Authority website.

1 How the Admissions Process Works

You will be invited to name four schools on your Secondary Common Application Form (SCAF).

The Local Authority will tell secondary schools who has applied for places, but not whether parents named them first, second, third or fourth on the Secondary Common Application Form.

Each school will look at all their applications, and draw up a rank order based on their oversubscription criteria to decide who will get places. This means, for example, that if how close children live to the school is an important factor, the children who live closest are most likely to be offered places, whether they named the school first, second, third or fourth on the SCAF.

The order you named the schools in only matters if more than one of them could offer your child a place. In that case, we will look back at your preferences and offer whichever of them you named highest on the form.

If we can't offer your child any of the schools you named on your form, we will write to you on 1 March offering a place at an alternative school.

2 Timetable for moving on to Secondary School

When?	What happens?
September 2010	You will receive information on secondary transfer from us through your child's primary school. Children who registered by 2 July to take the grammar school tests will take these in September and get their results on 18 October
September/October 2010	Schools hold open events
31 October 2010	You must have returned your Kent Secondary Common Application Form to your child's primary school by this date, or applied online
1 March 2011	You will be posted a letter on this date to let you know the secondary school place we are offering your child. The letter should arrive on 2 March 2011. Emails will be sent after 4pm to parents who applied on line, detailing their school place offer
22 March 2011	By this date you should have: - let the authority know whether or not you are accepting the place - made any appeal you wish to for a school you have named but haven't been offered - asked to be put on the waiting list for schools you named but haven't been offered

If your child has a Statement of Special Educational Need...

You will already have started to discuss your child's transfer to secondary school, and will have been given a form to allow you to express a preference for the school you wish your child to attend. The form should be returned to your child's primary school by 6 September 2010 and they will send it on to the local SEN+R Office (details on page 3).

Once we know which school you want, we'll write to them to consult about naming the school on your child's statement. If you don't tell us which school you want, we will write to the maintained mainstream secondary school closest to your home that can meet your child's needs.

If you are considering a grammar school place, see the box on page 14.

Schools' Admission Criteria for children joining the school in Year 7 are not applied to children with Statements. Provision for children with Statements is arranged through the Local Authority, and if a maintained school (that is, a school funded by a Local Authority) is named in your child's statement, that school must admit your child.

We will write to you in **December 2010** formally confirming the proposal to amend your child's Statement, setting out the proposed changes and seeking your views. Between December 2010 and 15 February 2011 you can make any representations about the proposed amended Statement. An amended Final Statement must be sent to you by **15 February 2011**.

If you wish to discuss any aspect of the arrangements for transfer of your child to secondary school, you should speak to your SEN Locality Officer at your local SEN+R Office.

THE MAIN FEATURES:

- Every Kent parent fills in Kent LA's Secondary Common Application Form (SCAF), online or on paper, see inside front cover.
- If you are applying to certain foundation or church aided schools you may also need to fill in a supplementary information form for return to the school (see individual schools' details).
- You are invited to name four schools you would like your child to attend.
- If any of your named schools receive more applications than there are places available your application is assessed against that school's published oversubscription criteria (see individual schools' details).
- We try to offer you a place at the school you most want.
- All children get sent one offer of a place on the same date, 1 March 2011. Letters are posted first class, to arrive on 2 March.

4 Parents' right to a school place

The law recognises that it may not always be possible to carry out parents' wishes, for a number of reasons:

- Because this would "prejudice the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources", ie because a particular school may be full.
- Because it is a selective (grammar) school and the child has not reached the required standard.
- Because the child has been permanently excluded from two or more schools.

If your child has a Statement of Special Educational Need...

The SEN Code of Practice says that if you want your child to have a mainstream education, the Local Authority must name or describe a maintained, mainstream school in the Statement, unless this would be incompatible with the efficient education of other children at the school. The Local Authority must ask you if you wish to express a preference for a *particular* maintained school (including a special school), and must comply with your preference unless:

- the school is unsuitable for your child's age, ability, aptitude or special educational needs
- the placement would not be compatible with the efficient education of other children with whom your child would be educated, or
- the placement would not be an efficient use of resources.

If you don't express a preference, the Local Authority will name the maintained, mainstream school closest to your child's home that can meet his or her needs.

If the Local Authority plans to name a school in the Statement, it must consult with that school and take account of the views the school expresses before deciding whether or not to name it. If the school is in another Local Authority's area, Kent must consult with that Local Authority, as well as the school itself.

To decide whether a school would be suitable for your child, the Local Authority must take account of any special arrangements which would be needed, and decide whether these represent an efficient use of resources. The Local Authority and/or the school must *take reasonable steps* to ensure that a maintained mainstream school is accessible, but does not have to make adaptations or provide equipment. If they would be needed at the school you've named, but are already available at another school, the Local Authority would normally look to that school.

If you want your child to go to a non-maintained school (that is, a school not funded by a Local Authority), you do not have the right to express a preference for it. However, you do have a right to make representations, and the Local Authority must always take account of what represents the most efficient use of resources provided it meets your child's needs.

5 Types of schools in Kent

The aim of Kent County Council is to provide children with a range of opportunities in secondary education that they and their parents feel will best meet their needs.

There are three types of secondary schools in Kent that are maintained by the County Council.

Community Schools

The Local Authority, Kent County Council, is the admission authority for community and voluntary controlled schools, organising the secondary transfer process and other admission arrangements.

Voluntary aided schools

These are schools that have been set up by voluntary bodies, such as churches or foundations. They are their own admission authorities but co-ordinate their secondary transfer process with the Local Authority.

Foundation schools

These schools are their own admission authorities, but they co-ordinate their secondary transfer process with the Local Authority.

You will also find some academies in this booklet.

Academies

Academies are all-ability schools set up by sponsors from business, faith or voluntary groups, working in partnership with central government and local education partners. The Department for Education (DFE) meets the costs of Academies. Although they are effectively independent schools, they provide free education. Their admission arrangements are agreed with the Secretary of State, and they are bound by the Admissions Code, like other local schools.

Note: Special schools, for children with Statements of Special Educational Need, are not included in this admission process. If you believe your child needs a special school place, you should contact your local SEN+R Office (see page 3).

6 Applying for a place in Kent if you live outside Kent

If you live outside Kent but would like to send your child to a school in the county you must name the Kent school on your home Local Authority's Common Application Form and they will liaise with us. We will then inform your home Local Authority whether we can offer your child a place at your preferred Kent school. **Please note** you may **NOT** use Kent's online application process or Secondary Common Application Form if you do not live in Kent.

7 Finding out about Kent schools

School prospectuses

Schools have their own prospectuses or booklets that explain more about what subjects they teach, what facilities they have and what they aim to achieve for their pupils.

You should contact the schools that interest you for a copy of these booklets

School open sessions

There is no substitute for seeing things for yourself. That is why all schools hold open days and evenings, when parents and children can visit and talk to teachers and existing pupils. We believe this provides a very good opportunity for you to get the feel of the school and encourage you to use the opportunities available. We strongly recommend that you visit those schools that interest you most. Headteachers welcome enquiries from parents and will be able to tell you a great deal about their schools.

8 Assessment for a Kent Grammar School

Kent Procedure

The grammar schools in Kent Local Authority's area use Kent's tests to help decide which children should be offered places. A Kent grammar school cannot offer a place to a child who has not been assessed suitable for admission to grammar school.

Testing will take place in September 2010, and parents will receive their child's assessment decision by post on 19 October. They will need to return the Secondary Common Application Form (or make an online application) by 31 October.

To be included in the tests in September 2010, a child needs to have registered for testing by 2 July 2010. More than 11,000 children had registered by the closing date. If your child has not been tested, a grammar school can't offer you a place on 1 March. If you name a grammar school on your SCAF when your child has not been tested, your application will be turned down, though you will still have the right to appeal for admission.

If your child takes the tests but does not do well enough to be eligible for a grammar school place, a grammar school cannot offer a place. If you still think that a grammar school would be the best place for your child, you can name your preferred grammar school(s) on the SCAF, but you will not be offered a place at any of them on 1 March. You will still have the right to appeal for admission.

Note: If your child does not have a Statement of Special Educational Need, but you believe that special arrangements may be necessary to allow him or her proper access to the test papers, you should discuss this first with the SENCO at your child's primary school.

If your child has a statement of Special Educational Need

If your child has a statement of Special Educational Need and you are interested in a place at a grammar school, you must register your child for testing and name a grammar school on your preference form. The Local Authority then has to carry out an assessment to determine whether that school is suitable in terms of your child's aptitude and ability, as well as their age and special needs. This is usually done through the testing process explained below.

If your child's special needs mean that some special arrangements may have to be made so that he or she can be assessed (for example, if your child has a visual impairment), the local SEN+R Team will liaise with your child's school, the Admissions Team and other relevant professionals as necessary to find out what needs to be done.

What tests are involved?

The tests, taken in September 2010, are maths, verbal and non-verbal reasoning in a multiple-choice format. Reasoning tests look at how quickly and efficiently children solve problems of increasing difficulty. These include questions using words or numbers and patterns and sequences. The tests are marked and the scores standardised. Standardisation means that each child's score can be compared with those achieved by other children of the same age. An allowance is made so that the youngest children are not disadvantaged.

We also ask children to complete a piece of writing under test conditions. This is not marked, but the Headteacher Assessment Panel may consider it at a later stage.

Testing Dates

Verbal and Non-Verbal Reasoning – 14 September 2010 Maths and Writing Task – 15 September 2010

Not all children will be able to take the tests on these days. Where we call children who live or attend school outside Kent into testing centres, the sessions will normally be as follows:

Practice tests – Saturday 11 September 2010 Main tests – Saturday 18 September 2010

Arrangements for external candidates will be confirmed to you by letter when we have processed all applications and know how many children we need to accommodate. This is likely to be in August.

How are decisions made?

The assessment decision is based on the test results. However, before you receive your decision, your child's primary school headteacher will have the opportunity to refer assessment decisions they disagree with to a panel of headteachers, with representatives from local primary and secondary schools, who will consider all the relevant information before making a decision. This can include your child's test scores, recent school work, the writing task and comments from your child's current headteacher. The panel will expect to see a full range of work for a child, regardless of which scores may be below the threshold. An assessment will only be changed by the Headteacher Panel if the panel is confident that the child will be well placed in a grammar school.

What if I disagree with the assessment decision?

You will be told whether your child has been assessed suitable for a high school or a grammar school. You cannot make an appeal against the assessment decision posted to you on 18 October, but you are still allowed by law to appeal for admission to any school you name on your SCAF and are not offered. This means that, if on 19 October your child has not been assessed suitable for grammar school but by 31 October you name a grammar school on your SCAF, although you cannot be offered a place there on 1 March, you can then ask an independent panel to consider whether there could be an exceptional reason for admitting your child. Appeals for admission to Kent schools should be lodged by 22 March, and the letter which offers you a school place will explain how to do this.

Once you have the assessment decision, it's best to take any questions you have to your child's primary school first of all. If the school can't help, you can contact the Secondary Admissions Team by ringing 01622 696565. Neither the primary school nor the Secondary Admissions Team can change the assessment you have received, but they can explain what it means and how it was reached, to help you when you fill in the Secondary Common Application Form.

Other testing procedures

Some individual schools will also have their own tests as part of their admissions process. This will be

stated in the school's details, and you should contact them direct for information about what tests are involved and when they will take place.

9 Completing the Kent Secondary Common Application Form

If you live in the Kent Local Authority area, and you would like your child to start at **ANY** secondary school or academy in September 2011 you **MUST** complete the Kent Secondary Common Application Form (SCAF), either online, through the Kent website (www.kent.gov.uk/ola), or on paper.

If you have already registered your child online to take part in the Kent grammar school tests, you will be able to log on and add your school preferences to the information you have already submitted, then resubmit the application, rather than starting from the beginning.

On that form we ask you to name up to four schools you would like your child to go to.

We ask you to rank these schools in the order you most prefer.

If your list includes one or more church or foundation schools, you will probably need to complete a supplementary information form for that school **as well as the Secondary Common Application Form.** If you need to check, look at the school's entry in this booklet, or go to www.kent.gov.uk/sif.

You may name a school or schools outside Kent on the form. We will inform the relevant Local Authority and they will consider your application under their arrangements. You are advised to contact the relevant Local Authority office for further details. Please see page 35 for the telephone numbers.

If you live in Kent and your child attends a primary school in Kent, you must complete a Kent Secondary Common Application Form, either online or on paper. Paper forms must be returned to that school by **31 October 2010**.

If you live in Kent and your child does not attend a Kent primary school, you can apply online, or get a Kent Secondary Common Application Form from the Admissions Team (01622 696565), to whom you should return it direct by **31 October 2010**.

If you have not applied online or on paper by **31 October 2010** your child will not be considered for a place in a Kent school until after places have been allocated in March.

Once you have made your preferences, they cannot be changed without a genuine reason – for example, if the family moves house after returning the form but well before places are allocated. It is important to make sure your SCAF shows us which schools you want, in priority order, because after the closing date you won't be able to change your mind until 4 April, when most places will be filled. Do remember to let us know if you move, so that you get your offer letter.

Pupil's home address

We will accept as a pupil's home address the residential property that is the **child's only or main residence**, not an address at which your child may sometimes stay or sleep due to your own domestic arrangements. It will be either:

- owned by the child's parent, parents or guardian; or
- leased to or rented by the child's parent, parents or guardian under a lease or written rental agreement.

Evidence of ownership or rental agreement may be required, plus proof of the child's permanent residency at the property concerned. The Council reserves the right to check information given on the application form. If any information given on the form is found to be incorrect, or if you fail to notify us of important changes in the information, the offer of a school place can be withdrawn. If you need further help, contact the Admissions Team.

We can only accept one current home address on the Secondary Common Application Form. If you live separately from your partner but share responsibility for your child, and the child lives at two different addresses during the week, we will regard the home address as the one at which the child sleeps for the majority of weekdays. If you have other arrangements which involve your child living at more than one address, and you are not sure which address you should give, please contact the Admissions Team for advice.

Distance

Many available maps and internet based measuring tools will give you an indication of the distance from your address to a school, but they often use different reference points. To make sure that we measure the distance from each applicant's home to the school they want in a fair and equitable way, Kent Local Authority uses Ordnance Survey address point data. Ordnance Survey address point references are seven digits long and accurate to within a metre.

The central point of your property as defined by Ordnance Survey is taken as one end of a straight line, with a defined address point reference on the school site as the other end. The same address point on the school site is used for everybody. When we apply the distance criterion for an oversubscribed Community school, these straight line measurements are used to determine how close each applicant's address is to the school.

A block of flats has a single address point reference, so applicants living in the same block will be regarded as living the same distance away from a Community school. In the unlikely event that two or more children live in the same block and in all other ways have equal eligibility for the last available place at the school, the names will be issued a number and drawn randomly to decide which child should be given the place.

Note: Kent Local Authority supplies Ordnance Survey address point data to all schools for ease of reference, but you will find that some Foundation and Aided schools and Academies use different methods to measure distances from applicants' homes. This will be clearly explained in each school's oversubscription criteria. Where a school has not explained that it will use a different method, the method used here will apply.

Brothers and Sisters

Where Kent County Council uses the term "brother or sister", it means children who live as brother and sister in the same house, including natural brothers or sisters, adopted siblings, stepbrothers or sisters and foster brothers or sisters.

If siblings from multiple births (twins, triplets, etc) apply for a school and the school would reach its Published Admission Number (PAN) after admitting one or more, but before admitting all of those siblings, the Local Authority will offer a place to each of the siblings, even if doing so takes the school above its PAN. However, this may not always be possible for example, if the school is a grammar school.

Where a school has not explained how it defines a sibling, the explanation given above will apply.

10 Allocating Places

We look at the applications to schools to see whether we can offer a place. If there are more applications to a school than there are places available, the school's oversubscription criteria are used to put applicants in priority order. Some of these children will not be offered a place because the school runs out of spaces before we get down to their names on the list of applicants. Some will not need to be offered one because another school, which they ranked higher on their Secondary Common Application Form, can give them a place.

If your Kent preferences include a voluntary aided or foundation school or an academy, we send that school your details, as they are responsible for their own admissions. If the school has too many applications for the places available, the governors will use the school's oversubscription criteria to put applicants in priority order. They will pass a ranked list back to us so that we can offer a place on their behalf.

11 School Offers

Kent Local Authority will make sure every Kent child who has submitted a Kent Secondary Common Application Form gets **ONE** offer.

If only one of the schools you have asked for could offer your child a place, that is the school place we will offer you.

If more than one of the schools you have asked for could offer your child a place, we will offer you whichever one of these you ranked highest on your Secondary Common Application Form. This is the only time your rank order will be used to decide which place to offer you.

(If you have named a grammar school on your Secondary Common Application Form, and that grammar school has too many applications from suitable candidates, it may not be possible to offer you a place there, even if your child has done well enough in the 11+ tests to qualify for a grammar school place. If this happens, you will be offered the highest available of your remaining preferences, even if that is not a grammar school.)

Sometimes, we may not be able to offer you a place at any school you have asked for. This will be because all those schools have had more applications than they have places available, and have offered them to children who have a better claim under the oversubscription criteria. If this happens, we will offer you a place as near to your home as we can, at another school.

Being offered a school doesn't mean you can't appeal for any of your other choices, or ask about being put on the waiting list for any spaces that may come up at those schools. After 4 April you can also apply to the Local Authority's Admissions Department for a Year 7 place at a school you didn't name on your original SCAF. We will process these late applications at intervals over the summer, along with requests for places from children who have arrived too late to apply by the closing date. Every child who applies for a place will be ranked for admission according to the school's published criteria, unless they are the subject of a Fair Access Protocol or a Direction, in which case they can be given priority over others on a waiting list who already have a school place.

12 What are the chances of getting my child into the school I want?

The best way to assess the chances of your child getting into the school you want is to study that school's oversubscription criteria (see school details).

Before you fill in the Kent Secondary Common Application Form make sure that you have read and understood the oversubscription criteria for the schools you are listing. You need to think carefully about whether your child is likely to meet these criteria.

One of the most important criteria for many schools is the distance you live from the school. The distances from which schools allocate places change from year to year, depending on demand. You may need to check with the school whether they have been able to admit children from your address in recent years. When deciding your preferences, be realistic about whether you live in the right place.

Some schools have entrance tests. Ask yourself whether your child is good at the subject being tested or at taking tests generally.

Having considered all these matters, rank the schools you want in order of preference.

Remember that other people will choose the same schools as you. If their children meet the criteria of a particular school better than yours, they will be offered a place ahead of your child.

13 The Choice Advice Service

The Choice Advice Service offers independent advice to those families who find the secondary transfer process difficult to understand, to enable parents to make the most realistic choice of school that best meets their child's needs.

So if you've looked at this booklet, visited the schools and talked to your child's teachers but still feel you need some extra help ask about the Choice Advice Service.

Where can I get help?

- Your primary school may have a Family Liaison Office (FLO) or Parent Support Adviser (PSA) who you can talk to at school. If you know who they are speak to them directly or ask the school for details.

What help can they give?

Listen to your questions

14 Examples

Marie has a grammar school assessment. She lives close to her local Community high school. Her parents would most like a place for her at the local church comprehensive, which gives priority to church attenders. Otherwise, they would like a local grammar school.

The parents' preferences are:

- 1. Church Aided Comprehensive
- 2. Community Grammar School
- 3. Foundation Grammar School
- 4. Community High School

Marie meets the entry requirements for all four schools, so she is offered her first preference.

Robina's parents would like her to go to a single-sex Community high school, even though it is a long way from her home. Otherwise, though they are not church attenders, they would like a church school, or another single-sex school. She has not taken the grammar school tests.

The parents' preferences are:

- 1. Single-sex Community High School
- 2. Church Aided School
- 3. Community Grammar School for Girls
- 4. Foundation Grammar School for Girls

The Community High School is oversubscribed by girls who live closer than Robina. The Church Aided School is oversubscribed with church attenders. The grammar schools cannot offer her a place on 1 March as she has not taken the grammar school tests. Her parents are offered a vacant place at the nearest high school to her home.

Adam has a grammar school assessment. His parents would most like a place for him at the Foundation grammar school closest to his home. Otherwise they would like a place at his local academy, a neighbouring Foundation high school or a school outside Kent.

The parents' preferences are:

- 1. Foundation Grammar School
- 2. Academy
- 3. Foundation High School
- 4. School Outside Kent

The grammar school is oversubscribed with suitable applicants and cannot offer him a place. As he qualifies for a place at the Academy, he is offered his second preference. Kristina has a High School assessment. Her parents would most like her to go to a local grammar school, a popular high school near where her mother works, or the Church Aided comprehensive, which is further away. They are regular church attenders.

The parents' preferences are:

- 1. Local Foundation Grammar School
- 2. Community High School
- 3. Church Aided Comprehensive
- 4. Local Foundation High School

Kristina does not meet the entry requirement for grammar school, and the Community high school offers all its places to children who live within 2 miles. She qualifies for a place at the Church Aided comprehensive, so is offered her third preference.

Oliver lives on the edge of an area served by grammar and high schools. He has a Grammar assessment.

The parents' preferences are:

- 1. Local Foundation Grammar School
- 2. Local Foundation Grammar School
- 3. Community Grammar School
- 4. Neighbouring Foundation Grammar School

All these schools are oversubscribed and have to apply their criteria. Some take account of test scores and some take account of home address, but none of them can offer Oliver a place, because too many other applicants are ranked above him. If it cannot find a grammar school place within a reasonable distance of his home, the Local Authority offers him a local school which does not select its intake.

Mikesh lives on the edge of an area served by a comprehensive school. He has a grammar school assessment, but lives a long way from his nearest grammar school, which is sometimes oversubscribed. He could travel easily to a specialist high school in the neighbouring scheme of education, so his parents would also like to try for a place there.

The parents' preferences are:

- 1. Specialist High School in neighbouring Scheme of Education
- 2. Local Comprehensive School
- 3. School outside Kent
- 4. Foundation Grammar School

His first preference is oversubscribed and can only take children from nearby. His second, third and fourth preferences could all offer him a place, so he gets the local comprehensive school, his second preference.

15 Letting you know

On 1 March 2011 Kent Local Authority will write to Kent parents offering places. You will receive only ONE offer. You must let the Authority know by 22 March 2011 whether or not you want the place, it will be possible to do this electronically.

If you do not let the Local Authority know that you want the place, it may offer that place to someone else, and you will lose it. You can also lose your school place if the information you put on your application form is later found to be incorrect.

If you have not been offered the school(s) you wanted, our letter will tell you how to appeal for a place. If you make an appeal for a place at a school, an independent panel will look at why you were not offered a place there, and decide whether there is a good reason to change that decision. This is separate from asking to go on a waiting list in case any spaces come up at the school, which you can also do.

If you have applied for a Kent school but do not live in Kent your home Local Authority will write on 1 March 2011 to tell you which school you have been offered.

16 Waiting Lists

If a school is oversubscribed on 1 March 2011, the admission authority for that school must keep a waiting list, at least until the start of the January term 2012. The list must* include:

- Children who named the school on the SCAF, could not be offered a place on 1 March, but asked by 22 March 2011 to go on a waiting list.
- Late applicants whose names are sent to the school by the Local Authority.

After 4 April, schools will* add the names of unsuccessful applicants to their waiting lists on request. (*A grammar school can only put children on its waiting list who have been assessed suitable for grammar school.)

A school's waiting list must be prioritised according to its published oversubscription criteria. If the number of children who accept places drops below the school's Published Admission Number, the waiting list will be used to determine who gets the vacant places, whether or nor independent appeal hearings are scheduled for later in the year.

The Local Authority, not the school itself, will make any offer of a vacant place, using information supplied by the school. If a child without a school place who is the subject of a Direction or a Fair Access Protocol is waiting for a place at the school, that child may need to be given priority over children on the waiting list who have already been offered a place at another school.

A school which has reached its Published Admission Number cannot offer places over that number. It may, however, be required to admit additional pupils by an Independent Appeal Panel, or by the Local Authority if this is necessary to secure a place for a child in Local Authority Care or a child with a Statement of Special Educational Need.

Vacant places will be offered in writing by the Local Authority on the following dates in the school year:

Monday 4 April 2011

Friday 6 May 2011 Friday 10 June 2011 Friday 8 July 2011

This is the last date in the academic year when bulk offers will be made under the 2011 Admissions Scheme. After this date, vacant places will be offered as they arise, through the In Year Process.

Putting your child's name on the waiting list for a school will not stop you appealing for a place there: you can do both. Putting your child's name on the waiting list for one school will not prejudice an appeal for another, and appealing for one school will not affect your position on the waiting list for another.

17 Appeals

If you are unhappy with the school your child has been offered you can appeal. All parents have the right to appeal against any decision to refuse them a school place. This means that you can appeal for a place at any school that you named and were not offered, wherever you ranked it on the Secondary Common Application Form.

How to appeal

We will be writing to offer you a school place on 1 March 2011. If we have not been able to offer you a school you wanted, our letter will explain briefly why this was, and let you know the arrangements for appealing for a place at that school. We will also send you a form which you can use to help you make an appeal.

22 March 2011

You can appeal for any school you have been turned down for, but if it is a Kent school please do your best to make sure that your appeal is received by 22 March 2011. This will help the people who organise a school's appeal hearings to try to arrange for all the appeals for that school to be considered at the same time, and by the same panel, which is what the School Admission Appeals Code of Practice recommends. Do not wait for the outcome of one appeal, or the offer of a place at another school before appealing: you can always withdraw an appeal request later.

Appeals received after 22 March will need to be accompanied by a reasonable explanation as to why they are late. It is best if all appeals can be heard at one time: a late appeal may have to be heard after others for the same school.

Parents who have appealed unsuccessfully for a particular Kent school may not appeal for a place at the same school within the academic year unless they can show there has been a significant and material change in their circumstances since the appeal.

On 4 April the Local Authority will offer the first waiting list places. After this date, the names of new applicants who cannot be offered a place will be added to the waiting lists.

If you have not been able to get a place at any of the schools you named on the SCAF and you are still not happy with the place you have been offered, you can apply to the Local Authority for admission to other secondary schools in Kent after 4 April. If you cannot be offered a place, you will have the opportunity to

appeal, and to ask for your child's name to be added to the school's waiting list. Children who join a waiting list after 4 April are ranked according to the school's published oversubscription criteria, not according to when they applied.

If your child has a Statement of Special Educational Need...

If you are not happy with the school named on your child's Final Amended Statement, you can appeal to the SEN and Disability Tribunal within two months of the issue of the Final Statement. This also applies if the school you want is a grammar school, and the Final Amended Statement names a non-selective school.

We will always try to resolve any issues or difference of opinion over the content of your child's Statement or the secondary school named in it through conciliation or mediation. These are informal processes which will not in any way prejudice your right of appeal to the Tribunal, and they can continue while your appeal case is being prepared. You also need to read the section headed "If Your Child has a Disability", at the end of this booklet, page 153. DDA legislation is there to ensure that an admission authority does not discriminate against a child on the grounds of a disability in its arrangements for admission to a school.

18 Some of your questions answered

IF YOU LIVE IN KENT

How can I apply for a secondary school?

You can apply online from our website, www.kent.gov.uk/ola or you can complete a paper copy of the Secondary Common Application Form, which you can get from your child's primary school, or from the Admissions Team (see contact details on page 3).

Can I apply for a school in another Local Authority's area?

You can apply for schools in another Local Authority's area, but you must name the school(s) on Kent's Secondary Common Application Form, and we will pass the details to the Local Authority concerned. You must not fill in another Local Authority's application form if your child is resident in the Kent Local Authority area.

What if I miss the October deadline?

It is very important that we receive your Secondary Common Application Form by the deadline. This means that we have the time to give all applications we receive the fairest consideration before writing to you on 1 March 2011. Applications received after the deadline cannot be considered with those received on time. We will try to meet your preferences after we have dealt with all others.

I only want to apply to foundation/voluntary aided schools or academies. Do I still need to use the Kent Secondary Common Application Form?

Yes, your applications can only be considered if you have filled in the Kent Secondary Common Application Form online or on paper. So, everyone must complete the Secondary Common Application Form <u>as well as</u> any extra forms asked for by individual foundation or voluntary aided schools or academies.

Why should I list more than one school or academy on my form?

Under the admissions scheme, we can only consider your child for admission to a school named on your Secondary Common Application Form. Naming only one school will not strengthen your initial claim on a place - if your child isn't eligible for a place there, the fact that it's the only school you named won't make any difference, and if your child is eligible for a place there, and you have named it as the first of four preferences, you will automatically be offered a place there on 1 March. If you only name one school and your child cannot be offered a place there, we have to offer you a vacant place at an alternative school when there may well be other schools you might have preferred and got.

What is the point of going to open events when I already know which schools are the best?

You can best decide how well a school might suit your child by going to see it for yourself. That way you are not relying on rumour that is often incorrect and out of date.

What if I have moved or I am moving home?

If you can provide proof of your new address (eg a letter confirming exchange of contracts) when you submit your Secondary Common Application Form, we will take that information into consideration in deciding on allocation of places. Otherwise we make decisions based on the last confirmed address we hold for your child.

What if my situation changes after I have completed the Secondary Common Application Form? Please contact the Admissions Team who will be able to give you individual advice.

I want a Kent grammar school, but I did not register my child for testing by the closing date. What can I do now?

If you have not registered by now your child will not be able to take the tests in September, and you will not get an assessment decision before you complete the SCAF. If you name one or more grammar schools on the SCAF when your child has not been assessed they will have to turn down your application, but you will still have the same right as everyone else to take an appeal to an Independent Appeal Panel.

IF YOU DON'T LIVE IN KENT:

What should I do if I want a Kent School?

If you live outside Kent but would like to send your child to a school in the county you must name the Kent school on your home Local Authority's Secondary Common Application Form and they will send to us details of your application. Some of the information above may also apply, and you may wish to read it as well.

How do you process applications from UK Service Personnel and Crown Servants?

The School Admissions Code makes special provisions for UK Service Personnel and Crown Servants. Contact a member of the Secondary Admissions team for advice.

If you have other questions about the secondary transfer process, or want some help, please contact the Admissions Team.

19 In year admissions

This booklet mainly offers advice on applying for a year 7 school place, to start secondary school in September 2011. If you are the parent or carer of a child who already lives or has recently arrived in Kent and is looking for a school place in a different school year or at a different time, you can use Kent Local Authority's 'In Year Common Application Form' (IYCAF) to apply to up to four secondary schools, inside Kent or in neighbouring Local Authority areas.

Kent Local Authority will contact the schools on your behalf and offer a place if it can. If more than one school could offer a place, Kent will offer the highest available of your preferences. If a school you name cannot offer you a place you will be told how to appeal, and how to put your child's name on the school's waiting list. If none of the schools you want can offer you a place, Kent Local Authority will offer an alternative, unless you already have a local school place.

If you and the child live in another Local Authority's area, you should contact your home Local Authority, as an application for any school place (even a place in Kent) will need to be made through them.

For information about which schools may have spaces, ring 01622 696565 and ask to be put through to the Casual Admissions team. They can send you an In Year Common Application Form, or you can get one from a Kent secondary school, or download a copy from our website, www.kent.gov.uk.

We will aim to find a place within 20 school days of receiving your completed form. Occasionally, finding a school place may take longer - for example, if all the local schools are full, if your child has educational needs which require special provision, wants a grammar school place or has been permanently excluded from the school they used to attend. We will try to find excluded children a place within 6 school days, and no child should be out of school for more than 30 school days.

Sometimes, to protect the interest of children who are out of school and haven't been found a place within these time limits, the Local Authority will use what is called a Fair Access Protocol (FAP) to make sure they can resume their education as soon as possible. Schools and Academies must give children who are subject to an FAP priority over children on their waiting list who already have a place at another school.

For more information about the FAP, ring 01622 696565 and ask to be put through to the Attendance and Behaviour Service.

20 Transport

You can apply for any school, and we'll try to give you the place you want, but please remember that admission applications and applications for help with the cost of home to school transport are completely separate. You will not automatically get transport assistance to any school that offers you a place. You

should read the following information carefully **before** naming your preferred schools on the Secondary Common Application Form, so that you understand whether you would need to pay for your child's transport between home and a particular school.

- If your child goes to the school the Local Authority calls the **nearest appropriate school** for transport purposes, and you live **more than three miles** from this school, you can apply for free home to school transport (or assisted travel if the child is 16+). When you look at the information about the different schools in this booklet, check the bottom of the page to see if that school is your nearest appropriate school for transport purposes. For the Isle of Sheppey Academy, it will be attendance at the nearest site to your home address. If you live near the county border, your nearest appropriate school for transport purposes may be outside Kent see page 33 for more information. Please note: if your child will be going to a Kent school, but you live outside the Kent Local Authority area (ie: if you pay your council tax to a Council other than Kent County Council), you must apply to your own Local Authority to see if you will get help with transport costs.
- The nearest appropriate school is usually the nearest school to a child's home that is suitable to a child's age, ability and aptitude. For children living in some places, however, we may treat more than one school as nearest appropriate for transport purposes. If you aren't sure once you've read about the schools, ask the Transport Team.
- A child who goes to a church school for denominational reasons usually gets help with transport to that school, as long as:
 - it is the nearest school of that denomination
 - it is more than three miles from the child's home by the shortest available walking route
 - the transport application form is signed by the vicar or priest to confirm that the child is a regularly practising member of a church of the same denomination as the school. The Local Authority does not normally offer transport assistance to pupils of one denomination who have chosen to attend a church school of a different denomination.
- Children who receive free school meals or whose parents receive the maximum level of Working Tax Credit may be eligible for transport assistance. To qualify the child must attend one of their three nearest appropriate secondary schools for transport purposes and live between 2 6 miles from the schools. For denominational schools the distance between the home and the school is 2 15 miles.
 - The transport form must also be signed by the appropriate church authority to confirm that the child is a regular and practising member of a church of the same denomination as the school.
 - Proof of receipt of the maximum Working Tax Credit is asked for and this is usually the form TC602, which is sent to you by the Inland Revenue. For a child who is entitled to free school meals, the proof of receipt will be a letter from Kent County Council confirming that the child is eligible, or that you are receiving one of the following benefits:
 - Income Support
 - Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
 - Child Tax Credit (TC602 for the current tax year with a yearly income of no more than £16,190)
 - Pension Credit (guaranteed part)
 - Income Related Employment and Support Allowance
 - The assistance will be reviewed annually and additional evidence may be requested. You should also contact the Transport Team should there be a change to your circumstances.

- Additional information can be found within the Home to School Transport booklet, which also contains the application form. These will be obtainable from primary schools, from the Transport Team and can be downloaded via our website www.kent.gov.uk from May 2011. (Contact Information on page 3).
- Distance from home to school is measured by the **shortest available walking route**. This does take into account public footpaths. The shortest available route is one along which a child, **accompanied as necessary**, can walk with reasonable safety to school.
- You may want a place at a school because it is single-sex, or mixed, or specialises in a particular subject or way of teaching. While we'll offer you the place if we can, we **do not** take account of these reasons for choosing a school when we look at applications for transport assistance. Check the bottom of that school's information page to see if it is your nearest appropriate school for transport purposes: if it isn't, you probably won't get help with transport costs.
- Free transport usually means your child will get a season ticket (pass) for public transport, or a seat on a bus/vehicle hired by the County Council. As we provide transport for so many children, we can't offer parents their choice of route or vehicle.
- If you do not name your nearest appropriate school for transport purposes on your Secondary Common Application Form you will not normally get free transport. If you do name it, but you can't get a place there, and we offer you a school you ranked below it, you may get help with transport to the school you have been offered.
- If your child cannot be offered a place at any of the schools you named on your Secondary Common Application Form, but is offered a place at another school by the County Council, you can apply for help with transport, but please remember that you will not automatically get free transport to any school that offers you a place.
- Foundation schools and academies are treated in the same way as other schools for transport purposes.
- For more information on whether or not your child will receive transport assistance visit www.kent.gov.uk or contact the Transport Team.

Application Forms

Home to School Transport information booklets, which include the application forms will be available from primary and secondary schools and from the Transport Team from May 2011. Please remember to include two passport-sized photographs of the child, as we may not be able to process your application. The forms must be returned to the team no later than 31 July to ensure that your child will have a pass for the first day of term. If we do not receive your form until after this date, we cannot guarantee your child's pass for the first day of term and we will not refund the cost of any transport that you have to arrange until the pass is issued.

On the first day of term, your child should carry the letter that confirms their transport has been granted in case the driver of the vehicle asks to see it. The passes will be sent to your child's school for the first day of term for distribution by the school.

Vacant Seats Payment Scheme (VSPS)

Even if your child does not qualify for free transport from home to school, you can apply to take up a vacant seat on a hired school vehicle. The charge is subject to variation, but in 2011/2012 it will be £165 for the Autumn and Spring terms and £160 for the Summer term for each child. We can't guarantee a place under this scheme, and we may need to withdraw it later on if we need the seat for a child who is entitled to free or assisted transport, if we decide to run a smaller vehicle, or if we no longer need to run a vehicle for children entitled to free transport. Post Statutory Charge (PSC) – Travel to school or college for students aged 16+

Pupils entering school years 12 and 13 who live more than three miles from their nearest appropriate school or college are no longer entitled to free transport, but currently they can get subsidised transport. Parents make a termly contribution towards the cost. This is subject to variation, but in 2011/2012 it will be £165 for the Autumn and Spring terms and £160 for the Summer term or parents can pay £490 for the whole year. Applications are made to the Transport Team at Sessions House. To qualify for assistance with transport for denominational reasons, students who continue to attend a church school in years 12 and 13 (or who join one at this stage) will need to get their priest or vicar to confirm on their application form that they are still regular and practising members of a church of the same denomination as the school. Before applying for help, we advise you to phone the local bus and train companies, as it may be cheaper for you to buy tickets direct from them.

Parents will not be expected to pay the contribution if they receive Income Support, Income Based Job Seekers Allowance, Income-related Employment and Support Allowance, Pension Credit or Child Tax Credit, **provided they do not receive Working Tax Credit** and have an annual income (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs) which does not exceed £16,190. Proof of income/entitlement to benefit will be required. For Child Tax Credit we will need to see a copy of Form TC602, sent to you by HM Revenue and Customs.

Appeals

If you think we've made a mistake in refusing transport assistance, you can ask for your application to be reviewed by the Transport Team. Once we have checked the application, we will write to let you know whether your child will get free home to school transport. If the decision cannot be changed and you are still dissatisfied and believe that you have extenuating circumstances, you can ask for your case to be considered by members of the Regulation Committee Appeal Panel.

If you wish to do so, you will be entitled to attend the hearing in person and to put your case to the Panel at County Hall, Maidstone. Members should have all the correspondence in front of them when they consider your appeal and any further papers or details of the procedure will be provided to you beforehand. Attendance at this hearing is not compulsory and you may prefer to ask your Local County Councillor to either accompany you or to speak on your behalf. Your Local County Councillor can be contacted via the Members Desk at County Hall (tel: 01622 694434).

In order to proceed with your appeal, parents should write to the address below advising the office if your Local County Councillor will be representing you or if you will be putting your case in person.

There is no further course of appeal that you can take after the appeal has been heard by the Regulation Committee Appeal Panel. You can object to the Local Government Ombudsman if you feel that the appeal hearing itself was not administered correctly.

Tackling the School-Run

A range of options are available to get your child to school. KCC is committed to reducing the impact of the school run and the negative effect this can have on the environment and Kent. Kent Freedom Pass

The Kent Freedom Pass enables young people in academic years 7-11 who live in Kent to travel free on virtually all public buses in the county, at any time, for a fee of £50 per year. A small number of bespoke bus services to schools apply an additional charge. The Freedom Pass scheme gives young people the independence to travel to and from school, at evenings and weekends, and throughout the school holidays. Full details and terms and conditions, including a list of participating bus operators, are provided at www.kent.gov.uk/kentfreedompass.

To apply, students must be:

- Attending a school or other educational provision (inside or outside Kent) recognised by the scheme.
- In academic year 7-11 from September 2011 onwards.
- A resident of Kent (ie paying Council Tax to a Kent district council for KCC services).

You can pick up an application pack from your child's school or download and print the application form from the website. Application forms should be returned to the address printed on the form, along with payment and a clear passport-sized photo. As this booklet went to print the facility to apply online was in development - check the website for up to date information.

The Kent Freedom Pass does not affect your child's entitlement to free home to school transport, and you can apply for both. If your child already receives free home to school transport and you have changed your address since you applied, please let Admissions and Transport know. Otherwise, it is likely that your application for a Kent Freedom Pass will be delayed while your entitlement is reconsidered.

The Kent Freedom Pass is not valid on hired school coaches or trains. If your child loses their Kent Freedom Pass you will be charged £10 for a replacement. We will only replace <u>one</u> Kent Freedom Pass in a scheme year.

If your child has a Statement of Special Educational Need...

The transport arrangements described above apply to all secondary school pupils. If a child does not qualify for free transport, it is assumed that a parent or responsible adult will accompany him or her to school if required. It is up to you as a parent to decide whether your child needs to be accompanied. However, in some cases where a child with a statement lives less than three miles from the nearest appropriate school, the Local Authority will provide free transport between home and school if there are reasons associated with the child's special needs.

To decide this, we will consider to what extent a child's safe journey to school may be significantly hampered by their needs, even when they are accompanied by a responsible adult. This is usually to do with a child's mobility or social interaction: free transport is not provided as a substitute for parents/carers who are not able to accompany their child to school for other reasons.

The Local Authority does have a duty to comply, where possible, with parental preference when it names a school in the Statement, but this does not mean that it must provide free transport if the school you choose is not the closest one which can meet your child's needs. In these cases, free transport will not be provided.

If you want to check whether your child may get free transport, you can speak to your SEN Locality Officer at your local Special Educational Needs and Resources Office (telephone numbers on page 3).

Kent Parishes and Villages whose Nearest Appropriate School (for Transport Purposes) is outside the County

Transport is provided to children living in Kent where the nearest appropriate school for transport purposes is outside of the County ie Medway or Bexley. Children living in the parishes named below must live more than 3 miles from the school via the shortest available walking route.

Children from low income families will also be assessed for transport assistance to these schools under the low income criteria.

21 General Information

School Fund

There is no charge or cost for admission to a maintained school, and nothing published in a school's own prospectus or said at an open evening about contributing to the School Fund should put you off applying for a place. Most schools operate a School Fund to help them pay for extra activities and equipment which cannot be provided from the school's own budget, and they invite parents to contribute to it if their child takes up a place there. Contributing to a school fund is entirely voluntary.

School Meals

Most secondary schools have cash cafeteria arrangements, where pupils can choose what they want to buy. They also offer a main meal, which may cost between £2.10 and £2.30 depending on the supplier.

Free school meals are available for

- children from families who can prove that they receive Income Support, Income Based Job Seeker's Allowance, an income-related employment and support allowance or the guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- children from families who receive Child Tax Credit, **provided** they do not receive Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs) which does not exceed £16,190
- the children of Asylum Seekers supported under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 who can provide appropriate documentation from the National Asylum Support Service.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

The law requires community, foundation and voluntary controlled schools and Academies which do not have a religious character to provide religious education that fulfils the requirements of a local agreed syllabus. The syllabus will reflect the fact that the religious traditions in Britain are mainly Christian, whilst taking into account the teaching and practices of other principal religions represented in Britain. Voluntary aided schools and Academies with a religious character normally follow a syllabus which reflects their religious designation.

Religious education is intended for all pupils, but parents do have the right to withdraw their child from all or part of RE. If you think you may wish to do this, you are encouraged to discuss the Religious Education provision in the school with the headteacher.

Collective Worship

Taking each school term as a whole, the majority of acts of collective worship in schools and academies that do not have a religious character will be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character.

Voluntary aided and voluntary controlled schools and academies with a religious character must deliver collective worship in line with their trust deeds, articles of government or funding agreement. For example, if the school is a Church of England or Roman Catholic school, the worship must be Christian and should reflect the denomination of the school.

Like Religious Education, collective worship is intended for all pupils, but parents do have the right to withdraw their child from it. You may want to find out more about collective worship in the school before you make a decision.

Maintaining Good Behaviour

All our schools encourage a high standard of behaviour from pupils, both in and out of the classroom. We believe that education is very much about passing on the values of courtesy, consideration for others, tolerance and understanding.

Self-discipline is what we are looking for in our pupils. We want them to have pride in themselves and in how others see them.

Parents are encouraged to help develop responsible attitudes in their children and the county's schools are encouraged to maintain a close partnership with parents.

Each school has its own discipline or behaviour policy which lays down the ground rules for behaviour inside schools and whilst pupils represent the school. The policy will detail what solutions the headteacher and governors will consider in case of misbehaviour.

Such claims will need to be supported by written evidence from a suitably qualified medical or other practitioner who can demonstrate a special connection between these needs and the particular school.
- d) Residence within a particular scheme of education. Kent has both comprehensive and selective areas of education. Priority is given to pupils resident in the same scheme of

- education as the school as defined in the "Admission to Secondary School in Kent" booklet.
- e) Nearness of children's homes to school The distance is measured between the child's permanent address and the school in a straight line using Ordnance Survey address point data. Distances are measured from a defined point within the child's home to a defined point within the school as specified by Ordnance Survey. The same address point on the school site is used for everybody. When we apply the distance criterion for an oversubscribed Community or Voluntary Controlled school these straight line measurements are used to determine how close each applicant's address is to the school. If applications which meet these criteria exceed the number that can be offered, applicants with a sibling at Bennett in September of the year of admission will be ranked before those without a sibling, and then within each group applicants will be ranked by distance from the school.§
- c) Children from non-Anglican Christian families at the heart of the church. The definition of this is a child who has one or both parents worshipping regularly (by which is meant at least three times per month on average) in any Christian church and who have done so for at least three years** up to the time of application. It is also normally expected that the child for whom they are applying is baptised***. If applications which meet these criteria exceed the number that can be offered, applicants with a sibling at Bennett in September of the year of admission will have priority, and then within each group applicants will be ranked by distance from the school.
- d) Children from Anglican families attached to the church. The definition of this is a child who has at least one parent who attends an Anglican church* at least monthly, or takes part in one form of service to the church on at least a monthly basis, and who has sustained this pattern of commitment for at least two years**. It will also be required that the child is baptised***. If applications which meet these criteria exceed the number that can be offered, applicants with a sibling at

- Bennett in September of the year of admission will have priority, and then within each group applicants will be ranked by distance from the school.
- e) Children from non-Anglican Christian families attached to the church. The definition of this is a child who has at least one parent who attends a non-Anglican Christian church at least monthly, or takes part in one form of service to the church on at least a monthly basis, and who has sustained this pattern of commitment for at least two years**. It will also be normally expected that the child is baptised***. If applications which meet these criteria exceed the number that can be offered, applicants with a sibling at Bennett in September of the year of admission will have priority, and then within each group applicants will be ranked by distance from the school.
- f) Children from Anglican and non-Anglican Christian families known to the church. The definition for this will be a child who has at least one parent who attends any Christian church on an occasional basis, less frequently than once a month, but at least as frequently as three times a year, or who takes part in a regular form of service to the church, less often than once a month but at least three times a year. If applications which meet these criteria exceed the number that can be offered, applicants with a sibling at Bennett in September of the year of admission will have priority, and then within each group applicants will be ranked by distance from the school.

- * Local Ecumenical Partnerships (LEPs) of which the Church of England is a member will be considered as Anglican churches for this purpose.
- ** if during this time the family has relocated, or changed the church at which they worship, supporting evidence from the previous church must be provided.
- *** or has been formally welcomed into the church community at a service or ceremony of thanksgiving or dedication. Documentary evidence will be required both for baptism and for any services of thanksgiving or dedication. A priest's or minister's letter will suffice as evidence for a service of dedication if no formal certificate is available.
- § (1) The number admitted under category B will not exceed 75% of the planned admissions number. Category B applications not admitted because of this cap will be re-ranked with category D applications.
- § (2) Before the rank ordering by distance is applied within Category B, places will be allocated to applicants attending parishes located in each of the deaneries of Malling (12 places), Sevenoaks(18 places) and Shoreham (6 places), as defined by the Diocese of Rochester. health, social and special access reasons will be applied in accordance with the school's legal obligations, including those under the Disability Discrimination Act 2005. Those children with a mental or physical impairment which gives them a demonstrable and significant need to attend this particular school will qualify, as will children of parents with similar impairments. To qualify, claims will need to be supported by written evidence from a suitably qualified medical or other practitioner and the evidence will need to demonstrate a special connection between the needs of the child or parent and Bennett Memorial Diocesan School. Sixth Form Admissions arrangements

Section 1 – General Principles

Bennett is a Christian School in the tradition of the Church of England and in the sixth form, as elsewhere, learning and development are underpinned by Christian belief and values. Bennett offers a range of academic and vocational qualifications for sixth form students as described in the prospectus. Some of these require minimum grades at GCSE. Our policy is to ensure that students accepted into the sixth form are placed on appropriate courses where they are likely to succeed. For this reason we ask all applicants to attend a guidance interview with appropriate staff to discuss the most suitable courses of study.

All year 11 students at Bennett will be encouraged to apply for the sixth form. We also accept applications from students wishing to transfer from another school. In all cases the same admissions criteria apply. The minimum number of external applicants we accept is 1 (this is our planned admissions number or PAN). However, in most years we admit many more than this because there is space on the courses and because applicants meet our criteria.

Section 2 – Definitions and details

Admission number in year 12

The numbers of external applications we receive vary from year to year. We exceed our minimum number if preferred courses of study are not oversubscribed and the external applicant has met the relevant entry requirements. For example in 2008 we admitted 18 external applicants. Internal applicants should apply by the date given in the current prospectus (the last day of term in December).

Applicants from other schools should endeavour to meet the same deadline to enable us to plan courses effectively.

Academic requirements

- To begin AS courses you must have a minimum of a 5.0 average score at GCSE and at least a C grade in the subject you wish to study (but see below). To calculate your average, give each A* a value of 8 and number downwards, so a C is worth 5 and a G is worth 1. A U is worth 0 and must be counted. For some courses a higher threshold is required.
- If you wish to study Biology, Chemistry or Physics you will

- need to have achieved an average of 6.0 at GCSE and at least a B in Core and Additional Science at GCSE, or a B in at least 2 sciences if you took three separate science GCSEs.
- If you want to study French or German you will be expected to have achieved at least a B grade in that language at GCSE.
- If you wish to study Mathematics you will need to have achieved an average of 6.0 at GCSE and at least a B grade is the threshold for acceptance onto the course.
- Subjects where it is not essential to have a GCSE in the same subject are Sociology, Psychology, Information Communication Technology, History, Geography, Physical Education, Business Studies, Drama and Theatre Studies, Philosophy, Photography and Media Studies.
- There is no specific entry threshold for our GCSE equivalent course in the sixth form.
- Meeting the requirements of any course is no guarantee that the applicant will automatically be offered a place on his or her preferred courses.

We will require external applicants to provide copies of results slips before taking up places.

Entry into year 13 for external applicants will depend on the courses required, availability of space in that group, the compatibility of different specifications, and module results from year 12. We require convincing evidence that the applicant will go on to complete the course successfully.

Oversubscription

- Children in Public Care#
- Applications from internal candidates who meet the academic requirements are considered first.
- Where particular courses are heavily oversubscribed and we cannot for practical or resourcing reasons run parallel groups the places will be offered to those internal candidates who have better grades at GCSE or subject specific requirements. This will form a major part of the guidance interview referred to above to determine the most appropriate course for an individual. We will offer alternative courses to any student affected by this criterion.
- For external applications the remaining places available on a particular course will be offered to those who have better grades at GCSE or subject specific requirements.
- In all cases, those applications who have signed the ethos statement on the application form will be ranked above all those who have not.

For external applicants, a reference from their previous school will be sought to check suitability for AS/A2 study and their preferred subject choices. Students will be invited for interview as appropriate. Preferred learning pathways and course choices are discussed. Following the interview stage, a letter will be sent to the applicant confirming the decision made regarding a place in year 12. All offers of a place in year 12 will be made on condition of students meeting the school entry requirements above.

Students holding conditional offers will have their place confirmed following receipt of the GCSE results in the summer. Guidance will be given to students who wish to consider a change of subject following receipt of GCSE results.

Admission to Year 13:

The majority of students in year 12 continue with their studies into year 13, dependent upon the entry criteria outlined below. In this context brother or sister means children who live as brother or sister in the same house, including natural brothers and sisters, adopted siblings, stepbrothers or sisters and foster brothers and sisters.
- c) Medical, Health, Social and Special Access reasons will be applied in accordance with the school's legal obligations, in particular those under the Disability Discrimination Act 1995. Priority will be given to those children whose mental or physical impairment means they have demonstrable and significant need to attend a particular school. Equally this priority will apply to children whose parents'/guardians', physical or mental health or social needs means they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend a particular school. Such claims will need to be supported by written evidence from a suitably qualified medical or other practitioner who can demonstrate a special connection between those needs and Wrotham School.
- d) Distance from the school to the home, measured in a straight line, with those living nearest having priority. The distance is measured between the child's permanent address and the school measured in a straight line using Ordnance Survey address point data. Distances are measured from a central point within the child's home to a similarly defined point within the school as specified by Ordnance Survey. The school uses measurements provided by the Local Authority

and further information on how distances are calculated is available in the "Admission to Secondary School in Kent" booklet provided by the Local Authority.

A pupil's home address is considered to be the residential property that is the child's only or main residence and not an address at which your child might sometimes stay or sleep due to your own domestic or special arrangements. The address must be the pupil's home address on the day you completed the application form and which is either:

- i owned by the child's parent, parents or guardian, OR
- ii leased to or rented by the child's parent, parents or guardian under a lease or written rental agreement.

If you live separately from your partner but share responsibility for your child, and the child lives at two addresses during the week, we will regard the home address as the one at which the child sleeps for the majority of weekdays.

Sixth Form Admissions arrangements - Sixth Form Published Admission Number: a minimum 20 places are reserved for students who do not attended Wrotham School.

Places in the sixth form will be given to students who have attained:

- a) 5 A*-C GCSE grades or equivalent to study A Level and Level 3 courses
- b) Individual subject prior attainment entry requirements
- c) Level 3 Diploma course will be given to students who have attained 5 A*-C GCSE grades including Maths and English or an equivalent
- d) Level 2 courses places will be given to students who have 5 GCSE A*-G grades.

After students have satisfied the academic criteria for admission into the Sixth Form places will be allocated using our oversubscription criteria above.

Your Guide to Data Protection

Caring for your data

We undertake that we will have in place a level of security appropriate to the nature of the data and the harm that might result from a breach of security. This means we will look after your data properly. We further undertake that we will:

- Not hold information about you that is excessive in relation to the purpose for which it is processed.
- Keep any information about you accurate and where necessary up-to-date. To help us to do this, please keep us informed if any of your details change.
- Not keep data processed for any purpose or purposes longer than necessary.
- Process your information in accordance with your rights under the Data Protection Act.

Your rights

You have certain rights under the Data Protection Act in relation to the information we hold about you. These rights are set out below:

- Access to personal data. You may request by writing to the address below, details of the information that we hold about you and the purpose(s) for which it is held. We will provide the information in a permanent form, as at the time of the request, subject to any routine processing continuing between that time and the time of response. Your request will be met within 40 days of receiving the request, or, if later, on receipt of any supplementary information needed to establish your relationship with the authority or verify your identity.
- You are entitled, by notice in writing, to require us to cease (or not to begin) processing personal data on the grounds that it is causing, or is likely to cause substantial damage or distress to you or another and that damage or distress is, or would be unwarranted. This does not apply where you have consented to the processing, the processing is necessary for the compliance with a legal obligation, or the processing is necessary to protect your vital interests.

- You are entitled, by notice in writing, to require us to stop using information about you for the purposes of direct marketing. Direct marketing means the communication (by whatever means) of any advertising or marketing material which is directed to you.
- You are entitled, by notice in writing, to require us to ensure that no decision taken by or on behalf of us and which significantly affects you is based solely on the automated processing of your information.

If Your Child has a Disability

Some children may have a disability within the meaning of the Disability Discrimination Act 2005. It is unlawful for a school to treat a disabled child less favourably than a non-disabled child, without justification, in relation to admissions, exclusions, and the provision of education and related services and functions. A school must make reasonable adjustments to ensure that it does not treat a disabled child less favourably but is able to justify its actions where it can demonstrate that the adjustments required are unreasonable.

A disability is defined as a physical or mental impairment that has a substantial and long term adverse affect on the person's ability to carry out day to day activities. The DDA 2005 now includes in its definition HIV, multiple sclerosis and some cancers, where the DDA 1995 did not. There will be some children who have Statements of SEN who do not fit this definition but, equally, there will be children who do not have Statements of SEN who are considered to have a disability.

If you think that your child has been discriminated against on the grounds of a disability in relation to the arrangements made for his or her admission, you may have a right of appeal.
