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
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Chairman's Message ... James E. Layden

The First North American Secession Convention... Staff Reporter

South Carolina was the only state League chapter that was represented at the First North American Secession Convention held in Burlington, Vermont on the 3-5 November 2006. The National League was present and did an outstanding job defending Southern principles and made a lasting impression on the late blooming Yankee secessionists. The meeting on Saturday lasted 10 hours and there were many other folks

representing Alaska, Hawaii, New Hampshire, Vermont, Cascadia, (Washington State, Oregon and parts of the Pacific Northwest of Canada), Texas, Christian Exodus and the Confederate Legion. Hawaii presented a video proving her illegal occupation via an agreement with the Queen of Hawaii and the United States government, which was never agreed to by the people of Hawaii. Washington tricked the Hawaiian people into statehood. Of course only native Hawaiians should have voted for or against statehood, but the treachery of the regime in Washington holds no bounds and they allowed military and other U.S. nationals to vote. The result of the meeting was a proclamation unanimously adopted by the delegates that secession is the only possible solution to the problems facing these United States. The National League of the South Conference was held this year in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Michael Peroutka, the 2004 Constitution Party Presidential Candidate, reminded everyone that the failure of the Washington politicians and bureaucrats is in their total ignorance and neglect of the Constitution upon which the republic was founded.

Donnie Kennedy, coauthor of the best selling, "The South was Right", gave a sterling call to action. Thomas Naylor, head of the Vermont secession project, also spoke at the conference. It seems that secession is the once and future desideratum of freedom loving people everywhere.

That brings up the first trans-regional secession conference ever held. On November 4th and 5th in Middlebury, Vermont, representatives of secession movements from far and wide came together in common cause.

A number of other prominent League members attended, among them, Donnie Kennedy who, when quizzed about the race question responded, "How can you believe in liberty and discriminate against your neighbor? Equality before the law is something we want and we're on the record for that." South Carolina was ably represented at the conference by League and Christian Exodus member Robert Iacomacci who surprised the attendees by initiating and leading the a most appropriate chorus of "The Bonnie Blue Flag." Kirkpatrick Sale, organiser of the convention, spoke for many millions of freedom loving subjects of the Empire when he stated, "Reform is useless. Rebellion and revolution are useless. What is left? Secession!"

The Red Shirts were active recently for they are never idle for long. When it came time to show our support for protecting the borders

they did their duty. There are one or two principled individuals in Washington. One of them is Colorado representative Tom Tancredo. Mr. Tancredo is steadfastly opposed to open borders and when on 11 September 2006, in Columbia, South Carolina, he spoke to a gathering of the "Americans Have Had Enough Coalition", which he had helped found and the South Carolina Red Shirts were there in force. At the close of the event the audience stood up and sang "Dixie." The inter-net was abuzz for weeks!

Those were the meetings and serious events. Here is the lighter side.

Once again Abbeville came alive as "Olde South Christmas" proclaimed our cultural memory, pride and delight in family fun. Old time music and dress were the order of the day. The weather was perfect and the shoppers were enjoying it all. Last year's event earned a lengthy photo spread in "Upstate (sic) Lake Living" magazine proving that the event has drawn widespread attention. Director of the Southern Cultural Centre, Robert Hayes, always at his best when under pressure, brought together a remarkable assortment of scholars, intellectuals and activists for an afternoon of stimulating talks on a variety of brainy subjects. Then there was the Olde South Christmas Ball. No Southern celebration is complete without a dance and ours was bigger and better than ever. Each year more Southrons put on their period finest for this event and I predict that, as spacious as the Abbeville Civic Center is, it is destined to get just a bit crowded in years to come. Indeed, nothing could be finer than Olde South Christmas in Abbeville, South Carolina

Finally, on a serious note, the South Carolina Minutemen are active and are having positive results. Beaufort County Council voted 7 to 1 (abstention) on a new measure to require businesses to sign affidavits stating that they have no illegal immigrants (criminal invaders) on their payrolls. This law was fashioned by Minutemen lawyers and is being adopted county by county as the Empire shrinks from defending its borders.

The ordinance has faced well-funded and well-organised opposition. Home builders, the hospitality industry and chambers of commerce have banded together. A coalition of seven private businesses hired Melissa Azallion, an im-

migration and employment lawyer with Nexsen Pruet on Hilton Head Island, to investigate the constitutionality of the ordinance. But we will win this one, one county at a time. The League of the South is fighting for our right to determine our own future. We are not the property of business. We will regain our right to protect our own borders and Big Business will no longer dictate its will to the sovereign citizens of South Carolina. Dorchester County is now debating an ordinance that mirrors the one originally filed in Beaufort County.

Mike Bedenbaugh of Newberry County called Robert Hayes and asked that he attend a tax protest meeting he was organising. Property taxes

had doubled in a single year and the citizens were up in arms. It is services to criminal invaders that drives taxes up and they know it. Two thousand citizens turned out. (See a report on this meeting elsewhere in this issue.) This is the beginning of the end of the invasion into South Carolina. The South Carolina League of the South is naming names and putting them on notice that the citizens of South Carolina come first, not well connected wealthy businesses.

The year 2007 promises to be like no other. For it represents nothing less than the bicentennial of Robert E. Lee. I won't bore you with tales of political correctness. We all know the days are evil. We are all subjects of an ideological regime: anti-Western, anti-Christian, antiwhite. Not surprisingly, Lee along with George

Washington and Thomas Jefferson is a main target of the evildoers. To others, Lee is not so malevolent. Rather, he remains a strange figure, a man out of place in American history. He is forever the Man in Gray, the man of a different uniform in a nation defined by progress unlimited. There's no room for tragedy in this America:

tragedy, defeat, occupation---Americans would rather not think about it.

Lee is not forgotten---at least to those who look hard enough. There are Lee Counties in 10 Southern states. (The "Lee Counties" in both Georgia and Virginia are for his father, Henry "Light Horse Harry" Lee, the famed Revolutionary War cavalryman.) There are 80-plus schools---and not all of them in the South---that bear his name, not to mention those streets, boulevards, parkways, plus the numerous monuments in his likeness, especially Stone Mountain, the largest outdoor sculpture in the Western Hemisphere. A previous generation was nostalgic for life "befoah de wah." Me, I'll take life before the Interstate, when the Old Lee Highway, the Jeff Davis Highway, and the Dixie Highway were the main byways running through the Southland. For the Old South, Lee was an icon on which folks could nurse their wounded pride. The South lost --- but look at what men it produced. In that age, from 1876 to 1941, the first great bulk of Lee scholarship was being produced. Starting in modern times, around the 1930s, Lee became puzzlement to some. Biographers, novelists, poets, and historians have all struggled to "get Lee right." Robert Penn Warren thought that Lee was too smooth, too refined a character to ever be a subject for fiction. Warren's fellow Agrarian, Allen Tate, quit a planned biography of Lee in frustration: He thought Lee was too image conscience (to borrow a modern term) to gather much sympathy. For decades, ambitious historians have sought to upend Douglas Southall Freeman's contention that unlocking Lee's true nature---specifically his ceaseless devotion to Christian morality ---involved no great mystery.

Is understanding Lee that hard? Lee was stoic like the Roman, but that was the way of the gentleman. He was human, plenty human. Lee's life was marked by great ambition, legendary victories, only to face enormous frustration and finally, defeat. He was, in his own words, a man "elevery wenting comething."

"always wanting something."

Lee was reared in Alexandria, Virginia at a time when the legacy of George Washington dominated the local culture. Lee's father, now sent into exile for failing to meet his debts, was a friend and contemporary of Washington. Lee grew up idolizing Washington. As fate would have it, Washington's adopted granddaughter also lived in Alexandria. The families were acquainted with each other. And you just knew that Lee would marry Mary Curtis. One can imagine the young Lee laying eyes on her and resolving right there to marry her. You'd almost like to be a fly on the wall for that courtship.

In his youth, Lee also cared for his mother. He burned equally to redeem the family name. At West Point, Lee would become the only cadet to graduate without receiving a single demerit---an astounding achievement that stands to

this day. After West Point, Lee began his life on the road. The coming decades would see Lee stationed, at among other places, Savannah, St. Louis, Brooklyn, New York, and West Texas. Ambition followed by frustration. Lee disliked being away from his family, even though he had no real home. Arlington, the mansion where his children were reared, was in fact the home of his father-in-law, George Washington Parke Curtis. In between West Point and Fort Sumter, there was the Mexican War, in which Lee served with great valor and vigor. His performance caught the eye of General Winfield Scott, who now declared Lee to be the finest soldier in the entire U.S. Army.

Lee, of course, opposed secession, even labeling it as a "rebellion." "The only song I long to hear is 'Old Columbia,'" he exclaimed as the Deep South seceded. However, wearing the blue and invading Virginia was asking too much. You had to wonder what the boys in Washington were thinking. "Having plowed her fields, he had a new sense of oneness with her," wrote the perceptive Freeman of Lee's special attachment to Old Dominion. In addition, Lee, during the war became convinced the South's rightness in not just moral terms, but constitutional ones as well.

And so, came Lee's greatest challenge, greatest glory, and greatest frustration. I am not a military historian. Lee excelled through those lighting quick offensive operations, the ones with Jeb Stuart conducting cavalry rides around the opposition, Stonewall Jackson striking the first blow, and James Longstreet's forces delivering the decisive follow-ups. After Jackson fell at Chancellorsville, Lee still took the offensive at Gettysburg. After that epic battle, Lee assumed a more defensive posture, one that kept U.S. Grant's mighty forces at bay all throughout 1864. I would only add that the Western theater was important, too. Jeff Davis's decision to relieve Joe Johnston in Atlanta with John Bell Hood was as significant as the loss of Jackson. Hood abandoned Johnston's successful defense of Atlanta for an heroic, but illconceived assault on Nashville. The Army of Tennessee was lost at a time when Lee's men were still in the field. Plus, there is the story of Nathan Bedford Forrest and all the missed opportunities.

So why Lee? There is that constant fascination with the underdog, with Lost Causes, with how the losing side manages to endure. There also was Lee's conduct, both during and after the war. He did win great battles against enormous odds. Plus, Lee was magnanimous in victory. He did not gloat or brag when a major battle was won. He knew the odds his army struggled under and the cruel reality of war----thousands of young men robbed of life at an early age. He referred to Federal forces as "those people" and even at times, "our friends." Finally, in defeat, Lee was regal. At Appomattox, he dressed to the nines, while Grant

showed up late, chomping on his ever-present cigar and wearing only a colonel's uniform. One can only recall James R. Robertson's unforgettable description: "[It] was one of those rare moments in history when the vanquished commanded more attention than the victor."

After the war, Lee's demeanor changed little. There was anger in private, the conciliatory stand in public. "How that great heart suffered," his son Robert Junior also observed. There was more, however, to his postwar life than melancholy. At Sulphur Springs, Lee confided to Fletcher I. Stockdale, a former governor from Texas, that if he had foreseen the ravages of reconstruction, he would not have surrendered, but instead died with his men right there at Appomattox. Indeed, at Washington College, where Lee served as president, he truly was a man without a country. The descendant of two signers of the Declaration of Independence, the son of a governor of Virginia, the husband of the adopted granddaughter of George Washington, Lee was now a mere spectator to the tyranny of Reconstruction and all the graft and corruption in Washington City. It couldn't have been easy. In all, I'd say such pro-Lee scribes as Dr. Freeman and the Rev. J. William Jones read the man correctly. Rev. Jones might not have been an academic, but he was an intimate of Lee during the Lexington years. Duty and self-denial were the cornerstones of Lee's life. He loved the former word, declaring it to be "the most sublimest word in the language. Always do your duty. Never do less."

"Teach him he must deny himself," the elderly Lee told the mother of a young child. Here again, is the code Lee strove to live by: self-denial, the determination to live for others. That does lead to frustration. At Washington College, Lee posted only one rule: All students must behave as Christian gentlemen. Lee fell short, as do all who take up the cross. The effort, however, is important. In that sense, Lee is hardly a failure. His life remains a fascination to millions around the world. Two hundred years later, the controversies, the adulation, and the debates rage on. Every year, the books tumble out of the presses. General Lee lives.

"This is the best one yet," is how one young man from Charleston put it. He has attended the last three South Carolina League of the South Conferences and he pronounced this one tops. I asked him why he felt that way. His response: "So many impressive speakers, and the confidence, it seems more organised and established."

We have come a long way to gain this degree of confidence. It reflects the experience of many a shared battle bravely fought.

This year, as last, the meeting took place on the third Saturday in November, at Crystal Lake Pavilion just north of Gaston, South Carolina. It's a central location and members came from every region of the country as well as from abroad.

With Mr. Robert Hayes officiating, Dr. John Cobin gave the invocation, after which Director Jim Hanks gave a synopsis of the projects, events and accomplishments of the year. Chairman James Layden was next to speak and his opening remark got right to the point. If we are to prevail in this epic contest we must commit ourselves without reserve. Mr. Layden gave the example of a bacon and egg sandwich where only two animals play a role - a pig and a chicken. The chicken is involved but the pig is committed!

Our two previous struggles for independence produced men and women of immense courage and dedication. It is proper that we look to them for inspiration. We are connected in spirit and in blood and we shall fulfill the promise for which they contended. Consistency is our hallmark. The success we have had in South Caro-

lina politics is the result of many things; high among them is the fact that, as an organisation we neither forget nor forgive. Mr. Layden's remark, "All our problems come from government," is hardly an exaggeration. We have brought powerful politicians down and we are now taking things to a new level by running our own candidates. When we begin something we see it through. We are results oriented. Our public campaigns have made our organisation well known. Politicos know that they must listen when we speak.

We own and operate successful businesses. We operate with a paid staff. We network with other groups when objectives coincide. We are growing and we are playing for the whole pot.

Next, board member, Laurie Sally, pointed out the aptness of George Washington's warning against the inevitable encroachment of government on the rights of free men. Government is power and without power our ideas will have no consequences. Leonardo da Vinci designed a bicycle in 1595 and yet his idea had no consequences. The private, if it stays private has no consequences and that is why we are activists, not armchair warriors. The direct path to power is through political office. Politicians lust for power and prestige. Lacking souls, they, like Pavlovian dogs respond only to pleasure and to pain. With this insight in mind we can accomplish great things. Upon politicians, we must dispense pleasure or pain as appropriate.

The indirect path to power is through control of elections. Those who decide who can win, control power from a distance and as most

elections are actually decided in the primary, a very small number of voters can exercise huge indirect power. In truth, most state elections are decided by less than three hundred primary voters.

Laurie gave several pointers as he told us how to give a candidate a donation in such a way that he will remember it (and the giver). And he repeated what Jim DeMint said about the League's influence on his campaign. He said that we went negative so that he didn't have to and that it made all the difference in the world. We do, indeed, have the intellectual capital (and the fortitude) to see this thing through!

Author Brian Cisco followed with a foretaste of his forthcoming expose, "War Crimes against Southern Civilians". He shared with us five amazing facts that the history books leave out. One by one, the cold-blooded murders came to light, not casualties of war, but coldblooded "hits" - ordered by military officers. Abduction, despoliation and wanton cruelty were the order of the day, officially sanctioned, encouraged and rewarded by the Commander in Chief of the United States Army. Mr. Cisco exposed the terrible truth that the South was set upon by systematic terrorists, whose thuggery, so long whitewashed and played down, will inform all future debates, casting the War of Northern Aggression in the infamous hues it so richly deserves. Over fifty thousand civilians were exterminated by the invaders in a despicable campaign of ethnic cleansing. What would an equivalent present day number of deaths amount to? One million! How would you describe a President who formulated, presided over and encouraged policies that resulted in this crime against humanity? I predict that a blockbuster movie is in the cards for this powerful book. The next question: Who will write the screenplay?

After Brian's performance we broke for dinner, during which our piper, George Forsythe entertained us with traditional Southern and Scottish tunes. No League member is more dedicated to the cause than George, who makes our events so memorable and who drives so far to do his part for the cause.

When we returned to the meeting, League member, Dean Weems, played and sang two original ditties of his own composition. Many in the audience were alternately amused and bemused as Dean's "Honey, You'll Get over It One Day", which touched a memory chord or two - perhaps too close for comfort.

Our afternoon session began with Dr. John Cobin's recollections of the campaign trail. He thanked the League and its members who he counted as his most generous and faithful supporters. Public meetings are our battlefield, Dr. Cobin explained. When we stand up and ask questions or hand out literature we are recognised as organised and effective. Dr. Cobin pointed out that even home-schooled individuals are being brainwashed. The U.S. flag has become the false god of many Christians, even of many of those being taught at home. Our enemies have invented a system of brainwashing that must be overcome. It is up to us to master the arts of communication and beat them at their own game. Dr. Cobin ran as a pro-life, Christian Libertarian candidate, but the party was not the important thing. A number of disparate groups supported his candidacy. He was clear all along about his sympathies and allegiances. He proclaimed that if elected his first act would be to propose the recognition of South Carolina's secession.

Finally, John Cook, MD gave a history of socialised medicine. The first step away from personal responsibility came about during World War II, when as a measure to attract employees during a wage freeze, employers began offering health insurance as a benefit. The system is now best described as socialism through regulation. Insurance companies are heavily regulated, keeping new businesses with innovative approaches from starting up. This is a part of the corporatism (a hybrid form of fascism) that has taken over much of the American economy. A government/business relationship effectively limits supply and choice while raising prices for consumers. Insurance companies have become gatekeepers that stop patients from getting the medicine that their physicians prescribe. This fascinating exploration of our present sclerotic health care "system" brought to a fitting close this year's meeting.

Reinvigorated and energised, we closed, as usual, with our beloved national anthem. As the last strains of "Dixie" faded, we lingered a while among friends and comrades. One hundred and forty one years we have been alienated from our birthright.

Our time is coming. Next year in Columbia!



Recently the property owners of Newberry and Saluda counties received a very unpleasant before-Christmas gift courtesy of their respective county councils. Most of the property owners' taxes increased two to three times of their last year's bill. To say the least, the property owners were not pleased, not pleased at all.

Our member, Robert Iacomacci, and I attended a tax payers protest meeting in Newberry on Wednesday 13 December. The meeting was held in the Newberry College basketball gymnasium and there were in excess of two thousand very mad tax payers in attendance. Only two council members were brave enough to face the rebellious citizens of Newberry County. Before the meeting concluded those two council members agreed to let the people just pay what they had paid last year. It will certainly take the watchful eyes of the people to make the council members stay in line, but I do believe they got the message that was shouted quite loudly and clearly.

On that same night, the neighboring county of Saluda also had a taxpayer's protest meeting with their county council over the same issue. 


