



Preface

What does one put in a preface anyway? Something, I guess, about what the book is, its purpose, who it's aimed at, how it came into being, and some acknowledgements. The trouble is, ninety per cent of that material can be found in the Introduction, mixed in with all the stuff about the hills themselves, and I have no desire to repeat it here. Very briefly, then:

This book is about a big list of hills, the HuMPs. And I mean big – nearly 3000 of them – but I hope that in its depths there will be something for everyone. The idea is to provide those people interested in climbing those hills on the list with a proper and nice-looking book to work from, something they have been denied up till now. The book also provides some background, information about topography, and extra data about the hills, which readers may or may not find useful. It is not just aimed at ‘baggers’ – collectors of summits – but to anyone who wants to find out what hills exist in their area (or any other area, for that matter) and pick some to climb.

I had been ruminating on the idea of a HuMPs book for a few years, but I lacked the technical expertise to generate one that could be easily updated from data files, and really didn't feel like manually updating the text every time some data changed. For this reason it was a real blessing when a chance conversation with David Stone turned into a realisation that he could provide just such a structure for the list, and would be happy to do so. He has taken care of the entire technical side of things in admirable fashion and I am deeply grateful to him, without whom the book could not exist at all.

This is an electronic book for a reason. I doubt that it would ever get published, not even in shops specially catering for obscure hillwalking books (if there are any). For that reason it could not exist without the Internet, which allows people to share documents of incredible triviality at little to no cost, and for which I am very grateful.

Preface by David Stone

This book is Mark Jackson's, based of course on the work of those he acknowledges. But since one important idea for the arrangement is mine, a short personal note about my contribution is in order.

Many years ago – it must have been 1995 or so, soon after I discovered Alan Dawson's book [3] – I worked out for myself the notion of 'parent hill' implicit in the notion of 'drop', and thought of arranging the hills of England and Wales in hierarchy according to parent. In those days I had no list of hills and their drops, let alone their parents, so it was tedious work to find them out; I got as far as the hills down to 300 m drop, but left it there.

Then recently, while checking some details for the lists which Mark Tren-grove has been editing and publishing, I realised that Mark Jackson's list in-

cluded the parent, and so I could produce the hierarchy which I had once tried to do by hand. This required the writing of a small program, which read the .txt form of the HuMPs list, and using the ‘parent’ column, reordered the list into a hierarchy, giving a long list of hills grouped under their parent. Ordering the hills under each parent in ascending order of drop tended to bring the near neighbours of a parent close to it in the list, so I chose that rather than the descending height often used.

An adapted form of the program was used to generate the tables in this book from the spreadsheet maintained by Mark Jackson. Such automatic generation reduces the work of maintenance and the chances of errors creeping in.

This book – thanks to all the work of Mark Jackson and others – realises that idea. Of course, every reader will look for what interests them; but for me the main interest of this list is that it shows the topographical relationships between the hills, recognising the importance of hills such as [Aran Fawddwy](#)↑, [Pen y Fan](#)↑ and [Pumlumon Fawr](#)↑ (taking Wales for example), as well as bringing neighbouring hills close to each other as far as is possible when two- or three-dimensional land is reduced to a one-dimensional list.

In my rôle as book-designer, I should like to acknowledge all the people – too many to name – who have provided the L^AT_EX document preparation system. This is the largest document I have worked on using L^AT_EX, and those more competent than I – either in the technical details of its use, or in book design – will no doubt spot examples of inelegant layout as a result of my inexperience. Please feel free to send suggestions for improvement to dfstone@bcs.org.uk. A brief note at the end on page 361 lists some bad points of which I am aware but do not know how to solve.

How to use this e-book

In this e-book, hyperlinks have been used in many places to make it easier to find related information. The types of link used are as follows, with an example for each.

- Names of hills are links to the corresponding index entry, to make it easier to find both the OS map numbers and the other references to the hill.

Ben Nevis is a hill which is named many times in this book.

- The ↑ following a hill name is a link to the hill's entry in the main tables.

Scafell Pike↑ is the most prominent hill in England.

- The superscript letters or symbols are links to the appendices. The page numbers of the appendices are given in footnotes.

Snowdon^{bsce} is one of the biggest hills, has an alternative summit name, is a county top, and is one of the easiest hills.

- Topo region and section numbers are links to the table for that region or section.

Càrn Eige is in topo section E1, part of topo region E.

- Page numbers are links to the page.

The indexes start on page 289.

- References to the further reading are links to the details of the work cited.

Alan Dawson's book [3] is referred as 'RHB'.

- URLs to external websites are links; they are always shown explicitly so that they are not lost if the book is printed.

- Grid references are links to the Ordnance Survey's Get-a-map service.

Chapter 1

Introduction

A hill slopes upwards. Many of them are very good at that.

E. J. Yeaman

That was Dr Yeaman's first answer to the age-old question 'What is a hill?'

Though it has to be admitted that sloping upward is something that all hills do, for a while some people have suspected that there might be a bit more to it than that. As Yeaman goes on to say, 'A hill is something distinct. Having toiled to the top of a long slope, it's demoralising to find that you're only on the shoulder of something a bit further on.'

Fortunately, there is a simple measure of exactly how distinct, or separate, a hill is. It goes by many names – 'prominence', 'relative height', or just 'drop'. As its name suggests, it is defined to be the vertical drop between the hill's summit and the highest saddle linking said hill to higher ground. Put another way, it's the height which the hill would be above sea level, if the sea level was raised and raised until the hill was the highest point on its own little island.

The advantages of using relative height are numerous. Apart from the weighty matter of deciding exactly how much relative height is needed to make a hill separate, gone are the arguments over what hills are distinct and what are merely subsidiary tops – arguments that have raged over the lists of Munro and Wainwright for decades. Some of Wainwright's Lakeland summits may look good from below, but you might barely notice them if you

were to descend from a higher neighbour towards them along the ridge. Using relative height eliminates these impostors, ensuring that you have to put in a decent effort to get to your summit from another one.¹ Finally, in most cases you are assured of a good view, due to the considerable drop on all sides of your hill and its separate nature. That is, if the mist would clear...

One can, of course, combine drop with absolute height, and restrict oneself to climbing only separate summits, say, over 2000 feet, but I have always preferred to think in terms of drop only. Again there are advantages to this way of thinking, the first of which is that a height cut-off for one region may just not be practical for another. For example, to climb all hills with a height of 2000 feet and a drop of 100 feet may be a good target in England, but you would be faced with a very large task if you tried to extend that to the whole of Britain – and you would still be missing out on several large parts of the country. In Scotland, just going for the Munros (above 3000 feet) restricts your hillwalking to mostly well-trodden areas, when in fact there is a great deal more to explore – the Outer Hebrides, the Lowlands, Arran, the Shetlands, the hills of Coigach and Applecross – the list goes on. Using relative height as your standard for what makes a hill worth climbing ensures that you get to see hills of all shapes and sizes, and visit all the places this fantastically diverse country has to offer.

The first list of hills in Britain to use relative height was John Rooke Corbett's list of Scottish hills between 2500 and 3000 feet [10], which was compiled in the 1920s, published posthumously by the SMC, and later named after its author. Although many other lists throughout the 20th century used drop in conjunction with height, the whole thing really took off with the publication in 1989 of Eric Yeaman's *Handbook of Scottish Hills* (Scotland, 100 m drop) [11] and Alan Dawson's 1992 *The Relative Hills of Britain* (Britain, 150 m drop) [3], which ignored absolute height completely.

Both books were impressive compilations, covering many hundreds of hills, although I think it's fair to say that the latter was better presented and has become more popular. In the years since then it has spawned a dedicated community of 'Marilyn-baggers' – the hills in the book being known as 'Marilyns' – which has compiled an impressive amount of knowledge on the subject, brought several members to near completion and many others to well over a thousand summits.

This book extends the list of Marilyns first presented in *The Relative Hills of Britain*. It adds over 1400 hills to the Marilyns, bringing the total to eleven

shy of 3000, by lowering the relative height threshold to 100 metres. This is the same value used by Yeaman, and thus this book includes all of the hills in Yeaman's book,² plus sizeable numbers of hills in England, Wales and the Isle of Man.

Why do we need another list of hills? Well, as stated above, some tireless baggers have nearly completed the Marilyns, and many more are (justly!) beginning to complain that their nearest unclimbed ones are an inconveniently long way away. No-one should have to sit around at home because they have 'run out of decent hills to climb', and this list will hopefully introduce those folk to a wealth of other hills, some in new places, and many much closer to home. Also, although the Marilyns consist of the most worthy hills in Britain, by no means do they consist of every single hill. Only the most ardent fanatic would contend that [Sca Fell↑](#), [Bow Fell↑](#) or [Crinkle Crags↑](#) deserve to be counted merely as tops or shoulders of [Scafell Pike↑](#). A visitor to Southern Lakeland who was only interested in climbing Marilyns would miss out on a great deal, and the same is true of many other places.

You see that this is about more than just giving a few people a new hobby! It is about publicising hundreds of unknown hills, revealing new places, and showing how the hills fit together in a natural way. It is about revising and recognising the work done by Yeaman and his southern counterpart Clem Clements, a painstaking labour that deserves to be revised, re-presented, and recognised. But most of all, I have done it because I enjoyed doing it, and because if this whole list gives just one person one good day on the hills that they wouldn't otherwise have had, the whole caboodle will have been worth it.

1.1 History and Development

A lot has happened in the last twenty years. It deserves to be set out and recognised, and in any case it has all influenced this book.

Eric Yeaman's *Handbook*, published by Wafaida in 1989 [11], was the first book (I believe) to be systematic and to impose no height restriction on the hills it listed. It listed all the Scottish hills with more than 100 metres of relative height, and also included many dozens of hills that, while failing to

²All hills in Yeaman's book that qualify by dint of relative height, anyway. The *Handbook* also included hills with less drop that qualified by distance from higher ground. Also, some hills have been deleted or included from the list in the last twenty years, based on corrections of their relative heights.

have enough relative height, were more than 5 km from their nearest higher neighbour along a ridge-line; these hills ‘qualified by distance’ and had to be above 100 metres in height to get in the book. On the principle that it’s better to be safe than sorry, it also included every hill whose height qualification was unclear from the contours; some of these are now reckoned to qualify while others probably fail to make the cut. It did not list drop, and grid references were only given to four figures.

Alan Dawson’s 1992 *The Relative Hills of Britain* (RHB) [3] listed the ‘Marilyns’ with more than 150 metres of drop. In Scotland this was a subset of the hills in Yeaman’s book, but neither author included drop information in their book, so it wasn’t a question of Dawson simply picking the most prominent hills from the previous publication, and the Marilyns appear to have better researched information, not to mention six-figure grid references. In England, Wales and the Isle of Man the hills listed were entirely new, and this was the first list at all, anywhere, of hills in Southern England.

In the years after the *Handbook* was published, English ‘hill scientist’ E. D. ‘Clem’ Clements aimed to replicate Yeaman’s methodology by providing an analogous list for England, Wales and the Isle of Man. This he did, producing in 1993 an extension of the southern Marilyns to include hills with 100 metres drop, along with height questions and distance qualifiers. It was never published. These lists form the basis for the HuMPs, and I am naturally hugely indebted to their compilers.

Following RHB, a series of booklets were published by TACit Press giving details of Alan Dawson’s lists of high tops with 30 m relative height – Murdos, over 3000 ft (1995) [4], Corbett Tops, over 2500 ft (1995) [7], New Donalds, in Southern Scotland (1995) [8] and Hewitts, in England and Wales (1997) [5, 6]. The latter pair were based on previous books by the Nuttalls [22, 21]. Together with the later Graham Tops listing (1999) [8], these provided drop figures and accurate information for all British hills above 2000 feet.

In 1999 a sea change occurred in the small world of hill lists, although it may have gone unnoticed at the time: RHB joined the Internet, and suddenly publication in a book was no longer necessary for lists to be available to keen (and web-savvy) baggers.

In 2001 Alan Dawson worked out the relative heights of the lower Marilyns, and the locations of all Marilyns’ key cols, releasing this data onto the rhb group’s Files section along with the drops of all the hills researched before then. He also researched the list of ‘Sub-Marilyns’, hills with between

140 and 149 m drop, and thus with the potential to be promoted to Marilyns [46].

There had been talk of researching the hills with 100 m drop for several years. Three years in, the RHB messageboard attracted this prophetic comment:

A proper list of British 100 m drop hills is the obvious next step for those of who have run out of Marilyns within a 3 hour drive. Why don't TACIT Press, Prof Yeaman and Clem Clements pool resources and publish a decent list of British Yeamans??
Shouldn't be too big a job! – Chris Upson, Oct 16 2002

To this end, spreadsheet files of the hills in Yeaman's and Clements' lists were uploaded to the Files section of the RHB e-group [56, 40, 50] by Iain Cameron and Gary Honey within the next month, incorporating drop data and six-figure grid references for those hills for which it had been worked out (the Marilyns and Subs). Clem's list was thus made publicly available for the first time.

About this time the Scottish hills with between 100 and 149 metres of drop began to be known as the 'New Yeamans', and their southern counterparts as the 'Clements' or 'Clem Yeamans'.

Steady progress was made over the next few years. This included Tony Payne's and David Purchase's (unpublished) lists of hills above 500 metres – the former for England and Wales based on the book by Michael Dewey [9], and the latter for Southern Scotland. In 2003 Clem Clements provided further corrections to his list of hills with 100 m drop, and in 2005 the bagger and lister of long standing, Rob Woodall, worked out their drops and released the results in a new version [59]. He also included the parent Marilyn,³ the concept of which began to become known. By 2006 Clem Clements had additionally drafted the Scottish hills over 500 m and the English and Welsh hills above 300 m. The relevant hills in these lists had of course already been listed in the original works, but the new lists' provision of drop data and accurate, up-to-date information is most welcome.

In 2005, from Alan's 2001 file, the topographer Pete Ridges calculated the parent peaks⁴ of the Marilyns and sub-Marilyns, and the results were combined into the spreadsheet 'Marilyns' parents' [56, 57].

³Basically, divide the place up into territories by tracing the runoffs from the Marilyns' key cols and the parent Marilyn is the one whose territory your hill ends up in.

⁴The parent peak is similar to the parent Marilyn, but calculated by tracing the runoffs from every peak more prominent than yours, to get the territories as before. The parent is always

The remaining hills of lower heights and less than 140 m drop still lacked drop and (in Scotland) six-figure grid reference data. Rob Woodall set out to fix this, pulling together information from different sources and adding much himself. For the Scottish parts he was greatly aided by Bernie Hughes, who had compiled a spreadsheet, reworked from an early version of the Database of British Hills, with much relative height data. This was finished in early 2007 [60], incorporating numerous changes and corrections from the original lists, as well as parent Marilyn information.

This completed the suit! With the aim of getting the list into a readable and accessible format, I added the data from the recent spreadsheet to the existing Marilyn text from RHB, ending up with a 150-page e-book [54] which was supplemented by maps from the Fugawi mapping program. These hills were uploaded to the RHB community's files section simply as 'The Extended RHB', but a better name soon presented itself: HuMPs (standing for Hundred Metre Prominences, as well as being a fairly accurate description of quite a few of them!).

The greatest drawback of the first edition was the data, some of which dated back to 1992 (!) owing to my lack of acquaintance with databases and other handy tools at that time. (I was a kid back then, but even so...) Over the last couple of years several more hills were added and deleted, and I updated the list sporadically (such changes being made much easier by the electronic format of the list). But what was needed was a really up-to-date version together with all the additional information found in RHB: a proper walker's resource.

Considering all the different databases that were in place by then, combining all the knowledge of the bagging world could have been an impossible task, but fortunately the task had already been done. I am incredibly grateful to Graham Jackson, Chris Crocker, Simon Edwardes, John Barnard and George Gradwell for putting together the Database of British Hills [53]. This is an up-to-date of almost every kind of information about the hills and is the source for the numbers in the book. A major update to the database took place in June 2009 which included both the HuMPs and relative height information – thanks again, guys!

The one field lacking was parent information, for which I cannot blame the DBoBH, as it's a pretty obscure concept. I brought in the parents from Pete Ridges' and Rob Woodall's files mentioned above, adding a number

higher and more prominent than the child. For those who want it, these concepts are explained in more detail in the next section.

of corrections of my own. Still missing was the parent peak information for HuMPs which aren't Marilyns, as these only had parent Marilyn data. I am grateful to David Stone for identifying those HuMPs whose parent peak might differ from their parent Marilyn, as this made it very easy for me to fill in the remaining parents and complete the Tree.

David Stone, as well as offering to copy-edit and design the book – for which I cannot be grateful enough – also came up with the idea of the topographical tree,⁵ which provided the final incentive to get the book under way. The rest is kind of self-explanatory.

Just to say that information in the Appendices was gleaned from RHB [3], the RHB update sheets [45], the notes at the back of the *Handbook* [11], the DBoBH notes [42], Iain Cameron's Yeamans datafile [40] (which included details of changes since the *Handbook*) and Rob Woodall's very informative personal database, without which the appendices would be a good deal less full than they are, particularly with regard to the changes from the original lists.

1.2 Bagging

Bagging [noun]. Etymology: From vb to bag, referring to the habit of going around, putting summits into bags, filing them away and getting them out occasionally for fond remembrance.

Definition: A game played by standing on interesting points.

Bagging, so far as I can make out, is the formalised version of hillwalking, just as 'twitching' is the rigorous form of bird-watching, and... er... growing prize marrows is a type of gardening that requires considerable dedication.

Since this book is a list of quite considerable size, one might suppose that its appeal would be entirely to baggers. Maybe one would be right, I don't know. You don't have to be a bagger to be a hillwalker and it is my hope that the more casual walker will be able to pluck some gems out of the bunch without worrying too much about the whole deal. But if you are a Bagger then you need to know What is Involved.

⁵See section 2.3 on the Tree later on.

If you are going to be a bagger then what you need above all else is The List. This is what provides you with the various possibilities for the next day's walking, this is what you carefully chart your progress through and this is what, assuming you have picked a list of the correct size, you finish, to wild acclaim.

And then you have to play The Game. Compared to most hobbies, this one is actually absurdly simple. All you have to do is stand on all the points in the list, points which are the tops of mountains and thus have sufficient relative height or whatever.

This is a bit like hillwalking, or mountaineering, but it is the top that counts, not the walk.

Dedication is important, which means going to a lot of places that your average hillwalker won't be interested in. Those hills which are right next to roads spring to mind, as well as those ones in the middle of thick forest, the sea stacks, the ones with questionable access, and so on. With some of these the great views make up for the poor quality of the walk, others are just rubbish. But if you are going to Bag, you have got to do the job properly – there is little honour in just doing the ones that look good, persevering through the bad ones makes the achievement complete, and anyway, you might get a pleasant surprise from one of them!

Some hills require a little more than struggles through forest to get to the top, but the same rules hold. Cheating is not on. If you are a *hillwalker* then you are not required to be rigorous, and you don't have to worry so much about the final few feet of [the Cobbler↑](#) or the final six hundred feet of [Stac Lee↑](#). But if you are a Bagger then unfortunately, you do have to actually be on the top. This can lead to problems, but the Bagger should not chicken out, as the Bagger can always learn a bit of rock-climbing, and the Game must be played. Turning back and claiming you got to the summit is even worse – and in any case, who do you think you're cheating? I imagine that the victory celebrations of anyone who employed this devious tactic would (privately) be somewhat damped.

Sometimes, it is not obvious which is the highest point. This is fair enough, and a good rule seems to be that at least your head has to be higher than the highest point, even if the rest of you can't quite follow. This usually means you are OK if you are on a hill with a flat top, or more than one point at the same height (see appendix *m*, 'Multiple Summits', on page [220](#)). Obviously, Messrs Barnard and Jackson's numerous surveys to determine the actual highest points of hills are laudable.

As a consequence of the head rule, if a summit is relocated to a point more than two metres higher than the old summit, then you didn't climb it properly the first time, did you? (Well, not unless you were smart enough to visit the other summit as well.) In which case, you had better go all the way back and climb it again to stand on the real summit. This is when some of us begin to have second thoughts about our dedication to the cause!

What about twin peaks? (See appendix *t*, 'Twin Peaks', on page 217.) Well, being separate tops at the same height I would have to recommend climbing both – otherwise, if the honour of being called higher switches to the one you didn't climb, you're going to have another repeat trip to make.

Then there is the delightful area of the 'ethics' of bagging. Oh yes. The Bagger, unlike the hillwalker, cannot be deterred by Keep Out notices, military installations or large barking dogs. The Bagger may turn back at such obstacles, the Bagger may feel that they have done the right thing, the Bagger may have been forcibly escorted off the premises by armed soldiers, but the Bagger has not stood on the summit, and consequently, will not have Completed the List. This sort of thing can prove a serious headache. Given that several people have managed between them to gain access to nearly all the hills in this book, it can be done, but please don't go getting yourself into serious trouble. Every occupation has its limits!

There is also the issue of transport. A hill must be Walked, so driving over the summit on that handy road and glancing at the trig point is not really on. But beyond that, you certainly can't rule out ascents assisted by mountain bike or canoe, and I see no reason to exclude air assistance either – although I'm not sure that lowering yourself from a helicopter onto **Stac Lee↑** would be any easier than climbing it!

I hope that I have managed to outline the advantages and disadvantages of Bagging. It can become an extreme sport, but there is clearly a middle ground. I can't really put it better than Alan Dawson when he says,

Use the list to give some extra purpose and enjoyment to your walking, and to encourage you to visit new areas and see new views, but do not let it dominate your thoughts so much that the bagging of summits blinds you to the character of the countryside. Lists can offer a tremendous incentive to actually go out walking more often, and you'll find that it's almost always worthwhile and enjoyable wherever you go.

And if you do manage to finish the job, then Well Done.

1.3 The Challenge of the HuMPs

In his book Alan Dawson wondered who would be the first person to stand on top of all the Marilyns. The answer to the question is no-one, at least not yet, but not for lack of trying: I think it's fair to say that St Kilda posed a slightly bigger obstacle than expected.

Nevertheless, hundreds of people have taken up the challenge with gusto. You don't get to 600 Marilyns by accident, and the long list of names in the Marilyn Hall of Fame is testament to the appeal of the challenge and the perseverance of those involved.

As mentioned in the Introduction (I find I keep trying to repeat myself around here), taking a look at the upper reaches of the Hall shows that quite a few people have nearly finished, and a great deal more will have climbed all the Marilyns in their local area.⁶ What next? To answer that question was half the reason for publishing this list; Britain has a great deal to offer, and no-one should be stuck at home wondering what to do because they have 'run out of hills to climb'!

So take on the HuMPs! They will keep you going, offer you fresh challenges and new places. Here are some fine mountains that are HuMPs but not Marilyns: [Sgùrr Tuath](#)↑ in Coigach; the shapely [Yewbarrow](#)↑, [Dow Crag](#)↑ and [Caw](#)↑ in Lakeland; mystical [Glastonbury Tor](#)↑; [Rhossili Down](#)↑ on Gower; [Màm Sodhail](#)↑, [Aonach Mòr](#)↑ and [Cairn Gorm](#)↑; [Cribyn](#)↑ in the Brecon Beacons; [Meall Mòr](#)↑ on the Summer Isles; [Meall Dearg](#)↑ on the Aonach Eagach; [A' Chir](#)↑ on Arran; the famous [White Horse Hill](#)↑ near Westbury; the great viewpoint of [Sidhean Mòr](#)↑ on the Point of Stoer; [Cnicht](#)↑, the 'Welsh Matterhorn'; the tops of Cape Wrath and [Dunnet Head](#)↑ – just a small selection and not the best one by any means, but a mere taster of the riches available.

For Baggers, however, just as with St Kilda but even more so, the existence of the [Old Man of Hoy](#)↑ poses a barrier to completion. A pity, in some ways, but maybe also a sign. I may be wrong, but I get the impression that the list of HuMPs is too large for that purpose: too large for any but the most resolute of us to get near completing it. What I am emphatically not publishing this list for is to suggest that the Marilyns are somehow inadequate, that you haven't done enough if you finish them. The aim is to supplement the Marilyns, not supersede them (hence the title).

⁶Actually, I can say the same thing, given that my local area is East Anglia and it contains a grand total of one Marilyn.

It may be that the HuMPs work better as a supplement – a key to exploration, rather than a very long series of stepping stones towards a final goal. Often, a walk up Marilynns can be enriched by the inclusion of some nearby HuMPs, as many HuMPs lie close enough to their parent Marilynns to provide enjoyable extensions (a useful function of the tree structure is identifying such peaks). The smaller size of many HuMPs makes them eminently suitable for shorter walks; a low-level walk with fine views is usually better than a high-level walk in thick cloud. They can be tucked away en route; next time you go to Skye, what could be a better hors d'œuvre than pulling in past Loch Long and nipping up [Fireach Àrd](#)↑ and [Avernish Hill](#)↑, squeezed in between the road and the sea and with intimate views? They are also even less frequented than the Marilynns, so use them to get away from the crowds – the two just mentioned have probably seen hardly any ascents at all. Ever.

Alternatively, going after a region's HuMPs will certainly lead to a more in-depth discovery of the area, especially in the south-east where the ratio of HuMPs to Marilynns is quite high. As an example, the Peak District and environs contain five Marilynns but twenty-five HuMPs, including the hills of [Shutlingsloe](#)↑ and [The Roaches](#)↑ which should not be missed by any visitor to the region. Central England including the Cotswolds and Chilterns goes from five to twenty-seven – and since an awful lot of people live in Central England or within an hour's drive of the Peak District, I kind of hope that the publication of this list will open up a lot of possibilities to such people.

Then it's just a matter of time before someone rounds off
that icky 150 m to a rounder 100 m ... and you at the head
table of the Hall of Fame can traverse the country all over
again ...

Chapter 2

Topography, Regions and Trees

Before I launch into the details of how the list is set up, I need to explain a few concepts.

Drop or relative height is very simple – just the vertical drop between the hill’s summit and the highest saddle linking said hill to higher ground, as mentioned on the first page.⁷

The territory of a hill (let’s call it A) is calculated by doing the following: first, find all the peaks in the vicinity that are more prominent than A. Then for each of these peaks, find their key cols and trace over the streams that run off from either side of the saddle. Keep tracing over the rivers until either (a) they meet up, or (b) they reach the sea. It is important to do this in order of drop: that is, first carry out the process with the most prominent peak, then do it with the next prominent, and so on. It will be seen that each time you carry out the process you enclose off an area of land containing the peak whose col you measured from, and no higher or more prominent peaks. This is the territory of that peak. But to get back to the hill A we started with, keep

⁷The only point of contention is with hills that are the highest point of their island. The usual convention is to assign these hills a drop equal to their height, since to get to a higher neighbour you have to descend to sea level. However, there is something called ‘wet prominence’ which argues that you have to descend below sea level to get to higher neighbours, so these hills should have a drop *greater* than their height, measured to an undersea col. Sadly, this statistic proves difficult to work out due to lack of detail in undersea mapping, and anyway, a 2 m-high island might have lots of wet prominence but it wouldn’t feel as worthy as your average HuMP!

doing this until you've done it for every peak more prominent than A. Now do it for A. Congratulations, you've enclosed A's territory.

The parent peak concept is relatively straightforward once you get the hang of territories. Supposing you wanted to find A's parent; then carry out the same sequence of traces as before, in order of drop, only this time stop just before you get to A. Now A should be in one of the territories you drew, one belonging to a particular peak. That peak is A's parent.⁸

To sum up: the parent of a hill is found by dividing the area into territories, by following the two watercourses from the key col of every summit more prominent than the one in question. The parent is the summit of the territory enclosing the hill in question.

2.1 Hpargopot

A pictorial explanation is definitely easier to follow than all that text, so let's consider the fictional island of Hpargopot (see map in figure 1). Let's say we want to work out the parent of Great Law.

First up we need to calculate the drops of the other, more prominent, hills. All the drops are listed in table 2 (use it to check your understanding of drop if you like).

Now we divide the island into territories. The first peak is Morven, whose key col is the sea, so it follows that its territory is the whole island. The next is Mynydd Mawr, and tracing the rivers from the 70 m col near St Tudwals, we find that they join up again at Littleton, making Mynydd Mawr's territory a closed loop.

Next we draw from Big Hill's col, which draws a new line across from Norbury to Ty-newydd, and also from Littleton to the sea. The next in the list is Great Law, so we stop, and find that Great Law is sitting in Big Hill's territory, so Big Hill is Great Law's parent. Not Mynydd Mawr nor Beinn Mhòr, which look like candidates, but the former is on the wrong side of the river and the latter is not prominent enough.

⁸There is another definition of parent. Called the encirclement parent, it is the highest point within the contour on the far side of the key col, or the highest point which can be reached from the key col without descending. This is easier to calculate but it tends to break down for hills with cols close to sea level. E.g. in the fictional island, Great Law's parent is Morven, since that is the highest ground that can be reached from the 30 m col without having to descend. For a British hill with a col 1 m above sea level, the encirclement parent will be Ben Nevis. This is not terribly helpful and it doesn't work for drawing trees either.

Figure 1: The fictional island of Hpargopot



Those who want further practise can work out the parents of Bryn Mawr and High Down (the answers are given in tree format later on).

In real life, the situations are often simpler than this (thankfully!), and a general rule of thumb presents itself: from your peak, continue along the ridge-line past the key col until you come to a higher and more prominent peak. This can be confusing (what exactly is the continuation ridge?) but is at least a useful check.

Take [Dale Head↑](#) in the Lake District as an example. It turns out that Honister Pass to its south is higher than Newlands Hause to its north-west, and thus is [Dale Head↑](#)'s key col (there being higher ground on the far sides of both cols). Sure enough, the parent lies on the Honister side, being [Great Gable↑](#), not [Grasmoor↑](#) as might be naturally thought (to readers of Wainwright anyway).

Another non-intuitive example is [Merrick↑](#), the ancestor of all the land between Glasgow and Hadrian's Wall. Now it turns out that the Hadrian's Wall gap to the south is higher, so [Merrick↑](#)'s parent lies in that direction. Trying to proceed along ridgelines is confusing, but working out a few drops and drawing the territories makes things clear: [Merrick↑](#)'s parent is [Helvellyn↑](#). Proceeding up the hierarchy leads to [Snowdon↑](#), so as far as topography is concerned, the Southern Uplands lie more naturally with Wales than with the Scottish Highlands!

2.2 On Regions

The question of what order to present a list in is not normally a difficult one. Some attempt is usually made to group together hills which are close to one another by selecting natural-looking (or artificial-looking) regions and then the hills are usually listed in height order.

The existing scheme for Marilynns as listed in RHB is undoubtedly a good one. However, it does have some failings. The most obvious one is that it works through Scotland in rather a haphazard way, starting in the middle and then covering the outside. Some sections, like 28B, become too big to be practical when more hills are added to them. More importantly, there are the hills that end up in the 'wrong' region.

What I mean by this is that they end up separated from their parents – a concept which will seem abstract to some, I know, but most people will have a fairly intuitive feel of what this means anyway. A good example is [Lord's](#)

Seat↑ (34A), which despite being listed with Northern Lakeland is clearly connected to the North-Western Fells – by a thousand-foot pass, for starters – and the parent concept backs this up, for its parent peak is **Grasmoor↑** to the south. Further examples can be found in the Lake District – **High Rigg↑** in the Central Fells for one, and **Muncaster Fell↑** for another – which, to the person concerned about such things, should definitely be grouped with the hills to which they are naturally connected – their parents.

The RHB regions were also designed for Marilyns, which sometimes leads to problems when the scheme is extended to cover more hills. For example, the hills to the north of Penrith are clearly more connected to the Lake District – they lie to the west of the River Eden – but since the RHB boundary is the M6, they end up being grouped with the Pennines, a situation which might well have been changed had these boundaries been designed with the HuMPs in mind.

It is clear that to form natural groupings we have to use natural boundaries.

2.3 On a Tree

I am indebted to David Stone for the basic idea of the ‘topo tree’. If each hill has a single parent, and a hill can have more than one ‘child’, then it should be possible to arrange all the hills into a tree-structure, with a wealth of branches leading to the single root, **Ben Nevis↑**, and a little investigation shows that it is possible to arrange hills in this way.

The other idea is to sort children by their drop, so that those children with the smallest drop are listed first, closest to their parent, followed by those with larger drops. For each hill, the procedure is repeated with its own children – take a look at the example below if you need to see what I mean. By and large, those children with smaller drops tend to be closer to, and more a part of, their parents, so this system does a good job at grouping hills with their natural allies.

This system has the advantage of being completely objective. It also shows the parent-child relationships in an extremely intuitive form (once indentation is applied; again see the example), and it takes up a good deal less room to do this than to write out each hill’s parent after its other data, allowing more room for other matters. Hillwalking often involves following ridges, and in this system hills are often listed next to the neighbours to

which they are connected by ridges. It is also interesting and reveals a great deal about the structure of the hills in general, so I have decided to use this system in this list.

Let's revisit our fictional island one last time. Table 3 shows how the tree is displayed. Each hill's parent is the hill above it and one indent to the left. (In the real tree, the indents are numbered to make looking for parents easier.)

2.4 Topo Regions

Of course, based on this method, one could get away without dividing Britain up into regions at all. However, it's handy to be able to look up a small area and see what hills it has to offer, or search the book by region – and the tree method does throw up some oddities in the ordering, as a look at the main tree below (table 4 on page 22) will reveal. For example, [Carnedd Llewelyn](#)↑ is separated from its Snowdonian neighbours by the entirety of South Wales, and the Pennines, southern England and the Scottish Lowlands end up between [Skiddaw](#)↑ and its fellows in the Lake District!⁹

It would clearly be convenient to siphon off [Cross Fell](#)↑ into a separate region, thus keeping [Skiddaw](#)↑ with [Helvellyn](#)↑, and this is what I've done.

⁹This is no error. For example, [Cross Fell](#)↑ and [Skiddaw](#)↑ are both children of [Helvellyn](#)↑, but since [Cross Fell](#)↑ has a smaller drop, it and all its children are listed first – in a sense, it is more closely related to [Helvellyn](#)↑ than [Skiddaw](#)↑ is.

For reasons of practicality I began to divide up the whole country into regions of manageable size, making sure that each cut represented a single branch of the tree – in other words, each region has a chief or ancestor, from which all other hills in that region are descended. It follows that in every region, the chief is both the highest and the most prominent peak.

In most cases each region consists of just the chief and all its descendants: the topographic territory of the chief. However, this can't quite be true in cases where the chief has too many descendants to fit into a region,¹⁰ and some sub-branches have been cut off. The most obvious example is **Ben Nevis↑** – the region that ends up belonging to **Ben Nevis↑** is what's left after all other cuts (e.g. **Snowdon↑**, **Ben Alder↑**, **Binnein Mòr↑**) have been made.

I just kept cutting until each region fell below a certain size, making sure that all regions remained connected topographically (i.e. along ridge lines). In some cases this required further cutting. For example, **Beacon Batch↑**'s territory in Southern England (which comprises regions **R5–R7**) is vast and I was keen to divide it up by making a region out of **Walbury Hill↑** (**R6**), parent of most of the eastern section. However, **Walbury Hill↑** falls between **Black Down↑** (**R7**) and **Beacon Batch↑**, separating **Black Down↑** from its parent, so I had to make **Black Down↑**'s family a separate region as well; I would have preferred to combine **Walbury Hill↑** and **Black Down↑** into a single region, but that would be against the rule that each region should have a single 'chief'.

To take another example, the topo regions **U** and **V** cannot be combined, despite the fact that **Waun Fach↑** (**V**) has as parent **Pen y Fan↑** (**U**), and regions **U** and **V** are contiguous. The logic is that the ridge route from **Waun Fach↑** to **Pen y Fan↑** goes through **Mynydd Epynt↑**, which is in region **T**. Therefore if I unified **U** and **V**, I would be obliged to unify them with **T** as well, which would be too big.

There remained the question of how to deal with the islands; it is clearly impractical to have a separate region for each island even if each one does

¹⁰For those interested, I plan to use this regional scheme in the 30 m list as well, and possibly others, so it was necessary for each region to contain sensible numbers of each type of hill. I was also keen to reduce the subjectivity of picking which hills should have their own regions, so I imposed upper limits on the numbers of certain types of hill (P300, Marilyn, HuMP, 'Tump' – 30 m hill; see if you can guess the acronym). I made sure that the ratios between these upper limits corresponded to the ratios between the total numbers of these hill types – so once one limit was fixed, the others were too. The actual limit I took from the size of the largest Marilyn territory (**High Willhays↑**), as I was keen to avoid having to break up any of those. For the larger regions denoted by letters, the limit was forced by the fact that I wanted 26 of them.

start its own tree. For the ones sufficiently big to need to be cut up themselves, like Skye, I treated them in the same way as Britain, giving each island one or more separate sections. To group the smaller islands I created a number of ‘island group regions’, such as **Z4** (Coastal Islands of Scotland) and **X6** (North Uist, South Uist, and Nearby Islands), which are inevitably of a slightly different style to the other regions.

To label the regions, I have used a letter-number format to avoid confusion with the existing RHB scheme, which employs the reverse format. This involved the construction of 26 larger regions for the letters to represent. I did this in the same way as the smaller sections; they conform to (larger) size restrictions; they have a single ‘chief’ each; and **X**, **Y** and **Z** are used for islands apart from the mainland of Britain.

As for the actual numbering and lettering of the regions, this was done to present the material in more or less the order that readers would expect it. Thus the count starts in the north of Scotland and moves, generally, from west to east and from north to south. The ordering was inspired by the scheme used by Jim Bloomer on his website [39].

The regions have been given names that seem to best describe the spread and stature of each one. My knowledge of area names and things like that can be a bit off, so suggestions of better names for the regions are quite welcome. The topo regions share names with RHB regions only where the correspondence between the two is perfect as far as HuMPs are concerned (for instance, regions 20C and **Z6**), and in such cases the two always share a name.

Another advantage of the topo regions is that you can work out their boundaries for yourself, armed only with the locations of the key cols of each region’s chief. For those who’d rather not do this, though, I have supplied boundaries for each region and put them after the region’s name, as in RHB. To prevent all the information being repeated twice on account of regions sharing boundaries, the sub-sections’ boundaries are cumulative. So if the boundaries for the region you’re looking at seem a little incomplete, you’ll need to refer to the boundaries for the previous sub-sections or the larger region, which will (hopefully) enable you to build up the complete picture, including what you’re after.

Chapter 3

Key to the Tables

In the previous chapter we have introduced the idea of listing hills in a tree. This chapter applies this to the whole of Britain in a high-level tree, and introduces the detailed tables which follow in the next chapter.

3.1 The Ancestor Tree

The overview tree below shows how the regions fit together into the larger tree and hopefully should make things clearer. Hills on islands are only included if there is more than one HuMP on the island. Islands with just one HuMP are listed in the detailed tables, and can be found through the indexes. Each region is represented by the name of its chief, whose drop is also given.

There is no rule against a hill's grandchild but not its child being given a separate region, nor against a younger sibling having a region but not an older sibling.¹¹ In these relatively rare cases, omitted hills are given in smaller type to give a fuller picture of the tree. Most readers of this book will be familiar with the RHB scheme of sections, so the RHB section of each hill is shown to the right of the name; if none is given, it is the same as that of the previous hill.

Use this tree whenever you want to see how the regions fit together on a larger scale, when the structure is obscured by the geographical order in which the regions are placed in the text.

3.2 Maps

Those who have seen the first version of the HuMPs list may remember some rather nice-looking maps which were used to indicate the positions of the HuMPs. These have been left out of this book for two reasons: (a) they massively increase the file size; and (b) they were based on low-resolution OS mapping, and it really wouldn't be a good idea to reproduce that in a book designed to be distributed freely.

The place currently to look for detailed maps is Simon Edwardes' website [48] where users can view good maps of the HuMPs that lie in any topo section. Still, if anyone has any ideas about free mapping that could be used to generate maps of the HuMPs to go in a future edition of this book, please tell me. Cheers.

3.2.1 Overview maps

The 'back cover' (final page of this e-book, 363) shows the boundaries of the topo regions superimposed on a topographical map of Britain. The maps in this section show the boundaries of the topo regions and sections, in enlarged sections of the same map. These will hopefully allow you to get a feel for where the regions are, what areas they cover and how they relate to each other, and also serve to illustrate how the boundaries of these regions always follow the rivers and contours of the landscape.

Figure 2: The topo sections of Orkney and Shetland




Figure 3: The topo sections of the Hebrides




Figure 4: The topo sections of north-western Scotland




Figure 5: The topo sections of eastern Scotland




Figure 6: The topo sections of south-western Scotland




Figure 7: The topo sections of northern England




Figure 8: The topo sections of southern England




Figure 9: The topo sections of Wales and the Isle of Man





Figure 10: The topo sections of South Wales and the south-west peninsula



3.3 RHB sections and topo sections

The ancestor and detailed trees makes it easy to find the RHB section(s) for a given topo section. It may be useful to list the sections as used in RHB [3] and the corresponding topo sections as introduced here, thus showing the reverse mapping. Table 5 lists these. The columns are headed by the RHB section letter; if an RHB region is not divided into sections, then the corresponding topo sections are shown in the A column.

3.4 How to read the tables

What follows is a brief description of the columns to be found in the main tables.

Indent The number of ‘generations’ from the root the hill is. For most hills, the root will be [Ben Nevis↑](#). For those on Skye, it’s [Sgùrr Alasdair↑](#), and so on. A hill’s parent is implicit in the tree structure, as detailed above; it can be found above the hill, and one indent to the left.

Name The name has been amended with reference to the most recent OS maps as necessary, including new Gaelic forms ([Beinn Sheasgarnaich↑](#) for [Beinn Heasgarnich](#), for example) and accent marks. On those rare occasions when the 1:25 000 and 1:50 000 maps differ, I have usually left the name in the form in which I found it. I have adopted a policy of treating OS names as definitive unless obviously wrong.

This includes the accenting, which is a fairly recent business, but in line with correct Gaelic, so I have adopted it out of respect for the language. Sometimes the OS have been inconsistent with it (about half their instances of ‘Carn’ have been accented to ‘Càrn’), so I have had to standardise the spelling of individual words. Apologies if any of these variations are in fact due to dialect.

Alternative names – though not alternative spellings – can be found in the Notes, which are indicated by letters referring the reader to the appendices; see the following section for an explanation of how they work.

Some hills have both a mountain name and a summit name, e.g. [Beinn a' Bheithir↑](#) – [Sgòrr Dhearg](#) and [Long Mynd↑](#) – [Pole Bank](#). In these cases I have used the mountain name where the peak in question is the highest point of the mountain, as with both the examples just given. With subsidiary summits (e.g. [Beinn a' Bheithir↑](#) – [Sgòrr Dhonuill↑](#)) I use the summit name. No information is lost in this way, because (a) in the case of [Sgòrr Dhonuill↑](#), it is obvious that it’s a subsidiary of [Beinn a' Bheithir↑](#) from the tree structure, and (b) in the case of [Sgòrr Dhearg](#), the summit name can be found in appendix s, ‘Summit Names’, on page [211](#).

Where two hills share the same name I have differentiated between them, as this makes it much easier to generate the tree from the parent

listings, and of course makes it easier to understand what hill I'm talking about. E.g. **Ben More (Crianlarich)**↑ and **Ben More (Mull)**↑. These bracketed names can be found in the Index but not in the main tables.

Hill names in **SMALL CAPITALS** are the root(s) of their topo section; all sections have just one root, except for those which are collections of islands. Hill names in **bold** are 'Minors', with drop at least 300 m.¹² The parent hill of the root (if there is one) is also included, with its name in smaller type, and its topo section in parentheses.

Island For those hills which are the highest points on their islands, the name of the island is given in *smaller italic type* to the right of the name. For the other hills, the island they lie on can be deduced from the fact that they are descended from (i.e. listed below) the island's highest peak – another advantage of the tree system.

RHB region This is given in smaller type to the left of the drop. If nothing is given, then it can be assumed that the hill lies in the same RHB region as the one listed above it. Actually, this happens quite a lot, since the RHB regions are usually pretty good at conforming to the branches of the tree. This information also serves to illustrate those places where the RHB regions do not conform to natural boundaries, splitting up a tree branch between several of them.

Drop and Height These are rounded to the nearest metre on those rare occasions where more accurate information is available from surveys, for general consistency.

Grid Reference The usual OS six figures, rounded down where ten-figure grid references are available.

Date of ascent and 1:50,000 map number Sadly it wasn't possible to include these two items in the tables due to lack of space. However, the numbers of the Landranger maps on which each hill can be found are listed in the index, after the name of the hill and before the list of pages on which the hill is mentioned. As for the date of ascent, I just hope there is enough space in one of the margins, or to the left of the Drop column.

¹²The term 'Major', for a hill of prominence at least 600 m, is well established. 'Minor' is introduced here, partly by analogy, partly in memory of Philip S. Minor, who walked with J. Rooke Corbett to establish some of the early lists.

3.5 Notes: references to the appendices

Each letter or symbol after the hill name, in superscript, is a reference to one of the appendices which come after the main list. These are tables of hills which are worthy of comment, either because their details have changed since the compilation of the source lists, or because of some oddity, such as being one of a pair of twin peaks, having alternative names, being a county top, or requiring climbing skills. A brief key to the letters used is given below in table 6.

The appendices are ordered in the order listed in table 6, which is about as systematic as I can get them (although not very). To aid the finding of particular appendices, the page numbers for each relevant appendix are listed at the bottom of each page of tables, the letter used to reference them is printed in large text at the head of the appendix, and (in the electronic version) there are hyperlinks from a superscript to the relevant appendix.

Also note that a letter after a hill's name in the list doesn't necessarily mean that it has the status which that appendix is devoted to. It just means that the hill is mentioned in the appendix as being related in some way to that status – maybe it had that status but lost it, or it's unclear whether it has the status or not. Turn to the relevant appendix for details.

3.6 The indexes

To help compensate for the lack of detailed maps, there are two indexes. The first lists all the hills, with the pages where each is mentioned, with the principal entry in the main table (and ancestor tree for those hills in it) marked in bold. It also lists the Ordnance Survey 1:50 000 sheet number(s) for the hill; there was not enough space for these in the main tables.

The second index is to place-names other than hills. This includes many lakes and rivers, because these form the boundaries of the new topo regions and sections. Thus to find hills in some area it may be useful to look up the name of a river or lake nearby.

In both indexes, in the electronic version, the page numbers in each index entry are hyperlinks to the relevant pages. The same system also works in reverse, so that the name of a hill in the main list links to its index entry. In the rest of the e-book, the name of the hill links to the index entry, while an upward-pointing arrow next to the hill name links to the main list entry.

Appendices

Ringing the Changes

This book relies upon the original works by Alan Dawson, E. J. Yeaman and Clem Clements. Since these were compiled nearly twenty years ago, it is inevitable that a number of changes to the list have occurred since then – some due to new mapping information, some due to error on the part of the original author.

This section will be of particular use to anyone in possession of the *Handbook* or RHB and who wants to see what's changed or amend their copy of the book.

These tables are by no means complete. Further discrepancies between the source documents and the current listing of HuMPs will be gratefully received!

One table is missing: height changes. This has been omitted because there have been hundreds of such changes over the last twenty years, usually only by one or two metres, and except for those hills which gain or lose status as a result, the height change will make little difference to walkers (as long as the summit location hasn't changed as well).

Let's start with the new HuMPs, i.e. hills which are now believed to have over 100 m of drop but are not listed in the *Handbook* or Clem's list, either because the authors missed them or because the maps have been updated since then giving new summit or drop spot heights.

See also the next appendix >, 'Replaced HuMPs', on page 194, as this contains some more new HuMPs which are in the special position of having directly replaced a previous one.

Garwall Hill↑, Blackstone Edge↑, Millstone Hill↑ and Creag Mhòr Thol-laidh↑ have all been promoted (or re-promoted) since the first release of the HuMPs list in June 2007, from which it can be seen that this is an on-going process. I know that a list of deleted HuMPs should also be in this section, but for that you'll have to refer to the section 'Sub-HuMPs and Deleted HuMPs' on page 239, as for reasons outlined there, the lists of Subs and Deletions have been combined, and I don't think it's appropriate to have a whacking great list of Subs right here.

> Replaced HuMPs <

Combining promotion and deletion, the HuMPs in table 10 have been superseded by a nearby higher summit since the publication of the source lists.

Note that the threshold between a 'summit relocation' and a 'replacement' is taken to be a 30 m drop between the summits.

Birks Fell↑ (Q7, 610 m, SD918763) was decided to have been overtaken by Horse Head Moor (609 m, SD893768) after apparently losing two metres in height. However, a 2008 survey by John Barnard and Graham Jackson revealed it to be 610 m after all; thus it regained its place as a Marilyn, Hewitt, Nuttall and HuMP.

East Cairn Hill↑ (P3) overtook West Cairn Hill↑ as the Marilyn when it was found to be six metres higher than first thought; however, since both hills are HuMPs, there were no changes to HuMP status or numbers.

In some cases, such as Dent↑, the general hill name has superseded the summit name, if the former is more widely known. In other cases, such as Esgeiriau Gwynion↑, the name given originally has now been recognised as belonging to a lower nearby sub-peak. For the three hills Beinn Loinne↑, Beinn Bhreac (Appin)↑ and Beinn Dubh (Luss Hills)↑, the reverse has happened; a name has been given that appears from the map to belong to a sub-peak!

The name changes of at least four hills – Cnoc an Ime↑, Fitful Head↑, Noss Head↑ and Green Hill (Lowther Hills)↑ – are from Yeaman’s book only, not RHB; the name given in RHB is the ‘correct’ one.

Three things to note here. In many of these cases there has been a change in height as well, so a visit to the old top may not have been sufficient for bagging purposes. Secondly, in some cases the old location may be almost exactly the same height as the new one, making the hill a multiple summit. Thirdly, more substantial examples of this procedure can be found at appendix >, ‘Replaced HuMPs’, on page 194.

The relocations of at least three Marilynns – **Cnoc an Ime↑**, **Green Hill (Lowther Hills)↑** and **Black Mountain↑** – are from Yeaman's or Clements' lists only, not RHB; the location given in RHB is the 'correct' one.

In the cases of **Cnoc an Ime↑**, **Sleddale Forest↑**, **Cracoe Fell↑** and **Chancetonbury Ring↑** there has been a name change as well, due to the summit now occupying a different place on the hill. (This could be thought of as a replacement.)

The relocations of **Cracoe Fell↑**, **Botley Hill↑**, **Chanctonbury Ring↑** and **Maesglase↑** were prompted by surveys. This may be true of others as well.

g Regional Changes

g

The RHB regions have generally stayed put over the years, but a few hills have changed from 1B to the newly created 26B, on account of the alteration of the boundary between the Highlands and Lowlands to the Highland Boundary Fault (for the Donalds listing).

The Marilynns are **Uamh Bheag↑**, **Ben Clach↑** and **Torlum↑** – these are all in topo section **N5**. (The change also affects the HuMPs of **Beinn nan Eun (Glen Artney)↑** and **Meall a' Choire Odhair↑**. The latter is also given in the following table, because its region was given wrongly in some sources.)

The only other *Marilyns* to have moved region are **Sgùrr Mhurlagain↑ (E6)**, which has migrated from 10C to 10B, **Liuthaid↑ (X3)**, which has been shifted from 24A to 24B, and **Black Mountain↑ (V)** which has been decreed to be in Wales rather than England, and has thus gone from 38B to 32A.

In addition, RHB regions 5, 7 and 8 have been split into A and B sections for the Corbett Tops list, and these have been taken up in this book – see the main list for details of which hills were split into where, as there are too many to give here!

There were no errors of this kind in RHB, but in previous lists (and versions of the Database of British Hills) that included the RHB regions, a number of *HuMPs* (not *Marilyns*) were placed in the wrong region, and it seems a good idea to document these changes here.

This table also includes cases where hills have shifted *topo* regions since the first release of the *HuMPs* in their current (*topo-region*) format. In all cases these shifts are due to the parents being wrongly assigned (see the following appendix).

This is a table of those hills which are also known by another name, in addition to those names given as primary names in the sources. Hills where a different name is given by one of those lists are of course covered in appendix *n*, ‘Name Changes’, on page 197; hence, if a hill does not appear here, you should check there. Despite the fact that, quite often, a hill is alternatively known by the name given to it in the source (often an older name), it just seemed silly to repeat the entire other table within this one!

In some cases, such as [Sugar Loaf](#)↑, the alternative name is in a different language. Variant spellings (e.g. the English-spelling names for the Gaelic-named hills in the Outer Hebrides) have not been included unless the pronunciation is substantially different.

The top dozen reach four different areas of the Scottish Highlands. The only non-Marilyns to make the list are Sgùrr an Lochain Uaine↑, Cairn Gorm↑ and Aonach Mòr↑.

Of course, this is exactly the same as ‘Most Prominent Marilyns’, or the most prominent hills in any list ranked entirely by relative height. However, since this list doesn’t actually appear in any published literature on the subject I thought I would give part of it here. A fuller version can be found on Wikipedia [70].

It doesn’t take much of a comparison with the preceding list to appreciate the greater geographical distribution of relative hills. Unsurprisingly, no two are in the same topo region. They are all of Munro height, although the most prominent Corbett, Goatfell↑, isn’t far behind with a height and drop of 874 m. Sgùrr na Coinnich↑ on Skye is the most prominent Graham and Beinn Mhòr (Lewis)↑ the most prominent sub-2000 ft peak. (As you might expect, the islands have an advantage when it comes to this sort of thing.)

The run of Xs, Ys and Zs in the second column indicates that all these are on islands apart from the British mainland. In fact, these are all the highest points on their islands with the exceptions of **Bembridge Down↑** and **Fora Ness↑** (which despite its drop figure is connected to the rest of its island by a thin neck of land, and thus wins the award for lowest col height).

The lowest HuMP on the mainland is **Worlebury Hill↑ (R5)**, a seaside outlier of the Mendip Hills, followed by its neighbour **Failand Hill↑**. The Scottish and Welsh records are set by **Fireach Àrd↑ (D2)** and **Mynydd Cilan↑ (S1)**.

Doubles

As stated in the key to the appendices (table 6 on page 45) there are three variations on a theme coming up – they all refer to situations where two points are the same height and it makes a difference which is higher, but the different categories refer to different amounts of drop between the points.

2 Paired Peaks

These are neighbouring HuMPs of the same height. An additional requirement is that one be listed as the parent of the other – or rather, the one estimated as higher, as in most of these cases it is a matter of opinion which peak is higher. If they are connected in this way then it follows that their drops will be affected by which one is actually higher. Table 22 lists these paired peaks.

Notice that some twinned Marilyns are paired HuMPs.

It is also worth mentioning [Gairbeinn↑](#) and [Corrieyairack Hill↑](#) (H2). Both the 1:25 000 and 1:50 000 maps indicate that these are paired peaks, giving them both as 896 m. However the height for [Corrieyairack Hill↑](#) looks extremely unlikely and this hill is now accepted as being four metres lower than [Gairbeinn↑](#).

The list has been checked, and no further pairs are believed to exist.

If there are two (or, in one case, three) hills close together (with less than 100 m drop between them) that are marked as having the same height, it is impossible to tell which is higher, and hence which of them has the right to

be called a HuMP. Table 23 gives those cases where the drop between the two hills is greater than 30 m and therefore the two are counted as separate tops (in my book at least); in such cases I would recommend climbing both.

Many pairs of hills exist whose heights differ only by a metre or two; for example, [The Old Man of Coniston](#)↑ and [Swirl How](#)↑; [Easington Fell](#)↑ and [Waddington Fell](#); [Milk Hill](#)↑ and [Tan Hill](#). In these cases there is a reasonable chance that the two are actually twin peaks, or that the one identified as the lower of the pair is higher – in fact, Harvey's maps actually give [Swirl How](#)↑ as being one metre higher than [the Old Man](#)↑! Sadly there are too many of these pairs to research and list here at the moment.

Sometimes a hill may have more than one point at the same height. If the drop between the two points is less than 30 m then they are counted as separate points on the same hill and thus, I would propose, visiting only one of them is necessary (after all, you're on the darned hill itself, and your head at least is higher than the highest point!)

In each case, the grid reference as given in the list is given first, followed by the grid reference(s) for the other possible summit location.

Meall Deise↑ is questionable, with decidedly confusing mapping between the 1:25 000 and 1:50 000 maps.

Hensbarrow Beacon↑ (W1) is in the odd situation of having several man-made summits nearby that considerably overtop the natural summit. Personally I am happy to stick with Dawson's policy of keeping the natural summit as the top, but keen baggers or those who want a view may want to summit the spoil heaps just to make sure (actually, I'm not even sure whether that's feasible).

The size of the above table has been considerably reduced in recent years by the efforts of John Barnard, Graham Jackson and others, who have surveyed hundreds of hills to find out which of two competing points is higher. The hills listed in table 25 may appear to have two points of equal height

when the map is consulted, but in fact a survey has established that the grid reference given is the highest point.

These 101 HuMPs make for a worthwhile objective in themselves. Sadly they contain many of the most difficult HuMPs, but there's no harm in trying.

According to latitude and longitude, the HuMPs which are at the greatest extremes of the compass are as follows:

Westernmost [Cnoc Glas↑](#), 376 m, on Soay (St Kilda), ([X1](#)).

Easternmost [Cheriton Hill↑](#), 188 m, Kent ([R8](#)).

Northernmost [Hermaness Hill↑](#), 200 m, on Unst, Shetlands ([Z1](#)).

Southernmost [Tregonning Hill↑](#), 194 m, Cornwall ([W1](#)).

The furthest west and north HuMPs on the British mainland are different:

Westernmost [Beinn Bhuidhe \(Point of Ardnamurchan\)↑](#), 161 m ([G2](#)).

Northernmost [Dunnet Head↑](#), 127 m, near John o' Groats ([A3](#)).

However, if we sort by the *x*-coordinates given by the British grid reference system, then the westernmost point turns out to be [Watch Croft↑](#), 252 m, in Cornwall ([W1](#)). This anomaly arises because the grid used by the OS is not parallel to the lines of longitude.

C County Top HuMPs

C

Local government in the UK is complex and not really an appropriate topic to dive into here. Briefly speaking, Scotland is divided into 32 council areas and Wales into 22 principal areas. England is divided into a mix of 27 two-tier counties and 89 independent unitary authorities (which includes some former counties like Herefordshire and Wiltshire).

After much investigation Peel Fell↑ (P10) has been found to be definitely in England. The status of Black Mountain↑ (V) is less clear. Although it is now considered to be in Wales by all list authors, and in any case the chances of a random point being on a random line are mathematically nil, it might be on the border.

W Watershed HuMPs

While we're on the subject of boundaries, it's worth mentioning those HuMPs which lie on the main 'natural boundary' of our island – the main watershed between John o' Groats and Land's End. These hills are not listed again here, as there are 165 of them, but they are marked with a *w* in the main listing.

There are some hills, such as [Beinn a' Chreachain↑](#), [Cauldcleuch Head↑](#) or [Boulsworth Hill↑](#), which don't have their summit actually on the watershed, even though it does pass almost over the top. In some other cases the exact course of the watershed is unclear.

The main attraction of these hills is of course that you can stand on their summit and have the water under one foot draining into the Irish Sea, and the water under the other into the North Sea: astride the backbone of Britain! From many of these hills, such as [Sgùrr Mòr \(Fannaichs\)↑](#) and [Cross Fell↑](#), you may well be able to see both seas, on a clear day.

To walk the watershed of Britain would be an almighty challenge in itself, probably taking at least six months. The Scottish section is undoubtedly the more interesting, and has, incredibly, been done (see the text of Dave Hewitt's book, available on the TACit website [65]). The southern section is difficult in a different way – uncounted miles of bog-trotting in the Pennines and a huge section of fields and farmlands in the Midlands. Best of luck to anyone who tries to follow it faithfully...

Practicalities

One interesting feature of Yeaman's book is his calculation of the energy it takes to reach a particular summit in megajoules, which obviously corresponds to the difficulty of the hill – in some sense, since it doesn't take into account rock conditions like those found on the Skye Cuillin, impassable rivers or vast bogs. However, by his reckoning [Caiteseal↑ \(X4\)](#) comes out so far ahead of the others that its position as the hill requiring the toughest walk can hardly be disputed. The shortest overland route to it is about nine and a half miles, involves crossing two transverse hills and according to Yeaman takes about seven hours – and once you're there, there are several other HuMPs in the region that you'll probably want to climb!

Oddly, [Caiteseal↑](#) is only about two miles from the nearest road even if this route does involve crossing a sea-loch and going up a very steep bank on the far side. By contrast, [Càrn an Fhidhleir↑ \(J2\)](#) and its neighbours are about nine miles from a road in any direction, even if the approaches to them can be shortened by taking bicycles up the Geldie Burn.

The HuMP most distant from any other is clearly [Tobha Rònaigh↑](#) on the remote island of Rona, far out in the Atlantic Ocean to the north-west of Cape Wrath. It is 45 miles from its nearest neighbour, [Dùnan Mòr↑](#) at Cape Wrath, and can only be reached by a long boat voyage over very rough seas. It also wins the award for the HuMP furthest from the nearest road, narrowly beating [Cnoc Glas↑](#) on Soay (St Kilda) – not that such awards mean much when virtually the whole journey has to be undertaken by boat.

This brings us to the St Kilda HuMPs, which present their own set of problems. Getting there (by no means easy, given the wild seas and access restrictions) is only half the story; with the exception of Hirta, the main is-

land, they present a near-impregnable wall of sea-cliffs and rock towers. On some of the islands, even landing is wellnigh impossible. The two sea stacks ([Stac an Armin↑](#) and [Stac Lee↑](#)) are serious rock climbs and covered with seabirds, whose slippery deposits may be as big a hazard as the rocks, and who when in residence may not be disturbed as the archipelago is a nature reserve. The stacks have been climbed, but rarely, and it is unsurprising that for several individuals the St Kilda Marilyns are the only gaps in an otherwise complete Marilyn tally. Three more tops – [Bioda Mòr↑](#), [Cnoc Glas↑](#) and [Mullach an Eilein↑](#) – are difficult but doable, as a recent trip by Marilyn-baggers demonstrated.

Thankfully, the HuMPs present no extra difficulties as far as St Kilda is concerned, with their only two additions to the archipelago being on the main island of Hirta. However, they introduce their fair share of sea stacks in other locations. The stacks of [Lianamuil↑](#) and [Arnamuil↑](#) off Mingulay

are an unknown quantity, while the **Great Stack**↑ off Handa can safely be assumed to be very difficult. However, the uncompletablety of the list is sealed by the inclusion of the **Old Man of Hoy**↑ (see cover), which is – if you'll pardon the hyperbole – completely impossible. A 137 m-high stack, it was not climbed until 1966 and since then only a handful of people have reached the top. (It therefore holds the award for the HuMP with the most recent first ascent.) It might also soon be an ex-HuMP, as apparently it used to be a lot wider than it is today, and is being eroded still. In one sense, we can only hope.

There are, of course, other HuMPs which require rock-climbing ability. The **Inaccessible Pinnacle of Sgùrr Dearg**↑ is by far the hardest summit to reach of the Cuillin, being a Moderate rock climb and a thorn in the side of many aspiring Munroists, and there are quite a few others dotted around; for details, please see table 30.

Several more hills involve scrambling to get to the summit, such as **Stac Pollaidh**↑, **A' Chir**↑ and some of the other Skye Cuillin; such summits may be beyond you, depending on your exposure threshold!

At completely the other end of the scale, the following HuMPs are less than 100 m distance and 10 m climb from a public (marked as yellow or above) road, or public transport, and not in forest or anything like that. This of course doesn't guarantee their easiness, as I don't have first-hand experience of them, and there may not be anywhere to park! Reports of impossibility will be gratefully received.

The two hills which have railways to their summits – [Snowdon↑](#) and [Snaefell↑](#) – also happen to be the highest and most prominent hills in this list. If these two are discarded, [Mynydd Bwlch-y-Groes↑](#) is the highest, and [St Boniface Down↑](#) the most prominent, hill that can be reached with such consummate ease. However, it seems there is no such thing as a typical hill in *this* list; [Mynydd Bwlch-y-Groes↑](#) is in an MOD range!

Many other hills, especially in Southern England, are within a couple of hundred metres, and little climb, of a road. Several other hills, such as [Sir William Hill↑ \(R1\)](#), have their status dependent on whether or not a white road on the map is accessible to the public; some hills with TV masts on their summits fall into this category.

[Mow Cop↑ \(R2\)](#) is a decidedly odd hill; it would qualify for this list, on account of its being very close to the nearest road – but unfortunately the top is a forbidden rock tor with no easy way up! Therefore, see appendix *h*, ‘Hardest HuMPs’, on page 233!

In the case of hills such as [Wideford Hill↑](#), it is worth noting that you have to actually be on Orkney Mainland in the first place.

Essays

Sub-HuMPs and Deleted HuMPs

Although Britain has some of the most accurate mapping data in the world, there are inevitably going to be errors of a couple of metres in some OS map heights. Add to that the error introduced by (in many cases) estimating a col height, or (in some cases) estimating a summit height, from the contours on the map, and what you have is a fair chance that several hills that are listed as having less than 100 m drop are actually true HuMPs.

The example of [Arnside Knott](#)↑, which leapt from *c.* 139 m drop to 150 m drop, shows that hills can jump around quite a bit more than we expect. However, we can be fairly sure that most unrecognised HuMPs will be covered by the first table that follows, which gives those hills believed to have between 95 and 99 m of drop. Hills with even lower drops have been excluded for reasons of space; anyway, this gives quite enough hills to be getting on with! (A full list of all hills with between 90 and 99 m of drop can be found by combining the information at [52] with the Database of British Hills ([53]).)

There is a problem in providing lists of sub-HuMPs and deleted HuMPs: both Yeaman and Clements included hills which they considered that, due to the uncertainty in the map data, might only have a small chance of qualifying, indicating this with an H in their notes. Inevitably, many of the hills in this category (which actually contains most of the British hills with 97–99 m drop) have been found to fall below the 100 m drop requirement, or their best current drop estimate is still below that level. This hardly makes them deleted HuMPs in a traditional sense. Also, considering the waste of space that would be incurred by repeating large sections of the list twice, I have opted to combine the list of subs and deletions.

There are therefore two tables following. The first includes all hills with over 95 m drop, whether included in the sources or not. The second lists hills with smaller drop that are listed in the sources as qualifying by height, whether certain or doubtful.

As explained above, there are a huge number of hills that look as though they are deleted HuMPs, although many of them were never considered very likely to qualify in the first place. Nevertheless, there are still quite a few hills that have been deleted since the source lists were published, due to mistakes by the authors.

In the first table (table 32), a † after the hill name indicates a bona fide deletion, i.e. a hill that was listed as definitely qualifying, but now doesn't. A § after the hill name indicates a hill listed as 'height qualification doubtful'. These hills may also have qualified by distance, but such matters need not concern us here. A ‡ after the name indicates that the hill was added (to either category) *since the original release*, either as part of an author-sanctioned release or by Rob Woodall in his database, so you won't find hills with that marker in the original lists.

It therefore follows that many hills with nothing after their names have never seen the light of day before, particularly in the upper echelons (97 m of drop or more) where, if discovered, they would probably have been included as 'height qualification doubtful'. Some of these have turned up following the completion of the list of British hills to 30 m, of which this is only a small part.

The second table (table 33) uses the same conventions as the first, except that it is only concerned with hills listed in the sources as qualifying by height. The † marking has therefore been dropped as redundant, as most hills in the second table fall into that category.

In both tables the parent is given, as a useful identifier of what the hill is attached to and where it stands. A ¶ after the hill name indicates that the parent is another sub-HuMP in the list.

Numbered notes in the lists indicate things like twin peaks and alternative names that would usually be given in the other appendices to the main list.

Finally, see also appendix >, 'Replaced HuMPs', on page 194, as this contains some more deleted HuMPs which are in the special position of having been directly replaced by a new one.

The proportion of these hills in Scotland shows the relatively higher rate of errors in Yeaman's Scottish coverage. However, many of these hills actually have more than 5 km separation from higher ground, such as in Caithness, so it is quite likely that Yeaman simply forgot to add the 'd' indicating that they qualified by distance as opposed to drop. Either that, or he just made a lot of mistakes!

Finally, I should like to say that **Stacaiseal**, **Dirrington Little Law**, **Birnein an Fhìdhleir**, **Loch Hill**, **Barskeoch Hill**, **Mounthuillie**, **Hill of Colvadale**, **Northballo Hill**, **Meall a' Bhealaich**, **Quarrystone Bank** and **Mynydd Dinas (Tonypandy)** have all been deleted since the first release of the HuMPs list in June 2007, so this is an ongoing process – your help is very welcome! (You can find a timeline of recent changes to the list at http://www.biber.fsnet.co.uk/hump_changes.html.)

HuMPs and Munros

A comparison of these two lists is made significantly more interesting by the fact that there are 273 HuMPs in Scotland over 3000 feet – close to the same number as the 284 Munros. It can be deduced that the list of HuMPs contains roughly those hills which would be Munros if the Munros had been selected purely on the basis of relative height.

The correspondence between the two lists has decidedly improved over the years as the SMC's revisions have brought the Munros more in line with the HuMPs, most notably in the 1997 revision when all three of the non-Munro Marilyns were promoted to Munro status along with five other prominent hills. There are 258 hills in both lists.

As Dawson has remarked in *The Murdos* [4], there seems to be something of a pattern here, with the mountains of Torridon and Glencoe losing out to Skye and the Lochnagar plateau. The rationale behind these decisions is at least transparent: mountains such as the **Bidean**↑, the **Buachaille**↑ and the Torridonian giants have traditionally been considered single mountains despite their many tops. On the other side, one could present a reasonable case for the argument that selecting a good list relies on distance and time taken to travel between summits as well as the drop between them. A quick look at the maps will show that the Munros of the Lochnagar plateau qualify by the former, and the Black Cuillin by the latter. Such factors are hard to quantify and lie outside the scope of this book. Although I would not advocate completely regularising the Munros (see the next section, ‘Relative Munros’), it would be good to see further developments in this area.

⁴⁰The case of Beinn a' Chroin needs mentioning, as this is not like the others in the list. It is merely generated by the fact that, although the west top is definitely higher and thus has the higher drop, the official list of Munros still gives the east top as the Munro. Hopefully this will be resolved in the next revision.

Relative Munros

To completely regularise the Munros and for there to remain the same number of them, a drop criterion of 91m would be required (OK, so this gives 283, but there are two tops with 90 m drop so the right number is impossible to achieve). (Given that the Munros use feet, it is very convenient that this is so close to a drop criterion of a round 300 ft.) It would include: the 258 HuMP-Munros; the 15 hills listed above in table 35; **Na Gruagaichean**, **Mullach nan Coirean**, **Aonach Beag (Corrour)** and **Sàileag** from the list of Munros with less than 100 m drop; and six other hills, listed here in table 36.

The Grey Corries, the Monadhliath, **Creag Meagaidh**↑, the South Glen-shiel Ridge would all lose a Munro, the Cairngorms two. Kintail would gain one but the **A' Chrallaig**↑ group lose two. The Crianlarich hills, Glen Cannich hills, West Mounth, **Gaor Bheinn**↑, the Ben Lawers group and **Ben Wyvis**↑ would gain one each. **Ben Cruachan**↑ gains two.

Now for the big movers: the Black Cuillin is reduced from eleven to seven. Glencoe would increase from seven (not long ago it was four!) to ten. **Beinn Eighe**↑ and **An Teallach**↑ would both increase from two to five. And most drastic of all, the Lochnagar plateau would be slashed from thirteen to five – possibly to the relief of those who don’t like the look of some of its remote and featureless tops!

HuMPs, Corbetts and Grahams

Every Corbett is also a HuMP, because Corbetts use a 500 ft/152 m relative height criterion. However, as we have seen, the relative-height analogue of the Munros actually has to go down to 91 m of drop to get the numbers right. Therefore the average Corbett is considerably more prominent than the average Munro (a fact which has already been commented on favourably by several Corbett climbers). However, if the Corbetts were to be a true ‘second division’ to the Munros, then they would have to go down to 91 m of drop, in order to get the same sort of character as the Munros (in terms of drop anyway). Alternatively, you could argue that the criterion should be 250 ft/76 m, scaling down by their height, in which case there would be even more!

Using a drop criterion of 91 m would give the list 325 summits, as opposed to the 220 Corbetts. The extra summits are too numerous to be listed here, but can easily be picked out from the Database of British Hills. They include all the HuMPs of Corbett height plus 25 others, such as [Blàbheinn↑’s Clach Glas](#).

A similar argument can be applied to the Grahams, which gives 410 hills (nearly twice the number of Grahams!) including, among other Graham Tops, [A’ Chir↑](#) on Arran.

Breakdown by Topo Region and Height

Here in table 37 you can see how the larger topo regions shape up in terms of number of hills, and hills of different categories of height and prominence.

Because of the balancing act done to construct the regions, the southern ones tend to have more HuMPs and Tumps, whereas the Scottish ones tend to have more hills of higher prominence. The greatest ratio of Tumps to P300s is found in region **R** with 392 whereas the smallest is found in region **I** with just 8; it should come as no surprise that the former contains East Anglia and the latter contains **Ben Nevis**↑, for this reflects the lie of the land!

As if the point needed stating again, this table also illustrates well the increased attention paid by the HuMPs to certain well-populated regions such as **R** and **W**.

The Names of Hills

Most Common Hill Names

For those interested in such things, here is a brief run-down of those hill names which appear four times or more in this list, in order of frequency of occurrence. Variant forms have been included under the same name, as this seemed the most logical thing to do, given that we are trying to get an idea of whether more hills are called Big Lump or Red Hill. Extensions don't count however (e.g. Càrn Mòr Dearg[†] does not count towards the Càrn Mòrs).

Only three of the 33 names in this list are English and only one is Welsh. Even accounting for the fact that there are more hills in Scotland, it is clear that Scottish hill names repeat a great deal. Explanations probably include the fact that some English hill names derive from other languages and a smaller number of inhabited places in Scotland to name hills after – most hill names in Southern England are named after nearby settlements, with this being a rare practise in Scotland.

Most of the translations given are fairly dull, so despite the difficulties in pronouncing the Gaelic names, we should probably be grateful to them. Moreover, before we laugh at them too much it is as well to remember that a lot of English names have fairly mundane translations as well. **Grisedale Pike**↑ would lose some of its majesty were it ‘Pig-valley Peak’, and **Pendle**

Hill↑ would sound faintly ridiculous as ‘Hill-hill Hill’.

Names for Hills

Next is a table of which generic words are used most frequently to name the hills. Most hill names have one of these words in them, often accompanied by adjectives referring to colour or something else. Although it may appear that there are an awful lot of Beinns and Mealls, the variety of names shown here is actually very impressive, even accounting for the fact that they come from several different languages.

Many books contain detailed information about the meanings and derivations of hill names and readers are advised to consult them for further information. A small selection of introductory works may be found in the Further Reading [38, 30, 31, 29, 37, 36, 35, 34, 32]; this is just a brief analysis of which words are used most frequently to name the HuMPs. Elements contained in the names have been included; thus Bengairn↑ and Scaraben↑ both count towards the Bens. Some words are clearly variant spellings (Sithean/Sidhean), mutated forms (Meall/Mheall) or cognates in different languages (Crag/Craig/Creag), but they have all been kept separate, as have plurals.

The notes aim to give the language the word comes from, a more precise definition where that exists, and any relations to other words in the list. The latter should help to show how the words group together into a relatively small number of families. For example, there may be more ‘Hill’s than ‘Beinn’s, but if all the Bens, Beinns, Bheinns, Bins, and -vens were added together, there would be 501 of them, making that word family the best-represented in Britain.

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⁴¹In case you were confused by the term mutation in the list above, it is something peculiar to the Celtic languages and involves changing the sound of a word's first letter. The rules about what happens are fairly predictable; for example, the related Gaelic and Welsh words Meall and Moel mutate to Mheall and Foel respectively, which, despite their different appearances, both begin with a V sound. This often happens after another word as opposed to before it: e.g. Beinn Ghlas and Glas Bheinn; Creag Dhubh and Dubhchreag. (In Gaelic mutation is marked by the latter H after the initial consonant.)

There is a Coum, a Combe, a Comb and a Coomb to add to the two -gwms in the above list, so these six hills named after hollows deserve a mention (oddly, none of them use the original Welsh spelling cwm).

Please also see the useful appendix to the 1997 Munro's Tables [12].

There might also be a section on pronunciation here in the future, as I've often thought that some info on how the hills' names are pronounced would be a useful addition to a book such as this. In the meantime, there are some links in the Further Reading which provide useful information – the Aker-beltz website [61] being the best resource for Gaelic, and the OS booklet [36] a good guide to Welsh.

The HuMPs Hall of Fame

Alan Dawson's yearly newsletter includes a table of the members of the 'Marilyn Hall of Fame' – the informal club open only to those who have climbed 600 Marilyns or more. It also serves as a useful list of the front-runners in the race to complete the Marilyns.

It seems a good idea to close the book with a list of those who have done an extraordinary number of HuMPs. It will of course be incomplete, as the list has hardly received masses of publicity, but most of the hills have been available in Yeaman's book for twenty years, and the HuMPs were first listed as such two years ago, and thus some information has come to light.

I have decided to set the bar for this little table at 2000 HuMPs. This may seem excessive, but the main reason for it is so that anyone who has nearly completed the Marilyns still has a little way to go before they can call themselves a 'champion HuMPer' (if you'll pardon the expression)! It actually has the curious side-effect that you can be in the HuMPHoF but not in the MarHoF – the club of those with more than 600 Marilyns – if you really try.

As mentioned many times elsewhere, the precursor to the current list of HuMPs, at least in Scotland. Also contains a great deal of extra information, particularly about hill names, and many appendices.


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Production notes

This lists a few aspects of the layout and design which are imperfect, but which I do not know how to correct at present. If any (La)TeXperts who know the solutions to these problems would care to tell me, `dfstone@bcs.org.uk`, I should much appreciate it.

- A few pages are too long, descending further down the page than intended. As far as I can tell, this is because of bugs in the `longtable` package. (I used the patched version from <http://www.cs.rutgers.edu/~ccshan/longtable/longtable.sty>, but though it has fewer bugs than the stock `longtable`, some bugs still remain.)
- The wedge symbol used for the appendix on new Marilyns does not appear in all PDF viewers in the PDF table of contents (usually in a side panel). As far as I understand it, that is a limitation of those viewers.
- Hyperlinks from hill names in the main tables are intended to link to the corresponding index entry. A few of them do not work. This seems to depend on the PDF viewer used.
- In the Further Reading, the running heads do not reflect the section within the Further Reading. This seems to relate to several packages interacting, making the obvious solution (using `\markright`) fail.
- The names of places in the section headings are indexed. But direct attempts to index them fail, for reasons I do not fully understand (they relate, I believe, to the fact that the headings are also used in the running heads and in the table of contents). Therefore, the section headings are repeated in white-on-white text just below the visible heading, in the margin, to act as targets for the index references. These are not

visible at first sight, nor when the book is printed, but can be found by searching in the PDF, and also by selecting text in the PDF.



A comprehensive list of all Britain's 2987 HuMPs: hills with a clear drop of 100 m all round, arranged in natural topographical groups.

Fully cross-referenced and indexed, with notes on twin summits, recent changes, regularising Munros, and sub-HuMPs.

The concept of Humps has been around for over 20 years, but they have previously attracted the interest of only a tiny number of walkers. Mark Jackson has done a superb job assembling and checking the raw data and in making it available in an accessible and user-friendly form (as well as inventing the term Humps). As a result, the Humps are now starting to catch on. I may even have to start doing them soon.
