1. Reference is made to your memorandum of 15 February 1954, your file number 105-11898, requesting information on P. E. RUIZ in Maracaibo, Venezuela, who was in communication with Pedro ALPIZU Carpos, and suggesting that P. E. RUIZ was identical with Jacinta IVEP Perez. Reference is also made to our CS-33489, dated 15 March 1954, and to our CS-34327, dated 24 March 1954, for information concerning Jacinto RIVEMA Perez.

- 2. No information has been obtained in Venezuela to identify P. I. RUIZ. A search of the files of this organization, of the United States consulate in Maracaibo, and of the Venezuelan Security Police in Maracaibo have failed to reveal any information concerning P. E. RUIZ.
- 3. The additional possibility exists that P. E. RUIZ may be identical with Clemente PEREDA, a Puerto Rican Nationalist teaching English at the University of Zulia, in Maracaibo. PEREDA was arrested in Maracaibo about 4 March 1954 but was released within a day or two. CS-32884, dated 9 March 1954, and CS-33489, dated 15 March 1954, contain additional information on PEREDA. It was reported in April 1953 that PEREDA and a group of about six students had been arrested on 19 April 1953 in Maracaibo and were charged with having spoken disrespectfully of the Venezuelan Government.
- 4. If P. E. RUIZ is identified you will be advised upon receipt of the information.

Rerep SA CHARLES B. FECK dated 4-2-54 which set out lead for San Juan Office to follow and report status of subject's appeals.

On 5-18-54 Attorney RAFATL YDRACH, Appeals Prosecutor, Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, with whom liaison has been maintained re subject's appeals, advised that all of subject's cases are still under appeal and that their status falls into two categories, as follows:

Cases appealed to Supreme Court of Puerto Rico, heard Tune 3, 1953 and pending disposition of the Court -

Illegal Use of Explosives (Art. 11, IPL 67) (6 year sentence)

Illegal Possession of Explosives (Art. 12, IPL 67) (2 and 1/2 year)

Possession of Unregistered Firearms (IFL 14) (6 yr. 9 mo.)

Cases in which Commonwealth Government is in process of filing brief for dismissal of appeals -

Attack to Commit Murder (Art. 218 of Penal Code of P.R.) (7-15 years)

Subversive Activities (IFL 53) (12 to 54 years)

It is noted that all of the above sentences were imposed to be served consecutively and that the subject, who was incarcerated 11-2-50 to 9-3-53, and again from 3-6-54 to present, has about 31 years of minimum sentences left to serve.

YDRACH advised that the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico expects to take action re all of subject's appeals in the month of June 1954. The Bureau will be kept promptly advised of progress in this matter and a report will be prepared for dissemination when results of the Supreme Court action are received.

Re criminal record dated March 26, 1954, furnished by the Identification Division of the FBI.

It is noted that the charge and disposition for arrest number 263226, Division of Criminal Records and Investigation, Puerto Rico Police Department, is not shown. It is pointed out that by disposition sheet submitted under date of October 10, 1951, the charge and disposition for this arrest number was shown.

It is suggested that the Identification Division add the data appearing on the disposition sheet for completion of subject's criminal record.

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DETAILS:

I: STATUS OF IMPRISONMENT AND AFFEAL

The Nationalist Tarty of Tuerto Rico, hereinafter referred to as the NITR, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order No. 10450.

Mr. JOSE C. ATONTO, Chief Special Trosecuting Attorney, Common-wealth Department of Justice, Fortaleza Street, San Juan, Tuerto Rico, on June 17, 1954, advised of the present status of TEDRO ALBIZU CAMTOS.

Mr. ATOMTE stated ALEIZU CAMIOS has been incarcerated in the Commonwealth Tenitentiary, Rio Fiedras, Lucrto Rico, since his arrest on March 6, 1954. According to Mr. ALOMIE, ALBIZU CAMIOS is incarcerated to serve the remainder of sentences imposed in 1951. Approximately a minimum of thirty-one years remains to be served. Mr. ALOMIE said ALBIZU CAMIOS had filed appeals, which motions the Commonwealth of Tuerto Rico desires to stop. On July 2, 1954, a hearing for both parties is scheduled to be held before the Supreme Court of Tuerto Rico.

II. STATUS OF HEALTH

Captain GERARDO DALGADO, Acting Varden, Commonwealth Tenitentiary, 410 liedras, Tuerto Rico, on June 15, 1954, advised SA JOHN TAGE of the physical condition of ALBIZU CANTOS as shown from the reports of the penitentiary physicians.

According to these reports, Captain DALGADO advised ALBIZU CAMTOS is presently in favorable physical condition. His legs have healed and are normal. ALBIZU CAMTOS can walk around without assistance, but remains resting or in bed a great part of the time.

Regarding the mental attitude of the subject, Captain DELGADO stated the reports show ALDIZU CAMIOS insists that the doctors take his temperature at different parts of his body. The doctors do not permit the subject to have wet towels in his possession, but do permit the subject to have a ice bag from which they say no harm can be caused to his body. ALBIZU CAMIOS, since he cannot have wet towels, has requested he be issued



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the stomic protective garments used by the United States Army, inasmuch as he continues to be attacked by nuclear rays.

ALBIZU CLMIO3 states the United States Government is experimenting with these nuclear rays on the pregnant women in Justo Rico, which is causing many births to be without a foot or an arm and some even born as "blue babies." According to DALGADO, ALBIZU CAMIOS says the United States will drop an atomic bomb on the island of Vieques.

The island of Vieques is situated off the east coast of Tuerto Rico.

Gaptain DELGADO pointed out that ALRIZU GANTOS occupies a room by himself at the prison hospital. There is a room adjacent to that of ALBIZU and opening into ALBIZU's room, in which a non-Mationalist prisoner is maintained who attends to ALBIZU, handles the food and cleans the room. These prisoners are changed periodically. Gaptain DELGADO advises that from March 6 ρ.ρ. until May 14, 1954, F. USTING OLDEGA GASTRO lived in the adjacent cell and attended ALBIZU. ORTEGA GASTRO entered the prison in March, 1952, on a three to seven year sentence for attempted murder. Trisoner BELAHCIO CELLIADEZ CRESTO, who was sentenced in December, 1953, to one to two years for burglary, is now attending ALBIZU.

In May, 1954, T-1, of known reliability, stated the Nationalist ACUSTING LIDOUNDO MODRISCEZ had explained he had received information from RAPAEL TREINIOUSE LOW 1108, in charge of the penitentiary hospital and whom tallion lid considers a very good source, that IEDRO ILTIZO CAMION is in an excellent state of health and that his appetite and spirits are entirely normal. According to the informant, MALDOMARO spined that the Nationalists could look forward to having a leader for many years to come (XIII)

In May, 1954, E-2, of known reliability, advised the Nationalist ELTIDIOXIIIMEZX ORALLS had told the Fationalist SEGUNDOXLORENZO THE IN THE LETTER PART OF May, 1954, that LETTO ALBIZU/CAMIOS appears to be in good physical condition

It is to be noted that ELTIDIO JIMANEZ HORALES had been arrested in the March 6 through 3, 1954 roundup of Nationalists by the Tuerto Rico Tolice Department and had been incarcerated at the Commonwealth Tenitentiary, Rio Tiedras, Tuerto Rico. JIMENEZ was released from this incarceration on bond in April, 1954.



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T-3, of unknown reliability but who is a friend of many Theoreerated Nationalists, in May, 1950, stated ALBIZU CAMIOS T-3, of unknown reliability is in no manner insene or showing signs of insenity, although he does display a more pronounced hatred of the United States than before.

The San Juan daily Spanish language newspapers, "El Mundo," and particularly "El Imparcial," have occasionally carried erticles commenting on the improvement in ALBIEU CANTOS! health since incarceration. These publications also have set forth items concerning the arrest of ALBIZU CAMIOS.

COMPLEMENTS WITH THE EMPIOPALIST PARTY OF TULRED RICO

incarcorated lationslists, had been accused by prison outhorities of planning an uprising in the penitentiary in order to remove IEDRO ALBIZU CALIDS to a new location away from his proximity to tuberculosis patients. It was believed the public attention crought to such an uprising would cause this change to be brought about.

In May, 1954, T-2 advised the Mationalist IMOCENCIO MONTALVO ONTALVO had been advised by TEDRO ALFIZU CANTOS, before MONTALVO's release from prison on bond, to continue the struggle for Tuerto Rican independence (2)(u)

On May 11, 1954, SAS JOHN LIGHT and GRORGE IR BULDING interviewed the incorcerated hationalist stated the present tectics of ALLIZU CARLOS and his close followers are to use recurring incidents of violence to attract World attention to Tuerto Rico and its problem of fighting for independence. continued, stating ALBIZU CATTOS sends out orders via trusted messengers to zone commanders scattered throughout Tuerto Rico, in New York City, Chicago, Cuba, South America and even Europe.

edvised he is able to contact ALBIZU CAMIOS by written coded messages. stated, however, that ALBIZU CAMIOS seldom enswers him in writing because TTIL does not want the messages intercepted. According to FALEIZU has ordered all incorcorated Nationalists to conduct themselves as model prisoners. CONFIDENTIAL

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In April, 1954, T-3 advised AIBIU COLTOS had said there were others to help and perform tasks for the MITR. This informant advised AIBIU CANTOS had stated President EISEMMONER is going to be removed and some people in the United States have been assigned to that job, but will not try unless they can succeed. According to this informant, AITIU CANTOS said, "Me can afford to be patient because we are going to win. The great United States will be surprised when we strike. The next time will be a real blow."

In March, 1954, T-3 odvised that MICIZU C.M. 03 had made the statement, "The MAI on orders from Mashington is persecuting me and the people of Lucrto Rico, but retribution is coming fast and lard." This informant stated MILIZU C.M. 103 had made the remark when he arrived in the Commonwealth Tenitentiary following his arrest on March 6, 1954.

3. Security Measures

According to 3-3 in April, 1934 so to persons who write to ALDIZU CLUDOS do so by addressing the latter to other persons in order to have their messages delivered without being looked into.

In May, 1954, this same informant advised ALBIZU CANTOS is attempting to secure a fellow prisoner for the purpose of being a courier and performing duties on behalf of the NITR, by performing a service of traveling to Masmi and Gustemala in the latter part of September, 1954, after the prisoner's release.

C. Support From Individuals

In March, 1954, T-3 advised MIBIZU COULDS had received a cable from the League of the Oppressed and Society for the Independence of Countries, which cable read, "No are with you; all the Argentine. Good luck."

This informant stated that ALDIZU CA 105 had also received greetings and correspondence which was in sympathy with the subject from Argentina, Boundor and the United States during the month of Warch following his incarceration.

(In April, 1954, T-3 advised) that approximately half of the



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incarcerated Mationalists are in support of ALLIZU C. MIOS and Tuerto wican independence but that the remainder want to leave the penitontiary and luerto Rico.

Communist Sympathy and Support from the 101

The Communist larty of Tuerto Rico, hereinafter referred to as the TCT, is a Communist larty in its own right and not a district organization of the Communist larty, US., although it adheres to the same Ferkist-Leminist ominaboles as the Communist larty, WSA.

The Communist Tarty, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order Ho. 10450.

(VIn) (In May, 1954, T-3 savised it was his impression that the Mationalists of the Commonwealth Ichitentiary appear to agree with the Communist cause and that help for the Mationalists can be obtained from the Communists. This informant believes ALBIZU CM TOS is now more Communistic then the other Mationalists This informant stated that ILLIZU CALLOS had said, "We and the Communists are fighting the common enemy, the United States."

T-4, of known reliability, in March, 1954, advised that RAMOM MIRIBAL, Interim Secretary General of the 16., had known of the stand taken by two supporters regarding .ADRO MEIZU C 11.0S which was: To defend him as a victim of political persecution, and to respect him for his valor and integrity in MANUEL NEGRON NOCUERA the struggle against imperiolism (g)(u)

IV. MICCILLIMICUS

In Loril, 1950, T-1 stated that CANCERON COURTS had said JULY WERNANDEZ WALLE, both of whom are actionalists, was a traitor, and HEGRON'S feelings stermed from HERVALDEZ VALLE'S remarks where HERVALDEZ VALLE said LEDIZU CANON was engaging in imposed and seed actions. in immoral relations, with the women who resided with him at TTTR headquarters 🏈 (u)

In June, 1954, 1-5, of unknown reliability, but a promiment individual, stated that he was sure an anterview with LESIZU C.MTO3 had been recorded and breadeast over station WKUM, Santurce, lucato Rico, after ABINU's release from prison in September, 1953.

No lead has been set out to verify this allegation and, in the event it is true, to obtain a copy of the recorded interview. Further, T-5 is not identified on the informant pages.





Rebulet dated 6-29-54 with reference to the Bureau's inquiry regarding a recorded interview with the subject.

This office initiated an investigation into this matter on June 1, 1954, and has continually followed the matter to this time.

The following information is being set forth to acquaint the Bureau with the data developed in this matter to date. subsequent report this data will be set forth in a form suitable for dissemination.

On June 1, 1954, Mr. RALPH PEREZ PERRY, Manager, Radio Station WKUM, Stop 15, Santurce, Puerto Rico, advised that PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS had made no speeches over that station nor over any other radio station during the period of his pardon, September 30, 1953, through March 6, 1954. PEREZ stated that the station has no record of any sort of NPPR broadcast during the above period, though he recalled that shortly after the release of ALBIZU, CAMPOS in 1953 on conditional pardon, Station WKUM had carried a brief announcement of an interview which had been conducted with ALBIZU CAMPOS at NPPR Headquarters by ANTONIO DIAZ VELAZQUE an announcer at WKUM.

PEREZ stated that the station had retained no copy of the announcement but to the best of his recollection it consisted merely of the type of statement that ALBIZU CAMPOS had been making to the press after his release from jail in September, 1953, that is complaining about his alleged bad treatment in La Princesa Jail.

PEREZ stated that he had attached no significance to the broadcast. He pointed out that the interview of the subject by DIAZ had been played over the radio from a tape. He believed the tape had been furnished by and returned to some member of the KEPR, Desiratory he did not know to whom.



The San Juan Office has made no attempts to contact DIAZ VELAZQUEZ because of the alleged labor dispute at the above radio station and instead has made local inquiry to identify DIAZ VELAZQUEZ more fully.

A check with ONI and G-2, San Juan, disclosed no allegations of Nationalist, Communist or anti-American sentiments of ANTONIO DIAZ VELAZQUEZ. San Juan informants contacted regarding this individual reported negatively

contacted on June 8, 1954, advised he knew DIAZ when the latter was employed in the position of radio announcer for a station in Arecibo, Puerto Rico, from approximately 1947 to 1950. This informant advised he never knew DIAZ to be connected with the NPPR but does believe that DIAZ is in favor of independence for Puerto Rico,

contacted on June 18, 1954, stated he did not know definitely whether DIAZ is or was an NPPR member but advised that he, the informant, had heard NPPR members mention DIAZ VELAZQUEZ frequently. This informant added that JUAN HERNANDEZ VALLE, former NPPR lawyer, had related to the informant that DIAZ VELAZQUEZ visited PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS on frequent occasions.

The following information is furnished for the information of the Bureau and San Juan:

On 3/24/54 PEDRO MARTINEZ LOPEZ furnished a sworn statement to AUSA ELIOT H. LUMBARD, SDNY. On 4/21/54 AUSA ARNOLD BAUMAN furnished a copy of this statement to ASAC EDWARD J. MC CABE. In this statement MARTINEZ advised that he terminated his NPPR membership in 1950 or 1951, when he was released from jail. MARTINEZ stated that he had heard ALBIZU CAMPOS make two speeches in which ALBIZU stated that independence for Puerto Rico could not be secured by peaceful means, that is by means of elections. MARTINEZ stated he could not recall the date that ALBIZU made this statement.

On 5/18/54 an anonymous source advised that JULIO HECTOR VELASQUEZ on 3/9/54 appeared before a Federal Grand Jury, SDNY, relative to his activities within the NPPR, VELASQUEZ advised the Federal Grand Jury that he was convicted in 1936 of the crime of Conspiracy to Overthrow the Government of the US by-Force, Conspiracy to Recruit Soldiers for Armed Hostility Against the US, and Conspiracy to Incite Rebellion.

VELASQUEZ stated that PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS is an idealist and that ALBIZU believes that force or violence might be necessarin order to achieve the ends of the NPPR.

The information furnished by this anonymous source should not be used in report form or disseminated outside the Bureau.

On 4/21/54 AUSA ARNOLD BAUMAN, SDNY, furnished ASAC McCABE a sworn statement made by MANUEL ANTONIO DOVAL ACOSTA before AUSA THOMAS A. BOLAN, SDNY, on 3/30/54. In this statement DOVAL advised that he had heard PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS once say that the Puerto Ricans should not obey laws of the US because the US had no authority to rule Puerto Rico. No specific date of this statement was indicated.

Information received from indicates very clearly are the two principal instigators of the violence of March 1, 1954. This office wishes the Bureau to know that there is a possibility that the cases against these, and especially against fail in the Insular Courts. If they do not rail entirely, in view of the partial and relatively innocuous information which the Insular Government has, short sentences may be imposed upon these individuals which would leave them in a position to resume their activity at some date in the not very distant future. the basis of the record, the activity which will be resumed will be of quite violent character. From the over-all point of view concerning the NPFR, it is apparent that no federal prosecution of the Party can be considered as successful unless it includes the conviction of and particularly The reasoning on this point is as follows:

It is assumed the department expects that the successful prosecution of the forthcoming seditious conspiracy trial in New York will have a deterrent effect on plans the Mationalists have for future violence. It is the considered opinion of the writer that if the information furnished Agents any part of it, is concerning produced in the form of testimony in the trial of the defendants named in the indictment and included as defendants, the trial will have no deterrent effect but on the contrary, the omission of from the indictment and the trick will be construct by the Nationalists as proof that the federal government conducted the trial only to save face. It will confirm them in their belief that the federal government is wear, it will convince them that the federal government is perfectly content to have the Commonwealth government protect and may very well have the effect of encouraging more violence.

The Bureau is also asked to consider that the probable reasoning of the Nationalists, in the absence of testimony about will be that the federal government has made only a superficial investigation of the violence of March 1, 1954, and that they, the Nationalists, are perfectly safe in continuing plans for more violence. They will conclude in the absence of such testimony that the mountain has labored and brought forth a mouse. They will recall that there was no federal prosecution of the NPPR as such after the October 30 and November 1, 1950 incidents. They will regard instant prosecution as a token prosecution and will feel that the federal government is either indifferent or weak or both. The Bureau will not fail to notice, in this connection, that all the talk being reported about violence at this time concerns violence in the United States, not in Puerto Rico.

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FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

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DETAILS:

I. STATUS OF IMPRISONMENT AND APPEAL

MR. JOSE C. APONTE, Chief Special Prosecuting Attorney, Commonwealth Department of Justice, Calle Allen, San Juan, Fuerto Rico, on October 13, 1954, advised of the present status of FEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS! appeals.

MR. APONTE stated that ALBIZU CAMPOS is incarcerated in the Commonwealth Penitentiary, Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico. He said ALBIZU CAMPOS! appeals are still under consideration by the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico, and as yet this court has not acted or handed down a decision on these appeals. MR. APONTE could offer no date when such decision or action by the Supreme Court upon ALBIZU's appeals would be given.

II. HEALTH STATUS OF PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS

A. Official Status

On July 14, 1954, RAFAEL TROYANO DE LOS RIOS, Medical Director, Commonwealth Penitentiary, Rio Piedras, stated that PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS was in good physical condition, but that he had not the slightest doubt ALBIZU was seriously ill mentally. DR. TROYANO stated that ALBIZU's lesions on his legs had been completely cured; that he eats regularly and sleeps a great part of the day, as well as all night, without the use of sedatives. According to DR. TROYANO, his general body functions are carefully checked and are normal. With regard to his mental state, DR. TROYANO stated ALBIZU continues believing he is being subjected to atomic rays. He is permitted to keep an ice pack on his head but he is not allowed to immerse his legs in water, although he has often asked to do so. Although the sores on his legs have been healed, ALBIZU frequently claims they are returning as a result of the nuclear rays. DR. TROYANO opined that ALBIZU hopes for the return of his lesions in order to substantiate his beliefs concerning the rays.

DR. TROYANO asserted that ALBIZU keeps a continuous smile on his face, which TROYANO believed was a mark which

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covers ALBIZU's hatred and resentment. DR. TROYANO classifies ALBIZU as a paranoid, but added that ALBIZU has a remarkable memory and actually recalls persons, dates and occurrences of many years ago. The doctor also added that in the first part of July, ALBIZU did not permit himself to be physically examined, claiming that the examination resulted in the adjustment of the rays.

Captain GERARDO DELGADO, Acting Warden, Commonwealth Penitentiary, Rio Piedras, on October 15, 1954, advised that the health of ALBIZU CAMPOS remained good and at the present time ALBIZU is not using any treatment to ward off his allegations of atomic ray attack upon his body, except an ice bag.

Caotain DELGADO stated that there is a penal guard and an inmate, who watch over ALBIZU and his needs. According to Captain DELGADO, this inmate brings ALBIZU his food and cleans his cell. DELGADO stated that no visitors are allowed to see ALBIZU CAMPOS at any time, and that ALBIZU remained incarcerated in a room by himself at the prison hospital. DELGADO commented that although ALBIZU's health remained good, his legs were quite weak, inasmuch as he spends a great part of his time resting in bed.

B. Propaganda Regarding ALBIZU's Health

T-1, of known reliability, in June, 1954, stated that CARMEN MARIA PEREZ GONZALEZ had asserted that the health of ALBIZU CAMPOS was poor and that his left arm was paralyzed. PEREZ told the informent that ALBIZU CAMPOS was kept in a room where tubercular prisoners were formerly held.

(T-2, of known reliability, in June, 1954 stated CARMEN M. RIA PEREZ GONZ/LEZ was telling that PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS appeared to be having trouble with his legs, inasmuch as the swelling of these extremeties had reappeared,

T-3, of known reliability informed that CARMEN MARIA PEREZ GONZALEZ was telling that ALBIZU CAMPOS was once again in poor physical condition. According to this informant, PEREZ asserted she had heard that ALBIZU is left alone and without care in the prison hospital.



The Puerto Rico Police Department, Bureau of Internal Security, furnished information on June 23, 1954, by Superintendent Captain BENIGNO SOTO, which disclosed that an automobile on June 23, 1954, was distributing leaflets throughout metropolitan San Juan. These leaflets announced the very critical state of PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS! health and requested the people to organize a committee to free him from prison. These leaflets were distributed, according to the Police Department, by VICENTE MORCIGLIO, who was identified by the department as a Nationalist.

"El Imparcial" and "El Mundo", San Juan Spanish language daily newspapers of June 26, 1954, set forth articles regarding the health of ALBIZU as being satisfactory and commenting briefly regarding his medical conditions.

(T-1, in June, 1954) stated that the Radio Station WIAC on June 25, 1954, had given a news broadcast which told of the death of ALBIZU CAMPOS,

III. CONNECTIONS WITH THE NPPR

A. Information Indicating Subject's Party Position

T-4, of unknown reliability but familiar with activities of the NPPR, stated in July, 1954, that in New York City in 1949 JULIO PINTO GANDIA, NPPR leader in that city, had told GONZ/LO LEBRON SOTOM/YOR to bring his petition signed by 108 Puerto Ricans, which LEBRON had recruited for joining the NPPR, to PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS in Puerto Rico, in an effort to gain admittance for that group to the NPPR.

This informant stated that in April, 1949, GONZALO LEBRON went to Fuerto Rico and presented the above-mentioned petition to ALBIZU CAMPOS, along with a recommendation from PINTO GANDIA. According to this informant, ALBIZU CAMPOS accepted LEBRON's group into the NPPR.

In July, 1954, T-4 stated that about September 16, 1949, GONZALO LEBRON was sent to Lares, Puerto Rico, by PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS to help prepare the Grito De Lares celebration. According to this informant, ALBIZU CAMPOS spoke at a theatre in Lares on September 23, 1949, in connection with the above NPPR celebration.

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(According to T-4) ALBIZU CAMPOS ordered the reorganization of the Lares, Puerto Rico, NPPR board in
late 1949.

T-1, in October, 1954, advised of an assertion made by CARMEN MARIA PEREZ GONZALEZ and DORIS TORRESOLA, wherein they stated that they are mad at the "Yenkees" but do not know what they are going to do because they cannot see ALBIZU CAMPOS.

B. Connections with Violence

In July, 1954, T-4 stated that ISABEL ROSADO, while in New York City in January, 1954, was displaying a piece of paper with the written name of PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS appearing on it. This informant stated ROSADO displayed the paper and signature to GONZALO LEBRON SOTOMAYOR and asked him if he knew her. (T-4 assumed that ROSADO used this means to show her official status in the NPPR.

ISABEL ROSADO, according to T-41 was telling that the NPPR wanted action in the United States immediately and although she did not specifically say violent action, such was implied. T-4 stated that ROSADO was telling of the very serious physical condition of ALBIZU CAMPOS and indicated to those whom she talked with that ALBIZU might die at any time.

In July, 1954, this informant said that LOLITA LEBRON went to Chicago, Illinois, in February, 1954. At a meeting of the Chicago NPPR Board a few days after LOLITA LEBRON's visit from New York, GONAALO LEBRON SOTOMAYOR addressed the Chicago Board stating that PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS was about to die and said that should he die, violent action would be taken.

(T-5, of unknown reliability but who is familiar with NPPR activities, stated that LOLITA LEBRON arrived in Chicago during the middle of February, 1954, and told members of the NPPR that ALBIZU CAMPOS had solicited her for immediate action and she had gone to Chicago to obtain two men who would accompany those she already had in New York for the purpose of attacking one of the targets that the maestro (PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS) had designated.

- 5 - CONFIDENTIAL

The Puerto Rico Police Department, on July 9, 1954, advised that RAMON LUIS, RODRIGUEZ, OCASIO, described as a Nationalist terrorist by this department, was stating he had been chosen by ALBIZU CAMPOS as shock leader of the aggressive Nationalists, and that a short time ago XID1ZU CAMPOS had sent word to him through JUAN JOSEVMUNOZ MATOS to ask why nothing had happened. RODRIGUEZ OCASIO sent word to ALBIZU CAMPOS via MUNOZ MATOS, wherein ALBIZU was advised that RODRIGUEZ OCASIO had no opportunity for action as he was closely watched by the Police Department.

In July, 1954, T-4 stated that inasmuch as PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS is the leader of the NPPR, he believes that ALBIZU must have ordered that an attack be carried out against the Congress of the United States on March 1, 1954, or at least ordered violence to take place on the Continent.

In July, 1954, T-4) stated that ISABEL ROSADO had said in October, 1953, that ALBIZU CAMPOS had received the impression that people were being sent by the NPPR in New York to Fuerto Rico to carry out the "original plan". According to this informant, ROSADO asserted that ALBIZU wanted this stopped as he wanted no action in Puerto Rico.

MISCELLINEOUS IV.

T-6, of known reliability, in July, 1954, stated ALBIZU CAMPOS had sent his personal regards via his lawyer, FRANCISCO HERNANDEZ VARGAS, to the NPPR members in Arecibo, Puerto Rico.

T-1, in October, 1954, stated ho had learned of money in the amount of #20.00 being sent to ALBIZU CAMPOS by CARMEN MARIA PEREZ GONZALEZ

Captain GERARDO DELGADO advised that during the period June, 1954, through August 23, 1954, CARMEN MARIA PEREZ GONZALEZ had sent money orders to ALBIZU CAMPOS with which ALBIZU bought necessities not generally provided in the prison, such as toilet items and foods sold in the canteen. According to DELG.DO, this money amounted to \$55.00.



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Captain DELGADO. also noted that a JUAN RICARDO ESTEBAN RIVERA, a godson of ALBIZU, had in August, 1954, sent a money order in the amount of \$10.00 to ALBIZU. In addition, DELGADO stated that this same person in September, 1954, furnished an additional \$10.00 money order for ALBIZU CAMPOS! use.

In August, 1954, T-4 advised of an assertion of JULIO PINTO GANDIA before a rally of the American Labor Party in 1949 in New York City that ALBIZU CAMPOS had said the Now York Junta of the NPTR would work with this labor party and VITO MARCANTONIO.

CHUI T-7, of known reliability, advised that from the time of its inception in 1936 there existed within the American Labor Party a struggle for power among three groups. These were the Communist Party, the Socialist Party and the Social Democrats. By the early 1940s, the Communist Party emerged as the controlling force within the American Labor Party in the major industrial areas in New York State. Generally these were the areas around Albany, Buffalo, Jamostown, Rochester, Schenectady, Syracuse, through the Hudson River Valley, Columbia, Dutchess, Nassau and Westchester Counties, and in New York City, with the exception of Brooklyn. In 1942, tho Communist Party was able to capture the American Labor Party in Brooklyn. (T-7) know this situation to continue up until at least 1949. The American Labor Party never developed into an organization of any real consequence non-industrial areas of New York State.

T-8, of known reliability, in July, 1954 advised that the Communist Party today as in the past, through its members in key positions in the American Labor Party, constitutes the force that controls it.

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ADMINISTRATIVE PAGE

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DMINISTRATIVE DATA

It is to be noted that the of unknown reliability, a con-man and a person with a long criminal record, has admitted his fabrication of information previously furnished by him while a prisoner in the Commonwealth Penitentiary, Rio Picdras, Puerto Rico. This informant has furnished considerable and sensational information, regarding the activities of individual NPTR members and of the Party. Because of the admission of fabrication and the fact that his information is of the type which is not easily corroborated, and some of which has been found to be falso, information from this source is therefore not included in this report.





The Communist Party, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

GRITO DE LARES (Cry of Lares)

The NPPR annually celebrates September 23d, as Grito De Lares, in commemoration of that date in 1868 when a group of Puerto Ricans established momentary control over the Spanish Regime at Lares, Puerto Rico.

CARMEN MARIA PEREZ GONZALEZ Was arrested by the Puerto Rico Tolice Department on March 6, 1954, and charged with violation of the Commonwealth Subversive Activities Law. PEREZ is presently free on bond awaiting trial.

JULIO PINTO GANDIA

Was convicted on October 12, 1954, of seditious conspiracy in the Southern District of New York and is presently awaiting sentence,

GONZALO LEBRON SOTOMAYOR

CONFIDER

Was convicted on October 12, 1954, of seditious conspiracy in the Southern District of New York and is presently awaiting sentence.

ISABEL ROSADO MORALES

Was arrested by the Puerto Rico Police Department on March 6, 1954, and charged with violation of the Commonwealth Subversive Activities Law. PEREZ is presently free on bond awaiting trial.



LOLITA LEBRON

Was convicted for her attack on March 1, 1954, upon the United States House of Representatives for seditious conspiracy in the Southern District of New York on October 12, 1954.

DORIS TORRESOLA ROURA

Was arrested by the Puerto Rico Police Department on March 6, 1954, and charged with violation of the Commonwealth Subversive Activities PEREZ is presently free on bond awaiting trial.

JUAN JOSE MUNOZ MATOS

Was arrested by Commonwealth Authorities for participation in the October, 1950, uprising, and subsequently served a term in the Commonwealth Penitentiary, Rio Picdras, Pucrto Rico. He was released from incarceration on December 11, 1953.

'ARGA'S

VARGAS is a defense attorney for ALBIZU CAMPOS.

VITO MARCANTONIO

MARCANTONIO was a former United States legislator in New York City, who was friendly with PEDRO ALBIZU C.MPOS while the latter was in New York City from 1943 to 1947.



It is noted that the typewritten draft dated June 1939, referred to in III-B above, appeared in the Argentine magazine "Claridad," issue of June 1939, over the subject's name.

With the exception of the material referred to in the above paragraph, there have been reported to be virtually no published writings of the subject under his own name since his federal conviction in 1936. T-10 advised that on June 9, 1944, JULIO FINTO GANDIA had visited the subject at the Columbus Hospital, New York City, for the purpose of copying a manuscript, prepared by the subject, in PINTO G.NDIA's own handwriting. Informant stated that when this was done the original prepared by ALBIZU was destroyed. It was the informant's opinion that the subject was ghost writing the editorials for the publication "Fuerto kico," the then official Nationalist Farty organ in New York City. advised in May 1945 that he had received positive information to the effect that the subject prepared the material for most, if not all, of the Nerk major publications (although the resulting orticles were not attributed to the subject when they appeared in published form.)

It is also noted that upon interview by Sn FamDamICK E. nODERICK and Sh Hembert F. GamaTHOUSE on May 14, 1952, ISOLINA RONDON, admitted the subject avoided putting into writing things that could be used against him or against the Nata.

There appear below some examples of intra-party correspondence of the subject (u)

T-11 advised in 1944 that the subject wrote a letter to PEDAO PEREZ FAGAN, Interim President of the Nara, who was residing at Aguas Buenas, Puerto Rico, which read in part:

"As always, you must exact strict discipline, especially from those who are most active and who show an excess of zeal.....I want you to understand that patriotism is invariably manifest in ordinary procedure by competent persons under one supreme head, and that in order to remain in the movement that is working to get freedom for Fuerto Rico, it is imperative that these standards be rigidly enforced and obeyed."

In April 1944, T-4 stated that the subject had directed FEMEZ PAGAN to see to it that the municipal boards of the NFFM refrain from any declaration or resolution to anyone whether in Puerto

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The San Juan Office of this Bureau was advised on February 1, 1954, by Mr. Ignacio Rivera, Secretary of the Supreme Court of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico as follows:

According to Mr. Rivera the Supreme Court of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico has upheld the revocation of the pardon granted to Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico President Pedro Albizu Campos finding that the pardon was a conditional one and is, therefore, revocable.

In addition to the above decision, Mr. Rivera advised that the Supreme Court of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico also upheld the following sentences received in Commonwealth District Court by Albizu Campos resulting from charges filed against him subsequent to the October 30, 1950, revolt: 2 years, 6 months for a violation of Article 12, Insular Law 67, Possession of Explosives with Intent to Commit damage; 6 years for a violation of Article 11, Insular Law 67, Illegal Use of Explosives; 2 years, 3 months on three counts charging a violation of Insular Law 14, Possession of Unregistered Firearms; one count in connection with this charge was dismissed.

The Supreme Court of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico still has pending before it appeals by Albizu Campos of sentences received resulting from the following charges filed against him in Commonwealth District Court in connection with the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico uprising of October 30, 1950: a 12-year minimum and 54-year maximum sentence on 12 counts charging a violation of Commonwealth Public Law 53 of January 9, 1948, (SetHtipus Conspigacy); and a sentence of 7 to 15 years for a violation of Article 218 Penal Code of Puerto Rico, Attack to Commit Murder. 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According to Mr. Rivera, the decisions of the Commonwealth District Court of San Juan, Puerto Rico, which have been upheld by the Supreme Court carries sentences totaling 10 years and 9 months. The sentences involved in the appeals still pending before the Supreme Court of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico carrie a minimum sentence of 19 years and a maximum sentence of 69 years. In addition, Mr. Rivera advised that Albizu Campos will be required to serve in prison the period of time during which he was free on the conditional pardon.

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Served sentences violation Insular Firearms Laws in connection Nationalist Uprising 1950. Leader of NPFR underground, Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico. (T-4) Possesses pistol (T-9, of unknown reliability)

REYNCLDS, RUTH MARY

Admitted associate of subject. Served sentence violation Insular Subversive Activities Law following Uprising, 1950. Admitted co-founder of ALPRI and Secretary of AIRI, 1952. Attended NPPR meetings New York City 1952-53 (T-18)

RIVERA LOZADA, AMADEO

Involved in conspiracy against life of Governor of Puerto Rico, 1948. (Puerto Rico Police Department). Incarcerated 1950-51, violation Insular Firearms Laws. Swore vengeance against police and FBI. In possession of pistol, 1953. (Puerto Rico Police Department).

RIVERA SOTOMAYOR, JOSE

Treasurer-General, NPPR, 1945-47, and one of ALBIZU's closest friends. Served Insular sentence 1950-52, violation Insular Subversive Activities Law. Companion and nurse to ALBIZU-CAMPOS following subject's release from jail, 1957

B. INSTRUCTIONS BY SUBJECT RE ORGANIZATION NPPR LOCAL BOARD, RIO PIEDRAS, PUERTO RICO

Confidential Informant T-9, of unknown reliability, advised in October, 1953, that DIEGO CUINONES GONZALEZ, a Nationalist of Barrio Buen Consejo, Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, had revealed he was instructed by the subject to form a local NPPR Board in Barrio Buen Consejo and to instruct the youth of this district in the movement for the fatherland. Informant further advised that QUINONES GONZALEZ allegedly had begun to form the local board pursuant to subject's instructions and had chosen a secretary and a treasurer for the Board

V. MISCELLANEOUS

A. NEWSPAPER PUBLICITY CONCERNING SUBJECT

1. Local

During the months of September and October, 1953, the subject's case was given constant publicity in the local press. The reports of his illness in September, 1953, and his release and subsequent return to NPPh Headquarters frequently monopolized the front pages of the local dailies, "El Imparcial" and

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T-6 related also that RCSA CCLLAZO, on January 21 and 30, 1954, had visited the subject. The same source stated that ALBIZU CAMPOS referred to MOSA COLLAZO as the contact women between himself and the NPPR in New York City. According to this informant, ROSA COLLAZO had visited ALBIZU CAMPOS on other occasions than the above, during her stay in Puerto Rico, and he is of the opinion that upon her return to New York, ROSA COLLAZO was expected to carry any orders ALBIZU might have for the NPPR in New York City

T-1 stated in February, 1954 that RAFAEL BURGOS FUENTES had been a frequent visitor of the subject since the subject's release from incarceration.

T-12, of unknown reliability, who is a close friend of DIMAS MATOS NIEVES, stated that MOTOS MIEVES had been a frequent visitor of the subject at his residence in San Juan

The Puerto Rico Police Department, in January, 1954, stated that JUANA MILLS and MICARDO RIVERA CORREA have been frequent visitors of the subject since subject's release from incarceration.

(T-13, of unknown reliability, in February, 1954) stated that DIEGO QUINONES GONZALEZ had also been a frequent visitor of the subject.

V. SUBJECT REQUESTS P. R. SUPREME COURT TO CLARIFY TERMS OF PARDON

(T-14, of known reliability) furnished information in February, 1954, that on February 18, 1954, the subject, through his lawyers, FRANCISCO HERNANDEZ VARGAS and JUAN HERNANDEZ VALLE, had presented a motion before the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico, which requested the Court to arrive at a decision concerning the full extent and scope of the pardon which had been granted the subject on September 30, 1953. This informant had no further information regarding this matter.

VI. MISCELLANEOUS

EL IMPARCIAL, in its issue of October 19, 1953, carried an article which stated the magazine BOHEMIA of Cuba had published interviews with LUIS MUNCZ MARIN, Governor of Puerto Rico, and with PEDRO ALBIZU CAMPOS, in which the subject stated the enemies of his fatherland were attacking him with atomic weapons for the purpose of liquidating him with liquid fire, and explained his stand on the day of the Nationalist uprising of October 30, 1950. Governor LUIS MUNOZ MARIN, in the same article, took the stand that the subject was COPY DESTROYED

- SEGUNDO LORENZO RUIZ According to T-6, is a Nationalist of Arecibo, Puerto Rico (200)
- JOSE MIVERA SOTOMAYOR Served sendence for violation of the Insular Subversive Activities Law, and according to T-3, is companion and nurse for subject since latter's release from jail

On November 7, 1952, NUTHERFORD and the writer that in about August 1950 he was summoned by the subject and was instructed to give to RAIMUNDO DIAZ PACHECO two guns which DIAZ PACHECO had earlier given to for safekeeping. It is noted that DIAZ PACHECO was killed leading the attack on the Governor's Palace, San Juan, October 30, 1950 during the Nationalist uprising.

In December 1950 T-4 reported that he had received information indicating that the subject, who was at that time incarcerated, had sent instructions through JUAN HEINANDEZ VALLE, his lawyer, to ANGELINA TORRESOLA DE PLATET, that TORRESOLA was the new Treasurer General of the NPPR to replace RAIMUNDO DIAZ PACHECO


In October 1953 T-15, of unknown reliability, reported that DIEGO QUINONES GONZALEZ had assorted he had received instructions from the subject to form a local NPPR board in Barrio Buen Consejo in Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, and to instruct the youth of Rio Piedras in Nationalist ideals. Informant further advised that QUINONES GONZALEZ had allegedly begun to form the local board pursuant to the subject's instructions and had chosen a secretary and treasurer for the board.

T-4 advised in January 1954 that the subject had issued orders forbidding meetings of the NPPR in Puerto Rico until he had regained sufficient strength to take personal charge of the organization of these meetings

In January 1954 T-4 reported that the subject had appointed four Nationalists as the only authorized persons to collect NPPR funds in Puerto Rico. They were JUANITA OJEDA MALDONADO, ISABEL ROSADO MORALES, JOSE RIVERA SOTOMAYOR, and EUFEMIO RODRIGUEZ PEREZ. Informant stated that subject had also issued instructions that no Nationalist should carry on NPPR business unloss they had been provided with credentials signed by the subject (%) W)

T-16 advised in 1954 that the subject had sent instructions to the New York board of the NPPR by ROSA COLLAZO in January 1954 reorganizing the New York board, giving LOLITA LEBRON the controlling position in the NPPR organizational setup in New York
