CHAPTER 1.—NUMBER OF INHABITANTS.

Introduction.—This chapter gives the population of North Dakota, by counties and minor civil divisions, as enumerated at the Thirteenth Census, taken as of April 15, 1910, with comparative statements of population where possible, and a statement and discussion for the state as a whole of the population living in urban and in rural territory. The statistics are given in detail in two general tables.

Table 1 (p. 323) shows the population of North Dakota, distributed according to counties and minor civil divisions, at the last three Federal censuses, namely, those of 1910, 1900, and 1890. The arrangement of counties and of the primary divisions in each county, except the few that are numbered, is alphabetical. The figures for the two secondary divisions are printed in italics. The changes in boundaries, name, or form of organization that have taken place since 1900 are indicated in the footnotes to the table. For changes between 1890 and 1900 reference must be made to the census report of 1900.

It may be noticed that the county totals as given in Table 1 for 1900 and 1890 sometimes exceed the aggregate population of the minor civil divisions as shown in the table. This is for the most part due to the territorial changes that have been made in the minor civil divisions within certain counties since 1890. In some counties the population returned by townships in 1910 was not so returned at earlier censuses. In other instances, however, the population of certain divisions returned separately at one census was returned in combination with that of other divisions at another census.

Table 2 (p. 338) shows the cities and incorporated towns and villages in North Dakota, alphabetically arranged, with their population in 1910, 1900, and 1890.

The population of North Dakota, by counties, at each of the last three Federal censuses, from 1890 to 1910, inclusive, also comparative figures, where possi-

ble, for 1870 and 1880 for those counties, which at these censuses formed part of Dakota territory; the increase during the last two decades; the density of the total and the rural population at the census of 1910; and the distribution of the population at the last two Federal censuses according to urban and rural districts, are given in Table I of Chapter 2.

The tables and text of the present chapter contain few technical expressions whose meaning is not apparent. The census usage in regard to certain terms is, however, explained below:

Density of population.—The density of population of a state or county is obtained by dividing its total population by the number of square miles in its land area. In calculating the density of rural population, the same divisor is used as it is not practicable to ascertain and deduct the exact area covered by the urban districts, and even if this could be done with accuracy the deduction of this area from the total land area would ordinarily make no appreciable difference in the resulting quotient.

Minor civil divisions.—The counties are divided generally into smaller political units which bear different designations in the different parts of the country, such as towns, townships, election precincts, school townships, etc. Of these minor civil divisions those which rank next to the county as geographic areas are termed primary divisions. In many instances, however, these primary divisions contain political units of still smaller area, such as cities, incorporated villages, towns, or boroughs. These smaller political units are referred to as secondary divisions.

Urban and rural population defined.—The Census Bureau, for purposes of discussion, has defined urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside of such incorporated places.

The comparisons of the urban and rural population in 1910 with that at earlier enumerations may be made either with respect to the varying proportions of the two classes at successive enumerations or with respect to the increase between enumerations. In order to contrast the *proportion* of the total population living in urban or rural territory at the census of 1910 with the proportion urban or rural at the preceding census, it is necessary to classify the territory according to the conditions *as they existed* at each census. In this comparison a place having less than 2,500 inhabitants in 1900 and

HISTORICAL NOTE.—The name Dakota was originally that of an Indian nation which inhabited the region now comprising North Dakota and adjacent states. The word signifies "friends, allies, or confederates."

The first authentic exploration within the present limits of North Dakota was made in 1738 when the French explorers, De la Verendrye and his sons, attempted to reach the Pacific Ocean. In 1804 and 1806 the United States Government exploring expedition under Lewis and Clark passed through the Dakota country by way of the Missouri River. British subjects had trading posts in this region early in the nineteenth century, and in 1810 Lord Selkirk, considering it British territory, built a fort near Pembina. Shortly afterwards a colony was planted here under a grant from the Hudson Bay Company. In 1823 the United States discovered that this place was within its borders, and raised the American flag over it.

North Dakota was originally a part of the vast area known as Louisiana, which was ceded by France to Spain in 1763, retroceded in 1800, and purchased by the United States in 1803. It belonged successively to the district of Louisiana (1804-5), the territory of Louisiana (1805-1812), and the territory of Missouri (1812-1834). That part of the present state lying east of the Missouri and White Earth Rivers belonged to Michigan territory (1834), to Wisconsin territory (1836), to Iowa territory (1838), and to Minnesota territory (1849). The area between the Missouri and White Earth Rivers and the present western boundary of North Dakota formed a part of

the "Indian Country" from 1834 to 1854, and in the latter year was included in the territory of Nebraska.

Upon the admission of the state of Minnesota in 1858, the region lying between that state and the Missouri and White Earth Rivers was left without legal name or existence, and it so remained until March, 1861, when the territory of Dakota was organized. At this time Dakota extended from the Keyapaha, Nobrara, and Missouri Rivers and the forty-third parallel to the Canadian boundary and from Minnesota to the Rocky Mountains, thus including the area now comprising most of Montana and nearly half of Wyoming. In 1863, when Idaho territory was formed, the region between the Rocky Mountains and the present western boundaries of North and South Dakota was included. Most of the present area of Wyoming was transferred from Idaho to Dakota in 1864, and continued a part of the latter territory until 1868, when Wyoming territory was organized. In 1882 a small triangular tract of land lying south of the forty-third parallel and west of the Missouri River was transferred from Dakota to Nebraska.

At the election of November, 1887, the question of the division of the Dakota territory into two states was submitted to the people and was carried at the polls. In November, 1889, North Dakota, with boundaries as at present, became a state of the Union.

over 2,500 in 1910 is classed with the rural population for 1900 and with the urban for 1910. On the other hand, in order to present fairly the contrast between urban and rural communities, as regards their *rate of growth*, it is necessary to consider the changes in population for the *same* territory which have occurred from one decennial census to another. For this purpose the territory which in 1910 was urban or rural, as the case may be, is taken as the basis, and the population in 1900 for the same territory (so far as separately reported

at that census) is presented, even though part of the territory may, on the basis of its population at the earlier census, have then been in a different class. This avoids the disturbing effect on comparisons which would arise from the passage, for example, of communities formerly classed as rural into the urban group. These two distinct forms of comparison are made in Table I of Chapter 2 for the state as a whole and for each county separately for the last two Federal censuses.

TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the state.—The population of North Dakota is 577,056. Compared with a population of 319,146 in 1900, this represents an increase during the last decade of 257,910, or 80.8 per cent. During the same period the total population of the United States increased 21 per cent. The rate of growth in the population of the state during this decade was

much greater than during the preceding decade, 1890–1900, when the rate was 67.1 per cent.

The following table shows the population of North Dakota at each Federal census from 1890 to 1910, inclusive, together with the increase and per cent of increase during each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole.

North Dakota was admitted as a state in 1889 and appears for the first time in the Federal census reports of 1890. That part of Dakota territory which now comprises the state of North Dakota had in 1870 a population of 2,405, which increased to 36,909 in 1880 and to 190,983 in 1890. Since 1890 the population has increased 386,073, of which increase more than two-thirds was gained during the last decade. The rate of growth for the state during this 20-year period was 202.2 per cent, while the rate for the United States was 46.1 per cent.

Principal cities.—North Dakota has 64 cities. Fargo, the largest, has a population of 14,331, and Grand Forks, the second city, a population of 12,478. Minot, Bismarck, and Devils Lake, with 6,188, 5,443, and 5,157 inhabitants, respectively, are the other cities in the state having over 5,000 inhabitants. There are also 5 cities having from 2,500 to 5,000 inhabitants and 54 having less than 2,500 inhabitants. The aggregate population of the 64 cities is 112,077, or 19.4 per cent of the total population of the state.

Table 2 shows the population in 1910 of all the cities of the state with comparative figures, where possible, for 1900 and 1890. The table following shows the population of the 5 cities having in 1910 over 5,000 inhabitants, as reported at each Federal census since their incorporation, together with the increase during each decade.

Of the cities included in this table, Minot shows the highest rate of increase during the last decade, namely, 384.6 per cent, and Fargo the lowest, 49.5 per cent.

The rates of increase for all cities, with the exception of Fargo, have been higher during the last decade than during the preceding decade.

Counties.—North Dakota has 49 counties. The population of these counties ranges from 3,577 in Oliver County to 33,935 in Cass County.

The following territorial changes have been made in the counties of North Dakota since 1900: Part of Billings was taken in 1907 to form Bowman; parts of Stark and Billings were taken in 1905 to form McKenzie; parts of Stark were taken in 1907 to form Adams

and Hettinger; parts of Ward were taken to form Mountrail in 1909, and Burke and Renville in 1910; parts of Mercer and Stark were taken in 1908 to form Dunn; part of McLean was taken in 1909 to form Sheridan; and part of Williams was taken in 1910 to form Divide.

Owing to the organization since 1900 of 10 new counties from parts of other counties, as shown above, the comparison of increase or decrease in population is made for only 33 counties and four combinations of counties. The combinations of counties are Adams, Stark, Bowman, Billings, Dunn, Mercer, Hettinger, and McKenzie; Burke, Ward, Mountrail, and Renville; Divide with Williams; and Sheridan with McLean. In order to determine the actual rate of increase for this territory, it is necessary to add the population of each new county to that of the old counties from which it was formed. Thirty counties and the four combinations of counties increased in population during the last decade. The rates of increase for the counties which do not enter into the combinations and which show increases range from 13.1 per cent in Richland County to 279.6 per cent in Logan County, and the absolute increases of the same group of counties range from 1,470 in Eddy County to 15,012 in Morton County. Each combination of counties shows a large percentage of increase. Three counties decreased in population during the last decade, the percentages of decrease being 17.5, 4.3, and 3.9 in Pembina, Traill, and Walsh Counties, respectively, and the absolute decreases 3,120 in Pembina County, 562 in Traill County, and 797 in Walsh County. The aggregate increase of population from 1900 to 1910 in the four combinations of counties and in the 30 counties that showed increases was 262,389; the aggregate decrease of population in the 3 counties that showed decreases was 4,479. The difference, 257,910, is, of course, the total increase of population in the state.

The maps on page 321 show the increase or decrease in the total and the rural population, respectively, of each county of North Dakota during the last decade. In the counties shown in white the population decreased; for the other counties the different rates of increase are indicated by differences in shading.

Density of population.—The total land area of the state is 70,183 square miles. The average number of persons to the square mile in 1910 was 8.2; in 1900 and 1890 it was 4.5 and 2.7, respectively. The average number per square mile for the United States as a whole in 1910 was 30.9.

The density of population is given by counties in Table I of Chapter 2 and in the maps on page 322, both for the entire population and for that living in rural territory, excluding in the latter case the population of places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, but not excluding the land area of such places.

Morton County, with 4,742 square miles, has the largest area, and Foster County, with 644 square miles, has the smallest area. Grand Forks County, containing Grand Forks city, has the highest density of any county, namely, 19.5 persons per square mile, while McKenzie County, with 2 persons per square mile, has the lowest density.

Minor civil divisions.—The political divisions into which counties are subdivided are collectively termed "Minor civil divisions." In North Dakota the counties are divided into 1,460 primary divisions, comprising 910 civil townships, 297 school townships, 27 school districts, 16 election precincts, 3 towns, 64 cities, and 143 villages. There are also 2 secondary divisions in the state, each a village which is not an independent minor civil division but which forms a part of the township in which it is located. Besides these minor civil divisions there are 513 unorganized townships, 11 of which have no population reported, and 3 Indian reservations in the state. These reservations, though independent of any county organization, are returned under the counties in which they are wholly or partly located.

Urban and rural population compared.—The following table presents the population of North Dakota at the Federal censuses of 1910, 1900, and 1890, respectively, distributed among cities, towns, and villages grouped according to specified limits of population, together with the percentage of the total population contained in each group at each of the censuses named. The classification is based upon the population of each place as it existed at each census.

As shown by this table, the urban territory of the state in 1910—that is, the cities of 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 63,236 inhabitants, or 11 per cent of the total population, while 513,820 inhabitants, or 89 per cent, lived in rural territory. The urban territory as it existed in 1900—that is, the cities then having 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 23,413 inhabitants, or 7.3 per cent of the total population, while 295,733 inhabitants, or 92.7 per cent, lived in rural territory. There has thus been a considerable increase in the proportion of urban population. For the United States as a whole the urban population constituted 46.3 per cent of the total population in 1910 and 40.5 per cent of the total population in 1900.

The state of North Dakota had in 1910 two cities of over 10,000 inhabitants each, Fargo and Grand Forks, whose combined population comprised 4.6 per cent of the total population of the state, while the eight other places of over 2,500 inhabitants together contributed 6.3 per cent of the entire population of the state.

The urban population of the state is contained in 10 cities, having a combined population of 63,236. The rural population is in 202 incorporated places of less than 2,500 inhabitants each and in the unincorporated territory. The 202 places of less than 2,500 inhabitants each have an aggregate population of 98,020, or 17 per cent of the total population of the state. These places comprise 23 having from 1,000 to 2,500 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 32,145; 41 having from 500 to 1,000 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 26,854; and 138 having less than 500 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 39,021. The population living in unincorporated territory represents 72.1 per cent of the total population of the state.

The table on page 319 shows further that in all incorporated places, including those of less than 2,500 inhabitants, there was in 1910 a population of 161,256, or 27.9 per cent of the population of the state. The population of all incorporated places, as they existed in 1900, was 71,148, or 22.3 per cent of the population of the state.

Table I of Chapter 2 shows that of the 4 counties of North Dakota which contained urban population in 1900, 2 had a larger proportion and 2 a smaller proportion of urban population in 1910 than in 1900. Three

counties and three combinations of counties which were wholly rural in 1900 were partly urban in 1910, while 26 counties and one combination of counties were wholly rural at both censuses.

In order to compare the *rate of growth* in urban and rural communities it is necessary in each case, as previously explained, to consider the changes in population which have occurred in the *same* territory from one decennial census to another. With this end in view places classed as urban or rural according to their population in 1910 are taken as a basis and the aggregate population in 1910 and in 1900 of the same places is then compared. Thus, as shown in the next table, the total population in 1910 of the cities which at that time had 2,500 inhabitants or more was 63,236; in 1900 the total population of these same places was 33,362. It may be noted that the latter figure exceeds the total population in 1900 of the cities which at that time had over 2,500 inhabitants each, 23,413 (see table on page 319), by 9,949. The difference is the result of the passage, since 1900, of certain communities from the rural to the urban class.

In the following table the population for the state as a whole is distributed so as to show, for 1910 and 1900, the combined population of the cities having, in 1910, 2,500 inhabitants or more, and the population of the remainder of the state.

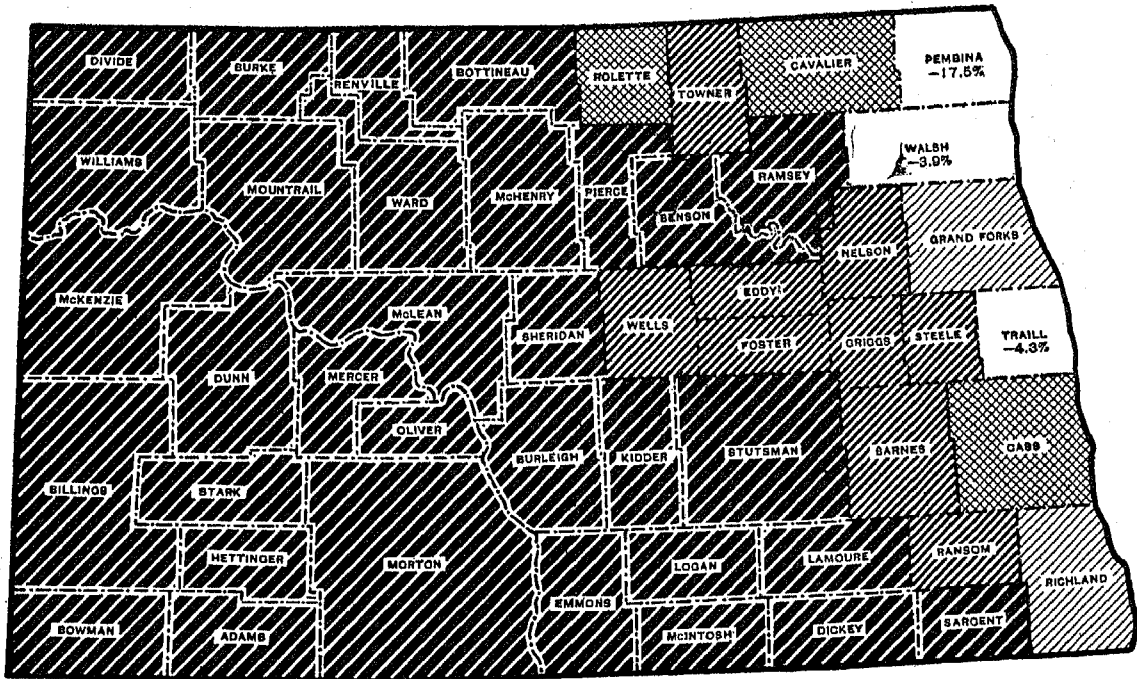

A comparison of the total population in 1910 of cities having a population of not less than 2,500 each with the total population of the same places in 1900, as given in the preceding table, shows an increase of 89.5 per cent. This represents the rate of growth of urban communities as thus defined. During the same period the rural population, comprising that of the remainder of the state, increased 79.8 per cent. Urban population thus increased somewhat faster than that of rural territory. For the United States as a whole urban population increased 34.8 per cent in the last decade and rural population 11.2 per cent.

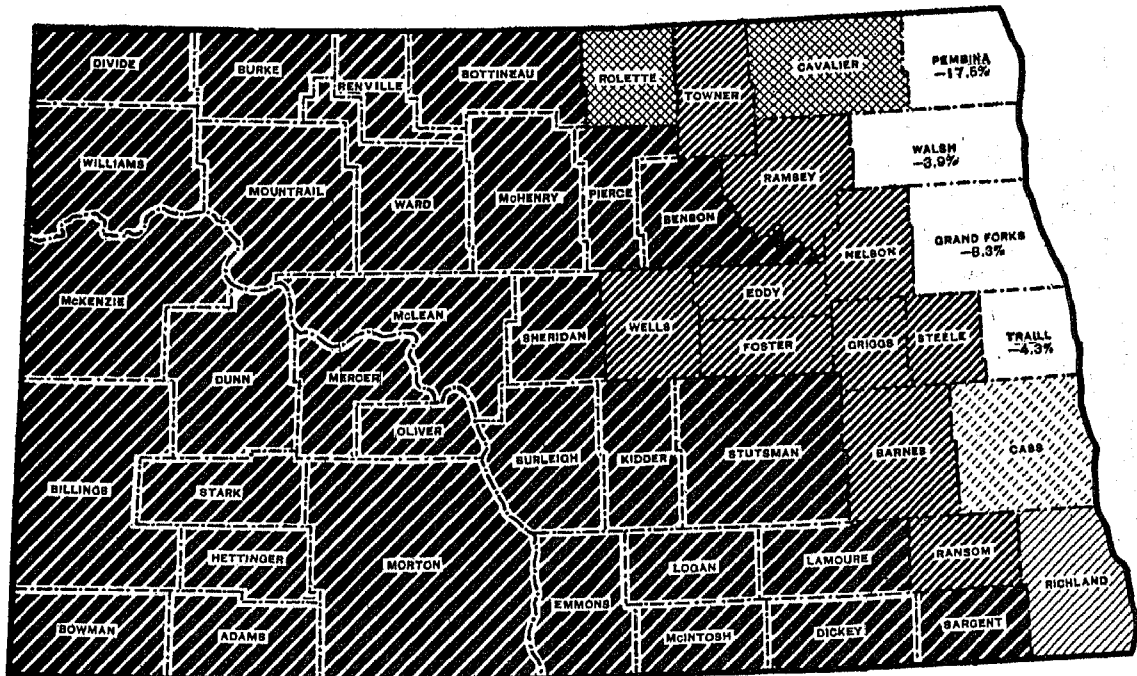
PER CENT OF INCREASE OR DECREASE OF POPULATION OF NORTH DAKOTA, BY COUNTIES: 1900-1910.

TOTAL POPULATION.



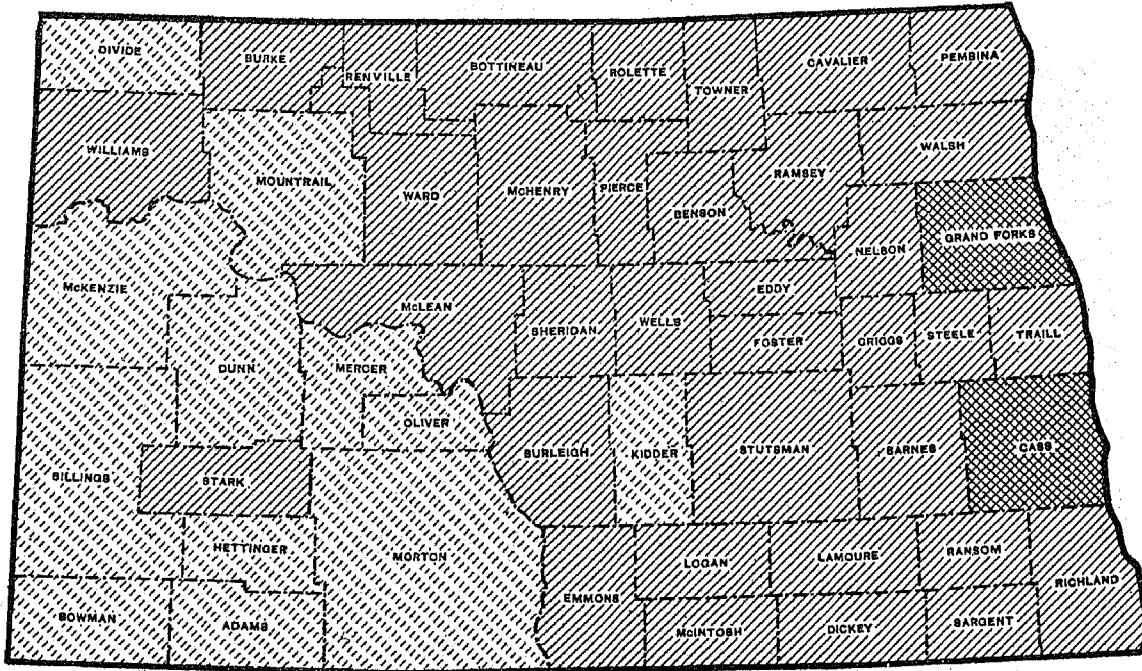
RURAL POPULATION.



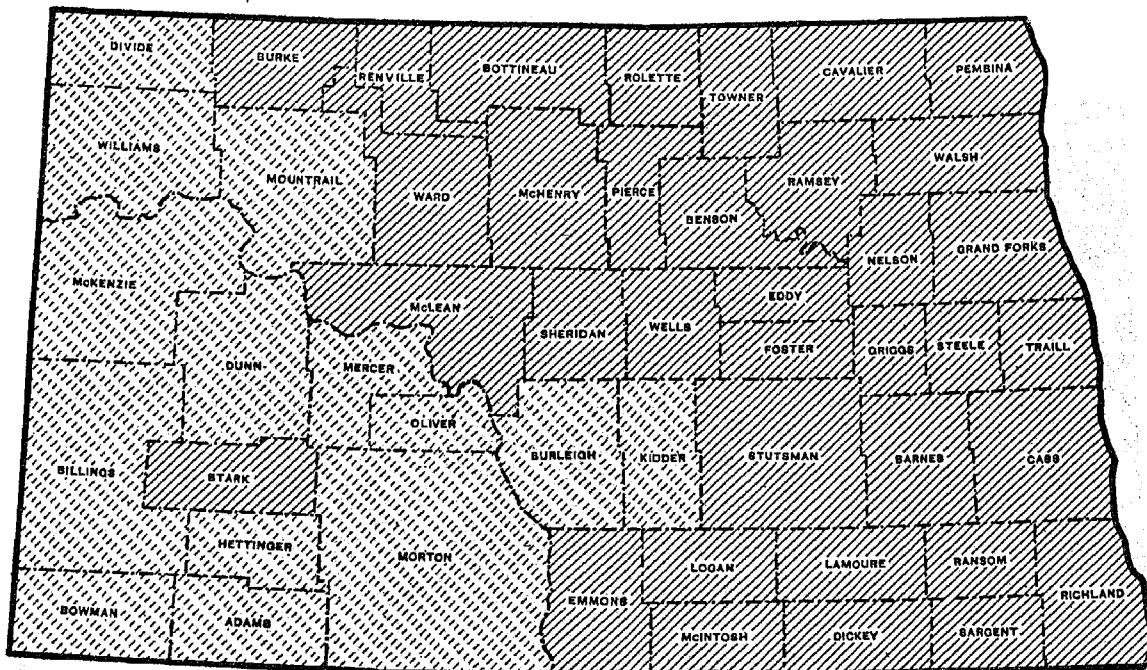

DENSITY OF POPULATION OF NORTH DAKOTA, BY COUNTIES: 1910.

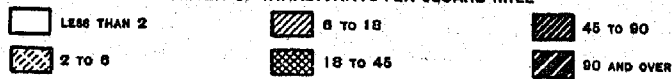
TOTAL POPULATION.

CHAPTER 2.—COMPOSITION AND CHARACTERISTICS OF THE POPULATION.

Introduction.—The first chapter having given the number of inhabitants of North Dakota by counties and minor civil divisions, the decennial increase and the density of population, and the proportions urban and rural, the present chapter deals with the composition and characteristics of the population. The two chapters cover all the principal topics of the population census except occupations and ownership of homes.

Description of the tables.—The greater part of this chapter consists of three general tables, which present statistics of color, nativity, parentage, sex, citizenship, illiteracy, school attendance, and dwellings and families, as follows: Table I for the state and counties; Table II for the two cities of more than 10,000 inhabitants; and Table III for cities of 2,500 to 10,000 inhabitants.

A series of summary tables (numbered 1 to 12) reproduces from the general tables the more important state totals, and presents also certain additional data relative to state of birth, age, and marital condition.

On account of the wide differences in characteristics among the different classes of the population, the statistics on each subject are shown according to race, and for the whites according to nativity and parentage. Classification according to nativity and parentage is scarcely necessary for the other races, since nearly all negroes and Indians are native born of native parentage, and nearly all Chinese and Japanese either foreign born or of foreign parentage.

The white population is divided into four groups: (1) Native, native parentage—that is, having both parents born in the United States; (2) native, foreign parentage—having both parents born abroad; (3) native, mixed parentage—having one parent native and the other foreign born; (4) foreign born. As the second and third classes do not differ greatly in characteristics, they are combined in some of the tables; in a few cases all three native white classes are combined.

Since marked differences often exist between urban and rural communities with respect to the composition and characteristics of the population, the two classes are distinguished in connection with several of the subjects. Urban population, as defined by the Bureau of the Census, includes that of all incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, the remainder being classified as rural.

The census inquiry as to school attendance was merely as to whether the person enumerated had attended any kind of school at any time between

September 1, 1909, and the date of enumeration, April 15, 1910. The Census Bureau classifies as illiterate any person 10 years of age or over who is unable to write, regardless of ability to read.

Color and nativity (Table 1).—Of the total population of North Dakota, 162,461, or 28.2 per cent, are native whites of native parentage; 251,236, or 43.5 per cent, are native whites of foreign or mixed parentage; and 156,158, or 27.1 per cent, are foreign-born whites. The corresponding percentages in 1900 were 20.6, 41.8, and 35.3, respectively, the proportion of native whites of native parentage having increased during the decade. The 6,486 Indians constitute 1.1 per cent of the population, and the 617 negroes, 0.1 per cent. In 29 of the 49 counties the proportion of foreign-born whites exceeds one-fourth. In no county is the proportion of native whites of foreign or mixed parentage less than one-fourth; in 6 it exceeds one-half. (See maps on p. 347.)

Of the urban population, 37.7 per cent are native whites of native parentage; of the rural, 27 per cent. The corresponding proportions for native whites of foreign or mixed parentage are 37.6 and 44.3 per cent, respectively. The percentage of foreign-born whites is 24 in the urban population and 27.4 in the rural; of negroes, 0.5 in the urban and 0.1 in the rural. The Indian population is almost exclusively rural.

Sex (Table 2).—In the total population of the state there are 317,554 males and 259,502 females, or 122.4 males to 100 females. In 1900 the ratio was 125.3 to 100. Among native whites the ratio is 114.9 to 100 and among foreign-born whites 145.8 to 100. In the urban population there are 115.6 males to 100 females and in the rural, 123.2.

State of birth (Tables 3 and 4).—Of the total native population—that is, population born in the United States—47.1 per cent were born in North Dakota and 52.9 per cent outside the state; of the native white population, 53.5 per cent were born outside the state; of the native negro, 83.4 per cent; and of the native Indian, 12.7 per cent. Persons born outside the state constitute a larger proportion of the native population in urban than in rural communities.

Foreign nationalities (Table 5).—Of the foreign-born white population of North Dakota, persons born in Norway represent 29.4 per cent; Russia, 20.4; Canada, 13.5 (those of French parentage, 1.5, and all others, 12); Germany, 10.6; Sweden, 7.8; Denmark, 3.4; Austria, 3.3; England, 2; Hungary, 1.8; Ireland,

1.6; all other countries, 6.4 per cent. Of the total white stock of foreign origin, which includes persons born abroad and also natives having one or both parents born abroad, Norway contributed 30.3 per cent; Russia, 15.3; Germany, 14.7; Canada, 12.7 (French stock, 1.8, and all others, 10.9); Sweden, 6.6; Denmark, 3; Ireland, 2.9; Austria, 2.7; England, 2.3; Hungary, 1.1; Scotland, 1 per cent.

Voting and militia ages (Table 6).—The total number of males 21 years of age and over is 173,890, representing 30.1 per cent of the population. Of such males, 24.9 per cent are native whites of native parentage, 28.1 per cent native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 45.8 per cent foreign-born whites, 0.9 per cent Indians, and 0.2 per cent negroes. Of the 79,721 foreign-born white males of voting age, 46,636, or 58.5 per cent, are naturalized. Males of militia age—18 to 44—number 145,628.

Age (Tables 7 and 8).—Of the total population, 14.3 per cent are under 5 years of age, 22.4 per cent from 5 to 14 years, inclusive, 20.5 per cent from 15 to 24, 28.9 per cent from 25 to 44, and 13.5 per cent 45 years of age and over. The foreign-born white population comprises comparatively few children, only 7.6 per cent of this class being under 15 years of age, while more than three-fourths (76.4 per cent) are 25 years of age and over. Of the native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, only 25.6 per cent are 25 and over; of the native whites of native parentage, 36.1 per cent.

The urban population shows a smaller proportion of children than the rural and a larger proportion of persons in the prime of life. Migration to urban communities explains this at least in part. Of the urban population, 34.8 per cent are from 25 to 44 years of age, inclusive, and of the rural population, 28.2 per cent.

School attendance (Table 9).—The total number of persons of school age—that is, from 6 to 20 years, inclusive—is 183,336, of whom 117,453, or 64.1 per cent, attended school. In addition to these, 1,799 children under 6 and 2,397 persons 21 and over attended school. For boys from 6 to 20 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 63.4; for girls, 64.8. For children from 6 to 14 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 80.7. The percentage for children of this age among native whites of native parentage was 82.7; among native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 81.5; among foreign-born whites, 70; and among Indians, 65.5. (See Table I.) In urban communities the percentage of children of that age attending school was 84.2, and in rural, 80.4; for persons from 15 to 20 years, inclusive, the percentages were 43.1 and 35.7, respectively.

Illiteracy (Table 10).—There are 13,070 illiterates in the state, representing 3.1 per cent of the total population 10 years of age and over, as compared with 5.6 per cent in 1900. The percentage of illiteracy is 0.5 among native whites, 6.3 among foreign-born whites, and 46 among Indians.

For all classes combined, the percentage of illiterates is 2.2 in urban communities and 3.2 in rural. For each

class separately, also, except the foreign-born whites, the percentage is higher in the rural population than in the urban.

For persons from 10 to 20 years of age, inclusive, whose literacy depends largely upon present school facilities and school attendance, the percentage of illiteracy is 1.7. (See Table I.)

Marital condition (Table 11).—In the population 15 years of age and over, 46.9 per cent of the males are single and 30.2 per cent of the females. The percentage married is 48.6 for males and 63.4 for females, and the percentage widowed 2.9 and 5.2, respectively. The percentages of those reported as divorced, 0.3 and 0.4, respectively, are believed to be too small, because of the probability that many divorced persons class themselves as single or widowed.

That the percentage single is so much smaller for women than for men is due partly to the excess of males in the total population and partly to the fact that women marry younger. Thus 8.3 per cent of the females from 15 to 19 years of age are married, as compared with 0.3 per cent of the males, and 50 per cent of the females from 20 to 24 years of age are married, as compared with 13.7 per cent of the males. In the next age group, 25 to 34 years, the percentages are 82.2 and 53.2, respectively; in the age group 35 to 44 they are 90.2 and 75.3; while in the next age group the percentage married is higher among the males. That there is a larger proportion of widows than of widowers may indicate that men more often remarry than women, but, since husbands are generally older than their wives, the marriage relationship is more often broken by death of the husband than by death of the wife.

For the main elements of the population the percentages of married persons among those 15 years of age and over are as follows: Foreign-born whites, 59.3 for males and 75.7 for females; native whites of native parentage, 47 and 63.1, respectively; native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 36 and 51.1; and Indians, 61.1 and 66.1.

These percentages by no means indicate the relative tendency of the several classes as regards marriage. To determine that, the comparison should be made by age periods, since the proportion married in any class is determined largely by the proportion who have reached the marrying age. Similarly, the proportion widowed depends largely on the proportion past middle life. The percentage married for males is slightly higher, and for females decidedly higher, in rural than in urban communities.

Dwellings and families.—The total number of dwellings in North Dakota is 118,757, and the total number of families 120,910, indicating that in comparatively few cases does more than one family occupy a dwelling. (See Table I.) The average number of persons per dwelling is 4.9, and the average number per family, 4.8.

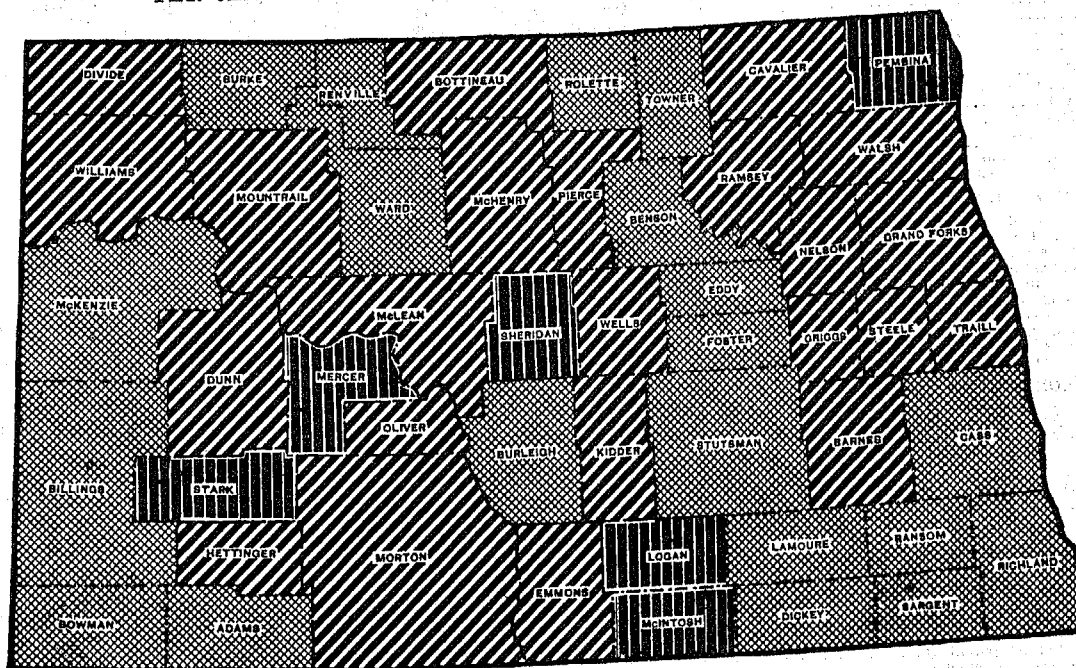

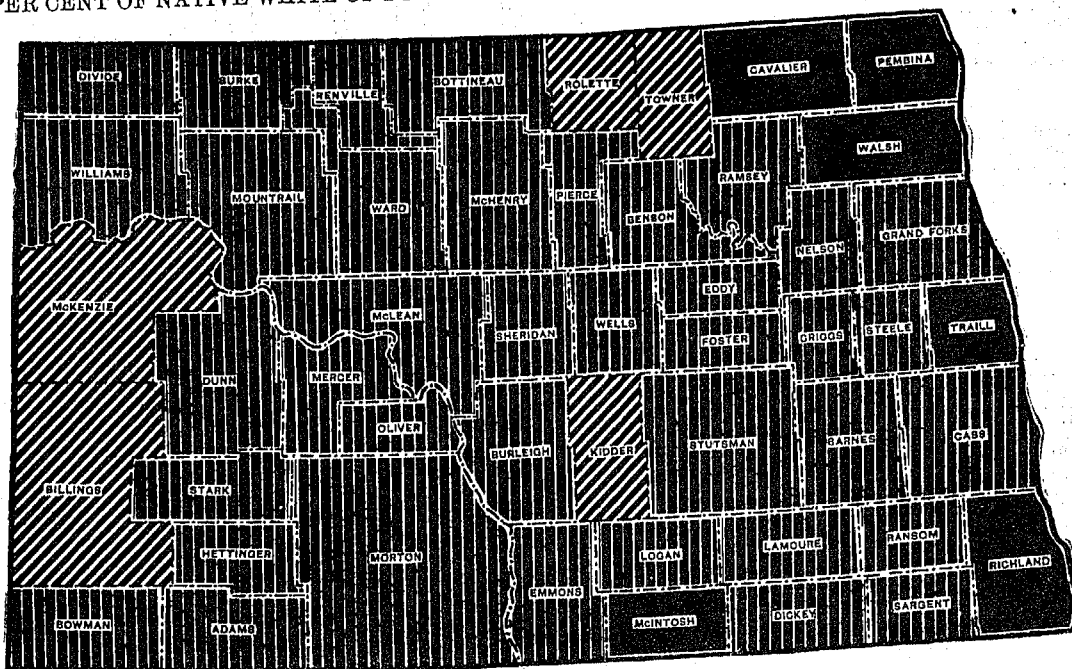

OHIO.

CHAPTER 1.—NUMBER OF INHABITANTS.

Introduction.—This chapter gives the population of Ohio, by counties and minor civil divisions, as enumerated at the Thirteenth Census, taken as of April 15, 1910, with comparative statements of population where possible, and a statement and discussion for the state as a whole of the population living in urban and in rural territory. The statistics are given in detail in two general tables.

Table 1 (p. 368) shows the population of Ohio, distributed according to counties and minor civil divisions, at the last three censuses, namely, those of 1910, 1900, and 1890. The arrangement of counties and of the primary divisions in each county is alphabetical. The figures for secondary divisions are printed in italics. The changes in boundaries, name, or form of organization that have taken place since 1900 are indicated in the footnotes to the table. For changes between 1890 and 1900 reference must be made to the census report of 1900.

It may be noticed that the county totals as given in Table 1 for 1900 and 1890 sometimes exceed the aggregate population of the minor civil divisions as shown in the table. This is due in part to the fact that some of the minor civil divisions of certain counties had gone out of existence by 1910, their territory having been annexed to other divisions or taken to form new divisions. In other cases certain cities and villages returned as secondary divisions in 1910 and 1900 were returned independently in 1890.

Table 2 (p. 387) shows the cities and incorporated villages in Ohio, alphabetically arranged, with their population in 1910, 1900, and 1890.

The population of Ohio, by counties, at each of the last five censuses, from 1870 to 1910, inclusive; the

increase during the last two decades; the density of the total and the rural population at the census of 1910; and the distribution of the population at the last two censuses according to urban and rural districts, are given in Table I of Chapter 2.

The tables and text of the present chapter contain few technical expressions whose meaning is not apparent. The census usage in regard to certain terms is, however, explained below:

Density of population.—The density of population of a state or county is obtained by dividing its total population by the number of square miles in its land area. In calculating the density of rural population, the same divisor is used as it is not practicable to ascertain and deduct the exact area covered by the urban districts, and even if this could be done with accuracy the deduction of this area from the total land area would ordinarily make no appreciable difference in the resulting quotient.

Minor civil divisions.—The counties are divided generally into smaller political units which bear different designations in the different parts of the country, such as towns, townships, election precincts, etc. Of these minor civil divisions those which rank next to the county as geographic areas are termed primary divisions. In many instances, however, these primary divisions contain political units of still smaller area, such as cities, incorporated villages, towns, or boroughs. These smaller political units are referred to as secondary divisions.

Urban and rural population defined.—The Census Bureau, for purposes of discussion, has defined urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside of such incorporated places.

The comparisons of the urban and rural population in 1910 with that at earlier enumerations may be made either with respect to the varying proportions of the two classes at successive enumerations or with respect to the increase between enumerations. In order to contrast the *proportion* of the total population living in urban or rural territory at the census of 1910 with the proportion urban or rural at the preceding census, it is necessary to classify the territory

HISTORICAL NOTE.—Ohio takes its name from the river which borders it on the south and southeast. The name of the river is a contraction of the Iroquois *Ohionhió*, "beautiful river."

The territory which now forms the state of Ohio was first explored by La Salle, a Frenchman. There are evidences that he discovered the Ohio River about 1670 and followed its course to the Louisville Rapids, but his first well-authenticated exploration was in August, 1679, when he sailed along the south shore of Lake Erie on his expedition to the Mississippi Valley. The French held possession of the territory as a trading ground until 1763, when, at the close of the French and Indian War, the French claims were relinquished in favor of the English. In 1778 the country west of the Ohio and east of the Mississippi was taken from the British by George Rogers Clark at the head of Virginia troops, and in the same year it was organized as a county of Virginia. At the close of the Revolution this territory was ceded to the United States by the British, and during the period 1781 to 1786 Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, and Virginia ceded to the Federal Government their claims to these lands, based on their early charters. Connecticut, however, did not cede all her western lands but kept over 3,500,000 acres—the Western Reserve—in what is now northeastern Ohio, and Virginia retained rights of soil in a tract in the southwestern part of the state to be used as legal bounties for Virginia

continental troops. In 1800 Connecticut transferred to the United States the jurisdiction over the Western Reserve.

The establishment, in 1787, of a territorial government for the region between the Ohio and the Mississippi, then known as the Northwest Territory, was followed by a large influx of pioneers from the older parts of the country. The first permanent settlement was made at Marietta in 1788 by a colony from Massachusetts. Later in the same year Cosantiville, now Cincinnati, was founded by a party from Lexington, Ky.

In 1800 the greater part of the Northwest Territory—the area now comprising Indiana, excepting a narrow strip along the eastern boundary, Illinois, Wisconsin, western Michigan, and northeastern Minnesota—was organized as the territory of Indiana.

In November, 1802, a convention, authorized by Congress in April of the same year, met at Chillicothe and adopted a constitution for the state of Ohio; and on February 19, 1803, Congress declared the new state to be a member of the Union.

By the enabling act of 1802 the limits of Ohio were fixed as they now stand, with the exception of the northern boundary west of Lake Erie, which was established at its present location in 1836.

according to the conditions as they existed at each census. In this comparison a place having less than 2,500 inhabitants in 1900 and over 2,500 in 1910 is classed with the rural population for 1900 and with the urban for 1910. On the other hand, in order to present fairly the contrast between urban and rural communities, as regards their rate of growth, it is necessary to consider the changes in population for the same territory which have occurred from one decennial census to another. For this purpose the territory which in 1910 was urban or rural, as the case may be, is taken as the basis,

and the population in 1900 for the same territory (so far as separately reported at that census) is presented, even though part of the territory may, on the basis of its population at the earlier census, have then been in a different class. This avoids the disturbing effect on comparisons which would arise from the passage, for example, of communities formerly classed as rural into the urban group. These two distinct forms of comparison are made in Table I of Chapter 2 for the state as a whole and for each county separately for the last two censuses.

TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the state.—The population of Ohio is 4,767,121. Compared with a population of 4,157,545 in 1900, this represents an increase during the last decade of 609,576, or 14.7 per cent. During the same period the total population of the United States increased 21 per cent. The population of the state has grown at

about the same rate during each of the last three decades. The following table shows the population of Ohio at each census from 1800 to 1910, inclusive, together with the increase and per cent of increase during each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole.

Ohio was admitted as a state in 1803. The population of the territory now constituting the state was first enumerated at the Federal census of 1800. It will be observed from the above table that the early censuses show a very rapid rate of growth in the state. During the 20 years from 1800 to 1820 the population increased more than twelve times, and during the next 20 years, from 1820 to 1840, it considerably more than doubled. Since 1840 the growth of the state has been very much slower, the population not doubling again until 40 years later, in 1880. During the 30 years since 1880 the population of the state has increased 49.1 per cent.

A comparison of the rates of increase for the state with those for the United States, as given in the preceding table, shows that during the first 40 years the population of the state increased very much faster than did that of the United States. Since 1840, however, the rate of increase for the state during each decade has been lower than that of the United States.

Principal cities.—Ohio has 82 cities. Cleveland, the largest, has a population of 560,663, and Cincinnati, the next largest city, a population of 363,591.

Columbus, Toledo, and Dayton, with 181,511, 168,497, and 116,577 inhabitants, respectively, are the only other cities with more than 100,000 population. Of the remaining cities, 3 have from 50,000 to 100,000, 6 from 25,000 to 50,000, 23 from 10,000 to 25,000, and 45 from 5,000 to 10,000 inhabitants, respectively. The aggregate population of the 82 cities is 2,467,054, or 51.8 per cent of the total population of the state.

Table 2 shows the population in 1910 of all the cities of the state with comparative figures, where possible, for 1900 and 1890. The table on page 363 shows the population of the 14 cities of Ohio having in 1910 over 25,000 inhabitants, as reported at each census since their incorporation as cities, towns, or villages, so far as figures are available, together with the increase during each decade.

Of the cities included in this table, Lorain shows the highest percentage of increase during the last decade, namely, 80.2 per cent, and Cincinnati the lowest, 11.6 per cent. Akron, Canton, Lorain, and Youngstown show increases during the last decade of over 50 per cent. Dayton, Lorain, and Toledo show lower rates of increase during the last decade, 1900-1910, than during the preceding decade, 1890-1900.

Cleveland has grown rapidly, though at widely varying rates, since 1830. From 1830 to 1870 the rates of increase in the population of the city ranged from 113.8 per cent for the decade 1860-1870 to 464.2 per cent for the decade 1830-1840. Since 1870 the rates of increase have ranged from 46.1 per cent for the decade 1890-1900 to 72.5 per cent for the decade 1870-1880. The absolute increase in population, however, has been larger with each succeeding decade since 1830.

The growth of Cincinnati during the last decade has been slow, the relative increase in population being the smallest shown for any decade covered by the table except that from 1890 to 1900, and the absolute

increase being smaller than for any decade since 1840 except that from 1890 to 1900.

Counties.—Ohio has 88 counties. The population of these counties ranges from 13,096 in Vinton County to 637,425 in Cuyahoga County.

There have been no changes in the territorial boundaries of the counties since 1900.

Forty-nine counties have increased in population during the last decade, the rates of increase ranging from one-tenth of 1 per cent in Fayette County to 65.6 per cent in Mahoning County, and the absolute increases from 19 in Fayette County to 198,305 in Cuyahoga County. Eighteen counties show a larger rate of increase than is shown for the state as a

whole, which, as before stated, was 14.7 per cent. Thirty-nine counties have decreased in population during the last decade, the rates of decrease ranging from one-tenth of 1 per cent in Lawrence County to 17.4 per cent in Paulding County, and the absolute decreases from 46 in Lawrence County to 5,225 in Wood County. The aggregate increase of population from 1900 to 1910 in the 49 counties that show an increase is 677,170; the aggregate decrease of population in the 39 counties that show a decrease is 67,594. The difference, 609,576, is, of course, the total increase of population in the state.

The maps on page 366 show the increase or decrease in the total and the rural population, respectively, of each county of Ohio during the last decade. In the counties shown in white the population decreased; for the other counties the different rates of increase are indicated by differences in shading.

Density of population.—The total land area of the state is 40,740 square miles. The average number of persons to the square mile in 1910 was 117; in 1900 and 1890 it was 102.1 and 90.1, respectively. The average number per square mile for the United States as a whole in 1910 was 30.9. In density of population Ohio ranks eighth among the states.

The density of population is given by counties in Table I of Chapter 2 and in the maps on page 367, both for the entire population and for that living in rural territory, excluding in the latter case the population of places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, but not excluding the land area of such places.

Ashtabula County, with 723 square miles, has the largest area, and Lake County, with 241 square miles, has the smallest area. Cuyahoga County, containing Cleveland city, has the highest density of any county, namely, 1,376.7 persons per square mile, while Vinton County has the lowest density, namely, 31.8.

Minor civil divisions.—The political divisions into which counties are subdivided are collectively termed "Minor civil divisions." In Ohio the counties are divided into 1,389 primary divisions, comprising 1,379 townships, 8 cities, and 2 villages. There are also 773 secondary divisions, comprising 74 cities and 699 incorporated villages. Of these, 13 cities and 13 villages

are coextensive with the townships in which they are located, while 2 cities include within their limits the whole of one township, in addition to parts of others. A state law passed in 1902 provided that all municipalities having less than 5,000 inhabitants should be called villages and those having over 5,000 inhabitants, cities. Changes were to be made according to the results of the Federal census. As a result of this law some communities returned as cities in 1900 were returned as villages in 1910, while other communities returned as villages in 1900 were returned as cities in 1910.

Urban and rural population compared.—The following table presents the population of Ohio at the censuses of 1910, 1900, and 1890, respectively, distributed among cities and villages grouped according to specified limits of population, together with the percentage of the total population contained in each group at each of the censuses named. The classification is based upon the population of each place as it existed at each census. For the purposes of this table Union City village is included in the group of urban places having from 2,500 to 5,000 inhabitants, although it had a population of only 1,595 in 1910, 1,282 in 1900, and 1,293 in 1890. This is due to the fact that Union City village, Ohio, and Union City, Ind., each separately incorporated, are together commonly known as Union City, which had a joint population of 4,804 in 1910, 3,998 in 1900, and 3,974 in 1890.

As shown by the following table, the urban territory of the state in 1910—that is, the cities and incorporated villages of 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 2,665,143 inhabitants, or 55.9 per cent of the total population, while 2,101,978 inhabitants, or 44.1 per cent, lived in rural territory. The urban territory as it existed in 1900—that is, the cities and incorporated villages then having 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 1,998,382 inhabitants, or 48.1 per cent of the total population, while 2,159,163 inhabitants, or 51.9 per cent, lived in rural territory. There has thus been a considerable increase in the proportion of urban population. For the United States as a whole the urban population constituted 46.3 per cent of the total population in 1910 and 40.5 per cent of the total population in 1900.

The proportion of the total population in the group of places from 100,000 to 500,000 inhabitants increased from 15.2 per cent in 1890 to 23.2 per cent in 1900, there being two cities in the group in 1890 and four in 1900. At some time between 1900 and 1910 Cleveland reached the 500,000 population mark and so passed out of the group. This loss was partly made up by the addition to the group of Dayton, which reached the 100,000 mark at some time during the decade. As a result of these two changes the proportion of the population in this group in 1910 fell to 17.4 per cent. The proportion of population in the group of places having from 50,000 to 100,000 inhabitants was considerably lower in 1900 than in 1890 or in 1910, owing to the fact that in 1900 only one city came within this class. No noteworthy change in the proportion of the total population in any of the groups of smaller cities and villages has occurred within the period covered by the table. The proportion of population in the combined groups of urban places having less than 100,000 inhabitants at the censuses of 1910, 1900, and 1890, was 26.7, 24.9, and 25.8 per cent, respectively.

The urban population of the state is contained in 82 cities and 57 villages, while that classed as rural is in 644 incorporated villages of less than 2,500 inhabitants each and in unincorporated territory. The 644 villages of less than 2,500 inhabitants each have an aggregate population of 452,030, representing 9.5 per cent of the total population of the state. These villages comprise 146 having from 1,000 to 2,500 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 223,400; 191 having from 500 to 1,000 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 135,745; and 307 having less than 500 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 92,885. The inhabitants of unincorporated territory number 1,649,948, or 34.6 per cent of the total population.

The table on page 364 shows further that in all incorporated places, including those of less than 2,500 inhabitants, there was in 1910 a population of 3,117,173, or 65.4 per cent of the population of the state. The population of all incorporated places, as they existed in 1900, was 2,416,099, or 58.1 per cent of the population of the state.

Table I of Chapter 2 shows that 61 counties had a larger proportion and 6 counties a smaller proportion of urban population in 1910 than in 1900. Four counties had urban population in 1910 that had only rural in 1900. Three counties had the same proportion of urban population and 14 counties were wholly rural at both censuses. In each of 17 counties more than 50 per cent of the population was urban in 1910.

In order to compare the *rate of growth* in urban and rural communities it is necessary in each case, as previously explained, to consider the changes in population which have occurred in the *same* territory from one decennial census to another. With this end in view places classed as urban or rural according to their population in 1910 are taken as a basis and the aggre-

gate population in 1910 and in 1900 of the same places is then compared. Thus, as shown in the table below, the total population in 1910 of those cities and villages which at that time had 2,500 inhabitants or more was 2,665,143; in 1900 the total population of these same places (so far as separately reported) was 2,027,462. It may be noted that the latter figure exceeds the total population in 1900 of those cities and villages which at that time had not less than 2,500 inhabitants each, 1,998,382 (see table on p. 364), by 29,080. The difference is the net result of the passage, since 1900, of certain communities from the rural to the urban class and vice versa and of annexations of territory during the same period.

A comparison of the total population in 1910 of the cities and villages having a population of not less than 2,500 each with the total population of the same places in 1900, as given in the table below, shows an increase of 31.5 per cent. This represents the rate of growth of urban communities as thus defined. During the same period the rural population, comprising that of the remainder of the state, decreased 1.3 per cent. For the United States as a whole urban population increased 34.5 per cent in the last decade and rural population 11.2 per cent. As shown by Table I of Chapter 2 there are 62 counties in Ohio in which rural population decreased but only 8 in which there was a decrease of urban population.

In the following table the population for the state as a whole is distributed so as to show, for 1910 and 1900, the population of the city of Cleveland, the combined population of the other cities having, in 1910, 100,000 inhabitants or more, the combined population of cities having from 25,000 to 100,000 inhabitants, and of cities and villages having from 2,500 to 25,000 inhabitants, respectively, and the population of the remainder of the state.

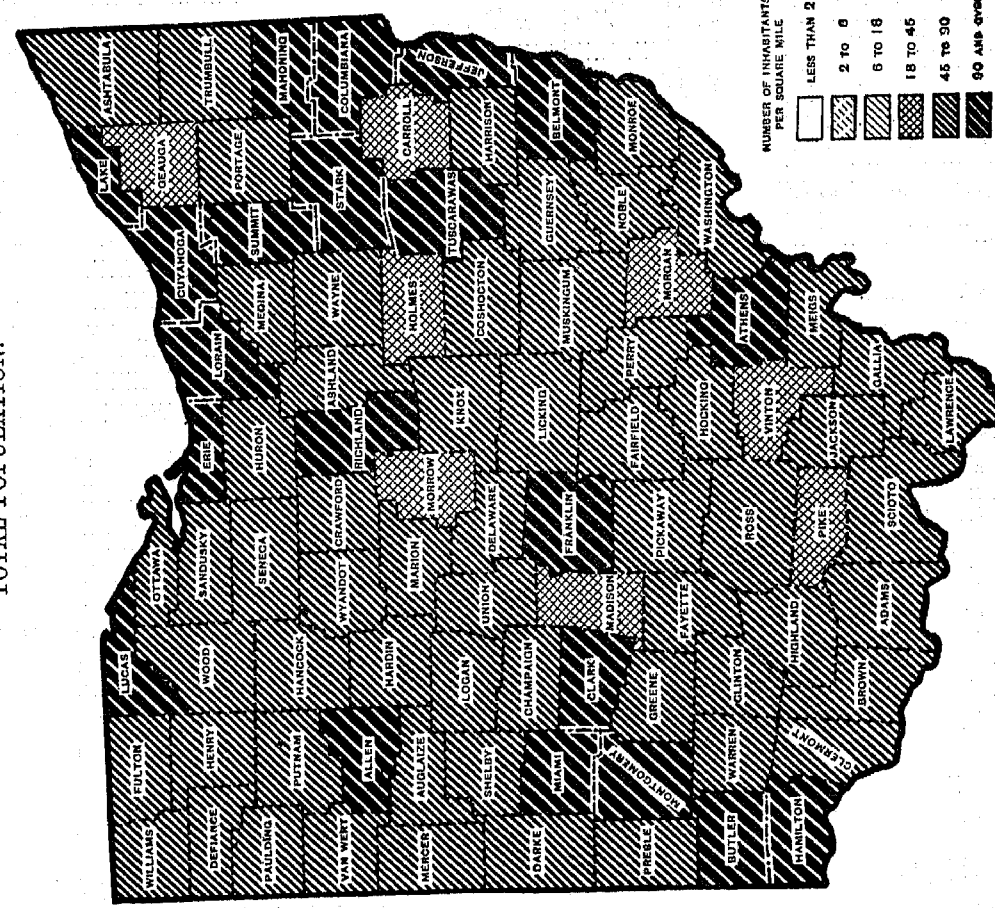

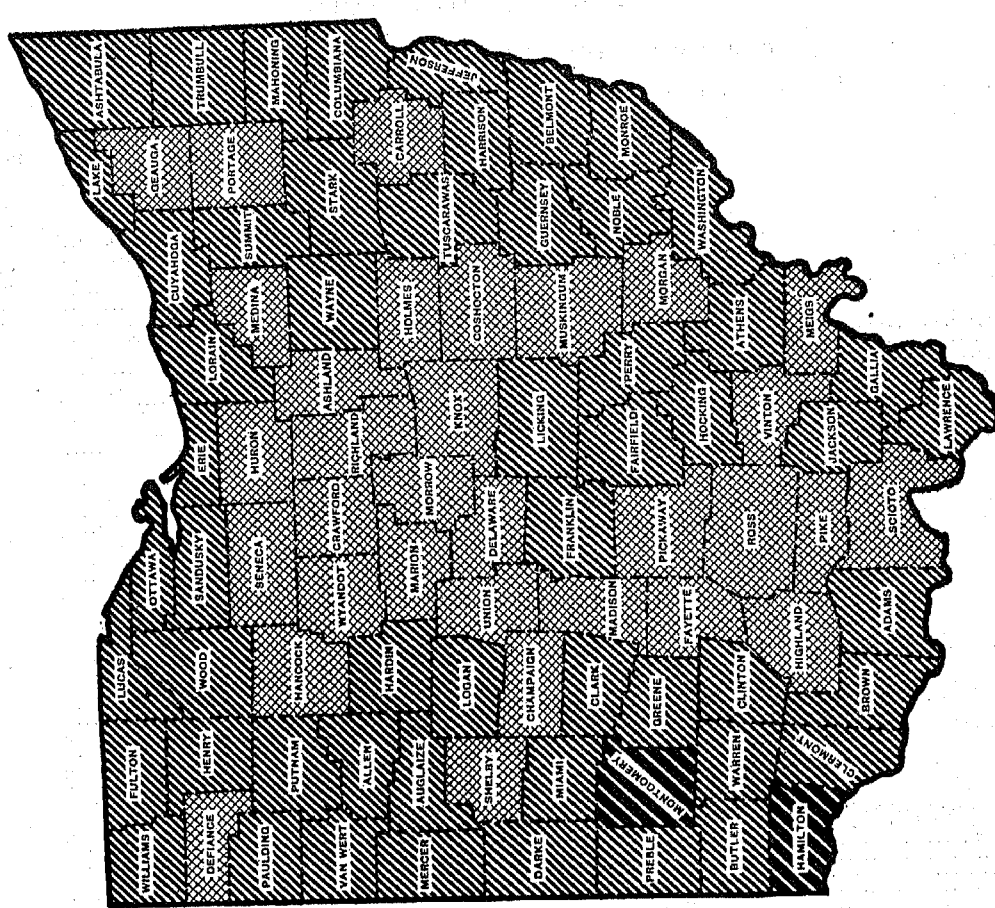
From this table it appears that the city of Cleveland increased in population during the last decade nearly three times as fast, and the group of cities having from 25,000 to 100,000 inhabitants each increased about three and one-half times as fast as the state as a whole, while the group of other cities in the state outside of Cleveland having over 100,000 inhabitants and the group of cities and villages having from 2,500 to 25,000 inhabitants each increased somewhat less than twice as fast as the state as a whole. The population living in rural territory decreased 28,105, or 1.3 per cent.

CHAPTER 2.—COMPOSITION AND CHARACTERISTICS OF THE POPULATION.

Introduction.—The first chapter having given the number of inhabitants of Ohio by counties and minor civil divisions, the decennial increase and the density of population, and the proportions urban and rural, the present chapter deals with the composition and characteristics of the population. The two chapters cover all the principal topics of the population census except occupations and ownership of homes.

Description of the tables.—The greater part of this chapter consists of five general tables, which present statistics of color, nativity, parentage, sex, citizenship, illiteracy, school attendance, and dwellings and families, as follows: Table I for the state and counties; Table II for cities of more than 25,000 inhabitants; Table III for cities of 10,000 to 25,000; Table IV for places of 2,500 to 10,000; and Table V for wards of cities of more than 50,000 inhabitants.

A series of summary tables (numbered 1 to 16) reproduces from the general tables the more important state and city totals, and presents also certain additional data relative to state of birth, age, and marital condition.

On account of the wide differences in characteristics among the different classes of the population, the statistics on each subject are shown according to race, and for the whites according to nativity and parentage. Classification according to nativity and parentage is scarcely necessary for the other races, since nearly all negroes and Indians are native born of native parentage, and nearly all Chinese and Japanese either foreign born or of foreign parentage.

The white population is divided into four groups: (1) Native, native parentage—that is, having both parents born in the United States; (2) native, foreign parentage—having both parents born abroad; (3) native, mixed parentage—having one parent native and the other foreign born; (4) foreign born. As the second and third classes do not differ greatly in characteristics, they are combined in some of the tables; in a few cases all three native white classes are combined.

Since marked differences often exist between urban and rural communities with respect to the composition and characteristics of the population, the two classes are distinguished in connection with several of the subjects. Urban population, as defined by the Bureau of the Census, includes that of all incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, the remainder being classified as rural.

The census inquiry as to school attendance was merely as to whether the person enumerated had attended any kind of school at any time between September 1, 1909, and the date of enumeration, April 15, 1910.

The Census Bureau classifies as illiterate any person 10 years of age or over who is unable to write, regardless of ability to read.

Color and nativity (Table 1).—Of the total population of Ohio, 3,033,259, or 63.6 per cent, are native whites of native parentage; 1,024,393, or 21.5 per cent, are native whites of foreign or mixed parentage; 597,245, or 12.5 per cent, are foreign-born whites; and 111,452, or 2.3 per cent, are negroes. The corresponding percentages in 1900 were 63.8, 22.8, 11, and 2.3, respectively, the comparison indicating that changes in the composition of the population during the decade have been slight. In 51 of the 88 counties the percentage of foreign-born whites is less than 5, and in only 15 does it exceed 10, the maximum, 33.6, being that for Cuyahoga, the most populous county. The percentage of native whites of foreign or mixed parentage ranges higher, being less than 5 in only 6 counties, and exceeding 10 in 57. (See maps on page 431.) In 60 counties the population is more than three-fourths native white of native parentage.

Of the urban population, 51 per cent are native whites of native parentage; of the rural, 79.6 per cent. The corresponding proportions for native whites of foreign or mixed parentage are 28 and 13.2 per cent, respectively. The percentage of foreign-born whites is 17.9 in the urban population and 5.7 in the rural; the percentage of negroes is 3.1 in the urban and 1.4 in the rural.

Sex (Tables 2 and 15).—In the total population of the state there are 2,434,758 males and 2,332,363 females, or 104.4 males to 100 females. In 1900 the ratio was 102.3 to 100. Among native whites the ratio is 100.1 to 100; among foreign-born whites, 137.8 to 100. In the urban population there are 102 males to 100 females, and in the rural, 107.5.

State of birth (Tables 3 and 4).—Of the total native population—that is, population born in the United States—85.1 per cent were born in Ohio and 14.9 per cent outside the state; of the native white population, 14 per cent were born outside the state; and of the native negro, 46.6 per cent. Persons born outside the state constitute a larger proportion of the native population in urban than in rural communities.

Foreign nationalities (Tables 5 and 12).—Of the foreign-born white population of Ohio, persons born in Germany represent 29.3 per cent; Hungary, 14.4; Austria, 12.2; Russia, 8.2; England, 7.3; Italy, 7; Ireland, 6.7; Canada, 3.9; Switzerland, 1.8; Scotland, 1.8; all other countries, 7.5 per cent. Of the total white stock of foreign origin, which includes persons born abroad and also natives having one or both parents born abroad, Germany contributed 41.6 per cent; Ireland, 10.3; England, 7.9; Austria, 7.7; Hungary, 7.2; Russia, 4.7; Italy, 3.8; Canada, 3.4; Switzerland, 2.1; Wales, 1.9; Scotland, 1.9 per cent.

Voting and militia ages (Table 6).—The total number of males 21 years of age and over is 1,484,265, representing 31.1 per cent of the population. Of such males, 56.7 per cent are native whites of native parentage, 19.8 per cent native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 20.8 per cent foreign-born whites, and 2.6 per cent negroes. Of the 308,478 foreign-born white males of voting age, 142,465, or 46.2 per cent, are naturalized. Males of militia age—18 to 44—number 1,076,928.

Age (Tables 7, 8, and 13).—Of the total population, 10.1 per cent are under 5 years of age, 18.1 per cent from 5 to 14 years, inclusive, 18.9 per cent from 15 to 24, 30.6 per cent from 25 to 44, and 22.3 per cent 45 years of age and over. The foreign-born white population comprises comparatively few children, only 5.4 per cent of this class being under 15 years of age, while 79.8 per cent, or nearly four-fifths, are 25 years of age and over. Of the native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 52.2 per cent are 25 and over, and of the native whites of native parentage, 47.5 per cent.

The urban population shows a smaller proportion of children than the rural and a larger proportion of persons in the prime of life. Migration to the city explains this at least in part. Of the urban population, 33.7 per cent are from 25 to 44 years of age, inclusive, and of the rural population, 26.6 per cent.

School attendance (Table 9).—The total number of persons of school age—that is, from 6 to 20 years, inclusive—is 1,313,809, of whom 868,578, or 66.1 per cent, attended school. In addition to these, 14,133 children under 6 and 15,377 persons 21 and over attended school. For boys from 6 to 20 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 66.3; for girls, 65.9. For children from 6 to 14 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 89.8. The percentage for children of this age among native whites of native parentage was 90.3; among native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 89.2; among foreign-born whites, 84; and among negroes, 87.2. (See Table I.) There is little difference between urban and rural communities as regards the percentage of school attendance for the ages from 6 to 14, but for persons from 15 to 20 years, inclusive, 26 per cent were reported as attending school in urban communities as against 40.1 per cent in rural.

Illiteracy (Table 10).—There are 124,774 illiterates in the state, representing 3.2 per cent of the total population 10 years of age and over, as compared

with 4 per cent in 1900. The percentage of illiteracy is 11.5 among foreign-born whites, 11.1 among negroes, and 1.5 among native whites.

For all classes combined, the percentage of illiterates is about the same in urban communities as in rural, 3.3 and 3.2, respectively; but for each class separately the rural percentage somewhat exceeds the urban.

For persons from 10 to 20 years of age, inclusive, whose literacy depends largely upon present school facilities and school attendance, the percentage of illiteracy is very slight, 0.9. (See Table I.)

Marital condition (Tables 11 and 14).—In the population 15 years of age and over, 36.1 per cent of the males are single and 28.9 per cent of the females. The percentage married is 58.2 for males and 59.5 for females; and the percentage widowed 4.8 and 10.7, respectively. The percentages of those reported as divorced, 0.6 and 0.7, respectively, are believed to be too small, because of the probability that many divorced persons class themselves as single or widowed.

That the percentage single is smaller for women than for men is due largely to the fact that women marry younger. Thus 8.9 per cent of the females from 15 to 19 years of age are married, as compared with 0.7 per cent of the males, and 47.9 per cent of the females from 20 to 24 years are married, as compared with 23.4 per cent of the males. In the age group, 25 to 34 years, the difference in the percentages is not so great, and in the next age group it practically disappears, while among those 45 and over the percentage married is higher among the males. That there is a larger proportion of widows than of widowers may indicate that men more often remarry than women, but, since husbands are generally older than their wives, the marriage relationship is more often broken by death of the husband than by death of the wife.

For the main elements of the population the percentages of married persons among those 15 years of age and over are as follows: Native whites of native parentage, 57.4 for males and 59.1 for females; native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 54.7 and 55.5, respectively; foreign-born whites, 65.5 and 67.9; negroes, 51.7 and 56.5.

These percentages by no means indicate the relative tendency of the several classes as regards marriage. To determine that, the comparison should be made by age periods, since the proportion married in any class is determined largely by the proportion who have reached the marrying age. Similarly, the proportion widowed depends largely on the proportion past middle life. The percentage married, both for males and for females, is somewhat higher in the rural than in the urban population.

Dwellings and families.—The total number of dwellings in Ohio is 1,024,800, and the total number of families 1,138,165, there being 111.1 families to each 100 dwellings. (See Table I.) The average number of persons per dwelling is 4.7, and the average number per family, 4.2.

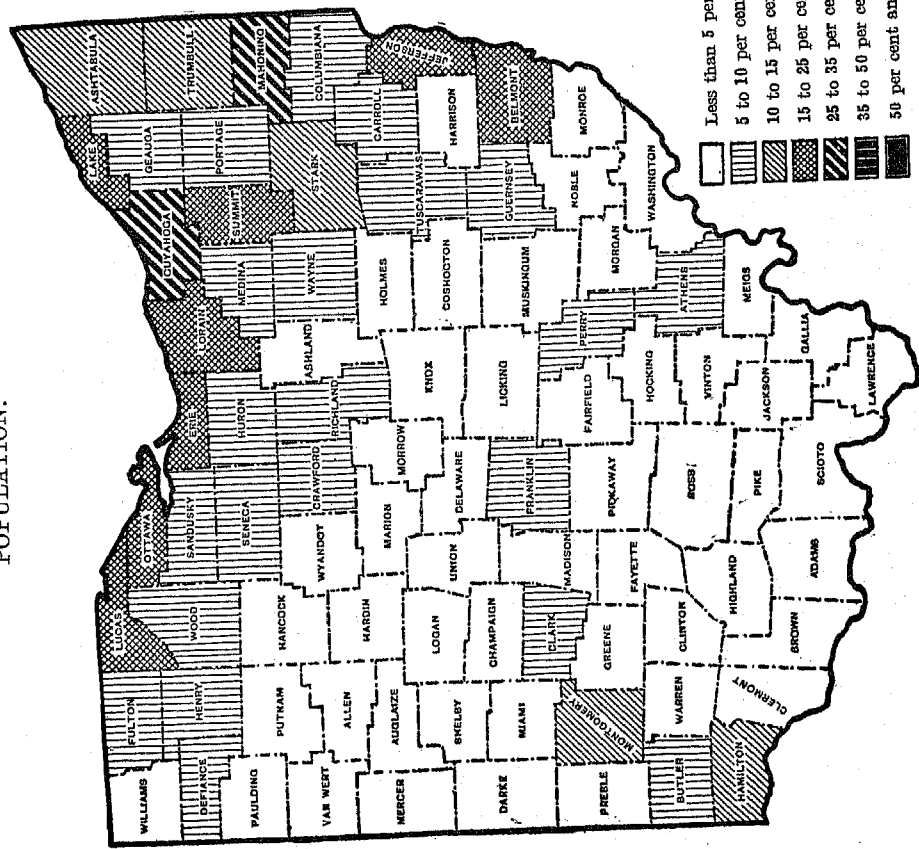

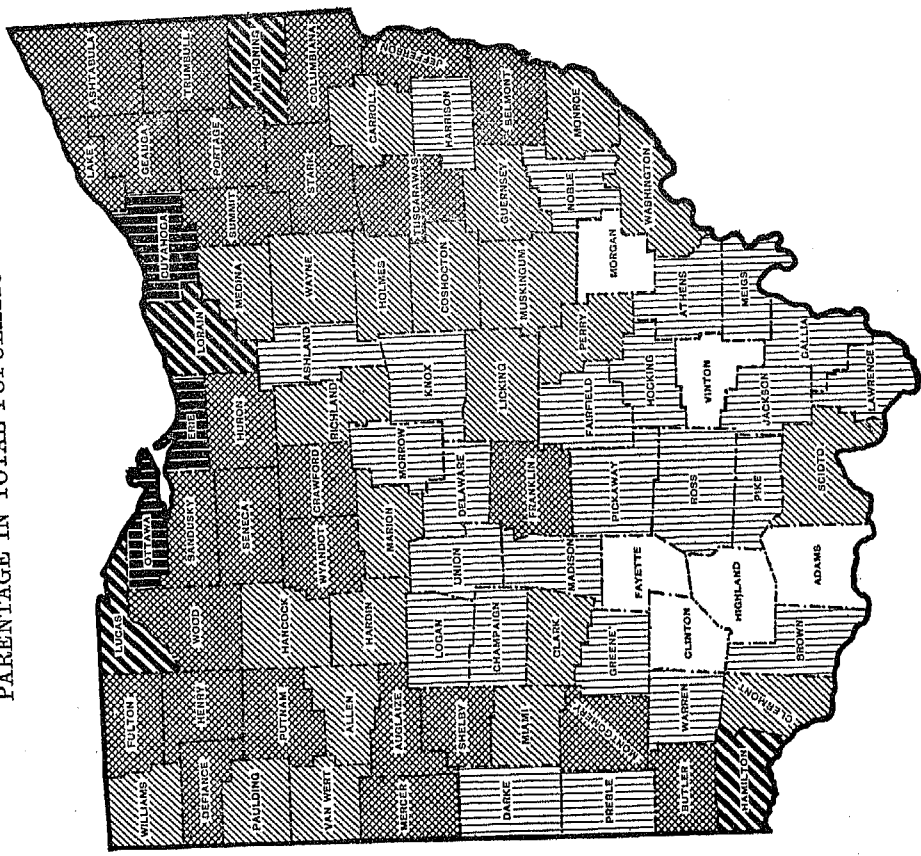

OKLAHOMA.

CHAPTER 1.—NUMBER OF INHABITANTS.

Introduction.—This chapter gives the population of Oklahoma, by counties and minor civil divisions, as enumerated at the Thirteenth Census, taken as of April 15, 1910, with comparative statements of population where possible and a statement and discussion for the state as a whole of the population living in urban and in rural territory. The statistics are given in detail in two general tables.

Table 1 (p. 440) shows the population of Oklahoma, distributed according to counties and minor civil divisions, at the census of 1910, in comparison with similar figures for 1907—in which year a special census of the state was taken by the United States Census Bureau—and, so far as possible, with those of 1900 and 1890. The arrangement of counties and of the primary divisions in each county is alphabetical, with the exception of a few counties in which the arrangement of the primary divisions is partly alphabetical and partly numerical. The changes in boundaries, name, or form of organization that have taken place since 1900 are indicated in the footnotes to the table. For changes between 1890 and 1900 reference must be made to the census report of 1900.

It is to a large extent impossible to give comparative figures for 1900 and 1890. This is chiefly caused by the fact that most of the counties have been organized since 1900 and by the fact that several counties have been redistricted since 1900. Comparative figures for 1907 are not given for a few counties which have been either organized or redistricted since that time.

Table 2 (p. 456) shows the cities and incorporated towns in Oklahoma, alphabetically arranged, with their population in 1910, 1907, and, when possible, in 1900 and 1890.

HISTORICAL NOTE.—The name Oklahoma is of Indian origin and signifies "Home or land of the red man."

The first white man to visit the area of the present state of Oklahoma was the Spanish explorer, De Soto, in 1541.

All but the extreme western part of the region now constituting Oklahoma was originally a portion of the vast Louisiana country, which was ceded by France to Spain in 1762, retroceded to France in 1800, and purchased by the United States in 1803.

The section of Oklahoma included in the Louisiana Purchase belonged, successively, to the district of Louisiana (1804-5), the territory of Louisiana (1805-1812), and the territory of Missouri (1812-1819). The part north of 36° 30' continued in the territory of Missouri until 1834 and from 1834 to 1854 belonged to the Indian Country. The part south of 36° 30', upon the organization of Arkansas territory, in 1819, was included in that territory. In 1824 the western boundary of Arkansas was placed about 40 miles west of where it now stands, and in 1825 it was established at its present location; in each of these years the area west of the new line was transferred to Missouri territory and from 1834 to 1854 was a part of the Indian Country.

In 1854, by the Kansas-Nebraska act, the area of the Indian Country, or Indian Territory, as it was afterwards known, was reduced to that of the present state of Oklahoma exclusive of the three western counties. The area now constituting

The population of Oklahoma, by counties, at each of the last three decennial censuses, namely, those of 1910, 1900, and 1890, and at the special census of 1907; the increase between the last three decennial enumerations and the years 1907 to 1910; the density of the total and the rural population at the census of 1910; and the distribution of the population at the census of 1910 according to urban and rural districts, are given in Table I of Chapter 2.

The tables and text of the present chapter contain few technical expressions whose meaning is not apparent. The census usage in regard to certain terms is, however, explained below:

Density of population.—The density of population of a state or county is obtained by dividing its total population by the number of square miles in its land area. In calculating the density of rural population, the same divisor is used as it is not practicable to ascertain and deduct the exact area covered by the urban districts, and even if this could be done with accuracy the deduction of this area from the total land area would ordinarily make no appreciable difference in the resulting quotient.

Minor civil divisions.—The counties are divided generally into smaller political units which bear different designations in the different parts of the country, such as towns, townships, election precincts, etc. Of these minor civil divisions those which rank next to the county as geographic areas are termed primary divisions. In many instances, however, these primary divisions contain political units of still smaller area, such as cities, incorporated villages, towns, or boroughs. These smaller political units are referred to as secondary divisions.

Urban and rural population defined.—The Census Bureau, for purposes of discussion, has defined urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside of such incorporated places.

The comparisons of the urban and rural population in 1910 with that at earlier enumerations may be made either with respect to the varying proportions of the two classes at successive enumera-

these three counties was a part of the Spanish possessions till 1821, of Mexico from 1821 to 1836, and of Texas from 1836 to 1850. Thereafter it remained unorganized until 1890, when Oklahoma territory was formed, but it was included in Indian Territory in 1889. Indian Territory had no organized territorial government, as had other territories of the United States, but the Five Civilized Tribes had their own forms of local self-government.

By Presidential proclamation of March 23, 1889, certain lands in the central part of Indian Territory, known as Oklahoma, were thrown open for settlement on April 22 of that year. No organized government was provided, however, until May 2, 1890, when Congress passed an act establishing the territory of Oklahoma. In September, 1893, the Cherokee Outlet, also called the Cherokee Strip, was made a part of Oklahoma. The new territory was then bounded on the north by Kansas and Colorado, on the west by New Mexico and Texas, and on the south in part by Texas. The remainder of its southern and all of its eastern boundary were formed by an irregular line extending from the intersection of the ninety-eighth meridian and the Red River on the south to that of the ninety-sixth meridian and the Kansas boundary on the north. Sections of Oklahoma were thrown open for settlement at various dates, and the population of the territory rapidly increased.

In June, 1906, Congress passed an act to enable Oklahoma and Indian Territory to form a state government and in November, 1907, Oklahoma, with boundaries as at present, became a state of the Union.

tions or with respect to the increase between enumerations. In order to contrast the *proportion* of the total population living in urban or rural territory at the census of 1910 with the proportion urban or rural at the preceding census, it is necessary to classify the territory according to the conditions as they existed at each census. In this comparison a place having less than 2,500 inhabitants in 1900 and over 2,500 in 1910 is classed with the rural population for 1900 and with the urban for 1910. On the other hand, in order to present fairly the contrast between urban and rural communities, as regards their *rate of growth*, it is necessary to consider the changes in population for the *same* territory which have

occurred from one decennial census to another. For this purpose the territory which in 1910 was urban or rural, as the case may be, is taken as the basis, and the population in 1900 for the same territory (so far as separately reported at that census) is presented, even though part of the territory may, on the basis of its population at the earlier census, have then been in a different class. This avoids the disturbing effect on comparisons which would arise from the passage, for example, of communities formerly classed as rural into the urban group. These two distinct forms of comparison are made in the tables shown on pages 436 and 437 for the state as a whole for the last two decennial censuses.

TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the state.—The population of Oklahoma is 1,657,155. Compared with a population, for the same area, of 1,414,177 in 1907 and 790,391 in 1900, this represents an increase since the census of 1907 of 242,978, and during the last decade of 866,764, or 109.7 per cent. During the last decade the total population of the United States increased 21 per cent. The percentage of growth of Oklahoma during this decade was much slower than during the preceding decade, 1890–1900, when the rate was 205.6

per cent, but the actual number added to the population was greater in the later decade.

The following table shows the population of the territory now comprising the state of Oklahoma at the last three decennial censuses, namely, those of 1890, 1900, and 1910, and at the special census of 1907, together with the increase and per cent of increase during the periods between each decennial enumeration, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole.

Oklahoma was organized as a territory in 1890, and appears in the Federal census reports for the first time in that year. In 1907 Indian Territory and Oklahoma were admitted to the Union as the state of Oklahoma. During the first decade, 1890–1900, the growth of the territory which now comprises the state of Oklahoma was very rapid, its population increasing over three times, while during the last decade, 1900–1910, the population a little more than doubled. During the first seven years of the last decade the average yearly increase was 89,112, while during the last three years the corresponding increase was 80,993. The population of the state in 1910 was more than six times as large as the population of the same area in 1890, while the population of the United States in 1910 was nearly one and one-half times that in 1890. The rate of increase in the population of Oklahoma during the decade 1890–1900 was nearly ten times that for the United States, and during the last decade, 1900–1910, a little more than five times.

Principal cities.—Oklahoma has 105 cities, of which Oklahoma City, the largest, has a population of 64,205,

and Muskogee and Tulsa, the second and third cities in the state, a population of 25,278 and 18,182, respectively. Enid, McAlester, Shawnee, Guthrie, and Chickasha are the other cities in the state having over 10,000 inhabitants each. There are also 6 cities having from 5,000 to 10,000, 32 having from 2,500 to 5,000, and 59 having less than 2,500 inhabitants.

Table 2 shows the population in 1910 of all the cities of the state with comparative figures, where possible, for 1907, 1900, and 1890. The table on page 435 shows the population of the eight cities having in 1910 over 10,000 inhabitants, as reported at each census since their incorporation either as cities or towns, so far as figures are available, together with the increase during the periods between decennial enumerations.

Since land in this state has been opened for settlement there has been an enormous increase in population. All the cities, with the exception of one, shown in the next table have increased over 200 per cent in population during the last decade. Tulsa, Oklahoma City, and Muskogee show the highest rates of increase, while Guthrie shows a comparatively low rate.

Counties.—Oklahoma has 76 counties. The population of these counties ranges from 4,553 in Cimarron County to 85,232 in Oklahoma County. For most counties comparisons with the 1910 figures can be made only for 1907, as Indian Territory was returned by nations and reservations in 1900; the changes during the period of three years are, of course, much less than during a ten-year period.

The following territorial changes have been made in the counties of Oklahoma since 1907: Part of Beckham was annexed in 1910 to Greer; part of Wagoner was annexed in 1909 to Tulsa; and part of Greer was taken in 1909 to form Harmon. The county of Swanson was created August 13, 1910, from parts of Kiowa and Comanche Counties. The Supreme Court of Oklahoma, on August 9, 1911, rendered a decision that the creation of Swanson County was illegal and dissolved the county, and the territory embraced in Swanson County has reverted to the parent counties.

Owing to the organization since 1907 of one new county from part of another county, as shown above, the comparison of increase or decrease in population from 1907 to 1910 is made for only 74 counties and one combination of counties. The combination of counties is Greer with Harmon. In order to determine the actual rate of increase for these counties, it is necessary to add the population of the new county to that of the old county from which it was formed. Sixty-six counties and the one combination of counties increased in population during the years from 1907 to 1910, while 8 counties decreased in population. The rates of increase for the 66 counties that show increases range from seven-tenths of 1 per cent in Pottawatomie County to 61.3 per cent in Tulsa County, and the absolute increases of the same group of counties range from 100 in Harper County to 29,383 in Oklahoma County. The combined counties of Greer and

Harmon increased 4,153, or 17.6 per cent in population. The rates of decrease for the 8 counties showing a decrease in population range from 2.9 per cent in Roger Mills County to 23.2 per cent in Cimarron County, and the absolute decreases range from 378 in Roger Mills County to 2,514 in Lincoln County. The aggregate increase of population from 1907 to 1910 in the one combination of counties and in the 66 counties that showed increases was 254,848; the aggregate decrease of population in the 8 counties that showed decreases was 11,870. The difference, 242,978, is, of course, the total increase of population in the state from 1907 to 1910.

The map on page 438 shows the increase or decrease in the total population of each county of Oklahoma during the period from 1907 to 1910. In the counties shown in white the population decreased; for the other counties the different rates of increase are indicated by differences in shading.

Density of population.—The total land area of the state is 69,414 square miles. The average number of persons to the square mile in 1910 was 23.9; for the same area in 1900 and 1890 it was 11.4 and 3.7, respectively. The average number per square mile for the United States as a whole in 1910 was 30.9.

The density of population is given by counties in Table I of Chapter 2 and in the maps on page 439, both for the entire population and for that living in rural territory, excluding in the latter case the population of places of 2,500 or more, but not excluding the land area of such places.

Osage County, with 2,277 square miles, has the largest area, and Marshall County, with 419 square miles, has the smallest area. Oklahoma County, containing Oklahoma City, has the highest density of any county, namely, 118.9 persons per square mile, while Cimarron County, with 2.5 persons per square mile, has the lowest density.

Minor civil divisions.—The political divisions into which counties are subdivided are collectively termed "Minor civil divisions." In Oklahoma the counties are divided into 1,280 primary divisions, comprising 892 townships, 101 cities, and 287 towns. There are also 4 secondary divisions, comprising that number of cities, each of which is coextensive with the township in which it is located. Besides these minor civil divisions there is one military reservation in the state.

Urban and rural population compared.—The following table presents the population of the territory which now comprises the state of Oklahoma at the decennial censuses of 1910, 1900, and 1890, and at the special census of 1907, respectively, distributed among cities and towns grouped according to specified limits of population, together with the percentage of the total population contained in each group at each of the censuses named. The classification is based upon the population of each place as it existed at each census.

As shown by the above table, the urban territory of the state in 1910—that is, cities of 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 320,155 inhabitants, or 19.3 per cent of the total population, while 1,337,000 inhabitants, or 80.7 per cent, lived in rural territory. The urban territory as it existed in 1900—that is, the cities then having 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 58,417 inhabitants, or 7.4 per cent of the total population, while 731,974 inhabitants, or 92.6 per cent, lived in rural territory. There has thus been a large increase in the proportion of urban population since 1900. For the United States as a whole the urban population constituted 46.3 per cent of the total population in 1910 and 40.5 per cent of the total population in 1900.

In 1910 the two cities then having more than 25,000 inhabitants each, Oklahoma City and Muskogee, contained 5.4 per cent of the total population of the state. The combined population of the groups of urban places having less than 25,000 inhabitants each comprised 13.9, 7.4, and 3.7 per cent of the total population of the state at the censuses of 1910, 1900, and 1890, respectively.

The urban population of the state is distributed among 46 cities, while the rural population is in 346 incorporated places of less than 2,500 inhabitants each and in the unincorporated territory. The 346 places of less than 2,500 inhabitants each have an aggregate population of 230,587, representing 13.9 per cent of the total population of the state. These places comprise 71 having from 1,000 to 2,500 inhabitants

each, with a combined population of 108,650; 92 having from 500 to 1,000 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 64,702; and 183 having less than 500 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 57,235. The population living in unincorporated territory represents 66.8 per cent of the total.

The above table shows further that in all incorporated places, including those of less than 2,500 inhabitants, there was in 1910 a population of 550,742, or 33.2 per cent of the population of the state. The population of all incorporated places, as they existed in 1900, was 141,673, or 17.9 per cent of the population of the state.

In order to compare the *rate of growth* in urban and rural communities it is necessary in each case, as previously explained, to consider the changes in population which have occurred in the *same* territory from one census to another. With this end in view places classed as urban or rural according to their population in 1910 are taken as a basis and the aggregate population in 1910 and in 1900 of the same places is then compared. Thus, as shown in the table on page 437, the total population in 1910 of those cities which at that time had 2,500 inhabitants or more was 320,155; in 1900 the total population of these same places (so far as separately reported) was 89,148. It may be noted that the latter figure exceeds the total population in 1900 of those cities which at that time had over 2,500 inhabitants each, 58,417 (see above table), by 30,731. The difference is the result of the passage, since 1900, of certain communities from the rural to the urban

class, and of annexations of territory during the same period.

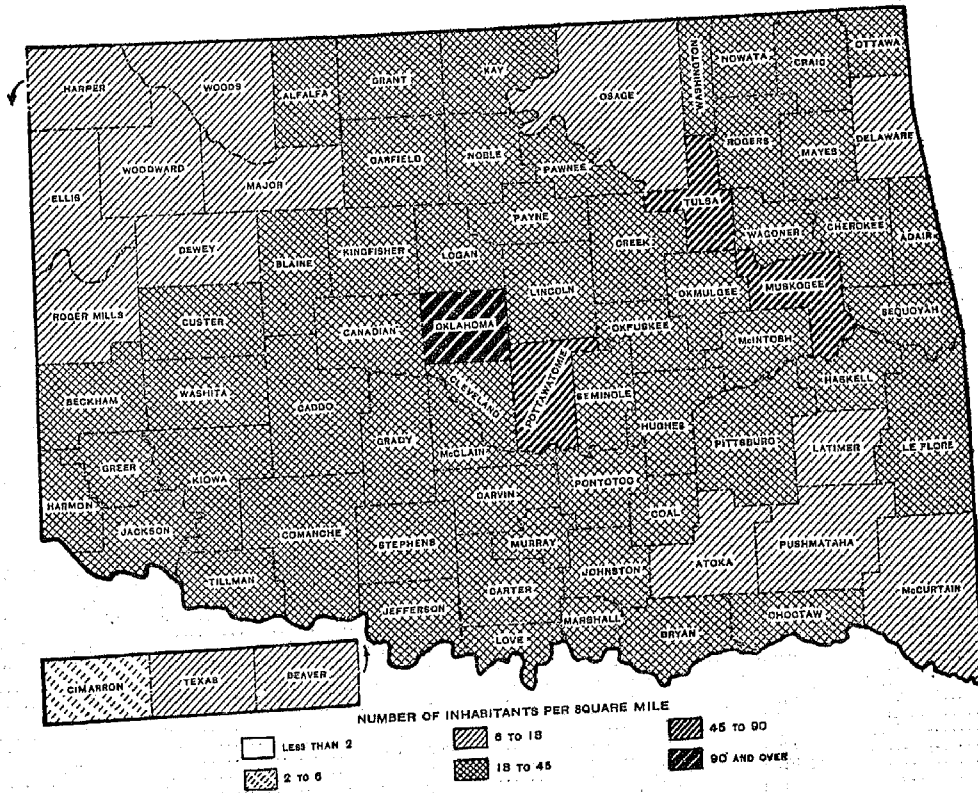

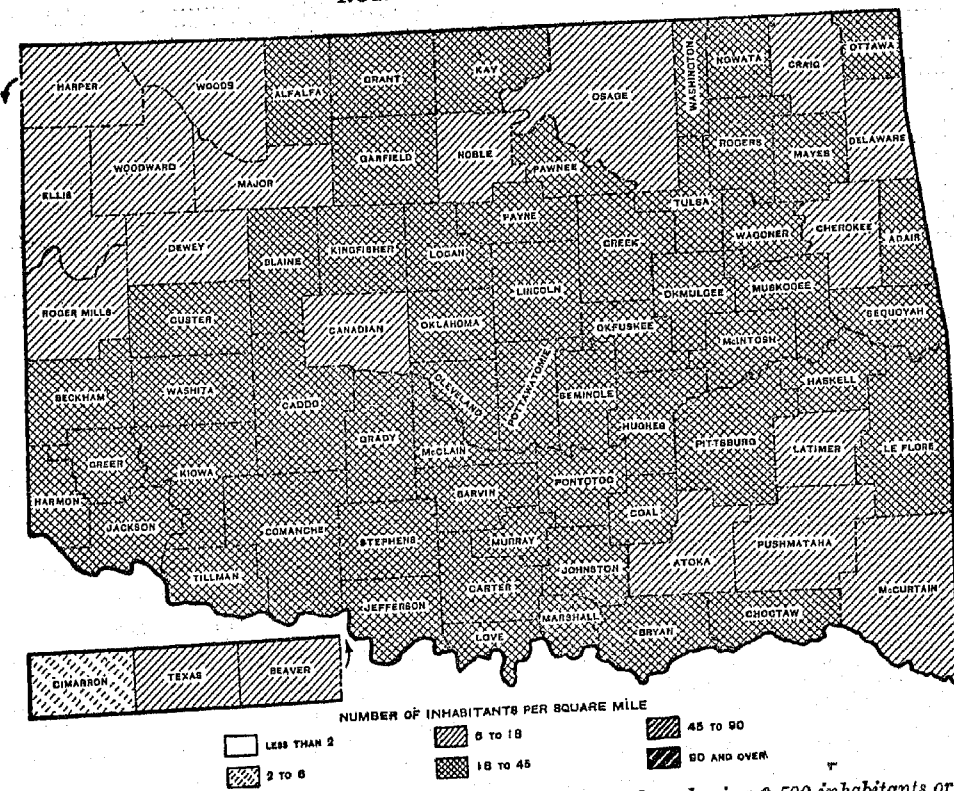
A comparison of the total population in 1910 of cities having a population of not less than 2,500 each with the total population of the same places in 1900, as given in the preceding table, shows an increase of 259.1 per cent. This represents the rate of growth of urban communities as thus defined. During the same period the rural population, comprising that of the remainder of the state, increased 90.7 per cent. The population of urban areas thus increased nearly three times as fast as rural. For the United States as a whole urban population increased 34.8 per cent in the last decade and rural population 11.2 per cent.

It also appears from this table that the group of cities having over 25,000 inhabitants increased in population more than two and one-half times as rapidly as the group having from 2,500 to 25,000 inhabitants.

CHAPTER 2.—COMPOSITION AND CHARACTERISTICS OF THE POPULATION.

Introduction.—The first chapter having given the number of inhabitants of Oklahoma by counties and minor civil divisions, the decennial increase and the density of population, and the proportions urban and rural, the present chapter deals with the composition and characteristics of the population. The two chapters cover all the principal topics of the population census except occupations and ownership of homes.

Description of the tables.—The greater part of this chapter consists of five general tables, which present statistics of color, nativity, parentage, sex, citizenship, illiteracy, school attendance, and dwellings and families, as follows: Table I for the state and counties; Table II for the two cities of more than 25,000 inhabitants; Table III for cities of 10,000 to 25,000; Table IV for cities of 2,500 to 10,000; and Table V for wards of Oklahoma City, the only city of more than 50,000 inhabitants.

A series of summary tables (numbered 1 to 14) reproduces from the general tables the more important state and city totals, and presents also certain additional data relative to state of birth, age, and marital condition.

On account of the wide differences in characteristics among the different classes of the population, the statistics on each subject are shown according to race, and for the whites according to nativity and parentage. Classification according to nativity and parentage is scarcely necessary for the other races, since nearly all negroes and Indians are native born of native parentage, and nearly all Chinese and Japanese are either foreign born or of foreign parentage.

The white population is divided into four groups: (1) Native, native parentage—that is, having both parents born in the United States; (2) native, foreign parentage—having both parents born abroad; (3) native, mixed parentage—having one parent native and the other foreign born; (4) foreign born. As the second and third classes do not differ greatly in characteristics, they are combined in some of the tables; in a few cases all three native white classes are combined.

Since marked differences often exist between urban and rural communities with respect to the composition and characteristics of the population, the two classes are distinguished in connection with several of the subjects. Urban population, as defined by the Bureau of the Census, includes that of all incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, the remainder being classified as rural.

The census inquiry as to school attendance was merely as to whether the person enumerated had

attended any kind of school at any time between September 1, 1909, and the date of enumeration, April 15, 1910.

The Census Bureau classifies as illiterate any person 10 years of age or over who is unable to write, regardless of ability to read.

Color and nativity (Table 1).—Of the total population of Oklahoma, 1,444,531, or 87.2 per cent, are whites; 137,612, or 8.3 per cent, are negroes; and 74,825, or 4.5 per cent, are Indians. The corresponding percentages in 1900 were 84.8, 7, and 8.2. In 62 of the 76 counties negroes constitute less than 12.5 per cent of the population, in 8 counties they constitute from 12.5 to 25 per cent, and in 6 the proportion exceeds one-fourth. (See map on page 465.)

Native whites of native parentage constitute 79.1 per cent of the total population of the state, and 90.7 per cent of the white population. Native whites of foreign or mixed parentage constitute only 5.7 per cent of the total population, and foreign-born whites 2.4 per cent.

Of the urban population, 76 per cent are native whites of native parentage; of the rural, 79.8 per cent. The corresponding proportions for native whites of foreign or mixed parentage are 7.5 and 5.2 per cent, respectively; for foreign-born whites, 3.6 and 2.1. The percentage of negroes is 11.6 in the urban population and 7.5 in the rural; of Indians, 1.4 and 5.3, respectively.

Sex (Table 2).—In the total population of the state there are 881,578 males and 775,577 females, or 113.7 males to 100 females. In 1900 the ratio was 115.3 to 100. Among the whites there are 114.7 males to 100 females; among the negroes, 109.5. Among native whites the ratio is 113.3 to 100, as compared with 178.1 to 100 for the foreign-born whites. Among Indians the ratio is 101.5 to 100. In the urban population there are 114.6 males to 100 females, and in the rural, 113.4.

State of birth (Tables 3 and 4).—Of the total native population—that is, population born in the United States—31.9 per cent were born in Oklahoma, and 68.1 per cent outside the state; of the native white population, 71.3 per cent were born outside the state; of the native negro, 66.6 per cent; and of the native Indian, 11.4 per cent. Persons born outside the state constitute a larger proportion of the native population in urban than in rural communities.

Foreign nationalities (Table 5).—Of the foreign-born white population of Oklahoma, persons born in Germany represent 25.2 per cent; Russia, 14.5; Austria, 9.7; England, 7.4; Canada, 7.1; Mexico, 6.6; Italy, 6.4; Ireland, 4.5; Scotland, 3; all other coun-

tries, 15.8 per cent. Of the total white stock of foreign origin, which includes persons born abroad and also natives having one or both parents born abroad, Germany contributed 31.2 per cent; Russia, 10.9; England, 10.1; Ireland, 8.9; Canada, 7.4; Austria, 6.6; Scotland, 3.4; Italy, 3; Mexico, 2.3; Sweden, 2.3.

Voting and militia ages (Table 6).—The total number of males 21 years of age and over is 447,266, representing 27 per cent of the population. Of such males, 88.4 per cent are whites, 8.2 per cent negroes, and 3.3 per cent Indians. Native whites represent 83.1 per cent of the total number and foreign-born whites 5.3 per cent. Of the 23,551 foreign-born white males of voting age, 12,074, or 51.3 per cent, are naturalized. Males of militia age—18 to 44—number 357,933.

Age (Tables 7, 8, and 12).—Of the total population, 14.6 per cent are under 5 years of age, 24.3 per cent from 5 to 14 years, inclusive, 20.1 per cent from 15 to 24, 26.6 per cent from 25 to 44, and 14.2 per cent 45 years of age and over. The foreign-born white population comprises comparatively few children, only 4.7 per cent of this class being under 15 years of age, while more than five-sixths (83.9 per cent) are 25 years of age and over. The negro population comprises a somewhat smaller proportion of children under 5 than the native white population of native parentage.

The urban population shows a smaller proportion of children than the rural and a larger proportion of persons in the prime of life. Migration to the city explains this at least in part. Of the urban population, 34.1 per cent are from 25 to 44 years of age, inclusive, and of the rural population, 24.8 per cent.

School attendance (Table 9).—The total number of persons of school age—that is, from 6 to 20 years, inclusive—is 566,323, of whom 383,816, or 67.8 per cent, attended school. In addition to these, 5,249 children under 6 and 5,136 persons 21 and over attended school. For boys from 6 to 20 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 68.1; for girls, 67.4. For children from 6 to 14 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 81.3. The percentage for children of this age among native whites of foreign or mixed parentage was 85.5; among native whites of native parentage, 82.2; among foreign-born whites, 75.8; among negroes, 76.5; and among Indians, 73. (See Table I.) In urban communities the percentage of children of that age attending school was 83.3, and in rural, 81.

Illiteracy (Table 10).—There are 67,567 illiterates in the state, representing 5.6 per cent of the total population 10 years of age and over, as compared with 12.1 per cent in 1900. The percentage of illiteracy is 17.7 among negroes, 9.8 among foreign-born whites, and 3.3 among native whites. It is 3.5 for native whites of native parentage, and 1.3 for native whites of foreign or mixed parentage.

For all classes combined, the percentage of illiteracy is 2.6 in the urban population, and 6.5 in the rural.

The rural percentage exceeds the urban for each class of the population, except the foreign-born whites, most of whom when they arrive in this country are past the school age. Among them the percentage of illiteracy is practically the same in the urban as in the rural population.

For persons from 10 to 20 years of age, inclusive, whose literacy depends largely upon present school facilities and school attendance, the percentage of illiteracy is 3. (See Table I.)

Marital condition (Tables 11 and 13).—In the population 15 years of age and over, 35.7 per cent of the males are single and 21.9 per cent of the females. The percentage married is 58.2 for males and 69.3 for females; and the percentage widowed, 4.8 and 7.9, respectively. The percentage of those reported as divorced, 0.6, both for the males and the females, is believed to be too small, because of the probability that many divorced persons class themselves as single or widowed.

That the percentage single is so much smaller for women than for men is due partly to the excess of males in the total population, and partly to the fact that women marry younger. Thus 21.8 per cent of the females from 15 to 19 years of age are married, as compared with 1.8 per cent of the males, and 68.9 per cent of the females from 20 to 24 years are married, as compared with 31.6 per cent of the males. In the next age group, 25 to 34 years, the percentages are 87.5 and 70.4, respectively, the difference between the percentages being less marked in the older age groups. That there is a larger proportion of widows than of widowers may indicate that men more often remarry than women, but, since husbands are generally older than their wives, the marriage relationship is more often broken by death of the husband than by death of the wife.

For the main elements of the population the percentages of married persons among those 15 years of age and over are as follows: Foreign-born whites, 62.8 for males, 79.2 for females; native whites of native parentage, 58.5 and 70, respectively; native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 55.1 and 66.6; negroes, 55.5 and 64; Indians, 58.4 and 63.7.

These percentages by no means indicate the relative tendency of the several classes as regards marriage. To determine that, the comparison should be made by age periods since the proportion married in any class is determined largely by the proportion who have reached the marrying age. Similarly, the proportion widowed depends largely on the proportion past middle life. The percentage married, both for males and for females, is higher in rural than in urban communities.

Dwellings and families.—The total number of dwellings in Oklahoma is 342,488, and the total number of families 351,167, indicating that in comparatively few cases does more than one family occupy a dwelling. (See Table I.) The average number of persons per dwelling is 4.8, and the average number per family, 4.7.

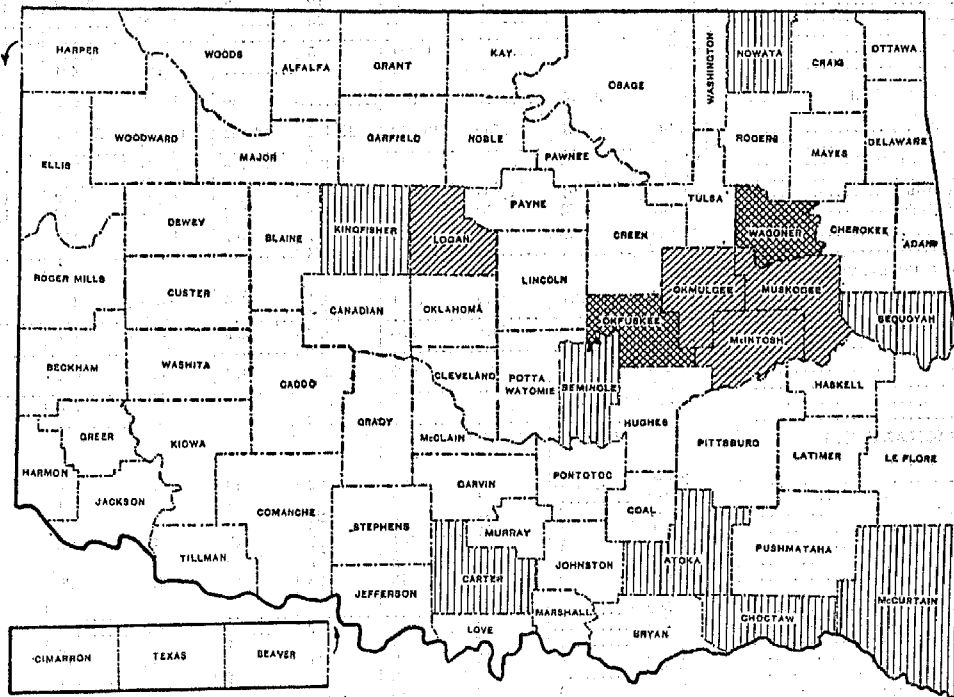
