The Proclamation is one of the most important documents in Queensland's history. It declared Queensland a separate colony from New South Wales when it was read to an assembled crowd on 10 December 1859.

Around 4000 people lined Brisbane's streets to celebrate the historic occasion. Moreton Bay district residents were jubilant Queen Victoria had responded to their petitions requesting separation and had approved the establishment of Queensland's own representative government.

Sir George Ferguson Bowen was sworn in as Queensland's first Governor, empowered to make laws and provide for the administration of justice.

He was accompanied from England by Robert Herbert, whom he had personally selected to fulfil the role of Colonial Secretary. This was the forerunner to the position of Premier of Queensland.

The Proclamation is one of the principal documents held by Queensland State Archives, the custodian of the largest and most significant documentary heritage collection in the state.


