








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New Town Mayor

Councillor Alan O'Sullivan—Town Mayor

My name is Alan O'Sullivan, 58 years of age, and I live with my wife, Valerie in Barton on Sea. Being a local retailer, I am concerned for the development of the town centre and am pleased with the completion of the new pavements at the southern end which saw numerous accidents due to its previous poor state of repair. I expect to see the market expanding to the north side of Station Road and maybe the pedestrianisation of the whole of Station Road south as a traffic free area to improve the environment for shoppers.

Chairman's cash boost for local charities

He added that, though the Council, through the grant-making process, awards significant sums to local charities, voluntary and community groups and to organisations such as the Citizens Advice Bureau, he was especially pleased to make contributions to the work of Oakhaven Hospice and First Opportunities.

New Milton Town Council has recognised Ted Horne by voting him Citizen of the Year 2009. Mr Horne is an 87-year old ex— New Scotland Yard policemen who in the 1980's moved to Grove Road, Barton-on-Sea. Ted has served with many police forces, in 1941 he joined the police force in Palestine until 1946 when he joined the Metropolitan Police. Rising through the ranks over a period of 28 years, Ted reached the rank of Detective Inspector. Ted moved to Barton-on-Sea in 1980 and became involved with the Citizens Advice Bureau as manager. However, this was not just the extent of Ted's community service as he is also greatly involved with the Royal British Legion serving as President, involved with the Poppy Appeal and as long term Remembrance Day marshal. In the 1990's Ted joined the Royal National Lifeboat Institution as chairman of the local branch.

The Citizen of the Year award was presented by Cllr John Hutchins at the Annual Towns Meeting on April 15th 2009. Mr Horne kindly thanked all those who had nominated him for the award and accepted the award not just for himself but also for the people who have worked with him in community projects over the last 25 years. A seat dedicated to Edward Horne has been placed next to the new Mosaics at Mallard Court, Station Road with the text "Edward Horne BEM, President, local branches of Neighbourcare, Royal British Legion and Chairman of RNLI"

CCTV cameras are coming

Great news for residents, CCTV cameras are due to be installed in September and operational by October. They will be painted green to blend in with the current street colour scheme.

The existing Safer Neighbourhoods team make every effort to provide a visible presence on the streets of New Milton and the surrounding areas. However, on some occasions outside influences and crime investigations dictate where and when they are able to patrol.

A police officer or police community support officer's time is often taken up doing things that do not always gain headlines such as visiting victims of crime to offer reassurance, intelligence gathering, crime prevention, and iting youth and other social groups. All of these are essential parts of policing communities but often out of the public eye.

The local police do their best to provide regular Street Meets and Beat Surgeries to meet up with the community and offer the opportunity for residents to voice their concerns. They will vary the times that these events are held, but please remember you can contact the local police at any time on 0845 045 45, asking for New Milton police station. If someone is in the station they will speak to you straight away, otherwise just leave a message and they will get back to you as soon as possible. Regardless of whether they are seen out and about or not, there are always police officers patrolling our area 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to make our neighbourhood a safer place in which to live and work.





The ASBOC Café Project

Great news for New Milton Youth as the ASBOC Cafe Project is nearing completion and should be opening sometime this autumn! In 2004, a trio received Anti Social Behavioural Orders, but wishing to give something back to the community they formed a partnership with Action For Youth and the collective thoughts of the trio and Action For Youth lead to the establishing of a youth café. The ASBOC committee was formed and more youths became involved with the project and have been working since 2005 to ensure the opening of a cafe.

In 2007, New Milton Town Council and New Forest District Council Crime & Disorder Portfolio holder Councillor Goff Beck identified a suitable site on the recreation ground. It wasn't long before planning applications were made and approved by the District Council. Most recently the unit has been split into two and the Council handed over the keys to ASBOC in August 2009. The Cafe will officially open for all youths and an open day will take place on the Recreation Ground shortly



We hope the ASBOC open day is a great success and wish them the best of luck.

Arnewood Youth Council

This third Joint Meeting of Representatives was held at the Arnewood School between 6 Town Councilors, 7 students and the Deputy Head-teacher of Arnewood School with the Assistant Town Clerk and Chair of School Governors in attendance. A range of issues was discussed including:

- Update on situation with empty shop premises within the town centre
- Suggested communication methods for the two parties
- Planned civic events for the town and the method used to advertise them

The newly-elected Chairman / Mayor of the Town Council, Cllr Alan O'Sullivan, welcomed all those attending and ran through the notes of the last meeting held on 4 March 2009 for any matters arising.

The Town Council I.T. support representative gave a presentation of Twitter, a suggested form of communication between the Council and the School. The students suggested using Facebook or a similar networking site, however there were likely to be access difficulties due to the school's firewall (filter) and Data Protection issues. After some discussion it was suggested that a Forum be set up, by invitation of each individual's school numeric email address. On request of the Deputy Head Teacher, the Town Council I.T. support representative will liaise with the School I.T. section to implement the forum.

On the issue of the town becoming 'greener', the recent change of Christmas lights to LED was welcomed, and any new equipment/vehicle change would encompass better energy efficiency. There followed a discussion on a proposed new cycle path from the roundabout at the end of Gore Road running to the School, and parking/congestion issues along First Marine Avenue in the summer.

It was highlighted that a history exhibition would be running in one of the empty shops between 8-31 July. Other events in the town include a Fun Day at the Recreation Ground on 11 July, and Pedal Car race on 12 July. The Deputy Head Teacher said the school could publicise Town Council events. Some students would like to see more events held on the Recreation Ground, such as a food festival similar to that recently held in Christchurch.

Of all the facilities suggested, the students were in agreement that a cinema would be most welcome in the town, as younger students were not yet able to socialise in the cinemas within larger towns. Although Forest Arts Centre show films, it was felt these were not current enough to compete with cinemas at Bournemouth etc. Venues for live music and ten-pin bowling were also discussed. Some students had recently attended a film workshop so could make a tape of suggested facilities for the town.

The Chairman suggested that Councillors may wish to volunteer in turn, visiting tutor groups once a month, to widen communications with students. Attendance at year group meetings, or the 'Speakeasy' sessions on a Friday would be useful. It was also suggested that nameplates be introduced at the next meeting to help foster closer working relationships between all attendees.



- Most car drivers could be travelling a lot further on a tank of fuel. No new car is required just a change to smarter driving. Try these tips:
- Shift up the gears earlier (between 2000 and 2500rpm). Cruising comfortably in 5th gear is the best place to be.
- Cut your top speed. Wind resistance increases significantly with speed. The optimum speed for fuel efficiency is 45-50mph.
- Avoid unnecessary braking by anticipating the traffic ahead. Fluid motion is better than stop start.
- When slowing down, stay in gear and take your foot off the accelerator as early as possible. This reduces fuel consumption to near zero.
- Plan your route to avoid congestion or getting lost.
