Christopher Weait

(bassoon, panel discussion) has been an IDRS member since early '70's, Vice-President ('75-'77), and Host of 5th Meeting in Toronto, Canada, the first outside the US. He is Professor of bassoon Ohio State University since '84, and was elected Distinguished Teacher of the Year by students in 2000. Before Ohio State, he was one of two principal bassoonists in the Toronto Symphony for 17 years under music directors Seiji Ozawa, Karel Ancerl and Andrew Davis. He has been a soloist on tour with the Toronto Symphony, Chamber Symphony of Philadelphia and Keith Brion and his New Sousa Band. Also he performed with L'Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal, National Arts Centre Orchestra, the Columbus Symphony and the Cleveland Orchestra, Has taught at Eastman School of Music (Visiting Professor, '81), Indiana University (Visiting Professor, '85), National Youth Orchestra of Canada and Buenos Aires International Music Festival in Argentina. He conducted the Central Ohio Symphony Orchestra for ten years and was appointed Conductor Laureate in 2000. He is the author of Bassoon Reed Making: a Basic Technique, now in 3rd edition (McGinnis and Marx), and Bassoon Warmups (Emerson). Other publications include a ground breaking report on vibrato, numerous compositions and performance editions of Schubert's Wind Octet, D. 72, and Fasch's Concerto for Three Wind Bands. Recent compact discs include Telemann for Bassoon (d'Note) and the

collaborative Bassoon with a View (Innova). His chamber recordings are on the Crystal and CBC labels. As founder and director of the Toronto Chamber Winds he supervised notable recordings of the Mozart wind serenades. His recordings were twice nominated for Juno Awards in Canada. Mark Weiger

(oboe) is Professor of Music teaching oboe and chamber music at the University of Iowa. Mr. Weiger received his degrees from the New England Conservatory of Music and the Juilliard School. Since coming to Iowa in 1988 he has performed as a soloist throughout the United States, Canada, England, Mexico, Brazil, Austria, France, and Italy. He presented two Carnegie Hall recitals, has been a finalist in nine international competitions, was the Second Prize winner in the New York International Oboe Competition and the First Prize winner in the Queens Philharmonic Concerto competition (NY). He performed double concerts with the Chicago Symphony's Principal Oboist, Ray Still, and presented solo recitals with such

notables as Ronald Roseman, Marc Fink, and Bert Lucarelli. In 1996-97, Mr. Weiger was the first solo oboist to serve as an Artistic Ambassador. As such, he has performed in Israel, Jordan, Pakistan, India, Greece, Nepal, and Sri Lanka. In 1998 his CD Oboe on Road was released through Crystal Records. His CDs Romantic Melodies for Oboe and The Devil's Tongue (featuring works that employ double and triple tonguing, and circular breathing) will be also released on Crystal Records. Mr. Weiger can also be heard on CRS, Capston, Eroica, and Green Mountain Records. He is a founding member of the double reed quartet Wizards! Which has released three CDs to critical acclaim, toured 18 states, and has presented educational residency programs in Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, Illinois, and Wyoming. Mr. Weiger is published through Schirmer Press, Simon & Schuster, the Double Reed Journal, Band Director's Guide, Bocal Music, and Conners Publications. His publication for *Teaching* Woodwinds has been reviewed as "a most significant contribution to the world of oboe playing and teaching." (Saturday, 3:30 pm, FT)



(bassoon) is Principal Bassoonist with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra and Professor of Bassoon at the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. A native of western Kentucky, Mr. Winstead began his musical training as a pianist and composer before taking up the study of several wind instruments. He later received degrees in bassoon from the Curtis Institute of Music and in theory and composition from West Virginia University. At age twenty-two Mr. Winstead first performed at the Marlboro Music Festival, serving for seven years as Principal Bassoonist under Pablo Casals for many recordings with the Marlboro Festival Orchestra. He also toured the United States and Canada and recorded chamber music representing the Festival. During this time and for an additional fifteen years, Mr. Winstead built a career as a college professor—teaching bassoon, piano, theory, and composition-first here at West Virginia University, then at Indiana-Purdue University, Florida State University, and Oberlin Conservatory of Music. Fourteen years ago he joined the Cincinnati

Symphony Orchestra. As a bassoon soloist, Mr. Winstead has appeared with orchestras ranging from the Wheeling (WV) and Waco (TX) Symphonies to the Pittsburgh and Cincinnati Symphony Orchestras, and has held residencies with the Lake George Opera, the Goldovsky Opera Festival, and the Fort Wayne Philharmonic. He has been a featured recitalist in this country and Europe at several conference of the International Double Reed Society, and served two terms as president of the Society. He has served as a member of the National Endowment for the Arts Music Advisory Panel for Solo Recitalist Grants, and he frequently presents master classes and concerto performance on university campuses across the country. Mr. Winstead's compositions have been premiered by the Philadelphia Orchestra and the Pittsburgh Symphony and he has been the recipient of several grants and awards. (Tuesday evening, CT

Arthur Weisberg

(bassoon, lecture) has been a member of the Houston, Baltimore, and Cleveland Orchestras. He played with the New York Woodwind Quintet for 14 years, and has taught at Yale University, the Juilliard School, and SUNY-Stony Brook. He now teaches at the former Harid Conservatory, now called the Conservatory of Music at Lynn University in Boca Raton, Florida. He has written The Art of Wind Playing and has composed numerous pieces for the bassoon in various combinations. (Wed. 3:30-4:20, FT)

(oboe, lecture) is a highly regarded international oboe clinician and teacher. She is a native of Pittsburgh, on the faculty of Grove City College, and maintains a private oboe studio of over 100 students. Although a number of her former students are seated in professional orchestras here and abroad, this clinician specializes in teaching students from grades 4-12. She has been teaching for over 30 years and has successfully placed students in such fine schools as Eastman, Juilliard, Peabody, and Manhattan Conservatories, Northwestern and Interlochen Academy. Her students are consistently awarded 1st chair placements up to, and including, the national level. She takes pride in the fact that every student who has wished to continue with their musical studies in college has received a music scholarship.
