This honor is particularly significant as Kopel has lived in Lower Manhattan all her life and had her life forever changed as a result of the September 11th tragedy. After completing her education, Kopel's goal is to teach history in the New York City public school system. She aspires to become an inspirational teacher who both connects and motivates her students. She states, "I want to be able to give back to the system that gave so much to me."

Jennifer Kulp's involvement at Miami University exemplifies the four pillars of Lambda Sigma – leadership, scholarship, service, and fellowship. While pursuing a major in zoology she has maintained a 3.88 grade point average. She is also involved in the Honors Program, Pre-Vet Club, Tae Kwon Do Club, while serving as the Lambda Sigma vice president of service and chair of the service committee. As indicated by these positions service is a very important part of Kulp and what is important to her. Besides the many local volunteer work she has organized and been involved in, she has participated in two alternative spring break programs. The first program took her to Mississippi to help rebuild homes for people affected by Katrina and the next one to New York city where she helped with the Ronald McDonald House, Meals-on-Wheels and helped with the clean-up of various city parks. As the chapter president states, "Jennifer's dedication to Lambda Sigma events was perhaps her best attribute. Southern Miss alumnus Randy Raggio '91 has been honored with the President's Volunteer Service Award for his volunteer service with Desire Street Academy. Launched in New Orleans in 2002, Desire Street Academy strives to empower young men physically, academically, spiritually, and socially and to equip them for success in life. Raggio is an academic tutor for remedial math and the ACT college entrance exam preparation for the organization. In addition, he helped prepare a marketing plan for Desire Street Academy and has worked with its advisory committee on publicity and fundraising. The President's Volunteer Service Award was created at the president of the United States' direction by the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation. The award is available to youth ages 14 and under who have completed 50 or more hours of volunteer service, to individuals 15 and older who have completed 100 or more hours, and to families or groups who have completed 200 or more hours. Raggio, pictured at left with President Bush, is currently an assistant professor at Louisiana State University. He earned his undergraduate degree in management information systems from Southern Miss, an MBA with a concentration in marketing from Vanderbilt University and a doctorate in marketing from Ohio State University. Raggio's professional marketing experience includes time as the marketing director for toy company, Kidpower. He has produced more than 13 commercials for products that have aired on national cable television and has appeared on QVC three times. In 1998, he was appointed to the Toy Manufacturers of America Blue Ribbon Communications Panel. Additionally, Raggio worked with Andersen Consulting (now Accenture) before leaving the firm to start his own company. Raggio's work extends far beyond the world of business and profit. In 1999, he spent seven weeks in India helping to develop daycare centers for children in the slums of Mumbai. In 2006, he founded and directed the "Louisiana Thanks You!" campaign to help the people of Louisiana express their gratitude for the overwhelmingly generous response to hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Born and raised in Mandeville, La., Raggio now resides in Baton Rouge, La., with his wife Noel and their children, Jenna and Jack.
