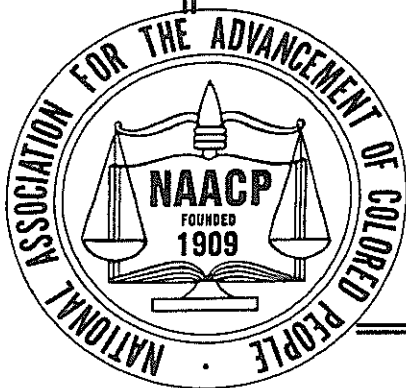

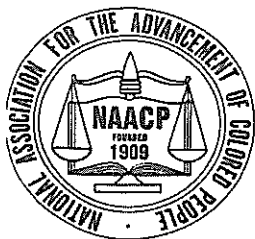

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P R E F A C E

Since 1914, the NAACP Legislative Report Card has served as a presentation of key civil rights votes taken in the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives. The edition that follows contains votes taken over the course of the entire 108th Congress, which began January 7, 2003 and adjourned on December 9, 2004. *This Report Card* is designed to provide NAACP members with insight into the general voting patterns of their congressional representatives and state delegations over the course of the 108th Congress.

The votes selected for inclusion in the *Report Card* are those that have been considered by the full U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate. Legislation that did not progress beyond the committee level is not included. The *Report Card* is updated and distributed to NAACP members twice each Congress. A Congress is two years long; the NAACP Legislative Report Card is issued at the end of the first year or session as a mid-term assessment, and then at the end of the second year and may be used as a final guide or assessment of the full two-year Congress.

We hope that you will find the enclosed information to be useful in your efforts to educate yourself and other NAACP members about the votes of our elected representatives on legislation of critical importance to the African American community and other friends of civil rights.

VOTE DESCRIPTION

1. INCREASE MINORITY HEALTH SERVICES GRANT MONEY

H.J. Res. 2 / Fiscal 2003 Omnibus Appropriations / Kennedy Amendment

Stevens (R-AK) motion to table (kill) the Kennedy (D-MA) amendment that would have provided \$540 million for minority health services, including HIV / AIDS prevention and treatment programs and the civil rights office of the US Department of Health and Human Services. *The Stevens motion was agreed to on January 23, 2003, by a vote of 51 yeas to 46 nays.*

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE STEVENS MOTION TO KILL THE KENNEDY AMENDMENT.

2. MIGUEL ESTRADA JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO THE D.C. CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

Cloture

Vote on invoking cloture (thus limiting or ending debate and moving on to final passage) on the confirmation of right-wing extremist judicial nominee Miguel Estrada, who was nominated to serve a lifetime appointment on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the DC Circuit. Three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 Senators, must vote yea for cloture to be invoked. *The motion to invoke cloture failed on March 18, 2003, by a margin of 55 yeas to 45 nays.*

THE NAACP OPPOSED MR. ESTRADA'S NOMINATION AND THUS WAS OPPOSED TO INVOKING CLOTURE AND ASKED FOR A "NAY" VOTE.

3. INCREASE FEDERAL EDUCATION FUNDING

S. Con. Res. 23 / Fiscal 2004 Budget Resolution / Murray Amendment

Gregg (R-NH) motion to table, or kill the Murray (D-WA) amendment to reduce proposed tax cuts established by the concurrent resolution by \$17.8 billion. The amount would be spent equally on debt reduction and provisions in the 2001 education overhaul legislation. *The motion to table the Murray amendment passed on March 19, 2003, by a margin of 50 yeas to 48 nays.*

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE MOTION TO TABLE THE MURRAY AMENDMENT.

4. INCREASE LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT FUNDING

S. Con. Res. 23 / Fiscal 2004 Budget Resolution / Clinton Amendment

Clinton (D-NY) amendment to increase funding for Byrne Grants by \$650 million, Local Law Enforcement Block Grants by \$400 million and first responders by \$1 billion for fiscal year 2003. The amendment would also provide \$4.5 billion for deficit reduction; the spending would be offset by a decrease in tax cuts. *The Clinton Amendment was rejected on March 25, 2003, by a margin of 49 yeas to 50 nays.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE CLINTON AMENDMENT.

5. INCREASE FUNDING FOR VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

S. Con. Res. 23 / Fiscal 2004 Budget Resolution / Clinton Amendment

Clinton (D-NY) amendment to increase spending on vocational education programs by \$326 million in fiscal year 2004 and by \$3.6 billion over ten years. The increase would be offset by a decrease in tax cuts. ***The Clinton amendment failed on March 25, 2003 by a margin of 49 yeas to 50 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE CLINTON AMENDMENT.

6 REGRESSIVE FEDERAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2004

H. Con. Res. 95 / Fiscal Year 2004 Budget Resolution / Final Passage of the Conference Report

Adoption of the final version of the budget resolution for fiscal year 2004. While this resolution does not have the power of law, it does establish a road map for spending and tax targets over the next ten years. The resolution allows tax cuts of up to \$550 billion while calling for miscellaneous spending cuts from current levels of \$168 billion over the next ten years. ***The resolution passed on April 11, 2004, by a margin of 51 yeas to 50 nays; VICE PRESIDENT CHENEY CAST THE DECIDING "YEA" VOTE.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED PASSAGE OF THE RESOLUTION.

7. JEFFREY SUTTON JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO THE 6TH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

Confirmation

Confirmation of right-wing extremist Jeffrey Sutton, of Ohio, to a lifetime appointment on the 6th Circuit Court of Appeals. ***Mr. Sutton was confirmed on April 29, 2003, by a margin of 52 yeas to 41 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED MR. SUTTON'S CONFIRMATION.

8. PRISCILLA OWEN JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO THE 5TH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

Cloture

Vote on invoking cloture (thus limiting or ending debate) on the confirmation of right-wing extremist judicial nominee Priscilla Owen to a lifetime appointment on the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals. Three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 Senators, must vote "yea" for cloture to be invoked. ***The motion to invoke cloture failed on May 8, 2003, by a margin of 52 yeas to 45 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED MS. OWEN'S NOMINATION AND THUS WAS OPPOSED TO INVOKING CLOTURE AND ASKED FOR A "NAY" VOTE.

9. EXTEND UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE*S. 1054 / Tax Cut bill / Kennedy Amendment*

Vote on the Kennedy (D-MA) amendment to waive the Budget Act and extend unemployment benefits by 26 weeks, with an additional 13 weeks for workers who have exhausted federal benefits. The amendment would also fund unemployment compensation for part-time and low-wage workers; the funding would be offset by eliminating the underlying bill's acceleration of the reduction of the top income tax rate. Three-fifths of those voting (60 votes) are necessary to waive the Budget Act. ***The amendment failed on May 15, 2003, by a margin of 50 yeas to 49 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE KENNEDY AMENDMENT.**10. INCREASE FEDERAL AID TO STATES***S. 1054 / Tax Cut Bill / Collins Amendment*

Amendment offered by Senator Collins (R-ME) to offset some of the budget shortfalls being experienced by the states and authorize \$10 billion a year for two years to states and localities, including \$5 billion a year for grants for education or job training, health care or other social services, transportation or infrastructure, and law enforcement or public safety. The remaining \$5 billion per year would be for a temporary increase in federal Medicaid assistance to the states. ***The Collins amendment passed on May 15, 2003, by a margin of 95 yeas to 3 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE COLLINS AMENDMENT.**11. INCREASE FUNDING FOR THE GLOBAL AIDS FUND***H.R. 1298 / Global AIDS Relief / Durbin Amendment*

Amendment offered by Senator Durbin (D-IL) to authorize up to \$1 billion for the Global AIDS Fund. The first \$500 million would be allocated with no conditions; the second \$500 million would be allocated only if foreign contributions are at least \$1 billion. ***The Durbin amendment failed on May 15, 2003, by a margin of 48 to 52.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE DURBIN AMENDMENT.**12. WILLIAM PRYOR JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO THE 11TH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS***Cloture*

Vote on invoking cloture (thus limiting or ending debate) on the confirmation of right-wing extremist nominee William Pryor to a lifetime appointment on the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals. Three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 Senators, must vote "yea" for cloture to be invoked. ***The motion to invoke cloture failed on July 31, 2003, by a margin of 53 yeas to 44 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED MR. PRYOR'S NOMINATION AND THUS WAS OPPOSED TO INVOKING CLOTURE AND ASKED FOR A "NAY" VOTE.**13. INCREASE FUNDING FOR JOB TRAINING PROGRAMS***H.R. 2660 / Fiscal Year 2004 Appropriations for the U.S. Department of Labor / Murray Amendment*

Murray (D-WA) amendment to increase spending for programs under the Workforce Investment Act by \$801 million. ***The Murray amendment was defeated on September 4, 2003, by a margin of 46 yeas to 49 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MURRAY AMENDMENT.

14. INCREASE FUNDING FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

H.R. 2660 / Fiscal Year 2004 Appropriations for the U.S. Department of Education / Harkin Amendment

Harkin (D-IA) amendment to provide an additional \$1 billion for school construction projects through the Fund for the Improvement of Education. ***The Harkin amendment failed on September 5, 2003, by a margin of 43 yeas to 46 nays.***
THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE HARKIN AMENDMENT

15. INCREASE TITLE I EDUCATION FUNDING FOR PUBLIC ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS SERVING LOW-INCOME STUDENTS

H.R. 2660 / Appropriations for the Department of Education / Byrd Amendment

Byrd (D-WV) amendment to provide an additional \$6.2 billion for Title I programs, which provide federal funds to schools that serve children from low-income families. The Byrd amendment would have increased funding for Title I programs to \$18.5 billion for the year, which is the amount that was authorized in the 2001 *No Child Left Behind Act*. ***The Byrd amendment failed on September 9, 2003, by a margin of 44 yeas to 51 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BYRD AMENDMENT.

16. INCREASE HIGHER EDUCATION FUNDING

H.R. 2660 / Appropriations for the Department of Education / Kennedy Amendment

Kennedy (D-MA) amendment to waive the Budget Act and provide an additional \$2.2 billion for higher education, including \$1.7 billion for Pell grants, \$157 million for federal work study programs and \$115 million for supplemental educational opportunity grants. ***The Kennedy amendment failed on September 9, 2003, by a margin of 49 yeas to 46 nays*** (a three-fifths majority (60) of the total Senate is required to waive the Budget Act).

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE KENNEDY AMENDMENT.

17. INCREASE FUNDING FOR HEAD START

H.R. 2660 / Appropriations for the Department of Education / Dodd Amendment

Dodd (D-CT) amendment to increase funding for Head Start in 2004 by \$350 million. ***The Dodd amendment was defeated on September 9, 2003, by a vote of 47 to 47*** (in the event of a tie, an amendment fails).

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE DODD AMENDMENT.

18. PROTECT OVERTIME PAY FOR AMERICAN WORKERS

H.R. 2660/Department of Labor Appropriations/Harkin Amendment

Harkin (D-IA) amendment to prohibit the US Department of Labor from implementing any regulation which would disqualify any worker from obtaining overtime pay. ***The Harkin amendment passed on September 10, 2003, by a margin of 54 yeas to 45 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE HARKIN AMENDMENT.

19. PROTECT STUDENT FINANCIAL AID ELIGIBILITY

H.R. 2660 / Appropriations for the Department of Education / Corzine Amendment
Corzine (D-NJ) amendment to block the US Department of Education from implementing proposed regulations that would change the way it determines student aid eligibility. By most estimates, the change would result in 84,000 college students losing their eligibility for Pell Grants in the next school year and it would reduce the number of middle-income families eligible for Stafford loans. ***The Corzine amendment was agreed to on September 10, 2003, by a margin of 51 yeas to 44 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE CORZINE AMENDMENT.

20. INCREASE FUNDING FOR AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAMS

H.R. 2660 / Appropriations for the Department of Education / Boxer Amendment
Boxer (D-CA) amendment to increase funding for after-school programs by \$250 million. ***The Boxer amendment failed on September 10, 2003, by a margin of 46 yeas to 49 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BOXER AMENDMENT.

21. PROTECT CIVIL RIGHTS ACCESS TO CLASS ACTION LAWSUITS

S. 1751 / Class Action Lawsuit Fairness Act of 2003 / Cloture
Motion to invoke cloture (and thus limit debate) on S.1751, legislation which would send most state law class action cases directly into federal court; clog the federal courts with state law cases and make it extremely difficult to have federal civil rights cases heard; deter people from bringing class actions; and impose barriers and burdens on settlement of class actions. The legislation would also discourage people from bringing class actions by prohibiting settlements that provide named plaintiffs full relief for their claims and would impose new, burdensome delay tactics for all class actions by automatically allowing a defendant to appeal any class certification in federal court and staying all the proceedings while the appeal is pending. ***The motion to invoke cloture failed on October 22, 2003, by a margin of 59 yeas to 39 nays (three-fifths of the Senate, or 60 Senators, must vote yeas for cloture to be invoked).***

THE NAACP OPPOSES THIS BILL AND THUS OPPOSED CLOTURE.

22. LIFTING OF CUBA TRAVEL BAN

H.R. 2898 / Department of Treasury Appropriations / Dorgan Amendment
Stevens (R-AK) motion to table (or kill) the Dorgan (D-ND) amendment that would prohibit any funds in the bill from being used to enforce a ban on U.S. citizens traveling to Cuba. ***The Stevens motion was rejected on October 23, 2003, by a vote of 36 yeas to 59 nays, and the Dorgan amendment was subsequently adopted by voice vote.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE STEVENS MOTION AND SUPPORTED THE DORGAN AMENDMENT.

23. INCREASE FUNDING FOR HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT ELECTION REFORM LAW

H.R. 2989 / Appropriations for the Department of Treasury / Dodd-McConnell Amendment

Dodd (D-CT) / McConnell (R-KY) amendment to waive the Budget Act and increase spending on election reform, as authorized by the 2002 *Help America Vote Act*, by \$1 billion. This money would be distributed in the form of grants to states to assist in efforts to improve election technology. ***The amendment was agreed to on October 23, 2003, by a margin of 63 yeas to 31 nays (three-fifths of the entire Senate, or 60 Senators, are required to vote yea to waive the Budget Act).***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE DODD-MCCONNELL AMENDMENT

24. CHARLES PICKERING JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO THE 5TH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

Cloture

Vote on invoking cloture (thus limiting or ending debate and moving on to final passage) on the confirmation of right-wing extremist judicial nominee Charles Pickering, Sr. to serve a lifetime appointment on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit. Three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 Senators, must vote yea for cloture to be invoked. ***The motion to invoke cloture failed on October 30, 2003, by a margin of 54 yeas to 43 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED MR. PICKERING'S NOMINATION AND THUS WAS OPPOSED TO INVOKING CLOTURE AND ASKED FOR A "NAY" VOTE.

25. CAROLYN KUHL JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO THE 9TH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

Cloture

Vote on invoking cloture (thus limiting or ending debate and moving on to final passage) on the confirmation of right-wing extremist judicial nominee Carolyn Kuhl to serve a lifetime appointment on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. Three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 Senators, must vote yea for cloture to be invoked. ***The motion to invoke cloture failed on November 14, 2003, by a margin of 53 yeas to 43 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED MS. KUHL'S NOMINATION AND THUS WAS OPPOSED TO INVOKING CLOTURE AND ASKED FOR A "NAY" VOTE.

26. JANICE ROGERS BROWN JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO THE DC CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

Cloture

Vote on invoking cloture (thus limiting or ending debate and moving on to final passage) on the confirmation of right-wing extremist judicial nominee Janice Rogers Brown of California to serve a lifetime appointment on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit. Three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 Senators, must vote yea for cloture to be invoked. ***The motion to invoke cloture failed on November 14, 2003, by a margin of 53 yeas to 43 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED JANICE ROGERS BROWN'S NOMINATION AND THUS WAS OPPOSED TO INVOKING CLOTURE AND ASKED FOR A "NAY" VOTE.

27. MEDICARE OVERHAUL

H.R. 1 / Conference Report / Final Passage

Final passage of the omnibus Medicare overhaul bill, which will reshape the way more than 40 million senior citizens and disabled Americans receive health care. Under this legislation, as many as 3 million seniors may lose their retiree prescription drug coverage; up to 6.4 million of the poorest Medicare beneficiaries will get less drug coverage than they have now; and millions of seniors could see their Medicare premiums rise if they refuse to join an HMO. ***The bill passed the Senate on November 25, 2003, by a margin of 54 yeas to 44 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED FINAL PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

28. RENEWING THE ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN

S. 1805 / Gun Immunity / Feinstein amendment

Feinstein (D-CA) amendment to extend the ban on 19 different types of assault weapons for another 10 years. Without legislative action, the current ban will expire September 13, 2004. ***The amendment passed on March 2, 2004, by a margin of 52 yeas to 47 nays, although the underlying bill was subsequently defeated.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE FEINSTEIN AMENDMENT.

29. CLOSING THE GUN SHOW LOOPHOLE

S. 1805 / Gun Immunity / McCain amendment

McCain (R-AZ) amendment to require criminal background checks on all firearms transactions occurring at events that provide a venue for the sale, offer for sale, transfer or exchange of firearms. ***The amendment passed on March 2, 2004, by a margin of 53 yeas to 46 nays, although the underlying bill was subsequently defeated.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MCCAIN AMENDMENT.

30. IMMUNITY FROM LAWSUITS FOR GUN DEALERS AND MANUFACTURERS

S. 1805 / Protection of Lawful Commerce in Arms Act / Final Passage

Final passage of legislation that would block liability lawsuits against gun makers and sellers based on the criminal misuse of firearms. It would also block lawsuits against trade organizations and against ammunition makers and sellers. Upon enactment, the legislation would apply immediately to all pending cases. ***The bill was defeated on March 2, 2004, by a vote of 8 yeas to 90 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE BILL.

31. INCREASE FEDERAL CHILD CARE FUNDING

H.R. 4 / Welfare Reauthorization / Snowe Amendment

Snowe (R-ME) amendment to increase mandatory child care funding by \$6 billion over the next five years. Current federal spending on child care is \$4.8 billion annually, and only one out of every seven children from families eligible to receive federal child care aid receives such assistance. ***The amendment passed on March 30, 2004, by a margin of 78 yeas to 20 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE SNOWE AMENDMENT.

32. HATE CRIMES PREVENTION & PROSECUTION

S. 2400 / Fiscal year 2005 Defense Authorization / Smith Amendment

Smith (R-OR) amendment to allow the federal government to provide enhanced assistance to state and local authorities to punish hate crimes to the fullest extent possible, and to expand the definition of a hate crime beyond the limitations of the protected areas, and include those motivated by the victim's disability, gender or sexual orientation. *The amendment passed by a margin of 65 yeas to 33 nays on June 15, 2004.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE SMITH AMENDMENT.

33. J. LEON HOLMES JUDICIAL NOMINATION TO SERVE ON THE US DISTRICT COURT FOR EASTERN DISTRICT OF ARKANSAS

Confirmation

Vote on the confirmation of right-wing extremist judicial nominee J. Leon Holmes to serve a lifetime appointment on the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Arkansas. *Mr. Holmes was confirmed by a margin of 51 yeas to 46 nays on July 6, 2004.*

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE CONFIRMATION OF J. LEON HOLMES.

1. EXTEND UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

S. 23 / Unemployment Benefits / McDermott Motion to Recommit

Congressman McDermott (D-WA) motion to recommit the bill extending federal unemployment benefits back to the House Ways and Means Committee with instructions that the committee report the bill back with language that would allow a total of 26 weeks in federal aid for laid-off workers who have exhausted their state unemployment benefits (the bill being debated only called for laid-off workers to receive up to 13 weeks of unemployment benefits.) ***The motion to recommit was defeated on January 8, 2003, by a margin of 202 yeas to 229 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MCDERMOTT MOTION TO RECOMMIT.

**2. CONGRESSIONAL BLACK CAUCUS / PROGRESSIVE CAUCUS
ALTERNATIVE BUDGET**

H. Con. Res. 95 / Fiscal 2004 Budget Resolution / CBC Substitute

Congressman Owens (D-NY) substitute amendment that would provide a balanced budget by 2008. The substitute would repeal tax cuts for high-income individuals and call for additional tax breaks for low-income families. It would also provide additional funding for education, health, childcare and housing. ***The amendment failed on March 20, 2003 by a margin of 85 yeas to 340 nays.***

**THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE CONGRESSIONAL BLACK CAUCUS /
PROGRESSIVE CAUCUS BUDGET ALTERNATIVE.**

**3. CURBING THE DIAMOND TRADE'S SUPPORT OF WAR AND VIOLENT
CONFLICT IN AFRICA**

H.R. 1584 / The Clean Diamond Trade Act / Final Passage

Final passage of H.R. 1584, legislation to require the President to prohibit the import or export of any rough diamonds that have not been certified as not originating from areas where the diamond trade finances or creates violent conflict. ***The bill passed the House of Representatives on April 8, 2003, by a margin of 419 yeas to 2 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED H.R. 1584.

4. LIABILITY FOR GUN MANUFACTURERS, DISTRIBUTORS AND DEALERS

H.R. 1036 / Protection of Lawful Commerce in Arms Act / Final Passage

Final passage of legislation that would block liability lawsuits against gun makers and sellers based on the criminal misuse of firearms. It would also block lawsuits against trade organizations and against ammunition makers and sellers. Upon enactment, the legislation would apply immediately to all pending cases. ***The legislation passed on April 9, 2003, by a margin of 285 yeas to 140 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED FINAL PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

5. A REGRESSIVE FEDERAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2004

H. Con. Res. 95 / Fiscal Year 2004 Budget Resolution / Final Passage of the Conference Report

Adoption of the final version of the budget resolution for fiscal year 2004. While this resolution does not have the power of law, it does establish a road map for spending and tax targets over the next ten years. The resolution calls for tax cuts of up to \$550 billion as well as miscellaneous spending cuts from current levels of \$168 billion over the next ten years. ***The resolution, passed on April 11, 2004, by a margin of 216 yeas to 211 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED PASSAGE OF THE RESOLUTION.

6. INCREASED INTERNATIONAL AIDS RELIEF

H.R. 1298 / United States Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria Act of 2003 / Final Passage

Final passage of legislation to authorize \$3 billion per year over the next five years to prevent and treat HIV and AIDS in Africa and elsewhere. ***The bill passed on May 1, 2003, by a margin of 375 to 41.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED FINAL PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

7. PREVENTING CIVIL RIGHTS CLASS ACTION LAW-SUITS

H.R. 1115 / Class Action Fairness Act of 2003 / Final Passage

Final passage of legislation that would send most state law class action cases directly into federal court; clog the federal courts with state law cases and make it extremely difficult to have federal civil rights cases heard; deter people from bringing class actions; and impose barriers and burdens on settlement of class actions. The bill would also discourage people from bringing class actions by prohibiting settlements that provide named plaintiffs full relief for their claims and would impose new, burdensome delay tactics for all class actions by automatically allowing a defendant to appeal any class certification in federal court and staying all the proceedings while the appeal is pending. ***The bill passed the House on June 12, 2003, by a margin of 253 yeas to 170 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE LEGISLATION.

8. EXPANDING THE CHILD TAX CREDIT TO LOW-INCOME FAMILIES

*H.R. 1308 / Tax Relief, Simplification and Equity Act of 2003 / Motion to Instruct Congressman Rangel (D-NY) motion to instruct House conferees to insist that the final version of the bill that is sent to the President include provisions from the Senate version of the bill that would allow low-income families to receive the increased child tax credit refund immediately. ***The motion to instruct was agreed to on June 12, 2003, by a margin of 205 yeas to 201 nays.****

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE RANGEL MOTION TO INSTRUCT.

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9. CITIZENSHIP AND IMMIGRATION STATUS REPORTING ABUSES

H.R. 2555 / Fiscal Year 2004 Appropriations for the Department of Homeland Security / Tancredo Amendment

Congressman Tancredo (R-CO) amendment to prohibit the use of any funds within the bill going to assist state or local governments that have restrictions on exchanging information with the Bureau of Immigration and Customs on an individual's citizenship or immigration status. ***The Tancredo amendment failed on June 24, 2003 by a margin of 102 yeas to 322 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE TANCREDO AMENDMENT.

10. INCREASING STUDENT LOAN FORGIVENESS FOR TEACHERS

H.R. 438 / Teacher Recruitment and Retention Act of 2003 / Final Passage

Final Passage of a bill that would increase from \$5,000 to \$17,500 the amount in student loans that could be forgiven for math, science and special education teachers who serve low-income students. Loan forgiveness would also be available to reading teachers who have obtained a separate state credential in reading. The bill also accelerates the timetable for loan forgiveness. ***The bill passed the House on July 9, 2003, by a margin of 417 yeas to 7 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

11. INCREASED FUNDING TO ASSIST FAILING PUBLIC ELEMNTARY SCHOOLS

H.R. 2660 / Fiscal Year Appropriations for the US Department of Education / Allen Amendment

Amendment offered by Congressman Allen (D-ME) that would block the US Department of Education from carrying out any sanctions on schools that fail to meet standards established in the 2001 *No Child Left Behind Act* until the schools receive the full amount of funds authorized in the measure. ***The Allen amendment failed in July 10, 2003, by a margin of 199 yeas to 223 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE ALLEN AMENDMENT.

12. TAXPAYER-FUNDED DISCRIMINATION IN HEAD START PROGRAMS

H.R. 2210 / School Readiness Act of 2003 / Woolsey Amendment

Amendment offered by Congresswoman Woolsey (D-CA) and others to strike a provision in the Head Start Reauthorization that would allow religious organizations operating Head Start programs to discriminate in hiring, based on religion, for positions supported by federal monies. ***The Woolsey amendment failed on July 24, 2003, by a margin of 199 yeas to 231 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE WOOLSEY AMENDMENT.

13. BLOCK GRANTING AND DIMANTLING OF HEAD START PROGRAM

H.R. 2210 / School Readiness Act of 2003 / Final Passage

Final Passage of a bill to reauthorize the Head Start program through 2008. The legislation also calls for the creation of a pilot program to allow Head Start money to go to states in a block grant formula and allow the states to create their own early childhood education programs in lieu of Head Start programs. ***The bill passed on July 24, 2003, by a margin of 217 yeas to 216 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE BILL.

14. INCREASE FUNDING FOR LOW-INCOME SECTION 8 HOUSING VOUCHERS

H.R. 2861 / Appropriations for the Department of Housing and Urban Development / Nadler Amendment

Amendment offered by Congressman Nadler (D-NY) to increase funding for Section 8 Housing Vouchers in the bill by \$150 million. The bill had already rejected a proposal by the Bush administration to provide Section 8 monies to states via block grants and increased the Bush request for Section 8 vouchers by \$205 million. ***The Nadler amendment passed on July 25, 2003, by a margin of 217 yeas to 208 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE NADLER AMENDMENT.

15. INCREASE IN FUNDING FOR FEDERAL HOMELESS PROGRAMS

H.R. 2861 / Appropriations for the Department of Housing and Urban Development / Lee Amendment

Amendment offered by Congresswoman Lee (D-CA) to increase federal homeless programs by \$83 million, thus bringing the total to the amount originally requested by President Bush for fiscal year 2004. ***The Lee Amendment failed on July 25, 2003, by a margin of 192 yeas to 232 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEE AMENDMENT.

16. ESTABLISH FEDERAL FUNDING OF PUBLIC SCHOOL VOUCHERS

H.R. 2765 / Appropriations for the District of Columbia / Norton Amendment

Amendment offered by Congresswoman Norton (D-DC) to strike from the bill a provision providing \$10 million for a school voucher pilot program in the District of Columbia. ***The amendment failed on September 5, 2003, by a vote of 203 yeas to 203 nays*** (in the event of a tie, an amendment fails).

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE NORTON AMENDMENT

17. LIFTING THE TRAVEL BAN ON CUBA

H.R. 2989 / Appropriations for the US Treasury Department / Flake Amendment

Amendment offered by Congressman Flake (R-AZ) that would prohibit any funds in the bill from being used to enforce the ban on traveling to Cuba by U.S. citizens. ***The Flake Amendment was adopted on September 9, 2003, by a margin of 227 yeas to 188 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE FLAKE AMENDMENT.

18. PROTECTION OF OVERTIME PAY FOR AMERICAN WORKERS

H.R. 2660 / Department of Labor Appropriations / Obey Motion

Congressman Obey (D-WI) motion to instruct the House conferees to support the Harkin amendment to the Department of Labor Appropriations bill which would prohibit the US Department of Labor from implementing any regulation that would disqualify any worker from obtaining overtime pay. ***The Obey motion to instruct passed on October 2, 2003, by a margin of 221 yeas to 203 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE OBEY MOTION.

19. ESTABLISHMENT AND CONSTRUCTION OF A NATIONAL AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY MUSEUM IN WASHINGTON, DC

H.R. 3491 / National Museum of African Americans History and Culture Act / Final Passage

Final passage of a bill to authorize \$32 million in fiscal year 2004 and unspecified sums in later years to plan and construct a National Museum of African-American History and Culture as part of the Smithsonian Institution. ***The legislation passed on November 19, 2003, by a margin of 409 yeas to 9 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

20. MEDICARE OVERHAUL

H.R. 1 / Medicare Prescription Drug and Modernization Act of 2003 / Final Passage Conference Report

Final passage of the omnibus Medicare overhaul bill, which will reshape the way more than 40 million senior citizens and disabled Americans receive health care. Under this legislation, as many as 3 million seniors may lose their retiree prescription drug coverage; up to 6.4 million of the poorest Medicare beneficiaries will get less drug coverage than they have now; and millions of seniors could see their Medicare premiums rise if they refuse to join an HMO. ***The bill passed the House of Representatives on November 22, 2003, by a margin of 220 yeas to 215 nays.***

THE NAACP OPPOSED FINAL PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

21. PREVENTING "FAITH BASED" DISCRIMINATION

H.R. 3030 / Community Services Block Grants / Woolsey Amendment

Amendment offered by Congresswoman Woolsey (D-CA) to insert "religion" as part of the nondiscrimination categories covered in the bill (thus requiring that any organization receiving taxpayer dollars could not discriminate when hiring to staff a program supported by federal funds) and would require that any program be covered in a "lawful and secular" manner. ***The Woolsey amendment was defeated on February 4, 2004, by a margin of 183 yeas to 232 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE WOOLSEY AMENDMENT.

22. CONGRESSIONAL BLACK CAUCUS ALTERNATIVE BUDGET

H.Con.Res. 393 / Fiscal 2005 Budget Resolution / CBC Substitute

Congressman Elijah Cummings (D-MD) substitute amendment that would call for \$43.3 billion in additional spending and \$5 billion for deficit reduction in fiscal year 2005. The CBC substitute would rescind tax cuts for individuals making more than \$200,000 in gross income, close several tax loopholes, and reduce funding for the ballistic missile defense program. Spending increases would include \$30.5 billion more for non-defense programs and an additional \$12.8 billion for defense, homeland security and veterans' programs. ***The amendment failed on March 25, 2004, by a margin of 119 yeas to 302 nays.***

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE CONGRESSIONAL BLACK CAUCUS BUDGET ALTERNATIVE.

**23. COMMEMORATING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE SUPREME COURT
BROWN VS. BOARD OF EDUCATION DECISION**

H. Con. Res. 414 / Final Passage

Passage of a concurrent resolution that would mark the 50th anniversary of the Supreme Court's *Brown vs. Board of Education* ruling that racial segregation in public schools is unconstitutional, and urging us a nation to renew our commitment "to continuing and building on the legacy of *Brown* with a pledge to acknowledge and address the modern day disparities that remain." *The resolution passed on May 13, 2004, by a margin of 406 yeas to 1 nay.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE RESOLUTION.

**24. RETAIN FUNDING FOR THE SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION'S 7(A)
LOAN PROGRAM**

H.R. 4754 / Fiscal Year 2005 Appropriations for the Small Business Administration / Manzullo Amendment

Amendment offered by Congressman Manzullo (R-IL) to increase funding for the SBA's 7(a) program by \$79 million. The 7(a) loan program is the SBA's core lending program and accounts for roughly 30% of all long-term small business borrowing in America. *The Manzullo amendment passed on July 7, 2004, by a margin of 281 yeas to 137 nays.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MANZULLO AMENDMENT.

**25. INCREASE FUNDING FOR CIVIL RIGHTS AND DEDUCATION ACTIVITIES
AT THE US DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE**

H.R. 4766 / Fiscal Year 2005 Appropriations for the Department of Agriculture / Baca Amendment

Amendment offered by Congressman Baca (D-CA) to increase funding for the USDA Office of Civil Rights by \$250,00 and to increase funding for research and education activities by \$1.5 million. Funds would be offset by cuts in rural development. *The Baca amendment failed on July 13, 2004, by a vote of 205 yeas to 209 nays.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BACA AMENDMENT.

26. APPLAUDING 10 YEARS OF DEMOCRACY IN SOUTH AFRICA

H. Con. Res. 436 / Democracy in South Africa / Adoption

Adoption of the concurrent resolution that would applaud South Africa for its transition to a democracy and the progress achieved during the last 10 years of majority rule. *The resolution was adopted on July 22, 2004, by a margin of 422 yeas to 0 nays.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE RESOLUTION.

27. GENOCIDE IN SUDAN

H. Con Res. 467 / Genocide in Sudan / Adoption

Adoption of the concurrent resolution that would declare that the violence in the Darfur region of Sudan constitutes genocide and urges the President to make the same declaration and to lead an effort to prevent genocide in the region. ***The resolution was adopted on July 22, 2004, by a margin of 422 yeas to 0 nays.***
THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE RESOLUTION.

28. HATE CRIME PREVENTION

H.R. 4200 / Fiscal Year 2005 Department of Defense Authorization / Motion to Instruct Conferees

Motion by Congresswoman Pelosi (D-CA) to instruct the House conferees to the Department of Defense Authorization bill to accept language in the Senate bill that would expand the definition of a hate crime and include additional tools to fight hate crimes. ***The motion to instruct was agreed to on September 28, 2004, by a margin of 213 yeas to 186 nays.***
THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MOTION TO INSTRUCT.

29. REPEALING GUN LAWS IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

H.R. 3193 / District of Columbia Personal Protection Act / Passage

Passage of legislation that would repeal most of the local District of Columbia laws intended to stem gun violence. The laws that would be repealed under this legislation include bans on the sale and possession of handguns, handgun ammunition and semiautomatic weapons and laws that require that weapons be kept unloaded and disassembled, or with the trigger locked. ***The legislation was agreed to on September 29, 2004, by a margin of 250 yeas to 171 nays.***
THE NAACP OPPOSED THE LEGISLATION.

30. REINSTATING THE DRAFT

H.R. 163 / Universal National Service Act / Final passage

Final passage of legislation that would require all citizens age 18 to 26 to perform two years of service in the military, the commissioned corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration or the Public Health Service. Individuals with disabilities or those with conscientious objections could participate in designated civilian activities promoting national security or homeland defense. ***The legislation failed on October 5, 2004, by a margin of 2 yeas to 402 nays.***
THE NAACP OPPOSED THE LEGISLATION.
