2. Accreditation and Validation

Asian Games Identification and Accreditation Cards (AGIAC) will act as an entry visa to Indonesia and ensure special access to the Games venues including the HQ Hotel and competition venues. INASGOC will distribute Accreditation Guide and Accreditation Application Forms to Accreditation Responsible Organizations by December 2017. The online Accreditation System start from January 31 until April 30, 2018. INASGOC will distribute the Pre-valid AGIAC to the confirmed participants on July 2018. Upon the arrival in Jakarta – Palembang, pre-valid AGIAC holders should visit one of the accreditation center with their effective identification

documents and validate their pre-valid AGIAC. Once validated, AGIAC becomes an official Games document.

3. Immigration and Visa

From July 30 to September 4, 2018, AD Card holders will be permitted upon presentation of their valid passports or travel documents. AD Cards holders will not need to apply for an Indonesian Entry Visa of Residence Permit in order to enter the country.

Any AD Card holders wishing to enter Indonesia before or after the valid period of the AD Card, or to remain in Indonesia after its expiry date, will need to make their own arrangements regarding visas according to Indonesian immigration law. AD Card holders should ensure that the information on their valid passport when entering Indonesia is exactly the same with the information on the certified document used for application for AD Card, and that their passport remain valid at least until February 5, 2019.

4. Transportation

4.1 Transport Services for Arrival and Departure

Shuttle Bus Services will be provided for arriving and departing athletes and team officials, depending on arrival and departure information and flight schedule. Before departure, Shuttle Bus Services require advance reservation.

4.2 Dedicated Vehicle Service

Dedicated Vehicle Services will be provided between Athletes' Village and the designated areas, depending on team events and on the size of NOC participants. Dedicated Vehicle Services require advance reservation and approval.

4.3 Transport Services for Competition (for non-team events)

Shuttle Bus Services for athletes and team officials participating in non-team events will be provided between Athletes' Village and the competition venues as per the competition schedule.

4.4 Transport Services for Training (for non-team events)

Shuttle Bus Services for athletes and team officials participating in non-team events will be provided between Athletes' Village and the training venues as per the training schedule.

4.5 Transport Services for Spectating

The AV-to-venues shuttle will be provided to athletes and team officials wishing to watch other sport competition events. The service is also available to all athletes and team officials who are involved in the same events: priority, however, will be given to athletes and team officials participating in their own events.

※ Tickets are required for spectating.

4.6 Transport Services for Luggage

The luggage belonging to athletes and team officials should, in principal, be loaded onto the bus they take. If not possible due to insufficient storage space, another vehicle will be provided to the destinations.

5. Accommodation

During the Games time, over 13,000 athletes and team officials including extra officials will be accommodated at Kemayoran Block D10 in Jakarta and Jakabaring Athletes Villages located in Palembang. Opening of Athletes' Village will be on July 16, 2018. A variety of amenities and recreational facilities will be offered for the Games family at Athletes' Village. For the sake of the safety, separate Accreditation Access is required for entering the area.

6. Media

6.1 Mixed Zone

The Mixed zone is an area in which athletes may be interviewed as soon as they leave the field of play. The Mixed Zone is designed to permit the broadcasters and press to interview athletes in a designated area near the field of play. In accordance with OCA's rules, all athletes must pass through the Mixed Zone. Mixed Zone interviews are recommended within limited time each to let the broadcasters and press to have an equal opportunity to speak to the athletes. The AFs and INASGOC Sports Operations Team will provide all necessary assistance to ensure the convenience of Mixed Zone.

6.2 Press Conference

After each event, the designated medallists will attend a press conference at the venue as well as coaches if circumstances dictate. They should accompany to the press conference room. Medallists press conference will be held right after the medal presentation ceremonies at the venue. Sports operational staff will bring athletes to the press conference room. Translation services will be provided with English and Indonesian during the press conferences at the venues. If medallists do not speak English or Indonesian, NOCs are requested to assign an interpreter with the medallists attending the press conference.

7. Medical Service

Medical stations for athletes will be installed at all competition venues and training facilities. On-site medical treatment and emergency transfer service will be provided during operating period. Polyclinic in the Athletes' Village will provide treatment and consultation by professional medical staff across the departments of internal medicine, general surgery (including orthopaedics), ophthalmology, stomatology, medical imaging, physical therapy, pharmacy, etc.

It will also have an emergency room open 24 hours a day, with stand-by ambulances. Any patient who needs further diagnosis and treatment will be transferred to designated hospitals of the Games.

Where accredited persons including OCA Family VIP guests, NOC guests suffer from acute diseases, acute exacerbations of chronic diseases or acute injuries, they can receive treatment in Polyclinic or designated hospitals for free of charge. Services may include emergency treatment, in-patient service, special consultation and ambulance transfer, if required. However, free medical services will not include selective or unnecessary treatment.

8. Host Country/City Information

8.1 Indonesia in Brief

Indonesia, officially the Republic of Indonesia (Indonesian: Republik Indonesia) is located mainly in Southeast Asia with some territories in Oceania. Situated between the Indian and Pacific Oceans, it is the world's largest island country, with more than thirteen thousand islands. It has an estimated population of over 260 million people (September 2016) and is the world's fourth most populous. Muslim-majority country. The world's most populous island of Java contains more than half of the country's population.

Indonesia's republican form of government includes an elected legislature and president. Indonesia has 34 provinces, of which five have Special Administrative status. Its capital and most populous city is Jakarta. The country shares land borders with Papua New Guinea, East Timor, and the eastern part of Malaysia. Other neighbouring countries include Singapore, the Philippines, Australia, Palau and the Indian territory of the Andaman and Nicobar Islands. Indonesia is a founding member of ASEAN and a member of the G-20 major economies. The Indonesian economy is the world's 16th largest by nominal GDP and the 8th largest by GDP at PPP.

Indonesia consists of hundreds of distinct native ethnic and linguistic groups. The largest - and politically dominant - ethnic group are the Javanese. A shared identity has developed, defined by a national language, ethnic diversity, religious pluralism within a Muslim-majority population, and a history of colonialism and rebellion against it. Indonesia's national motto "Bhineka Tunggal Ika" ("Unity in Diversity" literally, "many, yet one"), articulates the diversity that shapes the country. Despite its large population and densely populated regions, Indonesia has vast areas of wilderness that support the world's second highest level of biodiversity.

8.2 Jakarta in Brief

Geography

The Special Capital Region of Jakarta, is the capital and most populous city of Indonesia. Located on the northwest coast of the world's most populous island of Java, the city is the center of economics, culture and politics of Indonesia, with a population of 10,075,310 as of 2014. Greater Jakarta metropolitan area, which is known as Jabodetabek (a name formed by combining the initial syllables of Jakarta, Bogor, Depok, Tangerang and Bekasi), is the second largest urban agglomeration in the world, with population of 30,214,303 inhabitants as of 2010 census. Jakarta's business opportunities, as well as its potential to offer a higher standard of living, attract migrants from all over Indonesian archipelago, making the city a melting pot of many communities and cultures.

Climate

Jakarta has a tropical monsoon climate (Am) according to the Köppen climate classification system. The wet season in Jakarta covers the majority of the year,

running from October through May. The remaining four months (June through September) constitute the city's drier season (each of these 4 months has an average monthly rainfall of less than 100 millimeters (3.0in)). Located in the western part of Java. Jakarta's wet season rainfall peak in January and February with average monthly rainfall of 299.7 millimeters (11.80 in), and its dry season low point is August with a monthly average of 43.2 mm (1.70 in).

Tourism

Most of the visitors attracted to Jakarta are domestic tourists from all over Indonesia. Jakarta is trying to attract more international tourists by MICE tourism, by arranging increasing numbers of conventions. As the gateway of Indonesia, Jakarta often serves as the stop-over for foreign visitors on their way to Indonesian popular tourist destinations such as Bali, Lombok and Yogyakarta. Most of the renowned international hotel chains have presence in the city.

Other than monuments, landmarks, and museums around Merdeka square and Jakarta Old Town, tourist attractions of the city include Thousand Islands, Taman Mini Indonesia Indah, Setu Babakan, Ragunan Zoo, Sunda Kelapa old port and the Ancol Dreamland complex on Jakarta Bay, including Dufry Fantasi (Fantasy World) theme park, Sea World, Atlantis Water Adventure, and Gelanggang Samudra.

8.3 Palembang in Brief

Geography

Palembang is the second-largest city on Sumatra island after Medan and the capital city of the South Sumatra province in Indonesia. It is one of the oldest cities in the Malay Archipelago and Southeast Asia. Palembang is located on the Musi River banks on the east coast of Southern Sumatra, with a land area of 369.22 square kilometres (142.56 square miles) and Palembang is the sixth-largest city in Indonesia after Jakarta, Surabaya, Bandung, Medan and Semarang. Its built-up (or metro) area with Talang Kelapa and Rambutan was home to 1,620,429 inhabitants at the 2010 census.

At 2°59'10' S 104°45'20" E, Palembang occupies 400.61 km² of vast lowland area east of Bukit Barisan Mountains in southern Sumatra with average elevation of 8 metres (26 feet), approximately 105 kilometres (65 miles) from nearby coast at Bangka Strait. One of the largest rivers in Sumatra, the Musi River, runs through the city, dividing the city area into two major parts which are Seberang Ilir in the north and Seberang Ulu in the south. Palembang is also located on the confluence of two major tributaries of Musi River, which are Ogan River and Komering River. The river's water level is influenced by tidal cycle. In rainy season, many areas on the city are inundated by the river's tide.

Palembang's topography is quite different between Seberang Ilir and Seberang Ulu area. Seberang Ulu topography is relatively flat, meanwhile Seberang Ilir topography is more rugged with altitude variation between 4 and 20 metres (13 and 66 feet).

Climate

Palembang is located in the tropical rainforest climate with significant rainfall even in its driest months. The climate in Palembang is often described with "hot, humid climate with a lot of rainfall throughout the year". The annual average temperature is around 27.3 °C (81.1 °F). Average temperatures are nearly identical throughout the year in the city. Average rainfall annually is 2,623 millimeters. During its wettest months, the city's lowlands are frequently inundated by torrential rains. However, in its driest months, many peatlands around the city dried, making them more vulnerable to wildfires, causing haze in the city for months.

Tourism

Ampera Bridge, main city landmark, is a bridge crossed over 1,177 metres (3,862 feet) above the Musi River which connects Seberang Ulu and Seberang Ilir area of Palembang. Great Mosque of Palembang, also known as the Sultan Mahmud Badaruddin II Mosque, is located in the city centre.

Benteng Kuto Besak, situated on the northern bank of the Musi River and adjacent to Ampera Bridge, this fort is one of the Palembang Darussalam Sultanate of heritage buildings. The fort's interior has been turned into military hospital of the Tentara Nasional Indonesia, specifically the Health Department of Military Area Command II/Sriwijaya (Kesehatan Daerah Militer II/Sriwijaya).

Kampung Arab Al-Munawar, a mixture of middle eastern and palembangnese Malay culture and architecture. It has been long known that any visitors should dress politely in order to visit this area.

Kampung Kapitan, the home of one of the oldest Chinese stilt house in the city. The primary attraction is Tjoa Ham Hin's house with centuries-old furniture inside. There was also a nearby Chinese temple, which was one of the oldest in Palembang as well. Long before its existence as the Chinese settlement area, it was also called Tanggo Rajo where foreigners and newcomers from the archipelago stayed at.

Kantor Ledeng, located in the city centre, at first this building served as a water tower. Today this building serves as the mayor office of Palembang.

Kambang Iwak, a lake located in the tourist centre of the city close to Palembang mayor's residence. On the banks of this lake, there is a park and recreation arena which is always crowded during holidays.

Punti Kayu Tourism Forest, city forest located about six miles (9.7 kilometres) from the city centre with an area of 50 hectares (120 acres) and since 1998 designated as protected forests. In this forest there is a family recreation area and a local shelter a group of monkeys: long-tail macaque (*Macaca fascicularis*) and monkey (*Macaca nemistriana*) under the Sumatran Pine wood (*Pinus mercurii*).

Sriwijaya Kingdom Archaeological Park, the remnants of Sriwijaya site located on the banks of the River Musi. There is an inscription and stone relics, complex of ancient pond, artificial island and canals dated from the Sriwijayan kingdom in this area. The Sriwijaya Museum is located in this complex.

Bukit Seguntang archaeological park, located in the hills west of Palembang city. In this place there are many relics and tombs of the ancient Malay-Sriwijayan king and nobles.

Monumen Perjuangan Rakyat / Monpera, located in the city centre, adjacent to the Great Mosque and Ampera Bridge. As its name in this building there are relics of history in the colonial period.

Museum Sultan Mahmud Badaruddin II, located near the Ampera Bridge and adjacent to Benteng Kuto Besak. The building located in the former royal palace of Palembang Sultanate. The museum displayed the relics and historical objects with collections spanned from Sriwijaya Kingdom period to Palembang Darussalam Sultanate era.

Rumah Limas of IDR 10000 banknote is now located in Museum Balaputradewa, Palembang.

Museum Balaputradewa, the home of Rumah Limas featured on IDR 10000 banknote. This type of stilt house is the traditional house of the people of Palembang.

8.4 West Java in Brief

The population of West Java was put at 43,054,000 in mid-2010 making it the most populous province of Indonesia, home to 18% of the national total on 1.8% of the national land. A side from the special district of Jakarta, it is the most densely populated province in the country with an average of 1,236 people per km² (2010 data). The population growth rate recorded in the ten years to 2010 was 1.9%

Tourism

Endowed with natural beauty and rich culture, tourism is also an important industry in West Java. The Puncak area and Bandung have long been known as popular weekend destinations for Jakarta. Today Bandung has developed into a chic and fashionable shopping destination, popular not only among local Indonesian especially Jakarta, but also a popular shopping destination for neighbouring Malaysian and Singaporeans. The ancient coastal city of Cirebon is also popular as cultural tourism destination since the city has several kratons and many historical sites such as Gua Sunyaragi. Other popular tourism destinations include the Bogor Botanical Garden, Taman Safari Indonesia, Tangkuban Perahu crater, Ciater hot springs, Kawah Putih crater to the south of Bandung, Pangandaran beach, and various mountain resorts in Cianjur, Garut, Tasikmalaya, and Kuningan.

6. Competitions Rules

6.1 Training Policies

Pre-competition training will be allocated to all NOCs two (2) days prior to the start of the competition for the sports (including familiarisation, if necessary). Training sessions are strictly by allocation; no change and addition of training

requests are allowed. NOCs are required to notify the Sport Information Desk if any NOC does not intend to use the allocated training session. The training schedule will be fully managed by INASGOC.

6.2 Training Schedules

a) Pre-competition Training

Training schedules for all teams will be finalised after the Official Draw and published to all NOCs before the start of the 18th Asian Games 2018. There will be no Official Training at any Stadium, however the Participating Teams are permitted to conduct familiarisation session at the Stadium 1 or 2 days prior to their first match at the Stadium. Familiarisation schedule will be finalised and provided to all NOC at least 2 days prior to the first match at the stadium.

b) Training during Competition

Training schedule for all team will be finalised after the Official Draw and published to all NOCs before the start of the 18th Asian Games 2018.

6.3 Equipment at Training Venues

Standard football equipment will be provided at all training venues.

7. Technical Regulations

7.1 The Football competition of the Games will be held in accordance with the Laws of the Game laid down by the International Football Board (IFAB) and published by the Fédération Internationale de Football Association (**FIFA**) in force during the period of the Games.

7.2 In case of any disagreement in the interpretation of the language of the Laws of the Game, the English version shall prevail.

7.3 Any unforeseen cases not covered by the Laws of the Game shall be resolved as follows:

a) General issues: Resolved in accordance with the OCA Constitution and Rules

b) Technical issues: Resolved in accordance with the Laws of the Game laid down by Football Association Board (IFAB) and published by Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) under the guidance of the

Technical Delegate (TD) appointed by the Asian Football Confederation (AFC).

- 7.4 Only three (3) substitutes listed on the Team Starting List may take part in the Match. A participating athlete who has been substituted out may take no further part in the Match. One additional substitute may be used when a match goes into extra time (whether or not the team has already used the full number of permitted substitutes)
- 7.5 If a Match is stopped by the Referee before the end of normal playing time or during any Extra Time as a result of a Participating Team being able to only field fewer than seven (7) participating athletes, the Match shall be declared abandoned and if the Participating Team who is able to field more than seven (7) Participating Athletes shall be declared the winner by the score three (3) – zero (0), or the score at the time of abandonment, whichever is higher. The Tournament Committee (and if required by the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee) shall decide on the consequences.

8. Competition Format

There shall be two (2) stages

- (a) Group Stage
- (b) Knock-out Stage (starting from Round of 16 onwards for Men and Quarter-final onwards for Women)

8.1 Group Stage – League System

- (a) Teams will be draw into several groups of 3, 4 or 5 teams each. Should there be any last-minute withdrawals by any NOC, the grouping shall remain unaltered on condition that there must be at least two (2) teams in a group.
- (b) Three (3) points will be awarded for a win, one (1) point for a draw and zero (0) point for a loss. When there is a draw, no extra time or kicks from the penalty mark will be played.

(c) Determining of Ranking in a Group

- (i) higher number of points obtained in all group Matches;
- (ii) if two (2) or more Participating Teams are equal on points, the following criteria are applied to determine the ranking (in descending order):

Head-to-Head criteria

- (iii) higher number of points obtained in the group Matches played among the Participating Teams in question;
- (iv) superior goal difference from the group Matches played among the Participating Teams in question;
- (v) higher number of goals scored in the group Matches played among the Participating Teams in question;

Tiebreaker

if, after having applied the Head-to-Head criteria, two (2) or more Participating Teams still have an equal ranking, the Head-to-Head criteria shall be reapplied exclusively to the Matches between those Participating Teams to determine their final rankings. If this is unsuccessful, the Group Results criteria shall apply;

Group Results criteria

- (vi) superior goal difference from all group Matches played;
- (vii) higher number of goals scored from all group Matches played;
- (viii) kicks from the Penalty Mark if only the two (2) Participating Teams are both on the Field of Play;
- (ix) the lower score calculated according to the number of yellow and red cards received in group Matches as indicated below:
 - per yellow card: one (1) point;
 - per red card (as a consequence of two yellow cards): three (3) points;
 - per red card (direct): three (3) points; and,
 - per yellow card followed by a red card (direct): four (4) points;or
- (x) the drawing of lots.

- (d) The Technical Committee has the right to reschedule the final matches of any group if such matches are deemed to affect the result of the other matches concerned; the matches may be rescheduled to be played simultaneously in two (2) different venues.

(e) Determining the best positioned team from groups

Case 1: Where all groups consist of the same number of teams (using the third-placed participating Team as the example)

Step 1: Identify the third-placed Participating Teams in each group

Step 2: Rank the third-placed Participating Teams on the following basis:

- i) greater number of points from all group Matches;
- ii) goal difference resulting from all group Matches;
- iii) greater number of goals scored in all group Matches;
- iv) application of the Fair Play Criteria (see above Group Result Criteria (iv));
- v) drawing of lots

Case 2: Where the number of teams in group varies (using the third-placed participating Team as the example)

In principle, the results between the identified Participating Teams and the fourth-placed participating Team (women FB) and fifth-placed participating Team (men FB) in the group shall be considered null and void (in order to ensure same number of matches played for all third-placed participating Teams in the group)

Step 1: Identify the third-placed Participating Teams in each group

Step 2: Rank the third-placed Participating Teams on the following basis:

- i) greater number of points from the Matches identified by AFC;
- ii) goal difference resulting from the Matches identified by AFC;
- iii) greater number of goals scored in the Matches identified by AFC;
- iv) application of the Fair Play Criteria in the Matches identified by AFC (see above Group Result Criteria (iv));
- v) drawing of lots

8.2 Knock-out Stage - Men

- a) The top two (2) teams in each group and four (4) best third placing teams among all the groups (total 16 teams) will qualify to the Round of 16.
- b) Men's Round of 16: The top 16 teams shall play their matches in as follows:

- c) Men's quarter-finals: The eight (8) winning teams of the Round of 16 will qualify for quarter-finals. The matches shall be played as follows:
- QF1: Winner R16 (1) vs Winner R16 (2)
 - QF2: Winner R16 (3) vs Winner R16 (4)
 - QF3: Winner R16 (5) vs Winner R16 (6)
 - QF4: Winner R16 (7) vs Winner R16 (8)
- d) Men's Semi-finals: The four (4) winning teams of the quarter-finals will qualify for semi-finals. The matches shall be played as follows:
- SF1: Winner QF1 vs Winner QF2
 - SF2: Winner QF3 vs Winner QF4
- e) Men's Bronze medal match: Loser Semi-final 1 vs Loser Semi-final 2
- f) Men's Final match: Winner Semi-final 1 vs Winner Semi-final 2

8.3 Knock-out Stage – Women

- a) The top two teams in each group and two (2) best third placing teams among all the groups (total 8 teams) will qualify to the quarter-finals.
- b) Women's quarter-finals: The top 8 teams shall play their matches in as follows:
- QF1: 1A vs 3BC
 - QF2: 1B vs 3AC
 - QF3: 1C vs 2B

- QF4: 2A vs 2C
- c) Women's semi-finals: The four (4) winning teams of the quarter-finals will qualify for semi-finals. The matches shall be played as follows:
- SF1: Winner QF1 vs Winner QF3
 - SF2: Winner QF2 vs Winner QF4
- d) Women's Bronze medal: Loser Semi-final 1 vs Loser Semi-final 2
- e) Women's Final match: Winner Semi-final 1 vs Winner Semi-final 2

9. Match duration, Extra time and Determining the Outcome of a Match

- 9.1 Each match shall be played for ninety (90) minutes, divided into two (2) halves of forty-five (45) minutes each with an interval of fifteen (15) minutes as stipulated in the FIFA Laws of the Game.
- 9.2 In the knock-out stage (except for Bronze Medal match), if the result is a draw at the end of normal playing time, extra time shall be played after an interval of five (5) minutes at the end of normal playing time. A short drinks break (which should not exceed one minute) is permitted at the interval of half-time in the Extra Time.
- 9.3 There shall be no extra time for the Bronze Medal matches and shall proceed directly to taking kicks from the penalty mark to determine the winner.
- 9.4 During the interval between normal and extra-time, athletes shall not be allowed to leave the Field of Play unless prior permission from the Referee has been obtained.
- 9.5 If no decisive result is obtained after the end of extension time, the winner shall be determined by the taking kicks from the penalty mark in accordance with the FIFA Laws of the Game.
- 9.6 If penalty Kicks cannot be completed because of weather conditions or for any Force Majeure reasons, the results shall be decided by the drawing of lots by the Referee in the presence of the Match Commissioner and the two (2) captains of the participating teams.

9.7 If, through the fault of a participating team, the Penalty Kicks cannot be completed, the Tournament Committee shall decide on the consequences.

9. Sport Entries

10.1 Eligibility

- a) Only OCA member NOCs are entitled to send players to participate in the Football competition of the Games. These players are to be bona fide citizens of the NOCs they represent in accordance with the FIFA Regulations Governing the Application of the Statutes.
- b) Only players who comply with the OCA Constitution and Rules, and its by-laws, as well as the FIFA Regulations Governing the Application of the Statutes are entitled to participate in the Football competition.

10.2 Entry Timeline

- Entry by Sport – Deadline : 31st January 2018 24:00 (Time, GMT +9)
- Entry by Number – Deadline: 30th April 2018 24:00 (Time, GMT +9)
- Entry by Name – Deadline : 30th June 2018 24:00 (Time, GMT +9)

10.3 Entry Policies

- a) Each NOC may enter only one (1) men's team and one (1) women's team.
- b) For the Entry by Name, each NOC may enter a maximum of thirty (30) players with a minimum of three (3) goalkeepers for both Men and Women.

10.4 Age restriction:

- a) In Men's Football competition, only players born on or after January 1, 1995 are eligible to take part in the competition. However, a maximum of three (3) players who are older than the stipulated age limit may also be included in the official list of players.

- b) In Women's Football competition, there is no age restriction for the players.

10.5 Nationality

- a) For all players, the FIFA Regulations Governing the Application of the Statutes, shall be applied in the determination of the player's nationality. The player's passport shall serve as the primary proof of nationality. It should be free from tampering and any changes must be properly endorsed by the competent authority. Additional documents may be required by the OCA to be presented in order to establish a player's nationality. A player's evidence of nationality shall be produced whenever required by the relevant Committee or Officials of the OCA.
- b) Participating teams must be from the National Association which are affiliated with the AFC and/or FIFA, and which belong to a NOC affiliated with the OCA. No team shall be permitted to play a match against any team of an association not affiliated to FIFA without the consent of FIFA.

NOCs that withdraw their players or team after the submission of the final entries by name and team will face disciplinary action by the OCA EB.

10.6 Team Registration

- a) Final Registration
Each team shall submit their respective Final Registration to the Match Commissioner during the Match Coordination Meeting, where each team shall specify a minimum of eighteen (18) players and up to a maximum of twenty (20) players, with a minimum of two (2) goalkeepers for both Men's and Women's Football; from the Entry by Name list. The status of team officials shall be decided later.
- b) Replacement of Player After Final Registration
Once the final registration of the abovementioned players has been submitted and received by the Match Commissioners, participating Teams can still replace any of these players on any grounds, up until six

(6) hours before their first Match in the competition. There shall be no replacement of players after the aforesaid time frame for the entire Football competition.

c) Match Starting List

Each Team must hand the 'Player Selection List' with the names of the eleven (11) players who will start the Match and other players who are designated as either substitutes, suspended or injured as well as the name of the team captain, to the Match Commissioner upon their arrival to the Stadium or at least 90 minutes before the kick-off of their match.

d) The Match Commissioner will then produce the 'Match Starting List' which must be signed by the Head Coaches of both Teams. The Match Commissioner and Fourth Official will ask to see the Accreditation Cards and uniforms/equipment of the players whose names are listed on the 'Match Starting List'. Each player participating in the match must be in possession of their Accreditation Card for them to be entitled to play.

e) After the 'Match Starting List' has been completed and signed by both Teams and returned to the Match Commissioner, and if the Match has not yet kicked-off, the following would apply:

(i) If any of the eleven (11) players listed on the Match Starting List selected to start the match are not able to start the match for any reason, they may be replaced by any of the substitutes listed on the Match Starting List. During the match, three (3) players may still be replaced; and

(ii) The replaced player(s) shall no longer be eligible to participate in the match.

11. Team Bench and Technical Area

11.1 Up to a maximum of six (6) team officials and a maximum of nine (9) players (substitute or injured) are allowed to sit on the team bench during the Match, provided they are in possession of the appropriate accreditation and access card. A suspended player or official will not be allowed to sit on the substitutes' bench.

- 11.2 All officials and athletes on the team bench must wear their accreditation card at all times. The accreditation card shall always be available for inspection prior to the start of the match.
- 11.3 All officials and athletes on the bench must wear kits that are contrasting with the kit of the players and referees on the pitch. This kit must comply with the AFC Equipment Regulations.
- 11.4 Team A shall occupy the left-hand side bench and Team B shall be on the righthand side as viewed from the Fourth official bench.
- 11.5 The use of any form of electronic communication by team officials is permitted where it directly relates to player welfare or safety or for tactical/coaching reasons but only small, mobile, hand-held equipment (e.g. microphone, headphone, ear-piece, mobile phone/ smartphone, smartwatch, tablet, laptop) may be used. A team official who uses unauthorised equipment or who behaves in an inappropriate manner as a result of the use of electronic or communication equipment will be dismissed from the technical area.

12. Technical Officials

Technical Officials, Disciplinary and Ethics Committee & Appeals Committee

The AFC shall appoint Referees and Assistant Referees from the official FIFA List of International Referees and Assistant Referees. The AFC shall also have the right to appoint the Technical Delegate and the International Technical Officials as may be approved by the OCA. In the event of a violation of the Games Rules and Regulation and/or AFC/FIFA Rules and Regulations by any player, the OCA has the right to revoke the Accreditation Card and to propose changing the person to the concerned party.

The AFC shall appoint the Members of the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee and the AFC Appeals Committee.

13. Technical Meeting

Date : One (1) day prior to MD1
Time and Place : To be decided

14. Indiscipline and Violent Conduct

Any player or official reported for indiscipline or violent conduct anywhere in the stadium including but not limited to the field of play, the changing rooms, the Training Sites and hotels shall be dealt with by the:

- (a) AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee in accordance with the AFC Statutes, AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Code, AFC Code of Conduct, the relevant AFC Circular(s) and any other AFC Regulations; and/or
- (b) OCA EB.

15. Disciplinary Measures and Appeals

15.1 Disciplinary measures and appeals shall be dealt with in compliance and in accordance with the AFC Statutes, AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Code, AFC Code of Ethics, the relevant AFC Circular(s) and any other AFC Regulations.

15.2 The AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee may impose disciplinary measures for any violations of the aforesaid statutes, regulations, codes and circulars unless jurisdiction of another body has been specifically provided for. An appeal may be lodged to the AFC Appeal Committee against any decision passed by the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee unless otherwise stated under the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Code.

16. Cautions and Expulsions

16.1 All matters relating to cautions and/or expulsions, including the carrying forward of cautions between stages of the Competition, shall be undertaken in accordance with the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Code. For the avoidance of any doubt any athlete who receives a caution in two (2) separate Matches shall be automatically suspended for the next Match in the competition except where expressly set out below.

- 16.2. A player who completes the Group Stage having received only one (1) caution carry forward that caution to the Knock-out Stage. A player who completes the Round of 16 having cumulatively received only one (1) caution shall carry forward that caution to the Quarter-final. A player who completes the Quarter-final having cumulatively received only one (1) caution shall not carry forward that caution to the Semi-final.
- 16.3. A player and/or official who was sent off during the Competition shall automatically be suspended from the match following the match in which he or she was sent off. If the player and/or official was sent off in his or her team's last match in the Competition, the suspension will be carried forward as indicated in the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Code.
- 16.4. Any player and/or official who was sent off during the Competition shall remain suspended from further play until his or her case has been decided by the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee.
- 16.5. A suspended player and/or official shall not be allowed on the substitution bench, technical area and team dressing room.
- 16.6. Each Team shall bear the responsibility of monitoring the cautions and/or suspensions received by its players and officials and to ensure that all players and officials registered and/or fielded during the Competition are eligible to play.

17. Protests and Appeals

- 17.1 A protest is an objection of any kind to any matter that has a direct effect on the matches and any matters relating to breaches of this Handbook and/or the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Code.

17.2 Unless otherwise stipulated, to be considered valid, protests shall be:

- 17.2.1 submitted in writing to the Match Commissioner within two (2) hours of the end of the match in question;

- 17.2.2 followed up with a full written report, including a copy of the original protest, sent to the AFC General Secretariat within forty eight (48) hours from the end of the match;
- 17.2.3 accompanied by a non-refundable fee of five hundred US Dollars only (USD500) submitted within forty eight (48) hours of the end of the match.
- 17.3 No protest shall be lodged relating to the Referee's decisions regarding facts connected with play. Such decisions are final and binding and not subject to appeal, unless expressly otherwise stipulated in the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Code**
- 17.4 Should the AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee determine that a protest is unfounded or irresponsible, it may impose a fine.
- 17.5 If any of the formal conditions of a protest as set out herein are not met, such protest shall be disregarded. Following the completion of the final match of the Games, all protests shall be disregarded.**
- 17.6 The AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee shall make decisions on protests. The AFC Disciplinary and Ethics Committee may transfer a protest to the Technical Delegate for its decision if it is deemed to be purely operational in nature.**

18. Equipment and Clothing

- 18.1 Equipment and clothing (**Equipment**) shall be in accordance with the AFC Equipment Regulations and specifications set by OCA and INASGOC. If any Equipment submitted infringes any of the aforesaid Regulations and/or specifications, the Technical Committee will require the infringing team(s) to take corrective action(s).

- 18.2 Each team shall submit to INASGOC two (2) set of jersey colours together with the entry. The official jersey colour shall be noticeably different from and contrast with the colour of the reserve jersey (shirts, shorts, and socks). The goalkeepers shall wear colours contrasting with those of the two teams and the referee.**
- 18.3 Teams are required to wear the colours as assigned by the Match Commissioner. Teams must bring both set of jerseys to every match. If thermal shorts are used, they shall bear the same colour as the main colour of the shorts.
- 18.4. Throughout the competition, each player shall wear the number allotted to him or her on the Final Entry (Entry by Name) List. None of the numbers may contain advertising, design features, or any other elements.**
- 18.5. The player's name or popular name, not exceeding 7.5cm in height, shall be affixed above the number on the back of the shirt and shall be clearly legible. The letters should be capitalized and contain no advertising, design features, or any other elements.**
- 18.6 The AFC Equipment Regulations shall apply to any article worn or equipment used by a participating national association during the Games.
- 18.7 Player (including substitutes/substituted and sent off players) are not permitted to wear or use any form of electronic or communication equipment (except where EPTS is allowed).
- 18.8 Where wearable technology (WT) as part of electronic performance and tracking systems (EPTS) is used in matches played in an official competition organised under the auspices of FIFA, confederations or national football associations, the competition organiser must ensure that the technology attached to the player's equipment is not dangerous and must bear the following mark: IMS INTERNATIONAL MATCH STANDARD

19. Doping Control

- 19.1 The OCA Medical Committee and Anti-Doping Commission (OCA-MCADC) is solely responsible for the initiation and direction of any doping control during the Games.
- 19.2 Doping Control during the Games will be conducted in accordance with the OCA Anti-Doping Rules applicable to the Asian Games, the AFC Anti-Doping Regulations and the World Anti-Doping (WADA) International Standards for Testing and Investigations.
- 19.3 Every player may be subject to both In-Competition Testing at the matches in which he/she competes and Out-of-Competition Testing at any place. Testing may include both urine and blood and may be carried out with no advance notice.
- 19.4 Doping Control stations will be set up at the competition venue, where In-Competition testing will be conducted. Doping Control procedures shall be implemented according to WADA's International Standards for Testing and Investigations. Sample analysis will be performed at a WADA-accredited laboratory or as otherwise approved by WADA.
- 19.5 A player identified for doping control should be accompanied by a team official during the entire testing process.
- 19.6 INASGOC, in collaboration with the OCA-MCADC shall have in place the resources to assist in the investigation of any cases involving gender determination, should the need arise. The need for such tests and the processes to be followed will be as per the rules/procedures laid down by the OCA.

Result Management

- 19.7 Should the OCA-MCADC or its relevant decision-making bodies hold that a player has committed an Anti-Doping Rule Violation, this shall not in any way affect the ability of the AFC to conduct results management and initiate a disciplinary procedure pursuant to the AFC Anti-Doping Regulations.

- 19.8 The AFC shall also have the rights to result managements for both In-Competition and Out-of-Competition Testing.

20. Victory Ceremony

- 20.1 Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded to the top three teams. Fifteen minutes before the Victory Ceremony starts, the teams shall be escorted to the Waiting Area to get ready for the ceremony. Such players must wear their official uniforms/designated sports attire when receiving the medals.
- 20.2 The flag of the country of the winner shall be hoisted on the central flagpole and the National Anthem of the country of the winner shall be played.

21. Matters Not Provided For

Any matters not provided for in these Regulations and any cases of force majeure shall be decided by the Technical Committee in cooperation with the OCA and the AFC. All decisions shall be final and binding and not subject to appeal.

22. Exclusive Jurisdiction

For avoidance of doubt, nothing in this Handbook shall preclude the jurisdiction and/or purview of the AFC to investigate, hear and/or decide on all matters pertaining to football during and after the Games.
