65th Independence Day - More than 8 Million Residents in the State of Israel

On the eve of Israel's 65th Independence Day: 1

- The population of Israel numbers approximately 8.018 million people on the eve of Israel's 65th Independence Day. At the time of the establishment of the State, it numbered 806,000 residents.
- The Jewish population numbers approximately 6.042 million residents (75.3% of the total population); the Arab population numbers approximately 1.658 million residents (20.7%); and the population of "others," referring to non-Arab Christians, members of other religions, and persons not classified by religion in the Ministry of the Interior, numbers 318,000 (4.0%).
- Since Independence Day last year² the population increased by 138,000 persons. There have been approximately 163,000 babies born, and about 41,000 people passed away; 19,500 immigrants arrived in Israel.³
- In total, the population of Israel grew since the 64th Independence Day by approximately 138,000 residents - a growth of 1.8 %.
- At the end of 2011, over 70% of the total Jewish population were 'Sabras' born in Israel (at least half are second generation in the country) - compared with only 35% native-born in 1948.
- In 1948 there was only one city in Israel with more than 100,000 residents Tel Aviv-Yafo. Today, 14 cities number more than 100,000 residents, of which six number more than 200,000 residents: Jerusalem, Tel Aviv-Yafo, Haifa, Rishon LeZiyyon, Ashdod, and Petah Tiqwa.

¹ The Press Release in based on preliminary data. The population estimate does not include the foreign population, who numbered about 203,000 persons at the end of 2011.

Due to differences in the Hebrew calendar, the data relate to the 11.5 months (approximately) that passed since the last Independence Day.

³ Including citizens who immigrated; an immigrating citizen refers to a person born to an Israeli citizen while staying abroad, who entered Israel with the intention of settling.
