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Section One

POPULATION

This section presents statistics on growth, geographic distribution and general characteristics of the local population. Results from the 2010 Census of American Samoa are reproduced in this publication until the next census is conducted in April 2020. The decennial census is conducted every 10 years.

The U.S. Census Bureau released the 2010 Census total population and breakdown of the population by district, county and village levels. The 2010 Census counted the population of American Samoa at 55,519. According to the 2010 Census information, the median age was 22.4 years and the gender ratio was recorded at 103 males for every 100 females.

The population density (average number of persons per square kilometer) in 2016 was 283. This number could be a lot higher given the ruggedness and steep mountainous landscaping of the islands. People move to other places because of economic reasons, availability of land resources, and socio-political stability. The Manu'a Island residents continued to relocate to the main island of Tutuila looking for better economic opportunities or attending schools. Tutuila's population shifted from the Eastern District to the Western District in the past decades. In the 2010 Census, there were 31,329 people living in the Western District while 23,030 people live in the Eastern District.

The mid-year population estimate is derived from the Balancing Equation Method, taking into account the net migration of residents, births and deaths. These are the three forces that can change the population count. The mid-year population estimate for 2016 was 60,200 people living in American Samoa. The mid-year population estimates, as calculated by the Department of Commerce, may be different significantly when compared to those calculated elsewhere such as the Secretariat of the Pacific Community. Sources of data may be suspected as the cause of this critical disparity.

While the proportion of the American Samoa born population remained above 50 percent, the trend of foreign-born has increased from less than 20 percent in 1960 to over 40 percent in the 2010 census. The majority of the foreign-born were from neighboring Samoa accounted for about 30 percent, followed by the US born population with 6 percent. The resident population remained ethnically Samoan at 85 percent. There were over 19,000 that were neither citizen nor national of the United States. 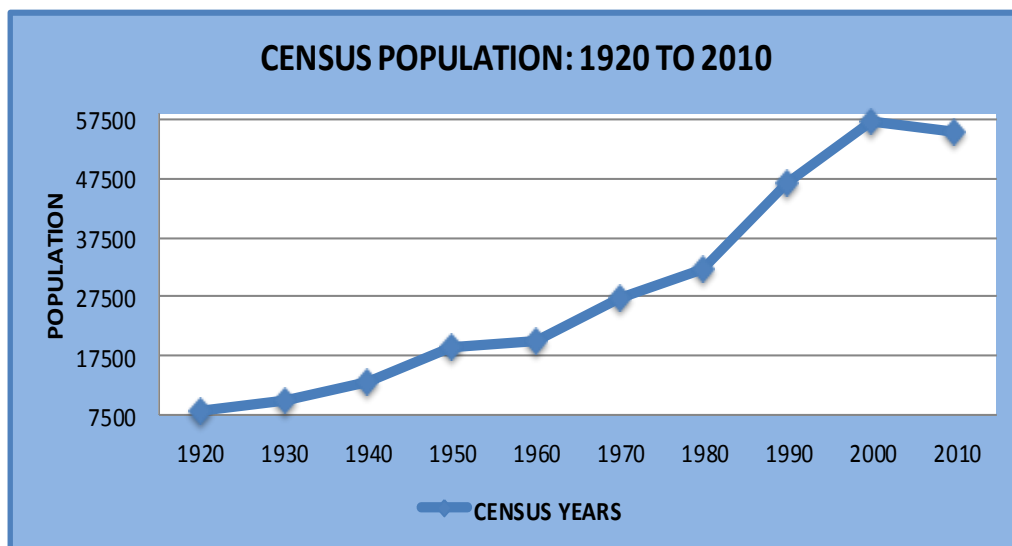

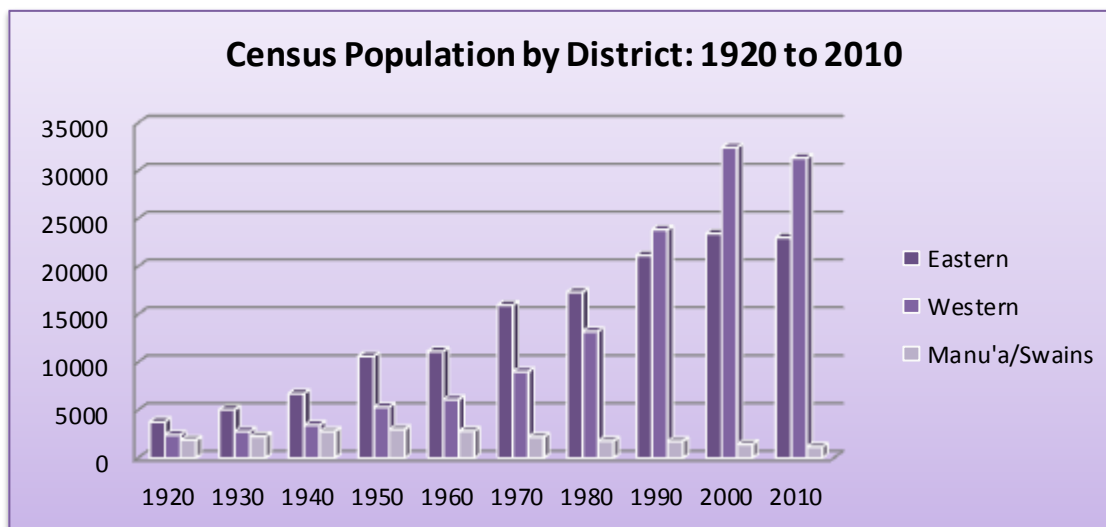

Section Two

VITAL AND HEALTH STATISTICS

This section presents data on births, deaths, life expectancy, marriages, diseases, patient visits and hospital discharges.

The LBJ Tropical Medical Center reported 1,013 births and 280 deaths in 2016. Teen births made up 10% of total births in 2016. Age groups 20-24 and 25-29 accounted for 29% and 27% of births respectively.

The Crude Birth Rate (CBR) was 16.8 in 2016. The Crude Death Rate (CDR) was 4.7 in the same year. Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) was calculated at 4.9, Neonatal Mortality Rate at 10.9 and Fetal deaths at 6.9.

The leading causes of death in 2016 were heart disease (19.3%), malignant neoplasm (15.7%), septicemia (12.5%), influenza/pneumonia (10.7%), and hypertension (10%). All other causes of death including not specified were at 31.8%.

Population natural growth is defined as total births minus deaths. The natural growth of the population in 2016 was 733 a 6.7% decrease from the previous year. Natural growth prior to 2011 registered above 1,000 persons added to the local population each year.

The number of out-patient visits in 2016 was 112,653 a significant drop from the previous year. Most out-patient clinics visits dropped in 2016. The Vital Statistics Office reported 253 marriage licenses were issued in 2016 a drop from 2015 which reported 264 marriages.

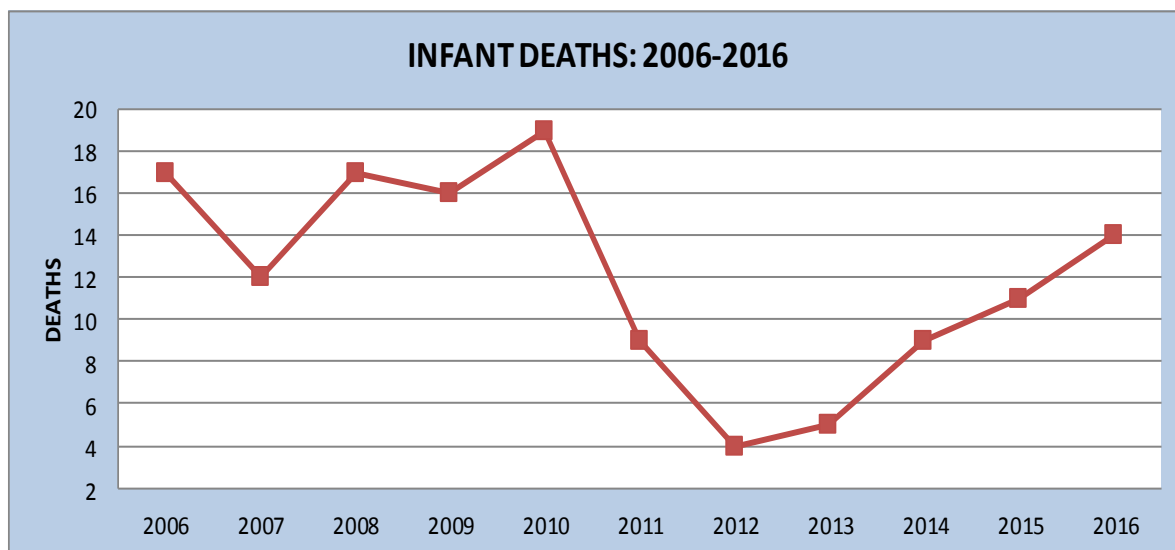

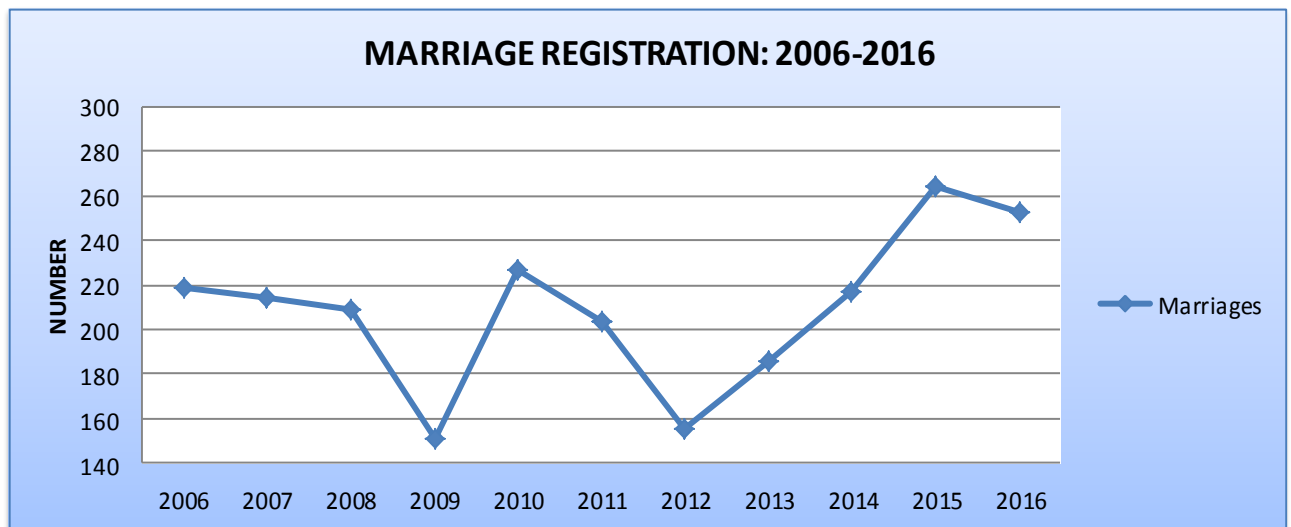

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Section Three

EDUCATION

This section presents statistical information on the number of educational institutions, school enrollment, and educational achievement.

The number of educational institutions in American Samoa remained at 110 from 2014 to 2016. This number includes American Samoa Community College (the only community college) located at Mapusagafou. School enrollment dropped again from 16,648 in 2015 to 16,559 in 2016. ASCC enrollment also dropped slightly in 2016 with 1,254 compared to 1,284 in 2015.

The average school enrollment for both public and private schools for the 2015-2016 school year was 14,981. School enrollment for public schools dropped again this year to 13,236. Public high school graduates vary from year to year. In the 2015-2016 school year, public and private high school graduates dropped again for the third straight year to 1,008 compared to the previous two years (2014 and 2015) which had graduates of 1,070 and 1,039 respectively. In 2016, there were 1,254 students who enrolled at ASCC full time and 553 enrolled part-time. More females than males have enrolled at the college for more than a decade.

ASCC offers many majors and certificate programs. About 27% of students majored in liberal arts but other majors are popular as well like accounting, business management, criminal justice, education, nursing, and health science and make up 44% of students enrolled at the college.

ASCC awarded a total of 139 degrees and certificates in 2016. It awarded 75 Associate of Arts degrees (54%), 60 Associate of Science degrees (43%), 3 Certificate of Proficiency (2%), and 1 Bachelor in Elementary Education (1%).

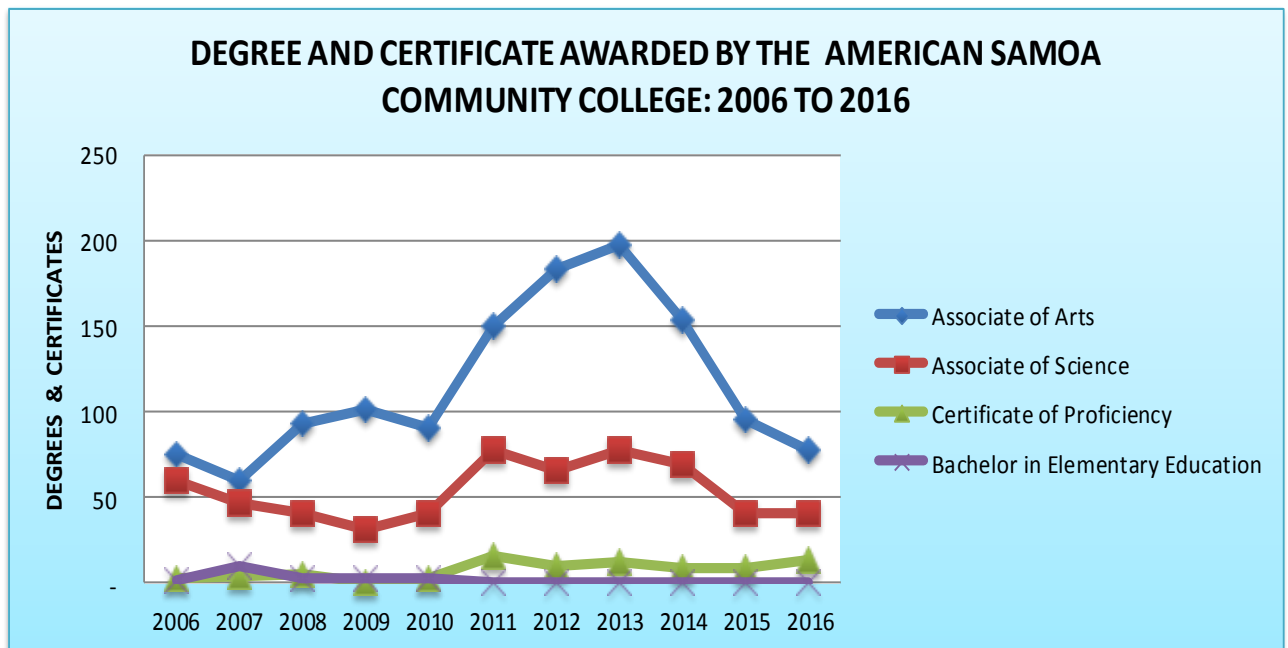

Section Four

LAW ENFORCEMENT

This section contains statistical data on crime, traffic, accidents, firearm registration, correctional facility, population, fire, and court activities.

The Department of Public Safety reported 282 Part I offenses in FY2016. Part I offenses include eight crimes such as murder and non-negligent homicide, rape (legacy & revised), robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, larceny-theft, and arson. The most crimes committed during FY2016 were burglary followed by larceny and assault (1st and 2nd).

In FY2016, DPS reported 1,512 Part II offenses. Part II offenses are other assaults, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property (buying, receiving possessing), vandalism, weapons (carrying, possessing, etc.), drug abuse violations, gambling, offenses against the family and children, driving under the influence, liquor laws, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, all other offenses, suspicion, curfew and loitering laws (person under age 18), and runaways (person under age 18).

Part one offenses that were committed by juveniles in FY2016 has decreased by 8.5 percent. Part two offenses also dropped by 16 percent in FY2016. Two leading offenses for Part one and Part two offenses were burglary and disorderly conduct respectively.

In FY2016, traffic accidents increased by 1.5 percent. There were 750 traffic accidents reported in FY2016. A total of 89 people suffered injuries in these accidents and one fatality was reported. A total of 192 firearms were registered in FY2016 increasing by 39 firearms from FY2015. The Tafuna Correctional Facility reported 183 inmates in FY2016 compared to 196 in 2015. Average inmate population in FY2016 was 183 compared to 197 in FY2015. For FY2016, the majority of inmates incarcerated are Samoa Citizens with 51.4%. Other inmates are U.S. Nationals with 44.3 percent, U.S. Citizens with 2.2 percent, Tonga with 1.1% and Asians with 1.1%.

In 2016, there were 85 fires reported. A breakdown of these fires reported 74 residential, 6 commercial, and 7 industrial.

The High Court reported 295 cases were filed in FY2016. There were 1,537 pending cases from FY2015 which were carried forward to FY2016. Only 302 cases were completed and disposed in FY2016.

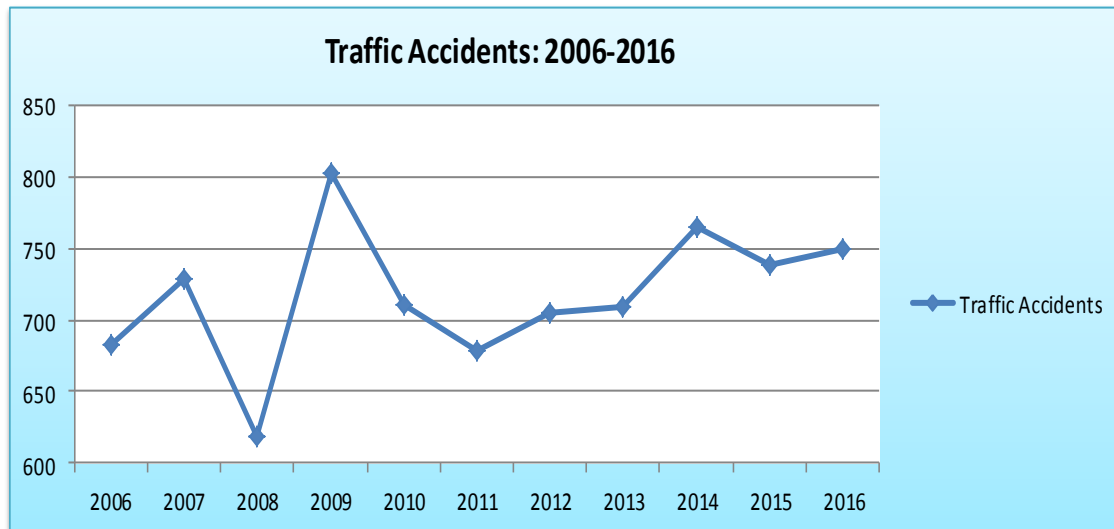

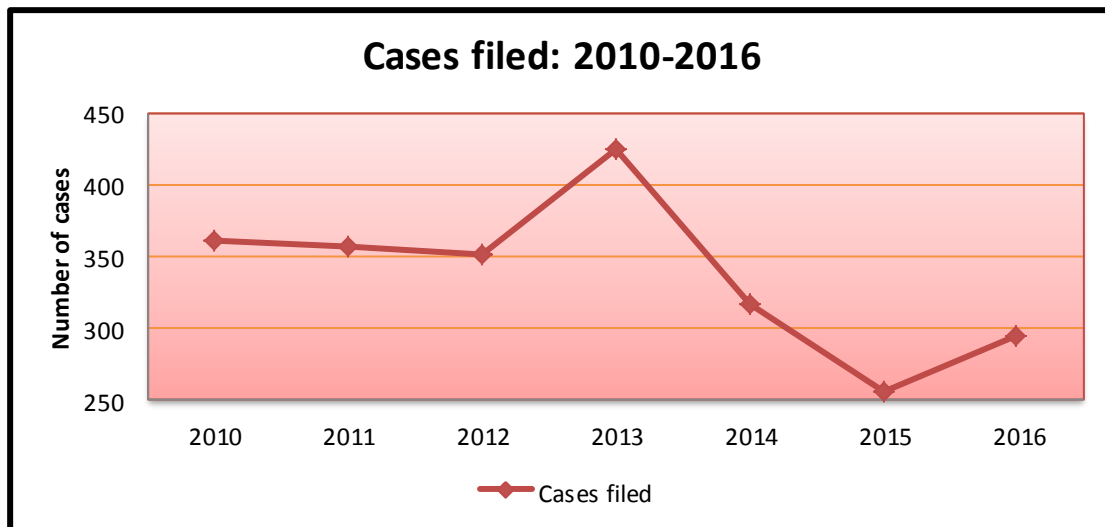

Section Five

CLIMATE

This section presents climate data for American Samoa.

American Samoa has a tropical maritime climate with abundant rain and warm, humid days and nights. The average temperature in 2016 was recorded at 82.5 degrees Fahrenheit. Throughout the past ten years, average temperature remained between 81.2 and 83.3 degrees. A total of 112.97 inches of rainfall was recorded in 2016. The month of April recorded the most rain with 30.87 inches and June recorded the lowest rainfall with 3.88 inches.

The two main seasons in Samoa are those of wet and dry, sometimes referred to as 'summer' and 'winter'. However, these are actually relative terms as it still rains quite a bit during the dry season. In addition, the south coast receives, on an annual basis, approximately twice as much rain as the north coast.

Summer or wet season is also cyclone season and runs from November through April. Winds tend to be either calm or mainly out of the north. Although heavy rain, showers and long rainy periods can occur any month of the year, torrential downpours are most common and humidity is at its peak during the summer months.

Winter or dry season is also Trade Wind season and runs May through October. The Trade Winds are mainly south-easterly but can turn to a more easterly direction at times. During the winter months the Trade Winds tend to blow rather incessantly and can range from anywhere from mild to rather strong at times. However, the Trade Winds can also blow during any month of the year, not just the winter months, or they might unexpectedly stop blowing in the middle of the Trade Wind season, often for days at a time.

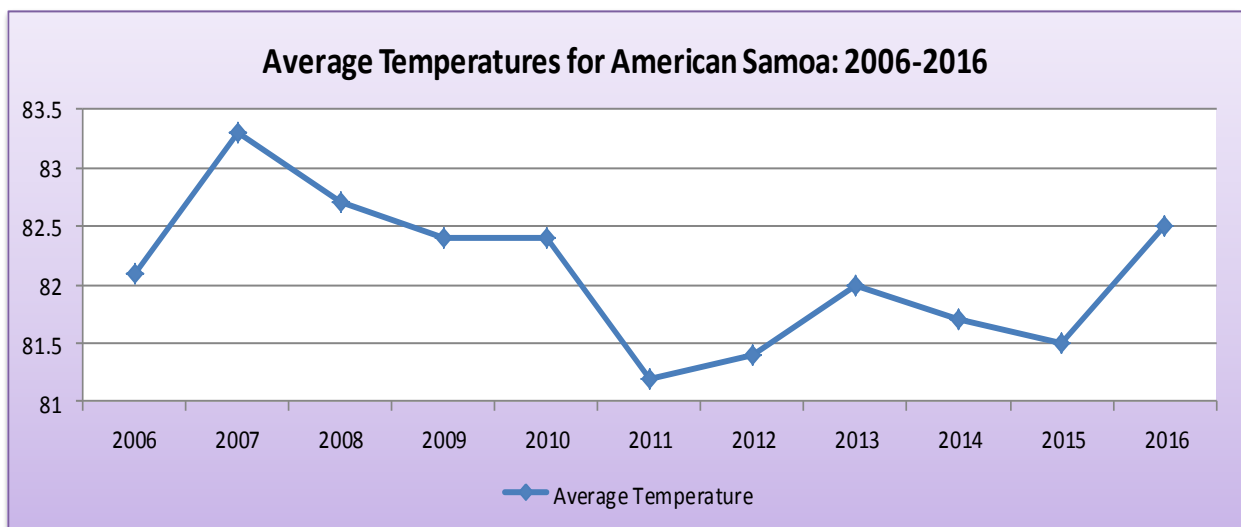

Note: A cooling degree day is a unit used to relate the day's temperature to the energy demands of air conditioning. Cooling degree days are calculated by subtracting 65 from a day's average temperature. For example, if the day's high is 90°F and the day's low is 70°F, the day's average is 80°F. Eighty minus 65 is 15 cooling degree days. Cooling degree days can be used to compare the current summer to past summers. It can also be used to compare the heat in one part of the country with another.

Section Six

**LAND USE/REGISTRATION, HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS, AND
BUILDING PERMITS**

This section presents statistics on land use, land ownership registration and tenure, housing characteristics, building permits, type and value of construction activities.

American Samoa has a total land area of 48,767 acres and about two-thirds of the land is steeply sloping and virtually inaccessible. Land registration at the Office of the Territorial Registrar added another 9 acres of land in 2016, which increases the registered acres of land to approximately 7,911. Land ownership registration is categorized into five titles. Communal land holds 26.7 percent, individually-owned holds 25.8 percent, government-owned holds 20.9 percent, freehold land holds 13.6 percent and church-owned holds 13.0 percent.

In the 2010 Census, American Samoa registered 10,963 housing units. Of the 10,963 housing units, 88 percent were occupied and 12 percent (1,275) were vacant. Of the 9,688 occupied housing units, 73 percent were owner-occupied and 27 percent were renter-occupied. In the Tualauta County, Tafuna village had the highest number of occupants per room in both owner-occupied and renter-occupied units.

Approximately 55 percent of the 10,963 housing units were located in the Maoputasi and Tualauta counties. Furthermore, these two counties absorbed most of the growth: a combined 68 percent of the rental market. Housing units are characterized as single detached units, attached units, 2 houses, 3 or more houses. This is unique to American Samoa where about 8 percent of households live in two or more houses. Those living in apartment housing although small but are on the rise as 7 percent of households live in building with two or more housing units. Those living in single detached houses have increased slightly from 78 percent in 2000 to 79 percent in 2010.

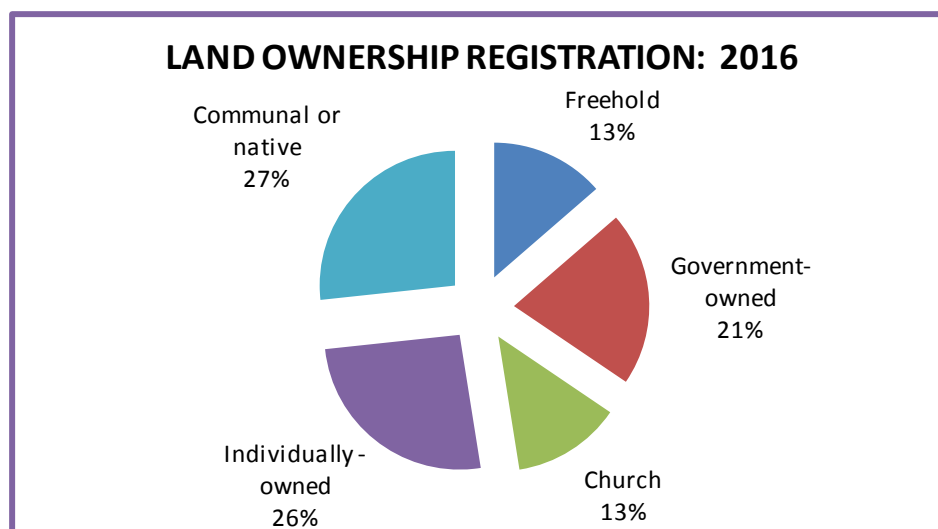
The number of building permits issued increased to 547 in 2016. Permits issued for new structures increased to 144 in 2016. Permits for extension, repair and alteration also increased in 2016 with 403 permits issued. The estimated value of construction went up to \$15.4 million in 2016.

Section Seven

INTERNATIONAL ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES

This section presents statistical data on international arrivals and departures by purpose and citizenship of travelers.

Approximately 70,370 travelers arrived in American Samoa in 2016. The majority of travelers were returning residents of American Samoa (41,843). Visitor arrivals accounted for 28.5 percent of all arrivals in 2016. Visitor arrivals dropped to 20,050 in 2016 compared to 20,328 in 2015.

There were 72,117 travelers that departed from American Samoa in 2016. As usual, the majority of departures were residents leaving the island (43,582) for better opportunities abroad. A net loss of 1,747 persons resulted in 2016. When looking at the data, arrivals and departures have been increasing since 2014.

New Zealand continued to lead the United States as our primary tourism market holding 43.7 percent of the market. The United States followed with 38.4 percent, Australia with 11.3 percent and the rest of the countries with the remaining 6.7 percent.

Section Eight

ELECTION

This section presents data on the American Samoa voter registration, election results and participation by voting districts, village, age and gender of the voting population.

About 17,296 people registered to vote in the 2016 General Election on November 8, 2016. This is an increase from the 2014 General Election. Although over seventeen thousand registered to vote in the 2016 election, there were only 12,069 voters who casted votes. The Tualauta voting district (District #15) cast the most votes with 2,376 (19.7 percent). Ituau (District #12) was second with 1,523 votes cast (about 12.6 percent) in the General Election.

In the 2016 election, the majority of registered voters were between the ages of 18 and 34 (48.3 percent). About 22.2 percent of registered voters were between the ages of 35 and 49. The 50-64 age group made up 17.5 percent of registered voters. The 65 and over age group had the least registered voters with 12 percent. A total of 8,002 males (46.3 percent) registered to vote while 9,294 females (53.7 percent) registered to vote in the 2016 General Election. Only 70 percent of voters casted votes in the 2016 General Election.

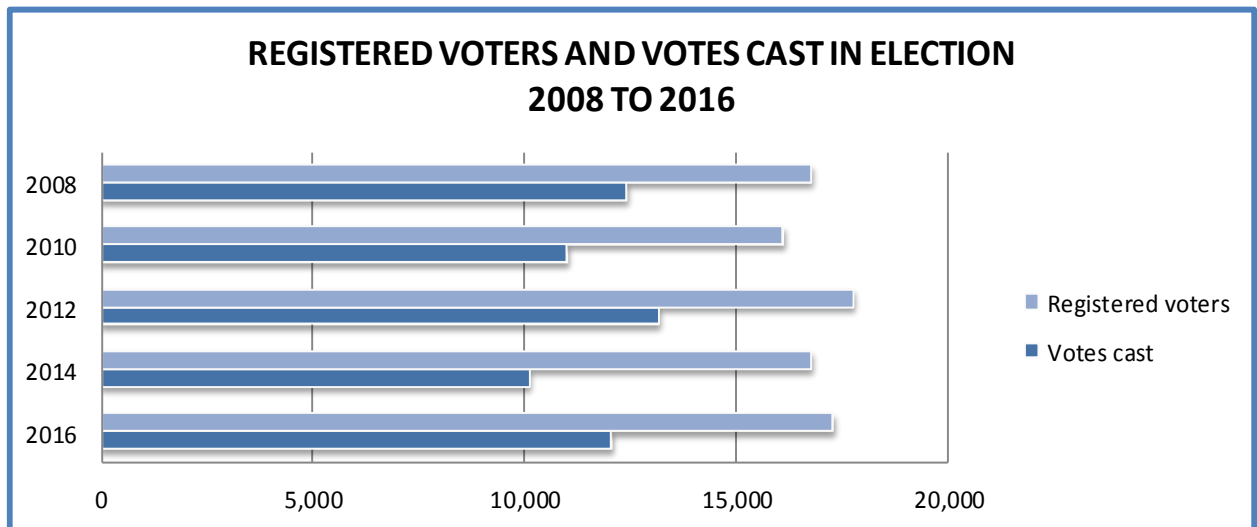

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Section Nine

GOVERNMENT FINANCE

This section presents statistical data on government revenues and expenditures.

The American Samoa Government adopted GASB Statement No. 34 since 2002. It is a reporting approach established by Governmental Accounting Standards Board to enforce new requirements and a new reporting model for the annual financial reports of state and local governments. Its primary purpose is to develop annual financial reports for easier interpretations and understandings of government funding. GASB No. 34 has technically changed the format of the financial statements in contrast in years before 2002. This had made financial data incompatible for analytical purposes. Therefore, it is difficult to evaluate the financial trend from previous to 2002.

The American Samoa Government collected \$249 million in revenues and spent \$262.5 million in Fiscal Year 2016. The resulting deficit in FY2016 was \$13.5 million. In Fiscal Year 2015, the government collected \$253.7 million in revenues and spent \$268.6 million resulting in a \$14.9 million deficit. Federal grants accounted for 65 percent of revenues in FY 2016. Local taxes accounted for 27.4 percent of revenues in the same fiscal year.

In Fiscal Year 2016, 27.1 percent of expenditures were for Education and Culture followed up by Health and Welfare with 21.4 percent and General Government with 19.1 percent.

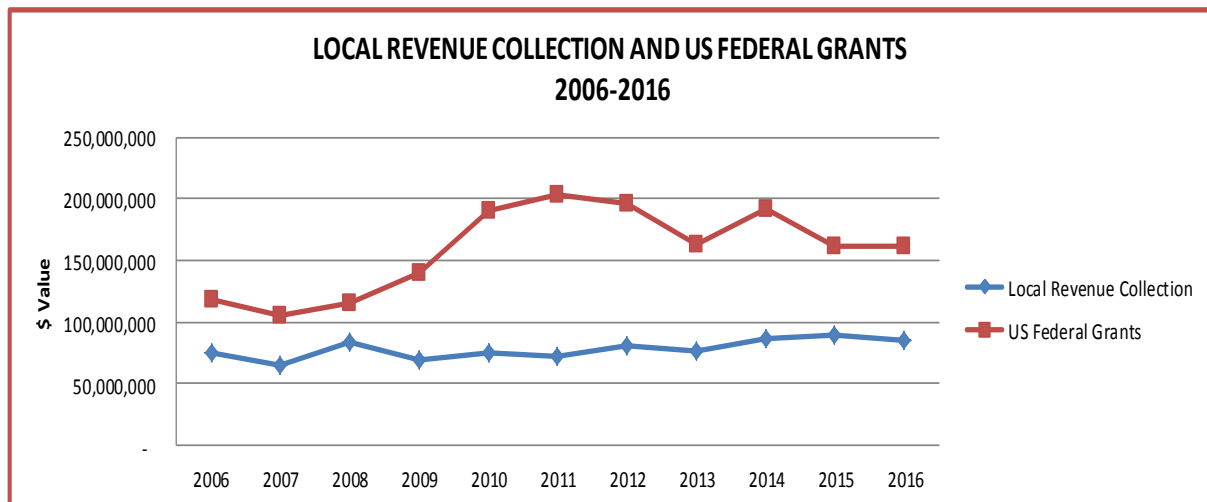

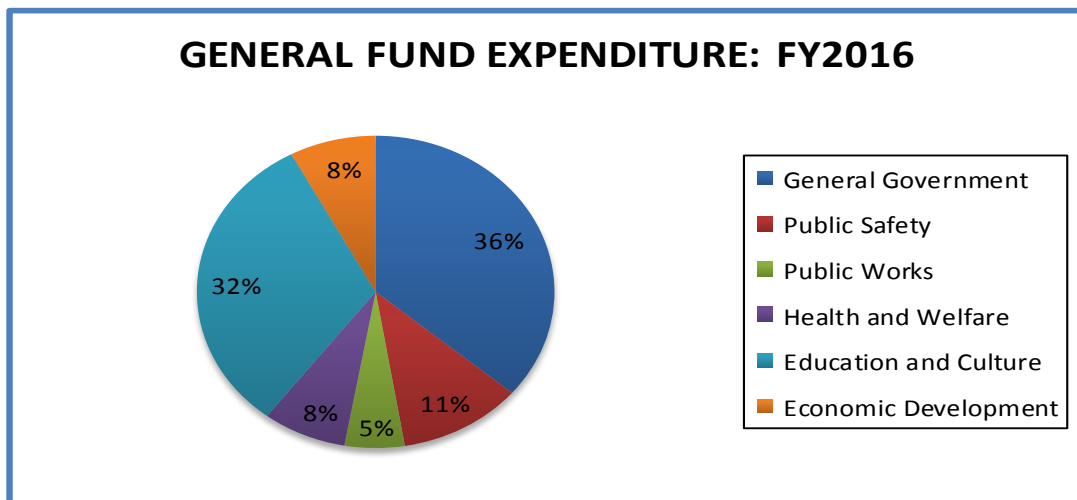

Section Ten

LABOR FORCE, EMPLOYMENT AND EARNINGS

This section presents statistical data on labor force participation, employment and earnings.

In 2016, total employment was estimated at 17,930 a minimal increase from 2015. General Government and the four government authorities made up 36.7 percent of the workforce in 2016. General government decreased in 2016 whereas all government authorities (ASPA, ASCC, ASTCA and LBJ) increased along with the canneries.

“The Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2007 (Public Law 110-28), as amended, applies the minimum wage rates to industries in American Samoa. This law also provides for additional increases in the minimum wage of \$0.40 per hour to occur every three (3) years (e.g. 2018, 2021, 2024, etc.) on September 30, until reaching the minimum wage generally applicable in the U.S.”

In 2010, the median household income was \$23,892. Close to \$350 million worth of income from all sources were received by all residents of the territory in 2010. Thus, the per capita income was \$6,311.

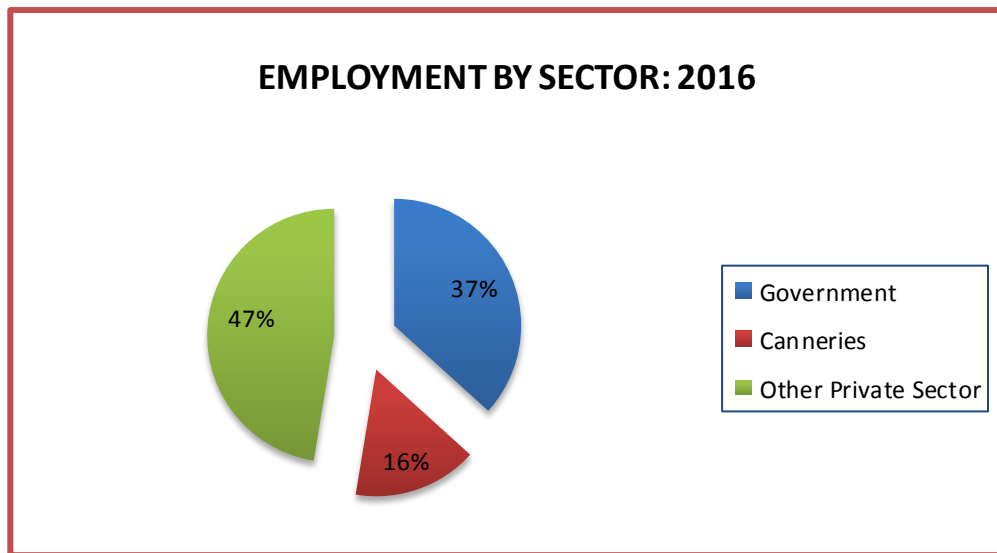
In 2010, about 57.8 percent of all persons or 54.4 percent of families were below the national poverty level. Of the 3,875 grandparents reported to have lived with their grandchildren, 66 percent of them were responsible for grandchildren.

Section Eleven

CONSUMER PRICES AND EXPENDITURES

This section presents statistical data on local consumer prices and indices with some household expenditure information from previous household surveys.

The Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HIES) was conducted on April 1st, 2015. This mid-decade survey's purpose is to determine household spending (in terms of household expenditures) and most importantly revise the Consumer Price Index market basket. The 2015 HIES is now completed with the final report issued on January 23rd, 2017. Published in this publication in Table 11.6 is combined detail group and sub-group expenditures from the 2015 HIES. However, the CPI revision will be published in our 2017 statistical yearbook.

The Consumer Price Index in 2016 registered at an average of 135.4 index points for All Items. The average inflation rate in 2016 was calculated at -0.1 percent. Table 11.4 shows average retail prices of selected commodities from 2005-2015. Units for a few commodities were changed and noted on the bottom of the table. Noted also were the corrections to the CPIs since the second quarter of 2008. A review of the average retail price of some commodities uncovered a posting error, hence the revisions. However, they were of minute differences.

Section Twelve

COMMUNICATION AND TRANSPORTATION

This section presents statistical data on communication and transportation services including vehicle registration and driver licenses, vessel and cargo movements, and air traffic and aircraft operations.

The number of landline telephones dropped significantly in 2016 (7,818) in 2016 compared to 2015 (8,031). Cellular phones however increased slightly in 2016 by 0.2%. Internet subscribers increased to 3,194 in 2015 and then again at 4,515 in 2016.

There were 3,072 cable service subscribers in 2016 which is a slight increase of 3% from 2015. There were 28,054 text message subscribers in 2016, a huge increase of 6.2% from 2015.

The number of registered vehicles recorded by the Office of Motor Vehicles in 2016 was 8,373 a drop of 13 percent when compared to the previous year. Commercial and private vehicles make up the majority of vehicles in the Territory. ASG vehicles accounted for 700-plus vehicles in the Territory.

The number of drivers' licenses and permits issued in 2016 dropped to 6,402 from 7,391 in 2015. Both private licenses and commercial permits contributed to this drop.

The vessel movement and cargo movement within the Territory in 2016 indicated significant decrease from the previous year.

There were 4,020 flights that landed at Pago Pago International Airport in 2016 compared to 3,686 in 2015. The incoming flights carried 66,480 passengers and the same number of flights took off carrying 68,628 passengers. About 2.7 million pounds of cargo and 1.6 million pounds of mail were brought in by commercial carriers. Outgoing cargo and mail were reported at 1.5 million and less than 500 thousand respectively.

In 2016, there were 174 flights between Pago Pago and Honolulu. This is an average of 15 flights per month. There were 3,518 flights between Pago Pago and Samoa (an average of 293 flights per month).

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Section Thirteen

AGRICULTURE AND FISHING

This section presents statistics on agricultural land, farms, farm tenures, field crops and livestock, and local fishing.

The Agricultural Census, which is conducted every five years, is usually conducted as supplement to the Decennial Census of Population and Housing. The one slated for 2013 was canceled due to the unavailability of financial assistance from USDA-NASS. Therefore, data is reproduced as presented in table 13.1 to table 13.9 from the 2008 Agricultural Census.

A total of 5,840 farms were covered in 2008. Approximately 39 percent of total land area (19,003 acres) is used for farming. This includes cropland, pastureland, and other farm uses including woodland. The majority of farms were cropland farms covering over 12,971 acres of land. Forty-four percent of farms were 1 to 2 acres in size. Another 22 percent were one or less acre in size. Similar distributions of average farm sizes were seen in both the 2003 and 2008 censuses.

All agricultural farming whether for commercial resale or home consumption were valued at \$49.3 million in 2008. This is a significant drop from the 2003 census with \$58.2 million. The drop in value of agriculture farming was probably due to flooding which affected American Samoa in 2003 and Hurricane Heta that devastated the islands in January 2004.

Staple food sold at the market like giant taro increased slightly in FY2016 whereas taro dropped for the second year in a row. Breadfruit and green banana increased in FY2016. Vegetables sold at the marketplace increased significantly in FY2016.

About 80,353 pounds of fish were caught by local fishermen in 2016. This is a huge drop from 2015 which recorded 109,087 pounds of fish that were caught by local fishermen. Trolling and bottom fishing and spear fishing methods increased in terms of fish caught whereas trolling, bottom fishing and longlining had reduced number of fish caught. Only 13 boats were used for fishing in 2016. Number of fishermen dropped to 52 in 2016 from 84 in 2015.

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Section Fourteen

COMMERCE AND TRADE

This section covers data on trade, government purchases, and business registration.

In this publication, trade data is classified using the 2012 Harmonized System Code at the two-digit level.

The American Samoa Balance of Trade in fiscal year 2016 recorded a deficit of \$269.6 million. Imports include government purchases, value of fish brought in for processing for the canneries, and value of commercial merchandise brought in for resale. Trade data is still considered incomplete because of the absence of the Post Exchange (PX) data from the import series. The value of exports is made up primarily of canned tuna and by-products.

Imports brought in through Customs Regulations for commercial use and resale valued at \$459.7 million in fiscal year 2016. The United States continued to be American Samoa's leading trade partner, followed by Korea, New Zealand, Samoa and Fiji.

The Department of Commerce and Treasury have been collaborating on improving import statistics to capture imports to include value, quantity and unit of measure, country of import and origin, as well classifying commodities in the HS coding system. Although a new system was implemented in FY2015, the project has been stalled and Customs reverted back to the old system in capturing imports and exports.

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Section Fifteen

ELECTRICITY AND WATER

This section presents statistical data on electricity production and consumption, number of meters and water usage.

Total gross kWh of electricity generated in 2016 amounted to 170 million. About 8.4 million kWh were used in the production of electricity, netting 161 million kWh for sale. With 8.9 percent of line loss, about 148.3 million kWh were sold. Fuel efficiency dropped again to 14 kWh per gallon for the past year. Lube efficiency dropped to 2,875 in 2016.

About 12 million gallons of fuel were consumed in FY2016. The average cost of a gallon of fuel dropped again in consecutive years to \$2.027 in FY2016. With the decrease in fuel cost, the fuel surcharge also dropped proportionally in this period.

The number of meters went down in FY2016 to 12,306. The majority of meters were for residential usage (about 87 percent of total meters). About 8.2 percent were for commercial usage. The rest were for government (3.4 percent), ASPA (1.2 percent) and large power (.05 percent).

In 2016, about 1,796 million gallons of water were sold by the American Samoa Power Authority (ASPA).

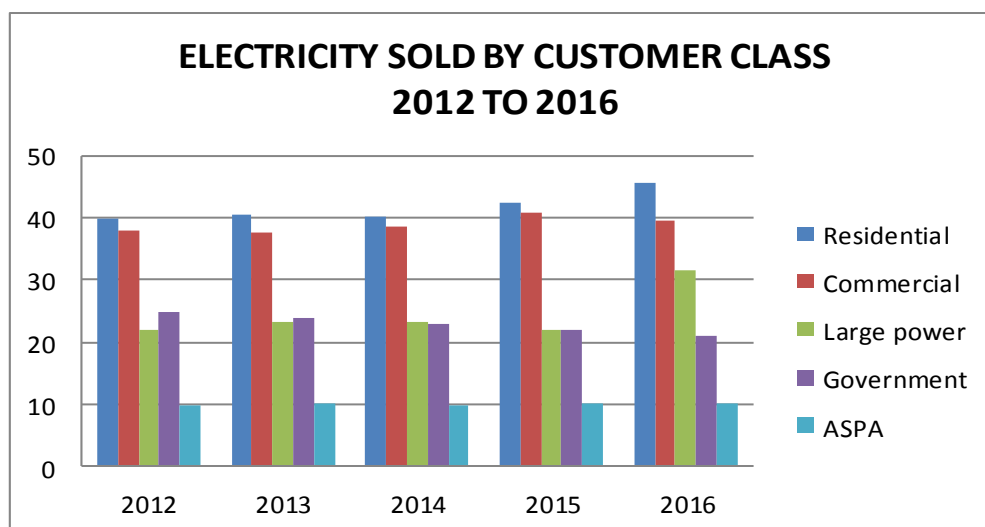

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Section Sixteen

NATIONAL ACCOUNTS

This section on national accounts was added to include GDP for American Samoa as released by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis.

The Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) under the U.S. Department of Commerce, through the Statistical Improvement Program funded by the Office of Insular Affairs (OIA) of the U.S. Department of the Interior has been developing formal methodologies for measuring the GDP of American Samoa and other Island Areas (Guam, CNMI and U.S. Virgin Islands).

Since 2010, BEA has released annual estimates of gross domestic product (GDP) for American Samoa from 2002-2016. According to BEA, gross domestic product in 2015 and 2016 was \$659 million and \$658 million respectively. Real GDP, which is GDP adjusted to remove price changes, was \$649 million (2015) and \$632 million (2016). Per capita GDP was \$11,170 (2015) and \$10,785 (2016).

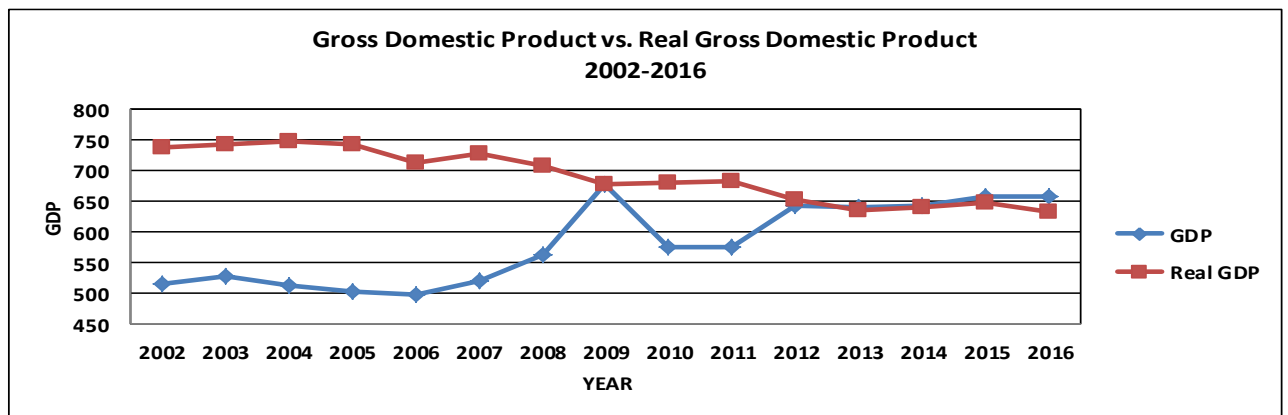
